Contract Q—A communication was received from the Comptroller, dated June 10 (14659), stating that on May 27, 1910, the Comptroller's certificate as to funds available had been endorsed on this contract. A communication was received from the Secretary, dated June 21, 1910 (14769), transmitting tabulated statement of deposits received for pamphlets of this contract (first advertisement) showing that all deposits had been refunded. Said statement was ordered filed with the Auditor.

Contract R—A communication was received from the Secretary, dated June 21, 1910 (14769), transmitting tabulated statement of deposits received for pamphlets of this contract showing balance unredeemed of \$5. Said statement was ordered filed with the Auditor.

Information—A communication was received from the State Department of Health, dated June 20, 1910 (14802), requesting list giving the location, name of contractor and Resident Engineer of the six largest contracts of this Board now in active operation. On June 23, 1910, the information requested was sent to said Department. A communication was received from Mrs. T. Baines, dated June 21, 1910 (14812), asking whether a highway will cross through Madison or Prospect aves., Valhalla, New York, on Block 586, Section 1, Kensico, Valhalla Heights, north of railroad station. On motion, this matter was referred to the Chief Engineer for report, and the Secretary was directed to reply in accordance with said report.

Hudson River Crossing—Chief Engineer's reports of accidents to the following employees of the Board, were sent to the State Department of Labor on June 15, 1910: Date of accident, June 5; name, Patrick Jackson; position, Miner; file number, 14676. Date of accident, June 7; name, Henry C. Page; position, Mining Foreman; file number, 14675. A communication was received from the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, F. T. Slack, Superintendent, dated June 18, 1910, asking whether there is any

objection to placing a saloon, boarding house, restaurant, horse shed, etc., on premises close to the office of this Board at Storm King, N. Y. On motion, the Secretary was directed to reply that this Board does object to same, owing to the close proximity to the work of the Board (15001).

Leases—A communication was received from the Chief Inspector B. W. S. Police, dated June 16, 1910, (13959), transmitting original lease duly executed from John N. Cordis, of Police Headquarters at No. 274 Fair st., Kingston, New York, and stating that the duplicate original had been sent to Mr. Cordis, and the triplicate original had been retained for the files of the Police Bureau. The original lease was sent to the Auditor June 20, 1910.

On recommendation of the Chief Engineer in his communication 4663 (14886), the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Secretary be and is hereby directed to submit to the Corporation Counsel, for approval as to form, and when so approved to execute a lease to the Board of Water Supply of the City of New York, from Jules Breuchaud and Bernard F. Coleman, sole surviving partners of the firm of Coleman, Breuchaud and Coleman, of the two-story and attic frame building about 22 feet by 26 feet, exclusive of porch, situated in the Town of Cortlandt, Westchester County, New York, about 200 feet south of Crompond road, at a point 3½ miles from Peekskill Village, about 1,200 feet south of the junction of Lexington ave. and Crompond road, and about 1,200 feet west of the junction of Catharine st. and Crompond road; the first story to consist of a hall and stairway and three rooms about 12 feet by 15 feet, 11 feet by 12 feet and 10 feet by 12 feet, and containing approximately 182, 125 and 122 square feet of floor space respectively; the second floor to consist of a hall and stairway, two closets and three rooms, about 12 feet by 15 feet, 12 feet by 12 feet and 8 feet by 9 feet, and containing approximately 182, 130 and 75 square feet, respectively; the total floor space in both stories to contain about 970 square feet, with use of a cellar under the whole house 8 feet in depth; also the use of a barn, located about 200 feet southwest of the house, the use of a carriage house located about 50 feet northwest of house, and the use of so much land surrounding house, carriage house and barn and included between the road on the north and west, the township line on the east and a fence south of the barn on the south, as may be desired for purpose of ingress and egress, garden and lawn. This lease to be for a term of one year from September 1, 1910, with rental at the rate of \$300 per annum, payable quarterly at the end of each quarter, with the privilege of renewal for one year from September 1, 1911, on the same terms and conditions.

On recommendation of the Chief Engineer in his communication 4644 (14885), the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Secretary be and is hereby directed to submit to the Corporation Counsel, for approval as to form, and when so approved to execute a lease to the Board of Water Supply of the City of New York, from Catharine J. Evans, of the second floor and two rooms on the third floor of a three-story brick building known as the Edmunds Building, situated on the southwest corner of Main st. and Maple ave., Walden, Orange County, New York, for a term of one year from the first day of October, 1910, at a rental of \$480 per annum, payable quarterly at the end of each quarter, with privilege of renewal for two years or any part thereof, from the first day of October, 1911, on the same terms. The lessor to maintain the necessary electric light fixtures and to furnish four coal stoves in place (no coal), and an oil heater and supply of oil for the same throughout the winter, and also to furnish whatever water may be used by the Board; the Board to pay for the electric light current.

