Dear Sir—A contract for the construction of an addition to the Ridgewood pumping station was some time ago entered into by the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

The Chief Engineer of the Department, for Brooklyn, has reported that the excavations for the foundations have developed quicksands, which make necessary a material modification of the plans, and a consequent increase of cost to the extent of about \$65,000. As you are aware, a material change in the terms of a City contract can only be made by agreement, and with the assent of the Board of Aldermen, and further, that any increase of outlay in such case is not protected by competitive bidding.

There is some question as to the necessity of this outlay, and we think that before it is authorized a further examination into the facts should be made. We therefore respectfully request that you will cause action by the Board of Aldermen upon the subject to be suspended for two weeks in order that this association may have a competent engineering examination made, the result of which will be duly submitted for your information.

Dear Sir—in connection with the improvement and paving of Coney Island avenue, from the Plaza to Neptune avenue, I beg to forward form of ordinance to be introduced in the Board of Aldermen, reducing the width of sidewalks on Coney Island avenue, between the above limits, from 25 feet to 15 feet, so that the curb lines will be 15 feet from and parallel with the building lines.

AN ORDINANCE to reduce the width of the sidewalks on Coney Island avenue, from the Plaza at Parkside avenue to Neptune avenue.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

That the width of the sidewalks on Coney Island avenue, from the Plaza at Parkside avenue to Neptune avenue be reduced from twenty-five (25) feet to fifteen (15) feet so that the curb lines will be fifteen (15) feet from and parallel with the building lines.

Sir—at a meeting of the Board of Health of the Department of Health, held April 22, 1908, the following preamble and resolution were adopted:

Whereas, The Commissioner of Health has been notified by the Comptroller that it will be necessary to purchase fresh fruits and vegetables in future by contract through public letting instead of through departmental orders as heretofore; and

Whereas, Inquiries by both the Department of Health and the Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals have developed the fact that it is far more economical to purchase these supplies through the issuance of monthly departmental orders, inasmuch as contractors will not bind themselves to furnish supplies of a character subject to great fluctuations in price by reason of weather conditions, railroad situations, etc., for months in advance without demanding compensation sufficient to cover every contingency; therefore be it

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 419 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Aldermen be and is hereby respectfully requested to authorize the Board of Health of the Department of Health of The City of New York, to purchase in the open market, without public letting, fresh fruits and vegetables as required in the institutions of said Department from time to time during the year 1908, at a total cost not to exceed the sum of \$5,000.

Dear Sir—My attention has been called to the fact that there is a misunderstanding on the part of some Aldermen in regard to the import of the resolution now before your Honorable Board of Aldermen embodying my request for an issue of Revenue Bonds to provide for cleaning the streets of the City by the use of flushing machines.

The impression seems to prevail that the machines will render hand sweeping unnecessary, and that in consequence the street cleaning force is to be reduced.

This impression is entirely erroneous, for, on the contrary, the request, as you will observe, states that it is proposed to have the machine flushing supplemented by hand sweeping, and this will require a large number of additional Sweepers, so that the funds asked for are to be utilized to extend the work of cleaning and not as a substitute for the present method. The work performed by the hand Sweepers will be materially expedited.

In addition to the extra number of men to be employed by the Department will be the men employed by the contractor to drive and operate the machine.

It is greatly to be desired that the action taken by the Board of Aldermen in this matter should be prompt, as the time is slipping by and it is important to begin the work before the hot weather.

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York:

Gentlemen—There is no doubt that one great assisting cause in the impoverishment of the soil in Central Park is lack of water to properly feed the earth to supply moisture to the grass, shrubs and trees, and I strongly advocate the immediate extension of the water system, as shown on accompanying map and indicated by green and yellow lines. I would propose making all the trenches and caring for the shrubs and trees, and laying the pipe with our own force of men; letting only the contract for the purchase of the pipe.

