Eleventh Avenue Track Removal Association,
Eleventh Avenue and Forty-seventh Street,

Hon. PATRICK F. McGOWAN, President, Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—The Eleventh Avenue Track Removal Association, at its meeting October 12 directed me to transmit to you as President of the Board the enclosed resolutions regarding the continued denial of your Honorable Board's unanimous requests for proper safeguard at the Eleventh avenue grade crossings of the "Death" avenue tracks. We have appealed to Governor Hughes in vain for a hearing to present formal charges for the removal of the Honorable Commissioner John E. Eustis, who presides at these "hearings," which only serve the railroad in its purpose to "do as it pleases on Eleventh avenue," as Alderman Herman W. Beyer stated on July 29.

We taxpayers and rentpayers of Eleventh avenue know of your warm and tender heart and your interest in our school children; your efforts to provide for the comfort of our children in the Washington Irving High School. Will you not aid this association in its effort to safeguard the lives and limbs of our little ones, who must four times daily cross these freight tracks on "Death" avenue on their way to and from Schools 51, 58, 84, 17, 28, 80, 127 and 141?

Will you not secure the activity of the honorable Alderman from the Ninth, Reginald Doull, to co-operate with our Alderman, Herman W. Beyer, and the Hon. John McCann, so that the daily violations of law on Eleventh avenue may cease? The children on Sunday, on their way to St. Ambrose, Sacred Heart, St. Malachy's, Holy Cross, St. Raphael's and the other large congregations of Catholic churches, should be protected.

Will you not resent the discourteous treatment of our revered champion, Father John P. Chidwick, who, at the hearing October 8, was ingeniously forced to appear to accuse the Police of neglect of duty, and who in the public prints was presented as criticising the flagmen by the questions of the Hon. J. E. Eustis, and the appropriately named attorney for the railroad?

As member of the Board of Estimate you know of the innumerable franchise gifts and favors to the New York Central Railroad made by our State, County and City officials. We on the west side can report on the average two deaths each month, of either a breadwinner or, like the latest victim, seven-year-old Seth Hascamp, ground to pulp under the wheels of a train stalled in violation of the law, a violation of law daily occurring at Thirty-fifth street and Eleventh avenue with impunity and immunity. Indeed, at that very hearing, called, we believe, for the very purpose of getting in evidence the sworn statements of the engineer and train crew to prevent the collection of damages from the railroad for its cruel slaughter of this little victim, who should be the last victim of "Death" avenue's tracks, and who would be the last but for the apathy of the City and County officials, whose sworn duty it is to make this mighty corporation obey the law.

P. S.—I had to send to the hospital just now the latest victim of these tracks, a cabman, Joseph Devine, who was struck by a freight car on Eleventh avenue, between Thirtieth and Thirty-first streets, after being told by the flagman there to "Come ahead."

Although gashed about the face and head, with true Irish grit he drove to the stable, and was placed on the straw in a stall, where he lay till this morning. He did not wish to go to the hospital, for fear of alarming his wife and family. Our association sent him there in a cab, at 11.30 a. m. I fear he has been hurt internally, and that the neglect to take him at once to the hospital will be against his recovery. No notice of this accident had been received by the Public (?) Service Commission's accident department until we notified the bureau this a. m., at 11.30 o'clock.

Had two flagmen been at the Thirtieth street crossing, as requested of the Commission September 29, this accident would never have occurred. Alderman Reginald Doull ought to get busy, for this is the third accident in his district since September 16, and he seems not to know of any of them till informed by us.

Dear Sir—On the 9th inst. we received from the City Clerk a certified copy of a resolution adopted by your Honorable Body reading as follows:

"Resolved, That the Commissioners of Accounts be and they are hereby directed to furnish the following information at once:

"First—The sum or sums expended and the number of men employed during the years 1907 and 1908 in the examination of the accounts and methods of the various Departments of The City of New York.

"Second—The sum or sums expended and the number of men employed in the investigation of the accounts and methods of the offices in the various Borough governments of The City of New York.

"Third—What is the percentage of the total appropriations for those years of the Municipal Departments and the Departments under the jurisdiction of the Borough Presidents."

Pursuant to the request contained in this resolution, we submit herewith the information as requested.

In connection with the schedules submitted, we desire to call the attention of your Honorable Body to the following facts:

The examinations of the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx were respectively instituted upon and pursuant to allegations of fact which, if true, constituted misfeasance and incompetency on the part of the officials involved, published in the press or filed with this commission by civic bodies. The examination of the Borough of Manhattan was, moreover, at the direct instance and request of the President of that Borough. The examination of the Borough of Queens has been ordered by the Mayor, pursuant to a request contained in a presentment of a grand jury of that county. The examination of the Borough of Brooklyn is now under way and will shortly be concluded. Queens will follow Brooklyn and Richmond will follow Queens.

This commission has now under way examinations of:

The Bureau of Licenses.
Borough Government of Brooklyn.
Department of Correction.
Municipal and Magistrates' Courts.
Night Court.
Department of Parks, The Bronx.
Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.
Special Inquiry, City's Income Account.
Bureau of Street Openings.
Bureau of Water Register, The Bronx.
Investigation of the practices of certain City Marshals.

