SIR—As required by section 49 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, we make the following

REPORT

of the “operations and action” of this Department for the three months ending September 30, 1894: The books containing the assessment rolls of real and personal estate for the year 1894, duly certified, were delivered to the Board of Aldermen on the first Monday of July, 1894, as required by law.

Upon the delivery of such books to the Board of Aldermen, we advertised in the newspapers and in the CITY RECORD, as required by section 9, chapter 269, of the Laws of 1880, that the assessment roll would be open for inspection for the period of fifteen days in the office of the Clerk of the Board of Aldermen, and during that time there were served upon us several writs of certiorari by corporations and individuals, which were duly transmitted to the Counsel to the Corporation for his official action.

Upon the receipt of these books by the Board of Aldermen, the President of that Board made a request upon us in writing to have computed the tax upon the assessed valuations of real and personal property contained in the assessment roll, and, in compliance with such request, we caused such computation of the tax to be performed by the clerical force of the Department, and without additional expense to the City.

Area of assessment: Both sides of One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street, from Vanderbilt avenue, West, to Webster avenue; east side of Webster avenue, from One Hundred and Eighty-fourth to One Hundred and Eighty-seventh street; both sides of Vanderbilt avenue, East, and Vanderbilt avenue, West, from One Hundred and Eighty-third to One Hundred and Eighty-seventh street; both sides of Washington avenue, from Samuel to One Hundred and Eighty-seventh street; both sides of Bassford avenue, from One Hundred and Eighty-second street to Third avenue; both sides of Battgate avenue, from a point about 265 feet south of One Hundred and Eighty-second street to One Hundred and Eighty-seventh street; both sides of Lorillard place, from Third avenue to One Hundred and Eighty-eighth street; both sides of Hoffman street, extending about 300 feet north of Kingsbridge road; both sides of Hoffman street, from a point about 80 feet east of Hoffman street to Lorillard place; both sides of Third avenue, from a point distant about 267 feet south of One Hundred and Eighty-second street to One Hundred and Eighty-seventh street; both sides of One Hundred and Eighty-first street, from Washington to Bathgate avenue; both sides of One Hundred and Eighty-second street, from Washington to Third avenue; both sides of One Hundred and Eighty-third street, from Vanderbilt avenue, East, to Third avenue; both sides of One Hundred and Eighty-fourth and One Hundred and Eighty-fifth streets, from Vanderbilt avenue, East, to Washington avenue; both sides of One Hundred and Eighty-sixth street, from Vanderbilt avenue, East, to Third avenue, and both sides of One Hundred and Eighty-seventh street, from Railroad avenue, East, to Lorillard place.

Second avenue (East Houston street to Twenty-third street), Third avenue (Bowery to Harlem river, Harlem river to One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street), Fourth avenue (Sixth street to Forty-second street), Fifth avenue (Washington place to Fifty-ninth street), Sixth avenue (all), Seventh avenue (Forty-second street to Fifty-ninth street), Eighth avenue (Hudson street to Fifty-ninth street), Lexington avenue (all), Madison avenue (all), Fourteenth street (First avenue to Eighth avenue), Twenty-third street (all), Thirty-fourth street (East river to Tenth avenue), Forty-second street (Second avenue to Ninth avenue), Fifty-ninth street (First avenue to Tenth avenue), One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street (Third avenue to Ninth avenue).