The total estimated cost of this work is \$135,000, and if early authorization is given by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment I believe this Department would have the work well under way and ready in part, at least, for the coming summer, and thereby stay, in a measure, the further deterioration of the soil, besides being prepared to protect and preserve any improvement that is made in reclaiming the soil by addition of earth and fertilizers, as it may be found wise to do later on.

The sum asked for to do sufficient amount of this work to carry us over this year is \$100,000.

The Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and concurs in the following resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment April 24, 1908, and authorizes the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount and for the purposes therein specified:

Sir—Hon. John H. O'Brien, Commissioner, Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, in communication under date of February 14, 1908, requests the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize an issue of Corporate Stock to the amount of \$150,000, for laying water mains in the Borough of Queens. I would report:

The proposed work includes the laying of about 46,000 feet of 8-inch pipe in Flushing, College Point, Whitestone, Bayside, Douglas Manor and Little Neck; 2,700 feet of 12-inch pipe, and 925 feet of 16-inch pipe in Flushing, and about 10,800 feet of 20-inch pipe in Broadway, from Bayside Pumping Station to Cemetery lane, Flushing.

The 8-inch and 12-inch pipe are to be laid in response to petitions filed with the Department of Water Supply, for the purpose of extending the distribution system to districts recently opened up, and as the development of this portion of the Borough is largely dependent on the supply of water for sanitary, fire and other purposes, I believe that it would be to the City's interest to grant this request, for the laying of the 8 and 12-inch pipe.

Regarding the 925 feet of 16-inch pipe to be laid on Murray lane, to supplement and improve the distribution service by providing a second distributing line from the stand pipe on High street, I believe that the cost of this item, about \$3,500, should also be included in the amount granted.

Regarding the 10,800 feet of 20-inch pipe, proposed to be laid on Broadway, between Bayside Pumping Station and Flushing, I would state that the necessity for this main is solely dependent on the completion of the Oakland Lake filtration plant and new pumping machinery connected therewith. As these works have not yet been advertised and since their construction will require at least a year, I believe that the granting of this item of a 20-inch main on Broadway, which will cost about \$50,000, may safely be withheld until next year; this will leave a net amount of \$100,000, which will be sufficient to cover the necessary work, and this amount I would recommend be appropriated.

I therefore suggest that you advise the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that, pursuant to section 178 of the Greater New York Charter, it may properly authorize the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock to the amount of \$100,000, to be used for laying water mains in the Borough of Queens.

Dear Sir—For lack of sufficient funds I am obliged to withhold the making of any further contracts for the laying of water mains in the newly built up sections of the Borough of Queens. Mains are now being extended under two contracts and the Department has completed surveys and estimates for another contract, which is about to be printed. This covers streets and avenues which have been improved by the erection of dwelling houses, and we have on file the petitions of the property owners and residents, demanding proper water service and protection to their property against fire.

The work outlined under the contract which has just been prepared will cost \$170,000. There will be a balance of about \$20,000 from the Water Fund Account,

which will be applied to this work, making the deficit \$150,000. This money will have to be provided for by an issue of Corporate Stock, pursuant to section 178 of the revised Charter.

This work is an absolute necessity, and several of the streets included under this new contract have been in readiness for this improvement for some time, and the people have been waiting patiently for the Department to extend its water service.

Sir—In the matter of the request of the Metropolitan Sewerage Commission for an issue of \$5,000 Corporate Stock, referred to the Comptroller by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and by you to the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics for examination, I beg to report as follows:

The Metropolitan Sewerage Commission was created by chapter 639, Laws of 1906, which provided for the appointment by the Mayor of five Commissioners to investigate and consider means for protecting the waters of New York Bay and vicinity against pollution. The law creating the Commission provides for the disbursement of a sum not to exceed \$15,000 to pay the expenses of the Commission.

On June 29, 1906, an issue of \$5,000 Corporate Stock was authorized for this purpose. On March 1, 1907, a second issue of \$5,000 Corporate Stock was authorized for the same purpose. The Commission, therefore, since its organization has received \$10,000 of the \$15,000 authorized for its expenditures. The premium derived from the sale of stock amounted to \$49.80. The total amount credited to the Commission was \$10,049.80.

