At a meeting of the Board of Docks held February 27, 1884.

The minutes of the meeting held February 20, 1884, were read and approved.

The following communications were received, read, and,

On motion, laid on the table to await action, as stated, to wit:

From Arnoux, Ritch and Woodford, attorneys, etc.—In reference to proceedings to be taken, respecting the title to the wharf property opposite Nos. 307 and 308 West street. Secretary directed to advise that the Board will take the matter into consideration, and as soon as the examination now being made is completed, will advise with the parties in respect thereto.

From Francisco A. Costello—In reference to furnishing piles to the Department. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to examine and report.

From Michael Kane—Requesting permission to fill in, and to erect a retaining wall back of the line of the bulkhead on the north half of the block between Ninety-sixth and Ninety-seventh streets, Harlem river. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to examine and report.

From Comptroller of the City—Requesting a reply relative to the proposed lease of wharf property to the Fulton Market Fish Mongers' Association. Treasurer to report in respect thereto.

From Thomas L. Sturgis—Requesting permission to build cribs, and to fill in behind the same at One Hundred and Fiftieth street, Harlem river. Engineer-in-Chief to be instructed to examine and report.

From James Densmore and D. C. Roundy—Requesting lease of premises between Ninety-sixth and Ninety-seventh streets, Harlem river, for a dry dock. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to examine and report.

The following communications were received, read, and,

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, action being taken where necessary, as stated, to wit:

From Counsel to the Corporation:

1st. Opinion in respect to application of the decision in the case of Langdon vs. The Mayor, to suits now pending, commenced by various parties against the city. Secretary to have the opinion recorded.

2d. Enclosing check for ten dollars, collected in settlement of suit against John Higgins.

3d. Enclosing check for twenty-five dollars, collected in settlement of suit against Samuel H. Bailey.

4th. In reference to injunction suit of William M. Kingsland, trustee, etc., against the Mayor, etc., affecting premises between Twenty-fourth and Twenty-fifth streets, North river.

From Department of Street Cleaning—In reference to and replying to the statements made in the letter from Mr. John Taylor Johnston, respecting the filling up the slip between Bethune and West Twelfth streets, North river. Secretary directed to transmit copy of communication to Mr. Johnston.

From Police Department—Reporting that the bulkhead at Pier 40, East river, was in a dangerous condition. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to examine and report.

From Pilot Commissioners—Reporting that the wreck of the coal boat "J. W. Dunning" had been removed from the slip at Twenty-third street, East river.

From Municipal Service Examining Board—Requesting a list of all appointments and changes since the Civil Service Rules went into force. Secretary directed to furnish all the information desired, and to advise that such information will be regularly furnished on the 15th and 31st of each month.

From Old Dominion Steamship Company:

1st. In reference to the condition of the roadway leading to Pier, new 26, North river, and requesting that a portion of the same be laid with Belgian pavement. Secretary directed to advise that the Engineer-in-Chief has been directed to repair the pavement and put it in good condition; but that it would add largely to the expense if relaid with Belgian pavement, and therefore the Board do not feel that it would be proper to make the change in the pavement as requested by them.

2d. Requesting permission to replace four fender piles on Pier, new 26, North river. Application granted, the work to be done under the supervision and direction of the Engineer-in-Chief.

From F. E. Hanson—Requesting that the Pier at One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, North river, be leased to him for a term of years. Secretary directed to advise that the pier can only be leased by sale at public auction to the highest bidder.

From E. F. Woods—Requesting permission to use an office on wheels on the East river. Secretary directed to advise that the application is denied, the Board requiring all applications to state definitely the location where the tally-house is to be placed, and that the same be constructed in accordance with the rules.

From John H. Morris—In reference to and requesting to be heard before action is taken on his application for land under water at Sherman's creek, Harlem river, and that the Board delay making its report to the Comptroller until further investigation.

From Foreign Fruit Merchant's Association—In reference to conference to be held with the Commissioners by a committee of the Association. Secretary directed, to advise that the Board will hear their committee on Wednesday, 5th proximo, at 2 o'clock P. M.

From Alexander Mason—Requesting allowance on rent for Pier 44, East river, for the period of forty-two days, during which the pier was occupied by the contractors while being repaired in 1881, and enclosing check for \$944.55, the balance of rent due for the current quarter, after deducting the same. Application for allowance on rent denied, and the Secretary directed to return the check tendered in payment, and to advise that the Board must insist upon the payment of the rent in full, in accordance with the terms and conditions of the lease, and that it cannot allow any abatement for the reason stated.

From P. Sandford Ross—Accepting contract for building crib-bulkhead at foot of Seventy-third street, East river.

From Pim, Forwood & Co., agents, lessees—In reference to settlement of the substructure of Pier, new 55, North river. Engineer-in-Chief directed, verbally, to examine and report in respect thereto.

