MINUTES, LOCAL BOARD OF CHESTER, TWENTY-FIFTH DISTRICT.

Pursuant to call by President Haffen, the members of the Local Board of Chester, Twenty-fifth District, met at the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street and Third avenue, in Bronx Borough Municipal Building, on Thursday, July 12, 1906, at 9.30 a. m.

Present—President Haffen, Alderman Mulligan, Alderman Dinwoodie.

Minutes of the previous meeting were adopted as typewritten.

Hearings Pursuant to Advertisement in the CITY RECORD.

311. Regulating and grading, setting curbstones and flagging sidewalks a space four feet wide, laying crosswalks, building approaches and erecting fences where necessary in Tremont avenue (One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street), from the eastern end of the proceeding now pending on that avenue at the Eastern Boulevard to Fort Schuyler road.

Petition of Edward H. Tobey and six others, representing 388 acres along Fort Schuyler road and the East river, was read. No one appeared in opposition.

Laid over awaiting report of the Chief Engineer as to the estimated cost of the proposed work, and a statement of the assessed valuation of the real estate within the probable area of assessment.

312. Constructing temporary sewers and appurtenances in White Plains road (west side), between East Two Hundred and Eighth street (Elizabeth street) and East Two Hundred and Fifth street (King street).

Petition of Charles L. Ullman and three others, was read. No one appeared in opposition.

Laid over awaiting report of the Chief Engineer as to the estimated cost of the proposed work, and a statement of the assessed valuation of the real estate within the probable area of assessment.

313. Regulating and grading, setting curbstones and flagging sidewalks a space four feet wide, laying crosswalks, building approaches and erecting fences where necessary in South Oak drive, between Cruger avenue and Bronxwood avenue and North Oak drive, between Cruger avenue and South Oak drive, and north Chestnut drive, from Barnes avenue to Bronxwood avenue.

Petition of C. E. Sawyer and thirteen others was read. Laid over awaiting report of the Chief Engineer as to the estimated cost of the proposed work, and a statement of the assessed value of the real estate within the probable area of assessment. No opposition.

No. 314. Regulating and grading, setting curb stones and flagging sidewalks, a space four feet wide, laying crosswalks, building approaches and erecting fences where necessary in Rosewood avenue (Locust avenue), between White Plains road and Cruger avenue.

Petition of C. E. Sawyer and thirteen others was read. No one appeared in opposition.

Laid over awaiting report of the Chief Engineer as to the estimated cost of the proposed work and a statement of the assessed value of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment.

No. 315. Laying out on the map of The City of New York a widening of East Two Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, from Bronx terrace or Bronx boulevard to Laconia avenue, from 50 feet to 100 feet, and an extension of Eastchester road, from Laconia avenue to East Two Hundred and Twenty-fifth street.

Petition of John Haas and eighteen others was read, as was also report of the Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx. No one appeared in opposition, and on motion, duly seconded, the Board unanimously adopted the following:

Resolved, That the Local Board of Chester, Twenty-fifth District, hereby recommends to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the laying out on the map of The City of New York a widening of East Two Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, from Bronx terrace or Bronx boulevard to Laconia avenue, from 50 feet to 100 feet, and an extension of Eastchester road, from Laconia avenue to East Two Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, Borough of The Bronx, City of New York.

No. 316. Acquiring title to Eastchester road, from East Two Hundred and Twenty-fifth street to Williamsbridge road, and East Two Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, from Bronx boulevard to Eastchester road, to be acquired in one proceeding, as these streets form one continuous highway or boulevard.

Petition of W. S. Jutten and two others was read. No one appeared in opposition. Laid over, awaiting report of the Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx.

No. 317. Acquiring title to Sedden street, from MacClay avenue to West Farms road.

Petition of M. Nathan and two others was read. Wm. F. Burrough appeared in favor, representing the petitioners. No one appeared in opposition.

Laid over, as the report of the Chief Engineer stated that section 46 of the final maps of the Borough were not filed as yet.

No. 318. Acquiring title to Buck street, from Zerega avenue to Seddon street.

Petition of Marcus Nathan and three others was read, as was also report of the Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx. As section 46 of the final maps of the Borough of The Bronx were not filed as yet, the matter was laid over. No one appeared in opposition to the petition.