The debts contracted amount to \$1,824.79 in excess of the sum heretofore appropriated for the expenses of the Commission. This amount does not include compensation for the Commissioners. Section 6 of chapter 639, Laws of 1906, which relates thereto says:

"The members of the Commission shall receive no salary, but shall be paid their reasonable and necessary expenses actually incurred in the prosecution of their duties, and shall each be paid a just and reasonable per diem compensation, to be determined by the Mayor of The City of New York for the time actually and necessarily employed on the work of the Commission."

The Mayor has fixed the compensation of the Commissioners at \$5 per diem. It is estimated that the compensation due to members and former members of the Commission will amount to \$4,000. If such compensation is chargeable to the \$15,000 authorized by the legislative enactment of 1906 for the expenses of the Commission, the \$5,000 appropriation now asked for will not meet the liabilities of the Commission. There would be an apparent deficit of \$824.79.

The membership of the Commission changed by reappointments and new appointments by the Mayor, January 10, 1908. Its members are George A. Soper, President; James H. Fuertes, Secretary; Charles Sooysmith, H. B. Parsons and Linsly R. Williams.

In a signed communication to the Mayor dated March 16, 1908, the Commissioners say:

"1. The harbor is now polluted and this pollution is increasing at a rapid rate.
2. Sewage and other drainage is now being discharged into these waters without restriction by any legal authority.

"3. Sewers and sewerage systems, some of great magnitude, are being built in New York and its vicinity without reference to any general scheme or policy for protecting the public health and welfare. All of these will discharge into the harbor.

"4. The Metropolitan Sewerage Commission has been appointed to investigate these conditions, place the responsibility for safeguarding the harbor and outline a general plan or policy by which nuisance and injury to health from contamination can be prevented.

"5. Most of the work for which the Commission was appointed still remains to be accomplished, but there are no funds with which to complete it.

"6. In order to make an authoritative study of this subject in accordance with the requirements of the Act, we estimate that \$75,000 and about two years of time will be necessary."

The Commission is required to submit its report to the Mayor on or before February 1, 1909. Under the law creating the Commission, it will go out of existence May 1, 1909. However, it is reasonable to suppose that the great importance of the work entrusted to the Commission will influence the Legislature to extend the term of office of the Commissioners and also to authorize additional funds for the continuation of their investigations.

Your Examiner recommends that the request of the Metropolitan Sewerage Commission for an issue of \$5,000 Corporate Stock be granted.

Sir—In a letter dated March 14, 1908, Mr. J. K. Paulding, Secretary of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, forwards to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment a request for an appropriation of \$50,000 to provide for the equipment of Pavilions "A" and "B" of the new Bellevue Hospital. I would report:

These new pavilions are fast approaching completion and should be ready for service within a few months. Mr. Paulding submits with his application to the Board, a detailed list of the proposed equipment of the hospital.

I have examined the list in detail and it appears that the prices there quoted are reasonable and proper and the list, as a whole, seems to be not extravagant and to contain nothing not properly called for in the equipment of a hospital of this character.

I find that there remains of the original appropriation of \$850,000 for the construction of Pavilions "A" and "B" of the new Bellevue Hospital an unexpended balance of something more than \$100,000 and in lieu of making an additional appropriation of \$50,000 for this purpose, it occurs to me that an amendment of the original resolution so as to permit of that authorization of \$850,000 being extended to cover the equipment of the hospital, would be sufficient to make the funds then authorized available for this purpose.

I therefore recommend that the resolution of March 16, 1905, appropriating \$850,000 to provide means for the construction of the new Bellevue Hospital be amended so as to include construction and equipment of the new Bellevue Hospital.

