### BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT—CITY OF NEW YORK,  
MAYOR'S OFFICE, CITY HALL,  
SATURDAY, December 30, 1893—10 o'clock A. M.

The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment.

Present—Thomas F. Gilroy, the Mayor; Theodore W. Myers, the Comptroller; George B. McClellan, the President of the Board of Aldermen; Edward P. Barker, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments; William H. Clark, the Counsel to the Corporation.

The minutes of the meetings held December 26 and 28, 1893, were read and approved.

The Mayor presented the following:

The People of the State of New York to Thomas F. Gilroy, Mayor of the City of New York; Theodore W. Myers, Comptroller of the City of New York; George B. McClellan, President of the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York, and Edward P. Barker, President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, constituting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Whereas, Jacob Lorillard, Vernon H. Brown and David J. King, as Commissioners under chapters 47 of the Laws of 1885, 573 of the Laws of 1883 and 249 of the Laws of 1890, pursuant to the respective provisions of the said acts, have heretofore and since the 1st day of August, 1893, duly made requisition upon the said Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the amounts required for the work of said Commission for the years 1893 and 1894, containing the items hereinafter specified, and

Whereas, You, constituting the said Board of Estimate and Apportionment, have omitted to act upon such requisitions or to allow the sums for which requisition was so made, or to include the same in the Final Estimate of such Board for the next ensuing financial year, or to provide the same by the issue of bonds pursuant to chapter 487 of the Laws of 1885;

Now, therefore, We do command you and each of you, upon receipt of this writ, forthwith to convene as such Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and to act upon the requisitions of the said Commissioners now before the said Board for the years of 1893 and 1894, and to allow and include in the Final Estimate of such Board for the next ensuing financial year, or to provide by the issue of bonds, pursuant to chapter 487 of the Laws of 1885, the following amounts called for in such requisitions of said Commissioners, namely:

For the year 1893—For Engineering Expenses, the sum of twenty-six hundred dollars.

For the year 1894—For Salaries, Clerk Hire, Wages, Rent, Incidental Expenses, Engineering Expenses and Improvement of Lands, in the aggregate the sum of sixty-eight thousand and sixty dollars.

Witness, Hon. Charles H. Truax, one of the Justices of the Supreme Court, at the Court-house in the City of New York, this 28th day of December, 1893.

Whereupon the Comptroller offered the following:

Resolved, That, in pursuance of the provisions of chapter 487 of the Laws of 1885, chapter 573 of the Laws of 1888, and chapter 249 of the Laws of 1890, and in pursuance of the terms of a peremptory writ of mandamus, issuing from the Supreme Court, under date of December 28, 1893, the Comptroller be and hereby is authorized and directed to issue Consolidated Stock of the City of New York, as provided by section 132 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, payable from taxation, to the amount of seventy thousand six hundred and sixty dollars (\$70,660), to meet the expenses of the Harlem River Bridge Commission, of which amount two thousand six hundred dollars (\$2,600) is appropriated for engineering expenses incurred during the year 1893, and sixty-eight thousand and sixty dollars (\$68,060) for salaries, clerk hire, wages, rent, incidental expenses, engineering expenses and improvement of lands, to be incurred during the year 1894 in the execution of the provisions of the acts aforesaid, and as specified in the requisition of said Commission of August 31, 1893—which bonds shall bear such rate of interest as the Comptroller may determine, not exceeding three per cent. per annum.

GENTLEMEN—I have the honor to ask that the sum of eighteen hundred and twenty-eight dollars (\$1,828) be appropriated for the purpose of paying Laborers Joseph A. Moore and John H. Wisemann from October 1, 1893, to December 31, 1894, inclusive.

These men were regularly appointed by me under section 177, Military Code, and no appropriation has been made to pay for their services, as the regular requisition for the pay of Army employees was submitted to your Board prior to their appointment.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, New York City:

SIRS—At a meeting of the Board of Health of the Health Department held December 27, it was

Resolved, That for the proper care and the prevention of contagious diseases in this city it is necessary to continue in the service of this Board the Medical Inspectors, Vaccinators and Disinfectors whose terms of service expire December 31, and that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and is hereby respectfully requested to appropriate, pursuant to chapter 535, Laws of 1893, the sum of six thousand five hundred dollars to pay the salaries of twenty-five Medical Inspectors and Vaccinators for two months from January 1, 1894, at one hundred dollars per month, and the salaries of ten Disinfectors for three months from January 1, 1894, at fifty dollars per month.

