BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN.

Regulating, Etc., 12th Avenue.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the assessment list for regulating, grading, curbing, recurring and flagging 12th avenue between 42d and 44th streets and objections of the New York Manufacturers' Real Estate Company, filed by Jas. A. Deering, attorney, and the 42d Street and Grand Street Ferry Railroad Company, filed by James L. Quackenbush, attorney, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of February 25, 1913.

The Board of Assessors reported that the list was originally apportioned 25 per cent. on the property of the City, the dock property, and 75 per cent. on the property on the easterly side of the avenue. At meeting of the Board of Assessors held February 11, 1913, the Board reapportioned the list in the proportion of 40 per cent. on the property on the east side and 60 per cent. on the property of the City.

Mr. James A. Dunn, representing Mr. Deering and Mr. Quackenbush, by representative, were heard in opposition to the assessment.

On motion of the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments the assessment list was referred back to the Board of Assessors, with directions to reduce the amount of assessment charged against the property on the easterly side of the avenue 20 per cent., and as so modified that the assessment be confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

as amended, shall be borne and paid by The City of New York, but that the whole of such cost and expense, including the expense of the Bureau of Street Openings, the cost and expense incurred by the President of the Borough of Queens, in the preparation of rule, damage, benefit and profile maps, for the use thereof; and of the awards, if any, for damages caused by intended regulation and all other expenses and disbursements authorized by section 997 of said title, as amended, shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby; and

Whereas, It appears from the affidavit of the Supervisor of the City Record that due notice was given therein that at the time of the adoption of the resolution directing the institution of proceedings herein to acquire title to the lands required for this improvement that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment would consider a proposed area of assessment as therein described and would give a public hearing thereon upon the 6th day of March, 1913; and

Whereas, At the aforesaid time and place a public hearing was given to all persons interested in such proposed area of assessment who appeared, and such proposed area of assessment was duly considered by this Board;

Resolved, That the area of assessment for benefit in these proceedings be and is hereby fixed and determined to be as follows:

Beginning at a point on the northerly line of Borden avenue where it is intersected by a line bisecting the angle formed by the intersection of the prolongations of the easterly line of Hyatt avenue and the westerly line of Burrough avenue as these streets adjoin Jay avenue, and running thence northwardly along the said bisecting line to a point distant 100 feet westerly from the westerly line of Burrough avenue, the said distance being measured at right angles to Burrough avenue; thence northwardly and always distant 100 feet westerly from and parallel with the westerly line of Burrough avenue and the prolongations thereof, to the intersection with a line distant 100 feet northerly from and parallel with the northerly line of Woodside avenue, the said distance being measured at right angles to Woodside avenue; thence eastwardly along the said line parallel with Woodside avenue to the intersection with the prolongation of a line midway between Lee avenue and Burrough avenue; thence southwardly along the said line midway between Lee avenue and Burrough avenue and along the prolongations of the said line to the intersection with a line bisecting the angle formed by the intersection of the prolongations of the easterly line of Burrough avenue and the westerly line of Adams street as these streets are laid out between Queens boulevard and Laurel Hill boulevard; thence southwardly along the said bisecting line to the intersection with the northerly line of Laurel Hill boulevard, thence southwardly in a straight line to a point on the southerly line of Laurel Hill boulevard where it is intersected by a line midway between Burrough avenue and Columbia avenue; thence southwardly along the said line midway between Burrough avenue and Columbia avenue and along the prolongations of the said line, to a point distant 100 feet southerly from the southerly line of Vandergrift street; thence eastwardly and parallel with Vandergrift street to the intersection with the prolongation of a line midway between Van Sinderen street and Van Tassell street; thence southwardly along the said line midway between Van Sinderen street and Van Tassell street and along the prolongations of the said line, to a point distant 100 feet southerly from the southerly line of Falkner street; thence westwardly and parallel with Falkner street to the intersection with a line bisecting the angle formed by the intersection of the prolongations of the easterly line of Burrough avenue and the westerly line of Mueller street as these streets are laid out at Hull avenue; thence southwardly along the said bisecting line to the intersection with the northerly line of Borden avenue; thence southwardly at right angles to Borden avenue, a distance of 180 feet; thence westwardly and parallel with Borden avenue to the intersection with a line at right angles to Borden avenue and passing through the point of beginning; thence northwardly along the said line at right angles to Borden avenue to the point or place of beginning.

Resolved, By the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, in conformity with the provisions of section 994 of the Charter, that the Corporation Counsel be and he hereby is authorized to enter into agreements relative to the acceptance of deeds of cession to land lying within the lines of the street to which these proceedings relate, and comprising one-half or more of the street width, at a date subsequent to that on which the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment may have been appointed in these proceedings, provided that the title of the grantors be established to his satisfaction and that the sum of one dollar be accepted as an award for the land so ceded, the said agreement being also conditioned upon the release of all of the remaining abutting land owned by the grantor, extending to the centre line of the block and occupying a position approximately at right angles to the land ceded, from any assessment in the proceedings, except its proportionate share of any and all awards that may be made for the taking of buildings acquired, or awards for damages to buildings affected in and by the said proceedings, and its proportionate share of the expenses incurred in said proceedings to the date when the deed is accepted.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

The Secretary presented affidavit of publication showing that the matter had been duly advertised.

On motion of the President of the Borough of Queens the hearing was adjourned for three weeks (March 27, 1913).

Public Hearing on a Modified Area of Assessment in the Matter of Amending the Proceeding for Acquiring Title to Remsen Avenue, from Calamus Avenue to Gwydir Street, and to Remsen Place, from Breck Place to Corinth Avenue, by Excluding the Latter Street, Borough of Queens (Cal. No. 16).

The Secretary presented affidavit of publication showing that the matter had been duly advertised.

No one appearing in favor of or in opposition to the proposed area of assessment, the hearing was closed.

The following resolution was offered:

Resolved, By the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York that the proceeding instituted by said Board on November 2, 1911, for acquiring title to Remsen avenue, from Calamus avenue to Gwydir street, and Remsen place, from Breck place to Corinth avenue, Borough of Queens, be and the same is hereby amended by eliminating therefrom Remsen place, from Breck place to Corinth avenue, the proceeding as amended to relate only to Remsen avenue, from Calamus avenue to Gwydir street.

Whereas, Pursuant to a resolution adopted by the Board on February 6, 1913, due notice has been given in the City Record that the Board would consider a proposed amended district of assessment for the aforesaid proceeding as amended; and

Whereas, On the 6th day of March, 1913, a public hearing was given to all persons interested in such proposed area of assessment who appeared, and such proposed area of assessment was duly considered by this Board;

Resolved, That the area of assessment for benefit in this amended proceeding be and is hereby fixed and determined to be as follows:

Bounded on the northwest by a line midway between Phelps avenue and Remsen avenue and by the prolongations of the said line; on the northeast by the southwesterly right-of-way line of the Main Line Division of the Long Island Railroad; on the southeast by a line midway between Remsen avenue and Woolley avenue and by the prolongations of the said line; and on the southwest by a line midway between Gwydir street and Cornbury place.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Public Hearing on the Removal of Sidewalk Encroachments on the Following Streets: Broad Street, Between Wall Street and Water Street; Beaver Street, Between Whitehall Street and Pearl Street; Exchange Place, Between Broadway and Hanover Place; Wall Street, Between Broadway and Pearl Street; Pine Street, Between Broadway and Pearl Street, and Cedar Street, Between West Street and Pearl Street, Borough of Manhattan (Cal. No. 17).

The Secretary presented the following Report of the Chief Engineer:

Report No. 12165. February 25, 1913.
Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on February 20, 1913, the President of the Borough of Manhattan presented six (6) resolutions providing for the removal of encroachments on the following named streets:

Broad street, from Wall street to Water street; Beaver street, from Whitehall street to Pearl street; Exchange place, from Broadway to Hanover place; Wall street, from Broadway to Pearl street; Pine street, from Broadway to Pearl street; Cedar street, from West street to Pearl street.

The Board fixed March 6, 1913, as the date for a public hearing on the proposed ordinances and referred them to the Chief Engineer for report.

An examination of these several streets shows that the conditions are similar to those which prevailed on a number of other streets in the lower section of Manhattan from which the removal of encroachments has already been authorized.

With the exception of Broad street, which has a uniform sidewalk width of 17 feet, the width of the sidewalks varies considerably not only on each street, but also on opposite sides of the same street, ranging from a minimum of about 4.5 feet in the two westerly blocks of Exchange place to a maximum of about 20 feet on the southerly side of Wall street at William street.

It is believed that there are no encroachments on the portion of Exchange place lying westerly from Broad street, but with this exception there are numerous conspicuous encroachments on every block affected.

The present occupation of the sidewalks differs in degree, and it appears unnecessary to describe each street in detail, but Broad street may be taken as representing typical conditions. The sidewalks on this street have a width of 17 feet, which is approximately one-third greater than the average width on the remaining streets. While the encroachments are in many cases disconnected, they form what may be considered an almost continuous occupancy of the sidewalk to a width of about 6 feet opposite fully 90 per cent. of the frontages. These encroachments consist principally of steps leading up to office buildings, columns and pilasters opposite the entrances thereto, fences protecting areaways, and a large number of platforms approximately one foot above the sidewalk level opposite the entire frontages of a number of buildings.

The encroachments on the sidewalks in the remaining streets affected are generally similar in character but somewhat less numerous. The portions devoted to private use, however, usually consist of a greater proportion of the total width of the sidewalk than is the case on Broad street, this amounting to a maximum of 60 per cent. on each side of Pine street in the section adjoining Pearl street, where the total width of the sidewalks is only 5 feet.

The encroachments on all of these streets constitutes a private occupation of a public thoroughfare, and the proposed removal of these obstructions is in accordance with the policy which has lately prevailed in the Borough of Manhattan, and which has resulted so beneficially.

I would therefore recommend that the resolutions presented by the President of the Borough of Manhattan be approved. Respectfully,

After hearing Mr. Frederick L. Allen, who appeared on behalf of the Mutual Life Insurance Company, in opposition to the resolution affecting Cedar street, Messrs. Shearman and Sterling, on behalf of the National City Bank, in opposition to the resolution affecting Wall street, and Mr. L. Napoleon Levy, representing property owners, in opposition to the resolution affecting Broad street, on motion of the President of the Borough of Manhattan the hearing was adjourned for three weeks (March 27, 1913).

Removal of Encroachments on West Twenty-eighth Street from Broadway to a Point 100 Feet West of Sixth Avenue, Borough of Manhattan (Cal. No. 18).

The Secretary presented the following Report of the Chief Engineer:

Report No. 12164. February 25, 1913.

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on February 13, 1913, the President of the Borough of Manhattan submitted a resolution providing for the removal of encroachments on West 28th street from Broadway to a point 100 feet west of Sixth avenue, which was referred to the Chief Engineer of the Board for report.

On March 21, 1912, the Board adopted a resolution providing for the removal of encroachments on this street from Broadway to Third avenue, and the resolution now presented is evidently intended to complete the improvement by providing easy access for pedestrians to the elevated railroad and Hudson Tubes Stations at Sixth avenue.

An examination shows that the encroachments are quite similar in character to those on the portion of this street previously considered. The sidewalks have a total width of 15 feet and the most conspicuous occupancy of this space occurs on both sides of the street opposite a number of high stoop houses where steps encroach six feet. There are also four elevated railroad stairways six feet wide adjoining the curb at Sixth avenue with entrances under them leading to the Hudson Tubes. Opposite the stairway at the northeasterly corner two frame storm doors restrict the available sidewalk space to about six feet.

It is recommended that the resolution submitted by the President of the Borough of Manhattan be approved. Respectfully, NELSON P. LEWIS, Chief Engineer.

Resolved, That the President of the Borough of Manhattan be and he is hereby authorized to remove or cause to be removed all said encroachments or encumbrances in accordance with the foregoing resolution.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—16.

Removal of Encroachments on Washington Avenue, between 3d Avenue at 159th Street and Fordham Road; on 3d Avenue, Between Harlem River and Fordham Road; and on East 177th Street, Between Webster Avenue and Boston Road, Borough of The Bronx (Cal. No. 19).

Resolved, That the Local Boards of the Bay Ridge and Flatbush Districts hereby recommend to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment an alteration in the map or plan of The City of New York by changing the grade in Bay 7th street, from Bath avenue to Cropsey avenue; and it is hereby

Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its approval.

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—Herewith is transmitted a joint resolution of the Local Boards of the Bay Ridge and Flatbush Districts, Borough of Brooklyn, adopted on November 14, 1912, recommending a change in the grade of Bay 7th street between Cropsey avenue and Bath avenue.

This change provides for the insertion of a summit in the block affected at a point distant 400 feet south of Bath avenue, the grade at this point being raised nearly six feet. Information is presented with the resolution to show that the effect of the change will be to legalize the lines to which improvements have already been made, these comprising a roughly graded roadway and the erection of six buildings on the abutting property. The resulting gradient to the north appears to be ample for drainage, while that to the south is at a rate of less than three per cent.

I see no reason why the change should not be approved, and would recommend such action after a public hearing.

Changing the Lines and Grades of the Street System Within the Territory Bounded by Concord Street, Jay Street, Sands Street and Bridge Street, Borough of Brooklyn (Cal. No. 22).

The Secretary presented the following communication from the Acting President of the Borough of Brooklyn and report of the Chief Engineer:

The City of New York, Office of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, Brooklyn, February 24, 1913.

JOSEPH HAAG, Esq., Secretary, Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Dear Sir—Under date of January 9, 1913, you enclosed a copy of letter from the Commissioner of Bridges, dated November 11, 1912, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and a printed memorandum of Chief Engineer Nelson P. Lewis, dated January 3, 1913, in the matter of readjusting the street system and grades in the territory bounded by Jay street, Sands street, Bridge street and Concord street, including and adjoining the Manhattan Bridge Plaza, this Borough.

The Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate recommended that the plans submitted by the Bridge Commissioner to that Board for approval, providing for these proposed modifications of the street system adjacent to the Plaza of the Manhattan Bridge, be referred to the Borough President for investigation, and that he outline such ordinances as may properly be adopted, in order to secure a suitable allotment of the roadway and sidewalk spaces for streets adjoining the Plaza, in accordance with a resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate on February 9, 1911.

The recommendations of Chief Engineer Lewis have been given serious consideration, and the Chief Engineer of our Topographical Bureau has prepared detailed report copy of which I herewith enclose. Map has been prepared providing for the adoption of changes of grades in the street system laid out within the territory bounded by Bridge street, Concord street, Jay and Sands streets, copy of which I also enclose for favorable consideration of your Board. It is also recommended that a resolution be passed, fixing the curb lines as shown on the map and designating the widths of roadways and sidewalks. Yours very truly,

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on January 9, 1913, a plan was submitted by the Commissioner of Bridges showing the modifications proposed in the street system within the territory bounded by Concord street, Jay street, Sands street and Bridge street in the Borough of Brooklyn, to include the various readjustments required in the vicinity of the plaza of the Manhattan bridge. The matter was thereupon referred to the President of the Borough of Brooklyn for examination and report, with the further recommendation that such changes as appear to him commendable be incorporated upon a new map prepared to conform with the rules generally observed by the Board in the matter of changes in the City plan, and also that a form of ordinance might be outlined indicating the apportionment of the roadway and sidewalk spaces of the various streets affected.

With accompanying communication from the Acting Borough President bearing date of February 24, 1913, there is submitted a new map making definite provision for the incorporation upon the City plan of the changes deemed advisable in the territory described by the Bridge Commissioner, the lines indicated being essentially those proposed by the Bridge Department, which Department it is understood has concurred in the minor modifications now proposed.

The changes include a readjustment in the grade of the Flatbush avenue extension from Concord street to Nassau street, and of Nassau street from Jay street to Bridge street, these providing for raising the elevation of the intersection of the Flatbush avenue extension with Nassau street about 1 foot, and as required to secure a covering over the subway leading to the bridge, together with an adjustment of the grade of a large open space adjoining this intersection to conform with the subway and surface railroad needs. The plan also shows the platform grades at all of the remaining street intersections where it is understood that the elevations now proposed will legalize existing conditions.

The map also shows a street crossing the lands acquired for the bridge plaza to connect the Flatbush avenue extension where it meets Nassau street with Bridge street at its intersection with High street. It is understood that while this street is shown as a part of the highway system, jurisdiction over it will remain in the Commissioner of Bridges unless at some later date it is transferred to the Borough President as a result of a request by the heads of both of these branches of the City government to the Sinking Fund Commissioners.

It has evidently been found impracticable to draft an ordinance which would clearly outline the roadway and sidewalk treatment which it is desired to legalize for this area, and it is suggested that provision for accomplishing this be made through the adoption of a resolution fixing the lines to conform with those shown on the plan, this providing for incorporating what was formerly the easterly sidewalk space of Jay street in the two blocks between Sands street and Nassau street, the northerly sidewalk space of Nassau street in the block between Jay street and the Flatbush avenue extension, and the westerly sidewalk space of Bridge street in the block between High street and Sands street within the roadway space of these streets, with the understanding that sidewalks will be provided on the adjoining area acquired by the city for the use of the Bridge Department; the effect of these changes will be the securing of wide thoroughfares ample for meeting the anticipated traffic needs in the immediate vicinity of the bridge. This regular outline of the Flatbush avenue extension in the block between Concord street and Nassau street is to be subdivided into a centrally located roadway with a width of 80 feet, harmonizing with that heretofore fixed in the section south of Concord street, with provision for a narrow marginal roadway near the westerly street line, and for a similar narrow roadway between the Flatbush avenue extension and Bridge street to be used by trolley cars crossing the bridge as a point where the motive power can be changed from the underground to the overhead system without interference with vehicular traffic.

I see no reason why the map should not be adopted, and would recommend such action after a public hearing. In case the plan meets with the approval of the Board, I would also recommend the adoption of a resolution fixing the roadway and sidewalk treatment to coincide with that indicated on the map.

Sir—Herewith is transmitted a resolution of the Local Board of the Williamsburg District, Borough of Brooklyn, adopted on March 14, 1912, recommending a change in the City plan by laying out public parks to comprise the block bounded by South 5th street, Wythe avenue, South 4th street and Berry street, together with that portion of the block bounded by South 5th street, Berry street, South 6th street and Wythe avenue, not already owned by the City.

The former area comprises 1.86 acres, which is valued on the books of the Department of Taxes and Assessments for the year 1911 at \$209,800, of which amount \$112,200 is charged to buildings. The remaining area comprises 0.28 acres, which is valued by the Tax Department for the year 1911 at \$41,700, of which amount \$21,600 is assigned to buildings. It would therefore appear that these projects relate to a combined area of 2.14 acres and represent a total valuation of \$251,500, of which \$133,800, or a little over 50 per cent, is represented by buildings. The resolution is accompanied by a petition bearing about 80 signatures, and the Local Board has also adopted another resolution initiating proceedings for the acquisition of title. No information is presented however, to indicate the willingness of the property owners to assume the expense which would be involved in carrying out the improvement.

A large portion of the block bounded by South 5th street, Berry street, South 6th street and Wythe avenue has already largely been acquired by the City in connection with the Williamsburg Bridge which here crosses it at an elevation very much higher than that of the street system. The bridge lands between the anchorage distant about 200 feet west of Wythe avenue and Bedford avenue have been turned over to public use; the portion of it west of Berry street having been parked, while the property between Berry street and Bedford avenue has been fitted up as a playground.

West of Wythe avenue the territory is largely given up to manufacturing industries and a park would here be of but little benefit.

In my judgment, a project of this kind involving the destruction of so many buildings and such a large expenditure might be more advantageously given a central position in a residential section. I assume, however, that the site has been selected by reason of the large adjoining area already in City ownership, and that it is proposed to merge the bridge holdings into the park space, although a question might be raised as to the practicability of safeguarding the use of the former area from the danger of accident as the result of the use of the bridge highway overhead.

In case the property owners of the section are prepared to assume the expense involved in carrying out the improvement which, it might be noted, would result in an assessment upon all of the territory within a distance of about one-half mile from the park boundary, I see no reason to object to the improvement. I believe, however, that its scope might properly be curtailed by limiting it to the southerly block and possibly by the substitution of the property adjoining the bridge in the block between Berry street and Bedford avenue in a place on the block north of South 5th street.

The matter is submitted to the Board for such action as may be deemed proper. In case the map change is favored, a report will at once be presented concerning the opening proceeding, in which a definite recommendation will be made concerning the boundary of the district of assessment to be fixed for meeting the expense involved.

Jerome Avenue, Ogden avenue and East 161st street have been graded and paved with a permanent pavement, while Woodycrest avenue and Anderson avenue have been regulated and graded. The Commissioner states that the changes now proposed, all of which appear to be of a minor character, are desired in order to legalize existing conditions.

Closing and Discontinuing Spencer Place, Between East 150th Street and the Lands of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, Borough of The Bronx (Cal. No. 27).

Dear Sir—At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on February 6, 1913, a communication from the Property Owners' Association of the 23d Ward, relative to closing and discontinuing Spencer place, between East 150th street and the lands of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, was referred to the President of the Borough of The Bronx.

The petitioners request that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment take action in accordance with the terms of chapter 407 of the laws of 1912 and "an Act for the refunding, cancellation and adjustment of assessments for the opening of Spencer place, between the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad and East 150th street, in the 23d Ward, Borough of The Bronx, City of New York," which became a law April 16, 1912, with the approval of the Governor.

The proceedings for acquiring title to Spencer place, between the limits named, were started November 19, 1897, by the Board of Street Opening and Improvement. Title was vested on May 31, 1899, and confirmed on January 3, 1905. The order confirming the report was entered in the County Clerk's office on January 9, 1905.

At a hearing of the Board of Estimate held on May 18, 1906, the matter of closing Spencer place, between East 150th street and the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad, was referred to a select committee, consisting of the President of the Board of Aldermen, the Comptroller and the President of the Borough of The Bronx. This committee reported to the Board at a meeting held on April 23, 1909, stating that "this portion of Spencer place has a width of only 25 feet, and, as laid out, forms a cul-de-sac, access being given to it only at its southerly end." For these reasons the committee was of the opinion that it might be discontinued without objectionable effect upon the City plan, provided the interests of the owners of the abutting property were not seriously damaged.

This report further recommended that the map change be not favored unless all of the interested property owners executed instruments in a form satisfactory to the Corporation Counsel and releasing the City from all claims for damages in case the street were discontinued. If this is done, the map change could be recommended and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, under the provisions of section 205 of the Charter, could properly dispose of the land to the abutting owners or others, under such terms as should appear to them proper.

I agree with the conclusions of the Special Committee in the foregoing report, and would suggest that its recommendations be followed. Yours truly,

Borough of Queens, bearing date of December 12, 1912, requesting the approval of a plan showing a modification in the lines of Borden avenue between Harold avenue and Lowery street.

The object sought under this plan appears to be the inclusion within the street system of a portion of old Borden avenue immediately adjoining the Calvary Cemetery, which has been in use as a highway for many years. The change involves a corresponding one on the opposite side of the street, and the effect is believed to be one which will decrease the expense involved in carrying out the opening proceeding now in progress. Advantage is taken of the opportunity to adjust the angle formed at the southerly corner of Borden and Greenpoint avenues, to conform with the results of an investigation made at a date subsequent to the time when the final map was adopted.

In 1907 the street plan of this locality was revised in order to permit of the construction of the Sunnyside yard; as a part of this plan the lines of Skillman place, as now shown, were given recognition, but no provision was made for establishing grade at the point where the street adjoins the railroad lands.

The plan now submitted is intended to supply the omission and to fix a grade adjoining the railroad suitable for securing drainage toward Jackson avenue. The elevation proposed is believed to conform with improvements already carried out, these including a number of buildings, together with the filling in of the street, excepting through a short section immediately adjoining the railroad property.

Changing the Line of Cornelia Street, Between Cypress Avenue and Myrtle Avenue, Borough of Queens (Cal. No. 31).

The Secretary presented the following communication from the Acting Corporation Counsel and report of the Chief Engineer:

City of New York, Law Department, Office of the Corporation Counsel, New York, January 31, 1913.

In re Cornelia Street, BBL-FPRD and Consolidated Proceedings, Borough of Queens. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—Block No. 117, Lot No. 1, affected by the above proceeding, is a large triangular parcel of land, bounded on the north by Myrtle avenue and on the south by Cypress avenue, and from the westerly angle of this triangular plot is taken damage parcels 81 and 82, containing 2,434 square feet.

On the remainder of the plot stands a two-story frame hotel, built many years ago. The damage map shows that the southeasterly line of Cornelia street, as proposed, cuts the westerly corner of the building .78 of a foot, and the easterly corner of the building .39 of a foot.

The building covers all of the remaining land owned by the claimant, so that it cannot be moved back of the new line of Cornelia street.

A claim has been presented before the Commissioners by the owner, not only for the value of the parcels taken, but also for the damage caused by the cutting of the building.

The witness called on behalf of the claimant has testified that the damage to the building is the sum of \$7,500. The estimate of the City's witness on the same building for the same injury is, in round numbers, \$1,700.

The claim is a substantial one, and would probably result in an award of not less than \$1,700, with the possibility of an award considerably larger in amount.

On January 28, 1910, the Board adopted the following resolution, viz.:

"Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be and he hereby is requested, before the confirmation of any proceeding, in which substantial damages are claimed for buildings and encroachments which would probably not be actually interfered with, to advise the Board of Estimate and Apportionment as to the

proposed damage allowance for each such parcel, and as to whether the owners would enter into an agreement concerning their retention, as provided under section 971 of the Charter, with the understanding that in cases where full or unreasonable payment is claimed the Board will request the actual removal of the encroachments as soon as the proceeding is confirmed, or will arrange for modifying the street lines in such a way as to avoid the damage."

The damage map shows that damage Nos. 81 and 82, when acquired by the City, will form an open public place at the junction of Myrtle and Cypress avenues.

The line of Cornelia street on this block can be changed so as to avoid the cut in the building without substantially reducing the width of the street, and without making an appreciable diminution in the size of the public place.

I would, therefore, recommend that the line of the street be changed so as to avoid cutting the building and that the rule and damage map be amended accordingly.