To the Board of Education:

The Committee on Buildings respectfully reports that the following communication has been received from the City Superintendent of Schools:

"Gentlemen—Since I made my report to your Committee on the sites which it is most desirable to improve for the purpose of relieving existing congestion in the schools, the City has acquired title to the site at Park and Grinnell avenues and Randall street, North Corona, Borough of Queens. Had the Board owned this site at the time I made up my report last February, I should have placed the improvement of this site among the most urgent improvements to be made. If there is still time, I recommend that a building on this site be erected, and that, in order to find money for the purpose, the proposed building adjoining Public School 99, Avenue K and East Ninth street, Brooklyn, be postponed for the present. In support of this proposition, I beg leave to say that in Public Schools 16 and 19, Corona, there are at present 637 pupils on part time, and in Public School 15, North Corona, there are 635 pupils on part time.

"Those who know the district well, assure me that the new building now in course of erection for No. 16 will relieve the crowded condition for only about six months and that further relief is urgently needed.

"I therefore recommend that a forty-eight classroom building with a division of classrooms as per the enclosed plan, be erected on the site at Park and Grinnell avenues and Randall street, North Corona, Borough of Queens."

Your Committee concurs in the recommendation of the City Superintendent of Schools and submits for adoption the following resolution:

Resolved, That the report and resolution adopted by the Board of Education on April 8, 1908 (see Journal, pages 573 to 576), relative to requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the issue of Corporate Stock to the amount of \$4,107,075 for the general construction of new elementary school buildings and additions, and necessary expenses in connection therewith, be and it is hereby amended by striking out the following, which appears under the caption, "Borough of Brooklyn;" "36, No. 99 (new) East Ninth street, near Avenue K, twenty-six rooms, \$182,000;" by striking out the amount in the total for said Borough and inserting instead the amount "\$2,099,000;" by inserting immediately under the caption "Borough of Queens" the following: "42, No. 92 Park and Grinnell avenues and Randall street, North Corona, forty-eight rooms, \$182,000;" and by striking out the amount in the total for said last-mentioned Borough and inserting instead the amount "\$1,286,500."

Sir—In the matter of a communication from the Board of Education requesting the authorization of an issue of Corporate Stock during the balance of the year 1908 to the amount of \$11,306,809 for the construction, equipment and improvement of school buildings and premises, which matter has already been partially considered in a report from the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics to the Comptroller, adopted at a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held March 13, recommending the immediate issue of \$2,164,704 of said amount, under the provisions of clause 9, section 169 of the Charter, for the purpose of equipping new school buildings already under roof, I beg to report further as follows:

The total amount requested by the Board of Education is distributed as follows:

As hereinbefore stated, the amount requested for equipping school buildings now under construction (Schedule A) has already been authorized. In addition to this amount (\$2,164,704) the Board of Estimate and Apportionment has since authorized the issue of Corporate Stock to the amount of \$600,000 for the construction of a new building for the Washington Irving High School, Manhattan, and of \$1,000,000 for permanent betterments for fire protection in sundry schools which are considered unsafe, requests for said amount for the former purpose and for \$3,000,000 for the latter having been presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, subsequently to the original report of the Board of Education asking for \$11,306,809 for school building purposes for the current year.

In addition to the need of an immediate appropriation for the construction of elementary schools, it would appear that provision should be made for additional high school accommodations in the Borough of Brooklyn without delay. The original report of the Board of Education requested \$900,000 for additions to the Girls' High School, Erasmus Hall and the Boys' High School in said Borough, and stated that two additional new buildings for high school purposes are imperatively needed—one in the Ridgewood section and one in South Brooklyn. The figures compiled by the Committee on High and Training Schools and transmitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, subsequently to the request for \$11,306,809 show that nearly 2,000 high school pupils are now being accommodated in annexes in the Borough of Brooklyn, and that the high school registration in said Borough is increasing at the rate of approximately 2,500 pupils per year at the present time.

