To the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

I hereby respectfully request your Honorable Board to pass a resolution in accordance with subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the Comptroller to issue Special Revenue Bonds to provide the means necessary to make payments for the following purposes, viz.: To pay the sum of \$14,667.64, the amount of the deficiency in the appropriation for the Office of the Register of the County of New York for the present year, 1904, for General Administration, entitled "Salaries of the Deputy, Assistant Deputy, Chief Clerk, Clerks, Employees and Folio Writers," over and above the unexpended balance of \$2,060.36, which I have heretofore requested the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to transfer to said appropriation from another appropriation in my office.

In explanation of my request, I beg leave to make the following statement:

The amount actually appropriated for said salaries for the present year, 1904, was \$148,840, which was \$7,228 less than the sum requested by me in my Departmental Estimate. The business of the Register's Office naturally increases from year to year; but the increase in the number of papers recorded for the present over the last previous year has been unusually great, being about 40 per cent. The largest single item of this appropriation is for the payment of the Folio Writers, who are paid at the rate of five cents per folio, and the amount necessary to pay them can, of course, be only roughly estimated in advance. After deducting the annual salaries of the regular employees of the office there remained only \$25,772 to pay the Folio Writers. A small amount, however, has been saved on the annual salary account, because of the death of one employee, and the transfer of another to the Supreme Court. In 1903, the amount actually paid to the Folio Writers was \$30,807.35; in 1904, the amount already paid to the Folio Writers for the seven months ending July 31, 1904, is \$24,561.25, and at that rate the amount which must be expended for the whole year will be approximately \$42,500, or an increase of about 40 per cent., due to the large increase in real estate transactions and in the number of instruments consequently recorded. Although the Folio Writers are paid but five cents per folio, I receive fees for their work at the rate of ten cents per folio; so that, if \$42,500 be expended, the sum of \$85,000 will be received by me and paid into the City Treasury. In other words, for every dollar expended the City receives two dollars in return, for folio writing, in addition to the extra fees collected for indexing and certificates. The increased work done in the Register's Office has, of course, resulted in a proportionate increase in all the fees payable into the City Treasury.

The sum appropriated for "Salaries—General Administration," for 1904, was the same amount precisely as that appropriated for 1903, which was based upon a large reduction in the number of salaried employees, due to the discharge of superfluous employees, made shortly after the commencement of my term of office; but my estimate for 1904 included the salaries of three bookbinders, amounting to \$3,240, who formerly had been on the City Record pay-roll, and who had not been employed by this office during 1903.

The deficiency in the said appropriation is due wholly to the insufficiency of the sum appropriated for the payment of Folio Writers.

Memorandum as to Expenditures in Connection with the "General Slocum" Disaster.  
The first item, \$300, professional services of John McDougall, is for work as described in his bill in connection with the raising of the boat.

The item \$1,122, Pach Brothers, photographs, is in connection with the taking of a large number of photographs at North Brother Island and the Morgue. These photographs were of great value and assistance in connection with identifications of the dead, many of which could not have been accomplished without the photographs.

The item \$122.50, for stenographic services, is for work at the Morgue in connection with listing and describing the dead and their effects. These typewritten descriptions were also of great service in securing identifications, especially after the bodies had been sealed up or buried.

The item \$12,275.71 includes \$11,000, amount of contract with the Merrit & Chapman Derrick and Wrecking Company, for raising the hulk, the balance of the amount being made up of charges in connection with towing, use of lighter, services of divers and wreckers, and for materials used in recovering bodies.

The item \$15, Edward Butchinger, use of launch, covers use of launch June 16 by Police at College Point, New York.

The item \$25, Wade Hixon, also covers use of another launch in carrying Police reserves from College Point to North Brother Island, services in recovering bodies and watching wreck.

The item \$1,934.85, John N. Robins Company (Erie Basin Dry Docks), is for wharfage, labor, use of pumping apparatus, etc., during the time the boat was in the possession of this Department and while still needed for evidence, examination, etc. The boat is now in possession of a trustee under the United States Court order, to be sold for the benefit for all concerned. At the proper time this Department will file a claim as salvor against the boat, which I am informed is legally a preferred claim. The amount ultimately realized on this claim, which will probably not be for a number of months, after deducting expenses, etc., cannot now be estimated but will not be large.