No. 319. Acquiring title to the widening and extension of Becker avenue (or Two Hundred and Forty-first street), from the White Plains road or boulevard to the centre line of the Bronx river, Wakefield, Borough of The Bronx, New York City.

Petition of James A. Varian and nine others, as well as report of the Chief Engineer of the Borough, were read.

Mr. A. C. Hottenroth, representing the property owners along the line of the improvement, appeared in favor.

No one appeared in opposition.

On motion, duly seconded, the following was adopted:

Resolved, That proceedings be and the same are hereby initiated for acquiring title to the widening and extending of Becker avenue (or Two Hundred and Forty-first street), from the White Plains road or boulevard to the centre line of the Bronx river, Wakefield, Borough of The Bronx, City of New York.

Unanimously adopted.

No. 320. Regulating and grading, setting curbstones and flagging sidewalks a space 4 feet wide, laying crosswalks, building approaches and necessary drains and appurtenances in West Farms road, from the Bronx river to the easterly side of Morris Park avenue, and paving the roadway thereof with granite blocks on a sand foundation.

Petition of Charles H. Graham and six others was read.

Estimated cost, \$45,600. Assessed value of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment is \$334,000. No opposition.

On motion, duly seconded, the Board unanimously adopted a resolution in favor of initiating proceedings for this improvement.

No. 321. Paving with granite blocks on sand foundation Devoe avenue, between West Farms road and East One Hundred and Eightieth street, and setting curb where necessary.

Petition of Bronx Consumers' Ice Company, by M. Cafilisch, secretary, and others was read. No one appeared in opposition.

Laid over, awaiting report of the Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx.

On motion, duly seconded, the Board respectfully recommended to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that a date be fixed for the vesting of title to West Farms road, from Bronx river to east side of Morris Park avenue.

Adopted.

No. 322. Regulating and grading, setting curbstones and flagging sidewalks a space four feet wide, laying crosswalks, building approaches and erecting fences where necessary in Westchester avenue, from Main street (West Farms road) to Eastern Boulevard at Pelham Bay Park.

Petition of George Joseph and five others was read. No one appeared in opposition.

Laid over awaiting report of the Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx.

No. 323. Regulating and grading, setting curbstones, flagging sidewalks a space four feet wide, laying crosswalks, building approaches and erecting fences where necessary in Railroad avenue, between Unionport road and Glebe avenue.

Petition of Mrs. K. Sehring and four others was read. No one appeared in opposition.

Laid over awaiting report of the Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx.

No. 94. Acquiring title to the lands necessary for Ten Broeck avenue, from Pelham Parkway South to Pierce avenue.

Petition of Sound Realty Company, by Hyman Sonn, vice-president, was read, as was also report of the Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx, dated May 17, 1906, from which it appeared that sections 41 and 46 of the final maps of the Borough, on which Ten Broeck avenue is shown, were not filed as yet.

Mrs. Miller and Mrs. Abbott appeared in opposition to acquiring title to the avenue at this time. Mr. Wm. J. Arnou appeared in favor of the petition and filed an additional brief signed by himself, Fannie Falvey, L. P. Fries, James Fowles and over fifty other owners of property, in favor of the petition as advertised.

On motion, the matter was laid over until August 2, 1906.

No. 281. Constructing a temporary sewer and appurtenances in Unionport road, between Columbus avenue and Morris Park avenue.

Petition of John A. Fitzsimons and others was read. No opposition at the hearing.

Estimated cost, \$3,000. Assessed value of the real estate, with improvements, included within the probable area of assessment is \$70,450.

On motion, duly seconded, the Board unanimously voted in favor of initiating proceedings for this improvement.

No. 62. Acquiring title to Unionport road, from White Plains road to the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway.

Petition of J. Muscovitz and five others and the report of the Chief Engineer of the Borough were read.

There being no opposition at the hearing the Board unanimously voted in favor of initiating proceedings for this improvement.

Adopted.

No. 294. Regulating and grading, setting curbstones and flagging sidewalks a space four feet wide, laying crosswalks, building approaches and erecting fences where necessary in Briggs avenue, from Bronx river to Pelham Bay Park. Amended to Briggs avenue (Gun Hill road), from White Plains road to Baychester avenue, at or near Pelham Bay Park.

Petition of Sound Realty Company by Max Marx, president, was read.

