MAYOR'S COMMITTEE ON LIBERTY LOAN.

SUBSCRIPTIONS BY CITY AND COUNTY OFFICIALS AND EMPLOYEES.

STANDING OF THE CITY AND COUNTY DEPARTMENTS.

The figures below are based upon subscriptions received up to 2 o'clock P. M. yesterday at the Comptroller's office, Room 851, Municipal Building, having been in the first instance turned in to the heads of the respective departments and by them transmitted to the Comptroller, as the Chairman of the Mayor's Committee. The Comptroller files a summary statement daily with the Commissioner of Accounts, as Chairman of the Executive Committee of the Mayor's Committee, and the latter calculates the departmental percentages upon the basis of one \$50 bond to the total payroll of each department, as provided in the 1917 budget, thereby fixing the base percentage for each department. In the interest of fairness the smaller boards, commissions, etc., have been grouped together for scoring purposes. Similarly certain county offices of each county have likewise been combined.

Alderman O'Rourke offered the following resolution:

No. 1662.

Resolved, That for the purpose of submitting to this Board a proper division of the Counties of the City into Assembly Districts, the following committee be appointed: Alderman Eagan, Chairman; Alderman Donnelly, Alderman Shields, Alderman Burden, Alderman Curley, Alderman Kenney, Alderman Browne, Alderman Heyman, Alderman O'Rourke, Alderman Trau and Alderman Diemer.

Which was adopted.

The Chairman presented the following tentative drafts of districts for the several courts embraced within the City of New York:

No. 1663.

COUNTY OF NEW YORK.

Whereas, Article three of the Constitution of the State of New York provides that in any City embracing an entire county and having no Board of Supervisors, the body exercising the powers of a common council shall assemble at such times as the Legislature making an apportionment of Assembly districts in the State shall prescribe, and divide any such county into Assembly districts as nearly equal in number of inhabitants, excluding aliens, as may be of convenient and contiguous territory, in as compact form as practicable, each of which shall be wholly within a Senate district formed under the same apportionment, and are to be equal in number to the members of Assembly to which such county shall be entitled; and

Whereas, by the provisions of Chapter 798 of the Laws of 1917, it is made the duty of the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York to meet on the 12th day of June, 1917, and proceed to divide the respective counties in such city into so many Assembly districts as they are entitled respectively to Members of Assembly under said law, therefore be it

Resolved, Pursuant to Article 3, Section 5, of the Constitution of the State of New York and the provisions of Chapter seven hundred and ninety-eight of the Laws of 1917, the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York do hereby divide the several courts respectively within such City into Assembly districts, numbered, bounded and described as hereinafter specified.

Resolved, That certificates be prepared and to be duly filed, signed by a majority of the Aldermen of said City, stating the number and descriptive boundary lines of each Assembly district with the number of inhabitants therein, exclusive of aliens.

First District. The First Assembly District shall consist of that portion of the Twelfth Senate District within and bounded by a line beginning at the junction of the East River and Gouverneur Slip, extending along Gouverneur Slip or Street to Water Street, along Water Street to Scammel Street, along Scammel Street to Cherry Street, along Cherry Street to Gouverneur Street, along Gouverneur Street to Grand Street, along Grand Street to Clinton Street, along Clinton Street to Henry Street, along Henry Street to Catharine Street, along Catharine Street to Division Street, along Division Street to Chrystie Street, along Chrystie Street to Canal Street, along Canal Street to Broadway, along Broadway to Broome Street, along Broome Street to Sullivan Street, along Sullivan Street to Spring Street, along Spring Street to McDougal Street, along McDougal Street to West Houston Street, along West Houston Street to Bedford Street, along Bedford Street to Seventh Avenue, along Seventh Avenue to Christopher Street, along Christopher Street to Bleeker Street, along Bleeker Street to Charles Street, along Charles Street to Greenwich Street, along Greenwich Street to West 10th Street, along West 10th Street to the Hudson River, along the Hudson and East Rivers to Gouverneur Slip, the place of beginning, including Governors, Bedloe's, Ellis and Oyster Islands.

Second District. The Second Assembly District shall consist of that portion of the Twelfth Senate District within and bounded by a line beginning at the intersection of Clinton and Grand Streets, extending thence along Grand Street to Essex Street, along Essex Street to Broome Street, along Broome Street to Ludlow Street, along Ludlow Street to East Houston Street, along East Houston Street to Second Avenue, along Second Avenue to East Fourth Street, along East Fourth Street to Broadway, along Broadway to West Third Street, along West Third Street to Sixth Avenue, along Sixth Avenue to West Washington Place, along West Washington Place to Seventh Avenue, along Seventh Avenue to Bedford Street, along Bedford Street to West Houston Street, along West Houston Street to McDougal Street, along McDougal Street to Spring Street, along Spring Street to Sullivan Street, along Sullivan Street to Broome Street, along Broome Street to Broadway, along Broadway to Canal Street, along Canal Street to Chrystie Street, along Chrystie Street to Division Street, along Division Street to Catharine Street, along Catharine Street to Henry Street, along Henry Street to Clinton Street, along Clinton Street to Grand Street, the place of beginning.

Third District. The Third Assembly District shall consist of that portion of the Thirteenth Senate District within and bounded by a line beginning at the junction of West Tenth Street and Hudson River, extending along West Tenth Street to Greenwich Street, along Greenwich Street to Charles Street, along Charles Street to Bleeker Street, along Bleeker Street to West Eleventh Street, along West Eleventh Street to West Fourth Street, along West Fourth Street to Bank Street, along Bank Street to Bleeker Street, along Bleeker Street to Eighth Avenue, along Eighth Avenue to West Fourteenth Street, along West Fourteenth Street to Seventh Avenue, along Seventh Avenue to West Thirty-seventh Street, along West Thirty-seventh Street to Eighth Avenue, along Eighth Avenue to West Fortieth Street, along West Fortieth Street to the Hudson River, along the Hudson River to West Tenth Street, the place of beginning.

82,120 inhabitants, excluding aliens.

Fourth District. The Fourth Assembly District shall consist of that portion of the Fourteenth Senate District beginning at the junction of the East River and Gouverneur Slip, extending thence along Gouverneur Slip and Gouverneur Street to Water Street, along Water Street to Scammel Street, along Scammel Street to Cherry Street, along Cherry Street to Gouverneur Street, along Gouverneur Street to Grand Street, along Grand Street to Essex Street, along Essex Street to Broome Street, along Broome Street to Ludlow Street, along Ludlow Street to Stanton Street, along Stanton Street to Suffolk Street, along Suffolk Street to East Houston Street, along East Houston Street to Sheriff Street, along Sheriff Street to Stanton Street, along Stanton Street to the East River and along the East River to Gouverneur Slip, the place of beginning.

54,553 inhabitants, excluding aliens.

Fifth District. The Fifth Assembly District shall consist of that portion of the Thirteenth Senate District within and bounded by a line beginning at the junction of West Fortieth street and the Hudson River, extending along West Fortieth street to Eighth avenue, along Eighth avenue to West Forty-third street, along West Forty-third street to Seventh avenue, along Seventh avenue to West Forty-fourth street, along West Forty-fourth street to Eighth avenue, along Eighth avenue to West Fifty-seventh street, along West Fifty-seventh street to Ninth avenue, along Ninth and Columbus avenues to West Sixty-third street, along West Sixty-third street to the Hudson River, along the Hudson River to West Fortieth street, the place of beginning.

