Whereas, A nefarious attempt has been made to assassinate the President of the United States; and

Whereas, The crime has shocked the people of the civilized world and excited profound sympathy for the distinguished sufferer and widespread indignation against anarchists and anarchism; and

Whereas, The blow that was struck at the President of the United States was aimed not at an individual but against the occupant of an office that is the highest and most honorable in the gift of the American people; and

Whereas, The people of the United States, without any political distinctions, regard their President as the embodiment of those constitutional principles which have safeguarded the rights of all the people of this land and made the nation strong in all the results that flow from civilization and progress; and

Whereas, The people of The City of New York have been second to none in their devotion to the Presidents of the United States; and

Whereas, They are aware that law, order and good government are necessary for the advancement and welfare of this and every other civilized nation upon the earth; and

Whereas, They recognize the fact that anarchism, with brutal and meaningless purpose, aims only at the destruction of the existing social order; and

Whereas, All the people of New York City unite in detestation of the crime by which the life of the President of the United States has been threatened; now therefore be it

Resolved, by the members of the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York, representing all the people of the metropolis, without any distinction of political opinion, That the crime committed in Buffalo against the person of the President of the United States be and it is hereby most strongly condemned; and be it further

Resolved, That the City Clerk be and he is hereby authorized and directed to convey to the President of the United States and Mrs. McKinley the assurance that the members of the Municipal Assembly sympathize most deeply with the President in his affliction, and that they assure him of their great satisfaction that his life has been spared and of their earnest hope for his speedy and complete recovery.

Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions, suitably engrossed and duly authenticated by the City Clerk, be forwarded immediately to the Secretary of State of the United States.

AN ORDINANCE to lay out a public place in the Twenty-eighth Ward, Borough of Brooklyn.

Be it Ordained by the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York, as follows: That, in pursuance of section 436 of the Greater New York Charter, the following resolution of the Board of Public Improvements, adopted by that Board on the 16th day of May, 1900, be and the same hereby is approved, viz.:

Resolved, That the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 436 of chapter 378, Laws of 1897, deeming it for the public interest to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by laying out a public place, bounded by Myrtle avenue, Knickerbocker avenue and Bleeker street, in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, does hereby favor and approve of the same, so as to lay out the aforesaid public place as follows:

Beginning at the southeast house corner of Myrtle avenue and Knickerbocker avenue;

1st. Thence easterly along the southern house-line of Myrtle avenue for 69.13 feet to the southwest house corner of Myrtle avenue and Bleeker street;

2d. Thence southerly along the western house-line of Bleeker street for 48.53 feet, to the northwest house corner of Bleeker street and Knickerbocker avenue, as shown on the Commissioners' Map of Bushwick;

3d. Thence westerly along the northern house-line of Knickerbocker avenue for 49.24 feet to the point of beginning.

AN ORDINANCE to pave One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street, Borough of The Bronx.

Be it Ordained by the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York, as follows: That, in pursuance of sections 413 and 422 of the Greater New York Charter, the following resolution of the Board of Public Improvements, adopted by that Board on the 24th day of October, 1900, be and the same hereby is approved, and the public work or improvement therein provided for is hereby authorized, and it is hereby determined that the cost and expense thereof shall be borne and paid as therein provided; namely,

Resolved, by the Board of Public Improvements, That, in pursuance of sections 413 and 422 of the Greater New York Charter, the paving with granite-block pavement on a sand foundation, with a guarantee of maintenance from the contractor for one (1) year, of the carriageway of One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street, between St. Ann's avenue and Trinity avenue, in the Borough of The Bronx, under the direction of the Commissioner of Highways, be and the same hereby is authorized and approved, there having been presented to said Board an estimate in writing, in such detail as the said Board has directed, of the cost of the proposed work or improvement, and

a statement of the assessed value, according to the last preceding tax-roll, of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment, the estimated cost of said work being six thousand six hundred dollars. The said assessed value of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment is two hundred and ninety-two thousand six hundred dollars.

And the said Board does hereby determine that no portion of the cost and expense thereof shall be borne and paid by The City of New York, but the whole of such cost and expense shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby.

