A meeting of the Board of Docks of the City of New York, held at the office of the Board, Pier "A," Battery place, Thursday, August 28, 1890.

The minutes of the meetings held the 21st, 22d and 23d instant were read and approved.

The following communications were received, read, and,

From the Counsel to the Corporation—Inclosing for verification the answer in the matter of Stringham and others vs. Flandreau, Post and others, respecting the removal of certain floating structures and obstructions, from the bulkhead northerly of the approach to Pier, new 47, North

In consequence of the fact that the Commissioners were unable to verify some of the admissions and denials contained in said answer,

Upon motion, it was ordered that the Counsel to the Corporation be requested to confer with the Board in relation thereto at a meeting to be held Friday, August 29, 1890, at 12 o'clock, M. From Wheeler, Cortis & Godkin, attorneys—Acknowledging receipt of a copy of resolutions adopted by this Board, August 21, 1890, and stating that their client Clement C. Moore has no power to make a conveyance of the rights and interest of his tenants.

power to make a conveyance of the rights and interest of his tenants.

From A. E. Outerbridge & Co., agents—Submitting application on behalf of the Quebec Steamship Company for an extension of the present lease of Pier, new 47, North river, together with the right to lengthen said pier, in accordance with chapter 482 of the Laws of 1890. Mr. Outerbridge requested to appear before the Board Thursday, September 4, at 11 A. M.

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, action being taken where necessary, as stated, to wit:
From the Finance Department—Returning the proposal of William P. Kelly for building a new wooden pier at the foot of One Hundred and Thirty-third street, and for building a new crib-bulk-head, between One Hundred and Thirty-third and One Hundred and Thirty-second streets, North river, and for dredging thereat, under Contract No. 348, and for building a new wooden pier foot of One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street, North river, under Contract No. 349, with his approval of the adequacy and sufficiency of the sureties thereto.

From the Department of Public Charities and Correction—Complaining of the trouble

From the Department of Public Charities and Correction—Complaining of the trouble experienced in unloading coal at Ward's Island, and requesting the Department to widen the dock at said place; also reporting that the "long dock" at Randall's Island requires immediate repairs. Referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

From the North and East River Steamboat Company—Requesting permission to erect four wooden uprights for a canvas covering on the south side of Pier, new 32, East river. Permit granted, to remain only during the pleasure of the Board.

From the Brooklyn and New York Ferry Company—Requesting permit to make all necessary repairs for the ensuing three months to ferry premises, foot of East Twenty-third street, Grand and Roosevelt streets, East river; also requesting permit to dredge on the south side of Pier foot of East Twenty-third street. Permit granted, the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, the repairs to be kept within existing lines.

"Resolved, That the Counsel to the Corporation be and is hereby requested to procure a stay in the above-entitled action and take such proceedings as may be necessary to perfect an appeal "from the said order.

"The foregoing preamble and resolution were adopted by the following vote: "Affirmative—President Post and Commissioner Matthews." Commissioner Cram not voting."

It becomes my duty as Commissioner of Public Works.

York:

It becomes my duty as Commissioner of Public Works and custodian of the many and immense interests involved in the City's water supply, to briefly present to the people of the City the present condition of the supply, and the extreme necessity for care and economy in the use of the water.

For a number of years past and up to the present time, the old Aqueduct and the Bronx river conduit have delivered in the City all the water which they are capable of carrying, the supply thus remaining stationary when the City has been constantly growing in population, buildings, manufactures and commerce, creating new and additional demands upon the water service. The consequence is that at certain seasons of the year, notably in extreme cold weather, when the habit of wasting

water from faucets to prevent freezing in the pipes prevails, and in warm and dry weather, when various methods of waste are in vogue, the daily consumption exceeds the supply which can by any possibility be received through the old Aqueduct and the Bronx river conduit, the excess of consumption being drawn from the city reservoirs, diminishing the depth of water and the pressure in the distributing mains. There is no possibility of increasing the water supply received in the City until the new Aqueduct is brought into operation, and in the meantime the only reliance for a fair and equal distribution of water throughout the city is care and economy in its use on the part of the people. Already the depth of water in the reservoirs is being diminished at the rate of one inch per day, and if this should continue for any length of time, the pressure in the distributing mains would be so reduced that it would be impossible to deliver water in thousands of houses located on high ground, and in some other locations even in the basements or cellars.

I, therefore, most earnestly appeal to all citizens, residents and people carrying on business in this city to be careful and economical in the use of water, in justice to themselves, to the people at large, and especially to those who are so located as to be already suffering inconvenience from insufficient supply of water.

Fourth—That our report herein will be presented to the Supreme Court of the State of New York at a Special Term thereof, to be held at the Chambers thereof, in the County Court-house in the City of New York, on the 23d day of September, 1890, at the opening of the Court on that day, and that then and there, or as soon thereafter as counsel can be heard thereon, a motion will be made that the said report be confirmed.