81,460 inhabitants, excluding aliens.

Sixth District. The Sixth Assembly District shall consist of that portion of the Fourteenth Senate District within and bounded by a line beginning at the junction of the East River and Stanton Street, extending thence along Stanton street to Sheriff street, along Sheriff street to East Houston street, along East Houston Street to Avenue B, along Avenue B to East Tenth street, along East Tenth street to Avenue C, along Avenue C to East Twelfth street, along East Twelfth street to Avenue A, along Avenue A to East Fourteenth street, along East Fourteenth street to First avenue, along First avenue to East Fifteenth street, along East Fifteenth street to Second avenue, along Second avenue to East Sixteenth street, along East Sixteenth street to First avenue, along First avenue to East Seventeenth street, along East Seventeenth street to Avenue B, along Avenue B to East Eighteenth street, along East Eighteenth street to the East River, along the East River to Stanton street, the place of beginning.

The Seventh Assembly District shall consist of that portion of the Fifteenth Senate District within and bounded by a line beginning at the junction of West Sixty-third street and Hudson River, extending thence along West Sixty-third Street to Columbus Avenue, along Columbus and Ninth Avenues to West Fifty-eight Street, along West Fifty-eighth Street to Eighth Avenue, along Eighth avenue to Broadway, along Broadway to West Sixty-second street, along West Sixty-second to Central Park West, along Central Park West to West Eighty-first, along West Eighty-first to Columbus avenue, along Columbus avenue to West Ninety-fourth street, along West Ninety-fourth street to Amsterdam avenue, along Amsterdam avenue to West Sixty-third street, along West Sixty-third street to First avenue, along First avenue to East Sixteenth street, along East Sixteenth street to Second avenue, along Second avenue to East Seventeenth street, along East Seventeenth street to Avenue B, along Avenue B to East Eighteenth street, along East Eighteenth street to the East River, along the East River to Stanton street, the place of beginning.

COUNTY OF RICHMOND.

Description of Boundaries of Proposed First and Second Assembly Districts.

The first assembly district is to consist of the territory bounded as follows: Beginning at the Upper New York Bay at the foot of Vanderbilt Avenue; thence westerly along Vanderbilt Avenue to Richmond Road; thence southwesterly and westerly along Richmond Road to Rockland Avenue (formerly Egbert Avenue); thence northwesterly along Rockland Avenue (formerly Egbert Avenue and Saw Mill Road) to Bradley Avenue (formerly Manor Road); thence northeasterly along Bradley Avenue (formerly Manor Road and Bradley Avenue) to Willow Brook Road; thence northwesterly and northerly along Willow Brook Road (formerly Gun Factory Road and Willow Brook Road) to Watchogue Road; thence easterly along Watchogue Road to brook known as Palmers Run, located west of Woolley Avenue; thence northerly along Palmers Run to Forest Avenue (formerly Cherry Lane); thence northeasterly along Palmers Run to the intersection of Post and Jewett Avenues; thence northerly along Palmers Run and Bodines Creek to the Kill van Kull; thence easterly along the Kill van Kull to the Upper New York Bay; thence southerly along the shore of the Upper New York Bay to the point of beginning.

To comprise and be identical with the territory known as the First and Second Wards, Borough of Richmond, The City of New York.

The second assembly district to consist of the territory bounded as follows:

New York Boat Owners' Association—Requesting Amendment of Article 9, Chapter 14, Code of Ordinances, Relating to Junk Dealers.

New York Boat-Owners Association, Inc., 80 Broad Street, New York City, June 12, 1917.

Honorable FRANK L. DOWLING, President, Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York City:

Dear Sir—There is at the present time before your Honorable Body an ordinance to amend article 9, chapter 14, of the Code of Ordinances, relating to junk dealers.

The amendments referred to, which relate to junkboatmen, have been suggested in the hope of ridding the waters adjacent to Greater New York of the dishonest junkboatmen. There have been several hearings, at no one of which did any one appear against this feature of the amendments and at the last public hearing before the Welfare Committee there was no opposition recorded against any of the amendments, whether relating to junk dealers, junkboatmen, or second-hand dealers.

Appearing in favor of the amendments, however, were representatives of the Merchants' Association, Plumbers' Association, Pennsylvania Railroad, Standard Oil Company, New York Central Railroad, the National Board of Steam Navigation, the New York Boat Owners' Association, Inc., and numerous others.

Therefore, we now ask that your Honorable Body pass the ordinances to amend article 9, chapter 14, of the Code of Ordinances, relating to junk dealers, and thus enable us to get some relief from the present intolerable conditions prevailing along the water front. Respectfully submitted,</

Commissioner of Street Cleaning—Request for Extension of Time for Use of Special Revenue Bonds, \$32,738, for Installation of a Combined System of Hose Connection and Sprinkler Equipment.

Hon. FRANK L. DOWLING, President of the Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—On October 26, 1915, the Board of Aldermen adopted a resolution authorizing the Comptroller to issue special revenue bonds to the amount of \$32,738, the proceeds of which were to be used by this department for the purpose of installing a combined system of hose connection and sprinkling equipment at the various dumping boards in the Boroughs of Manhattan, Bronx and Brooklyn, all obligations thereunder to be incurred on or before April 1, 1916. This resolution became effective November 9, 1915, without action by the Mayor. On December 10, 1915, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment approved of and concurred in the said resolution.

On March 24, 1916, request was made that said resolution be amended by providing that obligations thereunder might be contracted for on or before July 1, 1916. On April 13, 1916, the original resolution was amended by the Board of Aldermen in accordance with above request, received from the Mayor May 2, 1916, without his approval or disapproval, concurred in by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment May 12, 1916.

On November 6, 1916, request was made for further modification of the original resolution by transferring a certain portion of the original allotment from the Borough of Brooklyn to the Borough of Manhattan, in order that the contract might be let for the dump at the foot of East 46th Street, Manhattan, the original Manhattan allotment being insufficient for this purpose, and by further modifying the original resolution to extend the time for contracting the obligations thereunder from July 1, 1916, to Dec. 31, 1916. On November 28, 1916, the Board of Aldermen adopted a resolution in accordance with this request, which was approved by the Mayor December 5, 1916, and by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment December 22, 1916.

Bids for the work were received December 13, 1916; the contract was awarded December 27, 1916, and executed January 12, 1917. It was registered January 22, 1917. The contractor was required to finish the work within sixty (60) days of the latter date, but owing to the necessity for performing additional work which could not be foreseen when the specifications were prepared he was unable to complete the contract within the required time.

The City of New York, Board of Estimate and Apportionment, Bureau of Personal Service, May 22, 1917.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On April 19, 1917, the COMMISSIONER OF DOCKS requested the establishment of a grade of position, pursuant to the provisions of section 56 of the Greater New York Charter. The Bureau of Personal Service reports thereon as follows:

"Purpose—(1) To establish the grade of position of Deckhand at \$900 per annum, for 114 incumbents.

"Reason—(1) When the specifications were in course of preparation the position of Deckhand was placed on a par with Unskilled Laborers. The range of compensation was accordingly fixed from \$720 to \$840 per annum. This rate was based on the result of a minimum wage study made by the Bureau at that time. Since that time the conditions upon which these rates were fixed have changed considerably, and to reflect the increased cost of commodities the rates have been revised and now run from a minimum of \$792 to a maximum of \$888. All the Deckhands in the Department of Docks and Ferries at the present time receive \$66 per month, or \$792 per annum, which is the present minimum of the grade. The rates in the specifications are predicated upon a six-day basis, while the Deckhands in the Department of Docks and Ferries are now obliged to work seven days per week, and deductions are made for all absences, excepting the legal vacation during the summer months.

