#### DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH.

### REPORT FOR WEEK ENDING OCTOBER 17, 1914.

#### LOOK TO YOUR ROOF GUTTERS—DON'T BLAME THE PARK LAKES.

During August of this year numerous complaints reached the Department concerning the prevalence of mosquitos, especially on the upper west side of Manhattan. Many of the complaints specifically charged the lakes in Central Park with being

responsible for the breeding of these annoying visitors.

Through the co-operation of Professor C. E. A. Winslow, of the American Museum of Natural History, Dr. Donald B. Armstrong, of the Bureau of Public Health and Hygiene of the A. I. C. P., and the Sanitary Bureau of this department, an extensive investigation was undertaken in order to discover the justification for the complaints, the breeding places of the mosquitoes and to suggest remedies. This investigation showed that the mosquitoes were indeed present in very large numbers, not only on the upper west side of Manhattan, but throughout the city. Contrary, however, to the popular impression, they did not come from Central Park except in a very small degree. An insignificant breeding place was found in some marshy land near the north meadow.

Almost invariably the investigation disclosed mosquito breeding places on or near the premises from which the complaints originated. Among the sources thus discovered, obstructed gutters and leaders conducting rain water from the roofs of houses, were uncommonly frequent. Owing to frequent rains at that time, these obstructions resulted in the collection of small pools of water which were almost immediately utilized by mosquitoes for breeding places.

To those familiar with anti-mosquito work in this city, the result of this investigation was not at all surprising. It should be a lesson to the people of this city to look first to their own premises before laying the blame on outside sources.

#### THE HIGH COST OF DYING.

It has come to our attention that certain undertakers in the city of New York have been charging the relatives of the deceased exorbitant prices for transcripts of certificates of death used to collect insurance money. In a recent case an undertaker charged the son of the deceased \$3.50 for four transcripts for which the Department of Health charged only \$1.25. This represents an extortion amounting to almost 200 per cent. on the cost price. We have also learned that some undertakers charge relatives of the deceased a fixed price of \$1.00 for a burial permit, issued to them free of charge by the Department of Health.

If artificially increasing the cost of dying could possibly decrease the number of deaths, these uncalled-for additions to the undertaker's bill could be viewed with complacency. As it is, the Department of Health believes that the public should know the facts here set forth.

#### ENFORCING THE NEW MILK REGULATIONS.

Country Milk Inspection.

During the month of September eighty dairies were excluded from business in this city for failure to comply with the minimum requirements for the production of Grade

Twenty dairies, hitherto excluded, were allowed to resume shipments after reinspection had shown improved conditions; six creameries were excluded from shipment, owing either to insanitary conditions or to the acceptance of excluded milk. Three of these were subsequently allowed to resume after compliance with departmental regulations.

Shipments from four creameries were ordered degraded from Grade B to Grade C, as the bacterial content of milk shipped from two of these creameries was found to be continually excessive, and the other two creameries were degraded owing to their improper pasteurising apparatus. Upon subsequent inspection one of these creameries was later regraded.

Shipments from one creamery were ordered degraded from Grade A to Grade B because of the continued excessive bacterial content and because the dairies supplying this creamery would not conform to the requirements for Grade A.

Shipments from five creameries were ordered excluded on account of the fact that the pasteurizing apparatus was inadequate and that the milk was not held for a

sufficient period of time. This milk was subsequently shipped to the City and pasteurized in the City at a plant approved by the Department.

Samples for bacterial examination were taken at forty-four pasteurizing plants during this month. Their examination showed that the process of pasteurization was conducted in a very satisfactory manner, and that in all but nine of the pasteurizing plants the regulations were being closely followed. In these nine the bacterial content of raw milk, before pasteurization, was found to be excessive. Notices were forwarded to the dealers operating these creameries and reinspections have been ordered.

