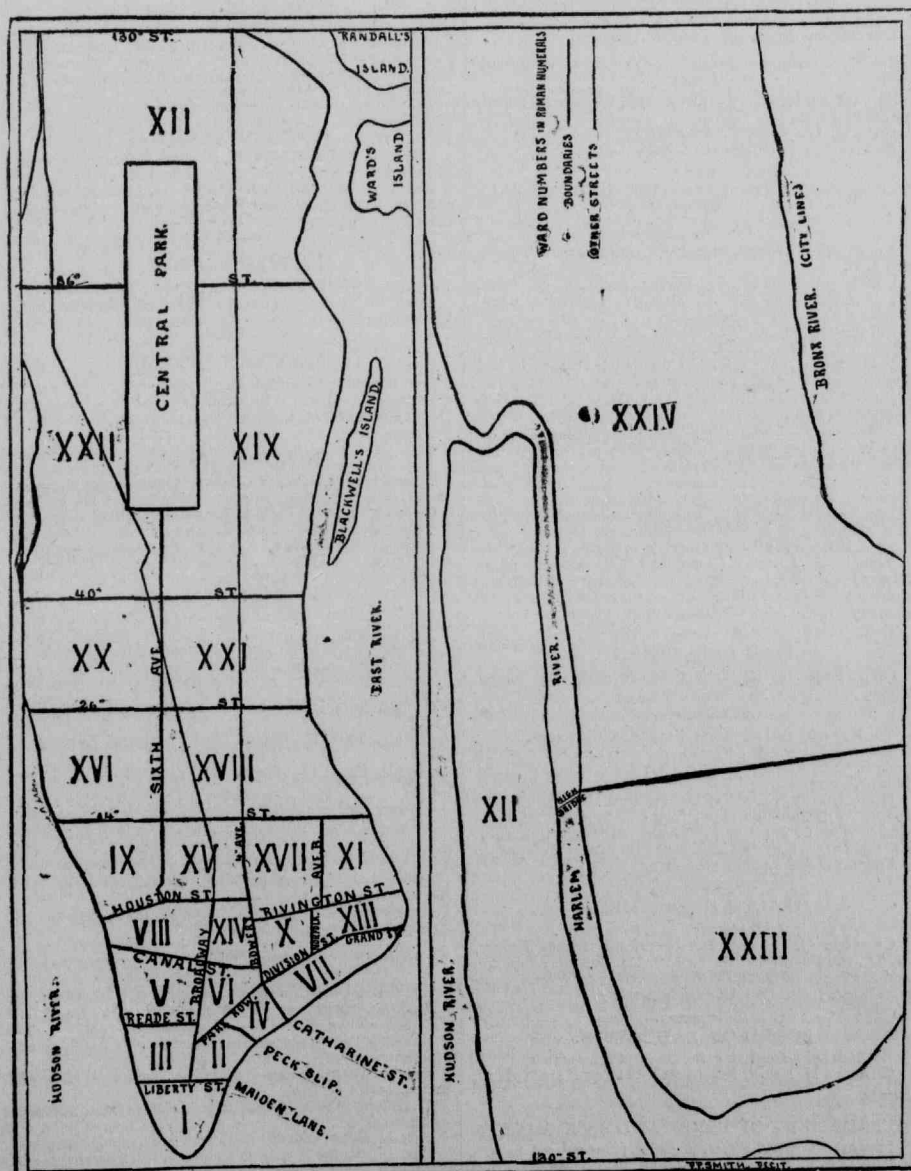

The 847 deaths represent a death-rate of 22.73 against 22.37 for the previous week, and 20.32 for the corresponding week of 1893.

Contagious and infectious diseases show a slight decrease, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever and small-pox being respectively 164, 286, 123, 10 and 19, against 155, 298, 151, 5 and 21 for the previous week, a total of 602 against 630. The increase of diphtheria was mainly in the Seventh, Tenth, Nineteenth and Twentieth Wards, and the decrease in the Sixth, Twelfth and Twenty-second Wards. The increase of measles was most marked in the Ninth, Eighteenth and Twenty-fourth Wards, and the decrease in the Eighth, Sixteenth, Nineteenth and Twenty-third Wards. The increase of scarlet fever was chiefly in the Eighteenth Ward, and the decrease in the Twelfth Ward. Five of the 10 cases of typhoid fever were above Fortieth street, and 3 below Fourteenth street. Eight of the 19 cases of small-pox were above Fortieth street, and 8 of the remaining 11 were below Fourteenth street, east of Broadway, and mostly below Rivington street.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the City, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.