Sir—Herewith is transmitted a communication from the Acting Corporation Counsel bearing date of January 31, 1913, recommending a modification in the line of Cornelia street, between Cypress avenue and Myrtle avenue, in the Borough of Queens, in order to avoid damage to a building which encroaches upon the street as heretofore mapped.

A proceeding for acquiring title to Cornelia street from the Brooklyn Borough line to Fresh Pond road, together with adjoining streets, was authorized on September 24, 1909, and was amended on March 23, 1911, to make it conform with the modifications subsequently made in the street lines. The rule and damage maps were approved on June 1, 1911, and the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment filed their oaths on October 14 following.

The street has been given a width of 60.05 feet through that portion of its length west of Forest avenue, and of 50 feet in the section between Forest avenue and Fresh Pond road. The damage map shows that in the short block between Cypress avenue and Myrtle avenue a two-story frame building encroaches from 0.39 to 0.78 feet. The Acting Corporation Counsel states that the owner of this property has presented a claim of damage to the building to the amount of \$7,500, and that the City's expert has testified that the building damage could be estimated at \$1,700; he states that the claim is a substantial one and that the award might possibly be considerably larger than the amount testified to by the City's witness.

Cornelia street in this block forms a large public place, and the Acting Corporation Counsel states that a change in the position of the easterly line would not appreciably affect the street area at this point.

The notice is given in conformity with a resolution adopted by the Board on January 28, 1910, under which the Corporation Counsel was requested to advise the Board in case unreasonable payment was claimed for encroachments in order that steps might be taken to remove them as soon as the proceeding was confirmed, or that the street lines might be modified in such a way as to avoid damage.

I would recommend that the matter be referred to the President of the Borough of Queens with the request that he submit a plan showing the changes proposed by the Acting Corporation Counsel provided that, in his judgment, they can be effected without prejudice to the street system. Respectfully,

Amending the proceeding for acquiring title to Union street, from New York avenue to Rochester avenue, and from Ralph avenue to East New York avenue, by excluding the block between Kingston avenue and Albany avenue, Borough of Brooklyn (Cal. No. 34).

(At the meeting of the Board on January 23, 1913, this matter was laid over for two weeks, but on January 30, at the request of the Borough President, a resolution was adopted amending the resolution of December 12, 1912, providing for vesting title on February 1, 1913, to that portion of Union street between Albany avenue and a line 100 feet westerly therefrom, so as to make it include only the northerly half of the street. This action had also been recommended by the Chief Engineer. On February 6 the matter of amending the proceeding was laid over for two weeks, and on February 20 for two weeks).

Sir—Herewith is transmitted a resolution of the Local Board of the Flatbush District, Borough of Brooklyn, adopted on March 8, 1909, initiating proceedings for acquiring title to East 5th street, from Ditmas avenue to 18th avenue.

This resolution affects two blocks or about 1,200 feet of East 5th street, which has been laid out upon the City map to have a width of 60 feet. The street is macadamized from 18th avenue to a point about 300 feet north of Avenue F and is approximately graded from the latter point to Ditmas avenue. A number of buildings have been erected upon the abutting property, but it is believed that there are no encroachments.

The Corporation Counsel has advised that these two blocks of East 5th street are dedicated to public use, and in recognition of such dedication the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on June 3, 1910, authorized the construction of a sewer in the northerly block. The Board, however, has established the policy of acquiring the fee to dedicate streets where such procedure is recommended by the Local Board having jurisdiction, and I can see no reason why such treatment should not be accorded in this case. It might be pointed out that the awards should be little more than nominal.

I would recommend the approval of the resolution; that title to the land be acquired in fee; that the entire cost and expense of the proceeding, including any damage allowed for intended regulating, be assessed upon the property benefited, and a district of assessment be laid out to comprise the following area:

The Manhattan Beach branch of the Long Island Railroad crosses East 21st street about midway between Avenue H and Avenue I. No physical crossing has heretofore been provided at this intersection, but under a recent map change grades were established for the street, which will permit of the construction of a highway bridge at such a time as a continuous thoroughfare is needed. The agreement between the Long Island Railroad Company and the City, under which the Bay Ridge improvement was carried out, provides for whatever rights the City may ultimately require over the railroad land, and it will therefore be proper to exclude the railroad right-of-way from the opening proceeding.

I would recommend the adoption of a resolution for acquiring title to East 21st street from Avenue C to Avenue J, excluding the right-of-way of the Manhattan Beach Division of the Long Island Railroad.

I would also recommend that title to the land be acquired in fee; that the entire cost and expense of the proceeding, including any damages allowed for intended regulating, be assessed upon the property benefited; and that a district of assessment be laid out to comprise the following area:

JOSEPH HAAG, Esq., Secretary, Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Dear Sir—At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, held on February 20, 1913, a communication from the Interborough Rapid Transit Company, dated February 19, 1913, relative to the matter of acquiring title to Review place from West 238th street to Van Cortlandt Park South, and to West 240th street from Spuyten Duyvil road to Broadway, was referred to the President of the Borough of The Bronx.

The communication from the Interborough Company requests the Board to acquire title in fee to that portion of the street upon which is erected and maintained the structures of the Interborough Rapid Transit Company, subject to the perpetual easement of the said Interborough Rapid Transit Company to maintain and operate its structures thereon. The franchise under which the Interborough Rapid Transit Company operates the subway system in this City is for a definite term of years, and not in perpetuity.

I would therefore recommend that the Board of Estimate acquire title in fee to the land, subject to the easement of the Interborough Rapid Transit Company, and not subject to the perpetual easement. Yours truly,

Dear Sir—At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of January 9, 1913, a map "showing the laying out of 3d avenue over the tracks of the New York and Harlem Railroad from the north line of Welch street, as acquired in 1887 to the south line of Pelham avenue as acquired in 1869, amendment to section 13," was approved.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment is hereby requested to initiate proceedings for the acquiring of title to all the land necessary for the widening of 3d avenue crossing the railroad tracks, as shown on the above map and not now owned by The City of New York. Yours truly,

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—Herewith is transmitted a communication from the President of the Borough of The Bronx, bearing date of February 15, 1913, requesting the institution of proceedings for the acquisition of title to the area included in 3d avenue as widened between East 189th street (Welch street), and Pelham avenue, and as shown upon a map adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment at its meeting of January 9, 1913.

Chapter 731 of the Laws of 1905, as amended by Chapter 736 of the Laws of 1907, provides for the inclusion of this area, which is occupied by the tracks of the New York and Harlem Railroad, in the street system, and for the construction of a bridge and the removal and reconstruction of the Fordham station. The Board of Estimate was also authorized under the terms of the same Act to issue corporate stock to an amount not exceeding \$225,000 to meet the expense involved in carrying out the improvement. The bond issue was authorized on June 3, 1910, but the contract has not yet been executed by the railroad company. It is informally understood that the failure to advance negotiations for construction is due to a claim made by the

New York Central Railroad Company as lessee of the property of the New York and Harlem Railroad Company, for a substantial allowance to represent the value of the rights for street purposes which the City requires, this claim having the effect of increasing the cost to an amount greater than that fixed by the statute.

The land owned by the railroad company and affected by the plan has a width of about 66 feet and a length of about 366 feet, comprising an area about equivalent to that of twenty-five city lots.

When the street plan was approved it was assumed that the terms of the special Acts of the Legislature were such as to clear the way for the occupancy of the area which it is proposed to use for street purposes and that it would not be necessary to apply the provisions of the Railroad Law, and for this reason no formal notice was given to the railroad company relative to the necessity of widening the street as prescribed by the statute in case the Railroad Law is to be applied. The provisions of this statute, however, will apparently have to be observed inasmuch as the railroad company has taken the position that the special Acts of 1905 and 1907 do not adequately clear the way for carrying out the improvement.

Under these conditions, and after giving a formal notice to the railroad companies relative to the necessity for this street, I would recommend the adoption of a resolution instituting proceedings for the acquisition of title to the fee in the land described subject to the easement of the railroad company, and that all of the cost and expense of the proceeding be assessed upon the following described area:

Beginning at a point on the prolongation of a line midway between Washington avenue and Bathgate avenue, where it is intersected by a line distant 100 feet northeasterly from and parallel with the northeasterly line of Fordham road, the said distance being measured at right angles to Fordham road, and running thence southwardly along the said line midway between Washington avenue and Bathgate avenue and along the prolongation of the said line, to the intersection with a line distant 100 feet southwesterly from and parallel with the southwesterly line of Fordham road, the said distance being measured at right angles to Fordham road; thence northwestwardly along the said line parallel with Fordham road to the intersection with a line distant 100 feet northwesterly from and parallel with the northwesterly line of Washington avenue, the said distance being measured at right angles to Washington avenue; thence southwardly along the said line parallel with Washington avenue to a point distant 100 feet easterly from the easterly line of 3d avenue, the said distance being measured at right angles to 3d avenue; thence southwardly and always distant 100 feet easterly from and parallel with the easterly line of 3d avenue, to the intersection with a line distant 100 feet southwesterly from and parallel with the southwesterly line of East 187th street, as this street is laid out between 3d avenue and Bathgate avenue, the said distance being measured at right angles to East 187th street; thence northwestwardly along the said line parallel with East 187th street and along the prolongation of the said line to a point distant 100 feet westerly from the westerly line of 3d avenue, the said distance being measured at right angles to 3d avenue; thence northwardly and always distant 100 feet westerly from and parallel with the westerly line of 3d avenue to a point distant 100 feet northeasterly from the northeasterly line of East 187th street, the said distance being measured at right angles to East 187th street; thence northeastwardly and always distant 100 feet northwesterly from and parallel with the northwesterly line of Decatur avenue to the intersection with a line distant 100 feet northeasterly from and parallel with the northeasterly line of East 194th street, as this street adjoins Webster avenue, the said distance being measured at right angles to East 194th street; thence southeastwardly along the said line parallel with East 194th street and along the prolongation of the said line, to a point distant 100 feet southeasterly from the southeasterly line of Webster avenue, the said distance being measured at right angles to Webster avenue; thence southwestwardly and always distant 100 feet southeasterly from and parallel with the southeasterly line of Webster avenue to the intersection with the prolongation of a line distant 100 feet northeasterly from and parallel with the northeasterly line of East 193d street, as this street adjoins Decatur avenue, the said distance being measured at right angles to East 193d street; thence southeastwardly along the said line parallel with East 193d street to a point distant 100 feet northwesterly from the northwesterly line of Washington avenue, as this street is laid out between East 189th street and Fordham road, the said distance being measured at right angles to Washington avenue; thence southwestwardly along the said prolongation of a line parallel with Washington avenue to the intersection with a line parallel with Fordham road and passing through the point of beginning; thence southeastwardly along the said line parallel with Fordham road to the point or place of beginning.

Resolved, That this Board consider the proposed area of assessment at a meeting of the Board to be held in The City of New York, Borough of Manhattan, in the City Hall, on the 17th day of April, 1913, at 10:30 a.m., and that at the same time and place a public hearing thereon will then and there be had.

Amending the Proceeding for Acquiring Title to Cruger Avenue from Baker Avenue to Rhinelander Avenue, and from White Plains Road to Bronx and Pelham Parkway; to Holland Avenue from Baker Avenue to Hunt Avenue; and to Rhinelander Avenue from White Plains Road to Cruger Avenue, so as to Relate only to Holland Avenue from Baker Avenue to Hunt Avenue, Borough of The Bronx (Cal. No. 40).

The Secretary presented the following communication from the President of the Borough of The Bronx and report of the Chief Engineer:

City of New York, President of the Borough of The Bronx, Office of the President, February 5, 1913.

JOSEPH HAAG, Esq., Secretary, Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Dear Sir—At the meeting of March 7, 1912, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted a resolution authorizing the proceedings for acquiring title to Cruger avenue from Baker avenue to Rhinelander avenue, and from White Plains road to Bronx and Pelham Parkway South, excluding the right-of-way of the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway, to Holland avenue from Baker avenue to Hunt avenue, and to Rhinelander avenue from White Plains road to Cruger avenue.

Due to repeated requests for change of lines of Cruger Avenue, the final maps for this avenue have been delayed and cannot be completed for several months, and therefore the opening maps cannot be forwarded. The owner of the house at the northeast corner of Holland and Van Nest avenues is very desirous of having the Holland avenue proceedings advanced with the Van Nest avenue proceedings, for which latter Commissioners have been appointed. If the Holland avenue and Van Nest avenue proceedings can be carried on together, the City can gain by placing an upset price on this house, which need not be destroyed, but can be moved to another location if the damage to it by reason of the acquiring of title in both streets can be ascertained at the same time.

I would therefore request that the Holland avenue proceedings be separated, and that the Corporation Counsel be requested to apply for the appointment of Commissioners in Holland avenue upon receipt of maps, which will be hastened.

Sir—At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, held on March 7, 1912, a proceeding was instituted for acquiring title to the following streets in the Borough of The Bronx:

Cruger avenue from Baker avenue to Rhinelander avenue, and from White Plains Road to Bronx and Pelham Parkway South; Holland avenue from Baker avenue to Hunt avenue; Rhinelander avenue from White Plains Road to Cruger avenue.

one-half mile, of White Plains road, which here has a width of 100 feet, and was planned as a substitute for the route originally acquired for this street, in order to secure an improved alignment in the section between Bronx and Pelham parkway and Bear Swamp road. Under the resolution of the Board, provision was made for assessing the entire expense of the proceeding upon the property deemed benefited, this comprising the adjoining area to a distance of 880 feet on the east and to an average distance of about 700 feet on the west. In order to clear the way for carrying out a grading improvement a resolution was adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on June 27, 1912, under which title to the street was vested in the City on August 1, 1912.

The rule and damage maps show that the proceeding relates to an area of 273,450.31 square feet, and that three frame dwellings and a number of sheds and hot beds fall largely or wholly within the street lines.

The preliminary report of the Commissioners, dated November 11, 1912, shows that the preliminary awards for damage aggregate \$152,899.49, of which amount \$9,615 represents the allowance for improvements. The report also shows that 20,893 square feet of the property acquired is subject to public easements, and that for this area a nominal award of only \$2 is to be allowed. It would, therefore, appear that the average allowance for the undedicated land taken in this proceeding is at the rate of about \$1,418 per city lot. The total expense involved in the proceeding is estimated at \$177,627.78, and I am informally advised that in distributing the assessment it has been assumed that about 75 per cent. of the benefit accrues to the immediate frontage on the street. The benefit area includes a portion of Bronx Park, against which it is proposed to levy an assessment of \$7,297.35, or about 4 per cent. of the entire cost of the proceeding.

The petitioner for the Hunt estate claims that his assessment for benefit exceeds his award for damage by \$23,359.56; that a street having a width of 60 feet would have been ample to meet the needs of the abutting property; that his holdings have already been assessed for the opening and improvement of White Plains road, as heretofore acquired; that the benefit area fixed in the opening proceeding discriminates against the owners of private property by reason of the assessment district having been made to include a greater area on the easterly side of the street than on the westerly side, thereby exempting land owned by the City within the boundaries of Bronx Park from assessment; that the position and width fixed for this street was required for rapid transit purposes; and that, in order to relieve the property owners from what is claimed to be an unjust burden, the area of assessment should be made to include an area as great as the one fixed in the proceeding for acquiring the section of White Plains road north of Morris Park avenue. For these reasons the Board is asked to accord such relief as it may deem just and proper.

The petitioner for William Vincent Astor alleges that his assessment for benefit is greater than his awards by about \$6,300; that in the proceeding heretofore carried out for acquiring title to White Plains road, north of Morris Park avenue, 40 per cent. of the expense was assumed by the City at large; that the proceeding now in progress was instituted in order to secure an improved alignment for the street and to replace a section erroneously laid out; that the new line will afford a more direct course for the proposed rapid transit line and thereby save the City a substantial expense; and that the City escapes its pro rata share of the expense of the proceeding by reason of a failure to include as large an area in the assessment district on the westerly side of the street as has been laid out on the easterly side. For these reasons the request is made that a substantial part and at least 40 per cent. of the expense of the proceeding be assumed by the City at large.

The Commissioners' report shows that the petitioners are the owners of a large portion of the assessment district and will be called upon to bear about 56 per cent. of the entire expense involved. The awards for the land taken from the Hunt estate appear to be based on an allowance of about \$750 per City lot, while the Astor estate property is valued on the basis of \$1,375 per City lot. The assessments for benefit appear to have been distributed on the assumption that it will apply equally throughout the entire length of the street.

Both of these petitioners cite the case of the proceeding for acquiring title to White Plains road, from Morris Park avenue to the City line, as affording warrant for a belief that they have been discriminated against in the proceeding now in progress, and as affording a precedent for the relief to be extended to them. This proceeding was authorized on September 20, 1899, with provision for placing the entire expense upon the property benefited. It included a length of about four miles of White Plains road, which was here laid out with a width ranging from 100 feet to 250 feet and averaging about 111 feet. On June 9, 1905, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment reconsidered the original determination made by the Board of Public Improvements by placing 40 per cent. of the cost upon the City at large, this relief having been afforded as the result of applying the rule adopted on July 25, 1902, relative to the apportionment of the expense of proceedings relating to streets having a width of more than 60 feet. This rule was abandoned in 1907 and has not been applied to any proceeding instituted subsequent to that date.

The petitioners make no reference to the extension of White Plains road, from Morris Park avenue to West Farms road, which was authorized on April 24, 1901, or to the proceeding relating to that portion of the street between West Farms road and the East River, which was authorized on June 18, 1909, the entire expense of both of which was placed upon the property benefited, notwithstanding that the street forms a continuation of the section so liberally treated and that it has a width throughout of 100 feet.

On April 11, 1912, the Board approved a report submitted by your Engineer, in which recommendation was made that the provisions of the Gerhardt Bill, this permitting of a reconsideration of a determination as to the distribution of the expense of a proceeding, should not be applied in such a way as to impose any portion of the expense upon the City at large unless the improvement was unmistakably of a metropolitan character.

In my judgment, the White Plains road does not fall within this class, but I believe that its local importance may justify the extension of some measure of relief through the enlargement of the area of assessment; to that end I would recommend that, after giving a new public hearing, the district of assessment be amended to comprise the following area:

Beginning at a point on a line midway between Wallace avenue and Barnes avenue distant 100 feet northerly from the northerly line of Mace avenue and running thence southwardly along a line always midway between Wallace avenue and Barnes avenue and the prolongations of these streets as laid out immediately north and south of Bronx and Pelham Parkway to the intersection with the northwesterly line of the unnamed street adjoining the New York, Westchester and Boston Railroad on the west; thence southwardly in a straight line to a point on the southerly line of Bear Swamp Road where it is intersected by a line midway between Wallace avenue and Barnes avenue as these streets adjoin Rhinelander avenue; thence southwardly along the said line midway between Wallace avenue and Barnes avenue to the intersection with a line midway between Rhinelander avenue and Morris Park avenue as these streets are laid out between Wallace avenue and Barnes avenue; thence westwardly along the said line midway between Rhinelander avenue and Morris Park avenue and along the prolongation of the said line to a point distant 100 feet westerly from the prolongation of the westerly line of Unionport road as this street is laid out immediately north of Bronx Part East, the said distance being measured at right angles to Unionport road; thence northwardly and always distant 100 feet westerly from and parallel with the westerly line of Unionport road and its prolongation to the intersection with the prolongation of a line distant 400 feet westerly from and parallel with the easterly line of Bronx Park East as this street is laid out between Brady avenue and Lydig avenue, the said distance being measured at right angles to Bronx Park East; thence northwardly along the said line parallel with Bronx Park East and along the prolongations of the said line to a point distant 100 feet westerly from the prolongation of the westerly line of Bronx Park East as this street adjoins Thwaites place, the said distance being measured at right angles to Bronx Park East; thence northwardly and always distant 100 feet westerly from and parallel with the westerly line of Bronx Park East and its prolongation as laid out at Thwaites place to the intersection with a line parallel with Mace avenue and passing through the point of beginning; thence eastwardly along the said line parallel with Mace avenue to the point or place of beginning. Respectfully, NELSON P. LEWIS, Chief Engineer.

Sir—Herewith are transmitted two resolutions of the Local Board of the Newtown District, Borough of Queens, adopted on July 1, 1909, initiating proceedings for acquiring title to the following streets: Ivy street, from Broadway to Junction avenue; Jennings street, from Broadway to Junction avenue.

These streets are incorporated on Section 26 of the final maps of the Borough, which was approved on May 20, 1910. They do not intersect Broadway as described by the Local Board but have been given a westerly terminus at Justice street. The Local Board resolutions, however, can properly be interpreted as a recommendation to acquire title to the entire street lengths as mapped.

Each street has been given a width of 60 feet and has a length of four blocks, or a little less than one-half mile. They are in use through the greater portion of their lengths, and a number of houses have in each case been erected upon the abutting property. It is believed that none of these encroach upon the land to be acquired.

The streets are adjacent and parallel and can advantageously be made the subject of a single opening proceeding which should be made to relate to Ivy street, from Justice street to Junction avenue, and to Jennings street, between the same limits.

I would also recommend that title to the land be acquired in fee; that the entire cost and expense of the proceeding, including any damages allowed for intended regulating, be assessed upon the property benefited; and that a district of assessment be laid out to comprise the following area:

Beginning at a point on the northeasterly line of Justice street where it is intersected by a line midway between Jennings street and Lewis avenue, and running thence southwesterly at right angles to Justice street, a distance of 160 feet; thence northwesterly and always distant 100 feet southwesterly from and parallel with the southwesterly line of Justice street to the intersection with the prolongation of a line midway between Horton street and Ivy street, as these streets are laid out adjoining Justice street; thence generally eastwardly along a line always midway between Horton street and Ivy street and the prolongations thereof, to the intersection with a line midway between Junction avenue and Field place; thence southwardly along the said line midway between Junction avenue and Field place to the intersection with the prolongation of a line midway between Jennings street and Lewis avenue; thence westwardly along the said line midway between Jennings street and Lewis avenue and along the prolongation of the said line to the point or place of beginning. Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—Herewith are transmitted two resolutions of the Local Board of the Newtown District, Borough of Queens, adopted on June 30, 1910, initiating proceedings for acquiring title to the following streets: Radcliff street, from Barkins street to Hewitt avenue; Strong street, from Barkins street to Hewitt avenue.

On January 9, 1913, the Board approved a map under which a radical modification was effected in the street system south of Corona avenue in the vicinity of these streets. On this map Barkins street was discontinued, but a street designated as Waldron street was laid out in a position approximately corresponding with its former location. The width of each street between Corona avenue and Barkins street was also decreased from 60 feet to 50 feet. In my judgment the resolutions can properly be interpreted as a recommendation to acquire all of these streets as now laid out east of Waldron street.

There would then be affected ten blocks or about 5,600 feet of Radcliff street and eight blocks or about 5,800 feet of Strong street, each of which has been laid out to have a width of 60 feet north of Corona avenue and of 50 feet southerly therefrom. Approximately graded roadways are in use from Waldron street to a point about 400 feet east of Tiemann avenue where old highways are included within the lines of each street. In these sections the abutting property is partially improved, but it is believed that there are no encroachments.

I would recommend the institution of a proceeding for acquiring title to each of these streets from Waldron street to Hewitt avenue, with the understanding that they will be combined into a single opening proceeding.

I would also recommend that title to the land be acquired in fee; that the entire cost and expense of the proceeding, including any damages allowed for intended regulating, be assessed upon the property benefited; and that a district of assessment be laid out to comprise the following area:

The Long Island Railroad Company, General Office, Pennsylvania Station, New York, February 7, 1913.

JOSEPH HAAG, Esq., Secretary, Board of Estimate and Apportionment, 277 Broadway, New York City:

Dear Sir—On January 23, 1913, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment approved rule map, damage map and profile in the proceeding for acquiring title to Grove street, from Woodward avenue to Traffic street; to Ralph street, from Grandview avenue to Traffic street, and to Vincent street, from Ralph street to Metropolitan avenue, in the Borough of Queens.

We note that the lines of Ralph street and Grove street are carried through to the northerly line of Traffic street, as mapped. Traffic street is neither legally nor physically opened, and at the point where it is met by Ralph street is occupied by tracks of the Long Island Railroad and used for railroad purposes. A narrow strip of Traffic street, within the lines of Grove street, as shown upon the damage map, is also required for railroad purposes.

As shown upon the damage map the parcels owned by the Railroad Company and required for railroad purposes are numbered 21, 33 and 34. This property, so owned and used, cannot be acquired for street purposes, being already subjected to a public use. We therefore suggest that you recall your approval of the rule, damage and profile maps above referred to and amend them so as to exclude the parcels numbered 21, 33 and 34.

In this connection we may also say that proceedings are now pending before the Local Board for the relocation of Traffic street, some short distance south of its present position, as mapped. If Traffic street is relocated as proposed there would seem to be no necessity for continuing either Ralph street or Grove street to the north thereof, and under the circumstances it may be desirable that you instruct the Corporation Counsel to withhold his application for the appointment of Commissioners until the street layout in this section is finally adjusted to the satisfaction of all interested parties.

We, however, are only interested to see that our land, used and required for railroad purposes, is not acquired in the proceeding.

Sir—At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on January 11, 1912, a proceeding was instituted for acquiring title to the following streets in the Borough of Queens: Grove street, from Woodward avenue to Traffic street; Ralph street, from Grandview avenue to Traffic street; Vincent street, from Ralph street to Metropolitan avenue.

The rule and damage maps in this proceeding were approved on January 23 last, but up to the present time the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment have not been appointed.

In a communication bearing date of February 7, 1913, the Long Island Railroad Company, through its General Solicitor, Mr. J. F. Keaney, now advises the Board that Damage Parcel No. 21 within the lines of Grove street and Parcels Nos. 33 and 34 within the lines of Ralph street, all of which are located within or adjoining the respective intersections of these streets with Traffic street, affect land that is being used for railroad purposes. Request is accordingly made that the opening proceeding be amended by the elimination of these parcels.

It is understood that the owners of the land in the immediate vicinity are desirous of developing their holdings along other lines than those laid out upon the City Plan and that the matter of a radical change in the position of Traffic street is at the present time under consideration. When these changes are effected it will be necessary to correspondingly modify the scope of the opening proceeding, and this can be done in such a way as to meet the objections now raised by the railroad company.