The high school congestion in Brooklyn is greatest in the Girls' High School and in Erasmus Hall High School, and your Examiner would therefore recommend that the amounts requested for additions to said schools, viz., \$100,000 for the former and \$400,000 for the latter, be authorized at this time. In addition to said amounts, your Examiner would also recommend the authorization of Corporate Stock to the amount of \$4,107,075 for the construction of elementary schools and necessary expenses in connection therewith, including salaries of Draughtsmen, surveys, borings, draughting room supplies, etc., according to the resolution attached hereto, the specific contracts

to be covered by said amount having been designated by the Board of Education at the request of the Comptroller.

The Committee on Buildings respectfully reports that at a meeting held on April 6, 1908, consideration was had on the following communication:

"April 1, 1908.

"Hon. EGERTON L. WINTHROP, Jr., President of the Board of Education:

"Dear Sir—Concerning the recent request of the Board of Education for an issue of Corporate Stock during the balance of the year 1908 to the amount of \$11,306,800, for the construction, equipment and improvement of school buildings and premises, \$2,164,704 of which amount has already been authorized for equipment, permit me to say that I am ready to recommend the authorization of \$4,000,000 for the construction of elementary schools if you will kindly furnish me with data showing the specific purposes for which it will be used.

The matter has been taken up with the City Superintendent of Schools and the Superintendent of School Buildings. The City Superintendent states that school accommodations are more deficient in the Borough of Brooklyn than in any other Borough, as is indicated by the fact that on February 28, 1908, there were 38,107 children on part time instruction, and that the order of necessity by Boroughs is as follows:

Brooklyn, Queens, Manhattan, The Bronx, Richmond.

Your Committee has selected as most urgent the school buildings enumerated in the subjoined list, all of which were embodied in the report adopted by the Board of Education on February 26, 1908 (see Journal, pages 345-346), with one exception, viz., Public School 28, Borough of Brooklyn. This building has been closed pending the making of certain changes to diminish danger in case of fire. It is a very old and poorly arranged frame structure, which, in the judgment of the City Superintendent, should never be used again.

Your Committee concurs with the City Superintendent and believes that this building should be demolished and replaced with a new fireproof edifice of at least thirty-six classrooms, to be constructed on the present site.

It is also deemed necessary to ask for a sum equal to five per cent. of the actual cost of erecting the buildings deemed most urgent, the same to be used for salaries of Draughtsmen, surveys, borings, draughting room supplies, etc.

Sir—Regarding the matter of the proposed increase in the annual salary of Stablemen in the Department of Street Cleaning, from \$720 to \$760, with extra pay for Sunday work at the rate of 25 cents per hour, referred by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to a Select Committee, consisting of the Comptroller and the President of the Board of Aldermen, and by you to this Bureau for investigation, I beg to report as follows:

As pointed out by the Commissioner in his communication requesting the increase, provision was made in the 1908 Budget for similar increases to other classes of the uniformed force of the Department, while the application made on behalf of the Stablemen was ignored.

It does not appear, however, that this action was due to any misapprehension, as suggested by the Commissioner. The chief reason was undoubtedly the insistent demand for rigid economy made at the time of final consideration of the department.

mental estimates, which necessitated the excision from the Budget of every item open to possible question.

A careful investigation of the subject, however, fails to show any ground upon which a continuance of this discrimination can justly be based. Your examiner is assured by the Commissioner of Street Cleaning that he can see no practical difference in the value or the difficulty of the work performed by the two classes of men. Both work the same number of hours and the advantages and disadvantages of the two positions are about equally divided. The objection, therefore, which has been made to equalizing the pay of Sweepers and Drivers, *viz.*, that it would result in creating a dearth of the latter, whose work is more exacting, does not obtain in this case, nor is there any ground upon which the present increase to the Stablemen can be made the excuse for a further increase to the Hostlers at some future time.

The fact undoubtedly is that the small increase here proposed would be only a partial recognition of the greatly increased cost of living which has occurred within recent years, and it is therefore recommended that the request of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment recommend to the Board of Aldermen that the annual salary of Stablemen in the Department of Street Cleaning be fixed at \$760, with extra pay for Sunday work at the rate of 25 cents per hour, be granted, said increased rates to take effect upon the action of the Board so fixing them.

