



A committee representing the Master Plumbers' Association appeared before the Board in respect to the registration of journeymen plumbers. After a hearing, the Board decided that it had no discretion under the law to refuse to register a journeyman plumber.

Action of the Board on Tenement-house Plans.

Resolved, That the following plans for light and ventilation of tenement-houses be and are hereby approved upon the conditions specified in the several permits granted.

Plan No. 1315, for two five-story tenements, 27 feet by 62 feet, with an extension 21 feet 8 inches by 22 feet, on a lot 27 feet by 100 feet 8 inches, on the south side of Ninety-first street, 96 feet east of Fourth avenue, each to be occupied by eleven families.

Plan No. 1316, for one five-story tenement, 49 feet front, 44 feet rear and 92 feet deep, on a lot 49 feet 5 inches by 100 feet, on the southwest corner of Third avenue and Thirty-sixth street, to be occupied by nine families.

Plan No. 1317, for one four-story tenement, 25 feet by 65 feet, on a lot 25 feet by 99 feet 11 inches, on the north side of One Hundred and Thirty-second street, 135 feet east of Fifth avenue, to be occupied by five families.

Plan No. 1318, for one five-story tenement, 24 feet nine inches by 56 feet, on a lot 24 feet 9 inches by 60 feet, on the southwest corner of Seventh avenue and Thirty-seventh street, to be occupied by eight families.

Plan No. 1318-2, for two five-story tenements, each 24 feet 8 inches by 82 feet, on lots 24 feet 8 inches by 100 feet, on the west side of Seventh avenue, 24 feet 9 inches south of Thirty-seventh street, each to be occupied by eight families.

Plan No. 1319, for one five-story tenement, 20 feet by 70 feet on a lot 20 feet by 87 feet, at No. 126 Broome street, to be occupied by ten families.

The weekly report of inspections of tenement-houses in course of construction, was received and ordered on file.

Plumbing and Drainage of New Houses.

Resolved, That the plans for the plumbing and drainage of new houses be and are hereby approved as follows:

Plan No. 113, for one tenement on north side of One Hundred and Thirty-second street, 135 feet east of Fifth avenue.

Plan No. 114, for one dwelling, east side of Central avenue near Croton avenue.

Plan No. 115, one tenement, south side of Seventeenth street, 100 feet west of Sixth avenue.

Plan No. 116, one office building at Nos. 184 and 186 Duane street.

Plan No. 117, one tenement north side of One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, 125 feet west of Ninth avenue, conditionally.

Plan No. 118, one tenement, north side of One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, 150 feet west of Ninth avenue.

Plan No. 119, one tenement, north side of One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, 100 feet west of Ninth avenue.

Plan No. 120, one tenement, north side of One Hundred and Twenty-fourth street, 200 feet west of Sixth avenue, conditionally.

Plan No. 121, one tenement at No. 25 West Twenty-third street, conditionally.

Plan No. 122, six dwellings, north side of One Hundred and Twenty-third street, 300 feet east of Eighth avenue.

The weekly reports of Assistant Sanitary Engineers on the plumbing and drainage of houses in course of erection were received and ordered on file.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending January 21, 1882:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,465, as follows, viz.: 4 public buildings, 496 tenement-houses, 96 private dwellings, 39 other dwellings, 7 manufactories and workshops, 8 stores and warehouses, 34 stables, 41 slaughter-houses, 17 other nuisances, 14 lodging-houses, 11 sunken and vacant lots, 95 yards, courts, and areas, 129 cellars and basements, 172 waste-pipes and drains, 271 privies and water-closets, 21 streets, gutters and sidewalks, 1 dangerous stairway, 1 cistern and cesspool, 7 smoky chimneys.

The number of reports thereon received from the Sanitary Inspectors was 409.