These bills would have been submitted sooner but for the fact that it was understood by this Department that the Coroner's office, the Health Department and others concerned were to get together and ask for a lump sum to pay the bills, but a different course has been found more practicable and for this reason an appropriation is asked to cover the amount of the bills incurred by this Department.

All the above bills are quite reasonable, in view of the grewsome nature of the work and the fact that it had to be done at once, and as the services were entirely satisfactory and four months have elapsed since they were rendered, it is respectfully urged that the appropriation asked for, to wit, \$15,760.06, be made promptly.

The City of New York—Department of Parks,  
Arsenal, Central Park, October 3, 1904.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, The City of New York:

Gentlemen—I beg to invite the attention of your Honorable Board to an item contained in my communication of February 18 last, estimating the amount required for necessary park improvements to be provided for through the issue of Corporate Stock—namely, the sum of \$73,000 required for the widening and improvement of that portion of One Hundred and Tenth street (Cathedral parkway), between Fifth and Seventh avenues.

The condition of this street is such that I feel it my duty to urge that action be taken without delay, to provide for its improvement. It is generally dilapidated, unfitted for traffic purposes, the source of constant complaint, and a menace.

The roadway in its present state is practically useless for traffic, and the cost of repairing this portion alone would be too large to be warranted for repairs alone, but should be done in connection with the general improvement of this street or avenue, on the lines as now defined, the title to the lands for its widening having been vested in the City since 1900. Being the northerly boundary of the Central Park and a very important thoroughfare, its use is in great demand when the street is in passable condition. That portion of the parkway between Seventh avenue and Riverside Park, with which it connects, has been fully improved for some time past, and the section herein referred to leaves unfinished a greatly needed improvement which has been long sought for.

Aside from the advantages to come from the permanent improvement, the condition of the present roadway is so discreditable that I deem it proper to urge most earnestly upon your Honorable Board the necessity for and wisdom of immediate action.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

Sir Hon. John J. Pallas, Commissioner of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, in communication under date of October 3, 1904, requests the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the issue of Corporate Stock to the amount of \$73,000 to provide means for widening and improvement of that portion of One Hundred and Tenth street (Cathedral parkway), between Fifth and Seventh avenues. I would report that I have had the premises examined. As stated by the Commissioner, the roadway in its present condition is practically useless for traffic; the old structures have been removed from the portion taken for the widening, and the fence set back on the new line; this leaves a strip on the north side of 45 feet wide from the old curb line to the new northerly line, which is in a dilapidated condition; the old sidewalk is broken and dangerous in places; this improvement, in my opinion, is very important and should be done at once.

The Engineer's estimate for this work is as follows:

## ORIGINAL.

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 105 of the Building Code, relative to fireproofing buildings.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

That section 105 of the Building Code of The City of New York is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 105. Fireproof Buildings—Every building hereafter erected or altered, to be used as a hotel, lodging-house, school, theatre, jail, police station, hospital, asylum, institution for the care or treatment of persons, the height of which exceeds thirty-five feet, excepting all buildings for which specifications and plans have been heretofore submitted to and approved by the Department of Buildings, or other public authorities now having jurisdiction in such matters, and every other building the height of which exceeds seventy-five feet, except as herein otherwise provided, shall be built fireproof, that is to say, they shall be constructed with walls of brick, stone, Portland cement, concrete, iron or steel, in which wooden beams or lintels shall not be placed, and in which the floors and roofs shall be of materials provided for in section 106 of this Code. The stairs and staircase landings shall be built entirely of brick, stone, Portland cement, concrete, iron or steel. No woodwork or other inflammable material shall be used in any of the partitions, furrings or ceilings in any such fireproof buildings, excepting however, that when the height of the building does not exceed (twelve stories nor more than one hundred and fifty feet) one hundred feet, the doors and windows and their frames, the trims, the casings, the interior finish when filled solid at the back with fireproof material, and the floor boards and sleepers directly thereunder, may be of wood, but the space between the sleepers shall be solidly filled with fireproof materials and extend up to the underside of the floor boards.