It would, therefore, seem unnecessary to take any action at this time or to delay the proceeding in so far as it relates to Vincent street, to Ralph street, between Grandview avenue and Fresh Pond road, or to Grove street, between Woodward avenue and Fresh Pond road.

I would accordingly recommend that the attention of the Corporation Counsel be directed to the probability of an early amendment of the opening proceeding referred to in so far as Ralph avenue and Grove street are concerned, between Fresh Pond road and Traffic street, and that he be requested not to incur any expense that could properly be charged against this area for a period of four months.

I would also recommend that the attention of the Borough President be directed to the objections raised by the railroad company, and that he be requested to expedite the preparation of the amendatory plan referred to so that any necessary modification in the opening proceeding can be promptly effected. Amended drainage plan of Sewerage Districts, Number 40-B and 40-C—The drainage system in this district was amended for the purpose of locating the trunk sewer in Fulton street, instead of Ridgewood avenue. There being so many obstacles in the way of the opening of Ridgewood avenue it was thought advisable to rearrange a system so that such areas which will have to use the trunk sewer in Vanderveer avenue may not be too long delayed in the sewer improvements.

Drainage plan of Sewerage District, Number 24-A, and amending portion of Sewerage District, Number 24—The principal amendment to part of District Number 24 was the establishing of high level sewers in 51st street. As the 51st street sewer south of Ditmars avenue will be built in tunnel, it was found necessary to determine the location of necessary shafts to receive the discharge of the laterals.

The following contemplated grades are being omitted from the plan.

On 47th street, 160 feet north of Hayes avenue, 66.1; on 48th street, 170 feet south of Jackson avenue, 65.9. Neither of these grades affect the sewers.

At 43d street and Jackson avenue, the adopted grade 67.0, is to be changed to 65.0. The sewers were modified to meet the proposed grade.

On 49th street, 141 feet north of Jackson avenue crown, 66.8, 67.6, 69.6. The sewer was modified as shown in additional grade.

On 50th street and Burnside avenue, established grade 70.0 to be changed to 75.0. Sewers were designed to meet the latter grade. Respectfully,

Charles street, from St. Marys avenue to Chestnut avenue; Smith street, from St. Marys avenue to Wall street; Oak street, from St. Marys avenue to Wall street; Wall street, from Reynolds street to Charles street; Reynolds street, from Wall street to a point about 400 feet south of St. Marys avenue.

Title to these streets has not been acquired under formal opening proceedings, but with the papers are submitted affidavits from residents of the vicinity certifying that each has been in use for more than twenty years and during this period has been maintained by the public authorities.

The streets have not been incorporated upon the City plan and are entirely inconsistent with the tentative map which has been adopted for the vicinity. The Board, however, on February 6 last approved a plan for the drainage of the streets, and in view of this action, there seems to be no reason to withhold the authorization of the improvement now desired.

The resolution affects lengths varying from about 300 feet of Oak street to about 800 feet of Reynolds street, aggregating a little more than one-half mile. A narrow macadamized roadway is in use within the lines of each of the streets, and the abutting property is partially improved. The outlet sewer is built.

The work is estimated to cost about \$6,900, and the assessed valuation of the property to be benefited is \$46,000.

In my judgment the resolution is a proper one, and I would recommend that the Borough President be authorized to have the work performed which is required prior to placing the improvement under contract. Respectfully,

Resolved, That this Board does hereby initiate proceedings for the said local improvement, to wit:

"To construct temporary combined sewers, with the necessary appurtenances, in Charles street, from St. Marys avenue to Chestnut avenue; in Smith street, from St. Marys avenue to Wall street; in Oak street, from St. Marys avenue to Wall street; in Wall street, between Reynolds street and Charles street, and in Reynolds street, from Wall street to a point about 400 feet south of St. Marys avenue, in the 4th Ward, Borough of Richmond";

—and which resolution is accompanied with an approximate estimate of the cost of the work and the assessed value of the property benefited.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby authorizes the President of the Borough of Richmond to prepare plans, specifications and an estimate of cost based on actual survey, and also to secure a determination of the boundary of the district of assessment; the entire expense of the work done subsequent to the date of this authorization to be charged against the Street Improvement Fund and later included in the assessment.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment will consider the authorization of the construction of the said proposed improvement after the President of the Borough of Richmond has submitted a statement showing that all of the above described work has been done, that he has secured the approval of the form of contract by the Corporation Counsel, that he is prepared to place the improvement under contract as soon as he receives the consent of the Board, and that the assessment map will be completed on or before the date of payment on acceptance; this report being accompanied by a further statement showing the quantity of work to be performed under each item and the unit price thereof, the expense incurred for preliminary work, the allowance to be made for additional engineering and contingencies, the total probable cost, and the number of working days to be allowed the contractor for carrying out the work.

Regulating and Grading East 3d Street, from Fort Hamilton Avenue to Beverly Road, Brooklyn (Cal. No. 78).

The Secretary presented the following report of the Chief Engineer:

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—Herewith is transmitted a communication from the Acting President of the Borough of Brooklyn, advising that all of the conditions which it is the practice of the Board to impose prior to the final authorization of local improvements have been complied with in the matter of grading, curbing and flagging East 3d street from Fort Hamilton avenue to Beverly road.

A report recommending the preliminary authorization of this improvement has already been prepared and is now before the Board for consideration. Assuming that it will meet with approval, there seems to be no reason to prevent the final authorization now requested, and such action is recommended.

The Borough President states that there have been no charges made against the Street Improvement Fund, and that it is proposed to allow the contractor 35 days in which to carry out the improvement.

The work to be done comprises the following: 600 cubic yards excavation, 3,680 linear feet cement curbing, 11,450 square feet cement sidewalk.

The cost of the improvement is estimated to be \$4,000.

—and thereupon, on the 6th day of March, 1913, resolutions having been adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorizing the President of the Borough of Brooklyn to prepare the necessary plans, specifications and an estimate of the cost of the proposed improvement based on actual survey, and further resolving that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment will consider the authorization of the construction of the proposed improvement after the President of the Borough of Brooklyn had submitted certain statements as provided in the said resolution, and the said resolution having been duly complied with by the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, as appears by papers and documents on the files of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and there having been presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment an estimate in writing in such detail as the Board has directed that the cost of the proposed work of improvement, together with the preliminary expenses, will be the sum of \$4,000, and a statement of the assessed value according to the last preceding tax roll of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment, to wit, the sum of \$161,450, having also been presented, it is

Resolved, That the said resolution of the Local Board be and the same is hereby approved and the construction of the local improvement therein provided for is hereby authorized. This Board does hereby determine that no portion of the cost and expense thereof shall be borne and paid by The City of New York, but that the whole of such cost and expense, including the aforesaid preliminary expenses, shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited by the said local improvement.

Sir—Herewith are transmitted communications from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, advising that all of the conditions imposed by the Board prior to the authorization of the following local improvements have been complied with.

1. Grading, curbing and flagging Douglass street, from Dumont avenue to Riverdale avenue.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on January 9, 1913, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$3,700. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is sixty days, and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$55.13.

The work to be done comprises the following: Five hundred and forty cubic yards excavation; 3,430 cubic yards filling, 2,050 linear feet cement curbing, 10,500 square feet cement sidewalk.

The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$5,100.

2. Grading, curbing and flagging Barrett street, from East New York avenue to Dumont avenue.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on September 19, 1912, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$10,900. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is fifty days, and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$101.99.

The work to be done comprises the following: 3,750 cubic yards excavation, 3,950 linear feet cement curbing, 19,170 square feet cement sidewalk.

The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$7,100.

3. Grading, curbing and flagging Thatford avenue, from Riverdale avenue to New Lots road.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on October 17, 1912, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$6,300. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is 110 days, and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$131.14.

The work to be done comprises the following: 11,940 cubic yards filling, 3,370 linear feet cement curbing, 16,430 square feet cement sidewalk.

The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$13,000.

4. Grading, curbing and flagging East New York avenue, from Utica avenue to Pitkin avenue.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on December 12, 1912, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$27,100. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is 150 days, and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$378.63.

The work to be done comprises the following: 6,410 cubic yards excavation, 16,490 cubic yards filling, 6,300 linear feet curbing, 29,060 square feet cement sidewalk.

The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$20,700.

5. Grading, curbing, flagging and paving with asphalt (preliminary pavement) 71st street, from 10th avenue to 11th avenue.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on January 23, 1913, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$4,800. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is thirty days, and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$43.32.

The work to be done comprises the following: 1,480 cubic yards excavation, 1,460 linear feet cement curbing, 3,550 square feet cement sidewalk, 2,440 square yards asphalt pavement.

The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$7,100.

6. Sewer in 36th street, from 14th avenue to West street.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on January 23, 1913, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$3,400. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is thirty days, and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$45.58.

The work to be done comprises the following: 822 linear feet 12-inch pipe sewer, 7 manholes, 2 receiving basins.

The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$3,100.

7. Sewers in the following streets: Avenue C from Gravesend avenue to West street; West street from Avenue C to Cortelyou road.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on January 23, 1913, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$5,700. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is 45 days, and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$70.49.

The work to be done comprises the following: 240 linear feet 24-inch pipe sewer, 380 linear feet 18-inch pipe sewer, 267 linear feet 15-inch pipe sewer, 225 linear feet 12-inch pipe sewer, 9 manholes, 3 receiving basins.

The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$5,200.

8. Paving with asphalt (preliminary pavement) West street from 39th street to 43d street.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on February 20, 1913, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$14,300. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is 35 days, and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$10.50.

The work to be done comprises the laying of 7,565 square yards of asphalt pavement.

The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$14,800.

9. Paving with asphalt (preliminary pavement) East 2d street from Cortelyou road to Ditmas avenue.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on February 20, 1913, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$5,300. The Borough President

dent states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is 30 days, and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$4.34.

The work to be done comprises the laying of 2,720 square yards of asphalt pavement.

The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$5,500.

10. Paving with asphalt (preliminary pavement) Dupont street from Oakland street to Provost street.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on February 20, 1913, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$3,900. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is 30 days, and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$4.94.

The work to be done comprises the laying of 2,040 square yards of asphalt pavement.

The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$4,200.

11. Paving with asphalt (permanent pavement) Forrest street from Central avenue to Flushing avenue.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on February 20, 1913, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$3,200. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is 30 days, and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$5.68.

The work to be done comprises the laying of 1,585 square yards of asphalt pavement.

The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$3,800.

12. Paving with granite block (permanent pavement) White street from Cook street to Moore street, and from Siegel street to Johnson avenue.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on February 20, 1913, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$14,500. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is 40 days, and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$9.60.

The work to be done comprises the laying of 3,665 square yards of granite block pavement.

The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$15,000.

13. Paving with asphalt (permanent pavement) Williams avenue from Belmont avenue to Sutter avenue.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on February 20, 1913, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$3,100. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is 30 days, and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$4.79.

The work to be done comprises the laying of 1,395 square yards of asphalt pavement.

The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$3,300.

14. Paving with asphalt (preliminary pavement) 45th street from New Utrecht avenue to 12th avenue.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on February 20, 1913, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$4,800. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is 30 days, and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$5.55.

The work to be done comprises the laying of 2,600 square yards of asphalt pavement.

The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$5,300.

15. Grading 12th avenue from 86th street to Dyker Beach Park.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on January 25, 1912, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$14,000. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is 180 days, and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$115.19.

The work to be done comprises the following: 51,880 cubic yards excavation.

The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$21,100.

16. Sewers in the following street: 12th avenue from 36th street to 38th street, 36th street from 12th avenue to Church avenue.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on January 23, 1913, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$9,600. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is 60 days, and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$94.66.

The work to be done comprises the following: 1,046 linear feet 24-inch pipe sewer, 279 linear feet 18-inch pipe sewer, 49 linear feet 15-inch pipe sewer, 443 linear feet 12-inch pipe sewer, 15 manholes, 7 receiving basins.

The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$10,400.

17. Sewers in the following streets: Battery avenue from 92d street to Warehouse avenue; Warehouse avenue from Battery avenue to 7th avenue, 7th avenue from Warehouse avenue to 92d street.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on October 3, 1912, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$41,000. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is 175 days, and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$341.69.

The work to be done comprises the following: 1,914 linear feet 48-inch brick sewer, 686 linear feet 42-inch brick sewer, 570 linear feet 36-inch brick sewer, 232 linear feet 30-inch brick sewer, 274 linear feet 22-inch pipe sewer, 274 linear feet 18-inch pipe sewer, 1,223 linear feet 12-inch pipe sewer, 39 manholes, 18 receiving basins.

The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$46,000.

18. Sewer in Avenue D from East 34th street to Brooklyn avenue.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on January 23, 1913, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$3,400. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is 30 days, and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$39.70.

The work to be done comprises the following: 430 linear feet 12-inch pipe sewer, 4 manholes.

The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$1,500.

19. Grading, curbing and flagging 80th street from 13th avenue to 14th avenue.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on February 6, 1913, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$3,900. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is 60 days, and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$47.77.

The work to be done comprises the following: 1,000 cubic yards excavation, 4,240 cubic yards filling, 1,430 linear feet cement curbing, 7,260 square feet cement sidewalk.

The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$5,000.

20. Grading, curbing and flagging 82d street from 13th avenue to 14th avenue.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on February 6, 1913, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$4,000. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is 70 days, and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$31.86.

The work to be done comprises the following: 6,035 cubic yards filling, 1,440 linear feet cement curbing, 7,260 square feet cement sidewalk.

The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$5,700.

21. Grading, curbing and flagging West 30th street from Neptune avenue to a point 360 feet south of Surf avenue.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment under a resolution adopted on September 19, 1912, and amended on February 20, 1913, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$13,600. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is 70 days, and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$153.20.

The work to be done comprises the following: 1,510 cubic yards excavation,

5,280 cubic yards filling, 4,050 linear feet curbing, 18,500 square feet cement sidewalk, 130 linear feet timber bulkhead. The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$16,000.

22. Paving with asphalt (permanent pavement) Coney Island avenue from Avenue N to Kings Highway.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on February 20, 1913, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$32,500. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is 50 days, and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$18.23.

The work to be done comprises the laying of 15,285 square yards of asphalt pavement.

The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$35,000.

23. Paving with asphalt (preliminary pavement) Sunnyside avenue from Miller avenue to Barbey street.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on February 20, 1913, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$7,100. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is 30 days, and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$9.19.

The work to be done comprises the laying of 3,790 square yards of asphalt pavement.

The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$7,600.

24. Paving with asphalt (permanent pavement) Avenue C from East 3d street to Gravesend avenue.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on February 20, 1913, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$4,900. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is 30 days, and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$4.81.

The work to be done comprises the laying of 2,210 square yards of asphalt pavement.

The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$5,200.

25. Sewers in the following streets: Gravesend avenue, easterly side, from Vanderbilt street to Fort Hamilton avenue; Fort Hamilton avenue, southerly side, from Gravesend avenue to West street; West street, from Fort Hamilton avenue to Church avenue.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on January 9, 1913, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$29,500. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is 120 days, and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$173.79.

The work to be done comprises the following: 957 linear feet 42-inch brick sewer; 822 linear feet 36-inch brick sewer; 358 linear feet 30-inch brick sewer; 1,492 linear feet 24-inch pipe sewer; 24 manholes; 15 receiving basins.

The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$24,500.

26. Grading, curbing and flagging East 2d street from Fort Hamilton avenue to Beverly road.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on January 23, 1913, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$3,800. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is 40 days, and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$95.57.

The work to be done comprises the following: 1,080 cubic yards excavation; 2,610 linear feet cement curbing; 10,840 square feet cement sidewalk.

The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$3,600.

27. Grading, curbing and flagging Junius street, from Blake avenue to Livonia avenue.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on January 23, 1913, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$4,200. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is fifty days, and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$61.64.

The work to be done comprises the following: 3,680 cubic yards excavation, 2,230 linear feet cement curbing, 10,590 square feet cement sidewalk.

The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$4,800.

28. Grading, curbing and flagging Montauk avenue, from Atlantic avenue to Liberty avenue.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on February 6, 1913, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$2,800. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is thirty days, and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$47.10.

The work to be done comprises the following: 1,380 cubic yards excavation, 1,720 linear feet cement curbing, 8,510 square feet cement sidewalk.

The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$3,000.

29. Sewers in the following streets: Livonia avenue, from Ames street to Douglass street; Douglass street, from Dumont avenue to East 98th street.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on January 9, 1913, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$18,700. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is seventy-five days, and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$140.21.

The work to be done comprises the following: 884 linear feet 30-inch brick sewer, 589 linear feet 22-inch pipe sewer, 571 linear feet 18-inch pipe sewer, 736 linear feet 12-inch pipe sewer, 22 manholes, 9 receiving basins.

The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$14,100.

I see no reason why the construction work required to carry out these improvements should not be authorized and would recommend such action.

I would also recommend that title be vested in the City on April 1, 1913, to the following streets: Douglass street, from Dumont avenue to East 98th street; Barrett street, from Sutter avenue to Blake avenue; Thatford avenue, from Riverdale avenue to Newport avenue, unless previously confirmed; East New York avenue, from Utica avenue to Pitkin avenue; 71st street, from 10th avenue to 11th avenue; West street, from Fort Hamilton avenue to the southerly line of Church avenue, from Avenue C to Cortelyou road, and from 39th street to 43d street, excluding railroad lands; West 30th street, from Surf avenue to Mean High Water Line of the Atlantic Ocean; East 2d street, from Fort Hamilton avenue to Albemarle road; Montauk avenue, from Atlantic avenue to Liberty avenue. 2. Sewers in Skillman street, from Park avenue to Myrtle, and in Myrtle avenue, from Skillman street to Nostrand avenue, in Nostrand avenue, from Myrtle avenue to Vernon avenue, and in Vernon avenue, from Nostrand to Marcy avenues.

3. Hewes street, from Wallabout canal to Classon avenue, and Classon avenue, from Hewes street to Park avenue, and Park avenue, from Classon avenue to Skillman street.

This is a very important proposition and I would respectfully request, if possible, that you place this on the calendar of the Board of Estimate for final authorization for the meeting to be held on the 27th instant. Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on January 9, 1913, and after a public hearing, preliminary authorization was given for what was described as the Classon Avenue Relief Sewerage System in the Borough of Brooklyn, the cost of which was then estimated to be \$2,497,500.

This improvement was initiated by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment pursuant to an opinion of the Corporation Counsel partly for the purpose of re-enforcing the capacity of the existing sewers and partly to supplement other sewers, the use of which would have to be discontinued as a result of the construction of the Fourth avenue subway, the Local Boards having jurisdiction having failed to act in the matter.

With the accompanying communication from the Acting President of the Borough bearing date of February 21, 1913, request is made for the final authorization of what is intended to be the first section of this improvement, comprising sewers in the following named streets:

Vernon avenue, from Nostrand avenue to Tompkins avenue; Tompkins avenue, from Vernon avenue to Greene avenue; Skillman street, from Park avenue to Myrtle avenue; Myrtle avenue, from Skillman street to Nostrand avenue; Nostrand avenue, from Myrtle avenue to Vernon avenue; Hewes street, from Classon avenue to Wallabout canal; Classon avenue, from Hewes street to Park avenue; Park avenue, from Classon avenue to Skillman street.

The work to be done in this section, which, from information presented, is to be subdivided into three separate contracts, comprises the following: 3,824 linear feet 186-inch sewer, 5,047 linear feet 180-inch sewer, 25 linear feet 54-inch brick sewer, 834 linear feet 30-inch brick sewer, 1,665 linear feet 24-inch pipe sewer, 1,282 linear feet 18-inch pipe sewer, 2,458 linear feet 15-inch pipe sewer, 8,072 linear feet 12-inch pipe sewer, 510 house connection drains, 51 receiving basins reconnected, 4 receiving basins, 2 inverted siphons, 3 storm water separators, 3 connecting drop sections, 181 manholes.

The Borough President states that the cost of the preliminary work aggregates \$368.36; that it is proposed to allow the contractor 350 working days for completing the work; and that the cost of construction is estimated at \$1,125,000. The assessed valuation of the property deemed benefited is stated to be \$476,883,191. Information is also presented to show that in the preliminary authorization an allowance of \$1,242,500 was made for that portion of the work which it is proposed to carry out at this time.

In order that there may be no delay in returning to the Street Improvement Fund the money expended in carrying out the work now proposed and to avoid the delay which would be involved if the presentation of the assessment lists were to be deferred until the entire relief system of sewerage is complete, I would recommend that the final authorization of the work now described be given and that the Borough President be requested to make it the subject of a single independent assessment list to be submitted to the Board of Assessors simultaneously with the preparation of the final estimates, with the further understanding that final authorization will be given for the remainder of the work required to complete the system under independent resolutions, the scope of which, in each case, will be limited to include that portion of the improvement concerning which simultaneous contracts will be entered into. Sir—Herewith are transmitted communications from the President of the Borough of the Bronx, advising that all of the conditions imposed by the Board prior to the authorization of the following local improvements, have been complied with.

1. Grading, curbing and flagging Glebe avenue, from Zerega avenue to Overing street.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on January 9, 1913, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$5,500. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is forty days, and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$33.25.

The work to be done comprises the following: 1,060 cubic yards earth and rock excavation, 870 cubic yards filling, 2,460 linear feet curbing, 9,600 square feet cement sidewalk.

The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$5,500.

2. Grading, curbing and flagging Tyndall avenue, from Moshulu avenue to a point about 73 feet north of West 260th street.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on January 23, 1913, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$35,400. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is 200 days, and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$34.37.

The work to be done comprises the following: 16,200 cubic yards earth and rock excavation, 13,800 cubic yards filling, 2,050 linear feet curbing, 8,100 square feet flagging.

The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$32,800.

3. Paving with bituminous concrete (preliminary pavement), and adjusting the curbing where necessary on Ogden avenue, from West 169th street to Aqueduct avenue.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on January 23, 1913, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$13,200. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is fifty days, and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$33.47.

The work to be done comprises the following: 6,820 square yards bituminous concrete pavement, 2,000 linear feet curbing adjusted.

The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$13,100.

4. Grading, curbing, flagging and paving with asphalt (permanent pavement) East 140th street, from Park avenue to Morris avenue.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on December 12, 1912, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$7,500. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is sixty days, and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$21.37.

The work to be done comprises the following: 1,400 cubic yards excavation, 1,250 linear feet new and old curbing, 4,800 square feet cement sidewalk, 1,600 square yards asphalt pavement.

The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$7,500.

I see no reason why the construction work required to carry out these improvements should not be authorized, and would recommend such action.

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on July 11, 1912, and in accordance with a resolution of the Local Board of the Van Courtlandt District, Borough of The Bronx, adopted on October 6, 1911, as amended on June 11, 1912, final authorization was granted for paving with Asphalt block (permanent pavement) and curbing where necessary West 231st street from Corlear avenue to Bailey avenue.

The work was estimated to cost \$23,700, and the assessed valuation of the property to be benefited was stated to be \$2,897,350.

On December 23, 1912, the Local Board adopted a new resolution, which is herewith transmitted, amending its original resolution initiating the improvement by providing for paving this street between the limits named with asphalt (permanent pavement) where the grade is three per cent. or less, and with asphalt block (permanent pavement) where the grade is more than three per cent. and adjusting curbing where necessary. From Corlear avenue to Kingsbridge avenue and from the crown about 300 feet west of Broadway to the New York and Putnam Railway, the grades established for this street are over three per cent. and it is evidently in this section of the street length that the asphalt block pavement is to be laid.

There is also transmitted herewith a communication from the Borough President advising that all of the conditions which it is the practice of the Board to impose prior to the authorization of local improvements have been complied with insofar as the later resolution is concerned, and requesting that the construction work be accordingly authorized.

The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is fifty days, and that the total expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$60,75.

The work to be done comprises the following: 3,915 square yards asphalt block pavement, 3,415 square yards asphalt pavement, 2,910 linear feet of new and old curbing.

The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$22,500, but no change is made in the value heretofore given for the assessed valuation of the property deemed to be benefited.

I can see no reason why the amendment proposed by the Local Board should not be made, and would recommend the rescission of the resolution of July 11, 1912, granting final authorization for the improvement as originally contemplated, and that the resolution of June 27, 1912, granting preliminary authorization be amended so as to conform with the later Local Board resolution.

I would also recommend that the construction work be then authorized.

LOCAL IMPROVEMENTS—BOROUGH OF QUEENS.

(Final Authorization.)

The Secretary presented the following report of the Chief Engineer, relating to Cal. No. 114 to Cal. No. 123:

Report No. 12177.

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—Herewith are transmitted communications from the President of the Borough of Queens, advising that all of the conditions imposed by the Board prior to the authorization of the following local improvements have been complied with:

1. Grading and paving with asphalt (permanent pavement) DeKalb avenue, from Onderdonk avenue to Woodward avenue.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on October 17, 1912, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$3,500. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is 25 days, and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$43.94.

The work to be done comprises the laying of 1,650 square yards of asphalt pavement.

The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$3,800.

2. Paving with asphalt block (permanent pavement) Radde street, from North Jane street to Paynter avenue.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on November 14, 1912, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$11,400. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is 40 days, and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$165.11.

The work to be done comprises the laying of 3,600 square yards of asphalt block pavement.

The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$10,600.

3. Paving with asphalt block (permanent pavement) Elm street, from Crescent street to 2d avenue.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on October 3, 1912, at which time information was pre-

sented to show that its probable cost would be about \$8,100. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is 30 days, and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$56.

The work to be done comprises the laying of 2,900 square yards of asphalt block pavement.

The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$8,700.

4. Grading, curbing and flagging Ridge street, from the Boulevard to Ely avenue.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on December 12, 1912, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$14,600. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is 150 days, and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$170.59.

The work to be done comprises the following: 14,000 cubic yards embankment, 3,600 linear feet curbing, 17,000 square feet flagging.

The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$16,300.

5. Sewers in the following streets: Liberty avenue, from Stoothoff avenue to Chestnut street; Cedar avenue, from Liberty avenue to Kimball avenue; Chestnut street, from Liberty avenue to Kimball avenue.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on October 3, 1912, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$4,200. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is 90 days, and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$77.52.