During the past week 148 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 50 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

50 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 212 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 170 houses, 170 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

39 cases of contagious disease were removed to the hospital and 2 dead bodies to the Morgue by the Ambulance Corps.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 501 births, 51 still-births, 238 marriages, and 817 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, January 21, 1882; this shows a decrease of 84 births and 6 still-births, and an increase of 34 marriages and 56 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1881, there was a decrease of 20 births, and an increase of 3 still-births, 78 marriages, and 150 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from small-pox decreased 6; puerperal diseases, 3; diarrhoeal diseases 11; alcoholism, 4; bronchitis, 8; pneumonia, 1; heart disease, 2; apoplexy, 8; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 13; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 3; Bright's disease and nephritis, 7; cyanosis and atelectasis, 2; premature and preterm births, 5; surgical operations, 1; suicide, 3; while the deaths from measles increased 13; scarlatina, 34; diphtheria, 15; croup, 1; whooping cough, 3; erysipelas, 4; cerebro-spinal fever, 3; malarial fevers, 7; rheumatism and gout, 3; phthisis pulmonalis, 12; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 2; convulsions, 2; gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 4; drowning, 2. The number of deaths from typhoid fever, inanition, cancer, aneurism, marasmus, tabes-mesenterica, and scrofula and meningitis and encephalitis, was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 159 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year, 242 under two years, 375 under five years, and 41 seventy years and over, which shows that the deaths of children under five years of age was — than the number reported during last week, and represent 45.90 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week 158 were in institutions, 444 in tenement-houses, 190 in houses containing three families or less, 10 in hotels and boarding-houses, 14 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 13 were on the basement floor, 136 on the first, 223 on the second, 148 on the third, 89 on the fourth, 32 on the fifth, 3 on the sixth. 799 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 18 non-residents; 79 were stated to be single, 179 married, 87 widowed, and the condition of 472 was not stated, these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 817; still-births, 51; bodies in transit, 20; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births 79 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 501 births; 238 marriages; 51 still-births; 817 deaths; 20 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated. 87 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 2 transcripts of the birth record, 7 of marriage, and 44 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending Jan. 21, 1882, was 31.9 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.950, the mean humidity was 89, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 917, and the total amount of rain-fall was 1.23 inches depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

NOTICE TO TAXPAYERS.

RELATING TO THE PAYMENT OF UNPAID TAXES, ASSESSMENTS, AND CROTON WATER RENTS.

THE COMPTROLLER OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK hereby gives notice to owners of real and personal estate in this city, that all unpaid taxes, assessments, and Croton water rents may now be paid with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum, as provided by chapter 33 of the Laws of 1881, which is as follows:

CHAPTER 33.

AN ACT relative to the collection of taxes and assessments, and of arrears of taxes and assessments, and Croton water rents, in the City of New York.

(Passed March 16, 1881; three-fifths being present.)

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. If any taxes of any year shall remain unpaid on the first day of November, after the assessment-rolls and the warrants to collect such taxes have been delivered to the Receiver of Taxes in the City of New York, it shall be the duty of said Receiver to give public notice, by advertisement for at least ten days in two of the daily newspapers, and in the CITY RECORD, printed and published in said city, respectively, that unless the same shall be paid to him at his office on or before the first day of December, in any such year, he will immediately thereafter proceed to collect such unpaid taxes, as provided in the following section of this act:

Section 2. If any such tax shall remain unpaid on the said first day of December, it shall be the duty of the said Receiver of Taxes in said city to charge, receive, and collect upon such tax so remaining unpaid on that day, in addition to the amount of such tax, one per centum on the amount thereof; and to charge, receive, and collect upon such tax so remaining unpaid on the first day of January thereafter, interest upon the amount thereof at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the day on which said assessment-rolls and warrants shall have been delivered to the said Receiver of Taxes to the date of payment.

The same rate of interest shall be so charged and collected upon any tax levied in the year eighteen hundred and eighty, remaining unpaid at the date of the passage of this act.