When the height of a fireproof building exceeds (twelve stories or more than one hundred and fifty feet) one hundred feet, the floor surfaces shall be of stone, cement, rock, asphalt, tiling or similar incombustible material, or the sleepers and boards may be of wood treated by some process approved by the Board of Buildings, or other public authorities now having jurisdiction in such matters, to render the same fireproof. All outside window frames and sash shall be of metal, or of wood covered with metal. The inside window frames and sash, doors, trim and other interior finish may be of wood covered with metal, or of wood treated by some process approved by the Board of Buildings to render the same fireproof.

All hall partitions or permanent partitions between rooms in fireproof buildings shall be built of fireproof material, and shall not be started on wood sills nor on wooden floor boards, but be built upon the fireproof construction of the floor and extend to the fireproof beams filling above. The top of all door and window openings in such partitions shall be at least twelve inches below the ceiling line.

## SUBSTITUTE.

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 105 of the Building Code relative to fireproofing buildings.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

That section 105 of the Building Code of The City of New York is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 105. Fireproof Buildings—Every building hereafter erected or altered, to be used as a hotel, lodging house, school, theatre, jail, police station, hospital, asylum, institution for the care or treatment of persons, the height of which exceeds thirty-five feet, excepting all buildings for which specifications and plans have been heretofore submitted to and approved by the Department of Buildings, shall be built fireproof, that is to say, they shall be constructed with walls of brick, stone, Portland cement concrete, iron or steel, in which wood beams or lintels shall not be placed, and in which the floors and roofs shall be of materials provided for in section 106 of this Code. The stairs and staircase landings shall be built entirely of brick, stone, Portland cement concrete, iron or steel. No woodwork or other inflammable material shall be used in any of the partitions, furrings or ceilings in any such fireproof buildings, excepting, however, the inside window frames and sash, doors, trims and other interior finish when filled solid at the back with fireproof material, and the floor boards and sleepers directly thereunder may be of wood covered with metal, or of wood treated by some process approved by the Department of Buildings, or other public authorities now having jurisdiction in such matters, to render the same fireproof, but the space between the sleepers shall be solidly filled with fireproof materials and extend up to the underside of the floor boards. The outside window frames and sash shall be of metal or wood covered with metal. (and every)

Every other building other than those mentioned in the first paragraph of this section, the height of which exceeds seventy-five feet (except as herein otherwise provided), shall be built fireproof, that is to say, they shall be constructed with walls of brick, stone, Portland cement concrete, iron or steel, in which wood beams or lintels shall not be placed, and in which the floors and roofs shall be of materials provided for in section 106 of this Code. The stairs and staircase landings shall be built entirely of brick, stone, Portland cement concrete, iron or steel. No woodwork or other inflammable material shall be used in any of the partitions, furrings, or ceilings in any such fireproof buildings, excepting however that when the height of the building does not exceed (twelve) eight stories, or more than (one hundred and fifty feet) one hundred feet, the doors and windows and their frames, the trims, the casings, the interior finish when filled solid at the back with fireproof material, and the floor boards and sleepers directly thereunder may be of wood, but the space between the sleepers shall be solidly filled with fireproof materials and extend up to the underside of the floor boards.

When the height of (a) any fireproof building, other than those to be used for purposes stated in the first paragraph of this section exceeds (twelve) eight stories or more than (one hundred and fifty) one hundred feet, the floor surfaces shall be of stone, cement, rock, asphalt, tiling or similar incombustible material, or the sleepers and boards may be of wood treated by some process approved by the Board of Buildings, or other public authorities now having jurisdiction in such matters, to render the same fireproof. All outside window frames and sash shall be of metal, or of wood covered with metal. The inside window frames and sash, doors, trim and other interior finish may be of wood covered with metal, or of wood treated by some process approved by the Board of Buildings, or other public authorities now having jurisdiction in such matters, to render the same fireproof.

All hall partitions or permanent partitions between rooms in fireproof buildings, shall be built of fireproof material, and shall not be started on wood sills nor on wooden floor boards, but be built upon the fireproof construction of the floor and extend to the fireproof beams filling above. The top of all door and window openings in such partitions, shall be at least twelve inches below the ceiling line.