The work to be done comprises the following: 256 linear feet 2-foot-6-inch concrete sewer, 252 linear feet 24-inch vitrified pipe sewer, 668 linear feet 12-inch vitrified pipe sewer, 10 manholes, 3 receiving basins.

The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$5,800.

6. Sewer in Decatur street, from Myrtle avenue to Forest avenue.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on December 12, 1912, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$2,300. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is 30 days, and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$23.73.

The work to be done comprises the following: 754 linear feet 12-inch vitrified pipe sewer, 7 manholes.

The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$2,400.

7. Sewers in the following streets: Jerome avenue, from Ocean avenue, east side, to Greenwood avenue; McCormick avenue, from Beaufort avenue to Jerome avenue; Oxford avenue, from Beaufort avenue to Jerome avenue; Seattle street, from Beaufort avenue to Jerome avenue; Portland avenue, from Beaufort avenue to Jerome avenue; Herald avenue, from Jerome avenue to the crown 265 feet northerly therefrom.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on September 19, 1912, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$22,700. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is 120 days, and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$293.16.

The work to be done comprises the following: 3,426 linear feet 12-inch vitrified pipe sewer, 240 linear feet 18-inch pipe sewer, 1,077 linear feet 4-foot concrete sewer, 487 linear feet 4-foot 6-inch reinforced concrete sewer, 42 manholes, 9 receiving basins.

The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$27,300.

8. Grading, curbing, flagging and paving with asphalt (permanent pavement) Silver street, from Fresh Pond road to a line 300 feet westerly therefrom.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on September 19, 1912, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$3,000. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is 15 days, and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$23.73.

The work to be done comprises the laying of 900 square yards of asphalt pavement.

The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$2,100.

9. Sewers in the following streets: Madison street, from Myrtle avenue to Wyckoff avenue; Wyckoff avenue, from Madison street to Halsey street; Halsey street, from Wyckoff avenue to Irving avenue.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on June 27, 1912, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$34,800. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is 150 days, and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$490.01.

The work to be done comprises the following: 1,230 linear feet 5-foot reinforced concrete sewer, 500 linear feet 4-foot 6-inch reinforced concrete sewer, 386 linear feet 4-inch concrete sewer, 700 linear feet 3-foot 6-inch concrete sewer, 16 manholes, 1 cleaning shaft, 16 receiving basins.

The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$38,100.

10. Sewers in the following streets; Nott avenue, from Van Dam street to Hulst street; Anable avenue, from Van Dam street to Hulst street; Hulst street, from Nott avenue to Anable avenue.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on February 8, 1912, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$19,100. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is 100 days, and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$339.18.

The work to be done comprises the following: 255 linear feet 3-foot 9-inch concrete sewer, 260 linear feet 3-foot 6-inch concrete sewer, 496 linear feet 3-foot 3-inch concrete sewer, 430 linear feet 3-foot concrete sewer, 260 linear feet 18-inch vitrified pipe sewer, 260 linear feet 15-inch vitrified pipe sewer, 1,670 linear feet 12-inch vitrified pipe sewer, 27 manholes, 25 receiving basins, 1 junction chamber.

The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$24,400.

I see no reason why the construction work required to carry out these improvements should not be authorized and would recommend such action.

I would also recommend that title be vested in the City on April 1, 1913, to the following streets:

Ridge street, from the Boulevard to the easterly line of Ely avenue; Madison street, from Wyckoff avenue to Myrtle avenue; Anable avenue, from Van Dam street to Hulst street; Nott avenue, from Van Dam street to Hulst street.

LOCAL IMPROVEMENTS—BOROUGH OF RICHMOND.

(Final Authorization.)

The Secretary presented the following report of the Chief Engineer, relating to Cal. No. 124 and Cal. No. 125.

Report No. 12178.

March 3, 1913.

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—Herewith are transmitted communications from the President of the Borough of Richmond, advising that all of the conditions imposed by the Board prior to the authorization of the following local improvements have been complied with.

1. Grading Knox street, from Richmond terrace to Market street, and setting curb returns at the intersecting streets.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on June 27, 1912, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$5,700. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is 40 days, and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$442.08.

The work to be done comprises the following: 2,743 cubic yards excavation; 2,593 cubic yards filling; 170 linear feet curbing.

The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$5,700.

2. Temporary sanitary sewer in Van Duzer street, from Vanderbilt avenue to Cornell place.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on November 14, 1912, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$1,100. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is 18 days, and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$46.47.

The work to be done comprises the following: 387 linear feet 8-inch vitrified pipe sewer; 3 manholes.

The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$1,400.

I see no reason why the construction work required to carry out these improvements should not be authorized, and would recommend such action.

I would also recommend that title be vested in the City on April 1, 1913, to Knox street, from Richmond terrace to Market street. Respectfully,

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—Herewith is transmitted a joint resolution of the Local Boards of the Flatbush and New Lots Districts, Borough of Brooklyn, adopted on December 19, 1912, recommending that the roadway width of Lenox road through its entire length, excepting the block between New York avenue and East 34th street, be fixed at 35 feet.

This street has been laid out upon the City Plan to have a width of 70 feet and under the general ordinance should have a roadway 36 feet wide.

To avoid damaging a number of shade trees, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, on June 13, 1912, fixed the roadway width of Lenox road from New York avenue to East 34th street at 34 feet, for which reason this block is now excluded from consideration. With the papers is presented information showing that in the remaining portion of its length the street has been improved in disconnected sections with a roadway 35 feet wide. It is now desired that existing conditions be legalized and that provision be made for establishing a similar treatment through the unimproved sections of the street.

I can see no objection to the treatment proposed and would recommend the adoption of a resolution fixing the roadway width of Lenox road, from Flatbush avenue to New York avenue and from East 34th street to East 98th street, at 35 feet, the roadway to be centrally located.

Regulating the Height, Size and Arrangement of Buildings Within City Limits. (Limiting the Height of Buildings Along 5th Avenue, from Washington Square to 110th Street, Borough of Manhattan) (Cal. No. 127).

*(At the meeting of the Board on February 27, 1913, this matter was laid over for one week.)

The President of the Borough of Manhattan offered the following:

Whereas, There is a growing sentiment in the community to the effect that the time has come when effort should be made to regulate the height, size and arrangement of buildings erected within the limits of The City of New York, in order to arrest the seriously increasing evil of the shutting off of light and air from other buildings and from the public streets, to prevent unwholesome and dangerous congestion both in living conditions and in street and transit traffic, and to reduce the hazards of fire and peril to life; and

Whereas, Under the provisions of section 407 of the Charter, the height and size of buildings may be regulated by City ordinance, but such ordinance must first have the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Chairman be authorized to appoint a committee of three members of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to take this general subject under consideration, to inquire into and investigate conditions actually existing, and to ascertain and report whether, in their judgment, it is desirable to regulate the height, size and arrangement of buildings hereafter to be erected or altered within the City limits, with due regard to their location, character or uses, to examine into the practice and the comparative experience of other cities either here or abroad, and to consider and report upon the question of the legal right of The City of New York to regulate building construction in the manner proposed; and be it further

Resolved, That such Committee may also investigate and report whether, in their judgment, it would be lawful and desirable for the purpose of such regulation to divide the City into districts or into zones, and to prescribe the regulation of the height, size and arrangement of buildings upon different bases in such different districts or zones; and be it further

Resolved, That the Committee, when appointed, may in turn appoint an advisory commission to aid it in its work, such commission to consist of as many members as the Committee may determine, serving without pay, if not already in the employment of the City, but including representatives of each of the several boroughs, and that either the Committee or its advisory commission may hold public hearings in each of the boroughs and may use all appropriate means to bring the subject to the attention of the taxpayers and to other persons who may be interested; and be it further

Resolved, That the Committee be empowered to employ a Secretary, who shall also be the Secretary of the advisory commission, to secure such expert or technical advice as it may require for its proper guidance, and to incur such other incidental expenses as it may from time to time find necessary, such disbursements to be made from the contingent fund of this Board, but not to exceed in the aggregate the sum of \$15,000; and be it further

Resolved, That the said Committee be instructed to submit, if practicable, in advance of any general report that it may make, suggestions or recommendations with relation to the proposed limitation of the height of buildings upon 5th avenue, between 110th street and Washington square, in the Borough of Manhattan, and within certain prescribed areas on either side of the said avenue, as proposed in the resolution presented to this Board on May 9, 1912, and now pending; and be it further

Resolved, That such Committee shall submit its final report and recommendations to the Board not later than six months from the date of its appointment, and shall thereupon cease to exist.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—16.

Acquiring Title to Seaside Park at Rockaway Beach, Borough of Queens (Cal. No. 128).

Dear Sirs—The Neponsit Realty Company hereby notifies you that it does not and will not acquiesce in or assent to any effort made by you or by the Corporation Counsel of the City of New York to prevent the confirmation of the final report of the Commissioners appointed in the proceedings to condemn the land and premises included within the public park (Seaside Park) at Rockaway Beach, Fifth Ward, in the Borough of Queens, City of New York, in and by which report the Neponsit Realty Company is awarded for the damage sustained by reason of said proceedings, together with interest on the awards for the lands and premises acquired from the date of vesting title in said proceedings to the date of said report the sum of \$1,316,458.33, which report is dated February 10, 1913.

The Neponsit Realty Company further notifies you that by the terms of a certain option offered by it to the City of New York, dated December 7, 1911, providing that upon the exercise of said option it would execute and deliver an assignment thereof to said City of New York for the sum of \$1,225,000 with interest at the rate of six per cent per annum, to be computed from August 1, 1911, together with all taxes and assessments which may have become a lien on or after August 1, 1911, or which thereafter might become a lien on said premises or any part thereof, and such reasonable sums of money as might be expended or incurred by the Neponsit Realty Company for counsel fees and other expenses in said condemnation proceedings, but deducting therefrom the amount of any encumbrance (except taxes and assessments) which there might be upon the title to said premises or deductible from the award therefor that it is provided.

Agreement Providing for the Elimination of Grade Crossings on the Long Island Railroad and for a Payment by the City Toward the Expense Thereof; Borough of Queens (Cal. No. 129).

(At the meeting of the Board on February 20, 1913, the President of the Long Island Railroad Company presented a form of Act for this purpose, which was referred to the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Corporation Counsel for examination as to its sufficiency and propriety and, if found proper, for presentation to the Legislature.)

The Secretary presented the following communication from the Acting Corporation Counsel, which was ordered printed in the minutes and filed:

City of New York, Law Department, Office of the Corporation Counsel, New York, February 27, 1913.

Board of Estimate and Apportionment, New York City:

Sirs—I am in receipt of a communication from Joseph Haag, Secretary, dated February 21, 1913, reading as follows:

"I transmit herewith copy of a communication from the President of the Long Island Railroad Company, addressed to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment under date of February 19, 1913, submitting a proposed form of an Act to ratify and confirm the agreement made July 21, 1911, between The City of New York and the Long Island Railroad Company, providing for the elimination of grade crossings and for a payment by the City towards the expense thereof, and to enable the City to carry out all of the provisions and conditions of said contract.

"At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on February 20, 1913, this matter was referred to the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Corporation Counsel, with the request that they pass on the proposed bill as to its sufficiency and propriety and, if it is found to be in proper form, that they cause it to be presented to the Legislature and endeavor to secure its enactment."

I have amended the proposed bill by adding a provision dispensing with the further consent or approval of the Public Service Commission, which amendment I deemed essential in view of the requirements of the railroad law by which such approval is made necessary in the proceedings taken thereunder for the elimination of grade crossings.

This amendment is agreeable to the President of the Board of Aldermen and the railroad.

The proposed bill as amended will read:

"State of New York, No., in Assembly.
February ..., 1913.

Introduced by

An Act to ratify and confirm an agreement made under date of July 21, 1911, between The City of New York and The Long Island Railroad Company, providing for the elimination of grade crossings and for a payment by the City towards the expense thereof and to enable the City of New York to carry out all of the provisions and conditions thereof.

The people of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The agreement between The City of New York and The Long Island Railroad Company, providing for the elimination of grade crossings on a number of streets in the Borough of Queens and for a payment by the City toward the expense thereof, executed under date of July 21, 1911, by the said City and Railroad Company is hereby ratified and confirmed and all the terms and provisions of such agreement shall be binding and effective upon the said City and the said Railroad Company, their successors and assigns, and shall inure to the benefits of the parties thereto without any further consent, approval, act or proceeding by or on the part of the Public Service Commission, or by or on the part of said City, or any officer, board or department thereof.

Section 2. This act shall take effect immediately."

I have arranged to have the bill introduced in the Legislature at once and pressed with vigor to enactment.

Proposed Amendment to Section 992 of the Greater New York Charter (Cal. No. 130).

The Secretary presented a communication from the Comptroller submitting a draft of a proposed amendment to section 992 of the Charter, prepared by the Corporation Counsel, under which provision is made for requiring property owners who cede land within street lines to the City to submit to the Corporation Counsel proof of title, or to deposit with him an amount of money deemed sufficient to defray the expense of searching title, the payment provided for being based on a rate of 50 cents per foot for the first 25 feet of frontage, and 20 cents per foot for each additional foot of frontage, with a maximum of \$50.

This legislation is intended to relieve the Budget from an expense which is clearly for the benefit of the abutting property owners.

On motion of the Comptroller the matter was laid over for one week (March 13, 1913).

By laying out the lines and grades of the street system within the area designated as section 318 of the Final Maps, bounded approximately by Potter avenue, Crescent street, Wolcott avenue, Blanchard street, Winthrop avenue, 7th avenue, Riker avenue, Steinway avenue, Winthrop avenue, 11th avenue, Wolcott avenue, Theodore street, Ditmars avenue and Purdy street, Borough of Queens.

520. By changing the lines of the street system bounded by Rust street, Grand street, Broad street, Hill street, Clermont avenue, Flushing avenue and James street, 2d Ward, Borough of Queens.

521. By changing the grade of Targee street from Metcalf street to Irving place, Borough of Richmond. Respectfully, JOSEPH HAAG, Secretary.

The Public Service Commission for the First District herewith transmits for appropriate action under the Rapid Transit Act the following documents which it proposes to execute:

1. Contract between The City of New York, acting by the Commission, and New York Municipal Railway Corporation for additional rapid transit railroads.

2. Certificate to be granted by the Commission to New York Municipal Railway Corporation for Broadway, Fulton street and Myrtle avenue additional tracks.

3. Certificate to be granted by the Commission to the New York Municipal Railway Corporation for Jamaica and Liberty avenue extensions.

4. Contract between The City of New York and Interborough Rapid Transit Company for additional rapid transit railroads.

5. Certificate to be granted by the Commission to Interborough Rapid Transit Company for Webster avenue extension, 8th avenue and 162d street connection, Queensboro Bridge extension and West Farms subway connection.

There are also transmitted two supplemental agreements which the commission

proposes to enter into upon the execution of the two main contracts. Those supplemental agreements are:

1. Agreements between The City of New York, acting by the Commission, Interborough Rapid Transit Company and New York Municipal Railway Corporation, covering trackage rights to be exercised by the latter company.

2. Agreement between The City of New York, acting by the Commission, Interborough Rapid Transit Company as lessee, under the contract with the City, and Interborough Rapid Transit Company as lessee of the Manhattan Railway Company, covering trackage rights to be exercised by the Interborough Company as lessee of the Manhattan Railway Company.

The contracts and agreements to become effective will require the approval and consent of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment; the certificates will require the approval of your Board and in addition the consent of your Board and of the Mayor, as the local authorities, to the construction and operation of the railroads therein described.

In view of the extended conferences with your Committee on Pending Transit Proposals and of the widespread discussion of these matters, it is unnecessary here to recite the various provisions of these documents or to declare the public policy that underlies them. The documents are the result of nearly five years of negotiation, actively participated in by your committee since its appointment two years ago. In transmitting them, the Commission desires to record its high appreciation of the work of your committee and especially of the work of its chairman, the President of the Borough of Manhattan.

The President of the Borough of Manhattan presented the following:

New York Railways Company, 165 Broadway, T. P. Shonts, President, March 6, 1913.

Hon. GEORGE CROMWELL, President, Borough of Richmond, New Brighton, New York:

My Dear Sir—During the period of subway negotiations you have many times brought to my personal attention your earnest desire that the Borough of Richmond be placed on equal terms with the other boroughs in that it be given the advantage of a five-cent fare from its borough line to points in Manhattan.

As a result of your interest and presentation of this matter it has been given my most careful consideration, and, recognizing that a considerable period must necessarily elapse before any rapid transit connection can be made between the Borough of Richmond and the other boroughs, I have recently stated to Chairman McCall, of the Public Service Commission, that in order to give to the residents of Staten Island the immediate benefit of a five-cent fare into Manhattan Borough the New York Railways Company is prepared to enter into an arrangement by which passengers may ride upon the Municipal Ferry and upon the cars of the lines of this company terminating at South Ferry for a single fare of five cents, to be divided so that the street car company shall receive three cents and the City two cents.

This plan will give to many ferry passengers who now walk to and from their places of business in Manhattan, or pay a full fare of five cents upon the surface cars, an opportunity to travel in their accustomed manner for a single fare of five cents.

The Borough of Richmond will thus be placed on equal terms with the other boroughs which have the advantage of a five-cent fare from their borough lines to points in Manhattan.

If this offer shall meet with the approval of the Public Service Commission and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, we shall be prepared to enter into a formal contract containing such reasonable terms as to its termination or modification and provisions for the details of the working arrangements as may be agreed upon after a conference.

Before closing this letter, I wish to express to you my appreciation of your uniform courtesy in all of our negotiations, and to state that the plan as above is the best concession that we can make in response to your constant pleas on behalf of the Staten Island public. Very truly yours,

Public Service Commission for the First District—Invitation to Contractors and Forms of Contract, Bond and Contractor's Proposal for Construction of a Part of the Astoria, Woodside and Corona Rapid Transit Railroad, Routes Nos. 36 and 37, Section No. 3.

Form finally adopted by the Commission Jan. 21, 1913, and approved as to form by the Corporation Counsel and filed on Commencement of Advertisement of Invitation to Contractors.

INVITATION TO CONTRACTORS.

PART OF ROUTES No. 36 AND 37.

The City of New York, acting by the Public Service Commission for the First District (hereinafter called "the Commission") invites proposals to construct Section No. 3 of the Astoria, Woodside and Corona Rapid Transit Railroad.

The points within the City between which the said part is to run and the route or routes to be followed are briefly as follows:

Section No. 3. Beginning at a point on Queens Boulevard in the Borough of Queens about two hundred and seventy (270) feet northwest of the westerly line of Van Dam st. and extending thence along and over Queens blvd., Greenpoint ave., Skillman ave. and Roosevelt ave. to a point over Roosevelt ave. about seventy (70) feet east of the easterly line of Sycamore ave. (Albertus ave.); with local stations at Rawson st., Lowery st., Bliss st., Lincoln ave., Broadway, 25th st., Elmhurst ave. and Sycamore ave., and with express stations at Woodside ave. and Junction ave.

The general plan of construction calls for an elevated railroad. The details of the construction of the railroad and appurtenances are more particularly indicated on the contract drawings.

Bidders will not be required to provide or lay any tracks or any ties, or to provide or lay broken stone or ballast on the reinforced concrete elevated Railroad, nor to do station finish work except such station finish work as is specifically required to be done.

The work of construction under the contract will include the construction of all necessary sewers and connections, along the route of the railroad; also the necessary support, maintenance, readjustment and reconstruction of vaults adjacent to buildings, pipes, tubes, conduits, subways or other subsurface structures; the support and care, of all buildings, monuments, surface railroads and other surface, subsurface and overhead structures of any kind, affected by or interfered with during the construction of the work; also the restoration of the sidewalks and roadways.

Bidders must examine the form of contract and the specifications, maps and plans; must visit the location of the work and inform themselves of the present conditions along the line thereof and make their own estimates of the facilities and difficulties attending the execution of the proposed work.

A fuller description of the work to be done is set forth and other requirements, provisions, details and specifications are stated, in the printed form of contract and in the contract drawings therein referred to. Printed copies of the form of contract, bond and contractor's proposal may be had on application at the office of the Commission, No. 154 Nassau Street, Borough of Manhattan, City of New York. The contract drawings may be inspected at the same office, and copies thereof may be purchased by prospective bidders on payment of five dollars (\$5.00). The printed form of contract and the contract drawings are to be deemed a part of this invitation.

Partial payments to the Contractor will be made monthly as the work proceeds as provided in the form of contract.

The Contractor will be required to complete the work as soon as practicable and within a period of eighteen (18) months from the date of the delivery of this contract.

Sealed bids or proposals will be received at the office of the Commission at No. 154 Nassau st., Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, until the 7th day of February, 1913, at twelve (12) o'clock noon, at which time, or at a later date to be fixed by the Commission, the proposals will be publicly opened.

Proposals must be in the form prescribed by the Commission, copies of which may be obtained at the office of the Commission.

A statement based upon estimate of the Engineer, of the quantities of the various classes of the work and of the nature and extent as near as practicable of the work required is to be found in the schedule forming a part of the form of Contractor's Proposal. The quantities given in such schedule are approximate only, being given as a basis for the uniform comparison of bids and no claim is to be made against the City on account of any excess or deficiency, absolute or relative, in the same, except as provided in the specifications and form of contract.

All proposals must, when submitted, be enclosed in a sealed envelope endorsed "Proposal for Constructing Part of Rapid Transit Railroad—Routes No. 36 and 37, Section No. 3," and must be delivered to the Commission or its Secretary; and in the presence of the person submitting the proposal, it will be deposited in a sealed box in which

all proposals will be deposited. No proposal will be received or deposited unless accompanied by a separate certified check drawn upon a national or state bank or trust company, having its principal office in the City of New York, satisfactory to the Commission and payable to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York for the sum of fifteen thousand (\$15,000) dollars. Such check must not be enclosed in the envelope containing the proposal.

The Unit Prices must not be improperly balanced, and any bid which the Commission considers detrimental to the City's interests may be rejected.

No proposal after it shall have been deposited with the Commission will be allowed to be withdrawn for any reason whatever.

The award of the contract will be made by the Commission as soon as practicable after the opening of the proposals.

Bidders whose proposals are otherwise satisfactory, in case the sureties or securities named by them are not approved by the Commission, may substitute in their proposals the names of other sureties or securities approved by the Commission, but such substitution must be made within five (5) days after notice of disapproval unless such period is extended by the Commission.

A bidder whose proposal shall be accepted shall, in person or by duly authorized representative, attend at the said office of the Commission within ten (10) days after the delivery of a notice by the Commission that his proposal is accepted and that the contract is consented to by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and such bidder shall then deliver a contract in the form referred to, duly executed and with its execution duly proved.

At the time of the delivery of the contract, the Contractor will be required to furnish security to the City by giving a bond for fifty thousand (\$50,000) dollars. At the option of the successful bidder cash or approved securities may be deposited instead of giving a bond. If securities are deposited in place of a bond under this contract, they must be of the character of securities in which savings banks may invest their funds and must be approved by the Commission.

The Contractor's bond must be in the form annexed to the form of contract.

In addition and as further security fifteen (15%) per centum of the amounts certified from time to time to be due to the Contractor will be deducted until the amounts so deducted and retained shall equal the sum of one hundred thousand (\$100,000) dollars. Thereafter there shall be so deducted and retained for such purpose ten (10%) per centum of the amounts certified from time to time to be due to the Contractor. The Contractor may from time to time withdraw portions of the amounts so retained upon depositing in lieu thereof corporate stock of The City of New York equal in market value to the amounts so withdrawn.

In case of failure or neglect to execute and deliver the contract or to execute and deliver the required bond or to make the required deposit, such bidder will, at the option of the Commission, be deemed either to have made the contract or to have abandoned the contract. In the latter case the Commission will give notice thereof to such defaulting bidder, and the Commission may thereupon proceed to make another contract with such, if any, of the original bidders, as, in the opinion of the Commission, it will be to the best interests of the City to contract with, or may by new advertisement invite further proposals. The defaulting bidder shall thereupon be liable to the City for all loss and damage by it sustained, including the excess, if any, of the amount it shall pay any other Contractor over the amount of the bid of such defaulting bidder.

If the Commission shall give notice to any bidder that his or its proposal is accepted and that the contract is consented to by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and if the bidder shall fail within ten (10) days thereafter or within such further period, if any, as may be prescribed by the Commission, to execute and deliver the contract and to execute and deliver the bond with sureties, or to make the required deposit, then the Invitation to Contractors and proposal accepted as aforesaid shall be a contract binding the bidder to pay to the City the damage by it sustained by reason of such failure, and in such case the bidder shall, by the terms of the proposal, absolutely assign to the City the ownership of the check accompanying his or its proposal as a payment on account of such damages.

All such deposits made by bidders whose proposals shall not be accepted by the Commission will be returned to the person or persons making the same within five (5) days after the contract shall be executed and delivered. The deposit of the successful bidder will be returned when the contract is executed and its provisions in respect of the bond or deposit are complied with.

The right to reject any and all bids is reserved.

RAPID TRANSIT RAILROAD.

CONTRACT.

Routes Nos. 36 and 37—Section No. 3.

Agreement made this .. day of February, 1913, between The City of New York, hereinafter called the City, acting by the Public Service Commission for the First District, hereinafter called the Commission, party of the first part, and E. E. Smith Contracting Company, a corporation organized under the Laws of the State of New Jersey, hereinafter called the Contractor, party of the second part.

Whereas, the Commission in behalf of the City by due advertisement, pursuant to law, has invited contractors to submit to the Commission proposals for making this contract; and

Whereas, the Contractor has thereupon duly submitted to the Commission a proposal, which has been accepted; and

Whereas, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York has consented to this contract;

Now, therefore, in consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements hereinafter contained, and under the authority of chapter 4 of the laws of 1891, entitled, "An Act to provide for Rapid Transit Railways in Cities of over One Million Inhabitants," and of the various acts amending the same, the parties do hereby, the City for itself and its successors and the Contractor for itself, its successors and assigns agree each with the other as follows:

I.

GENERAL PROVISIONS AND DEFINITIONS.

Outline of Contract.

