*Opening of Proposals.*

The Comptroller, by representative, attended the opening of proposals at the following Departments, viz.:

March 27. The Department of Public Works—For laying water-mains in the Boulevard, between Ninety-sixth and One Hundred and Eighteenth streets, and for furnishing 800 cast-iron lamp-posts, 1,500 street-lamps, 100 Boulevard lamps, 1,500 additional globes, 8,000 glass street signs, 3,000 cubic yards gravel, 2,000 cubic yards gravel screenings, 1,200 cubic yards broken trap-rock stone and 900 cubic yards trap-rock screenings.

March 29. The Department of Street Improvements, Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards—For constructing an outlet sewer and appurtenances in Tiffany street, from Long Island sound to Longwood avenue, and for regulating, grading, paving, curbing, flagging, etc., in the several streets and avenues enumerated in the advertisement of said Department, dated March 15, 1894, published in the CITY RECORD.

March 29. The Department of Docks—For furnishing sawed yellow pine timber.

March 30. 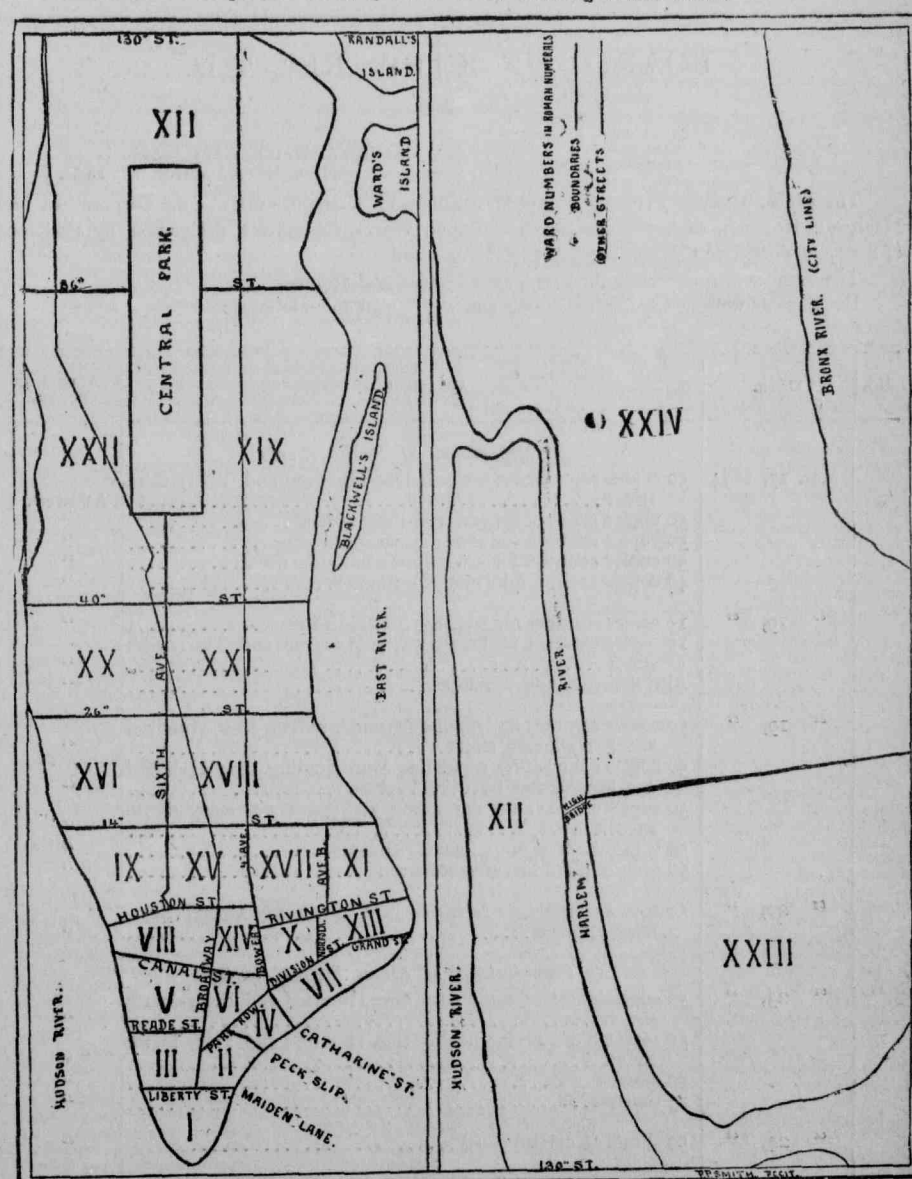

The 873 deaths represent a death-rate of 23.49 against 21.19 for the previous week, and 31.60 for the corresponding week of 1893.

Contagious and infectious diseases show a marked increase, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever and small-pox being respectively 188, 375, 169, 19 and 21, against 159, 309, 176, 8 and 26 for the previous week, a total of 772 against 675. The increase of diphtheria was mainly in the Twelfth, Seventeenth and Nineteenth Wards, and the decrease in the Seventh and Fourteenth Wards. The increase of measles was most marked in the Eighth, Ninth, Thirteenth, Eighteenth, Nineteenth, Twenty-first and Twenty-second Wards, and the decrease in the Fourth, Seventeenth and Twenty-third Wards. The increase of scarlet fever was chiefly in the Seventh, Eleventh and Seventeenth Wards, and the decrease in Twelfth, Nineteenth, Twenty-first and Twenty-second Wards. Nine of the 19 cases of typhoid fever were above Fortieth street, and 6 of the remaining 10 were below Fourteenth street. Thirteen of the 21 cases of small-pox were below Fourteenth street, east of Broadway, and 5 were above Fortieth street.

#### TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereupon liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thereupon be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act:

When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.