Hon. FRANKLIN B. WARE, Alderman Thirty-first District, No. 1170 Broadway, New York:

Dear Sir—Your letter dated October 12, addressed to Mr. William A. Anderson, Superintendent of the Board of Fire Underwriters, had consideration at the meeting of the Board held on October 19. A special committee, of which the writer is Chairman, was empowered to make reply and take such action as it saw fit.

In accordance therewith, I have to advise you that the New York Board of Fire Underwriters is opposed to the enactment of the proposed ordinance, which you inclose, amending section 105 of the Building Code, for the following among other reasons:

First—We believe that much of the wood that has been introduced in buildings in this City as "fireproof" has not been properly treated by process approved by the Building Department, and it is our opinion that until the wood-treating companies, the builders and the architects, are required to furnish sworn statements to the Building Department as to the amount of wood in the building and that all of it has been properly treated by approved process, and until these statements have been verified by the Building Department by examination of plans, details and specifications of the building and by tests of samples taken from the building from time to time, the underwriters and the public cannot be certain that the requirements of the code will be complied with.

Second—It is questionable how long wood that has been treated will remain fire-resisting, for it is well known that no process yet adopted makes wood fireproof. Heretofore the Department of Building has had control of fireproofing processes. The proposed ordinance permits the approval to be given by "the Board of Buildings or other public authorities now having jurisdiction of such matters." The introduction of the words "or other public authorities now having jurisdiction of such matters" is either unnecessary or suspicious.

Third—The proposed change requiring "fireproof" wood to be used in buildings of eight instead of twelve stories, or more than 100 feet instead of 150 feet in height, would be a hardship to property owners under present conditions, first, because very little of the so-called "fireproof" wood is even fire-resisting; second, because the cost of said treatment adds very largely to the cost of the building, and, third, because it would not be possible to get enough fireproofed wood to finish the great number of buildings that are being constructed in New York.

When this wood fireproofing process was first introduced the underwriters sought to stimulate its use by making a reduction in rate because of the introduction of such wood in any building. So much of the so-called fireproof wood is defective, however, that we do not now feel that this reduction is justified.

To the Honorable President of the Board of Aldermen, City of New York:

Sir—At a meeting of the Executive Committee of the New York Chapter of the American Institute of Architects held October 21, 1904, a report was made by the Committee on Examinations in regard to certain proposed changes in section 105 of the Building Code of The City of New York, relating to fireproofing of buildings. A copy of the report is inclosed herewith.

The Committee feels that the proposed amendment seems unconsidered and of doubtful advantage, especially as the fireproof qualities of fireproof wood as compared with metal covered have not been clearly demonstrated, nor does it see any advantage in fireproofing the sleepers.

The Committee is of the opinion that as the Board of Aldermen have the power to make ordinances to amend the Building Code, and as such amendments may be made from time to time without an opportunity being afforded for proper consideration of the parties most interested, it (the Committee) suggests that a request be sent to his Honor the Mayor, asking him to disapprove any amendments to the Building Laws unless a previous public hearing had been given, or that the proposed amendment had been submitted to the following bodies for their opinion:

New York Chapter, A. I. A.  
New York Board of Fire Underwriters  
Mechanics and Traders' Exchange.  
Society of Architectural Iron Manufacturers.  
Real Estate Owners.  
The Builders' Association.  
New York Real Estate Exchange (Limited).  
The Chief of the Fire Department.

These bodies being those represented in the Board of Examiners as constituted in section 649 of the Greater New York Charter.

The following resolution was adopted by the Executive Committee.

"Resolved, That while the New York Chapter of the American Institute of Architects desires to encourage all improvements tending to making buildings more secure and fire resisting, nevertheless, if this particular law were passed, it would be a burden upon the owner with little or no assurance that buildings would be made more fireproof."

Dear Sir—The Committee on Examinations begs to report as follows on the proposed ordinance of the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, to amend section 105 of the Building Code, relating to fireproof buildings:

It finds the principal changes to be:

(1) Public buildings, that is to say, all buildings hereafter erected or altered, to be used as a hotel, lodging house, school, theatre, jail, police station, hospital, asylum, and institutions for the cure and treatment of persons, the height of which exceeds 35 feet, will be required to have metal window frames for outside windows, and the inside window frames and sash, doors, trims and other interior finish, and the floor boards and sleepers may be of wood covered with metal, or of wood treated by some process approved by the Department of Buildings or other public authorities now having jurisdiction in such matters, to render the same fireproof.

