On motion, ordered to be placed on file, and the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That Charles Peterson & Co. be and they hereby are granted permission to erect a temporary landing-platform in front of the Chesbrough estate on the Harlem river, a short distance south of the Croton Aqueduct, in process of construction, the said work to be done under the supervision and direction of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, and in accordance with the plans and diagrams submitted, which are herewith approved, provided that the consent of the United States Engineer, officer in charge of the Harlem River Canal, is first obtained; it being expressly agreed and understood that this permit is for a temporary platform only, and that it is revocable at any time by the Board of Docks; and further provided, that the said Charles Peterson & Co. shall, within five days after receipt hereof, file in this office an agreement in writing that they will remove the said platform within ten days after receiving a notice from the Board of Docks to do so.

The report of the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 7517, in reference to the application of the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railroad Company for permission to alter and amend wharf and ferry structures at the foot of Whitehall street, East river, was

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, and the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That permission be and is hereby granted to the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railroad Company to alter, repair and extend the ferry wharf structures at the foot of Whitehall street, East river; the said work to be done in accordance with the plans submitted, which are hereby approved, and under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department; provided, that the said company shall first agree to and assent, in writing, within ten days from the date of this resolution, to pay as compensation for the use of the land under water covered by said ferry structures, over and above and in addition to the land under water now covered by existing structures, the sum of twenty-five cents per square foot per annum, payable quarterly, at the end of each quarter, to the Treasurer of this Department during the continuance of the present lease of said ferry franchise, or for such time as the said Staten Island Rapid Transit Railroad Company may occupy the premises referred to under the existing lease, and also that all structures erected on said land under water shall revert to and become the property of the City on the revocation or sooner termination of this permit or of the expiration or sooner termination of the lease of said premises held by said company; and it is also further provided, that the Department of Docks reserves the right to modify or change the terms of the above-described agreement in case the said company obtains more favorable terms with reference to said structures from the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

Whereas, At a meeting of the Board of this Department, held on December 16, 1887, the following preamble and resolutions were adopted:

Whereas, This Board has been in negotiation for the purchase of certain bulkhead or wharf property, commencing 100 feet west of Jackson street, extending thence westerly 125 feet on South street, along the East river, in the City of New York, as provided by section 15, chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882; and

Whereas, Such negotiations have resulted in a proposition on the part of John Duryea, for and in behalf of himself, Wright Duryea, William Duryea, Hiram Duryea and Edgar E. Duryea, under the terms of which they are willing to sell and convey to the Corporation of the City of New York, the premises hereinafter described for the sum of \$120 per lineal foot; therefore, be it

Resolved, That in pursuance of the proposition so named, the Board agrees to purchase for and on account of the Corporation of the City of New York the following-described piece or parcel of wharf property from the owners thereof, together with all their rights, titles, easements and privileges incident thereto, for the sum of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000), subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, as provided by said section 715, chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, viz.:

All that certain bulkhead or wharf on the southerly side of South street, situated between a line formed by the prolongation in a southerly direction of a line drawn parallel to and one hundred feet westerly from the westerly side of Jackson street (formerly Walnut Slip) until it intersects the said bulkhead, and another line formed by the prolongation in a southerly direction of a line drawn parallel to and two hundred and twenty-five feet westerly from the westerly side of Jackson street (formerly Walnut Slip), until it intersects the said bulkhead, the same extending along the East river for a distance of one hundred and twenty-five feet, together with the perpetual rights of wharfage, and all other riparian rights, terms, easements and privileges connected therewith or arising therefrom, or connected with or arising from the outer line of South street, or any other wharf line extending along the East river, between the said line formed by the prolongation in a southerly direction of a line drawn parallel to and one hundred feet westerly from the westerly side of Jackson street, and another line formed by the prolongation in a southerly direction of a line drawn parallel to and two hundred and twenty-five feet westerly from the westerly side of Jackson street, as and for the purposes of a wharf or bulkhead; and also, all the perpetual rights, titles, terms, easements or privileges in the land under water, or in or over the waters of the East river opposite to or in front of the said bulkhead, said outer line of South street, or said wharf lines, and all rights to any further or future grants of land and land under water in the East river, between the aforesaid prolongation of the line drawn parallel to and one hundred feet westerly from the westerly

side of Jackson street and a line drawn parallel to and two hundred and twenty-five feet westerly from said westerly side of Jackson street.