Police—On June 17, 1910 (14735), by direction of Commissioner Shaw, Inspector Burke, Board of Water Supply Police, was authorized to ask for bids for repairing the gutter and leaders to the house used for police barracks at Valhalla, New York. On June 20, 1910 (14456), the Chief Inspector, Board of Water Supply Police, was authorized to arrange for the harvesting of hay upon Parcel 388A, Ashokan Reservoir, Section 9.

Real Estate, Northern Aqueduct, Section 1—Chief Engineer's communication 4631 (14489), reported that he had directed the construction of a temporary bridge over the open cut near the point where Locust ave. intersects the right of way from the ice house, on Parcel 40, Section 1, Northern Aqueduct, as the cost of such construction will be very slight, and can all be done under the terms of Contract 2. On

motion, the Secretary was directed to transmit this information to the Corporation Counsel in reply to Opinion 980.

Opinion 1006, June 28, 1910 (7480), requested that daily gagings of the ice pond on Parcel 40 be made both of the inflow from the inlet near the ice house, and also of the overflow, and requesting that Michael F. Carmody, Sergeant-on-Aqueduct, procure such information in reference to said ice house as Mr. H. T. Dykman, Special Counsel, may require. On motion, the Secretary was directed to write the Corporation Counsel that Mr. Dykman may have the services of Sergeant Carmody whenever required, and the Chief Engineer was instructed to make the gagings requested.

Real Estate, Northern Aqueduct, Section 4—A communication was received from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, dated June 21, 1910 (14791), stating that at the meeting of said Board held June 17, 1910, the request of this Board for the approval of purchase of Parcel 189, for \$2,250, had been referred to the Comptroller.

Real Estate, Southern Aqueduct, Section 13—Opinion 1004, June 24, 1910 (14838), advised that the right of way across Parcel 925 be kept open by the contractor under Contract 24. On motion, this was referred to the Chief Engineer.

Real Estate, Southern Aqueduct, Sections 13, 14—A communication was received from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, dated June 17, 1910 (14747), transmitting certified copy of resolution adopted by said Board June 10, 1910, approving the purchase for \$11,389, of Parcels 945, 947, 951 and 953, Section 13, and of a permanent easement in Parcel 968, Section 14.

Real Estate, Southern Aqueduct, Section 14—A communication was received from I. J. Beaudrias, Special Counsel, dated June 21, 1910 (14789), transmitting contents of a communication from Daniel P. Hays, Attorney for the Board of Trustees of the Village of Pleasantville, to the effect that said Village must be provided with some temporary supply during the time of construction of the Catskill Aqueduct through the Village property, and during the time of interference with the bed of the stream which runs into and supplies the aqueduct, and that the most practical temporary supply would be from the Village of Briarcliffe. On motion, the Secretary was directed to write Mr. Beaudrias, requesting that a representative of the Board of Trustees of the Village of Pleasantville confer with the Chief Engineer of this Board, so that said Village can be taken care of in accordance with the plans laid out in our contracts.

Real Estate, Southern Aqueduct, Section 15—A communication was received from I. J. Beaudrias, Special Counsel, dated June 21, 1910 (14787), asking whether or not it is the intention to close that portion of See ave. taken in Parcel 1039, lying southerly from Payne st., and stating that this question will come up before the Commissioners of Appraisal at the office of Mr. John J. Delany, No. 2 Rector st., New York City, on June 24, 1910, 11 a. m., and requesting if it is the intention of the City to leave See ave. open south of Payne st., that an Engineer of this Board so testify before said Commissioners on the above date. Chief Engineer's communication 4653 (14787), reported that there is no intention on the part of the City to close any portion of See ave. lying south of Payne st., but only that portion of it lying north of said street, as noted on maps of Section 15, Southern Aqueduct. Said communication stated that the Chief Engineer had arranged to have an Engineer present at Mr. Delany's office, June 24, 1910.

On June 23, 1910, notice of lien filed by Dessar & Ridgway, attorneys, against the payment for Parcel 1025, was sent to the Auditor.

A communication was received from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, dated June 18, 1910 (14355), stating that at the meeting of said Board held June 10, 1910, the request of this Board for the approval of the purchase of Parcel 1038 for \$90 had been referred to the Comptroller.

