DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

At an adjourned meeting of the Board of Docks held Friday, June 21, 1901, at 2 o'clock P. M. Present—The full Board.

The minutes of the meeting held June 14, 1901, were approved.

The following communications were referred to the Treasurer:

From the New York and Cuba Mail Steamship Company—Requesting a lease of the pier to be constructed on the site of the present Pier, old 15, East river.

Hacker-Jones-Jewell Milling Company—Requesting permission to use and occupy, when completed, a portion of the bulkhead at the foot of Pike street, East river.

The following permits were granted, to continue during the pleasure of the Board:

M. Goodwin, to maintain a floating damping-board for loading cellar dirt on scows at the bulkhead between Eighteenth and Nineteenth streets, North river, compensation therefor to be fixed by the Treasurer.

Citizens' Steamboat Company, to place a tally-house, 6 by 8 feet, on Pier, old 56½, North river.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief, and to be kept within existing lines:

Constantine & Neandth, to repair the bulkhead between Sixth and Seventh streets, East river.

Lowell M. Palmer, to repair the piers between Dupont and Freeman streets, Greenpoint, and foot of Ninth and Tenth streets, Borough of Brooklyn.

Brooklyn Union Gas Company, to repair the bulkhead at the foot of Kent avenue and Cross streets, Brooklyn.

Realty Trust, to repair the Pier foot of Bayway avenue, Tottenville, Staten Island.

William S. Van Cleaf, to repair the pier foot of Ferry street, Port Richmond, Staten Island.

The following permits were granted, to continue during the pleasure of the Board, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

Harlem Rowing Club, to maintain its boat-house and float at the foot of Lenox avenue, Harlem river, compensation to be fixed by the Treasurer.

William H. Zeltner, to maintain a platform float and approach on the westerly side of City Island, about 600 feet south of the new bridge approach thereat.

Morse Iron Works and Dry Dock Company, to erect and maintain a temporary shelter for the use of the New York Yacht Club, on the southerly side of the pier foot of Fifty-eighth street, Brooklyn.

The following communications were ordered on file:

From the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund—Approving the plans for the improvement of the water-front between Seventy-seventh and Eighty-first streets, and between Ninety-fourth and Ninety-eighth streets, North river; approving of the purchase of the wharfage rights appurtenant to the northerly half of Pier, old 54, East river, from Michael Halpin; and disapproving of the terms and conditions of the proposed sale of the Hamilton, South, Wall, Fulton and Catharine Ferry franchises, at the upset price of four and one-half per cent. per annum of the gross receipts.

On motion, the matter of the proposed sale of the ferry franchises was tabled, and the Secretary directed to enter in full on the minutes the resolutions as adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, as follows:

"Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of the map or plan submitted by the Department of Docks and Ferries for the improvement of the water-front on the North river, between Seventy-seventh and Eighty-first streets, in the Borough of Manhattan, as adopted by the Board of Docks on May 17, 1901.

"Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of the map or plan submitted by the Department of Docks and Ferries for the improvement of the water-front on the North river, between Ninety-fourth and Ninety-eighth streets, in the Borough of Manhattan, as adopted by the Board of Docks on May 24, 1901.

"Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of the purchase by the Board of Docks, from Michael Halpin, of wharfage rights, etc., appertaining to the northerly half of Pier, old 54, East river, Borough of Manhattan, for the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000), as described in an agreement entered into by the Board of Docks with said Michael Halpin, dated the 12th day of December, 1900.

"Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund decline to approve of the terms and conditions of the sale of the franchises of the Fulton, Wall, Catharine, South and Hamilton Avenue Ferries, as transmitted by the Department of Docks and Ferries under date of June 4, 1901, on the ground that the upset price fixed thereon is less than the rental which could be

obtained for the wharf property of the City if leased for other than ferry purposes, and that if a sale should be made on the terms proposed not only would the City receive nothing for the franchises for operating the ferries but would in effect be subsidizing the ferry companies to the extent of the difference between such upset price and the fair market rental of said wharf property; and be it furthermore

"Resolved, That in returning this advertisement of sale unapproved to the Department of Docks and Ferries the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund suggest that new terms and conditions be considered by the Board of Docks on one of the three following bases:

- (1) An upset price of 5% per cent.
- (2) An upset price of forty thousand (two hundred and ten dollars; any competitive bids being made by increasing such amount instead of by percentages of gross receipts; and
- (3) An upset price of one dollar for the franchise privileges, the rental for the wharf property being charged separately at forty thousand two hundred and ten dollars (\$40,210)."

