The Honorable Thomas F. Gilroy, Mayor, etc.:
Sir—As required by section 49 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, we make

the following REPORT

of the "operations and action" of this Department for the three months ending September 30, 1894:

The books containing the assessment rolls of real and personal estate for the year 1894, duly certified, were delivered to the Board of Aldermen on the first Monday of July, 1894, as required

by law.

Upon the delivery of such books to the Board of Aldermen, we advertised in the newspapers and in the CITY RECORD, as required by section 9, chapter 269, of the Laws of 1880, that the assessment roll would be open for inspection for the period of fifteen days in the office of the Clerk of the Board of Aldermen, and during that time there were served upon us several writs of certiorari by corporations and individuals, which were duly transmitted to the Counsel to the Corporation for his official action.

Upon the receipt of these books by the Board of Aldermen, the President of that Board made a request upon us in writing to have computed the tax upon the assessed valuations of real and personal property contained in the assessment roll, and, in compliance with such request, we caused such computation of the tax to be performed by the clerical force of the Department, and without additional expense to the City.

For such purpose the books containing such assessment roll were received from the Board of Aldermen on the 30th day of August, 1894, and returned to said Board, with the computation of the tax completed, on the 28th of September, 1894.
