

SIR—In compliance with the requirements of section 110 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, as amended by chapter 516 of the Laws of 1884, we herewith transmit the results of our examination of the Chamberlain's and Comptroller's offices for the fourth quarter of 1893, and submit statement as follows :

The balance in the City Treasury, Sinking Funds and Miscellaneous Accounts on December 30, 1893, was \$6,651,497.19, which agrees with the balances as stated in the Chamberlain's books, and also with the certificates of the officers of the several depository banks of concurrent date. The 847 deaths represent a death-rate of 22.73 against 22.37 for the previous week, and 29.32 for the corresponding week of 1893. Contagious and infectious diseases show a slight decrease, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever and small-pox being respectively 164, 286, 123, 10 and 19, against 155, 298, 151, 5 and 21 for the previous week, a total of 602 against 630. The increase of diphtheria was mainly in the Seventh, Tenth, Nineteenth and Twentieth Wards, and the decrease in the Sixth, Twelfth and Twenty-second Wards. The increase of measles was most marked in the Ninth, Eighteenth and Twenty-fourth Wards, and the decrease in the Eighth, Six-teenth, Nineteenth and Twenty-third Wards. The increase of scarlet fever was chiefly in the Eighteenth Ward, and the decrease in the Twelfth Ward. Five of the 10 cases of typhoid fever were above Fortieth street, and 3 below Fourteenth street. Eight of the 19 cases of small-pox were above Fortieth street, and 8 of the remaining 11 were below Fourteenth street, east of Broad-way, and mostly below Rivington street. By order of the Board.