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the contract opened May 31, 1901, for building a new pier at the foot of West Ninety-sixth street, North river, under Contract No. 706, be and hereby is awarded to Henry L. Spindler, he being the lowest bidder, subject to the approval of The American Bonding and Trust Company of Baltimore City and the National Surety Company as sureties, by the Comptroller.

From the Comptroller—Approving sureties on Contract No. 705.

From the Corporation Counsel:

1st. Approving form of Contract No. 709.

2d. Approving form of lease of Pier, new 36, North river, to William P. Clyde & Co.

Commissioners authorized to execute same.

3d. Advising that the Department of Docks and Ferries has no jurisdiction over property within park limits.

From the Commissioners of the Land Office—Transmitting copy of application made by Edmund C. Strong and others for a grant of land under water at Mill Creek, Jamaica Bay, Borough of Brooklyn.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Secretary be and hereby is directed to notify the Commissioners of the Land Office that this Department has examined into the application of Edmund C. Strong, John Keeley, Jr., and Roderick Green for a grant of land under water at Mill Creek, in the Thirty-second Ward of the Borough of Brooklyn, dated May 7, 1901, and finds that the granting of same will conflict with the rights of the City under the provisions of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897, and will be otherwise injurious to the public interests of The City of New York, and that therefore this Board protests against the granting of said applications.

From the Maritime Association of the Port of New York—Commending the action of the Department in transferring the Sound Line Steamers from the North to the East river.

From John B. McDonald, contractor—Stating that he is about to commence the construction of the Rapid Transit Railroad on Lenox avenue, One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, Third avenue and Westchester avenue, from a point 100 feet north of the centre line of One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street and Lenox avenue to the westerly building line of Brook avenue.

From the John Simmons Company—Requesting permission to extend their eighty feet of bulkhead between Jackson and Gouverneur slips, East river, out to the new pierhead-line. Secretary directed to state that before permit will be granted an agreement must be filed that in the event of the City requiring the premises for the improvement of the water-front no additional item of value shall be claimed beyond the actual cost of such improvement.

From the Central Vermont Railway Company—Requesting an extension of time in which to vacate Pier, old 36, East river, with adjoining land under water and platforms.

On motion, the time in which to vacate said premises was extended to August 1, 1901.

From the Knickerbocker Steamboat Company—Requesting that this Department drive additional mooring piles on the south side of the piers foot of West Fiftieth and West One Hundred and Twenty-ninth streets, and agreeing to pay the cost thereof. Engineer-in-Chief directed to drive the desired piles and to report the cost thereof for collection from said company.

From the Port Chester Transportation Company—Requesting that a gangway be cut in the backing log on the north side of Pier, new 33, East river. Engineer-in-Chief directed to cut the gangway and to report the cost thereof for collection from said company.

From the Treasurer—

1st. Recommending that the action of the Board of June 14, 1901, in fixing the compensation to be charged the Knickerbocker Steamboat Company for the berth occupied by one of its steamers, on the south side of the pier foot of West Fiftieth street, North river, be amended by

Plan 757. Alterations to Buildings, 1901, Manhattan and The Bronx—Petition to allow fireproof shed to be built in rear of building for engine and boilers; same to be constructed of iron and steel joists, with 4-inch hollow tile, and covered on the outside with corrugated iron; roof to be constructed of corrugated iron and skylights on top on 4-inch iron beams, with single rows and beams, all as stated in petition; Nos. 95 to 100 Pearl street. Petitioners, Cleveland & Entel. Referred to President.

Plan 1375. Alterations to Buildings, 1901, Manhattan and The Bronx—Petition to allow second story and rear walls to be 12 inches, without lining same with 8-inch brickwork in basement, first and second stories; also to allow stairs from first story to roof to be enclosed with 4-inch single rows and hollow tile, instead of 12-inch and 8-inch brick walls, all as stated in petition; No. 103 West High Street. Petitioner, J. Charles Hankinson. Referred to President.

Plan 1448. Alterations to Buildings, 1901, Manhattan and The Bronx—Petition to allow an additional story to be built, without lining walls of lower stories 4 inches, as stated in petition; Nos. 227 and 230 Washington street. Petitioner, C. A. Danahoe. Denied.

Application No. 2725. New Buildings, 1901, Brooklyn—Petition to modify the provisions of the Building Code as to allow the erection of a frame extension in the fire limits; premises one building, north side, Fourteenth street, 195 feet east of Fourth avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, New York City. Petitioner, Holy Family Church. Referred to Commissioner Gullibley.

Application No. 2794.