Eleven new pasteurizing plants were approved during the month and permits recommended granted. Two permits to sell Grade A milk were also recommended

#### City Pasteurizing Plants.

The close of this month marked the completion of a large up-to-date pasteurizing plant with a capacity for pasteurizing two thousand forty-quart cans daily, and representing an investment of several hundred thousand dollars.

City Milk Inspection.

During the month of September 131 inspections were made at the receiving platforms and ferries and in spite of the very warm days in September the temperature of the milk received in the City was found to be below 50 degrees F. Only a few cases of mislabeling were found, and examination of empty containers being returned to

the country showed these, on the whole, to be clean.

Nearly 24,000 specimens of milk, as offered for sale in the City, were examined by our inspectors, and of this number only 63 specimens were found to be above the maximum temperature permitted by the Department's regulations. In addition to this 579 samples of milk were taken and upon chemical analysis 99 of these were found to be below the standard.

#### WHO IS THE PERSISTENT OFFENDER?

On December 18, 1911, F. E. Rosebrock and Company, a corporation dealing in bakery supplies at 325 Greenwich Street, Borough of Manhattan, of which Fred Rosebrock was president and a director, was fined \$500 for violation of Section 42 of the Sanitary Code, for offering for sale decomposed cannel eggs.

On November 18, 1912, the same firm was fined \$250 for violation of Section 66a of the Sanitary Code, for using flavoring extracts containing methyl alcohol. About this time the old corporation of F. E. Rosebrock and Company discontinued business at 325 Greenwich Street, and a new corporation, incorporated under the laws of New Jersey, was formed under the name of the Fred. E. Rosebrock Company. Fred E. Rosebrock was president and a director of this company which conducted a business in bakers' supplies at 360 Washington Street. On November 17, 1913, this firm was fined \$500 for violation of Section 42 for offering for sale putrid and decomposed eggs.

In August of this year the Fred E. Rosebrock Company discontinued business and a new corporation, known as the Rosebrock Butter and Egg Company, Inc., was formed, incorporated under the laws of New York. Fred E. Rosebrock was President and a Director of the new concern, and the business was conducted at 360 Washington Street. Within the past few days criminal prosecution has been commenced by the Department of Health against this firm for an alleged violation of Section 48a, relating to the breaking-out of eggs and the keeping of canned eggs without a permit. Who is the persistent offender?

### FINES DO NOT DETER CORPORATIONS.

In its work to protect the public against unwholesome food, the Department is frequently hampered by the fact that successful prosecution of corporations can result only in fines. These, apparently, have but little deterrent effect, the officers of the corporations and others responsible for the carrying on of the business, evidently feeling that the occasional payment of even a large fine only slightly reduces the enormous profit to be made by corrupt and illegal business dealings. The Department is determined to continue its campaign against the dealers in dirty and unwholesome is determined to continue its campaign against the dealers in dirty and unwholesome foods and will endeavor to prosecute the persons responsible for these illegal practices and ask for the imposition of jail sentences.

TIME TO CHECK THE PATENT MEDICINE FAKER According to an interesting article just published by the United States Public Health Service, there has been a notable increase in the consumption of patent medicines in the United States in the last few decades. It appears that while the increase in population in the United States from 1880 to 1910 was approximately 83.3 per cent., the increase in the value of patent medicines and related products was 740.5 per cent. In other words, the population of the United States was less than doubled, the value of the medicines manufactured and consumed was increased ninefold.

The mania, for such it almost seems to be, of the American public to dose themselves with drugs of all kinds, concerning which they know little or nothing, has frequently been commented on. In the article above referred to, the point is well made that all important or active medicaments must, of necessity, have harmful influences when taken indiscriminately or for a continued length of time. "It may be accepted as fact that whenever the activity [of a medicine] is sufficient to produce a decided therapeutic effect in disease it is also sufficient to produce a deleterious effect when improperly used, either as to time or quantity."