"When the rates were fixed on a six-day basis it was thought that a way would be found to make unnecessary the application of a seven-day rate. The men are still required, however, to work seven days, and for that reason it seems fair to recognize this requirement in the rate of pay. Laborers are paid at the rate of \$2.50 per day, and on that basis receive an annual compensation of \$12,50. It appears equitable, therefore, to fix the rates in the specifications about to be promulgated at a minimum of \$900 and a maximum of \$1,020 per annum for Deckhands who work 365 days, and to apply the present rates of \$792 minimum and \$888 maximum to the employees of those departments which require only 313 days of service.

"Finding—The request is proper and necessary."

Recommendation—In view of the above report, the Committee recommends that the Board of Aldermen be requested to establish the grade of position by the adoption of the attached resolution. Respectfully,

Dear Sir—In accordance with the instructions conveyed by the Finance Committee at the public hearing of May 28, 1917, upon the request of this department for the issue of \$123,750 revenue bonds, pursuant to subdivision 8, section 188 of the Charter, I herewith transmit an amended request to your Honorable Board to issue special revenue bonds in the sum of \$2,750 to provide for deficiencies in two accounts of this department, as follows:

Code 2674. Telephone Service \$2,000 00

Code 2671. Shoeing and Boarding Horses 750 00

Code 2674. Telephone Service, \$2,000.

The budgetary allowance in this code is \$5,000, which has proven insufficient owing to the increased cost of service at New Hampton Farms and throughout the department, and also because of the opening of additional pens in connection with additional divisions of the Magistrates' Courts requiring additional telephone service. The number of local calls allowed in our contract in 1917 is 7,500, while up to the present time this year the department has averaged approximately 5,500 local messages a month in addition to toll calls. This shortage will cause an overdraft on our contract later in the year.

In connection with this request I wish to point out that action was taken the middle of last year to reduce the number of private calls in the department and to list all calls from local institutions, so that the charges could be made for calls for private business. This operated to considerably reduce the monthly telephone bills. Our telephone operator, Miss Becker, is very careful in enforcing the provisions of this general order of the department.

Code 2671. Shoeing and Boarding Horses, Including Veterinary Service, \$750.

The budgetary allowance in this code is \$3,076, based upon a horse census of 83, but since January 1, 1917, we have acquired 30 additional horses, and the extra money requested is to provide for their shoeing and the veterinary service made necessary. An increased cost of \$10 per month for boarding horses must be provided for because of the rising price of forage. Respectfully,

Dear Sir—On May 28th the Finance Committee of the Board of Aldermen gave a hearing upon the application of this department for the authorization of \$123,750 in special revenue bonds, pursuant to subdivision 8, section 188, of the Greater New York Charter. The Committee informed me that it had been determined that applications for Revenue Bonds to meet deficiencies due to war conditions should be made with the Comptroller with the provisions of subdivision 7, section 188, of the Greater New York Charter, and that, therefore, application should be made to the Comptroller for all items, save Code 2674, Telephone Service, \$2,000; Code 2671, Shoeing and Boarding Horses, \$750.

Pursuant to subdivision 7 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, I hereby make application to the Comptroller for the issue of special revenue bonds in the sum of \$121,000, enumerated below:

Code 2652, Food Supplies \$110,000 00
Code 2654, Forage and Veterinary Supplies 8,000 00
Code 2661, General Plant Supplies 2,000 00
Code 2675, General Plant Service 1,000 00

Total \$121,000 00

The budget of the department as finally determined by the Board of Estimate, was made up by estimating costs at the then current market prices. In making up the original estimate of the department we had tried to estimate future market prices. The Board of Estimate, however, believed this was not the best way to make up the budget. In the case of food supplies we made the stipulation for the record.

Code 2652, Food Supplies, \$110,000.

The budgetary allowance in this code is \$390,000, made up by estimating that raw food would cost sixteen cents per inmate per day, although the actual cost at the time the budget was made was \$0.1768525, which meant upon the then census a shortage of \$80.72 per day, or a deficit of \$29,466.18. On the budgetary basis the cost of food supplies per month was \$32,518.70 for the year 1917. The present cost per month is \$41,722.24, an approximate increase in food costs of 28 per cent.

The department was able to feed prisoners at the rate of 16 cents per day during the years 1914, 1915 and 1916, but that amount was proven inadequate.

In this connection permit me to point out that the newspapers have recently carried a statement purporting to have been given out by Secretary of War Baker on May 21, 1917, in which there is contained the following statement:

"It costs almost three times as much to feed an American soldier to-day as it did during the Spanish-American War. In 1898 the average cost per man was 12.81 cents a day. Now it is 32 cents."

Drastic action has been taken to obviate the great increase in the cost of food stuff:

1. In making bread, a formula providing 20 per cent. corn meal has been utilized, and experiments are now being made with a larger percentage of corn meal.

2. Rice has been substituted for potatoes to a large extent.

3. More drastic action has been taken to eliminate waste of food, particularly bread, although this is uphill work among some of the prisoners, who are of the opinion that only fools should go hungry as long as there is anything to take.

Our purchasing department has taken advantage of every opportunity to obviate the increase of prices:

1. By letting contracts and ordering in supplies to the fullest extent in order to obviate rise in prices.
2. By special arrangements with the Comptroller's office for expediting payments in order to secure better prices and occasional discounts.
3. By demonstrating the promptness of the Department in taking care of supplies delivered.

Notwithstanding our action prices have increased to a remarkable degree. The cost of flour has risen since 1916 from an average of \$6.17 per barrel to \$9.05 per barrel. Our annual consumption of flour amounts to 12,000 barrels, so that this increase in price represents a deficit of \$34,560. We fear that our next contract price will be \$13 per barrel.

Code 2654, Forage and Veterinary Supplies, \$8,000.

This increase is due only slightly to the increased number of horses to feed and to provide for, but for the most part, to an abnormal increase in the cost of supplies. The budgetary allowance in this code is \$12,000, based on a horse census of 83, but since January 1, 1917, in order to carry out an extensive agricultural and construction programme the horse census has increased to 113. The cost of forage has risen to an unprecedented degree. Oats cost \$2.87 per hundred as against \$1.69 per hundred in 1916. Additional chickens and pigs have been purchased for New Hampton Farms and their food amounts to approximately \$50 per month. This is a paying investment, however, as eggs are now being produced at New Hampton at about 16 cents per dozen. The cost of producing pigs is likewise small where there has been plenty of labor to care for them.

Code 2661, General Plant Supplies, \$2,000.

The budgetary allowance in this code is \$5,800, but on account of the greatly increased cost the expenses are doubled and additional funds are required for the purpose of electric bulbs, cotton waste, lubricating oil, toilet paper and miscellaneous articles. The Department has been severely criticised by the State Commission of Prisons for not providing toilet paper and we will again come in for more serious criticism than ever if an additional supply is not provided at once.

Code 2675, General Plant Service, \$1,000.