Also, any and every right, title or interest said parties of the first part may have, other than as above described in and to said South street, adjoining said bulkhead, as and for the purposes of a wharf or bulkhead, and in any bulkhead or bulkheads in front thereof, and the wharfage and emoluments therefrom, and the land and land under water and waters of the East river in front of said river extending from South street as far into the river as any private right may extend in front of said bulkhead, and any structures erected thereon; therefore, be it

Resolved, That the proposition made by this Board, by and on behalf of the owners of the property above described, to sell and convey the same to the Corporation of the City of New York, upon the terms and conditions named therein, be and hereby is accepted, subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, as provided for by law, and that the President of this Board be and is hereby authorized to notify the said parties of the acceptance hereof, and request that the agreements for carrying out the same shall be prepared and executed in quadruplicate by the said private owners, within twenty days from date hereof, and that when so prepared and submitted, the officers of this Board be and are hereby directed to execute the same, and affix the seal of this Department thereto, and when so executed, the Secretary be and hereby is directed to transmit a copy of the same to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and one of the quadruplicates to the Comptroller of the City.

Resolved, That the foregoing preambles and resolution be and they are hereby rescinded.

The said Commissioner of Public Works is hereby authorized to prescribe a penalty not exceeding the sum of five dollars for each offense, for permitting water to be wasted, and for any violation of such reasonable rules as he may, from time to time, prescribe for the prevention of the waste of water; such fines shall be added to the regular water rents.

The rent of all tenements which shall exceed in width fifty feet shall be the subject of special contract with the Commissioner of Public Works.

The apportionment of the regular rents upon dwellings, houses are on the basis that but one family is to occupy the same, and for each additional family, one dollar per year shall be charged.

Meters will be placed on all houses where waste of water is found, and they will be charged at rates fixed by the department for all the water passing through them.

The extra and miscellaneous rates shall be as follows to wit:

BAKERIES.—For the average daily use of flour, for each barrel, three dollars per annum.

BARBER SHOPS. shall be charged from five to twenty dollars per annum each in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works; an additional charge of five dollars per annum shall be made for each bath-tub therein.

BATHING TUBS in private houses, beyond one, shall be charged at three dollars per annum each, and five dollars per annum each in public houses, boarding-houses, and bathing establishments. Combination stationary wash-tubs, having a movable division in the centre and capable of use for bathing, shall be charged the same as bathing tubs.

BUILDING PURPOSES.—For each one thousand bricks laid, or for stone-work to be measured as brick—ten cents per thousand. For plastering, fifty cents per hundred yards.

COWS.—For each and every cow, one dollar per annum.

DINING SALOONS. shall be charged an annual rate of from five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

FISH STANDS (retail) shall be charged five dollars per annum each.

For all stables not metered, the rates shall be as follows:

HORSES, PRIVATE.—For each horse and fifty cents per annum; and for each additional horse, two dollars.

HORSES, LIVERY.—For each horse up to and not exceeding thirty in number, one dollar and fifty cents per annum; and for each exceeding ten, one dollar.

HORSES, OMNIBUS AND CART.—For each horse, one dollar per annum.

HORSE TROUGHS.—For each trough, and for each half barrel or tub on sidewalk or street, twenty dollars per annum; each trough is to be fitted with a proper ball-cock to prevent overflow.

Hotels and Boarding Houses shall, in addition to the regular rate for private families, be charged for each lodging room, at the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

LAUNDRIES shall be charged from eight to twenty dollars per annum, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

LIQUOR AND LAGER BEER SALOONS shall be charged an annual rate of ten dollars each. An additional charge of five dollars per annum shall be made for each tap or water-box.

PHOTOGRAPH GALLERIES shall be charged an annual rate of from five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

PRINTING OFFICES, when not metered, shall be charged at such rates as may be determined by the Commissioner of Public Works.

SODA, MINERAL WATER AND ROOT BEER FOUNTAINS shall be charged five dollars per annum each.

STEAM ENGINES, where not metered, shall be charged by the horse-power, as follows: For each horse, one dollar up to and not exceeding ten, the sum of ten dollars per annum; for each exceeding ten, and not over fifteen, the sum of seven dollars and fifty cents each; and for each horse-power over fifteen, the sum of five dollars.

WATER-CLOSETS AND URINALS.—To each building on a lot one water-closet having sewer connection is allowed without charge, each additional water-closet or urinal will be charged as hereinafter stated. All closets connected in any manner with sewer shall be charged two dollars for each seat per annum, whether in a building or on any other portion of the premises.

Urinals shall be charged two dollars per annum each.

WATER-CLOSET RATES.—For holders of any form, when water is supplied direct from the Croton supply, through any form of the so-called single or double valves, hopper-cocks, stop-cocks, self-closing cocks, or any valve or cock of any description attached to the closet, each, per year, twenty dollars.

