

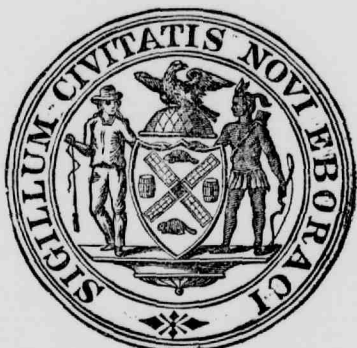

CITY OF NEW YORK—DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS,  
Nos. 49 AND 51 CHAMBERS STREET.

The President reports as follows:

Pursuant to the request from some of the residents in the vicinity of Crotona Park, directions have been given that the dam at the south end of Indian Pond should be repaired, in order to make a place for skating.

The Board will remember that the ordinance of this Department, providing that certain vehicles should carry lights in Central Park at night, was suspended pending action by the Board of Aldermen upon a similar resolution. The Board of Aldermen, on December 1, 1891, adopted an ordinance, of which a copy is laid before the Board, and it will be in order to instruct the President as to whether the suspended ordinance should be revived, in case such ordinance is approved by the Mayor.

The apprehended inconvenience arising from the fact that carriages were not required to carry lights in the streets, and might, therefore, be prevented from entering the park at all, is now done away with.

A communication from Messrs. Morris & Steele, concerning the drainage of the Tibbitt's Brook District, is laid before the Board. The Commissioner of Street Improvements has been invited to meet us as well as the writers of the letter, Messrs. Morris & Steele, in order that the matter may be fully discussed at this meeting.

In order to bring about greater discipline and more efficient service in the mounted squad, Roundsman McKenna has been detailed in command of it in place of Roundsman Egan, subject to the approval of the Board.

A request from Messrs. Charles Buek & Co. for leave to plant trees at Riverside Park and Seventy-eighth street, and a report of the Superintendent thereon is laid before the Board. Upon the general subject of tree-planting I report that it will be necessary to commence to plant young trees on the westerly side of the park from One Hundred and Tenth street down to Fifty-ninth street. For several years the Department has mentioned this work in communications presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and it is time that a commencement was made. I have therefore directed the Superintendent to look around and secure trees for that purpose, which can be purchased in case the Board so direct after the first of the year. Meanwhile time will be saved.

On motion, at 12.40 P.M., the Board went into Executive Session.

Resolved, That the design for an iron fence or railing, this day submitted, be approved and substituted for the plan approved on July 15, 1891, for an inclosing wall around Mount Morris Park; that the same be forwarded to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for approval, with the request that the Comptroller be authorized and directed to issue bonds to the amount of eighteen thousand two hundred and fifty dollars, as provided by chapter 575 of the Laws of 1887, to be used for the purpose of erecting the railing as designed to inclose the said park with the exception of the entrances.

Resolved, That the resolution adopted by this Board on July 22, 1891, requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the expenditure of six thousand dollars from the amount raised for a foundation wall around Mount Morris Park, for the purpose of constructing the super-

structure to be placed on said foundation, in accordance with a plan adopted July 15, 1891, be so amended as to refer to the design this day approved, instead of the said plan therein mentioned.

Which were adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—Commissioners Gallup, Straus, Dana, Tappen—4.

On motion of Commissioner Tappen, it was ordered that no ale, beer or alcoholic drinks be sold under the license of Daniel Sullivan for selling refreshments in the skate building at Van Cortlandt Lake.

On motion of Commissioner Tappen, the matter of the license for conducting the Casino restaurant in the Central Park was referred to Commissioners Gallup and Dana for consideration and report.

On motion, at 1.25 P.M., the Executive Session arose and the Board adjourned to Wednesday, 16th instant, at 10 o'clock A.M.
