

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BOARD OF PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS.

The Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York met at the office of the Board, No. 21 Park row, on Wednesday, May 9, 1900, at z o'clock P. M., pursuant to notice.

The roll was called and the following members were present and answered to their names: The Commissioner of Water Supply, the Commissioner of Highways (Deputy Commissioner Shannon), the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, the Commissioner of Sewers, the Commissioner of Fublic Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, the Commissioner of Bridges, the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the Fresident of the Borough of Richmond.

The President, Hop. Maurice F. Holshan, presided.

The President offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Whereas, It appears by the minutes of the 2d instant that a resolution was adopted by this Board for widening Cauldwell avenue, from One Hundred and Filty-eighth to One Hundred and Sixty-third street, and a form of ordinance approved for transmission to the Manicipal Assembly; and

Whereas, No such resolution was adopted nor ordinance approved; and
Whereas, The resolution which was adopted by said Beard was to discontinue all proceedings
in the matter of widening Cauldwell areane, from One Hundred and Fifty-eighth to One Hundred
and Sixty-third street; now, be it
Resolved, That said minutes of the second instant in the above matter are corrected to read

"Reselved. That the Board of Public Improvements, deeming it for the public interest, does hereby discontinue all proceedings for widening Cauldwell avenue, from One Hundred and Fifty-eighth to One Hundred and Sixty-third street."

OPENING ELIMERE PLACE, BRONX.

The following communication from the Corporation Counsel was read :

OFFICE OF THE CORPORATION COUNSEL, NEW YORK, April 28, 1900.

Hon. MAURICE F. HOLAHAN, President of the Board of Public Improvements :

Siz—I transmit herewith, for action by your Board, petition and stipulation of Frederick J.

Middlehrook and the Tremont Land Company, by which it is agreed that, in the case of the
vesting of title in The City of New York on the appointment of Commissioners in proceedings to
open Elamere place, from Marmion avenue to Southern Boulevard, the petitioners will waive any
claim for interest on awards to be made for the value of the land taken.

They appear to be the owners of all the street to be acquired, except a frontage of 21.25 feet
at the corner of Marmion avenue.

To the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York .:

We, the undersigned, Frederick J. Middlebrook and the Tremont Avenue Land Company, a domestic corporation, do bereby jointly petitics your Honorable Board:

First—To provide that title to the premises to be acquired for the spening of Elamere place, from the easterly side of Marmion avenue to the westerly side of the Southern Boolevard, be vested in The City of New York immediately upon the appointment of the Commissioners to be appointed in the proceeding to be taken for the acquiring of mid title, and shows.

Second—That the peritioner, Frederick J. Middlebrook, is the owner of the premises proposed to be taken for said Elamere place, and also of all the land on both sides thereof with the exception of twenty-one and twenty-live one-hundredths feet at the corner of Marmion avenue, and that the petitioner, the Tremont Avenue Land Company, is vesiled under contract of sale of all of said premises now held by said Frederick J. Middlebrook, and that the vended is destrouted disposing of said premises fronting upon said proposed Elamere place, so that as speedily as possible said Elamere place may be improved by the erection of attractive dwelling houses, but will not do so until, and onless, title can be vested in the City to said proposed Elamere place, so that no question of dedication thereof may arise.

Third—That the reason for such request is so that the petitioner, the Tramont Avenue Land Company, may give deeds wherever proper or necessary which shall front upon said proposed Elamere place, without any question of dedication.

Fourth—That in order to accomplish such end, and so that no harm or injury of any kind may came to the municipality, we, the undersigned, do hereby stipulate and agree to accept awards for the damage done by the taking of such property without interest of any kind until the filling of the report of the Commissioners, that thereby the purpose of the Honorable Comptroller to prevent the running of laterest against the City may be faily carried out, and that the said property fronting

CHANGE OF GRADES OF TWELFTH AVENUE, BEOOKLYN.

The following report from the Topographical Engineer was read:

Six—In raply to the action taken by the Board of Public Improvements referring for repart communication from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn recommending change of grade of Twelfth avenue, between Sixtieth atreet and Sixty-foorth street, I wish to state that consultation was held with the Chief Engineer of the Department of Highways, Barough of Brooklyn, with the result that the accompanying map, entitled, "Plan and Profile showing change of grades in Twelfth Avenue, between Sixtieth Street and Sixty-fifth Street, in the Thirtieth Ward, Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York," was prepared and is herewith presented for a public hearing and adoption.