This request is occasioned by war conditions. It is because the price of clothing has so increased. The amount requested is to pay for the dry cleaning of the winter suits of the inmates of this Department for sanitary and economic reasons. Under the former procedure, the winter suit of an inmate has been retained by him and when surrendered upon his discharge has usually been absolutely worthless. We hope by the new procedure to save a number of these suits for use. I am informed that the cost of materials if the suits were to be cleaned by our own labor would be greater than the cost of having them cleaned by concerns fully equipped to do such work. The greatest part of the expense, I am told, are the materials used. There is danger that our prisoners would waste so much material as to more than exceed the cost of labor and materials under contract.

It is estimated that the life of a suit would be doubled if it can be taken from the inmate in the Spring and re-issued in the Fall. As the present cost of a suit is about \$8 it is obvious that a considerable saving can be effected with the expenditure of fifty cents per suit for dry cleaning.

We are facing a deficit in our Laundry, Cleaning and Disinfecting Supply appropriation on account of a shortage of grease in our institutions, preventing our soap plant from manufacturing the quantity of hard soap that was estimated. For this reason we have been compelled to purchase laundry soap in the open market far in excess of the quantity allowed in the budget, and at an increased price. The raw materials entering into the manufacture of soap also have increased in cost, as have disinfectant and exterminator—two large items.

It is advisable that ample funds be allowed this department for sanitary purposes, as the possibility of an epidemic starting among the inmates is always present during the hot weather, and, in addition to that, we are open to criticism of the State Prison Commission and other public bodies at all times.

Code No. 2675, General Plant Service, \$2,100.

In Code No. 2675, General Plant Service, the budgetary allowance is \$2,138.00

and at the present time our books show an unencumbered balance of \$1,006.17, which will prove insufficient, owing to a great many expenses that could not have been foreseen when the budget was compiled. Some of the charges that will accrue are: Laundry service, New Hampton, \$1,200; hire of tabulating machines, \$584; rental of sewing machines, \$560; removal of manure, \$300, and sundry other items, such as demurrage, hire of launches, blueprints, towing, etc.

Code 1308. The expenditure made from this account for paints, lumber, cement and other large items were on unit prices approximately twenty-five per cent. greater than the allowance made for them in the budget.

Code 1315. Early this year several horses in our stables were ill and required considerable veterinary services. The estimated deficiency for the balance of the year will be \$125.

Gentlemen—On May 2, 1917, you referred to the Committee on Corporate Stock Budget a request from the President, Borough of Manhattan, for the *reduction* from \$31,027.55 to \$30,027.55 in the amount authorized under Code "C.P.M. 16B, Improvement of Market Spaces under Manhattan and Williamsburg Bridges," approved July 10, 1914, and for an *increase* in the amount authorized under Code "C.P.M. 46A, West Washington Market, Improvement Drainage of Roof and Streets of Market, etc." from \$34,000 to \$35,000.

The Bureau of Contract Supervision to which the request was referred on May 2, 1917, reports thereon, as follows:

"On January 28, 1916, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment approved an appropriation of \$27,000 for repaving and for the drainage of streets within the area of West Washington Market; for connecting the roof leaders of the market buildings directly with the sewer system and for other expenses incidental to said improvements. On June 9, 1916, the amount was increased by resolution of the Board to \$34,000.

"The work of repaving and improving the drainage of the streets within the market area has been completed. The contract for repaving included repairs to the sidewalks within the market area and new and old sidewalks were laid and relaid to the following extent:

New bluestone flagging	1,206 sq. ft.
Old bluestone flagging relaid.....	8,883 sq. ft.

Total repaired 10,089 sq. ft.

"New curb also was laid adjacent to sidewalks in streets bounding the market area, i. e., Bloomfield street, 13th avenue, Gansevoort street and West street. The new curb in many instances is higher than the adjacent sidewalks and these sidewalks in numerous places are sunken and the flagging displaced.

"The estimate of cost of repairing these sidewalks is \$1,400. The sidewalks should be repaired and the estimate of cost is reasonable.

"There remains an unencumbered balance of \$400 in the fund already provided for improving the market, C.P.M. 46A, and the action proposed will provide the required amount, \$1,400, without increasing the bonded debt of the City.

"There remains an unencumbered balance of \$3,506.36 in C.P.M. 16B.

"As this restoration of sidewalk is incidental to the repaving, it is properly chargeable to the corporate stock fund."

We recommend the adoption of the attached resolutions, one rescinding the sum of \$1,000 in Code C.P.M. 16B, and the other authorizing an additional sum of \$1,000 for Code C.P.M. 46A, in accordance with the provisions of section 169 of the Charter.

Gentlemen—On April 11, 1917, the Board of Education requested rescindments of corporate stock aggregating \$118,524.87, and additional appropriations of corporate stock totaling \$372,507.35.

The Bureau of Contract Supervision, to which the requests were referred on April 14, 1917, reports thereon, as follows:

Rescindments.

An examination of the account books of the Finance Department, as to the balances available for rescindment in the funds released by the Department of Education, indicates that they can be reduced only to the extent of \$117,446.71, of which \$110,410.06 represents balances of unissued corporate stock, and \$7,036.65 small cash balances; the latter to be transferred to the account "C.F.M. 24."

The facts relating to these requests are as follows:

Manhattan Trade School for Girls.

This school occupies leased quarters and it is urgent that the new building be completed before the expiration of the lease on July 1, 1918. The steel framework is being erected and floor arches constructed. Contracts have been let for all work but heating, ventilating and elevators; electric equipment; furniture; sprinkler system, shop machinery, ash hoist and dumbwaiter; all of which were estimated by the department in the request at \$200,000. One item included in the \$200,000 at \$85,000 is now estimated to cost \$106,200, due to the recent advance in the cost of materials. It is probable that \$100,000 will be required to complete this building, instead of the \$88,836.35 requested.

Public School 4, The Bronx.

The construction of an addition to this building is under way. Contracts have been let for all the work except the following in the new addition, sanitary work, heating and shop equipment, electric equipment and furniture, and also the alteration and equipment of the old building; all of which is estimated in the request at \$98,950. Since the request, a contract has been awarded for one item for \$3,937 more than the estimated cost.

It is probable, therefore, that \$70,000 will be required to complete this entire work.

Public School 32, The Bronx.

The excavation for the new addition is completed and a retaining wall is being constructed. The following work remains to be done: construction and sanitary work; heating and ventilating work; electric equipment and furniture, estimated by the department to cost \$221,760.

Public School 40, The Bronx.

The sum of \$141,350 is available for the construction of an addition and the alterations of the old building, both including equipment. The work has not started.

Plans ready for contracts indicate that the cost of the work will be \$231,597.

Public School 45, The Bronx.

The addition to this building is under construction, the alterations to old building are under way. It is necessary to provide shop equipment, a pottery room and ventilation for the auditorium, estimated to cost \$37,707.56, for which \$20,000 additional is necessary.

Public School 16, Borough of Brooklyn.

The new building is under construction and it is necessary to provide heating, ventilating, electric equipment and furniture, and also some alterations and equipment for old building, all estimated to cost \$52,020, which will require an additional allowance of \$19,285.

The amounts estimated as necessary to complete these buildings, summarized are as follows:

"The increase in the amounts necessary for the several buildings as stated are due to the unusually high and continually increasing prices of materials.

"With the exception of the Manhattan Trade School for Girls it is necessary that the work at these buildings be proceeded with, in order to carry out the programme for duplicate school organizations.

"In the case of all the buildings mentioned except Public School 40, The Bronx, work is under way and must be completed or some of the value of the work already done will be lost through deterioration.