Whereas, under the existing law, such fireproofing is not required.

(2) The rules governing buildings 150 feet high (12 stories) will be applied to all buildings exceeding 100 feet high, or 8 stories.

(3) Fireproof wood may be approved by "other public authorities now having jurisdiction in such matters."

Inquiry both at the Building Department and from Alderman Ware fails to enlighten us as to who has authority other than the Building Department.

Your Committee feels that the proposed amendment seems unconsidered and of doubtful advantage, especially as the fireproof qualities of fireproof wood, as compared with metal covered, have not been clearly demonstrated, nor does it see any advantage in fireproofing the sleepers.

Dear Sir—I respectfully transmit herewith a Quarterly Report of work done by paid and unpaid labor, together with a statement showing the disposition of prisoners for the quarter ended September 30, 1904, to wit:

##### Carpenters' Work.

At Third District Prison—Work done by prison help: Repairing 6 wooden bunks, 5 benches, 2 tables, 1 ice box, 3 chairs and washtubs in laundry.

At Fourth District Prison—Erecting new store-room 17 feet by 12 feet, located in corridor; material used: 136 feet 3 inches by 3 inches spruce, 400 feet 4 inches by 6 inches spruce, 400 feet ¾ inches tongue and grooved yellow pine flooring, 10 pounds nails, 1 lock, 4 butt hinges, 2 dozen screws, putting in two new windows in cells on second tier; glazing: 2 panes, 16 inches by 9 inches.

At Fifth District Prison—Repairing and putting in new sash tape to windows in office and male prison; glazing: 4 panes, 14 inches by 16 inches, and 1 pound of putty.

##### Plumbing and Tinsmithing.

At Second District Prison—By paid labor: Repairing steam leaks, 13 hours' steam-fitter; clearing out gas risers between floors, also repairing brackets; material used: 2 three-quarter-inch black ell, 1 three-quarter-inch by 4-inch black nipples, 1 three-eighth-inch hose cock, 1 dozen lava gas tips, ½ pail cement, 5½ hours' labor; work done by staff: overhauling and putting in good condition fire place; material used: 300 fire-bricks and 2 barrels fire clay.

At Fourth District Prison—By paid labor: Construction of a new lock, 7½ inches by 6 inches by 2½ inches, including three keys furnished for main gate of prison; old lock opened and taken off, gate fitted and striker hole cut out; 6 hours' labor, two men; put in one set of rings and covers for "Duparquet" range No. 3; installing new gas-pipe and putting up brackets in store-room and stairway leading from court to corridor; material used: 18 feet iron pipe, 5 elbows, 1 tee, 1 wall-flange, 1 brace bracket, 1 double arm, hooks and screws, 7 hours' labor (two men). Putting in new closet cistern and repairing valve and ball cock; material used: 1 new oak tank, 2 washers, 2¾ hours' labor; by unpaid labor: put in two new ½-inch brass faucets on stationary tubs in kitchen, one ¾-inch brass faucet on sink in female prison.

At Fifth District Prison—By paid labor: Repairing faucet spindle from basin waste and repairing faucet in male prison; repairing rim of water closet in ten-day house, repairing 1 faucet in laundry, 2 faucets in female prison cell Nos. 7 and 9, and clearing obstruction from sink waste to basin; material used: 8 washers, lampwick, 6½ hours' labor; opening lock of cell No. 8, female prison.

Put in Mott's Defiance range No. 9 new iron grate and one top cross piece.

##### Painters' Work.

At Second District Prison—Retouching all the necessary parts of prison; material used: 50 pounds white lead, 10 gallons raw oil, 10 gallons turpentine, 20 pounds chrome green, 2 pound paint brushes and 3 sash tools.

At Third District Prison—Renovating the interior of prison and giving same two coats of paint, also varnishing all the woodwork and office furniture; material used: 100 pounds white lead, 10 gallons raw oil, 5 gallons turpentine, 10 pounds chrome green, 2 pounds drop black in oil, 2 gallons liquid dryers, 1 gallon inside varnish and 5 gallons asphaltum varnish.