Section 3. All existing provisions of law which impose a charge and require the collection of interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum upon arrears of taxes on real and personal estate within the City of New York, upon arrears of assessments for local improvements and street openings in said city, and upon arrears of Croton water rents of said city, are hereby repealed; and in lieu of such charge of interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum, there shall be charged and collected by the officer authorized to collect and receive any such arrears of taxes and assessments and Croton water rents, interest upon the amount thereof at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the date of such entry to the date of payment. This provision shall apply to taxes, assessments, or Croton water rents remaining unpaid and due, for the non-payment of which the lands and tenements liable therefor shall be hereafter sold at public auction as now provided by law; provided, however, that nothing in this act shall be construed to affect the rights of purchasers at sales for taxes, assessments, or Croton water rents, heretofore made, or to authorize the redemption of lands and tenements from sales heretofore made for any lesser sums than the sums collectible for such redemption under the provisions of existing laws.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the Comptroller of the City of New York to give public notice by advertisement, for at least ten days, in the CITY RECORD, printed and published in said city, immediately after the confirmation of any assessment for a local improvement or street opening in said city, that the same has been confirmed specifying the title of such assessment and the date of its confirmation by the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessments in proceedings for local improvements, and by the Supreme Court in proceedings for street openings, and also the date of entry in the record of titles of assessments kept in the Bureau for the Collection of Assessments and of Arrears of Taxes and Assessments, and of Croton Water Rents, notifying all persons, owners of property affected by any such assessment, that, unless the amount assessed for benefit on any person or property shall be paid within sixty days after the date of said entry of any such assessment, interest shall thereafter be collected thereon as provided in the following section of this act, and all provisions of law or ordinance requiring any other or different notice of assessments and interest thereon are hereby repealed.

Section 5. If any such assessment shall remain unpaid for the period of sixty days after the date of entry thereof in the said record of titles of assessments, it shall be the duty of the officer authorized to collect and receive the amount of such assessment, to charge, collect, and receive legal interest thereon, at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the date of such entry to the date of payment.

Section 6. This act shall take effect immediately.

ORDER OF THE COMPTROLLER OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, CONSOLIDATING CERTAIN BUREAUX IN THE FINANCE DEPARTMENT.

SECTION 3 OF CHAPTER 321 OF THE LAWS OF 1880, requires that heads of departments shall reduce the aggregate expenses of their respective departments by a reduction of salaries, and confers upon them authority to consolidate bureaux and offices for that purpose, as follows, to wit:

"In making the reduction herein required, every head of department may abolish and consolidate offices and bureaux, and discharge subordinates in the same department."

The Comptroller of the City of New York, in pursuance of the duty imposed and the authority thus conferred upon him, hereby orders and directs that the following Bureaux in the Finance Department shall be consolidated, the consolidation thereof to take effect on the first day of January, 1881, viz:

First—"The Bureau for the Collection of Assessments," and "The Bureau for the Collection of Arrears of Taxes and Assessments, and of Water Rents," shall be consolidated as one bureau, and on and after January 1, 1881, shall be known as "The Bureau for the Collection of Assessments and of Arrears of Taxes and Assessments and of Water Rents," and possess all the power conferred and perform all the duties imposed by law and ordinance upon both of said bureaux and the officers thereof, the chief officer of which consolidated bureau shall be called "Collector of Assessments and Clerk of Arrears."

Second—"The Bureau for the Collection of the Revenue accruing from rents, and interest on bonds and mortgages, revenue arising from the use or sale of property belonging to or managed by the city," and "the Bureau of Markets," shall be consolidated as one Bureau, and on and after January 1, 1881, shall be known as "The Bureau for the Collection of City Revenue and of Markets," and possess all the powers conferred and perform all the duties imposed by law and ordinance upon both said bureaux, and the officers thereof; the chief officer of which said consolidated bureau shall be called "Collector of City Revenue and Superintendent of Markets."

As to all assessments confirmed subsequent to June 9, 1880, for local improvements theretofore completed, and as to any assessment for local improvements known as Morning-side avenues, notices must be filed within two months after the dates upon which such assessments may be respectively confirmed.

The notice must specify the particular assessment complained of, the date of the confirmation of the same, the property affected thereby, and in a brief and concise manner the objections thereto, showing, or tending to show, that the assessment was unfair or unjust in respect to said real estate.