Article I. The Contractor agrees to construct the part hereinafter described of a Rapid Transit Railroad, with its appurtenances. The City agrees to pay the Contractor the sums of money hereinafter mentioned at the times and in the manner and upon the terms and conditions hereinafter set forth.

Brief Description of Works.

Article II. The Railroad to be constructed under this contract forms a part of a certain route adopted by the Commission on October 10, 1911, and which is known as the Fifty-ninth Street, Woodside and Astoria Route, or Route No. 36, and part of a certain route adopted by the Commission on October 10, 1911, and which is known as the Roosevelt Avenue Route, or Route No. 37. Route No. 36 and Route No. 37 combined form the Astoria, Woodside and Corona Rapid Transit Railroad, or Routes 36 & 37. The part of Routes 36 & 37 to be constructed under this contract consists of:

Section No. 3.

From Van Dam Street and Queens Boulevard to Sycamore Avenue and Roosevelt Avenue.

Beginning at a point on Queens Boulevard in the Borough of Queens about two hundred and seventy (270) feet northwest of the westerly line of Van Dam Street and extending thence along and over Queens Boulevard, Greenpoint Avenue, Skillman Avenue and Roosevelt Avenue to a point over Roosevelt Avenue about seventy (70) feet east of the easterly line of Sycamore Avenue (Albertus Avenue); with local stations at Rawson Street, Lowery Street, Bliss Street, Lincoln Avenue, Broadway, 25th Street, Elmhurst Avenue and Sycamore Avenue, and with express stations at Woodside Avenue and Junction Avenue.

The precise location of the tracks, and the dimensions and other characteristics of the Railroad are more fully stated in the specifications forming a part of this contract, and in the detailed drawings and plans hereinafter mentioned.

Statutes Incorporated Herein.

Article III. This contract is made pursuant to the Rapid Transit Act, which is to be deemed a part hereof as if it were incorporated herein.

Marginal Notes, etc.

Article IV. Titles, headings, running headlines and marginal notes are printed hereon merely for convenience and shall not be deemed to be any part of this contract for any purpose whatever.

Definitions of Words.

Article V. The following words and expressions used in this contract shall, except where by the context it is clear that another meaning is intended, be construed as follows:

"City."

(1) The word "City" to mean The City of New York, and any other corporation or division of government to which the ownership, rights, powers and privileges of The City of New York under the Rapid Transit Act, shall hereafter come, belong or appertain.

"Commission."

(2) The word "Commission" to mean the Public Service Commission for the First District, and any other board, body, commission, official or officials, to which or to whom the powers now belonging to the said Commission in respect of the location, construction, equipment, maintenance and operation of Rapid Transit Railroads under the provisions of the Rapid Transit Act shall, by virtue of any act or acts, hereafter pass or be held to appertain.

"Contractor."

(3) The word "Contractor" to mean the party of the second part to this contract, and its successors and assigns and any and every person or corporation who or which shall at any time be liable in the place or for the party of the second part to perform any obligations under this contract assumed by the said party of the second part. For convenience the Contractor is hereinafter referred to as if the Contractor were an individual. The word "he" shall, as the sense may require, include "it," "she" and "they"; the word "him" shall include "her," "it" and "them"; and the word "his" shall include "its," "her" and "their."

"Comptroller."

(4) The word "Comptroller" to mean the Comptroller of The City of New York and the officer or board to whom or to which his powers now existing under the Rapid Transit Act shall come to appertain.

"Engineer."

(5) The word "Engineer" to mean the Chief Engineer of the Commission or his duly authorized representative and any successor or successors duly appointed or any deputy or substitute for him who shall be appointed by the Commission or by its authority.

"Rapid Transit Act."

(6) The words "Rapid Transit Act" to mean chapter 4 of the laws of 1891 as amended by chapters 102 and 556 of the laws of 1892, chapters 528 and 752 of the laws of 1894, chapter 519 of the laws of 1895, chapter 729 of the laws of 1896, chapter 616 of the laws of 1900, chapter 587 of the laws of 1901, chapters 533, 542, 544 and 584 of the laws of 1902, chapters 562 and 564 of the laws of 1904, chapters 599 and 631 of the laws of 1905, chapters 472, 606 and 607 of the laws of 1906, chapter 429 of the laws of 1907, chapter 498 of the laws of 1909, chapters 205, 504, 505 and 506 of the laws of 1910, chapter 888 of the laws of 1911, and chapter 226 of the laws of 1912, or as heretofore otherwise amended.

"Railroad."

(7) The word "Railroad" to mean the part which the Contractor agrees by this contract to build, together with all appurtenances thereto which are to be constructed or provided by the Contractor.

"The Works."

(8) The words "the Works" to mean all of the matters and things herein agreed to be furnished or done by or on the part of the Contractor.

"New York."

(9) The words "New York" to mean the City of New York according to its boundaries at the date of this contract.

"Daily Newspaper."

(10) The words "daily newspaper" to mean any paper regularly published in New York on every day or every day except Sundays and holidays.

"Notice," "Direction."

(11) The word "notice" to mean a written notice. The word "direction" to mean a written direction.

Wherever in the specifications or upon the drawings the words "directed," "required," "permitted," "ordered," "designated," "prescribed," or words of like import are used, it shall be understood that the direction, requirement, permission, order, designation or prescription of the Engineer is intended, and similarly the words "approved," "acceptable," "satisfactory" or words of like import shall mean approved by or acceptable or satisfactory to the Engineer.

Legal Address of Contractor—Address May Be Changed.

Article VI. The address given in the bid or proposal, upon which this contract is founded, is hereby designated as the place where all notices, directions and other communications to the Contractor shall be certified, mailed or delivered. The delivering at the above-named place or depositing in a post-paid wrapper directed to the above place, in any post-office box regularly maintained by the Post-office Department, of any notice, letter or other communication to the Contractor, shall be deemed sufficient service thereof upon the Contractor. Such address may be changed at any time by an instrument in writing executed and acknowledged by the Contractor and delivered to the Commission. Nothing herein contained shall be deemed to preclude or render inoperative the service of any notice, direction or other communication upon the Contractor personally.

Contractor Responsible for Acts of Sub-contractor's Employees.

Article VII. If the Contractor shall cause any part of this contract to be performed by a sub-contractor, the provisions of this contract shall apply to such sub-contractor and his officers, agents and employees in all respects, as if he and they were employees of the Contractor; and the Contractor shall not be in any manner thereby discharged from his obligations and liabilities hereunder, but shall be liable hereunder for all acts and negligence of the sub-contractor, his officers, agents and employees as if they were employees of the Contractor. The employees of the sub-contractor shall be subject to the same provisions hereof as employees of the Contractor; and the work or materials furnished by the sub-contractor shall be subject to the provisions hereof, as if furnished directly by the Contractor.

Commission May Disapprove Sub-contractors.

Article VIII. The Contractor, before making any sub-contract of the work, shall state in writing to the Commission the name of the proposed sub-contractor, the portion of the work which such sub-contractor is to do or the materials which such sub-contractor is to furnish, the place of business of such sub-contractor and such other information as the Commission may require. The Commission shall have the right to require the Contractor not to award any sub-contract to a person, firm or corporation disapproved of by the Commission.

II.

WORK TO BE DONE, PRICES, ETC.

Work to be Done.

Article IX. The Contractor shall do all the work and furnish all the materials, plant, tools and appliances necessary or proper for performing and completing the work of constructing the Railroad in the manner and within the time hereinafter specified. He shall complete the Railroad and do all work and furnish all labor and materials in and about the construction of the Railroad to the satisfaction of the Commission and in accordance with this contract and the specifications and drawings herein mentioned at the prices herein agreed upon and fixed therefor; provided, however, that said contract drawings may from time to time be altered or modified as hereinafter provided.

Construction Includes Incidental Work.

Article X. In order to construct the Railroad it will be necessary to take up and relay the sidewalk pavement or other surface material, to protect, support and maintain during construction all buildings and other structures, including their foundations, and all surface railroads, water mains, gas pipes, electric subways, poles and wires, vaults, including vaults of abutting property, and other surface, subsurface and overhead structures, together with their necessary connections, as the same may be met with along the route; to build sewers along the route, to make or remake the necessary manholes, catch basins and other sewer connections therewith; to move, alter, readjust or rebuild water mains, gas pipes, electric subways, vaults, including vaults of abutting property, and other surface, subsurface and overhead structures, together with their necessary connections; and to do all such additional and incidental work as may be necessary for the completion of the Railroad and the reconstruction and restoration of the street pavements or other surfaces adjacent

to the route of the Railroad and which may have been directly or indirectly disturbed or injured by the Contractor in the progress of the work of construction, to as useful and good a condition as existed before construction shall have been begun. All such work of every description, including all work, labor and material in connection therewith, is part of the work which is included in this contract and which the Contractor agrees to perform for the prices herein agreed upon.

Prices.

Article XI. The City will pay and the Contractor shall receive in full compensation for furnishing the necessary plant and all the materials and labor, and for performing and completing all the work which is necessary or proper to be furnished or performed in order to complete the Railroad (including all incidental work) and also for all loss or damage arising out of the nature of the work aforesaid, or from the action of the elements, or from any unforeseen obstruction or difficulty encountered in the prosecution of the work, and for all risks of any description connected with the work, and for all expenses incurred by or in consequence of the suspension or discontinuance of the work as herein specified, the following prices, to wit:

Item 1-B. For Column Excavation, as specified in Section No. 74, the sum of One 75-100 dollars (\$1.75) per cubic yard.

Item 1-C. For Railroad Duct Excavation, as specified in Section No. 74, the sum of One 25-100 dollars (\$1.25) per cubic yard.

Item 6. For concrete masonry, in place, the sum of Six 00-100 dollars (\$6.00) per cubic yard.

Item 6-A. For concrete masonry for the reinforced concrete elevated Railroad, in place, the sum of Seven 20-100 dollars (\$7.20) per cubic yard.

Item 6-B. For natural cement finish for the reinforced concrete elevated Railroad, in place, the sum of Seventeen $\frac{1}{2}$ Cents (\$17 $\frac{1}{2}$ -100) per square yard.

Item 6-E. For granolithic surface finish for platforms of stations on the reinforced concrete elevated Railroad, in place, the sum of Fourteen Cents (\$14-100) per square foot.

Item 6-F. For concrete copings around stairwells for stations on the reinforced concrete elevated Railroad, in place, the sum of Forty Cents (\$40-100) per lineal foot.

Item 9. For brick masonry, in place, the sum of Twelve 00-100 dollars (\$12.00) per cubic yard.

Item 12. For timber piles, in place and prepared, the sum of Thirty-five Cents (\$35-100) per lineal foot.

Item 13. For timber foundations, placed and fastened, the sum of Fifty 00-100 dollars (\$50.00) per thousand feet, board measure.

Item 15. For waterproofing, treated woven fabric, laid with pitch or asphaltum, in place, as follows:

(b) For two-ply, the sum of Fifty Cents (\$50-100) per square yard.

(d) For four-ply, the sum of Ninety Cents (\$90-100) per square yard.

Item 17. For vitrified pipe, in place, as follows:

(e) For four (4) inch vitrified pipe, the sum of Thirty Cents (\$30-100) per lineal foot.

Item 17-A. For cast-iron pipe and fittings, including specials, "extra heavy," in place, the sum of

(a) For three (3) inch, the sum of Fifty-five Cents (\$55-100) per lineal foot.

(b) For four (4) inch, the sum of Seventy Cents (\$70-100) per lineal foot.

(c) For six (6) inch the sum of One 00-100 dollars (\$1.00) per lineal foot.

(d) For eight (8) inch, the sum of Two 00-100 dollars (\$2.00) per lineal foot.

Item 18-A. For Railroad ducts in place as required by Section No. 221 of the Specifications, the sum of Twelve $\frac{1}{2}$ Cents (\$12 $\frac{1}{2}$ -100) per duct foot.

Item 19. For riveted steel, painted and erected, the sum of Sixty 00-100 dollars (\$60.00) per ton of two thousand pounds.

Item 20. For steel beams and shapes with connections, painted and erected, the sum of Sixty 00-100 dollars (\$60.00) per ton of two thousand pounds.

Item 21. For steel rods and bars built in concrete, the sum of Forty-eight 00-100 dollars (\$48.00) per ton of two thousand pounds.

Item 25-A. For miscellaneous iron castings such as column fenders, manhole heads and covers, gratings, water, gas or other straight pipes, etc., in place, the sum of Sixty 00-100 dollars (\$60.00) per ton of two thousand pounds.

Item 25-B. For new cast-iron hub and spigot pipe, special castings, in place, the sum of Seventy 00-100 dollars (\$70.00).

Item 26. For special wire forms, in place, the sum of Ten Cents (\$10-100) per pound.

Item 30. For street surface restored:

(h) For all surfaces of whatever character as required in Section No. 225, the sum of One 75-100 dollars (\$1.75) per square yard.

Item 32. For wrought-iron electric conduits, in place, in stations as follows:

(a) For three-fourths (3/4) inch wrought-iron conduits, the sum of Thirty Cents (\$30-100) per lineal foot.

(b) For one and one-half (1 1/2) inch wrought-iron conduits, the sum of Forty-five Cents (\$45-100) per lineal foot.

(d) For one (1) inch wrought-iron conduits, the sum of Thirty-five Cents (\$35-100) per lineal foot.

Item 33. For cast-iron outlet boxes, in place, the sum of Seventy-five Cents (\$75-100) each.

Item 33-A. For cast-iron pull boxes, in place, the sum of Eight 00-100 dollars (\$8.00) each.

Item 75. For street surface railroads, including the support, reconstruction, rebuilding, etc., where necessary, as follows:

(c) For electric (overhead trolley) railroads, the sum of Two 00-100 dollars (\$2.00) per lineal foot of single track.

Item 128. For steel and iron stairways for the reinforced concrete elevated Railroad (including stringers), in place, the sum of Two 25-100 dollars (\$2.25) per lineal foot of tread.

Item 129. For steel and iron stairway platforms (including stringers), in place, the sum of Two 00-100 dollars (\$2.00) per square foot of platform.

Item 130. For sixteen (16) ounce copper, flashing for canopies of the stations on the reinforced concrete elevated Railroad, in place, the sum of Forty Cents (\$40-100) per square foot.

Item 131. For three (3) inch wrought iron pipe, in place, the sum of Forty Cents (\$40-100) per lineal foot.

Work Not Susceptible of Classification.

Article XII. In case any work or materials shall be required to be done or furnished in or about the Works—whether specified herein or indicated on the plans or not—which are not susceptible of classification under the Schedule of Unit Prices, the Contractor shall and will if ordered by the Engineer do and perform such work and furnish such materials at and for the actual and necessary net cost in money to the Contractor for labor and for material, where new material is used, and in addition thereto ten per centum (10%) of such net cost for the use of tools and plant superintendence and all other expenses incidental to the performance of such work and the furnishing of such material, and the Contractor shall have no further claim in excess of the above; but this method of payment shall not apply to the performance of any work or the furnishing of any material which in part or in whole is susceptible of classification under such schedule, which work or material shall be paid for in part or in whole, as the case may be, at the unit price given in such schedule, except as herein otherwise expressly provided.

In case any work or material shall be required to be done or furnished under the provisions of this Article, for cost plus ten (10%) per centum, the Contractor shall at the end of each day during the progress thereof furnish to the Engineer daily time slips showing the name and number of each workman employed thereon, the number of hours employed thereon, the character of work he is doing and the wages paid or to be paid to him, and also a daily memorandum of the material delivered on the work showing the amount and character of such material, from whom purchased and the amount paid or to be paid therefor. If required, the Contractor shall produce any books, vouchers, records or memoranda showing the work and materials actually paid for and the actual prices therefor.

Quantities Approximate Only.

Article XIII. It is expressly understood and agreed that the quantities of the various classes of work to be done and materials to be furnished under this contract, specified in the Contractor's Proposal, are approximate and only for the purpose of comparing, on a uniform basis, the bids offered for the Works under this contract; and neither the City, nor the Commission, nor any member of the Commission, is to be held responsible that any of the said estimated quantities shall, by reason of inaccuracies, or changes in the Works, be found even approximately correct in the construction of the Works; and the Contractor shall make no claim for anticipated profit, or for loss of profit, because of a difference between the quantities of the various classes of work actually done or materials actually delivered, and the estimated quantities stated in the Contractor's Proposal.

Right of Commission to Amplify Plans.

Article XIV. The Commission shall have the right, during the progress of the work, to amplify the plans, to add explanatory specifications and to furnish additional specifications and drawings.

Plans May Be Modified.

Article XV. The Commission further reserves the right to change the location and to alter, in any way it may deem necessary for the public interests, the drawings aforesaid, in part or altogether, at any time during the progress of the work, without constituting grounds for any claim by the Contractor for payment or allowance for damages or extra service other than is provided for items of the different classes of construction shown in the schedule, or where not susceptible of classification, then as otherwise provided herein.

Contractor Bound to Complete in Best Manner.

Article XVI. The Contractor shall complete the entire work in accordance with the specifications and contract drawings and according to the other provisions of this contract and within the times specified in this contract, in the most workmanlike manner and with the highest regard to the safety of life and property and according to the lines, levels and directions given by the Engineer, for the prices herein agreed upon.

Best Materials, Machinery, Tools, etc., to be Used.

Article XVII. The Contractor shall furnish of the best description all materials, machinery, implements, tools and labor necessary to construct and put in complete working order all work covered by the specifications, contract drawings and provisions of this contract, including all additional specifications, drawings and details issued or required as herein provided for the prices hereinbefore agreed upon.

Contractor Has Examined Location, Plans, Etc.

Article XVIII. The Contractor hereby represents that prior to the execution of this contract he has examined in detail on the ground the location mentioned herein and indicated on the plans, and that he has fully examined the plans and has read each and every clause and section of this contract and the specifications and has had full opportunity to consider the same and make necessary investigations relating thereto; and he agrees that he will not make any claim for, or have any right to, damages or an extension of time for completion of the Works, or any other concession, because of any misinterpretation or misunderstanding of this contract or the specifications or of the plans, or because of any lack of information.

No Acceptance to Obviate the Necessity for Sound Work, Etc.

Article XIX. No acceptance of any part of the Works or of materials therefor shall relieve the Contractor of his obligation to furnish sound material and perform sound work, whether with respect to such part or to any part of the Works.

Inspection.

Article XX. The Commission contemplates, and the Contractor hereby approves, the most thorough and minute inspection by the Commission and its Engineer, and by their representatives or subordinates, of all work and materials and of the manufacture or preparation of such materials from the beginning of construction to the final completion of the Works. It is the intention of the Commission that its Engineer shall draw the attention of the Contractor to all errors or variations from the requirements of this contract or other defects in workmanship or materials. But it is expressly agreed that no omission on the part of the Commission or its Engineer or any officer, member or subordinate of the Commission to point out such errors, variations or defects shall give the Contractor any right or claim against the City or shall in any way relieve the Contractor from his obligations according to the terms of this contract.

Contractor to Afford Facilities for Inspection.

Article XXI. The Contractor shall at all times give to the Commission and its members, to the Engineer and his assistants and subordinates, and any person designated by the Commission or its Chairman, all facilities, whether necessary or convenient, for inspecting the materials to be furnished and the work to be done under this contract. The members of the Commission, the Engineer and all employees of the Commission bearing his authorization or the authorization of the Commission or its Chairman, shall be admitted at any time summarily and without delay to any part of the Works or to inspection of materials at any place or stage of their manufacture, preparation, shipment or delivery.

Engineer to be Furnished Facilities.

Article XXII. The Engineer shall be furnished with every reasonable facility for ascertaining whether the work is in accordance with the requirements and intention of this contract, even to the extent of uncovering or taking down portions of finished work. Should the work thus exposed or examined prove satisfactory, the uncovering or taking down and the replacing of the covering or the making good of the parts removed shall be paid for at the contract prices for the class of work done; but should the work exposed or examined prove unsatisfactory, such uncovering, taking down, replacing and making good shall be at the expense of the Contractor.

Inspection Not to Relieve Contractor of Obligations.

Article XXIII. The inspection of the work shall not relieve the Contractor of any of his obligations to fulfill his contract as herein prescribed, and defective work shall be made good and unsuitable materials will be rejected, notwithstanding that such work and materials have been previously overlooked by the Engineer and accepted or estimated for payment. If the work or any part thereof shall be found defective before the final acceptance of the whole work, the Contractor shall forthwith make good such defect, in a manner satisfactory to the Engineer, and if any material brought upon the ground for use in the work, or selected for the same, shall be condemned by the Engineer as unsuitable or not in conformity with the specifications, the Contractor shall forthwith remove such materials.

Engineer's Determination—To Be Final and Conclusive Upon Contractor.

Article XXIV. To prevent disputes and litigations, the Engineer shall in all cases determine the amount, quality, acceptability and fitness of the several kinds of work and materials which are to be paid for under this contract; shall determine all questions in relation to the Works and the construction thereof, and shall in all cases determine every question which may arise relative to the fulfillment of this contract on the part of the Contractor. His determination and estimate shall be final and conclusive upon the Contractor, and in case any question shall arise between the parties hereto, touching this contract, such determination and estimate shall be a condition precedent to the right of the Contractor to receive any money under this contract.

Engineer to Explain.

Article XXV. The Engineer shall make all necessary explanations as to the meaning and intention of the specifications, shall give all orders and directions contemplated therein or thereby and in every case in which a difficult or unforeseen condition shall arise in the performance of the work required by this contract.

Other Contractors.

During the progress of the work it will be necessary for other contractors and persons to do work in or about the construction or equipment of the Railroad. The Contractor shall afford to such other contractors or persons such facilities as the Engineer may require.

Differences Between Contractor and Other Contractors.

Any differences or conflicts which may arise between the Contractor and other contractors of the Commission in regard to their work shall be adjusted and determined by the Engineer.

Substitute for Chief Engineer.

Article XXVI. Any engineer substituted by the Commission in place of the Chief Engineer during his absence, illness or inability or when the Commission shall so determine, shall, during his official connection, have all the power and authority of the Chief Engineer, and in all respects be recognized as such Chief Engineer.

III.

SPECIFICATIONS.

Specifications and Drawings Subject to Requirement of Railroad of Highest Class—
Where Text of Contract Doubtful, Best Materials and Workmanship Required.

Section No. 1. The specifications and contract drawings hereinafter mentioned and taken in connection with the other provisions of this contract are intended by the Commission to be full and comprehensive, and to show all the work required to be done. But in a work of this magnitude it is impossible either in advance to show all details, or precisely to forecast all exigencies. The specifications and contract drawings are to be taken, therefore, as indicating the amount of work, its nature and the method of construction so far as the same are now distinctly apprehended. The Railroad is intended to be constructed for actual use and operation as an inter-urban railroad of the highest class, adapted to the necessities of the people of New York, in the best manner, according to the best rules and usages of railroad construction, and in the event of any doubt as to the meaning of any portion or portions of the specifications or contract drawings, or of the text of the contract, the same shall be interpreted as calling for the best construction, both as to materials and workmanship, capable of being supplied or applied under the then existing local conditions. All the clauses of the specifications, and all the parts of the contract drawings, are, therefore, to be understood, construed and interpreted as intending to produce the results hereinbefore stated.

To Construct in Accordance with Specifications.

Section No. 2. The Contractor shall construct and complete the Railroad strictly in accordance with the requirements of these specifications; if, in the specifications or contract, any detail or other matter or thing requisite be not mentioned, nevertheless the same is deemed to be included and the Contractor hereby undertakes to do the same as part of the work hereunder, at the unit prices for each class of work where applicable or as provided in Article XII of the contract.

Maps and Drawings.

Section No. 3. The contract plans referred to in the contract and specifications bear date January 3, 1913, are each countersigned by the Engineer, are stamped with the seal of the Commission, bear the general title:

ROUTES NO. 36 AND 37. SECTION NO. 3.

Contract Drawing No.

and are designated or numbered as follows:

Nos. A-1 to A-10 inclusive, C-1 to C-14 inclusive (C-10, dated December 14, 1912), C-501 to C-504 inclusive and C-1001. Some of these drawings also apply to Sections 2 and 4 of Routes No. 36 and 37, and are so marked.

Typical Sections and Dimensions.

Section No. 4. The sections and dimensions shown on the contract drawings are typical sections and dimensions which should be applicable to the greater part of the work. Where, however, changes are deemed necessary they may be ordered under Article XV of the contract and the Engineer shall issue such plans and specifications as may be necessary.

Supplementary Drawings.

Section No. 5. In addition to the contract drawings already mentioned, the Commission has had prepared a set of maps and plans bearing the same seal and general title as the contract drawings, but designated as Supplementary Drawings. These supplementary drawings exhibit certain information which the Commission has received from its Engineer of the general nature of the soil underlying portions of the route, the nature and position of surface railways, water mains, gas and other pipes, sewers, electric subways, manholes, hydrants, catch basins and other surface, subsurface and overhead structures.

Supplementary Drawings May Be Examined.

Section No. 6. These supplementary drawings can be seen at the office of the Engineer, also samples of material taken in connection with test borings. They are exhibited to the Contractor without any guarantee on the part of the Commission as to their completeness or correctness. The Contractor may have copies (blue prints) of these drawings for such aid, if any, as may be derived from them, on the payment of the cost of blue-printing.

In Case of Difficulties Not Indicated on Supplementary Drawings.

Section No. 7. If, in the prosecution of the work, difficulties of any nature be encountered which are not indicated or suggested by the supplementary drawings, or by the samples of the test borings, or if additional surface, subsurface or overhead structures or obstructions be discovered or found of different size or in different positions or of different nature from those shown on the supplementary drawings, or if in any way such supplementary drawings be found erroneous, the Contractor shall take every necessary or proper precaution to overcome the unforeseen difficulty, and is to support, maintain, protect, remove, adjust or readjust, as the case may be, the additional or different surface, subsurface or overhead structures according to the direction of the Engineer, and as provided in this contract and these specifications.

Specifications Not Exclusive.

Section No. 8. It is expressly understood that the specifications do not include all requirements, but are requirements in addition to those heretofore or elsewhere given or provided in this contract. The specifications and other provisions of this contract, and the contract drawings, are intended to be explanatory of each other. Should, however, any discrepancy appear or any misunderstanding arise as to the import of anything contained in either, the explanation of the Engineer shall be final and conclusive.