AN ORDINANCE to regulate Pitkin avenue, Borough of Brooklyn.

Be it Ordained by the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York, as follows:

That, in pursuance of sections 413 and 422 of the Greater New York Charter, the following resolution of the Board of Public Improvements, adopted by that Board on the 26th day of December, 1900, be and the same hereby is approved, and the public work or improvement therein provided for is hereby authorized, and it is hereby determined that the cost and expense thereof shall be borne and paid as therein provided; namely,

Resolved, by the Board of Public Improvements, That, in pursuance of sections 413 and 422 of the Greater New York Charter, the regulating and grading of Pitkin avenue, between Snediker avenue and Linwood street, in the Borough of Brooklyn, and the paving of the carriageway with granite-block pavement, setting or resetting of the curb, laying of crosswalks, and flagging or reflagging of sidewalks of said street where not already done, under the direction of the Commissioner of Highways, be and the same hereby is authorized and approved, there having been presented to said Board an estimate in writing, in such detail as the said Board has directed, of the cost of the proposed work or improvement, and a statement of the assessed value, according to the last preceding tax-roll, of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment, the estimated cost of said work being seventy-three thousand two hundred dollars. The said assessed value of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment is seven hundred and eight thousand dollars.

And the said Board does hereby determine that no portion of the cost and expense thereof shall be borne and paid by The City of New York, but the whole of such cost and expense shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 178 of the Greater New York Charter, the Comptroller be authorized, subject to concurrence herewith by the Municipal Assembly, to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York, in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to the amount of thirty-five thousand dollars (\$35,000), the proceeds whereof shall be applied to the work of laying water-mains in Hunt's Point road, from Lafayette avenue to Manida street, and in Manida street, between Hunt's Point road and the East river, Borough of The Bronx, across the East river to Riker's Island, and on Riker's Island where necessary, with the necessary stop-cocks, hydrants and connections.

Resolved, That the Municipal Assembly hereby concurs in the said resolution and that the Comptroller be and hereby is authorized to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York, in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to the amount of thirty-five thousand dollars (\$35,000), for the purpose of providing means for the payment of the expenses therein mentioned and authorized.

AN ORDINANCE to regulate, etc., a new street between Richmond turnpike and Ward avenue, Borough of Richmond.

Be it Ordained by the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York, as follows:

That, in pursuance of sections 413 and 422 of the Greater New York Charter, the following resolution of the Board of Public Improvements, adopted by that Board on the 19th day of June, 1901, be and the same hereby is approved, and the public work or improvement therein provided for is hereby authorized, and it is hereby determined that the cost and expense thereof shall be borne and paid as therein provided; namely,

Resolved, by the Board of Public Improvements, That, in pursuance of sections 413 and 422 of the Greater New York Charter, the regulating and grading of a street sixty feet in width between Richmond turnpike and Ward avenue, in the Second Ward of the Borough of Richmond, the southerly line of said street to begin at a point on the easterly side of Richmond turnpike, 443 feet, more or less, northeasterly from the intersection of the northerly line of Louis street with the said easterly line of Richmond turnpike and said southerly line of said proposed street, to extend thence in a straight line southeasterly and along the northeasterly line of the property of Louis De Jonge & Co. to a point on Ward avenue distant 378 feet, more or less, northeasterly from the intersection of the northerly line of Louis street and the westerly line of Ward avenue, setting or resetting of curbstones, paving gutters and the macadamizing of the roadway of said street, under the direction of the Commissioner of Highways, be and the same hereby is authorized and approved, there having been presented to said Board an estimate in writing, in such detail as the said Board has directed, of the cost of the proposed work or improvement, and a statement of the assessed value, according to the last preceding tax-roll, of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment, the estimated cost of said work being eleven thousand five hundred dollars. The said assessed value of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment is sixty-five thousand nine hundred dollars.

And the said Board does hereby determine that no portion of the cost and expense thereof shall be borne and paid by The City of New York, but the whole of such cost and expense shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby.