In England, the patent medicine evil has become so pronounced that in June of last year a select committee of the House of Commons was appointed to consider and inquire into the question of the sale of patent and proprietary preparations and appli-

quire into the question of the sale of patent and proprietary preparations and appliances, and advertisements relating thereto, and to report on what amendments, if any, in the law, were necessary or desirable. The extent of the consumption of patent medicines in the United Kingdom may be estimated from the statement that more than two million pounds sterling is expended yearly in advertising matter.

It is interesting to note that the Committee findings regarding so-called "medicated wines" agree closely with the report recently made by the United States Commissioner of Internal Revenue and published in our Weekly Bulletin of August 22nd, 1914. The English Committee found that in many cases these wines contained a large amount of alcohol, often twenty per cent., and in one instance as much as twenty-three per cent. "Inasmuch as these wines are largely consumed by women, many of whom profess themselves as strictly temperate persons, it must come as a distinct shock to those themselves as strictly temperate persons, it must come as a distinct shock to those who have been taking the recommended doses of some of these widely advertised wines, to learn that they have been consuming daily an amount of alcohol equal to a wineglassful of whiskey." The Committee believes that grave injury is caused to the public by the existing large sales of medicated wines.

The report recommends that the duty of controlling the sale and advertisement of proprietary medicines in the United Kingdom be administered by the Local Government Board until a Ministry of Public Health is created, when the administration should be transferred to that department; that there be furnished to the government department an exact and complete statement of the ingredients and their proportions in these remedies, and a statement of the alcoholic strength of medicated wines and a specimen of every appliance for the cure of ailments, other than recognized surgical instruments; that a special court or commission be constituted with power to permit or prohibit in the public interest or on the ground of non-compliance with the law, the sale and advertisement of any patent, secret or proprietary remedy or appliances. It is further recommended that the sale and advertisement should be prevented by law of remedies purported to cure certain diseases and ailments, including consumption, cancer, lues, fits, deafness, rupture, other diseases, etc.

#### TEACHABLENESS OF THE CONSUMPTIVE PATIENT.

Some years ago a most discouraging report published in the Johns Hopkins Hospital Bulletin, concluded that a considerable majority of the tuberculosis patients seen by the tuberculosis nurses in Baltimore could not be taught either hygiene or prophylaxis and that the practical outcome of home visiting supervision was not encouraging.

In the October number of the American Journal of Nursing an interesting resume of the work of the visiting nurses of the Gouverneur Clinic is given by Winifred W. Allen and Elizabeth McConnell. The basis of the report were the patients who attended the clinic during the year 1912 and who had been under clinic care or nursing supervision for six months or more. Despite difference in race, religion and language, the overwhelming majority of the patients proved to be teachable in the essentials of personal hygiene and prophylaxis and most of those whom the clinics trained for six months or more, both learn and practice what is taught them.

The conclusion is drawn, therefore, "that no class can be looked upon as wholly unteachable and that time and persistence yield a surprising percentage of good results even with the least promising cases."

This is distinctly encouraging for all who are engaged in public health education and holds out promise for excellent results.

#### REVISION OF THE SANITARY CODE.

A letter in the following terms has been addressed by the Commissioner of Health to each member of the Advisory Council and of the Medical Advisory Board:

"A general revision of the Sanitary Code has been undertaken, with the purpose of bringing the Code into conformity with the great body of municipal ordinances recently remodeled by the Codification Committee of the Board of

"This occasion affords an opportunity for improving the Code by the redrafting of existing sections, by the omission of superfluous contents, and by the inclusion of desirable new matter.

"A copy of the existing Code will be forwarded to each advisory member, and the co-operation of all is solicited. The revised Code should represent a consensus of expert opinion on the best measures for the protection and improvement of the City's health."

#### WORK OF THE BUREAU OF INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

A new edition of the Hand Book of the Bureau of Infectious Diseases has just come from the press, and is now ready for distribution. Its scope has been considerably widened and the booklet now embraces a description of the varied activities of the Bureau of Infectious Diseases in all its details. It is at one and the same time a manual of instruction for employees of the Bureau, and a book of information to students of this brand of public health work.