Subdivisions of Specifications.

Section No. 9. These specifications are grouped in subdivisions as follows:

1. Brief Description of the Work.

General Nature.

Section No. 10. The Rapid Transit Railroad which is hereinbefore described is to be an elevated railroad. The general details of construction and the location of the various tracks, junctions, grades, etc., are indicated more particularly on the contract drawings.

The Contractor will not be required under this contract to provide or lay tracks or ties on any part of the Railroad, or to provide or lay broken stone or ballast on the reinforced concrete elevated Railroad.

Stations are to be constructed at such places as are indicated on the plans, but station finish work, except as specifically required to be done, is not included in the work to be done under this contract. Station construction must, however, be kept so advanced that station finish contractors can complete their work coincidentally with the completion of the Railroad.

Surface and Subsurface Structures.

Section No. 11. In addition to the construction of the Railroad, it will be necessary to do various incidental work which is generally referred to in Article X hereof.

2. General Clauses.

Best Quality of Work.

Section No. 12. All materials and workmanship must be of the best class in every respect, and the Engineer is to be the sole judge of their quality and efficiency.

Rapidity and Safety.

Section No. 13. All the work shall be prosecuted in the manner, according to local conditions, best calculated to promote rapidity in construction, to secure safety to life and property and to reduce to the minimum any interference with abutting property and the public travel. Paving, or other surface work affecting, or affected by, street traffic shall be prosecuted during such hours as will reduce such interference to a minimum. Night work shall be conducted, in accordance with the directions of the Engineer, so that annoyance to occupants of abutting property shall be reduced to a minimum, and the Engineer may, if in his judgment conditions so require, direct that night work be omitted.

Contract Section Part of System.

Section No. 14. The contract section embraced in this contract is one of a number of contract sections forming part of an extensive rapid transit railroad system, which the interests of the City imperatively require should be completed and put in operation without delay. If the Contractor shall fail so to prosecute his work that, in the judgment of the Engineer, it shall not be reasonably probable that the work will be completed within the time limited, the Contractor, if directed by the Commission, shall increase the number of shifts and the number of men in each shift as may be necessary to insure the completion of the work within the time required by this contract, or within the shortest possible time thereafter.

Emergencies.

Section No. 15. In case of emergencies involving danger to life or property, continuous work with an increased force may be ordered by the Engineer for such time as may be necessary.

Permits.

Section No. 16. No work shall be begun until the Commission shall issue to the Contractor a permit authorizing him to proceed. No permits for excavation will be issued until the Contractor has given satisfactory assurance to the Engineer that the material needed for construction has been acquired and is available. Such permits are to be in such form and to cover such portions of the work as the Commission shall prescribe.

When to Be Filed with Borough President.

Section No. 17. Before any opening is made in the surface of a street, a copy of the permit issued by the Commission shall have been filed with the Borough President not less than five days, unless the Engineer shall expressly direct work to begin within a less period.

Notice Regarding Commencement of Work.

Section No. 18. Before commencing work on any part of the route, the Contractor shall give notice in writing to the Engineer at least one (1) week in advance of his intention to commence such operations; and before commencing manufacture, or resuming manufacture, if the same has been suspended, of any article called for by these specifications, notice shall be given to the Engineer in writing at least one (1) week in advance, with the name and address of the maker and the amount and description of the material to be manufactured.

Methods of Construction.

Section No. 19. Detailed plans showing the proposed methods of construction shall be submitted to the Engineer and receive his approval before permits will be granted and before such plans are put in operation.

Ordinances and Regulations.

Section No. 20. In all operations connected with the Works all ordinances of the City, and of the Board of Health, so far as they may be valid and operative with respect thereto, and all laws of this State which are now applicable to and control or limit in any way the actions of those engaged in the work or affecting the materials belonging to them, shall be respected and strictly complied with, and the Contractor shall further strictly comply with all applicable Federal, State and Municipal regulations regarding the transportation in and around the City and Harbor of materials used in, or in connection with, the work.

Requirements of Borough President, etc., to Be Observed.

Section No. 21. Whenever the construction of the Works under the provisions of this contract shall interfere with, disturb or endanger any sewer, waterpipe, gas-pipe, or other duly authorized sub-surface structure, the work of construction at such points shall be conducted in accordance with the reasonable requirements of the Borough President or the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity or other officer or local authority having the care of and the jurisdiction or control over such sub-surface structures so interfered with, disturbed or endangered.

Building and Water Permits, Shut-Offs for Water Pipes, etc.

Section No. 22. The Contractor shall, at his own cost, provide for the water supply necessary for his work and he shall bear the cost of any inspection charge in connection therewith. He shall bear the expense absolutely necessary in the bagging of gas pipes where it is necessary to cut off the supply of same, and of the shutting off and restoration of the flow in water mains where such work applies to the maintenance and support thereof, as provided in Section No. 51 of the specifications.

Storage on Streets.

Section No. 23. Along the streets occupied by the Railroad and on cross-streets adjacent thereto, only a reasonable amount of such structural and other material as may be absolutely necessary to avoid delay in construction may be stored; such material must not be allowed to accumulate, but must be replenished from day to day. The amount to be so allowed shall be determined by the Engineer.

Material Stored.

Section No. 24. Excavated sand, gravel or stone that in the judgment of the Engineer is suitable for use in mortar, concrete, or masonry, also structural and other material to be used in the work, may be stored in such locations and for such periods as are approved by the Engineer.

Approval of Engineer Revocable.

Section No. 25. In any case material may only be so stored with the approval of the Engineer, revocable at any time; and if so ordered, such material shall be removed immediately on receipt of the order, or within a period of time to be therein stated.

Access to Fire Hydrants.

Section No. 26. Wherever the work is being carried on, free access must be given to every fire hydrant and fire alarm box, and when required hydrants shall be extended by suitable tube or piping to an accessible point as approved by the Engineer, and to the satisfaction of the Chief of the Fire Department. Materials must not be piled at any time or place within ten (10) feet of any fire hydrant or fire alarm box; and where materials are unavoidably piled or placed in the vicinity of a fire hydrant or fire alarm box, and to such height as to obscure a sight of the same, the position of such hydrant or fire alarm box shall be indicated by suitable signals, both day and night.

The Contractor shall guard, maintain and protect the existing wires, cables, ducts, manholes, posts and poles of the Fire Department. He shall not cause the interruption of the existing Fire Department Fire Alarm Telegraph service. No Fire Department wire, cable, duct, manhole, post or pole shall be disturbed except in the presence of a representative of the Bureau of Fire Alarm Telegraph. In case of the disturbance of any of the former, the same shall be restored to its existing condition by the Contractor at his own expense.

Work to Be Cleared.

Section No. 27. At his own expense and as directed from time to time by the Engineer, the Contractor is to clear the work, streets and all public places occupied by him of all refuse and rubbish that may accumulate from any source whatever and leave them in a neat condition; but this is in no way to be construed as placing upon the Contractor the usual duties of the Street Cleaning Department.

Assistance to Be Rendered to Owners of Buildings.

Section No. 28. Where access to any adjacent property is temporarily cut off, owing to the occupancy of the street by the Contractor, he must, at his own cost, render every assistance to the owner or occupant in handling such materials of any description, including all material to be removed by the Department of Street Cleaning, that has to be taken to or removed from such property; such material shall be taken to or from the nearest accessible point that in the opinion of the Engineer is convenient for handling.

Waste Material.

Section No. 29. Waste material of any character will under no conditions be permitted to remain on the streets, but must immediately on its becoming unfit for use in the work be carted away and disposed of by the Contractor as hereinbefore provided.

Conveniences for Men.

Section No. 30. Necessary conveniences, properly secluded from public observation, shall be constructed and maintained by the Contractor at his own expense

wherever needed for the use of the Contractor's employees, to the satisfaction of the Engineer and the sanitary authorities.

Fences.

Section No. 31. Wherever necessary the Contractor shall erect and maintain at his own expense fences for the protection of adjoining property and of the adjoining public places.

Advertisements Forbidden.

Section No. 32. The using of fences and buildings during construction for advertising purposes, other than the name and address of the Contractor, is forbidden; all temporary buildings and fences erected by the Contractor shall be neat in appearance and shall be painted as directed by the Engineer.

Barricades.

Section No. 33. Barricades and bridges shall be erected by the Contractor at his own cost, for the protection of the work or use of the public; they shall be substantial in character and neat in appearance.

Detailed Drawings.

Section No. 34. The Engineer will prepare and furnish to the Contractor, from time to time as required, drawings and plans amplifying such details of the contract drawings as may be necessary, and drawings and plans necessary to show the adjustment and reconstruction of all surface and subsurface structures wherever the reconstruction of the same is necessitated by the construction of the railroad. These plans must be strictly followed, unless local conditions should develop, during construction, suggesting changes, when, with the approval of the Engineer, such changes may be permitted.

Working and Shop Drawings.

Section No. 35. The Contractor shall make all working or shop drawings which may be required in addition to the contract drawings, or in addition to such other drawings as the Commission may issue in amplification of such contract drawings, as explained above. All working or shop drawings shall be submitted in duplicate to the Engineer for his approval, which approval shall be indicated by his counter-signing one set of such working or shop drawings and returning the same to the Contractor. Should the working or shop drawings be not approved by the Engineer, then the Engineer shall return one set of such working or shop drawings, with the necessary corrections and changes indicated thereon; and the Contractor must make such corrections and changes, and again submit plans in duplicate for the approval of the Engineer; and no work called for by said working or shop drawings shall be done until the approval of the Engineer be obtained, which must be given or refused within twenty (20) working days after delivery to him at his office of such plans in duplicate.

Lines and Grades.

Section No. 36. During the progress of the work the Commission will give, through the Engineer, to the Contractor, suitable points, marks or benches, indicating the line and grade of the Railroad and of the sewers; such points or bench marks to be established at such intervals as the Engineer deems necessary for the Contractor to be able to perform his work. The principal lines and grades are to be given by the Engineer, who may change them from time to time as may be authorized and directed by the Commission. The stakes and marks given by the Engineer shall be carefully preserved by the Contractor, who shall give to the Engineer all necessary assistance and facilities for establishing benches and plugs and for making measurements.

Notice, How Given.

Section No. 37. When the Contractor is absent from any part of the work where it may be necessary to give instructions, orders will be given by the Engineer to, and shall be received and promptly obeyed by the superintendent or overseer of the Contractor, who may have charge of the particular work in relation to which the orders are given, and a confirmation in writing of such orders will be given to the Contractor by the Engineer if so requested.

Imperfect Work.

Section No. 38. Any imperfect construction which may be discovered before the final acceptance of the work, shall be corrected immediately on the requirement of the Engineer and at the Contractor's expense, notwithstanding that it may have been overlooked by the proper inspector.

Damaged Work to be Replaced.

Section No. 39. All work of whatever kind which during its progress and before its final acceptance shall become damaged from any cause shall be broken up or removed and be replaced by good and sound work at the Contractor's expense.

Condemned Materials to be Removed.

Section No. 40. If any material brought on the ground for use in the work or selected for the same shall be condemned by the Engineer as unsuitable or not in conformity with the specifications, the Contractor shall forthwith remove such materials as may be directed by the Engineer.

Competent Men.

Section No. 41. The Contractor shall employ only competent, skillful and faithful men to do the work. Whenever the Engineer shall notify the Contractor in writing that in his opinion any man on the work is incompetent, unfaithful or disorderly, such man shall be discharged from the work and shall not again be employed on it.

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General Manner of Prosecution and Maintenance of Traffic.

Access to Buildings, etc.

Section No. 42. No building shall, without the consent of the occupant, and after notice to the Engineer, be deprived of means of access thereto; and, where necessary, suitable means shall be provided, at the Contractor's expense, to permit owners and occupants to reach their premises. Where necessary, proper and easy means for passengers to reach or leave street cars shall be maintained.

Contiguous Contract Sections.

Section No. 43. On the division line of contiguous contract sections, the Engineer will decide any matters in the details of construction within a limit of twenty feet on either side of the line where the work of contractors may be in conflict, and direct which of the contractors shall complete the details of construction within such limits.

Conduct of Work.

Section No. 44. Generally the Contractor will be permitted to conduct his work in the most expeditious manner possible, having due regard for the safety of persons and property and facilities for traffic and under such instructions as the Engineer may give from time to time.

Facilities for Travel.

Section No. 45. All necessary facilities are to be furnished by the Contractor for the benefit of street travel, both on longitudinal and cross streets.

Close Observance of Above Requirements.

Section No. 46. The Commission will insist upon the close observance of the above requirements, and no departure therefrom will be allowed, excepting upon the written permission of the Commission.

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Street Railroad Tracks, Mains and Other Surface, Subsurface and Overhead Structures.

Notice to be Given.

Section No. 47. Notice is to be given by the Contractor to all individuals, companies and the proper city officials, owning or having charge of surface, subsurface or overhead structures along any part of the work, of his intention to commence operations along such part of the route, at least one (1) week in advance, and the Contractor shall file with the Engineer at the same time a copy of said notice; and he shall co-operate with the proper parties, officers or officials in charge of such structures and shall furnish them with all reasonable facilities to inspect the methods of caring for their property.

Plans Furnished.

Section No. 48. In the rearrangement of surface, subsurface or overhead structures requiring removal and relaying or reconstruction due to interference with the railroad structure a tentative plan will be made by the Engineer, which will be submitted to the parties interested; if any reasonable charges are then requested by any of the said parties within ten (10) days after the submission of the tentative plan, such changes will then be made, if in the judgment of the Engineer they will best conserve the interest of all parties concerned; a further plan will then be made which, on the approval of the Engineer, will be final.

Reconstruction or Relaying, etc.

Section No. 49. Whenever it becomes necessary to cut, move, change or reconstruct any surface, subsurface or overhead structures, or connections therewith (as more particularly enumerated in article 10), such work shall be done in accordance

with the standard specifications and reasonable requirements of the several owners or of the Borough President or Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity or other officer or local authority having the care of and the jurisdiction or control over such structures, except as elsewhere herein specifically provided.

Reasonable Dispatch.

Section No. 50. All work of reconstruction or alteration shall be done with reasonable dispatch, and facilities are to be provided so that said work will interfere as little as possible with the practical working and use of such structures.

Maintenance, Support, etc.

Section No. 51. The Contractor shall at all times, by suitable bridging or other supports, maintain and support in an entirely safe condition for the usual service and to the reasonable satisfaction of the owners, all surface, subsurface and overhead structures and appurtenances encountered or affected during the prosecution of his work. All surface, subsurface and overhead structures and appurtenances, and all surfaces of whatever character along the line of the work shall be protected from injury, but should any injury occur the Contractor shall fully restore such surface, subsurface or overhead structures and appurtenances or surfaces to as good a condition as existed before the injury was done. All the above, including also all changes of surface, subsurface or overhead structures and appurtenances made by the Contractor for his own convenience in executing his work, shall be done at the Contractor's own expense.

Necessary Permanent Changes.

Section No. 52. Payment for all changes of surface, subsurface or overhead structures and appurtenances, including all work, labor and material incidental thereto, made necessary because of physical interference with the Railroad structure and requiring their removal, relaying or reconstruction in other than their original positions, is included: In the cases of surface and overhead structures, in the price stipulated in the *Schedule* for riveted steel, Item 19; in the case of subsurface structures, in the prices stipulated in the *Schedule* for Column Excavation and Railroad Duct Excavation, Items 1-B and 1-C; except as otherwise herein specifically provided under other *Schedule Items*.

In the design of the Railroad structure it is intended to avoid physical interference with surface, subsurface and overhead structures as far as in the judgment of the Engineer it may be reasonably practicable to do so.

Maintenance of Surface Railroads.

Section No. 53. The Contractor shall maintain and support both temporarily and permanently, in a manner that will cause the minimum interference with traffic, and in a safe condition all street surface railroads, including ducts, cables and all other appurtenances of such railroads; he shall rebuild either in their original or in new locations all parts of such surface railroads, including ducts, cables and all other appurtenances of such railroads, whose reconstruction or rebuilding may be necessitated by the construction of the work; and he shall construct trolley-wire troughs or other insulating protection under the Railroad structure. Payment therefor will be at the rate specified in *Schedule Item* 75, which price will include the cost of all work, labor and material incidental thereto, which means that such work, labor and material will not be paid for under any other *Schedule Item*. The work of rebuilding tracks mentioned herein is not intended to include the movement of tracks laterally, but only such work as is incidental to the construction of the Railroad; except that at stations the track nearest the structure will be moved laterally.

Trolley troughs and insulating protection shall be similar to such constructions under the elevated extensions of the existing Manhattan-Bronx Rapid Transit Railroad constructed under the contract of February 21, 1900, between the City and John B. McDonald in The Bronx on the Broadway and West Farms divisions.

Facilities to be Given to Make Extensions.

Section No. 54. In the event of the owners or the City desiring to make any addition, alteration or extension to their structures, or do any work to or in connection with surface, subsurface or overhead structures owned by them, or it, or to lay any new structure in or across a street occupied by the Works, at the time the work under this contract is in progress, the Contractor, by written permission, shall give said owners or the City all reasonable opportunity to perform such work; provided such work or alteration for the benefit solely of the owners of subsurface structures does not cause the Contractor any serious loss or delay, as shall be determined by the Commission. The written permission from the Contractor, with three prints of plans or sketches, or a description indicating the proposed work in detail, shall be submitted to and approved by the Engineer before any work shall be proceeded with under such written permission.

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Excavation.

Width of Excavation.

Section No. 55. Special care must be taken to avoid damage wherever excavations are being made. The width of such excavations shall not exceed the width actually necessary, in the opinion of the Engineer, for the proper prosecution of the work. All excavations shall be of such dimensions as shall be necessary, in the opinion of the Engineer, for the proper and expeditious progress of the work, and to permit the laying and readjusting of all sewers, mains, subways and other subsurface structures encountered.

Depth of Excavation.

Section No. 56. All excavations shall be excavated to such depth, both in soft ground and in rock, as may be necessary to permit the laying of such concrete bed or special foundation as shown on the plans or as may be deemed necessary by the Engineer. But in the case of column foundations on ledge rock in place the surface of the rock shall be carefully cleaned of loose and rotten rock and roughly brought to a horizontal surface; except that where such rock is less than five (5) feet below the surface it shall be excavated to a depth of at least five (5) feet below the surface.

Sides to be Secured.

Section No. 57. The sides of the excavations shall be secured against slips by suitable sheet piling or sheeting, held in place by braces, shores or walling timbers, special precautions being taken where there is additional pressure, due to the presence of buildings or other structures. Where a movement of the ground might cause the settlement of an adjacent building, the sheeting must be started, if near the building, before the elevation of the bottom of the foundation of the building is reached; if away from the building, at such depth of the excavation as the Engineer may permit; and the excavation must not be made in advance of or below the bottom of the sheeting.

Filling Back of Sheetings.

Section No. 58. Sheetings shall be driven wherever possible, but when it is placed against the sides of the excavation, the spaces or voids back of the sheeting must be immediately and carefully filled with suitable material to prevent as far as possible the natural ground back of the sheeting from moving.

Sheeting.

Section No. 59. No payment shall be made to the Contractor for sheeting left in the ground or in the work, unless the Engineer shall in writing require it to be left in, in which case payment shall be made to the Contractor for the sheeting so left in as measured by the Engineer, and at one-half the current market price for new material of the same grade, character and dimensions, and without any allowance or payment for placing the same or the expense thereof.

Timber for Temporary Purposes.

Section No. 60. All timber used for sheeting, shoring, bracing, decking or other temporary purposes, shall be sound and free from any defects that may impair its strength. It shall be provided, placed and removed at the Contractor's own cost and expense. All sheeting and timber used temporarily shall be put in place by skilled mechanics, keyed tight by wedges where necessary, and so arranged as to be withdrawn readily without endangering the adjoining soil.

Vaults of Abutting Property.

Section No. 61. The cost of the removal, where necessary, of all walls or other parts of vaults of abutting property that are within the ordered net lines of any excavation is included in such excavation as provided in Section No. 70, but the restoration of all such walls or other parts of vaults originally within the ordered net lines of such excavation will be paid for at the unit prices specified in the *Schedule* applicable to the several classes of work and material involved in such restoration.

The above is not to be construed, however, as applicable to any work beyond the ordered net lines of such excavation, which shall be at the Contractor's own cost and expense.

Vaults Disturbed.

Section No. 62. Wherever vaults of abutting property are broken through or otherwise disturbed, the Contractor shall at his own cost and expense erect a six-inch

hollow tile wall laid in Portland cement mortar, as a temporary partition, on or about the building line, or as directed, that will afford proper protection to the owner or occupant of the adjoining premises.

Blasting.

Section No. 63. Whenever rock or other material requiring blasting is encountered in any excavation, all necessary precautions must be exercised by the Contractor, as required by the ordinances of the City relative to blasting. Explosives shall be used only of such character and strength as may be permitted by the Commission, and the right is reserved for the Engineer to direct that in special cases ordinary blasting powder only, in small charges, shall be used. Blasting shall not be done between the hours of 11 P. M. and 7 A. M. without the express permission of the Engineer, and under such restrictions as he may impose.

Storage of Explosives.

Section No. 64. No larger quantity of explosives shall be kept on the line of the work than will be actually required for the twelve (12) hours of work next ensuing, and it shall be kept under lock, the key to which is to be only in the hands of the foreman or other equally trustworthy person. The amount of explosives kept in any one place shall not exceed the limit permitted by any ordinance of the City, or as may be determined by the Commission. Caps and exploders shall not be kept in the same place with dynamite and other explosives. During freezing weather, special precautions shall be taken as to the care and manipulation of dynamite.

Near Pipes and Mains.

Section No. 65. Whenever any pipe or main is encountered in or alongside of the excavation, right is reserved to direct that all rock within five (5) feet of the same shall be removed by means other than blasting.

Pumping.

Section No. 66. Whenever water is encountered in excavations, the same shall be removed by bailing or pumping, great care being taken when pumping that the surrounding particles of soil be not disturbed or removed. If necessary to prevent such disturbance, the pumping must be done by a series of driven wells whose points are protected by fine wire cloth, the rate of flow at each well being made so slow as not to remove the particles of soil; or the pumping must be done by other means approved by the Engineer. The delivery from all pumps shall be conducted into adjacent sewers, and the delivery pipes shall be so arranged as to be readily inspected at all times to ascertain if the water is free from particles of soil.

Carts to be Tight.

Section No. 67. All carts, buckets or other vehicles used by the Contractor for the removal of material shall be tight and so arranged and so loaded as not to spill over. Whenever a cart, bucket or other vehicle so used is leaky or unsuitable, it shall be immediately withdrawn from the work on notification by the Engineer, or his duly qualified assistant, in charge of that portion of the work.

Removed Expeditiously.

Section No. 68. Excavated material shall be removed expeditiously and disposed of, in any place selected by the Contractor, subject to the ordinances and regulations of the City authorities governing the disposal of such material, and the regulations of the United States Government as to the disposal or dumping of material in and about or near the Harbor of New York.

When Excavated Material May Be Taken by City.

Section No. 69. If at any time during the course of construction the City shall desire for city purposes any part of the material excavated, and the cost of such disposal shall not exceed the cost to the Contractor of the method in which he is then disposing of it, the Commission may order such material dumped or turned over to the City at a point designated without cost to the City.

Section No. 70. All excavations include the excavation of all materials of whatever nature encountered in the excavations, including earth above and below mean high water, ledge rock in place, boulders and other materials requiring blasting. Excavation shall be classified and paid for as either:

Column Excavation, Definition of.

(1) Column Excavation, which includes all excavation for Railroad column foundations and for all subsurface structures required to be removed, relaid or reconstructed in other than their original locations or otherwise changed because of their physical interference with Railroad column foundations, or

Railroad Duct Excavation, Definition of.

(2) Railroad Duct Excavation, which includes all excavation for Railroad ducts and Railroad duct manholes and their appurtenances and for all subsurface structures required to be removed, relaid or reconstructed in other than their original locations or otherwise changed because of their physical interference with Railroad ducts or Railroad duct manholes.

Ordered Net Lines of Excavation and Measurement.

Section No. 71. The ordered net lines of excavation and the measurements for payment therefor will be determined as follows:

(1) Column foundations and duct manholes: In excavation for Railroad column foundations and Railroad duct manholes the ordered net lines of excavation and the measurements therefor, except such portion as may be in rock, shall include the total excavation from the street surface to the bottom of the column foundation or the bottom of the duct manhole, within vertical planes one and one-half (1½) feet outside of the net outside lines of the bottom of such column foundation or duct manhole, as ordered or indicated on the plans.

In such portion of the excavation for Railroad column foundations and Railroad duct manholes as may be in rock the ordered net lines of excavation and the measurements therefor shall include the total excavation from the surface of the rock to the bottom of the column foundation or the bottom of the duct manhole, within vertical planes six (6) inches outside of the net outside lines of the bottom of such column foundation or duct manhole, as ordered or indicated on the plans.

(2) Railroad ducts: In excavation for Railroad ducts the ordered net lines of excavation and the measurements therefor shall include the total excavation from the street surface to the bottom of the duct structure within vertical planes passing through the net outside lines of such duct structure, as ordered or indicated on the plans.

(3) **Subsurface structures:** In excavation for subsurface structures required to be removed, relaid or reconstructed in other than their original locations or otherwise changed because of their physical interference with railroad column foundations or Railroad ducts or Railroad duct manholes the ordered net lines of excavation and the measurements therefor will be as follows:

(a) **Electric ducts and pipe conduits:** In excavation for electric ducts and pipe conduits, other than Railroad ducts, the ordered net lines of excavation and the measurements therefor shall include the total excavation from the street surface to the bottom of such ducts or pipe conduits within vertical planes passing through the net outside lines of such ducts or pipe conduits; provided, however, that if such ducts or pipe conduits shall consist of a single conduit or a group of conduits not enclosed in concrete, then the ordered net lines of excavation and the measurements therefor shall include the total excavation from the street surface to the extreme bottom of such single conduit or group of conduits within vertical planes one (1) foot outside the net outside lines of such single conduit or group of conduits.