NOTE.—Chapter 178 of the Laws of 1889 provides that an annual sum shall, until other provision may be hereafter made by law, be set apart out of the surplus income, revenues and accumulations of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt, sufficient, with the accumulation of interest thereon, to meet and discharge the above-mentioned Stocks and Bonds, instead of raising the amount by taxation annually for that purpose, as provided by section 192 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882.

At a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, held December 4, 1893, the following preamble and resolutions were adopted:

Whereas, Stocks and bonds of the City of New York, amounting to the sum of two million six hundred and thirty thousand dollars (\$2,630,000), forming a portion of the City Debt, payable by the laws authorizing their issue from taxation, of which sum the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hold six hundred thousand dollars (\$600,000), become due and payable in the next following

calendar year, 1894, and stocks and bonds of the City and County of New York, amounting to the sum of one million four hundred and ninety-four thousand dollars (\$1,494,000), payable from the Sinking Fund, as provided by section 192 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, as amended by chapter 178 of the Laws of 1889, of which sum the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hold twelve thousand dollars (\$12,000), become due and payable in the next following calendar year, 1894, as stated in the Comptroller's Report, presented this day, of the condition of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt; and

Whereas, It appears also by said report that the accumulations of said Sinking Fund for the year 1894 are sufficient to pay and redeem that portion of the City Debt so payable from taxation and from the Sinking Fund, without in any way impairing the preferred claims on said Fund, as prescribed in sections 175 and 192 of the Consolidation Act of 1882 and other provisions of law; and



Whereas, The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deem it to be for the best interests of the City that that portion of the City debt, payable originally by law from taxation, should be paid and redeemed by said Sinking Fund; and

Whereas, The accumulations in the Sinking Fund will be sufficient to meet the payment of all bonds and stocks payable from the Sinking Fund falling due in the next calendar year, 1894;

Resolved, That, as provided by section 191 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund do hereby certify to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the accumulations in the Sinking Fund will be sufficient to meet the payment of certain stocks and bonds payable in the year 1894 from the Sinking Fund, as provided by section 192 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, as amended by chapter 178 of the Laws of 1886, said stocks and bonds amounting to one million four hundred and ninety-four thousand dollars (\$1,494,000), of which sum twelve thousand dollars (\$12,000) is held by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund; and that certain stocks and bonds of the City of New York, constituting a portion of the city debt, which, by the laws authorizing their issue, were made payable from taxation, amounting to the sum of two million six hundred and thirty thousand dollars (\$2,630,000), become due and payable in the next calendar year, to wit, 1894, of which sum the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hold six hundred thousand dollars (\$600,000); that the amount of stocks and bonds now outstanding, which constitute a preferred charge against the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt, as provided by section 175 of the Consolidation Act of 1882, is four million two hundred and sixty-seven thousand two hundred dollars (\$4,267,200), no portion of which becomes due in the year 1894; that the amount of stocks and bonds and cash in said Sinking Fund on the 30th of November, 1893, was sixty-four million fifty-eight thousand nine hundred and forty-eight dollars and seventy-nine cents (\$64,058,948.79); that the amount of the estimated revenues of said Sinking Fund for the next calendar year is six million eight hundred and thirty thousand dollars (\$6,830,000), and that said portion of the city debt payable from taxation and becoming due in said year 1894 can be paid and redeemed by said Sinking Fund without in any way impairing the preferred claims thereon, as prescribed by section 175 of the Consolidation Act of 1882.

