AN ORDINANCE to amend section 169, article IX. of chapter VI. of the Revised Ordinances in force January 1, 1881, as amended by an ordinance approved December 7, 1885.

The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows: Section 1. Section 169, article IX. of chapter VI. of the Revised Ordinances in force January 1, 1881, as amended by an ordinance approved December 7, 1885, is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

"Sec. 169. It shall be the duty of the said gas companies, or the one whose pipes are about to be disturbed by the construction, alteration or repairing of any sewer, culvert, water-main or pipe, or the regulating or grading of any street, on the receipt of the notice provided for in the preceding section, to remove or otherwise protect and replace the main and service pipes, lamp-posts and lamps, where necessary, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works. The company notified in accordance with the preceding section shall comply with such notice by causing the pipes, lamp-posts and lamps to be protected and replaced where necessary during the progress of the work."