Real Estate, Southern Aqueduct, Section 17—On June 24, 1910, Commissioner Shaw verified as Commissioner petition for appointment of commissioners of appraisal in this proceeding.

Real Estate, Ashokan Reservoir, Section 1—On June 18, 1910, the Secretary was served with subpoena, dated June 16, 1910 (13723), directing the production, on June 21, 1910, at the County Court House, Kingston, of all documents in relation to the borings made upon Parcel 7. On June 18, 1910, Hon. F. J. N. Clarke, Commissioner of Appraisal in this proceeding, was notified that Department Engineer Davis would be present to answer questions and produce such records as are available.

Real Estate, Ashokan Reservoir, Section 11—A communication was received from the Department of Finance, dated June 14,

1910 (14684), fixing June 30, 1910, as the date for the payment of the awards in the second report in this proceeding.

On June 17, 1910 (13971), the Corporation Counsel was requested to advise this Board if any of the awards covering cemetery parcels 501, 526-A-12, 526-A-23, 526-A-26, 526-A-30, 526-A-46, 526-A-56, 526-A-57, 526-A-59, 526-A-60, 526-A-61, 526-A-62, 526-A-67, 526-A-91, 526-A-92, 526-A-95, includes compensation for the removal of bodies, headstones, monuments or fences.

Real Estate, Ashokan Reservoir, Section 12—A communication was received from the Department of Finance, dated June 14, 1910 (14684), fixing June 30, 1910, as the date for the payment of the awards in the second report in this proceeding.

Real Estate, Ashokan Reservoir, Section 13—A communication was received from the Department of Finance, dated June 14, 1910 (14684), fixing June 30, 1910, as the date for the payment of the awards in the second report in this proceeding.

Real Estate, Buildings—A communication was received from Niles S. Hopkins, Armonk, N. Y., dated June 13, 1910 (14654), offering the sum of \$110 for the lumber of the house and barn on Parcel 499, Kensico, Section 7. On motion, this matter was referred to Commissioner Chadwick. A communication was received from the Comptroller, dated June 11, 1910, transmitting copy of letter from G. W. Smith, former owner of the above parcel, dated June 8, 1910, offering \$100 or so for said house. On motion, this was referred to Commissioner Chadwick.

A report was received from Commissioner Shaw, dated June 27, 1910 (14852), stating that he had assigned to Richard H. Burke, Inspector Board of Water Supply Police, the buildings on Parcel 291, Section 5, Kensico, on the usual terms and conditions. On motion, the matter of fixing rent for said buildings was referred to Commissioner Chadwick.

On recommendation of Commissioner Chadwick in his report dated June 29, 1910 (14928), the New York Probation Association was granted permission to use the house on Parcel 849, Kensico, Section 11, for the months of July and August, 1910, at a rental of \$25 for the two months.

On June 16, 1910 (14714), the above certified copies of orders were returned to the Comptroller and he was advised that copies of said orders had already been received from the Corporation Counsel and that vouchers in payment of said fees and disbursements had been prepared and transmitted to the Comptroller.

Opinion 999, June 13, 1910 (14653), transmitted copy without date, of order of the Supreme Court filed in the office of the Clerk of Westchester County, June

3, 1910, taxing as follows the fees of the Commissioners of Appraisal in Kensico, Section 12, in connection with their second report:

Patrick A. McManus, \$1,600; William Catlin, \$1,600; Joseph Barrett, \$1,600.

Said opinion also transmitted copy of letter to the Comptroller, dated June 13, 1910, recommending the payment of said fees as so taxed. The original opinion and enclosures were sent to the Auditor June 14, 1910, for preparation of vouchers, if found correct.

Opinion 1001, June 20, 1910 (14754), transmitted copy of order of the Supreme Court, dated June 11, 1910, taxing as follows the fees and disbursements of the Commissioners of Appraisal in Southern Aqueduct, Section 15, in connection with their second report:

John J. Delany, \$2,500 fees, \$5.40 disbursements; James P. Kilby, \$2,500 fees, \$30.95 disbursements; James D. Connor, \$2,500 fees, \$9 disbursements.

Said opinion also transmitted copy of letter to the Comptroller, dated June 17, 1910, recommending the payment of said fees and disbursements as so taxed. The original opinion and enclosures were sent to the Auditor June 20, 1910, for preparation of vouchers, if found correct.

Real Estate, Kensico, Section 10—A communication was received from the Department of Finance, dated June 14, 1910 (14684), fixing June 30, 1910, as the date for the payment of the awards in the first report in this proceeding.