(b) **Pipes:** In excavation for pipes the ordered net lines of excavation and the measurements therefor, except such portion as may be in rock, shall include the total excavation from the street surface to a depth of six (6) inches below the interior diameter of the pipe within a trench two (2) feet wider than the interior diameter of the pipe; provided, however, that where in the opinion of the Engineer the trench for laying pipes 30 inches or more in diameter is required to be close sheeted and the trench is so sheeted, the ordered net lines of excavation and the measurements therefor, except such portions as may be in rock, shall include the total excavation from the street surface to a depth of six (6) inches below the interior diameter of a 20-inch or smaller pipe and twelve (12) inches below the interior diameter of a pipe of larger diameter within a trench two (2) feet wider than the interior diameter of the pipe. No allowance will be made for the removal of rock under the bells to give the required clearance.

(c) **Valve chambers and other structures:** In excavation for valve chambers and for valves, valve boxes and hydrants, the ordered net lines of excavation and the measurements therefor shall include the total excavation from the street surface to the lowest part of such valve chamber or other structure within

vertical planes one (1) foot outside of the net outside lines of the bottom of such valve chamber or other structure.

(d) **Other subsurface structures:** For all other subsurface structures the ordered net lines of excavation will be as directed by the Engineer.

At the intersection of two trenches or at the intersection of a pipe or other trench with an excavation made by the Contractor under orders from the Engineer for any purpose whatsoever, the cubical contents of the intersection will be allowed only once. Under no circumstances will a double allowance be made for any excavation.

No deduction from the amount of excavation to be allowed as aforesaid will be made on account of vault space or spaces occupied by pipes or other subsurface structures.

No Allowance Outside of Ordered Net Lines.

Section No. 72. There will be no measurement or allowance made nor money paid for excavation outside (in plan or depth) the ordered net lines of excavation as indicated in Section No. 71; and no allowance shall be made for any excess excavation caused by slips or slides. It is understood and agreed that the Contractor has estimated and allowed for all such matters in *Schedule Items 1-B and 1-C*.

Payment for Excavation.

Section No. 73. Column Excavation shall be paid for at the price stipulated in *Schedule Item 1-B*; Railroad Duct Excavation at the price stipulated in *Schedule Item 1-C*.

Prices for Excavation to Include.

Section No. 74. The prices herein stipulated for Column Excavation and Railroad Duct Excavation, *Schedule Items 1-B and 1-C* respectively, are to include the cost of excavating, of the disposal of the materials excavated, of backfilling, of all sheeting and bracing, of maintaining and supporting of openings during and after excavation, of all pumping or bailing, and of the maintenance, support, removal, reconstruction, with all incidental work, labor and material of any kind, of all subsurface structures and surfaces of whatever nature and their appurtenances, payment for which is not herein elsewhere specifically provided for under other *Schedule Items*.

6.

BACKFILLING.

Quality of Material—How Placed.

Section No. 75. Wherever necessary, excavations shall be back-filled with sand, gravel or other good clean earth, free from perishable material and from stones exceeding six (6) inches in diameter, and not containing in any place a proportion of stone of or below that size exceeding one (1) part of stone to five (5) parts of earth. The filling shall be compacted by flooding with water or, in cases where flooding with water is not practicable it shall be compacted by ramming in layers, not exceeding six (6) inches in depth.

Subsurface Structures—Frozen Material Not Permitted.

Section No. 76. Whenever pipes, sewers, or other subsurface structures are met with, the filling must be carefully packed, rammed and tamped under and about such subsurface structures, using special tools for the purpose. No filling of trenches with frozen earth will in any case be permitted, nor will any filling be permitted over frozen material.

Sheeting Removed.

Section No. 77. As fast as the work of filling permits, sheeting and other timber supporting the sides of the excavation shall be carefully withdrawn, and the spaces left by the removal of such material carefully back-filled, but if directed by the Engineer the sheeting shall be left in place.

How Paid For.

Section No. 78. The cost of backfilling is to be included in the prices paid for Column Excavation and Railroad Duct Excavation, *Schedule Items 1-B and 1-C* respectively.

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PILING AND TIMBERING.

Character of Piles.

Section No. 79. If in the judgment of the Engineer the ground is of such a character as to require piling, the Contractor shall drive such piles as the Engineer directs. The piles shall be of good, sound pine or spruce, or other acceptable timber, straight and free from shakes; they shall be not less than twelve (12) inches in diameter at the butt end, or less than six (6) inches in diameter at the point, and shall be driven to the satisfaction of the Engineer and by means of a steam hammer driver if so required by him. If necessary the points of the piles shall be protected by proper shoes, and the butts by rings or caps. Piles shall not be spliced unless permitted by the Engineer, and then in such manner as he directs. Piles shall be carefully cut off to the grade given by the Engineer.

Piles Driven in Required Location.

Section No. 80. Piles shall be driven in the position and manner and to the depth ordered; if driven in a wrong position or injured in any way by driving they must be withdrawn and replaced by others. After being driven they shall be cut off to a true plane for proper adjustment with capping timber or masonry.

Payment for Timber Piles.

Section No. 81. The price herein stipulated to be paid per lineal foot of timber piles, *Schedule Item 12*, is to cover the cost of furnishing, driving and preparing the piles ready for the capping timber's or masonry, including all work, labor and material in connection therewith, and the portion cut off and removed will not be included in the length measured for payment. No test piles, guide piles, or piles other than those that are a part of the finished foundation and are included within the net width of the finished foundation will be paid for.

Concrete Piles.

Section No. 82. If in the judgment of the Engineer special conditions so require, piles of re-inforced concrete of an approved form of construction shall be used.

Payment for Piles Other Than Timber Piles.

Section No. 83. Payment for piles other than timber piles will be as provided in Article XII. of the contract.

Grillage.

Section No. 84. Timber grillage foundations shall be built if so directed by the Engineer.

Foundation Timber.

Section No. 85. All foundation timber shall be of pine or spruce, or other timber permitted by the Engineer, sound and free from shakes. It shall be of such dimensions, and laid in such manner, as the special plans to be issued shall require, and held in place by bolts, spikes or good seasoned oak or locust treenails.

Foundation Timber, Measurement and Payment.

Section No. 86. No wastage is to be allowed for, and the estimate of the quantities of foundation timber used will be based on the amount ordered by the Engineer and placed according to his directions. Payment for foundation timber, including all work, labor and material in connection therewith, will be as provided in *Schedule Item 13*.

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CEMENT.

Portland Cement.

Section No. 87. All cement used in the work shall be true Portland cement, by which is meant the finely pulverized product, resulting from the calcination to incipient fusion of a properly proportioned intimate mixture of argillaceous and calcareous earths or rocks, to which no addition greater than three (3) per cent. has been made subsequent to calcination.

Brand to be Approved.

Section No. 88. Before any cement is furnished, the brand shall receive the approval of the Engineer. Cement, to be acceptable, shall be of a well-known brand which has been in successful use for large engineering works in America for at least five (5) years, and which has an established reputation for uniform character. Preference will be given to cements which, by their records, show a tendency to maintain high strength of mortar with increased age.

Inspection.

Section No. 89. Cement shall be subject to inspection at the place of manufacture or on the work, and to such tests as may be ordered by the Engineer. The Engineer or his representatives shall have access at all times and places to inspect the methods of manufacture, storage and protection, and shall have liberty to inspect the daily laboratory records of tests and analyses at the cement works.

Tests.

Section No. 90. In general, tests will conform to the methods recommended by the Committee on Uniform Tests of Cement of the American Society of Civil Engineers. Unless otherwise directed, samples will be taken at the place of manufacture by a representative of the Engineer, and sent to the Commission's laboratory, where

the tests will be made. If required, tests will be made on the individual samples, without intermixing.

Specific Gravity and Color.

Section No. 91. The cement shall have a specific gravity of not less than 3.10 nor more than 3.25 after being thoroughly dried at a temperature of 212 degrees Fahr. The color shall be uniform, bluish gray, free from yellow or brown particles.

Chemical Analysis.

Section No. 92. Chemical analyses of cement made from time to time shall show a reasonably uniform composition. Cement shall not contain more than 1.75 per cent. of sulphuric anhydride (SO_3) nor more than 4 per cent. of magnesia (MgO).

Fineness.

Section No. 93. The fineness of the cement shall be such that it shall leave by weight a residue of not more than eight (8) per cent. on a No. 100, and not more than twenty-five (25) per cent. on a No. 200 sieve; the wires of the sieves being respectively 0.0045 and 0.0024 inch in diameter.

Time of Setting.

Section No. 94. It shall not develop initial set in less than thirty (30) minutes unless a more quickly-setting cement is specifically required, and shall develop hard set in not less than one (1) hour nor more than ten (10) hours.

Soundness.

Section No. 95. Pats of neat cement, after remaining one (1) day in moist air, shall be kept in air or water of normal temperature for at least twenty-eight (28) days, or shall be exposed to an atmosphere of steam, above boiling water, in a loosely closed vessel for at least five (5) hours; and the separate parts under any of these conditions shall remain hard without any indications of checking, cracking, distortion, disintegration or blotching.

Tensile Strength.

Section No. 96. Neat cement briquettes shall have at the end of one (1) day in moist air a breaking strength, per square inch of sectional area, of not less than one hundred and fifty (150) lbs.; at the end of seven (7) days—one (1) day in air, six (6) days in water—of not less than five hundred (500) lbs.; and at the end of twenty-eight (28) days—one (1) day in air, twenty-seven (27) days in water—of not less than six hundred (600) lbs. The strength at twenty-eight (28) days shall not be less than that at seven (7) days.

Mortar Briquettes.

Mortar briquettes, composed of one (1) part of cement and three (3) parts of standard Ottawa sand, by weight, shall have at the end of seven (7) days—one (1) day in air, six (6) days in water—a breaking strength, per square inch of sectional area, of not less than two hundred (200) lbs.; and at the end of twenty-eight (28) days—one (1) day in air, twenty-seven (27) days in water—of not less than three hundred (300) lbs. The strength at twenty-eight (28) days shall show an increase of not less than fifty (50) lbs. over the strength at seven (7) days.

Long-time Tests.

Section No. 97. Tests will be made from time to time extending over longer periods than twenty-eight (28) days. If such tests show a tendency to unsoundness or unusual reduction in strength with increased age, the Engineer shall have the right to prohibit the further use of that brand and to require that another brand be substituted.

Storage During Tests.

Section No. 98. All cement shall be held in storage to allow ample time for masonry shall be one (1) part cement to two (2) parts sand; for pointing, one (1) part cement to one (1) part sand; for concrete masonry, as specified under the head of concrete; and for other classes of work, as directed by the Engineer.

Masonry.

How Contained.

Section No. 99. Cement shall be packed and delivered in canvas sacks or other strong, well-made packages, plainly marked with the manufacturer's brand, and sealed in an approved manner. The weights of such packages shall be uniform.

Methods of Storing.

Section No. 100. The Contractor shall at all times keep in store on the work, or at some point convenient thereto, a sufficient supply of cement, so as to guard against possible shortage. It shall be stored in a weather-tight building, with a tight floor a proper distance above the ground, and with sufficient floor space to admit of storing each lot of cement separately, so as to facilitate identification of each individual lot in case of necessity for further tests or rejection. Cement that has become partially set or otherwise damaged shall not be used.

9.

MORTAR.

Cement and Sand—Mixing.

Section No. 101. All mortar shall be prepared from accepted cement and clean, sharp sand, approved by the Engineer. These ingredients shall be thoroughly mixed dry in the proportions as specified below; water shall then be added, so as to produce a stiff paste. Water used in mortar, grout or concrete must be clean, fresh water, no salt water being permitted. The mortar shall be freshly mixed for the work on hand, in proper boxes made for that purpose, and no mortar shall be used that has stood beyond such limit of time as may be determined by the Engineer.

How Measured.

Section No. 102. For purposes of mixture, three hundred and seventy-five (375) pounds of Portland cement shall be estimated at three and one-half (3½) cubic feet of volume. The proportional parts of sand and stone or gravel shall be by volume as cast into the measuring box. The proportions for brick masonry shall be one (1) part cement to two (2) parts sand; for pointing, one (1) part cement and one (1) part sand; for concrete masonry, as specified under the head of concrete; and for other classes of work, as directed by the Engineer.

10.

MASONRY.

Laid in Portland Cement.

Section No. 103. All masonry, except as otherwise specified, shall be laid in Portland cement mortar, and shall be built of the forms and dimensions shown on the plans, or as directed by the Engineer from time to time; and the system of joining or bonding ordered by the Engineer shall be strictly followed.

Water Not to Interfere With.

Section No. 104. Care must be taken that no water shall interfere with the proper laying of masonry in any of its parts.

Freezing Weather.

Section No. 105. During freezing weather such masonry only shall be built whose construction, in the judgment of the Engineer, can not be postponed, except at the cost of delaying the work. The Contractor shall provide such appliances as are necessary for heating the water and the materials used in the masonry according to the specific instructions of the Engineer.

Protected in Freezing Weather.

Section No. 106. During freezing weather all masonry shall be protected by a suitable covering of salt hay, canvas, tarpaulin or by such material or in such ways as may be necessary to insure it against freezing.

Hot Weather.

Section No. 107. During hot weather all masonry, especially concrete, shall be kept wet by sprinkling and properly covered until it has become thoroughly set and hardened.

Pointing.

Section No. 108. Unless otherwise permitted, every joint that is to be pointed shall be raked out, within two (2) days after being laid, to a depth of at least two (2) inches.

Mortar for Pointing.

Section No. 109. Pointing of the face joints of masonry shall be thoroughly made with cement mortar mixed in the proportion of one (1) part of cement to one (1) part of sand, except where otherwise specially provided.

When Pointing Permitted.

Section No. 110. No pointing shall be done in freezing weather, and masonry laid between December 1st and April 1st shall not be pointed until permitted by the Engineer.

Defective Masonry.

Section No. 111. Any masonry which is found to be defective from any cause whatsoever, before the final completion and acceptance of the work, must be removed and properly rebuilt, or if damaged during such time must be properly repaired.

11.

*CONCRETE.

How Composed.

Section No. 112. The concrete shall be composed of gravel or broken stone, or mixture of both, free from all dust and dirt, and mixed together with the proportion of mortar specified below.

Sand.

Section No. 113. Sand for concrete shall be of the kind herein specified for mortar.

Stone.

Section No. 114. Stone for concrete shall be sound, clean gravel, or sound, hard, broken limestone, or trap rock, or a mixture of such gravel and broken stone may be used.

Sizes of Stone.

Section No. 115. Broken stone or gravel for concrete shall be graded from fine to coarse, and that which is all of one size, or practically so, shall not be used. It shall be screened or washed so as to remove all dust, and it shall contain no pieces that will pass through a hole three-eighths (3/8) inch in diameter, and no pieces that will not pass through a hole one and one-half (1½) inches in diameter. Broken stone or gravel for concrete, graded as above, but between three-eighths (3/8) and three-fourths (3/4) inch in diameter, may be required and used in special parts of the work.

Rubble Concrete.

Section No. 116. In concrete where the thickness is thirty (30) inches or more, if permitted by the Engineer, the Contractor may imbed in the same pieces of clean, sound stone whose greatest diameter does not exceed twelve (12) inches and whose least diameter or thickness is not less than three-quarters (3/4) of the greatest diameter. These stones shall be set by hand in the concrete as the layers are being rammed, and so placed that each stone is completely and perfectly imbedded. No two (2) stones shall be within six (6) inches of each other and no stones within four (4) inches of an exposed face, nor shall any such stone be placed nearer than six (6) inches to any metal built in the concrete for reinforcing the same.

Proportions.

Section No. 117. The proportions of cement, sand and stone (or gravel) used in making concrete shall be one (1) part of cement, two (2) parts of sand and four (4) parts of stone.

Mixing by Machine.

Section No. 118. Whenever practicable, concrete shall be machine mixed. A rotary machine of a pattern approved by the Engineer, and mixing only one batch at a time, shall be used.

Mixing by Hand.

Section No. 119. When concrete is mixed by hand the stone or gravel shall be spread on a platform in a bed about six (6) inches thick, and shall be thoroughly wet. Sand shall be spread on a platform and the requisite portion of cement spread on the sand. After thoroughly mixing the latter, the dry mixture thus formed shall be spread evenly over the bed of stone wet as above, and the whole turned over until thoroughly mixed, but not less than two (2) turnings on the mixing board shall be allowed in any case, water being added as necessary. Care shall be taken to keep the bed of concrete wet and avoid piling.

How Laid.

Section No. 120. Concrete shall be placed immediately after mixing in layers of such thickness as may be directed by the Engineer, and shall be thoroughly compacted throughout the mass by ramming or spading, special tamping bars or tools being used as approved by the Engineer. The amount of water used in making the concrete shall be as approved by the Engineer. If a small amount of water has been used in mixing, ramming shall be continued until the water flushes to the surface; as a rule, however, concrete shall be placed wet.

Time for Hardening.

Section No. 121. Concrete shall be allowed to set for twelve (12) hours, or more, if so directed, before any work shall be laid upon it; and no walking over or working upon it shall be allowed while it is setting. Concrete shall not be flooded with water before being thoroughly set.

Rock Surface to be Cleaned.

Section No. 122. Before laying concrete on rock surfaces the latter shall be carefully cleaned of loose and rotten rock and roughly brought to a horizontal surface, and when laid on earth the earth shall be rammed as directed before placing the concrete.

Surface Rough for Bonding.

Section No. 123. Wherever a section of concrete is necessarily left unfinished, leaving a surface which will be hard set before additional concrete can be laid, care shall be taken to flush the cement to such surface, and such dovetails or grooves shall be formed as may be necessary to insure a good bond with the new work; and if deemed necessary by the Engineer, the joints shall be reinforced with steel bars or dowels, to be furnished by the Contractor.

Joints Cleaned.

Section No. 124. In all cases of joints of old with new work the old surfaces shall be thoroughly cleaned and wet, and a coating of mortar or cement shall be applied, if required, before placing the concrete.

Forms.

Section No. 125. Suitable forms shall be provided by the Contractor to support the concrete while being placed. These forms shall be immediately replaced by new ones as soon as they commence to lose their proper shape. The forms shall be made of wood or metal.

Section No. 126. The forms if made of wood, shall be made of boards with tight joints, tongued and grooved if required by the Engineer.

Forms, How Set—Defective Work Replaced.

Section No. 127. The forms shall be set true to line, firmly secured, and be so tight as not to allow water in the mortar to escape. On the removal of the forms if there are voids such as to indicate an excessive loss of mortar, portions of the concrete shall be cut out to the fullness of such defects and the space refilled with a rich concrete or mortar in such proportions and in such manner as the Engineer may direct.

Reinforcement Steel.

Section No. 128. Where reinforcement steel is used, efficient means shall be provided to maintain it in the exact position it is to occupy in the completed work, and to prevent it from becoming dislodged, or moved in any manner, when concrete is placed.

Concrete, How Measured and Paid For.

Section No. 129. Concrete masonry shall be measured in place in the work to the prescribed net lines ordered by the Engineer and shall be paid for at the price stipulated in Schedule Item 6, which price is to include the cost of all scaffolding, centres, forms, etc., and removing the same, and all work, labor and material incidental thereto.

Backing or Filling Concrete. Not Paid For.

Section No. 130. No concrete backing or filling outside of the ordered net lines of the structure will be paid for.

12.

BRICK MASONRY.

Quality.

Section No. 131. Bricks for masonry shall be of the best quality common bricks, burned hard entirely through, regular and uniform in shape and size and of compact texture.

How Laid.

Section No. 132. All brick masonry shall be laid in mortar of the quality above described, except that in exposed locations coloring matter may be added, if required by the Engineer. The bricks shall be laid to line with joints in the face work not exceeding one-quarter (1/4) of an inch in the beds, and three-eighths (3/8) of an inch on ends; the bricks to be thoroughly wet before laying and to be completely embedded in mortar under the bottom and on the sides and ends at one operation, care being taken to have every joint full of mortar.

All exterior surfaces shall be smooth and regular.

Cleaned.

Section No. 133. The inside faces of all arches and other exposed parts shall have all the mortar scraped off and washed clean immediately after the centres have been struck, and shall be pointed and left in neat condition.

* See also subdivision 17.

No "Bats" or Culls.

Section No. 134. All bricks of whatever nature shall be carefully culled and if necessary gauged before laying, at the expense of the Contractor. No "bats" shall be used except in large masses of brickwork, where a moderate proportion, to be determined by the Engineer, may be used, but nothing smaller than half bricks.

Racked or Toothing.

Section No. 135. All unfinished work shall be racked back or toothed, as directed by the Engineer, and before new work is joined to it the faces of the brick in the old work must be scraped entirely clean, scrubbed with a stiff brush and be well moistened.

Measurements and Payments.

Section No. 136. Brick masonry shall be measured to the lines indicated and shown on the plans or as ordered by the Engineer and shall be paid for as herein stipulated in Schedule Item 9, for common brick masonry; this price is to include the cost of all scaffolding, forms, centres, etc., and the removal of the same, of all plastering and pointing, and of all other work, labor and material incidental thereto.

13.

Steel and Iron.

Open Hearth Process.

Section No. 137. Steel shall be made by the open hearth process.

Chemical and Physical Properties.

Section No. 138. The chemical and physical properties of finished material shall conform to the following limits:

Yield Point.

Section No. 139. The yield point shall be that strain beyond which the elongation ceases to be proportional to the weight imposed, and may be indicated by drop of beam. The speed of testing shall be governed by the inspector.

Finish.

Ductility Elongation.

Section No. 140. In determining the ductility, the elongation shall be measured after breaking on an original length as specified, in which length shall occur the curve of reduction each side of the point of fracture.

Chemical Determinations.

Section No. 141. Chemical determinations of the percentages of carbon, phosphorus, sulphur and manganese shall be made by the manufacturer from a test ingot, so taken, during the casting of each melt of steel as to fairly represent the melt. Two copies of such analyses shall be furnished to the Engineer or his Inspector.

Test Pieces.

Section No. 142. Sample pieces for tensile and bending tests of plates, shapes and bars shall be cut from such portions of the finished product of each melt as the inspector may designate, and shall be stamped by him; they shall have both faces rolled and both edges milled to the usual form of a standard test specimen,—one and one-half (1½) inches wide on a gauged length of nine (9) inches,—or with both edges parallel. The area of the minimum section shall not be less than one-half (½) square inch.

Rivet Rods.

Section No. 143. Rivet rods shall be tested as rolled.

Where Taken From.

Section No. 144. For rollers and pins the specimens shall be cut from the finished bar so that the center of the specimen shall be one inch from the outside of the bar.

Steel Castings.

Section No. 145. For steel castings the test piece shall be turned to a uniform minimum section of one-half (½) inch diameter, for a length of at least two and one-half (2½) inches. Specimens for bending shall be one (1) inch by one-half (½) inch in section.

Treatment of Test Specimens.

Section No. 146. For steel castings the number of tests will depend on the character and importance of the castings. Specimens shall be cut cold from coupons molded and cast on some portion of one or more castings from each melt. The coupons shall be annealed with the castings before being cut off.

Rolled steel shall be tested in the condition in which it comes from the rolls.

Number of Tests.

Section No. 147. At least one tensile and one bending test shall be made from each melt of steel as rolled. In case steel differing three-eighths (3/8) inch or more in thickness is rolled from one melt, a test shall be made from the thickest and from the thinnest material rolled.

Duplicate Tests.

Section No. 148. If the above tests do not fulfil the requirements of these specifications, duplicate tests may be made at the discretion of the inspector, he selecting and stamping the duplicate test pieces. If these retests meet all the requirements, the melt shall be accepted.

Angles.

Section No. 149. Angles three-quarters (3/4) of an inch and less in thickness shall open flat, and angles one-half (½) of an inch and less in thickness shall bend shut, cold, under blows of a hammer, without signs of fracture. This test shall be only made when required by the inspector.

Rivet Steel.

Section No. 150. Rivet steel, when nicked and bent around a bar of the same diameter as the rivet rod, shall give a gradual break and a fine, silky, uniform fracture.

Discard.

Section No. 151. Sufficient discard shall be made to insure sound material free from piping or excessive segregation. The material shall be finished straight and smooth, and shall be free from all seams, flaws, cracks, defective edges or other defects. Any imperfection which may develop during the progress of the work will be sufficient cause for rejection.

Material Marked.

Section No. 152. Each finished piece of steel shall be marked with the melt number, excepting that the bars for reinforcing concrete shall be bundled and the melt number stamped on a metal tag attached to each bundle.

Variation in Weight.

Section No. 153. A variation in weight of any piece of steel of two and one-half per centum (2½ per cent.) from that specified shall be sufficient cause for rejection, except in case of sheared plates exceeding one hundred (100) inches in width, where the variation may be five (5) per centum.

Rejections.

Section No. 154. Material which, subsequent to the above tests at the mills and its acceptance there, develops weak spots, brittleness, cracks or other imperfections, or is found to have injurious defects, will be rejected at the shop and shall be replaced by the manufacturer at his own cost.

Mill Orders.

Section No. 155. The Engineer shall be furnished copies in triplicate of all mill orders, and no material shall be rolled nor work done before the Engineer has been notified so that he may arrange for the inspection.

Test Pieces.

Section No. 156. The Contractor shall furnish, without extra charge, such standard test pieces as may be necessary to determine the uniform quality of the material and also the use of a reliable testing machine, with the necessary labor for testing.

WROUGHT IRON.

Double Rolled.

Section No. 157. All wrought iron shall be double rolled, tough, fibrous and uniform in character. It shall be thoroughly welded in rolling and be free from surface defects.

Method of Testing.

Section No. 158. The methods specified for testing rolled steel shall apply generally to wrought iron. Standard test specimens shall show an ultimate strength of at least fifty thousand (50,000) lbs. per square inch, and an elongation of at least eighteen per centum in eight (8) inches, with fracture wholly fibrous. Specimens shall bend cold with the fibre, through one hundred and thirty-five degrees (135°), without sign of fracture, with inner radius not to exceed the thickness of the piece tested. When nicked and bent the fracture shall show at least ninety (90) per centum fibrous.

CAST IRON.

Chemical Requirements.

Section No. 159. Cast iron shall be tough gray iron made by the Cupola process and shall contain not more than 0.6 per centum of phosphorus and not more than 0.12 per centum of sulphur. No mill cinder iron, white or burnt iron or scrap of any kind will be permitted in the composition.