REPORTS:

Realizing the importance of the subject the Committee has given it the most careful consideration. A public hearing was held March 19, 1908, and an opportunity given all persons interested to be heard.

Except for a few positions in the "Inspection Service," the rates of compensation set forth in each grade seemed to meet the approval of all the speakers, but a decided opposition was made to limiting increases of salaries to \$150 in any one year, on the ground that it provided for the service of one year in the grade only as the requisite for an increase of salary and was not based upon merit and fitness, which is contrary to the letter and spirit of the Civil Service Laws, a ground which your Committee considered not without merit, as it would place employees only one year in a grade, for the purpose of an increase of salary, upon the same footing with employees who had been years in the same grade, and would be unjust to many who have grown gray in the service of the City.

Limiting the increase of any salary in a grade to \$150 in any one year, would prevent the City from competing for the retention of the services of a particularly efficient employee when private individuals sought his services at a greater increase of salary.

While there may be some merit in limiting increases of salaries not to exceed \$150 at any one time, your Committee feel that the head of each department in the City government should have power to increase salaries within a grade, automatically increasing \$150 at a time, to the maximum of a grade in a year if an employee be worthy of such increase.

The placing of the position of Janitors of the Board of Education in "The Attendance Service," in a grade from \$540 to \$1,200 per annum, would paralyze the work of caring for school buildings. In that department a sum is fixed for the entire care of a school building, the amount being figured upon the size of the building, the floor and yard space, number of boilers, furnaces, stoves, steam and gas engines, pumps, dynamos, hot water heaters, etc. The moneys paid to a public school Janitor do not

constitute a salary, as he is responsible for the entire plant and fixes and defrays the cost of labor out of the moneys received from the Board of Education, receiving himself, as compensation, the differences between the sum of his disbursements and the total sum paid to him. It is obvious that the grades recommended, running from \$540 to \$1,200 for the position of Janitor are absurd as respects the Board of Education.

Your Committee disapproves of the schedule as herewith presented and recommends the following resolution for adoption:

Section 458—Lights—Each and every vehicle using the public streets or highways of this City, except vehicles of licensed truckmen, shall show, between one hour after sunset and one hour before sunrise, a light or lights so placed as to be seen from the front and each side; if dash lantern is carried, it shall be placed on the left hand side; such light or lights to be of sufficient illuminating power to be visible at a distance of 200 feet; said light or lights shall show white in front but may be colored on the sides, excepting licensed truckmen. Every automobile shall exhibit during the same period two lamps showing white lights visible at a distance of 300 feet in the direction toward which the automobile is proceeding, and shall also exhibit a red light, visible in the reverse direction. The lamps shall be so placed as to be free from obstruction to light from other parts of said automobile. *No operator of any automobile or other motor vehicle, while operating the same upon the public highway, within the City, shall use any acetylene, electric or other headlight, unless properly shaded so as not to blind or dazzle other users of the highway, or make it difficult or unsafe for them to ride, drive or walk thereon.* In the Borough of The Bronx, excepting south of Tremont avenue and One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street, east of Jerome avenue and west of the Bronx River, and in the Boroughs of Richmond and Queens, and in the Twenty-sixth, Thirtieth, Thirty-first and Thirty-second Wards of the Borough of Brooklyn, every car or other vehicle between said hours, while moving on, along, or standing upon the portion of streets in said Boroughs or parts of Boroughs, shall also carry a light or lights of such illuminating power as to be plainly visible 200 feet, both ahead and behind said car or vehicle.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

The term "cream" means that portion of milk represented in milk fat which rises to the surface of milk on standing or is separated from it by centrifugal force and which is fresh and clean. The term "adulterated," when used in this section, refers to cream to which any foreign substance whatever has been added, or which contains less than 15 per cent. of butter fat.