The question whether a temporary or permanent bridge be constructed should be solved definitely by concluding to build a permanent structure over the tracks of the railroad, the expense of which should be shared equally by the railroad company and the Manierpality. How the attitude of the railroad company is in regard to contributing their slite towards defraying the cost is not known, and it is advisable, therefore, to send a special notice to the railroad company to attend the public hearing.

Whether the City can proceed with the regulating and grading of Twelfth avenue, between Sixtieth and Sixty-fifth streets, after this change of grade has been adopted and filed, is a matter which belongs properly to the Department of Highways.

I return the papers in the matter and transmit a technical description for a public hearing.

4th. Thence southwesterly to the intersection of Sixty-second street, the elevation to be 75.0 feet above mean high-water datum;

5th. Thence southwesterly to the intersection of Sixty-third street, the elevation to be 75.0 feet above mean high-water datum;

6th. Thence southwesterly to the intersection of Sixty-fourth street, the elevation to be 80.0 feet above mean high-water datum; as heretofore.

7th. Thence southwesterly to the intersection of Sixty-fifth street, the elevation to be 72.0 feet above mean high-water datum, as heretofore.

All elevations refer to mean high-water datum as established by the Department of High-ways, Borough of Boooklyo.

Resolved, That the President of this Board cause to be prepared for submission to this Board three similar maps or plans for certification and filing in the manner required by law, showing as nearly as possible the nature and extent of the proposed change of grades of the above-named avenue and the location of the immediate adjucent or of intersecting open or established public streets, avenues, roads, squares or places, sufficient for the identification and location thereof.

It is known where the general contractor has received all but his last payment, he being fully paid for his state of the work and his profit, leaving the last payment to be divided among the sub-contractors, he having no money at stake, did not use honest endeavors to complete or make any attempt to remove the violations placed against the building, as the remaining amounts of money belonged to the sub-contractors.

We real that as the general contractors.

We real that as the general contractor places all his equities in such a position that they cannot be attached legally, and where the present conditions of such a rapid and enormous advance of all building material which reaches at least forty per cent., it would be unfair for the City to ask us to assume the risks for the soft benefit of the general contractor.

We furthermore ask that you give us the same privilege of collecting our just debts as is given the steamfifters.

DEAR SIR-I wish to call to your attention certain considerations in relation to the present proposed opening of Silliman place, between Second and Third arenues, in the Borough of Brooklya, in regard to which Mr. Kingsbury of this office saw you on Monday.

Onginally the street was laid out at right angles to Third avenue, but upon the applications of persons in the neighborhood the lines were changed, and a street was laid out by widening Center lane, on the south.

The present proposed opening is made upon an application in which the estate of Horace Holden, owning the land on the south of the proposed street, joined. It was understood that the new street was to follow approximately the present lines of Cedar lane, widened twenty-live feet on the south.

new street was to follow approximately the present lines of Cedar lane, widened twenty-five feet on the south.

I have just discovered that a change was made in the Engineer's office of the Board of Public Improvements, the result of which is that the southerly line of the proposed street, after running 633-37 feet from Second avenue, takes a new course, expressed in the resolution as follows:

"4. Thence easterly deflecting 20 degrees 30 minutes and 21 seconds to the left for 73.42 feet to the western line of Third avenue,"

It appears from the map on file in the Engineer's other that the word "left" in the resolution must be a clerical error for "right."

The object of this change is apparently to make this last course of the southerly boundary of Silliman place a prolongation of the southerly boundary of Ovington avenue. In the apinion of the parties in interest, it will greatly impair the value of the lot at the corner of Third avenue and Silliman place and will make an extremely awkward configuration of the street.

If the last course could be changed so as to run at right angles to Third avenue, it would obviate the principal objections, and I should not be disposed to oppose the proposed street opening, although the land therefor would be taken entirely from the property which I represent.

I should also be disposed to acquiesce if the line, as originally proposed, were followed, making the southerly boundary of Silliman place a continuous straight line.
