#### MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS.

(G. O. 395.)

By Alderman Morris—

Whereas, The inadequacy of the present aqueduct to afford the needed supply of Croton water for use in this city is conceded on all hands, and already steps have been taken with a view of constructing an additional aqueduct to supply the deficiency; and

Whereas, Before authorizing a work of such magnitude, involving an expense of many millions of dollars, to be paid by our already over-taxed tax-payers, due consideration should be given to every feasible plan, and the one selected should be that which can be most expeditiously, economically, and efficiently applied to the present and future needs of this city, in respect to the adequacy of its water supply; and

Whereas, It is apparently clear to the ordinary mind, that the erection of a new aqueduct, which necessitates the purchase of land or the right of way for its construction, from private property-owners, from the Croton river, in Westchester County, to the receiving reservoir, in this city (a distance of nearly, if not quite, forty miles), must, necessarily, in addition to the cost of the construction of the aqueduct, be enormously expensive; and

Whereas, It seems to be practicable to provide an ample supply of Croton water for this city, both for its present and future needs, by laying, as occasion may require, one or more lines of iron pipes, thirty-six or forty-eight inches in diameter, either upon or alongside of the present aqueduct for its entire length, and over the present High Bridge; or, if that be not practicable, then that such iron pipes be used to convey the water, under ground, over and along a new route, from the Croton to the Harlem river, as a measure of much greater economy, and of equal if not greater efficiency; be it therefore

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Public Works, in the consideration of the question of providing an adequate supply of water for this city, be and is hereby requested to take into consideration the practicability of introducing such additional supply of water by means of iron pipes, in one of the two ways mentioned in the last preceding paragraph, and report the result of such inquiry, together with an estimate of the cost of the two methods—pipes or aqueduct—to this Board, at as early a day as possible, and before any application is made to the State Legislature to authorize the work.

By Alderman McCarthy—

Resolved, That the Counsel to the Corporation be and he is hereby requested to report to this Board what action he has taken to conform to the provisions of a resolution adopted by this Board, April 13, 1876, directing him to prepare a memorial, on behalf of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York, praying for the passage of an act, by the Legislature of this State, to authorize the construction of an additional aqueduct or other appliance, in order to afford this city a sufficient and unfailing supply of Croton water.

By the same—

Resolved, That permission be and is hereby given to the Direct United States Cable Company to retain a small ornamental sign-post in front of their building, No. 16 Broad street, the same to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

By Alderman Morris (for Alderman Wade)—

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to J. & W. Lyall to connect buildings Nos. 540 and 541 West Twenty-third street with a steam-pipe, underground, not more than two inches in diameter; provided, no detriment be occasioned thereby to the public uses of said street; hat said J. & W. Lyall be responsible for any loss or injury occasioned thereby; and that no inter-

ference with the water or gas pipes, or sewer, shall result therefrom, the work to be done at their own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

By Alderman Pinckney—

Resolved, That John J. Pollock be and is hereby appointed a Commissioner of Deeds, in place of John J. Pollock, whose term of office has expired.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote:

Affirmative—The President, Aldermen Cudlipp, Guntzer, Hess, Howland, Keenan, McCarthy, Morris, Pinckney, Purroy, J. Reilly, and Seery—12.

By Alderman Hess—

Resolved, That James Saitta be and he is hereby appointed a Commissioner of Deeds.

Which was referred to the Committee on Salaries and Offices.

Alderman Seery moved that when this Board adjourns it do so to meet on Saturday next, the 21st inst., at 2 o'clock P. M.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

#### UNFINISHED BUSINESS.

Alderman McCarthy called up G. O. 370, being a resolution and ordinance, as follows:

Resolved, That One Hundred and Seventeenth street, from Second to Third avenue, be paved with Belgian or trap-block pavement, and that at the several intersecting streets and avenues crosswalks be laid where not now laid, and relaid where those now laid are, in the opinion of the Commissioner of Public Works, not in good repair, or are not upon a grade adapted to the grade of the proposed new pavement, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Alderman McCarthy moved to amend by striking out the words "One Hundred and Seventeenth street, from Second to Third," and inserting in lieu thereof the words "One Hundred and Thirteenth street, from Third to Fourth," in the resolution and ordinance wherever they occur.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

And the resolution and ordinance, together with the petition presented at this meeting, was then laid over.

#### COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE DEPARTMENTS AND CORPORATION OFFICERS.

The President laid before the Board the following communication from the Department of Public Works:

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS,  
COMMISSIONER'S OFFICE, ROOM 19, CITY HALL,  
NEW YORK, October 19, 1876. }

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

GENTLEMEN—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your resolution, approved on the 12th instant, requesting me to make a personal inspection of the roadway of Seventh avenue, from Fourteenth to Fifty-ninth street, and to report to you the result of such inspection, with such recommendations as in my judgment may be adopted, to make the roadway passable for vehicle and pedestrians.

I have made an examination now, and heretofore, of the Seventh avenue, and find it in bad condition (especially at the crossings), having been paved with wood from Fourteenth street to Fifty-ninth street.

As stated in my last quarterly report to the Mayor, all the wooden pavements of the city are worn out, and require replacement with stone-block pavements during the year 1877. This is particularly true of the avenues and other business streets.

I have applied to the Board of Apportionment for an appropriation for 1877 of \$500,000 for repavements, and \$250,000, in addition, for repairs and renewals.

With these sums many streets and avenues, especially the important thoroughfares, can be put in excellent condition.

The appropriation for the present year is nearly exhausted; but there are some small balances which may be transferred from other appropriations, and which I will request the Board of Apportionment to grant.

In this way some of the important crossings may be repaired this season.
