

BOARD OF REVISION AND CORRECTION OF ASSESSMENTS.

A meeting of the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessments was held at the Comptroller's Office, on Tuesday, March 4, 1884, at 1.25 o'clock P. M.

Present--S. Hastings Grant, Comptroller; George P. Andrews, Counsel to the Corporation; Frederick Smyth, Recorder.

The minutes of the meeting held February 13, 1884, were read and approved.

The assessment list for sewer in Thompson street, between West Third and West Fourth streets, and objections of Amos R. Eno and Robert W. Tailer, laid over at the last meeting, were

After hearing Stevenson Towle, Engineer-in-Charge of Sewers, as to the necessity for the building of the sewer, and Mr. Tailer also; on motion, the said assessment list was ordered to be returned to the Board of Assessors for re-examination with reference to a re-apportionment of the

The assessment list for regulating and grading, setting curb-stones and flagging, in One Hundred and Thirteenth street, from Fifth to Eighth avenue, and objections of Wm. G. Wood, M. D., laid over at the last meeting, were taken up.

George A. Jeremiah, Superintendent of Street Improvements, explained in regard to the character of the "filling" used in said work, objected to by Dr. Wood.

After due consideration, the objections were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed,

The assessment list for sewers in Twenty-fourth, Twenty-fifth and Twenty-sixth streets, between Eleventh and Thirteenth avenues, and in Thirteenth avenue, between Twenty-fourth and Twenty-seventh streets, with alterations and improvements to existing sewers, and objections of the Chelsea Jute Mills, James Clark and Eben Peek, filed by Allen McDonald, attorney; J. E. Smith and John C. Shaw; George L. Kingsland and others, executors, filed by Kitchei & Jelhffe, attorneys, and Ichabod T. Williams, filed by Stewart & Baldwin, attorneys, were presented by the Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of January 10, 1884.

Some of the objectors having requested that the consideration of the said assessment list be postponed until the next meeting, on motion, the same was laid over.

The assessment list for regulating, grading, resetting curb and gutter stones, and relaying flagging in One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, between Sixth and Seventh avenues, and record of awards for damages to buildings, by reason of change of grade, and objections of Amelia O'Neill and others, filed by Truman H. Baldwin, attorney, and petition of Mary G. Belloni, for damages, filed by Kitchel & Jelliffe, attorneys, laid over at the last meeting of the Board, were, on motion, taken up.

After again hearing Mr. Baldwin, on motion, the assessment list and papers therewith were referred to the Counsel to the Corporation, for his opinion as to the powers of the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessments to review the action of the Board of Assessors with respect to the amount of damages they may allow to property-owners, by reason of change of grades.

The assessment lists for regulating, grading, setting curb and flagging, in One Hundred and Eighteenth and One Hundred and Nineteenth streets, from Sixth to Seventh avenue, with records of awards for damages to buildings by reason of change of grades, and applications for and objections

to the awards by Simon Sterne, filed by John A. Beall, attorney, and also the petitions and objections of Theodosia Baldwin, executrix, etc., filed by James A. Deering, attorney were presented by the Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of March 1, 1884.

Mr. Beall, in behalf of Mr. Sterne, and C. B. Augustine, representing James A. Deering, in behalf of Theodosia Baldwin, claimants for the said awards, objected to the amounts awarded as insufficient for the damages sustained.

On motion, the said assessment lists were laid over to await the opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation in the matter of regulating, etc., One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, between Sixth and Seventh avenues, in which the question is also raised as to the power of the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessments to review the action of the Board of Assessors as to awards.

The Comptroller presented the assessment list for paving Forty-third street with granite pavement, from Second to Third avenue, and objections of John McDonald, Bernard Kelly, O'Reilly Brothers, and others, received from the Board of Assessors under date of March 1, 1884.

After hearing Cornelius O'Reilly for the objectors, as to the excessive cost of the work, and Mr. Jasper, Secretary of the Board of Assessors, the assessment list and objections were, on motion, ordered to be returned to the Board of Assessors, with the request that said Board take testimony in regard to the alleged dumping and depositing of rubbish, etc., on the street, after the same had been graded, curbed, etc., and also by whom such alleged deposits had been made.

The Comptroller presented the assessment list for regulating and grading, setting curb and flagging sidewalks, four feet wide, on One Hundred and Twenty-second street, between Seventh and Eighth avenues, received from the Board of Assessors January 3, 1884, with communication dated December 31, 1883, also the objections of Wm. C. Lester, by John C. Shaw, attorney, filed in the Finance Department on January 30, 1884.

Mr. Shaw, having been notified of the meeting, did not appear.

After considering the objections, and hearing Mr. Jasper, Secretary of the Board of Assessors, in explanation of the assessment, on motion, the objections were overruled, and the assessment list confirmed, all the members of the Board voting in the affirmative.

SIR—There were 628 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, March 1, 1884, which is an increase of 36, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 91 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1883. The actual mortality for the week ending February 23, 1884, was 604, which is 34.8 below the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 23.38 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,343,118.

are let for lodgers containing four or more beds in any
apartment therein for the use of lodgers, a permit in
writing from this Department shall be required, and no
person in the City of New York shall have, lease, let, or
keep any such lodging-house or the lodgings therein, or
assist in the keeping, hire, or assist in hiring, or conduct
the business of any such lodging-house, or the lodgings
therein, except pursuant to the terms and con lition of a
permit in writing previously obtained therefor from this
Department, an application for which shall be made in
accordance with the rules and regulations of the Board of
Health by the person or persons who propose to use the
same. The beds in all lodging-houses and in every room
in which beds are let for lodgers shall be separated by a
passageway of not less than two feet, horizonially, and all
the beds shall be so arranged that under each of them the
air shall freely circulate, and there be adequate ventilation. Four hundred (200 cubic feet of air space shall be
provided and allowed for each bed or lodger, and no more
beds shall be permitted than those provided in this way,
naless free and ad quate means of ventilation exist,
approved by the Bourd of Health, and a special permit in
writing be granted therefor, specifying the number of
beds or the cubic air space which shall under special
circumstances be allowed.

AT 9.30 P. M. ON THURSDAY THE 15TH instant, the aqueduct had to be shut off to repar a large leak that could not be repaired in the usual manner from the exterior. This leak had suddenly devoloped in the section south of Yonkers, where smaller fissures had previously occurred.

The examination showed fissures aggregating 2,000 feet in length. The repairs were fini-hed and water was again turned on by 4 f. M., on Saturday, the 17th instant.

While the flow through the aqueduct was interrupted the supply in the Central Park reservor was drawn down five eet.

This loss of supply in the city reservoirs, occurring now, as winter is approaching, makes it necessary to take extra precautions against waste of water. Being aware of the temptation to leave faucets open in cold weather to prevent freezing in the pipes, I specially protest against that practice, and appeal to all citizens to abstain from wasteful use of water in any manner whatever. The present condition of the supply and the possibility of a recurrence of similar leaks in the aqueduct make it my duty to give this public notice that I shall hercinafter resort to the peremptory measure of shutting off the water in all places where per-istent waste is discovered.