The work of this Commission upon the side of special examinations has since early in the summer of 1907 proceeded according to a definite plan, approved by his Honor the Mayor, comprising examinations of all the Borough governments and major Departments. This plan has been several times necessarily interrupted because of the immediate need for special inquiries, whose need was not anticipated at the time of the formulation of the aforesaid plan, notably in the cases of the award by the Board of Water Supply of the contract for building the main dams of the Ashokan Reservoir and of the Bureau of Licenses of the Mayor's office.

The work of this commission upon the side of special investigations completed in the year 1907 was as follows:

Borough Government of Manhattan.

Inquiry into the matter of the Ashokan Dam award by the Board of Water Supply.

Constitutionality of certain legislation reducing the price of gas (in co-operation with the Law Department).

Extent and effect of delayed certification work.

Regulating and grading streets in the Borough of Queens to other than the grade legally established.

Hon. PATRICK F. MCGOWAN, President, Board of Aldermen:

Sir—Bids were received for coal in all Boroughs, for the use of the Police Department at the several station houses, in January, 1908, and contracts were awarded to the lowest bidder in Manhattan at \$5.65 per ton, The Bronx at \$6.49 per ton, Brooklyn at \$6.15 per ton, and Richmond at \$5.75 per ton, each of 2,240 pounds.

The lowest bid for the Borough of Queens, at \$5.75 per ton, was considered excessive and all bids were rejected. February 7, 1908, bids were again received, pursuant to advertisement, for coal in the Borough of Queens, the lowest being \$6.60. February 27, 1908, again bids were received for the Borough of Queens, the lowest being \$7 per ton. Again, March 25, 1908, bids were received for the Borough of Queens, the lowest being \$6.75 per ton. All of these bids were rejected as excessive, the amount paid for coal for the year 1907 having been \$5.60 per ton of 2,200 pounds.

March 25, 1908, the Board of Aldermen were requested to authorize the Police Commissioner to purchase 800 tons of coal in the open market without competing bids, for use in the Borough of Queens. June 9, 1908, the Committee on Public Letting reported favorably to the Board of Aldermen upon this matter, but the resolution was lost—51 to 2; reconsidered and placed upon the list of general orders.

It is respectfully requested that favorable action be taken by the Board of Aldermen at an early day. The station houses in the Borough of Queens are without coal and are absolutely in need of it.

Sir—In the appropriation made for this Department for the year 1908, for the Borough of Manhattan, for Forage, Horseshoeing and Medicine, the amount provided was \$284,016.60. And the amount expended up to and including September 30, 1908, is \$21,485.74.

Leaving a balance of \$262,530.86

The amount that is now found to be necessary under the said appropriation for the remainder of the year for the Borough of Manhattan, that is to say, for the months of October, November and December, in order to meet the costs of contracts actually let to the lowest bidders for the same, is \$76,665.82.

Leaving a deficit at the end of the year of \$24,134.96

In the appropriation made for this Department for the year 1908, for the Borough of Brooklyn, for the above account, Forage, Horseshoeing and Medicine, the amount provided was \$188,371.24. And the amount expended up to and including September 30, 1908, is \$171,270.77.

Leaving a balance of \$17,094.47

The amount that is now found to be necessary under the above appropriation for the remainder of the year for the Borough of Brooklyn, that is to say, for the months of October, November and December, in order to meet the costs of contracts actually let to the lowest bidders for the same, is \$50,541.07.

Leaving a deficit at the end of the year of \$33,446.60

The difference between the amount appropriated and the amount actually required to be expended is explained principally by the very great and unexpected increase during the year in the price of forage for the horses, as well as by the fact of the very large number of horses added to the Department since the beginning of the year.

I therefore request that your Board, pursuant to subdivision 8, section 188 of the Charter, authorize the Comptroller to issue Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$57,561.35, namely:

For the Borough of Manhattan.....\$24,134 95
For the Borough of Brooklyn.....33,426 60

—in order to enable this Department to feed and shoe its horses for the remainder of the year.

Report of Committee on Public Letting—

No. 1071.

The Committee on Public Letting, in which was referred on September 22, 1908 (Minutes, page 261), the annexed resolution in favor of authorizing the Commissioner of Public Charities to contract for repairs to steamer "Thomas S. Brennan," without public letting, respectfully

REPORTS:

That, having examined the subject, it believes the proposed authorization should be made, inasmuch as these repairs were rendered necessary by a collision, resulting through no fault of the employees of the Department, and it being imperative that the work should be done at once. It also appears from the letter of the Commissioner that seven bids were received, and the work was awarded to the lowest of these bidders. The Committee recommends that the said resolution be adopted.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the power conferred upon it by the provisions of section 419 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Aldermen, deeming such course to be in the public interest, hereby authorizes and empowers the Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities to execute a contract or agreement with James Tregarthen, Son & Co., for repairing the damage to the Steamer "Thomas S. Brennan," caused by collision with the steamer "Maraval," on May 25, 1908, without public letting, and calling for a total expenditure of not more than fifteen hundred and sixty-nine dollars.