From Lowther & Brother—Requesting permission to drive piles at the bulkhead between Thirty-first and Thirty-second streets, East river. Application denied, as the piles would be outside the bulkhead line.

From Engineer-in-Chief:

1st. Reporting as to damage done to Pier, new 43, North river, by the steamer "Richmond Hill." Secretary directed to notify Seager Brothers to repair the same within twenty-four hours, under the supervision and direction of the Engineer-in-Chief, or this Department will do the work at their cost and expense.

2d. Reporting the suspension of Acting-Watchman, Owen Keenan, for being found off post on February 22d instant, and recommending that he be not again assigned to duty as Acting-Watchman for ten days. Action of Engineer-in-Chief approved, and his recommendation adopted.

3d. Reporting as to the condition of Pier, old 42, North river, and the repairs necessary thereto. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to do the work of repairing the same in accordance with his report.

4th. Reporting in reference to the approach to Pier, new 26, North river. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to do the work of relaying and repairing the pavement.

5th. Reporting amount of work done during the week ending February 23, 1884.

6th. Reporting that repairs had not been made to the Piers at One Hundred and Twenty-ninth and One Hundred and Thirty-first streets, North river, by the lessees as directed by the Board. Secretary directed to request the opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation as to the liability of the lessees of piers to repair and make good the damage done to piers by running ice, and if terms and conditions of the lease or form of the lease agreed to be executed by the parties covers, or is intended to cover, making repairs, if the same is damaged or carried away by running ice in the river.

7th. Reporting as to assignment of employees to special duty other than that to which they were appointed. Secretary directed to furnish the information to the Bookkeeper.

8th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 3435, as to dredging between Forty-sixth and Forty-eighth streets, North river.

9th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 3449, that the dredging in front of bulkhead, one hundred feet north of the Pier at Forty-seventh street, North river, had been done as ordered at a cost of \$242.62. Treasurer to make out bill therefor and collect the same from J. and R. Darrow.

10th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 3940, as to the condition of and repairs required to Pier 41, East river. Secretary directed to notify the lessees of the pier that the Engineer-in-Chief has reported that the pier requires to be repaired, and that they are required to repair the same under the supervision and direction of the Engineer-in-Chief.

11th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 3301, that the work of placing a derrick on Pier 37, East river, had been done under his supervision.

12th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 3423, that he had repaired the crib-bulkhead between Piers 6 and 8, East river.

From Edward Gilon, Dock Master—Reporting as to repairs being required to the deck of the Pier at Forty-sixth street, North river. Work already ordered to be done by the Engineer-in-Chief.

From Charles H. Thompson, Dock Master—Reporting that the bulkhead at Pier 8, East river, needed repairs. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to examine and report.

From George W. Wanmaker, Dock Master:

1st. Reporting that the platform at the boat landing at the Battery needed repairs. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to do the work.

2d. Reporting that the approach to Pier, old 22, North river, was in a bad and dangerous condition. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to examine and report.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office on the 26th day of February, 1884, the following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, the following amendments of the Sanitary Code for the security of life and health be and the same are hereby adopted, and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:

Resolved, That section 201 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 201. That for all lodging-houses in which beds are let for lodgers containing four or more beds in any apartment therein for the use of lodgers, a permit in writing from this Department shall be required, and no person in the City of New York shall have, lease, let, or keep any such lodging-house or the lodgings therein, or assist in the keeping, hire, or assist in hiring, or conduct the business of any such lodging-house, or the lodgings therein, except pursuant to the terms and condition of a permit in writing previously obtained therefor from this Department, an application for which shall be made in accordance with the rules and regulations of the Board of Health by the person or persons who propose to use the same. The beds in all lodging-houses and in every room in which beds are let for lodgers shall be separated by a passageway of not less than two feet, horizontally, and all the beds shall be so arranged that under each of them the air shall freely circulate, and there be adequate ventilation. Four hundred (400) cubic feet of air space shall be provided and allowed for each bed or lodger, and no more beds shall be permitted than those provided in this way, unless free and adequate means of ventilation exist, approved by the Board of Health, and a special permit in writing be granted therefor, specifying the number of beds or the cubic air space which shall under special circumstances be allowed.

Resolved, That section 89 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 89. That no blood, butchers' offal or garbage, nor any dead animals, nor any putrid or stinking animal or vegetable matter, shall be thrown by any person or allowed to go into any street, place, sewer, or receiving-basin, or into any river or standing or running water or excavation, or upon any ground or premises in the built-up portions of said city.

## TO THE PUBLIC.

**AT 9:30 P. M. ON THURSDAY THE 15TH** instant, the aqueduct had to be shut off to repair a large leak that could not be repaired in the usual manner from the exterior. This leak had suddenly developed in the section south of Yonkers, where smaller fissures had previously occurred.

The examination showed fissures aggregating 2,000 feet in length. The repairs were finished and water was again turned on by 4 P. M., on Saturday, the 17th instant. While the flow through the aqueduct was interrupted the supply in the Central Park reservoir was drawn down five feet.