"The estimates have all been checked by the Bureau of Contract Supervision and are reasonable under present conditions."

We recommend the adoption of the attached four resolutions, the effect of which will be (1) to authorize an additional appropriation of \$385,000 in accordance with the provisions of section 169 of the Charter, (2 and 3) to rescind balances in various corporate stock funds aggregating \$110,410.06, and (4) to transfer \$7,036.65 of cash balances in corporate stock funds to the fund C. Request of Exemption from Public Letting for the Purchase of Steel Furniture for the Hall of Records in the Amount of \$35,000.

Hon. FRANK L. DOWLING, President, Board of Aldermen, City Hall, N. Y. City:

Dear Sir—At a recent meeting of the Board of Aldermen the sum of \$45,000 was appropriated by the Board for the purchase of steel furniture and fixtures for the Hall of Records. Of this amount \$10,000 was set up for alterations of the building. This sum is now under contract.

Bids were advertised for the purchase of steel furniture for the sum of \$35,000 remaining, with the result that the lowest bid obtained was \$48,193.43. This is \$13,193.43 in excess of the appropriation made for this purpose.

This office has received another bid from a responsible party who is willing to deliver the furniture and fixtures under the specifications for the sum of \$35,000 and will give a satisfactory bond. It is therefore possible to save upwards of \$13,000 if this contract be exempted from public letting forthwith.

has sent me a copy of the communication transmitted to you under date of June 9, 1917, by the Acting President of the Borough of Manhattan, requesting exemption from public letting of steel furniture for the Hall of Records in the amount of \$35,000.

Through a representative of my office I have been continuously in touch with the attempt of the President of the Borough of Manhattan to obtain a bid by public letting for this work and equipment, which, you will remember, is part of the program initiated by this office for freeing of space in the Hall of Records, Borough of Manhattan so that a substantial portion of that building could be leased, as it has been, to departments of the State government having offices in New York City.

The bids submitted in response to advertisement therefor were very largely in excess of the preliminary estimates submitted for the same work by certain persons who submitted bids. This excess appears to me to be entirely without justification, and a responsible person stands ready, if public letting be waived, to do the work and furnish the equipment at a price within the original estimates. Dear Sir—Pursuant to subdivision 7, section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, I hereby respectfully request the issue of special revenue bonds in the sum of \$10,000, to be used for the purchase of medical and surgical supplies for the use of this department.

The budgetary allowance for the Department of Correction for the purchase of medical and surgical supplies is \$5,000, and is segregated within the money allowed to the General Drug Department of the Department of Public Charities.

Up to June 1, 1917, the distributions by them to our institutions, have aggregated \$6,057.49, leaving a deficit at the present time amounting to \$1,057.49. This deficit is caused by the unprecedented increase in the cost of gauze, absorbent cotton, and in fact all medical supplies, and the additional money requested is to provide proper medical treatment for the inmates, during the balance of the year.

The physical condition of the inmates is one of the important factors considered by the Parole Commission in determining eligibility for parole, it is therefore incumbent upon the Department of Correction to provide facilities for the care and treatment of the inmates especially those suffering from contagious venereal diseases and drug addiction.

Also in addition to those sentenced to our institutions, the Judges are committing drug addicts to the Workhouse Hospital for treatment prior to passing sentence.

Commissioner of Public Charities—Request for the Privilege to Contract, Without Public Letting, for the Installation of Fire Alarms in the Hospitals on Blackwell's Island.

Department of Public Charities of The City of New York, Municipal Building, Tenth Floor, June 12, 1917.

To the Honorable Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York:

Gentlemen—Through the Board of Estimate we made a request to your Honorable Board to allow us to contract without public letting for the placing of fire alarm systems in certain of the institutions of the Department. Our request was made owing to the fact that we had received bids on public proposals which exceeded the amount we had in hand for the complete project. During the time the matter was before your Board, the price of material and labor advanced so that the lowest bidder would not take the contract. Accordingly it became necessary for your Board to act and we rejected the bids.

We again advertised and received public bids this day. There were three responsible bidders for the work. The amount bid for all of the buildings is \$117,035. We have on hand but \$46,000, and it is highly important that fire alarms be placed in the hospitals on Blackwell's Island as the fire hazard is very great. We accordingly ask the privilege to contract without public letting with Jandus Electric Equipment Co., \$13,725, for the City Hospital, and Croker Fire Protection Engineering Co., \$20,800, for the Metropolitan Hospital.

If fire should once thoroughly start in any one of the buildings there would be serious loss of life, as it would be impossible to remove the patients from them.

I believe it would be wise to install these fire alarms as early as possible and trust that your Honorable Board will take prompt and favorable action on this request. Very truly yours,

1—Amendment to article 17, chapter 10 of the Code of Ordinances, by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 214, "Liquefied Chlorine," containing

regulations for the storage and use of chlorine, which were adopted after a public hearing was held in the matter.

2—An ordinance to amend paragraph 1-c, section 211, article 17, chapter 10 of the Code of Ordinances, by including in the first line thereof the words "except chlorine."

3—An ordinance to amend paragraph 1-k, section 211, article 17, chapter 10 of the Code of Ordinances, by including in the first line thereof the words "and chlorine."

4—An ordinance amending section 21, chapter 12, Code of Ordinances of the City of New York, by adding the provision that the Fire Commissioner may, in his discretion, accept an automatic fire alarm system in lieu of watchmen and time detectors.

An Ordinance to Amend Article 17 of Chapter 10 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of New York by Adding Thereto a New Section, to Be Known as Section 214.

AN ORDINANCE to Amend Article 17 of Chapter 10 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of New York by adding thereto a new section, to be known as section 214. Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Sec. 1—Article 17 of chapter 10 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of New York is hereby amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as section 214, and to read as follows:

§214. Liquefied Chlorine.

1. *Permit required. No person, firm or corporation, shall store, sell, use or transport any liquefied chlorine without a permit.*

2. *Certificate of fitness. No liquefied chlorine shall be used except under the constant supervision of a person holding a certificate of fitness.*

3. *Compression. No chlorine gas shall be compressed in the City of New York.*

4. *Storage and use. Liquefied chlorine gas may be stored only in quantities specified by the Fire Commissioner and under the following conditions:*

(a) *In approved fireproof buildings used exclusively for the storage of liquefied chlorine. Such buildings shall be approved only when all the materials entering into their construction, including flooring and trim and partitions, whether temporary or permanent are incombustible in character.*

(b) *In enclosed lots or yards in sparsely settled sections, in the discretion of the Fire Commissioner and under such restrictions as he may deem necessary.*

(c) *In buildings used for other purposes than the storage of liquefied chlorine, on the ground floor only, provided the containers of liquefied chlorine are located in a room or compartment constructed of fireproof or fire retarding material, which is easily accessible from the street or yard. If the room or compartment is not easily accessible from street or yard, it shall be provided with an approved automatic sprinkler system by means of which the compartment may be readily flooded with water, all of which shall be in accordance with plans approved by the Fire Commissioner. The cylinders of chlorine gas may be placed in a receptacle, approved by the Fire Commissioner, so arranged as to be automatically flooded with cold water from a reliable source in case of fire.*

(d) *No permit shall be issued for the use of liquefied chlorine above the grade floor, except in a building occupied exclusively by the person, firm or corporation using the liquefied chlorine and protected by an approved automatic sprinkler system, except that in special cases where the use of liquefied chlorine existed prior to the adoption of these regulations this requirement might be waived by the Fire Commissioner.*