At Fourth District Prison—Painting and retouching all the necessary parts of prison, to wit: Painted roof of vegetable house, prison kitchen, storeroom, also whitewashed walls in rear yard of prison, 21 feet high; material used: 100 pounds white lead, 5 gallons raw oil, 5 gallons turpentine, ½ gallon liquid dryer, 2 pounds chrome green, ½ barrel finishing lime, 3 pounds ultramarine blue and 5 pounds kalsomine glue.

At Fifth District Prison—Renovating and painting 24 cells, male prison, also cell gates to same; painting all the iron work, such as railings, stairs and steam-pipes; painting 16 cells in female prison, also gates, railing and iron stairs; painting Matron's room and Chapel and three cells thereat, varnishing all the woodwork; painted office with 3 foot dado, varnishing all the woodwork and office furniture; painted two ten-day houses with 6 foot dado; gilding radiators in Matron's room and office; material used: 300 pounds white lead, 15 gallons raw oil, 15 gallons turpentine, 2 gallons liquid dryer, 10 pounds chrome green, 5 pounds burnt umber, 10 pounds yellow ochre, 5 pounds Venetian red, 10 pounds Prince's Metallic, 1 gallon inside varnish, 3 5-inch flat wall brushes, 2 sash tools, 2 fitchers and 5 pounds putty.

The prisons were cleansed of roaches, waterbugs, etc., by the services rendered of the P. M. Frank Disinfectant Company.

The usual amount of cleaning, cooking, laundrying and other general work done in all the prisons by unpaid prison help.

Hon. FRANCIS J. LANTRY, Commissioner of Correction:

Sir—I herewith most respectfully submit the report of the principal work performed and improvements carried out in connection with this institution during the quarter ending September 30, 1904.

The two new roads lately built leading respectively from the lower part of Central avenue and from the stable to the middle dock, have been top-covered with the stone broken at the stone shed, and rolled, and the road extending from Pavilion 3 to the south dock renewed and similarly treated, so that the principal thoroughfares on the island are now in sound and durable condition.

During the past quarter the workmen of the Dock Department have executed the necessary repairs at the middle and south docks, the timbers on the latter especially having greatly needed renewal and strengthening.

The new boat-house, 24 feet by 18 feet by 10 feet, has been built at the south dock, for the better security of the Department boats, and all boats have been transferred thereto from the north end of the island. At the same time the float used in connection with the naphtha launch and rowboats has been transferred to the south dock, and a more safe and convenient mooring place provided for the launch. The Fairbank's platform scale, for the weighing of coal and ice, has also been removed from the north to the middle dock.

The subway for the conveyance of steam for the heating of the different buildings has been rebuilt to the extent of 1,200 feet.

Among other improvements may be mentioned the replastering and the repair of stoops at two of the officers' dwellings on the hill, and likewise the addition of a new stoop to one of the pavilions at the south end of the island.

All the labor referred to, with the exception of the special work of the Dock Department men, has been performed by prisoners, who have also taken part in the various routine duties usual on this island. Among these may be mentioned the burying of the dead at City Cemetery, work on the farm, for the raising of corn, potatoes, onions, cabbage, etc., building repairs, roadmaking, unloading of coal and ice, keeping grounds in order, stone breaking, etc.

The female prisoners capable of work have been employed in the weekly scrubbing out of the different buildings, and likewise in the laundry, the number of pieces washed being given among the accompanying tables.

The boys at the Reformatory, between school hours, have been engaged chiefly in work on the farm, hauling stone to and from the stone shed, and in loading and unloading freight.

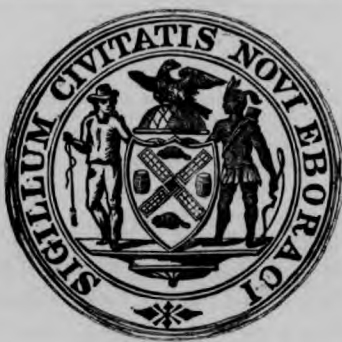

##### GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.
