DEPARTMENT OF PARKS.

THURSDAY, OCTOBER 19, 1899—ADJOURNED MEETING, 11 A. M.

Present—Commissioners Clausen (President), Moebus, Brower.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

The following communications were received:

From the Corporation Counsel, advising the Department in the matter of the erection of projections on buildings on Riverside drive, Fifth avenue, adjoining Central Park, and certain other streets or parkways.

Commissioner Clausen offered the following:

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 610 of the Greater New York Charter, the following general rule or ordinance for regulating the erection of oriel or bay-windows or other projections on buildings on Riverside drive; that portion of Fifth avenue lying between Fifty-ninth and One Hundred and Tenth streets, and such other streets or parkways over which this Board may be by law authorized to exercise such control, is hereby enacted:

1. All applications for the privilege of erecting bay-windows or other house projections shall be referred to the Commissioner in whose administrative jurisdiction the park or parkway affected lies, who may in his discretion grant the same upon payment of a fee to be determined in each case by said Commissioner.

2. Working plans in duplicate, drawn to a scale of one-quarter inch to the foot, shall be required to accompany each application, showing elevation plans and vertical section of extent of projection, one copy of which shall be filed in the office of the Department and one, duly certified by said Commissioner, shall be returned to the applicant for filing in the Department of Buildings.

3. No such projection shall extend more than four feet beyond the house or building line.

Commissioner Brower offered the following:

Whereas, The Corporation Counsel has advised that authority to regulate erections and projections on streets within a distance of three hundred and fifty feet from the outer boundary of any park which, prior to January 1, 1898, was exercised by the Commissioners of Public Parks, is not by the terms of the Greater New York Charter now vested in this Department, excepting as to Riverside drive, Fifth avenue, adjoining Central Park, and certain other streets or parkways; and

Whereas, Several certain consents or permits affecting Fifth avenue and Riverside drive have been issued since that date upon applications presented to the Commissioner for the boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, as shown by plans filed in the office of the Department; and

Whereas, Such permits or consents were given in consideration of the payment of a fee in each case, the amounts of which were duly paid to the Department and turned over to the City Treasury; and

Whereas, The Corporation Counsel has advised that such permits should be granted in form prescribed by ordinances enacted by this Board; therefore

Resolved, That all such consents or permits for the erection of projections or bay-windows heretofore given and executed by George C. Clausen, as Park Commissioner for the boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, for which fees have been paid, and which are not inconsistent with the terms of the ordinance this day adopted, be and the same hereby are ratified and confirmed.

1st. Reporting upon an application of William H. Devlin for the improvement of the small park bounded by Manhattan avenue, Morningside avenue and One Hundred and Fourteenth street be and the same hereby is extended to October 25, 1899, as recommended by the Chief Engineer for the boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—Commissioners Clausen, Moebus, Brower—3.

Commissioner Clausen offered the following:

Resolved, That, pursuant to the terms of the contract entered into by this Department with T. E. Crimmins, and dated July 18, 1899, for furnishing and delivering shale sandstone screenings for parks in the Borough of Manhattan, the quantity of material to be furnished be and hereby is increased, as may be required, not exceeding twenty-five per cent.

Resolved, That under the power conferred by law upon the Board of Health, the following additional amendment to the Sanitary Code for the security of life and health, be and the same is hereby adopted and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:

Sec. 134. That the owners, lessees, tenants and managers of every blacksmith or other shop, forge, coal yard, foundry, manufactory and premises where any business is done, or in or upon which an engine or boiler are used, shall cause all ashes, cinders, rubbish, dirt and refuse to be removed to some proper place, so that the same shall not accumulate at any of the above-mentioned premises or in the appurtenances thereof, nor the same become filthy or offensive. Nor shall any owner, lessee, tenant, manager, engineer, fireman or any other person cause or allow any smoke, cinders, dust, gas, steam or offensive odor to escape or be discharged from any such building, place or premises; and every furnace employed in the working of engines by steam, or in any mill, factory, printing house, dye factory, iron foundry, glass house, distillery, brew house, sugar refinery, bake house, gas works or in any other buildings used for the purposes of trade or manufacture shall be so constructed as to consume or burn the smoke arising therefrom.

1. Bidders must satisfy themselves by personal examination of the location of the proposed work, and by such other means as they may prefer, as to the accuracy of the estimate, and shall not at any time after the submission of an estimate dispute or complain of the statement of quantities, nor assert that there was any misunderstanding in regard to the nature or amount of the work to be done.

2. Bidders will be required to complete the entire work to the satisfaction of the Armory Board, and in substantial accordance with the specifications of the contract and the plans therein referred to. No extra compensation, beyond the amount payable for the work here mentioned, which shall be actually performed at

the prices therefor, to be specified by the lowest bidder, shall be due or payable for the entire work.

Bidders will state in their estimates a price for the whole of the work to be done, in conformity with the approved form of contract and the specifications therein set forth, by which price the bids will be tested. This price is to cover all expenses of every kind involved in or incidental to the fulfillment of the contract, including any claim that may arise through delay, from any cause, in the performing of the work thereunder.

Bidders will distinctly write out, both in words and in figures, the amount of their estimates for doing this work.

The person or persons to whom the contract may be awarded will be required to attend at this office, with the sureties offered by him or them, and execute the contract within five days from the date of the service of a notice to that effect, and in case of failure or neglect so to do, he or they will be considered as having abandoned it and as in default to the Corporation, and the contract will be readvertised and relet, and so on until it be accepted and executed.

Where more than one person is interested it is requisite that the verification be made and subscribed to by all the parties interested.