Resolved, That the following additional sections to the Sanitary Code to be known as sections 56a, 56b and 56c be and the same are hereby adopted to read as follows:

Section 56a. All milk held, kept, offered for sale or sold and delivered in The City of New York shall be so held, kept, offered for sale or sold and delivered under either or any of the following grades or designations and under no other, and in accordance with such rules and regulations as may be adopted by the Board of Health, namely:

Milk—This term shall be applied to cows' milk which conforms to the requirements of section 53 of the Sanitary Code and which does not meet the requirements of milk sold under other grades or designations herein provided for.

Selected Milk—This is milk produced by farms holding a permit therefor from the Board of Health and handled according to the rules and regulations of said Board.

Inspected Milk—Which is milk produced under the supervision of a Milk Commission appointed by the Medical Society of the County of New York or by the Medical Society of the County of Kings, or under certificates for "inspected milk" issued by said Commission. No milk, however, shall be held, kept, offered for sale or sold and delivered as inspected milk in The City of New York which is produced under requirements less than those of the said Board for selected milk.

Guaranteed Milk—Which is milk produced by farms holding a permit therefor from the Board of Health and produced and handled in accordance with the rules and regulations of said Board.

Certified Milk—Which is milk certified by the Milk Commission appointed by the Medical Society of the County of New York or the Medical Society of the County of Kings as being produced under the supervision and in conformity with the requirements of that Commission as laid down for certified milk. No milk, however, shall be held, kept, offered for sale or sold and delivered as certified milk in The City of New York which is produced under requirements less than those of the said Board for guaranteed milk.

Skimmed Milk—Which is milk containing less than 3 per cent. butter fat.

Condensed Skimmed Milk—Which is milk in which the butter fat is less than 25 per cent. of the total milk solids.

Condensed Milk—Which is milk from which any part of the water has been removed, or milk from which any part of the water has been removed and to which sugars have been added.

The provisions of this section shall not apply to buttermilk, or to milk products commonly known as kumyss, matzoak, zoolak, dried milk or milk powder, or to other similar preparations, or to cream or modified milk.

Section 56b. No milk shall be held, kept, offered for sale or sold and delivered in The City of New York which has been subjected to the action of heat commonly known as "Pasteurization" unless the receptacle in which the same is contained is plainly labeled "Pasteurized." Pasteurized milk shall not be sold as such unless the rules and regulations of the Board of Health in regard thereto have been complied with, and said term "Pasteurized" may be used in connection with any milk designated or graded as hereinbefore provided for.

Section 56c. No milk shall be held, kept, offered for sale or sold and delivered in The City of New York under either or any of the grades or designations provided for in section 56a hereof without a permit in writing therefor from the Board of Health subject to the conditions thereof and the rules and regulations of said Board (except condensed milk when contained in hermetically sealed cans), and said permit shall specify the grade or designation of milk which the holder of such permit is authorized to keep, offer for sale or deliver as aforesaid.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be enclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. There shall be published daily, Sundays and legal holidays excepted, under a contract to be made as hereinafter provided, a paper to be known as the CITY RECORD. And said CITY RECORD, and the newspapers now by law designated as corporation newspapers in the present City of Brooklyn, shall be the only papers to be included within the term corporation newspapers, as the same is used anywhere in this act; There shall be inserted in said CITY RECORD nothing aside from such official matters as are expressly authorized. . . . All advertising required to be done for the City, except as in this act otherwise specially provided, and all notices required by law or ordinance to be published in corporation papers, shall be inserted at the public expense only in the CITY RECORD, and the publication therein shall be a sufficient compliance with any law or ordinance requiring publication of such matters or notices. . . . The Comptroller shall cause a continuous series of the CITY RECORD to be bound as completed, quarterly, and to be deposited with his certificate thereon in the office of the Register of Deeds of the County of New York in the County Clerk's office of said County, and in the office of the City Clerk, and copies of the contents of any of the same, certified by such Register, County Clerk or City Clerk, shall be received in judicial proceedings as *prima facie* evidence of the truth of the contents thereof.—§1526, *Greater New York Charter*.
