From the Clerk of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, advising of the action of said Board in making the unexpended balance of the amount provided for paving the plaza at Fifty-ninth street and Fifth avenue applicable to the work of asphaltting in other localities in the Central Park. Filed.

Commissioner Clausen offered the following :

Resolved, That, pursuant to the terms of the contract between this Department and Theodore P. Huffman & Co., dated July 15, 1898, for furnishing forage in the boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, the quantities of timothy hay, clover hay, straw, oats and corn therein specified be decreased, as may be required, not exceeding twenty-five per cent., and that the quantity of bran therein specified be increased, as may be required, not exceeding twenty-five per cent.

Whereas, By reason of the large increase in the price of glass and also a considerable increase in the cost of structural iron since the estimate for the erection of greenhouses in the Central Park was prepared, the sum heretofore provided for that work is found to be insufficient.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be respectfully requested to authorize an issue of bonds to the amount of seven thousand dollars, in the manner provided by chapter 643 of the Laws of 1897, the proceeds to be applied to the work of erecting greenhouses in the Central Park.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be respectfully requested to amend its action of August 22, 1898, in authorizing the expenditure of the sum of eighteen thousand dollars from the surplus of bonds sold pursuant to the provisions of chapter 194 of the Laws of 1896, for doing certain asphalt work at the plaza at Fifty-ninth street and Fifth avenue, so as to provide for said sum by the issue of bonds to the amount of seventeen thousand dollars, under chapter 643 of the Laws of 1897, the remaining one thousand dollars to be taken from the fund provided by chapter 194 of the Laws of 1896.

The action of the Secretary in transmitting the same, with requisitions for the amount, to the Finance Department for payment, approved.

The action of the President in furnishing certain information to the New York State Commerce Commission in relation to the water front of the city and the improvement thereof, as requested by said Commission, was approved.

The President gave notice that at the next meeting of the Board he would move that the Engineer-in-Chief take possession of the 125 feet of bulkhead north of Watts street, North river, owned by the Kingsland estate.

On motion of the President, the Secretary was directed to notify the Consolidated Ice Company that unless it places the Pier foot of West Forty-third street in proper condition within ten days, the Board of Docks will seize the property, the premises being in a condition dangerous to life and health.

On motion of the President, any and all permits granted Richard J. Foster to maintain ice bridges on bulkhead between Piers new, 41 and 42, North river, was revoked, to take effect immediately and the Engineer-in-Chief directed to remove such ice bridges at once.

At a regular meeting of the Board of Docks, held Friday, December 23, 1898, at 2 o'clock P. M.

Present—The full Board.

The Board proceeded to open estimates on Contract No. 644, a representative of the Comptroller being present.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to transmit to the Comptroller the security deposits made by the above bidders at the time of submitting their estimates, whereupon the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the contract opened this day for dredging in the vicinity of Catharine street, near the site of former Pier, old 35, East river, under Contract No. 644, be and hereby is awarded to the Morris & Cummings Dredging Company, it being the lowest bidder, subject to the approval of Daniel J. Leary and Grahams Pulley, as sureties, by the Comptroller.

The minutes of the meeting held December 16, 1898, were approved.

Christopher Cunningham and Stephen McMahon appeared and presented a petition from business men requesting the construction of a public dock at or near the foot of Greenpoint avenue, Newtown creek. They were informed that the matter would receive the consideration of the Board as soon as money is available for such improvement.

The communication from the Corporation Counsel, requesting information in relation to the policy of this Department as regards water-front property now being condemned, was referred to the President to answer.

The communications from Owens & Co., requesting a rebate in rental of the bulkhead foot of East Forty-seventh street during the time same was being rebuilt, and also requesting a ten-years lease of the bulkhead, at an annual rental of \$750, were referred to the Treasurer and Commissioner Meyer.

The following permits were granted, to continue during the pleasure of the Board:

Curtis & Blaisdell, to use and occupy the platform foot of Fifty-sixth street, East river, compensation to be paid therefor at the rate of \$12.50 per month, payable at the end of each month to the Dock Master.

John A. Bouker, to maintain dumping-board, between Seventy-first and Seventy-second streets, East river, compensation therefor to be fixed by the Treasurer.

Portchester Transportation Company, to maintain tally-house on Pier, new 32, East river.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

J. & F. Kelly, to repair the bulkhead foot of Bay Twenty-second street, Bath Beach, Borough of Brooklyn.

J. C. Ennis, to construct a walkway at Canarsie, Jamaica Bay, Borough of Queens, said walkway to remain thereat only during the pleasure of the Board.

From the Comptroller—

1st. Approving sureties on Contract No. 642.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That a penalty of twenty dollars per day be and is hereby imposed upon Hoagland & Robinson for each and every day during which any part of the brick now on the new made land in the rear of the bulkhead between West Fifth and West Fifty-first streets, North river, shall remain on said premises after December 24, 1898; and in case said brick is not removed on that date, the Secretary be and hereby is directed to request the Corporation Counsel to take steps

to have H. P. Robinson, the surviving partner of the said firm of Hoagland & Robinson, punished for the commission of a misdemeanor, in accordance with the provisions of section 827 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897.