(e) *The number of liquefied gas cylinders permitted above the grade floor shall not in any case exceed in number twice the number actually connected and in use at any one time and the cylinders shall be supported from the ground in such manner as not to be dependent for support upon any non-fireproof portion of the building construction.*

(f) *No permit shall be issued for the storage or use of liquefied chlorine in any building used for a hotel, lodging house, tenement house, or dwelling, or in any building, lot or enclosure located within 50 feet of the nearest wall of a building occupied as a hospital, school, theatre or other place of public amusement or assembly.*

6. *Sale—No person, firm or corporation shall sell any liquefied chlorine for use within the City of New York, unless the purchaser thereof holds a permit to store or use liquefied chlorine.*

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

1. *Capacity. No person shall store for sale any gas compressed to a pressure greater than 6 pounds to the square inch, without a permit, except the following:*

(c) *Non-combustible liquefied gases, except chlorine, in quantities not exceeding a total container capacity of 1 cubic foot, and in containers none of which shall have a capacity exceeding 200 cubic inches.*

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Sec. 1. Paragraph 1 (k) of section 211 of article 17 of chapter 10 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York, is hereby amended to read as follows:

1. *Capacity. No person shall store for sale any gas compressed to a pressure greater than 6 pounds to the square inch, without a permit, except the following:*

(k) *Non-combustible liquefied gases, except ammonia and chlorine, such as nitrous oxide, carbonic acid, sulphur dioxide (chlorine), in quantities not exceeding a total container capacity of 12 cubic feet, and in containers none of which shall have a capacity exceeding 1.5 cubic feet. Anhydrous liquid ammonia not exceeding a total container capacity of 12 cubic feet, and in containers none of which shall have a capacity exceeding 5.5 cubic feet, except as otherwise provided in these regulations.*

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

An Ordinance to Amend Paragraph 1 of Section 21 of Article 2 of Chapter 12 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of New York by Adding Thereto the Provision that the Fire Commissioner May, in His Discretion, Accept an Automatic Fire Alarm System in Lieu of Watchmen and Time Detectors.

AN ORDINANCE to amend paragraph 1 of section 21 of article 2 of chapter 12 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of New York, by adding thereto the provision that the Fire Commissioner may, in his discretion, accept an automatic fire alarm system in lieu of watchmen and time detectors.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Paragraph 1 of section 21 of article 2 of chapter 12 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of New York is hereby amended to read as follows:

§21. *Watchmen; interior fire alarms; diagrams of means of egress.*

1. *Watchmen. In every building used or occupied as a hotel, lodging-house or public or private hospital or asylum, there shall be employed by the owner or proprietor, or other person having the charge or management thereof, one or more watchmen whose exclusive duty it shall be to visit every portion of such building at regular and frequent intervals, under rules and regulations to be established by the commissioner, for the purpose of detecting fire or other sources of danger, and giving timely warning thereof to the inmates of the building. There shall be provided a watchman's clock, or other device, to be approved by the commissioner, by means of which the movements of the watchman may be recorded. The fire com-*

missioner may, however, in his discretion, accept an automatic fire alarm system in lieu of watchmen and time detectors.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

The President laid before the Board the following communication from the Commissioner of Health:

No. 1686.

Secretary, Department of Health—Requesting Issue of Special Revenue Bonds, \$113,000, for Food and Forage Supplies.

City of New York, Department of Health, Office of the Secretary, June 11, 1917.

Hon. Board of Aldermen, Municipal Building, Manhattan:

Sirs—In the 1917 budget the appropriations allowed for food and forage supplies together with all other supplies were based on prices prevailing from July 1, 1915, to June 30, 1916.

The prices for these commodities, however, have advanced since that period from twenty-five to fifty per cent, and in some instances as high as three hundred (300) per cent; for example, such items as potatoes, flour, sugar, cabbage, hay, oats, etc., with the result that the appropriations for food and forage supplies of the Department of Health are almost entirely exhausted.

The appropriations for food supplies were based on a specific per capita allowance, based on experience, up to June 30, 1916, as follows:

Doctors	\$0.50	per day
Nurses37	per day
Other employes229	per day
Contagious patients163	per day
Tuberculosis patients34	per day

The cost, however, for the present year has advanced to:

Doctors	\$0.57	per day
Nurses41	per day
Other employes29	per day
Contagious patients24	per day
Tuberculosis patients41	per day

It is estimated that it will require approximately \$100,000 additional to provide food supplies for the hospitals and Tuberculosis Sanatorium for the balance of the year 1917.

The cost of food supplies for the period from January 1 to June 30 (estimated) will be \$171,809.67. It is considered that it will require at least an equal amount for the remaining six months of the year, namely, \$172,000. To meet expense there is a balance of \$40,000 in the appropriation at the present time, which together with supplies still undelivered on existing contracts amounting to \$39,000 give a total of \$79,000 available for the balance of the year. The amount requested, \$100,000, will leave a small margin for possible increase in prices.

The appropriations for forage supplies were likewise based on prices prevailing during 1915 and the early part of 1916, and at the present time are entirely exhausted due to the extremely high prices for forage during the present year.

It is estimated that it will require \$13,000 to meet the requirements for forage for the balance of the year 1917.

Your Honorable Board is hereby respectfully requested to authorize the issuance of special revenue bonds in the sum of \$100,000 for food supplies and \$13,000 for forage supplies.

Acting Commissioner of Street Cleaning—Request for Permission to Contract, Without Public Letting, for the Removal of a Cover from the Dump at West 77th Street, Manhattan.

Department of Street Cleaning of The City of New York, Office Municipal Building, 12th Floor, June 12, 1917.

Hon. FRANK L. DOWLING, President, Board of Aldermen:

Si—Pursuant to Section 419 of the Greater New York Charter, request is hereby made that the Board of Aldermen adopt a resolution authorizing this Department to enter into a contract, without public letting, for the removal of a cover from the dump at West 77th Street, Manhattan, where it can no longer be utilized, and its erection at East 209th Street, Manhattan, over a dump at this location, the cost of said work not to exceed \$14,000.

The proposed change of the cover from West 77th Street to East 209th Street is due to the fact that this cover is no longer suited to the requirements of those districts served by the 77th Street dump, due to the installation of motor equipment, which will be effective before the end of this year, and the further expectation that this dump will only continue to be used as a temporary expedient pending the settlement of the West Side matter.

The construction of a dump at 209th Street makes a special covering desirable, and it has been thought wise and economical to move the covering no longer usable at 77th Street.

The reasons for the request that we be allowed to enter into this contract without public letting are:

1. The unsettled conditions pertaining to the dumps in Manhattan due to the uncertainty relative to the West Side Improvement and the inability of the Department to place a dump on Sherman Creek, as originally proposed, due to the alleged defective title of the City to the bed of the creek, have prevented previous definite fixing of a location for a dump in the vicinity of 209th Street.

2. During tentative consideration of plans for the 209th Street dump, informal bids, peculiarly favorable to the City under the present abnormal conditions, were received upon specifications prepared by the Department of Docks and Ferries.

3. If obliged to proceed in the usual way and advertise formally, the delay will handicap the operations of the Department, will prevent the Department from accepting the low bid already offered, and cause other losses due to further delay.