This loss of supply in the city reservoirs, occurring now, as winter is approaching, makes it necessary to take extra precautions against waste of water. Being aware of the temptation to leave faucets open in cold weather to prevent freezing in the pipes, I specially protest against that practice, and appeal to all citizens to abstain from wasteful use of water in any manner whatever. The present condition of the supply and the possibility of a recurrence of similar leaks in the aqueduct make it my duty to give this public notice that I shall hereinafter resort to the peremptory measure of shutting off the water in all places where persistent waste is discovered.

Fourth.—That our report herein will be presented to the Supreme Court of the State of New York, at a Special Term thereof, to be held at the Chambers, in the County Court-house, at the City Hall, in the City of New York, on the fourth day of April, 1884, at the opening of the Court on that day, and that then and there, or as soon thereafter as counsel can be heard thereon, a motion will be made that the said report be confirmed.

Resolved, For the proper supervision of the waterfront of the city, the care of the wharf property located thereon placed in the charge of this Department, the rendering of necessary facilities for the prompt berthing of vessels thereat, and the collection of the wharfage accruing therefrom, that the waterfront of the City of New York be and hereby is arranged and divided into nine districts, and that for each of the said districts there shall be appointed, designated, or assigned, from time to time, at the pleasure of the Board, a suitable and competent person to be known and entitled as "Dock Master," who shall perform such duties and render such services in relation to the supervision, regulation, and occupation of the wharf property and waterfront in

their respective districts, as the laws of the United States and of the State of New York, the ordinances of the City of New York, and the by-laws of this Board, and its rules, or orders, shall or may require, prescribe, or direct.

The several districts so made and created, and the Dock Masters assigned thereto, are as follows, to wit:

District No. 1.—Embracing all that portion of the East river, extending from Castle Garden, on the Battery, to and including Pier 21, East river.  
Charles H. Thompson, Dock Master; office, 33 Coenties Slip.

District No. 2.—All that portion of the North river extending from Castle Garden, to and including Pier old 42, North river.  
George W. Wainmaker, Dock Master; office, foot of Duane street, N. R.

District No. 3.—From east side Pier 21, East river, to and including Pier 55, East river.  
Edward Abel, Dock Master; office, 262 South street.

District No. 4.—From north side Pier, old 42, North river, to and including pier at foot of West Twenty-third street, North river.  
John M. Smith, Dock Master; office, Pier, new 43, N. R.

District No. 5.—From north side Pier 55, East river, to north side of Thirty-fourth street, East river.  
Bernard Kenney, Dock Master; office, foot of East Sixteenth street, E. R.

District No. 6.—From north side Pier at Twenty-third street, North river, to and including Pier at foot Fifty-ninth street, North river.  
Edward Gilon, Dock Master; office, Pier, new 57, N. R.

District No. 7.—From north side of Thirty-fourth street, East river, to south side of Ninety-second street, East river.  
Robert Hall, Dockmaster; office, 646 First avenue.

District No. 8.—From north side of Pier at Fifty-ninth street, North river, to Yonkers and Spuyten Duyvil Creek, from North river to Kingsbridge.  
Theodore S. Croft, Dockmaster; office, foot of West Seventy-ninth street, N. R.

District No. 9.—From south side Ninety-second street, East river, to and including Bronx river, and also Harlem river, from East river to Kingsbridge.  
John Callan, Dockmaster; office, foot of East One Hundred and Fourth street, Harlem river.

Resolved, That until otherwise ordered by this Board the following rules and instructions are issued for the guidance and observance of the several Dock Masters of the Department:

\* \* \* \* \*

Each Dock Master shall promptly designate and assign in the order in which application is made, suitable and convenient berths, so far as practicable, within the limits of his district, for the use of such vessel and water craft as may require the same for the reception or discharge of passengers, merchandise, etc., therefrom or for the necessary repair or the safety of any vessel or water craft.

It shall be the duty of each Dock Master to require and enforce the due observance of and compliance with such of the national and State laws, city ordinances, and the rules, regulations and orders of the Department of Docks as appertain to the use, care, and custody of the wharf property of and about the City of New York, promptly reporting to the Board all violations and evasions of such laws, ordinances, rules, regulations and orders.

\* \* \* \* \*

Each Dock Master is expressly prohibited, under penalty of immediate dismissal from his position, from receiving or demanding, directly or indirectly, any fee, gratuity, compensation, or article of value of any nature or kind, for the assignment of a berth to a vessel at any pier, slip, or wharf property whatsoever, or for the performance of or the omission to perform any of the duties required of or pertaining to the position of Dock Master of this Department.

Any person or persons having any cause of complaint against the Dock Masters for any failure or omission in the performance of the duties as required by the above rules, are requested to promptly communicate the same to this Board, at their offices, Nos. 117 and 119 Duane street.