For any closet, or any of the forms of valve, plunger, or other water-closet not before mentioned, supplied with water as above described, per year, ten dollars.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from the ordinary service of cistern filled with ball-cock, and overflow pipe that communicates with the pipe to the water-closet, so that overflow will run into the hopper or water-closet, when ball-cock is defective, or from which an unlimited amount of water can be drawn by holding up the handle, per year, each, five dollars.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from any of the forms of waste-prevention cisterns, that are approved by the Engineer of the Croton Aqueduct, which are so constructed that not more than three gallons of water can be drawn at each lift of the handle, or depression of the seat, if such cisterns are provided with an overflow pipe, such overflow pipe must not connect with the water-closet, but be carried like a safe-waste, as provided by the Board of Health regulations, per year, each, two dollars.

Cisterns answering this description can be seen at this Department.

METERS.

Under the provisions of section 352, Consolidated Act 1882, water-meters, of approved pattern, shall be hereafter placed on the pipes supplying all stores, workshops, hotels, manufactories, public edifices, at wharves, ferry-houses, stables, and in all places where water is furnished for business consumption, except private dwellings.

It is provided by section 352, Laws of 1882, that "all expenses of meters, their connections and setting, water rates, and other charges for the supply of Croton water, shall be a lien upon the premises where such water is supplied, as now provided by law."

All manufacturing and other business requiring a large supply of water will be furnished with a meter, and the water measured by meter, ten cents per one hundred cubic feet.

The rate charged for steam-vessels taking water daily or belonging to daily lines, is one-half cent, per ton (Custom House measurement) for each time they take water.

Steamers taking water other than daily, one cent per ton (Custom House measurement).

Water supplied to sailing vessels and put on board, twenty-five cents per hundred gallons.

All matters not hereinbefore embraced are reserved for special contract by and with the Commissioner of Public Works.

HYDRANTS, HOSE, TROUGHS, FOUNTAINS, ETC., ETC.

No owner or tenant will be allowed to supply water to another person or persons.

All persons taking water from the City must keep their own service-pipes, street tap, and all fixtures connected therewith, in good repair, protected from frost, at their own risk and expense, and shall prevent all waste of water.

The use of hose to wash coaches, omnibuses, wagons, railway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot be permitted.

No horse-troughs or horse-watering fixtures will be permitted in the street or on the sidewalk, except upon a license or permit taken out for that purpose.

All licenses or permits must be annually renewed on the first of May. Such fixtures must be kept in good order and the water not allowed to drip or waste by overrunning the sidewalk or street, or to become dangerous in winter by freezing in and about such troughs or fixtures.

No hydrant will be permitted on the sidewalk or in the front area, and any hydrant standing in a yard or alley, attached to any dwelling or building, must not be left running when not in actual use, and if the drip or waste from such hydrant freezes and becomes dangerous in winter, the supply will be shut off in addition to the penalty of five dollars imposed.

Taps at wash-basins, water-closets, baths and urinals must not be left running, under the penalty of five dollars for each offense, which will be strictly enforced.

Fountains or jets in hotels, porter-houses, eating-saloons, confectioneries or other buildings are strictly prohibited.

The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas, house-fronts, yards, court-yards, gardens, and about stables, is prohibited. Where premises are provided with wells, special permits will be issued for the use of hose, in order that the police or inspectors of this department may understand that the permission is not for the use of Croton water.

Opening fire-hydrants to fill hand sprinklers or other vessels will not be allowed.

The penalty for a violation of any of the preceding rules and regulations will be five dollars for each offense, and if not paid when imposed will become a lien on the premises in like manner as all other charges for unpaid water rates.

PUBLIC NOTICE AS TO WATER RATES

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT in compliance with the provisions of chapter 559, Laws of 1887, amending sections 50 and 52 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1868, passed June 1, 1887, the following changes are made in charging and collecting water rates:

1st. All extra charges for water incurred from and after June 1, 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the confirmation of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall include all charges and penalties of every nature.

2d. In every building where a water meter or meters are now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water by meter measurement shall be the only charge against such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through meter.

3d. The returns of arrears of water rents, including the year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the confirmation of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall include all charges and penalties of every nature.

4th. A penalty of five dollars (\$5) is hereby established, and will be imposed in each and every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful manner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the Bureau under the respective buildings or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears in like manner as other charges for water.

5th. Charges for so-called extra water rents of every nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 1, 1887, will be canceled of record on the books of the Department.

NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reduction of charges for water supplied to their premises, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful

waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, &c., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the amount of water used or wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will be allowed for any portion of one year.
