REPORT OF TRANSACTIONS FEBRUARY 3 TO 9, 1908.

Communications Received.

From the Board of Aldermen—City Clerk transmits certified copy of a resolution which reads as follows:

Whereas, Jurisdiction over the Raymond Street Jail, in the Borough of Brooklyn, has been transferred from the hands of the Sheriff of Kings County to those of the Commissioner of Correction; and

Whereas, Persons who desire to visit inmates of this institution are now required to go to the office of the Commissioner of Correction in the Borough of Manhattan, to obtain the necessary passes, thereby entailing a loss of time, and the expense of several carfares, which many of them can ill afford; therefore

Resolved, That Hon. John V. Coggey, Commissioner of Correction, be and he is hereby respectfully requested to consider the establishment of a branch office for the work of his Department in the Borough of Brooklyn, or devise some way whereby the many who may wish to visit this or other institutions in his charge may be less inconvenienced than they now are.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen February 4, 1908, a majority of all the members elected voting in favor thereof.

MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York, Held at the Commission's Offices, No. 299 Broadway, on Wednesday, February 19, 1908, at 10 a. m.