Total estimated cost of the work to be between White Plains road and Baychester avenue, \$331,000. Assessed value of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment is \$806,165.

It appears from the report of the Engineer of Highways that Briggs avenue terminates at Baychester avenue and does not extend to Pelham Bay Park, as called for in the petition.

On motion, duly seconded, the Board recommended that the petition be amended in accordance with the suggestion of the Engineer of Highways. No one appeared in opposition at the hearing; therefore, on motion of Alderman Dinwoodie, duly seconded, the Board

Resolved, That proceedings be initiated for this improvement.
Unanimously adopted.

No. 299. Paving with asphalt block on a concrete foundation East One Hundred and Eighty-fifth street, from Park avenue to Third avenue, and setting curb where necessary.

Petition was not opposed at the hearing.

Estimated cost, \$7,000. Assessed value of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment is \$233,500.

Sewer is in between Park avenue and Washington avenue; also water between Park and Third avenues; and gas mains laid between Park and Washington avenues.

Discontinuing Edgewater road, from the centre of Tiffany street to what is known as "ship basin," Borough of The Bronx, and closing and extending streets in the area bounded by Viele avenue, Bryant avenue and the East river.

Petition of East Bay Land and Improvement Company, by Chas. H. Patrick, president, was read, which represented an ownership of 33 lots.

The report of the Chief Engineer suggested that this land might be taken for a public park; also that there is no objection to extending to the bulkhead line Bryant street, Faile street and Coster street; also to the closing of Edgewater road, from Coster street to Bryant street, or the ship basin.

President Haffen said that he did not see any necessity for closing Edgewater road.

Mr. Chas. H. Patrick appeared in favor of the petition as signed by him as President of the East Bay Land and Improvement Company.

Report.

This matter having been referred back by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to the President of the Borough of The Bronx on the adverse report of the Chief Engineer of the Board, additional surveys and investigations were made and two sketches prepared, marked "A" and "B," which are herewith submitted for the consideration of the Local Board.

On sketch "A," North street is retained on its line from Walton avenue to Morris avenue; at its intersection with former Second avenue, a street is laid out covering the former Second avenue and running along the wall of the Grand Boulevard and Concourse to an intersection with East One Hundred and Seventy-fifth street. This line is designated by letters A, B and D.

The plot of land bounded by Morris avenue, old Second avenue and North street, is to be used to provide steps to connect the low level of North street with the Grand Boulevard and Concourse.

The grade between A and B is about 9 per cent., and from B to D about 9.7 per cent.

Sketch "B" which, I believe, is the most feasible and cheapest, provides for access from Walton avenue to the Grand Boulevard and Concourse by using North street, from Walton avenue to the old Second avenue, thence running on old Second avenue up to the Grand Boulevard and Concourse on the line marked A, B and C.

Steps are to be provided from the intersection of North street and Second avenue with Morris avenue.

The grade from A to B is about 11 per cent. and from B to C, about 12 per cent.

No. 90. Map or plan showing the widening of West One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street, from Harlem river terrace to Fordham road, from 80 feet to 100 feet; the widening of Harlem river terrace, from West One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street to Fordham road, from 50 feet to 80 feet, and the laying out of two plazas in the block bounded by West One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street, Harlem river terrace and Fordham road, as an approach to the bridge over the Harlem river, in the Twenty-fourth Ward, Borough of The Bronx, City of New York.

The above change of map was suggested in report of the Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx, dated February 27, 1906, and was advertised for a public hearing in the CITY RECORD and local papers.

Mr. J. B. Powers appeared in opposition to part of the proposed change.

Alderman Morris, to whom the matter had been referred, reported in favor of the Chief Engineer's proposition.

Resolved, That when the matter of East One Hundred and Sixty-first street widening is reconsidered that it be taken up in executive session.

Unanimously adopted.

Water mains for East One Hundred and Eighty-first street, between Park and Third avenues, where not already laid.

Respectfully recommended to the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

By Alderman Morris—

Complaint has been made by citizens that the schedule of the Interborough surface railroad and the Union Railroad, particularly along Jerome avenue and Burn-

side avenue, as well as One Hundred and Eighty-ninth street and on Fordham road, is inadequate for increasing traffic.