4. It is believed that the City will suffer a considerable financial loss if it attempts to secure further formal bids upon this work, inasmuch as prices for doing such work are constantly advancing and the present bid appears to be especially favorable.

5. Immediate action is necessary to avoid danger of losses due to the possibility of accident to the present floating dump at 206th Street, which is a temporary affair and now kept afloat only with difficulty.

It is believed that the bid made on this work was received as a result of requests sent to some of the fourteen responsible engineering and contracting concerns and is the lowest of the two definite proposals received by over \$13,000, and furthermore due to the fact that these bids were received over a month ago, it is necessary that the City take immediate action if it is to secure the advantage of the low figure.

I therefore respectfully request that the matter be not referred to Committee, as is customary, but that the Board take action at to-day's meeting.

Report of the Committee on General Welfare Presenting to the Board Without Recommendation an Ordinance to Amend the Code of Ordinances, Relating to "Junk Dealers."

The Committee on General Welfare, to which was referred on April 17, 1917 (Minutes, page 143), the annexed ordinance to amend article 9 of chapter 14 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to Junk Dealers, respectfully

REPORTS:

That the Committee has had this matter under consideration for some time, during which a public hearing was held, at which little or no opposition appeared and there was unanimous approval thereof by representatives of the various transportation companies in and about the City. Notwithstanding this the Committee is unable to agree as to the merits of the proposed ordinance and presents it to the Board without recommendation.

AN ORDINANCE to amend article 9, chapter 14, of the Code of Ordinances relating to Junk Dealers.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Article 9 of chapter 14 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York is hereby amended to read as follows:

ARTICLE 9.

Junk Dealers.

Section 120. Definitions.

121. License fee and bond; term.

122. Restrictions.

123. Record of purchases.

124. Reports to the police department.

125. Lost or stolen goods.

126. Violations.

Section 120. Definitions.

1. Junkman, junkshop, *junk cartman, junk boatman*. Any one dealing in the purchase or sale of junk, old rope, old iron, brass, copper, tin, [or] lead, rubber, paper, rags, bagging, slush or empty bottles, in large or small quantities, including *junk cartmen and junk boatmen*, shall be deemed to be a junk dealer and his place of business a junk shop. *This ordinance shall not apply to persons engaged exclusively in the purchase and sale in large quantities of scrap iron and steel, or woolen rags, or paper stock, but each said person shall annually file with the Police Commissioner and Commissioner of Licenses, a statement, in writing, setting forth the name and address of such person and the character of the business thereof.*

2. Junk cart, junk boat. Any vehicle in the streets, or any vessel in the waters of the city, used for the purpose of collecting or selling junk, old rope, old iron, brass, copper, tin, lead, rubber, paper, rags, bagging, slush or empty bottles, shall be deemed, respectively, a junk cart or junk boat, and every junk cart or junk boat shall show on each outside thereof the words "Junk Cart" or "Junk Boat," together with the figures of its official number, which] and the owner or owners thereof junk dealers. Any vehicle used for the purpose of collecting or selling any article or articles hereinbefore enumerated shall be furnished, by the Department of Licenses, with a plate, to be affixed to conspicuous and indispensable part of the vehicle, on which plate shall be clearly set forth the official number of the junk cart with the words "Junk Cart" and the date of expiration of the license, and the design or color of this plate shall be changed at the beginning of each license year, and in the case of a junk boat, the words "Junk Boat" and the figures of the official number thereof shall be painted in white block letters and figures respectively at least, [twelve] eighteen inches high and two inches wide on a black background on the stern and also on both the port and starboard sides of the boat, at the forward end thereof; and no person shall do such collecting or selling in any other way or manner than as aforesaid. *In the case of a junk boat, there shall be but one person on the boat.*

Section 121. License fee and bond; term.

Every junk dealer shall pay an annual license fee of \$20 and give a bond to the City, with sufficient surety approved by the commissioner of licenses, in the penal sum of \$250 condition for the due observance of all provisions of law and municipal ordinances relating to such dealers, excepting in the case of a junk dealer operating a junk boat, who shall furnish for each junk boat so operated, a bond, with sufficient surety approved by the commissioner of licenses, in the sum of \$1,000 conditioned for the due observance of all provisions of law and municipal ordinances relating to such dealers. Each [junk cart or junk boat] junk dealer operating one or more junk carts or junk boats, shall pay an annual license fee of \$5 for each horse-drawn or power vehicle or for each boat, and an annual license fee of \$2 for each push cart.

All junk dealers' licenses, including junk cartmen [carts] and junk boatmen [boats] shall be issued as of November 1, and shall expire on the 31st day of October next succeeding the date of issuance thereof.

Section 122. Restrictions.

1. Place. No junk dealer, *including junk cartmen and junk boatmen*, shall carry on business at any other place than the one designated in the license therefor, *which place of business shall be within the limits of The City of New York*, nor shall he continue to carry on business after such license has been suspended or revoked, or has expired.

2. Purchases. No junk dealer, *including junk cartmen and junk boatmen*, shall purchase any goods, article or thing whatsoever from any minor, apprentice or servant, knowing or having reason to believe the seller to be such, nor from any person between [the setting of the sun] the hours of 6 p. m. and 7 a. m., [7 o'clock in the morning.]

3. Sales by dealers. No article or articles hereinabove enumerated, except old iron purchased in lots of one thousand pounds or over, old paper and old rags, shall be sold or disposed of by a junk dealer, including junk boatmen and junk cartmen, until the expiration of 48 hours after such purchase or receipt.

4. Prohibition as to second hand dealers. No person, firm or corporation licensed as a second hand dealer shall deal in the purchase or sale of any article or articles enumerated in section 120 hereof, or employ or use a cart wagon, boat or other vehicle for the purpose of collecting any such things or materials.

5. Other Business. No one licensed as a junk dealer, including junk cartmen and junk boatmen, shall be licensed as a pawnbroker or dealer in second hand articles in the city.

6. No licensed junk dealer, including junk boatmen and junk cartmen, shall purchase or sell any new goods.

Section 123. Record of purchases.

Every junk dealer, *including junk cartmen and junk boatmen*, shall keep, at his place of business, which place shall be within the limits of The City of New York, a book in which shall be legibly written, in English, at the time of every purchase or sale, a description of every article so purchased or sold, the name, residence and general description of the person or persons from whom such purchase was made or to whom such sale was made, the day and hour of such purchase or sale, and, when the purchase consists of articles from a scow, coal-boat, lighter, tug or other vessel, the name of such scow, coal-boat, lighter, tug or other vessel, and the name and residence of the owner thereof; and such book shall at all reasonable times be open to the inspection of any police officer, or the mayor, the commissioner or any inspector of licenses, or any magistrate, or person duly authorized in writing, for such purpose, by the commissioner or any magistrate, who shall exhibit such authorization to the dealer.

Section 124. Reports to the police department.

Every junk dealer, *including junk cartmen and junk boatmen*, upon being served with a written notice so to do by a member of the police department, shall report to the police commissioner, on blank forms to be furnished by the police department, an accurate description of all goods, articles or things purchased or received in the course of business of the junk dealer during the days specified in such notice, stating the amount paid for, and the name, residence and general description of the person from whom such goods, articles or things were received.

Section 125. Lost or stolen goods.