Real Estate, Possession—Two communications were received from the Comptroller, dated June 20, 1910 (14559), acknowledging receipt of requests of this Board of June 15 and 17, 1910, that immediate steps be taken to hasten the payment of the awards for one-half the assessed valuation of the parcels in Ashokan Reservoir mentioned in the minutes of June 14, 1910.

A communication was received from the Department of Finance, dated June 20, 1910 (14799), requesting that in future this Board attach to vouchers in payment of one-half the assessed valuations the certified copies of orders of the Supreme Court directing said payments, and also requesting that the orders covering parcels mentioned in list transmitted with said letter be sent to said Department, in order to facilitate the payment of one-half the assessed valuations. On June 28, 1910 (14799), the orders requested were sent to the Comptroller. Permits issued by the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity and by the Superintendent of Highways for the opening of streets for water taps, gas and sewer connections and for crossing the sidewalks for excavating, laying new sidewalks and for openings for poles and trees were examined in relation to their interference with the street monuments, and in case this occurred a \$25 bond was required.

A Special Information Bureau having been established by the President of the Borough of The Bronx, many inquiries which come to this Bureau were attended to by the Topographical Bureau. An accurate account of the number of cases could not be kept.

E—Miscellaneous.

1. During the quarter 282 communications were referred for report in the Topographical Bureau and 220 reports and letters were written on these subjects.

2. In accordance with the provisions of section 980 of the Greater New York Charter, Revised, as amended by chapter 394 of the Laws of 1901, each month a return is forwarded to the Corporation Counsel, verified by the Borough President, showing the names of persons employed, and the number of hours occupied by them in the preparation of maps relating to proceedings for acquiring title to avenues, streets, etc., and the dates of the days of the month so occupied, their respective salaries, the amount of such salary apportioned to the expense thereof in each proceeding; during the quarter such returns were made and forwarded for December, 1909; January and February, 1910.

3. The Topographical Bureau has charge of the assigning of numbers to houses of the Borough. All buildings in the Borough (both east and west of the Bronx River) have received their official numbers. As new buildings are erected and requests are made for same, new numbers are assigned. A record of all these assigned house numbers are kept in atlases on file in the Topographical Bureau.

4. The correcting and bringing up to date of the atlases of the street system, west of the Bronx River, in the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, Chief Engineer, Topographical Bureau, Bureau of Highways and Bureau of Sewers was kept up during the month of January, 1910.

5. The card index of street improvements in the Borough of The Bronx was brought up to date, and those west of the Bronx River were forwarded to the Consulting Engineer and the Deputy Commissioner of Public Works.

6. The correcting of the tax maps of the Borough of The Bronx and in use in the Topographical Bureau was continued.

7. Three vaults of the Topographical Bureau were kept in order.

The weekly reports of the Topographical Bureau were arranged and filed.

Maps received were put on file, labeled and recorded and in many cases repaired. Four hundred and twenty-one requests for maps were attended to, a record of such maps kept, giving the title of the maps, by whom and at what time taken and returned.

Work on indexing survey note books of field parties, which were incomplete, was progressed.

Examinations of the 80-foot scale sheets of the Topographical Survey, east of the Bronx River, are in progress in order to determine which field books refer to the respective sheets. This work is very laborious and required great care.

8. The following black prints were mounted during the quarter and colored up, as copies of filed maps, requested by the Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

12. One Topographical Draftsman is constantly engaged in making blueprints and blackprints for the Topographical Bureau, the Bureau of Highways and the Bureau of Sewers. A complete record is kept of every print made, giving title and sizes.

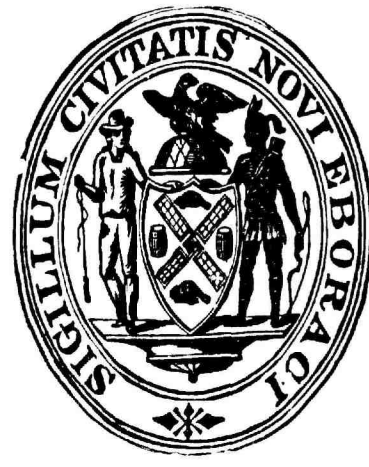

Y., on the 16th day of July, 1910, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon of that day, or as soon thereafter as counsel can be heard, for an order confirming such report, and for such other and further relief as may be just.

Reserving to The City of New York the right to oppose the confirmation of any or all of the awards contained in said report.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