On motion, duly seconded, the Secretary was directed to communicate with the presidents of the various surface railroads in this Borough and urge them to provide better railroad accommodations for this Borough, and that free transfers be given from the Interborough surface and the Union Railway Company lines to the Manhattan Railway and the Interborough subway lines, instead of charging an additional three cents fare as at present.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the Chief Examiner be and he hereby is directed to proceed with a non-competitive examination of C. A. Holmquist, No. 334 Plymouth avenue, Rochester, to qualify him for provisional appointment to the position of Assistant Engineer in the Board of Water Supply, under the provisions of Civil Service Rule XII., paragraph 3.

A communication was presented from Alfred D. Flinn, Department Engineer, Board of Water Supply, dated June 9, stating that the Commission's delay in certifying the lists of eligibles for provisional appointment in that Department had caused it serious inconvenience, and requesting that such certification be hastened. The Secretary was instructed to inform Mr. Flinn that the Commission regretted exceedingly any inconvenience that he had been caused in the matter, but that the Chief Examiner was doing his best to meet the demands of the various departments with the examining force at his disposal.

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the Department of Health requesting the Commission to grant a non-competitive examination to Mr. Constant A. Benoit, East Twenty-seventh street, Sheepshead Bay, Brooklyn, to qualify him for provisional appointment to the position of Chemist in that Department, pending the establishment of an eligible list. The request was granted, and the Chief Examiner was instructed to proceed with a non-competitive examination of the candidate in accordance with Rule XII., paragraph 3. A communication was presented from the Secretary of the Civil Service Reform Association, dated June 8, with reference to the increase in salary of Mr. Alton T. Roberts, Statistician, from \$1,200 to \$1,800 per annum, under the authority of Rule XV., paragraph 12, and his subsequent transfer from the Bureau of Buildings, Manhattan, to the Board of Water Supply at the increased salary, and also renewing his request that the Commission rescind paragraph 12 of Rule XV. The Secretary was instructed to communicate with Mr. Goodwin and state that Mr. Roberts' increase in salary to \$1,800 was made under the authority of that rule, and that the length of time that elapsed between the time of his increase in salary and his transfer to the Board of Water Supply the Commission believed to be unimportant; that his request for the cancellation of paragraph 12 of Rule XV. was still under consideration, the Commission being in doubt of the effect of such a step in view of the recent decision of Mr. Justice Bischoff in the case of Douglass vs. Baker.

The request of Jeremiah J. Bevan, Westchester, New York, that he be permitted to correct the date of birth on his application for Inspector of Incumbrances was granted, it appearing from the birth certificate furnished by him that the date as first given was incorrect.

The request of Jacob Gurtor, No. 115 Eldridge street, that his name be restored to the eligible list for Clerk, Tenement House Department, was granted upon his statement that he never received a notice from the Tenement House Commissioner regarding an appointment to that position, and consequently could not respond.

That non-residents of hospital districts be not admitted to the Allied Hospitals of this Department except in case of accident or great emergency or as special patients of the attending physicians or surgeons.

That undergraduates or students be not admitted to the Out-Patient Department of Gouverneur Hospital on account of the limited space in the clinic rooms.

That the Board of Aldermen be requested to appropriate thirty thousand dollars for the purchase of furniture, fittings, apparatus, etc., for the new Harlem Hospital.

Referring to the question that the Department of Charities be remunerated for the nurses who are on duty in the Allied Hospitals, it is recommended that in the future the graduate nurses be placed on the pay rolls of the respective hospitals.

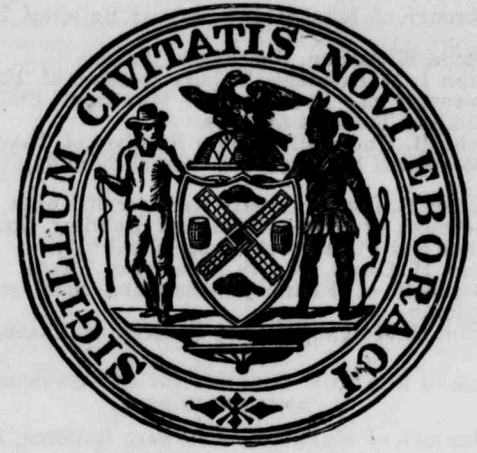

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof.