## HEALTH DEPARTMENT.

Law expenses, Marshal's fees (section 595 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882), two thousand dollars (\$2,000), being the same as the amount allowed in the final estimate for 1893, and fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500) more than the amount allowed in the provisional estimate for 1894. Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, on the 30th day of October, 1893, adopted the Provisional Estimate for the year eighteen hundred and ninety-four (1894), and have considered the objections to and rectifications of said estimate, made by the Board of Aldermen on November 13, 1893, of the amounts required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of the City and County of New York, in each Department and branch thereof, and the Board of Education, for the next ensuing financial year, to wit, for the year eighteen hundred and ninety-four (1894), in which estimate is included such sum as is necessary for the payment of interest on the bonds of the said city and county which becomes due and payable within said year, which is not otherwise provided for; also such sum as is necessary to be raised by tax to pay the principal of any bonds and stocks which become due and payable during the said year, which is not otherwise provided for; also the amount to be raised by tax annually, which, with the accumulations of interest thereon, will be sufficient to redeem the stocks and bonds issued to provide for the supply of water, pursuant to the provisions of section 11 of article VIII. of the Constitution of the State of New York, as amended in 1884, and also so much as may be necessary to pay the proportion of the State tax required to be paid by the City and County of New York in said year 1894, as provided by section 189 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, which objections to and rectifications of said Provisional Estimate were transmitted by the Clerk of the Board of Aldermen on November 14, 1893, and presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on November 15, 1893; therefore

Resolved, That after such consideration of the said objections to and rectifications of said Provisional Estimate, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment do hereby make this a

## FINAL ESTIMATE

of the amounts required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of the City and County of New York, in each Department and branch thereof, and the Board of Education, for the next ensuing financial year, to wit, for the year eighteen hundred and ninety-four (1894), in which is included such sum as is necessary for the payment of the interest on the bonds of the said city and county and of the annexed territory, which becomes due and payable within said year, and also such sum as is necessary to be raised by tax to pay the principal of any bonds and stocks which become due and payable during the said year, not otherwise provided for; also the amount to be raised for the supply of water by tax annually, which with the accumulations of interest thereon, will be sufficient to redeem the stocks and bonds issued as provided by section II of article VIII. of the Constitution of the State of New York, as amended in 1884, and also so much as may be necessary to pay the proportion of the State tax required to be paid by the City and County of New York in said year, as follows:

The 775 deaths represent a death-rate of 21.04 against 19.86 for the previous week, and 20.43 for the corresponding week of 1892.

The increase of 44 deaths was mainly due to an increase of 8 in the deaths from diarrhoeal diseases, of 19 from phthisis, of 6 from heart diseases, of 12 from pneumonia, and of 17 from Bright's disease, partially offset by a decrease of 3 in the deaths from diphtheria, and of 8 from measles.

The deaths from diphtheria were most numerous in the Twelfth and Nineteenth Wards, from measles in the Thirteenth Ward, and from scarlet fever in the Nineteenth Ward.

The Ninth Regiment.

The First Battery of Artillery.

The Ninth Regiment occupies quarters leased by the City, over a stable on Twenty-sixth street, near Eighth avenue, which has been condemned by the Building Department, is shored up by beams, and is unfit and unsafe for such occupancy. Notwithstanding this drawback, the Regiment has maintained a fair degree of efficiency and is entitled to the same consideration at the hands of the Armory Board as the other Regiments of the Brigade. A site for a new armory for this Regiment has been selected on Fourteenth street, and the erection of a suitable building for its use should be begun at once.

The Sixty-ninth Battalion occupies quarters over a market on Third avenue, between Sixth and Seventh streets, which are in very bad repair throughout. This Battalion has recently, by order of the Commander-in-chief, been reduced to five companies from a Regiment of ten companies, but it is intended to restore it at once to a regimental organization, and active steps are being taken to form the new companies, three of which are already under way. This Regiment is composed of a class of our citizens from which large enlistments may reasonably be expected, and it is my opinion that it will be restored to a regimental organization before the end of the present drill season.

The First Battery of Artillery occupies leased quarters in West Forty-fourth street, which are inadequate and unsuitable, and it should be provided with proper accommodations without delay. The Battery is in excellent order and is noted for its efficiency and drill.

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY  
ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT  
act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889),  
which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in  
the city, described in any grant of land under water,  
from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing  
covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to  
pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets  
shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement,  
the Common Council may, by ordinance, require  
the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and  
the expense thereof to be assessed on the property

discharge such owner from any and every covenant and

such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or  
avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of  
the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners  
of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of  
the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such  
lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in  
writing, specifying the ward number and street number  
of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and  
assigns, to be released from the obligation of such  
covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be  
thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and  
thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns  
shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to  
pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot  
in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable  
to assessment accordingly.

When notice, as above described, is given to the  
Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or  
lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are  
forever released from all obligation under the grant in

The building to be designed to furnish accommodations for a regiment of infantry.

The front on Fourteenth street to be of rock-faced granite, and the front on Fifteenth street to be of brick with stone trimmings.