If any goods, articles or thing whatsoever, shall be advertised in any newspaper printed in the city as having been lost or stolen, and if the same or any such answering to the description advertised or any part [or portion] thereof, shall be or come into the possession of any junk dealer, *including junk cartmen and junk boatmen*, [he] such dealer, upon receiving written, printed or oral notice so to do, shall give information thereof in writing to the police commissioner, [and state] stating from whom the same was received. Every junk dealer, *as aforesaid*, who shall have or receive any goods, article or thing lost or stolen, or alleged or supposed to have been lost or stolen, shall exhibit the same, on demand, to any police officer, or to the mayor, commissioner or any inspector of licenses, or any magistrate, or person duly authorized in writing, by the commissioner or any magistrate, who shall exhibit such authorization to such dealer.

Section 126. Violations.

Any person who shall violate, or neglect, or refuse to comply with any of the provisions of this article, shall, upon conviction thereof, be punished by a fine of not more than \$200, or by imprisonment not exceeding sixty days, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

That the Committee having heard Commissioner Fay, who urged the adoption of this ordinance contending that in elevator apartment houses extending 150 feet in height, the elevator and operator is essential to be in operation during the night and on holidays and Sundays. He also cited many instances where the firemen were handicapped when a fire during the night where the elevator was not running and the attendant was not present.

The Committee is of the opinion that this ordinance is necessary and recommends its adoption.

In every building exceeding 150 feet in height, at least one elevator shall be kept in readiness for immediate use by the Fire Department, during all hours of the night and day, including holidays and Sundays, and there shall be in attendance at all times a man competent to operate the elevator.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Report of the Committee on General Welfare in Favor of Adopting an Ordinance to Amend the Code of Ordinances, Relating to "Refrigerating Plants."

The Committee on General Welfare, to which was referred on May 1, 1917 (Minutes, page 262), the annexed ordinance to amend section 220, article 18 of chapter 10 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to refrigerating plants, respectfully

REPORTS:

That the Committee having heard Mr. Hull, Assistant to the President, in favor of this ordinance, who explained at some length the advantages the City will derive therefrom, and no one appearing in opposition thereto, recommends its adoption.

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 220 of article 18 of chapter 10 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to refrigerating plants.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Section 220 of article 18 of chapter 10 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York is hereby amended to read as follows:

§220. Precautions.

1. Helmets or respirators. In such large refrigerating plants, as may be designated by the fire commissioner, there shall be kept, fit and available for use, suitable helmets or respirators which shall permit the wearer to reach, without suffocation, any part of the refrigerating system.

2. Pipes to be designated. In all refrigerating plants the pipes in the engine room shall have conspicuous signs, displayed at proper places, designating in easily legible letters the name of the refrigerating chemical contained therein.

3. Rules. In all refrigerating plants there shall be posted several copies of a brief set of rules satisfactory to the fire commissioner, directing all employees as to their duties in case of fire or other emergencies. Employers shall be responsible for the proper drill of all employees in such emergency duties.

4. Supervision. No refrigerating [machine] plant, of over 3-tons refrigerating capacity, using ammonia or carbon dioxide as a refrigerant, nor any refrigerating plant using over eight pounds of ethyl chloride or eight pounds of sulphur dioxide as refrigerants, shall be operated unless under the charge of a person holding a certificate of [fitness from] qualification issued by the [fire] police [commissioner] department, [], or who has been duly certified as competent to operate a refrigerating plant by any department of the city having jurisdiction to certify thereto. Any person holding a certificate of fitness to operate a refrigerating plant issued by the fire commissioner prior to the time when this ordinance takes effect shall be exempt from its provisions until the expiration of such certificate.

5. Certificate of qualification. Upon the request of any person who makes application to the police department for a license or certificate as engineer of any class or grade, or as to such applicant's qualifications to operate such a refrigerating plant, he shall be examined by said department as to his qualifications to operate a refrigerating plant, and, if he is found to be so qualified, said department shall so certify; such certification to continue in force one year unless sooner revoked or suspended.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Report of the Committee on General Welfare in Favor of Adopting a Substitute Ordinance to Amend the Code of Ordinances, Relating to Dealers in Second-hand Articles.

The Committee on General Welfare, to which was referred on May 22, 1917 (Minutes, page 338), the annexed ordinance to amend section 44, article 4, chapter 14 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to dealers in second-hand articles, respectfully

REPORTS:

That the Committee after having held a public hearing on the original ordinance on the same subject bearing No. 1373, which was referred to the Committee on March 13, 1917, and having heard Mr. Van Wirt, representing the Police Department; Mr. Hartman, representing the old clothes dealers; Mr. Diamond, Secretary Old Clothes Dealers; Mr. Yager and Mr. Salken in favor of same, who urged the adoption of this ordinance for the reason that it would regulate and place under the jurisdiction of the Commissioner of Licenses all dealers of old clothes, and having been informed by the representative of the Police Department that the present method of selling old clothes upon the streets caused considerable trouble and annoyance, and further that many of the dealers in and peddlers of old clothes have been acting in violation of the law. The Committee believes that this ordinance will prevent recurrences of this kind in the future; it further believes that a fee of \$5 will be ample compensation for this privilege.

It, therefore, recommends the adoption of the accompanying substitute ordinance.

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 44, article 4, chapter 14 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to dealers in second-hand articles.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Paragraph 1, section 44, article 4, chapter 14 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to Dealers in Second-Hand Articles, is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 44. Restrictions.

1. Place, expired licenses. No dealer in second-hand articles shall carry on business without a license, or at any other place than the one designated in his license [nor shall he continue to carry on business after his license is suspended, revoked or shall have expired,] except that any dealer in or peddler of old clothes shall have the right to purchase or sell old clothes from house to house, and if he has no store, his home shall be designated as his place of business; but no such dealer or peddler shall purchase clothes from or sell clothes to a person or persons on the streets; and such dealer in and peddler of old clothes while soliciting business from house to house shall wear a badge to be supplied by the commissioner of licenses in such form and design as the commissioner of licenses shall prescribe. No dealer in second-hand articles shall continue to carry on business after his license is suspended, revoked or shall have expired. The annual license fee to deal in or peddle old clothes shall be \$5.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect December 31, 1917.

Hon. HARRY ROBITZEK, Chairman, Committee on General Welfare, Board of Aldermen, City Hall:

Dear Sir—There has been introduced by the Welfare Committee in the Board of Aldermen, in new form, an amendment to the second hand dealers' ordinance, providing for the licensing of old clothes dealers and peddlers. While on the whole the amendment is a good one, there are two features of it to which this Department must respectfully object.

The first feature is that providing for a license fee lower than that charged to any other second hand dealer. I am unable to find any reason why this particular group should pay less than other dealers, especially as the rate was worked out very carefully on the basis of the cost of licensing and regulating all second hand dealers. It is also a fact that when this question was first brought to us by the second hand clothing peddlers, they had no objection to the license fee already fixed in the second hand dealers' ordinance.

The other objection is to the date when the ordinance will become effective, which is January 1, 1918.

In order not to seriously complicate the work of the Department, the ordinance

should become effective immediately, or else not before January 31, 1918. This latter date is the expiration date of all second hand dealers' licenses.

If the ordinance became effective immediately, a provision might be included under which a license fee for part of a year might be charged now and the license now issued made to expire on January 31, 1918, when licenses for a full year could be obtained.

If the provision now in the ordinance were retained, a man would be compelled to pay a year's license fee on January 1, 1918, and his license would expire at the end of that month.

I hope that the Welfare Committee and the Board as a whole will see fit to amend the proposed ordinance in the particulars mentioned above. Very truly yours,




