Mr. JOSIAH A. BRIGGS, Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx: Sir—In accordance with your instructions I have the honor to submit the following report of work done under my charge during the months of April, May and June,

The Topographical Bureau of the President of the Borough of The Bronx is charged with the following duties:

I. To make the topopgraphical surveys, computations, maps or plans and profiles and reports in connection with the following three (3) divisions of work:

(a) The preparation of a design for the street system in those parts of the borough where a design is not adopted as yet, and the making of surveys, maps, etc., showing changes of adopted street system and grades; also the preparation of three copies for filing of all matters which have been adopted by the Local Boards or approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

ment.
(b) The actual demarcation on the ground by monument stones and cop-

per bolts on the lines of adopted avenues, streets, public squares, places, etc., and the protection of the same when improvements are being made.

(c) The making of surveys, searches, maps, technical descriptions, profiles, etc., for the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment in the matter of acquiring title by the City to avenues, streets and other public property.

II. To keep in custody the record and maps of all matters pertaining to work under the jurisdiction of the Topographical Bureau; also keeping in custody all maps filed in relation to the Borough of The Bronx under the Department of Public Parks, the Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth wards, and the President of the Borough of The Bronx.

III. To make examinations, maps and reports on miscellaneous matters referred by the Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx.

I.-(a) Preparation of the Design of a Street System, Maps Showing Changes of Adopted Street Systems, etc.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment on May 29, 1903, approved a tentative plan of the street system east of the Bronx river, which amended previously filed plans and laid out streets over such areas, which had not been taken up.

Calculations, maps and plans showing dimensions of blocks and grades of streets and avenues were progressed on those sections which are not interfered with by the proposed railroads through the borough.

The fixture sheets, which show the relation between the new street system and existing street lines and property lines by dimensions and co-ordinates, were pro-

gressed.

Computations were also made for all the changes or establishing of new street lines, grades, etc., which had been before the Local Boards and for which maps were forwarded to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for adoption and filing.

Studies to extend the present adopted street system from the Eastern boulevard are well advanced.

easterly to the Sound are well advanced.

Studies and maps are in progress rearranging the street system, showing the lines of the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway, from the Bronx river to the northern boundary of the city; also for the Clason's Point section.

Examinations and alterations of the proposed grades of the above railway, from Willis avenue to the Bronx river, were also made.

New comparative lists were prepared showing the changes of grades of the railroad, the grades of the intersecting avenues and streets, the clearance under the bridges crossing the streets, for the purpose of making a new report to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

The results of the above studies and examinations in relation to the New York.

The results of the above studies and examinations in relation to the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway were embodied in a map and submitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment as an amendment to the tentative plan of the street

This map embraces the area from the Bronx river to the northern boundary of the City, and from 600 feet to 1,000 feet easterly and westerly of the line of the railroad.

III. To Make Examinations, Maps and Reports on Miscellaneous Matters Referred by the Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx.

During the quarter 359 communications were referred for report to the Topographical Bureau by the Chief Engineer and the Secretary of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, and 328 reports and letters were written on these subjects.

Numbering of Houses in the Borough.

The Board of Aldermen, on April 26, 1904, resolved that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and is hereby requested to authorize the Comptroller to issue Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$5,000, in accordance with the provisions of subdivision 8, section 188, of the amended Greater New York Charter, the proceeds thereof to be applied to the cost and expense of renumbering and naming the streets and avenues in the Borough of The Bronx, and the

The system of house numbering in the Borough of The Bronx was determined as delineated in the report of the Topographical Bureau for the quarter ending March 21, 1906, and the sending out of notices for the district west of the ending March 31, 1906, and the sending out of notices for the district west of the

Bronx river is completed.

A map showing the house numbers for the Borough of The Bronx was prepared for the purpose of having the same photo-lithographed and printed. Proof sheets have been received and the map will be ready for distribution next month.

Numerous property maps filed in the office of the Register of the City and County of New York were copied for office use.

New maps showing Inspectors' districts in the Borough of The Bronx were made in the Topographical Bureau.

A sketch for an iron enclosure for the old Ten Mile monument located at Boston road and East One Hundred and Sixty-eighth street was prepared.

Studies and plans were made for locating a bridge across the East river connecting the Borough of The Bronx with the Borough of Queens from the old Ferry Point to Whitestone.

Maps were prepared suggesting additional rapid transit lines in the Borough of The Bronx.

In case any property above described is used for any public purpose, such as a highway, etc., such use shall continue until The City of New York shall have legal right to take possession of or change the same.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the consent, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