Test Bar.

Section No. 160. The quality of the iron entering into castings shall be determined by means of the "Arbitration Bar." This is a bar 1¼ inches in diameter and 15 inches long, cast under the same circumstances as those which attended the casting of the full-sized piece. This bar shall sustain at the center, when resting upon two dull knife edges twelve (12) inches apart, a load of three thousand (3,000) pounds with a deflection of at least one-tenth (1/10) of an inch before rupture.

Number of Test Bars.

Two (2) sets of two (2) bars shall be cast from each heat; one set from the first and the other set from the last iron entering into the castings. Each set of two bars is to be made in a single mold.

True to Pattern.

Section No. 161. Castings must be sound, true to pattern, free from cracks, flaws, excessive shrinkage, and have smooth, clean surfaces. They must be neatly chiseled and wirebrushed before leaving the foundry. Castings which do not accurately conform to dimensions on the plans will be rejected. Each casting shall have its distinguishing letter or number cast on at the place indicated on the plans.

WORKMANSHIP.

Quality.

Section No. 162. All workmanship shall be first class. All parts exposed to view shall be neatly finished. All nuts exposed to view on the final structure shall be hexagonal. Shearing and chipping shall be neatly and accurately done and all portions of the work, exposed to view, neatly finished. Lattice bars shall have neatly rounded ends concentric with the rivet holes.

Material Straightened in Shop.

Section No. 163. All material shall be straightened in the shop before being worked in any way.

Size of Rivets.

Section No. 164. The size of rivets called for on plans shall be understood to mean the actual size of the cold rivet before heating.

Rivets Holes Accurately Spaced.

Section No. 165. All holes shall be accurately spaced and punched. The diameter of the punch shall not be more than one-sixteenth (1-16) inch greater than the diameter of the rivet. The diameter of the die shall be as small as may be required to punch a clean hole.

Punching.

Section No. 166. Punching shall be accurately done. Drifting to enlarge unfair holes will not be allowed. If the holes must be enlarged to admit the rivet they shall be reamed. Poor matching of holes will be cause for rejection.

Sub-punching and Reaming.

Section No. 167. Where sub-punching and reaming are required, the punch used shall have a diameter not less than three-sixteenths (3-16) inch smaller than the rivet. Holes shall then be reamed to a diameter not more than one-sixteenth (1-16) inch larger than the nominal diameter of the rivet. All reaming shall be done with twist drills after the material is assembled and firmly bolted together. The use of lubricants in reaming is not allowed.

Drilling.

Section No. 168. All materials over seven-eighths (7/8) of an inch thick shall be drilled from the solid. Material over five-eighths (5/8) of an inch and not exceeding seven-eighths (7/8) of an inch in thickness shall be sub-punched and reamed.

Burrs Removed.

Section No. 169. All burrs shall be removed, and the members shall have all parts firmly drawn together with bolts before reaming or riveting is commenced.

Sheared Edges.

Section No. 170. Sheared edges of plates, exceeding five-eighths (5/8) of an inch in thickness in main members, shall be planed at least one-eighth (1/8) of an inch where called for on plans.

Assembling.

Section No. 171. Riveted members shall have all parts well pinned up and firmly drawn together with bolts, before riveting is commenced.

Riveting.

Section No. 172. Rivets when driven shall completely fill the holes, and shall be machine driven wherever possible. They shall have full concentric heads or they shall be countersunk when so required. Rivet heads shall not be flattened to less than half the diameter of the rivet on the line of the shank unless countersunk. Loose, burned or otherwise defective rivets shall be cut out and replaced. In cutting out defective rivets, great care shall be taken not to injure the adjacent material. If necessary they shall be drilled out.

Rivet Spacing.

Distances from center of rivet to edge of sheared plate shall not be less than 1¼ inches for 3/4-inch rivets and 1¾ inches for 5/8-inch rivets; distances from center of rivets to a rolled edge shall not be less than 1½ inches for 3/4-inch rivets and 1¾ inches for 5/8-inch rivets. The minimum pitch for 3/4-inch rivets shall be 2½ inches and for 5/8-inch rivets 2½ inches. When material is sub-punched and reamed the pitch for 3/4-inch rivets may be made 2½ inches and for 5/8-inch rivets 2½ inches.

Use of Bolts.

Section No. 173. Generally the use of bolts instead of rivets will not be permitted, but when used in special cases the holes shall be reamed parallel, and the bolts turned to a driving fit, with the threads entirely outside of the holes.

Templates.

Section No. 174. All holes for field rivets where called for on plans shall be sub-punched and accurately drilled to an iron template, fitted with bushings, or reamed and match marked while the connecting parts are temporarily assembled in the shop. In case of splices of upper chords or other compression members, the abutting ends shall be brought to a forcible bearing.

Stiffeners—Splice Plates and Fillers.

Section No. 175. Stiffeners of plate girders shall be faced on the ends and brought to a true contact bearing with the flange angles. Web splice plates and fillers under stiffeners shall be cut to fit within one-eighth (1/8) of an inch of flange angles.

Finished Members.

Section No. 176. Finished members shall be true and free from kinks, twists or open joints. Ends of floor beams and stringers shall be finished square and true.

Web Plate Projections.

Section No. 177. Web plates must not project beyond the flange angles or be more than one-quarter (1/4) of an inch back of face of same.

Abutting Surfaces Faced.

Section No. 178. All abutting surfaces shall be neatly planed or faced perpendicular to the direction of the strain, so as to insure even bearings, except where otherwise noted on the plans.

Pins and Rollers.

Section No. 179. Pins and rollers shall be turned accurately to a gauge and shall be of full size throughout. All pin-holes shall be bored truly and at right angles to the axes of the members to be connected and shall fit the pins with a play not exceeding one-thirty-second (1-32) of an inch for pins over 5 inches in diameter, and not exceeding one-fiftieth (1-50) of an inch for pins 5 inches and less in diameter. Anchor bolts and adjustable members over one (1) inch in diameter shall be of structural steel with cold-rolled threads; the threaded portion of such bolts, tested to destruction, shall develop a greater strength than the unthreaded portion.

Rods Upset.

Section No. 180. Rods and bars which are to receive a thread shall be properly upset. Where threads are cut on steel, they shall be properly filed.

Bed Plates Planed.

Section No. 181. Bed plates shall be planed. The bottom of the shoes shall be

planed exactly parallel to the centre line unless otherwise shown. The cutting of the planing tool shall be in the direction of expansion.

Annealing.

Section No. 182. Steel, except in minor details, which has been partially heated, shall be properly annealed. All steel castings shall be annealed.

Steel Castings True to Pattern.

Section No. 183. Steel castings shall be true to pattern and free from injurious imperfections.

Rods and Bars Deformed Sections.

Section No. 184. Rods and bars to be used for reinforcing concrete shall be deformed as approved by the Engineer; plain bars will not be used.

Bent Rods.

Section No. 185. Bent rods shall be bent uniformly to template in a machine or press approved by the Engineer. They may be bent either at the shop or on the work. In special cases bending hot and annealing may be required.

Details Boxed.

Section No. 186. Nuts, bolts, rivets and other similar material shall be boxed.

Weight Marked.

Section No. 187. The weight shall be plainly marked upon every piece and box.

Inspection.

Section No. 188. Free access and information shall be given by the Contractor for a thorough inspection of material and workmanship, with proper office facilities.

Contractor Responsible.

Section No. 189. The Inspector shall make detailed reports of his inspection to the Engineer and may notify the Contractor of any defects in the material or workmanship, but all acceptances made by him shall be considered temporary, and his inspection shall in no way relieve the Contractor of full responsibility for the character and accuracy of the work until its completion and final acceptance by the Engineer.

Errors in Plans.

Section No. 190. The Contractor shall be responsible for all errors which can be discovered by checking or examining the plans.

Inspector's Office.

Section No. 191. The Contractor shall furnish for the use of the Inspector a suitably equipped office at the mills and at the shops.

Loading and Shipping.

Section No. 192. All parts shall be carefully loaded and protected from injuries during transportation by such means as will be satisfactory to the Inspector. After delivery of materials at the work the Contractor will be required to store the same on skids at least twelve (12) inches above the ground and to keep the same in good condition. Any piece showing injurious effects of rough handling at any stage until the final acceptance of the work may be rejected.

Payments for Steel.

Section No. 193. The prices to be paid for steel are as herein provided in Schedule Items 19, 20 and 21. These prices include the cost of material delivered and erected in the work, of all necessary cleaning and painting (where painting is required) and of all other incidental work, labor and material. The quantity of metals to be paid for shall be the number of pounds actually placed in accordance with the drawings or orders. The price for Item 19 also is to include the cost of the maintenance, support, removal and reconstruction, with all incidental work, labor and material, etc., of all surface and overhead structures of whatever nature and their appurtenances, payment for which is not herein elsewhere specifically provided for under other Schedule Items.

Payments for Castings.

Section No. 194. For miscellaneous iron castings, such as column fenders, man-hole heads and covers, gratings, water, gas or other straight pipes, etc., payment shall be made as provided in Schedule Item 25-A; for new cast-iron hub and spigot pipe, special castings, payment shall be made as provided in Schedule Item 25-B. These prices shall include the cost of the material delivered and erected in the work.

Under these Items payment will be made for such new castings as may have to be provided on account of changes, etc., made necessary because of physical interference with the Railroad, as more fully described in Section No. 52. This does not relieve the Contractor, however, of his obligation to preserve all castings that are in a good condition and can be reclaimed and used, in order to avoid the necessity whenever possible of providing new castings.

Wire Forms.

Special wire forms, of a type and weight to be approved by the Engineer, are to be furnished and placed around the lower flanges of the roof girders, and at other places as may be required, in order to hold the concrete in place.

Wire Forms, Payment For.

Special wire forms, wherever used, will be paid for as stipulated in Schedule Item 26, which price is to include the material in place and all work necessary and incidental thereto.

Painting.

Section No. 195. All metal work, excepting as otherwise herein provided, shall be painted with three coats of paint, including the shop coat, of kind and quality approved by the Engineer.

Shop Coat.

Section No. 196. All iron shall be scraped free from scale, and receive one coat of red lead paint as herein specified before leaving the shops. All surfaces which come in contact or are enclosed shall be painted before being assembled. All turned or faced surfaces shall receive a coat of white lead and tallow before leaving the shops. If the Engineer so directs on members or parts of members buried in concrete the shop coat will be omitted.

Quality of Red Lead.

Section No. 197. The red lead shall be strictly pure, and shall contain at least 80 per cent. of "true lead" (Pb_3O_4). The color shall be a clean, pure tint. The red lead shall be of the fineness that when washed with water through a No. 19 silk bolting cloth, not more than 1 per cent. shall be left on the screen.

Quality of Linseed Oil.

Section No. 198. The linseed oil must be absolutely pure, fully aged and ripened, well settled oil. It shall be perfectly clear on receipt, and after heating to 212 degrees Fahr. on a current of hydrogen, shall not show a deposit of foots nor a loss of over 0.4 per cent. for raw oil, nor over 0.2 per cent. for boiled oil. The specific gravity at 60 degrees Fahr. for raw oil shall be between 0.932 and 0.937, and for boiled oil between 0.936 and 0.940.

Original Packages.

Section No. 199. All material shall be delivered, inspected and sampled in original packages.

Proportions in Mixture.

Section No. 200. Red lead paint shall be mixed in the proportion of 500 lbs. of red lead to 5½ gallons of boiled linseed oil, and 11 gallons of raw linseed oil.

Damaged Shop Coat to Be Renewed.

Section No. 201. Where the shop coat has become damaged before or after erection, through any cause whatever, it shall be renewed with the same kind of paint as originally used, such renewal to be considered only as a part of the original shop coat.

Structural Steel and Rods.

Section No. 202. Structural steel and rods to be imbedded in concrete shall be protected from the weather before being put in place, and shall be cleaned and scales removed before being incased in the concrete. Rods shall not be painted.

Second Coat Carbon Paint.

Section No. 203. The second coat of paint shall be a carbon paint approved by the Engineer. It shall be applied after erection, but not until the metal has been cleaned from dirt or other objectionable matter that may be found thereon.

Metal to Be Cleaned After Erection.

Section No. 204. After erection the metal shall be thoroughly cleaned of all dirt, rust or scales by stiff wire brushes or sand blasts, as directed, and afterward dusted and thoroughly and evenly painted as described above. No paint shall be applied until the cleaning has been passed upon by an Inspector.

Third Coat, When Applied.

Section No. 205. The third or finishing coat, which shall be a carbon paint of a color and quality approved by the Engineer, shall be applied to all exposed surfaces of the metal after its erection. It shall be applied at such time after such completion and before the final acceptance of the work as in the judgment of the Engineer may be advisable. The several field coats shall be sufficiently tinted to be distinctive.

Surfaces in Contact.

Section No. 206. Surfaces of exposed members inaccessible after erecting, shall be cleaned and painted before erecting.

Recesses, Etc.

Section No. 207. All recesses that might contain water, or through which water could enter, must be filled with thick paint or a waterproof cement of ground skins before receiving final painting.

Section No. 208. All surfaces so close together as to prevent the insertion of a brush, must be painted thorough by using a piece of cloth, if necessary.

Rainy or Freezing Weather.

Section No. 209. No painting in rainy or freezing weather or on wet surfaces will be permitted.

Payments.

Section No. 210. Payment for painting is included in the prices for steel and iron.

15.

DUCTS.

Vitrified Ducts—Quality and Size.

Section No. 211. The ducts to contain cables for transmitting electricity for the Railroad shall be manufactured of the best clay, thoroughly mixed, burnt and vitrified, sound in all respects, straight and free from soft spots, stones, cracks or blisters liable to impair their strength or durability; in lengths generally of eighteen (18) inches, shorter lengths shall only be used as directed; generally in one-way form with circular holes, the diameter to be such as to pass a mandrel three and one-half (3½) inches in diameter. The interior surface of the holes to be smooth and clear of warts, pits, pits or blisters, which may tend to injure the electric cable in pulling the same through the duct. The ends to be cut smooth and at right angles to the axis of the duct and beveled on inside for three-quarters (¾) of an inch.

Thickness of Ducts.

Section No. 212. The outside walls and webs of one-way ducts to be three-quarters (¾) of an inch thick; the outside dimensions of ducts to be not less than five (5) inches, and constructed square on outer lines with corners cut off.

Ends Combed.

Section No. 213. The ends of ducts to be combed with two (2) sets of three (3) combings each, each combing to have a width of one-quarter (¼) of an inch and a depth of one-sixteenth (1-16) of an inch.

Glaze.

Section No. 214. The inside and outside of ducts to be thoroughly glazed in the most approved manner with good salt glaze.

Inspection.

Section No. 215. All ducts to be subject to inspection, both at the place of manufacture and on the work. All rejected ducts to be promptly removed by the Contractor at his expense.

How Laid.

Section No. 216. The ducts shall be laid in beds of cement mortar about one-quarter (¼) of an inch in thickness, with broken joints and with full bearing. Two (2) strips of thick unbleached muslin six (6) inches wide, and coated with neat cement mortar, shall be used to wrap each joint, the ends of the wrap to lap four (4) inches. The muslin shall not be less than 56x60 count, weight not less than four (4) ounces to the yard and width thirty-six (36) inches. In laying the ducts care must be taken to close abutting joints so that practically the ends of ducts shall be in contact on all sides. Where ducts are laid on curves, the wraps must be doubled if required, to protect the openings between the ends of the ducts on the outer line of the duct and to exclude all mortar from duct openings.

Mandrels.

Section No. 217. The ducts shall be laid with a linked mandrel of the length and diameter to be prescribed, the same accurately fitting the duct openings, the mandrel to be left in each duct until the next succeeding duct is laid.

Concrete Envelop.

Section No. 218. The ducts shall be laid within a concrete envelop four (4) inches thick on the top and bottom and three (3) inches thick on the sides.

Laid to Line.

Section No. 219. The ducts shall be so laid that the center of the holes shall be true to line and grade.

To Be Rodded.

Section No. 220. After the ducts are laid, and sufficient time is given to allow the mortar in beds to set, they shall be rodded; all mortar or other foreign matter must be cleaned from the duct openings, leaving a clear and smooth opening. If obstructions are found in rodding the ducts which cannot be removed by cleaners, so as to give a clear and smooth opening sufficient to pass a three and one-quarter (3¼) inch mandrel, the ducts shall be removed and relaid; all ducts, during the construction and after being rodded, shall be plugged with suitable plugs, to be furnished by the Contractor. If wooden plugs are used they shall be immersed in water for at least eight (8) hours before being put in place.

Measurements and Payments for Vitrified Railroad Ducts.

Section No. 221. Railroad ducts shall be paid for per duct foot in place at the price herein stipulated for Railroad ducts, Schedule Item 18-A, which price shall include the cost of furnishing, laying and rodding the ducts, of the concrete envelop and of all other material, including all work, labor and material incidental to the duct line construction as shown on the plans, except excavation and the restoration of the street surface, which will be paid for under Schedule Items 1-C and 30(h); and except duct manholes. The ducts to be provided under Schedule Item 18-A, shall include only those intended solely for the purpose of the operation of the Railroad.

Duct Manholes.

Section No. 222. Generally the Railroad duct lines will be constructed near the curb side of the column foundations. But to escape existing subsurface structures they may be placed in other locations as ordered. Duct manholes shall be built as indicated on the plans or as directed by the Engineer. These manholes shall be generally at intervals of about four hundred (400) feet. They may vary in form as may be necessary to accommodate the work to local conditions. At manholes the ducts will be laid to conform to the special conditions. Duct manholes will be paid for in accordance with the various classes of work or material applicable thereto in the Schedule and at the prices stipulated therein for such classes of work or material.

Manhole Drain Pipes.

The four (4) inch drain pipes for the duct manholes shall be vitrified pipe of the best quality, thoroughly and perfectly burnt, without imperfections, well and smoothly glazed inside and outside and perfect in shape. It shall be paid for at the price stipulated in Schedule Item 17(e), which price shall include all work, labor and material incidental to furnishing and laying the pipe in place, and including the proper connections with the sewers; except excavation and the restoration of the street surface.

16.

SURFACES RESTORED.

Section No. 223. As soon as the structure in any excavation or trench made within a street shall be completed and the trench backfilled, a temporary pavement shall be laid and maintained in a condition satisfactory to the Engineer; and after the earth shall have become, in the opinion of the Engineer, sufficiently settled, the Contractor shall proceed to restore the surface to a condition similar to, and equally as good as, that existing previous to the commencement of construction.

Other Sidewalks May Be Laid.

Section No. 224. Nothing contained in these specifications shall be understood or construed as prohibiting the Contractor from making any arrangement with any property owner to lay another style of sidewalk, or other surface covering within curb lines, in place of the sidewalk or other surface covering taken up; in which case the Contractor shall file with the Commission a copy of his contract with such property owner, duly acknowledged in writing by both parties.

In case any property owner desires to lay a sidewalk, or other surface covering within curb lines, affected by this contract, different from the one removed, and shall notify the Commission in writing that he has failed to make satisfactory arrangements for such work with the Contractor, then the Commission, in its discretion, may direct the Contractor to finish and dress off the filling over his work to such grade as the Engineer may select, and further direct him to remove from the area to be restored all material of whatever nature not required to be relaid, and to permit another contractor to lay such sidewalk or other surface covering; in which case the liability of the Contractor under this contract shall cease, as far as that part of his

work is concerned, whenever the Engineer shall report to the Commission that the instructions of the Commission have been complied with, exactly the same as if the Contractor had fully completed the restoration as hereinbefore provided.

Payment for Street Surface Restored.

Section No. 225. Payment for all street surface restored of whatever character, and work, labor and material incidental thereto, such as restoring manhole heads and covers, trees, etc. (except as included in Item 25-A), will be made as provided in Schedule Item 30 (h).

The foregoing provisions of this Subdivision (No. 16) apply only to the restoration of street surfaces where paved roadways or sidewalks actually exist at the time of the delivery of this contract. In cases where only the ordinary dirt roadway or sidewalks exist and in cases where no roadway or sidewalks exist, the Contractor will be required to backfill and restore such surfaces to their original grades and conditions at his own expense.

17.

REINFORCED CONCRETE ELEVATED RAILROAD.

Reinforced Concrete Elevated Railroad.

Section No. 226. Besides the concrete usually required in elevated railroad construction work as specified herein in Subdivision 11, this contract section also will include the construction of a portion of the Railroad as a reinforced concrete elevated railroad, extending from about the east building line of Hill Street to about forty-five (45) feet west of the west building line of Gofman Street, as shown on the contract drawings. Such portion of the Railroad to be built as a reinforced concrete elevated railroad is herein referred to as the "reinforced concrete elevated Railroad." The reinforced concrete for such reinforced concrete elevated Railroad shall be constructed in accordance with the requirements of Subdivision 11 (except the requirements of Section No. 116 or as otherwise qualified in this subdivision), and also in accordance with the requirements of this subdivision. All concrete of the reinforced concrete elevated Railroad above the top of the Railroad column foundations will be considered, measured and paid for as concrete masonry for the reinforced concrete elevated Railroad. All other concrete masonry will be paid for as stipulated in Subdivision 11, Schedule Item 6.

Lumber for Forms and Centers.

Section No. 227. The lumber for wooden forms and centers shall be spruce or Norway pine or other approved wood, sound and free from knots, shakes and rot. The lumber for forms shall be tongued and grooved; also it shall be dressed on the side next to the concrete surfaces which will be exposed in the finished work, and it shall be dressed in any other manner which may be necessary to secure watertight and smooth fitting forms.

Metal Forms.

Section No. 228. Metal forms, if used, shall be made of metal sufficiently thick to retain their shape without the use of wood. No forms made of wood and covered with iron will be permitted.

Character of Forms.

Section No. 229. Forms shall be constructed by experienced and capable workmen and must be of first-class workmanship throughout. For exposed surfaces of concrete they must be smooth and the boards must be carefully matched. The forms must be constructed so as to secure beveled or chamfered edges for beams and columns where ordered; and when required the edges or corners of the forms must be rounded at interior angles formed between intersecting concrete surfaces. The forms also shall be constructed so that the lagging can be removed without disturbing the support for the concrete, in order that the concrete surface may be subjected to a finishing process when the concrete has reached the proper age for treatment. All forms shall be lubricated with a thick and heavy filler oil of a quality known as "sludge" or its equal. Just before being used forms must be carefully cleaned of all cement, dirt and debris in order to provide for a perfectly smooth face to the exposed surface of the concrete.

Placing Forms.

Section No. 230. Every precaution shall be taken in placing or assembling the forms to do so in such a manner that when removed, after the concrete has been placed, the faces of the concrete that are to remain exposed shall present a smooth and even surface.

Forms Removed.

Section No. 231. Forms shall be removed as soon after the concrete has been placed as may be done with safety to the work; except that arch forms supporting the elevated structure shall not be removed in less than twenty-eight (28) days. But no forms shall be removed without first notifying the Engineer. Such notification shall not relieve the Contractor of responsibility for the construction and for the removal of such forms. Immediately on the removal of the forms the faces that will remain exposed shall be carefully examined and any irregularities of the surface corrected; projections shall be removed and voids filled with mortar. All projecting wires, bolts or other devices that are used for holding forms and that pass through the concrete must be cut off at least one (1) inch beneath the finished surface and the ends covered with mortar. Care shall be taken to form perfectly all edges, arrises and mouldings. If after the removal of the forms it is found that any of these lines are imperfect the cement film shall be cut away to insure a proper bond and such lines shall be restored. In order to secure a uniform surface color and texture, the mortar to be used for filling voids, to cover the ends of projecting wires, bolts or other devices and to restore edges, arrises and mouldings shall be of the same materials and of the same proportions as that contiguous to such restored work.

Made Smooth to Receive Waterproofing.

Section No. 232. Concrete to which waterproofing is to be applied shall be made smooth at the time of laying and shall be carefully protected from injury until thoroughly set.

Impervious to Water.

Section No. 233. It is intended to obtain concrete impervious to water; the concrete shall be mixed and deposited with this end in view, and if required, it shall be carefully troweled as may be directed in order to add to its imperviousness.

Section No. 234. Arch centers must be constructed so as to remain as nearly as possible invariable in level and form from the time they are ready for the concrete until the time of their removal from under the arches; also they must be constructed so that they may be removed with ease and without shock or jar to the concrete masonry. The main members of centers must be bolted together at the joints. Centers must not be removed from under the arches in less than twenty-eight (28) days.

Concrete Finish.

Section No. 235. The surfaces of the concrete masonry for the reinforced concrete elevated Railroad shall be finished, as indicated on the Contract drawings, or as ordered, either with a natural cement finish, rubbed, washed, dressed, tooled or otherwise treated on the surface as directed, or with a mortar faced finish composed of specified materials rubbed, washed, dressed, tooled or otherwise treated on the surface as directed.

Immediately following the removal of the forms (or lagging only if directed), followed by the removal of the projections and the filling of the voids, etc., as herein provided, the entire concrete surface to be finished shall be treated in such a manner as directed, and so as to insure a uniform surface of the desired color and texture.

Natural Cement Finish.

Section No. 236. Where a natural cement finish treated as directed is required, care must be taken to insure the flushing of the cement against the forms. This shall be done by careful spading and puddling while the concrete is being placed, for which special tools shall be provided as required.

Mortar Faced Finish.

Section No. 237. Where a mortar faced finish treated as directed is required, the mortar facing shall consist of a mortar composed of specially selected materials which shall be as uniform as possible for the entire work. Such materials shall include white or ordinary Portland cement (of quality herein specified), with white sand, different colored granite grits, mica, felspar or other materials in such proportions as may be required. The mortar facing shall be laid one and one-half (1½) inches thick. The mortar facing and the concrete backing shall be constructed simultaneously. This is to be accomplished by using sheet steel facing forms of an approved pattern placed on edge the proper distance back of the lagging. The space between the facing form and the lagging is to be filled with the facing mortar. The concrete backing is to be filled in to the height of the facing form, which then is to be lifted vertically and the backing and facing thoroughly bonded by tamping them together.

Samples.

Section No. 238. The Contractor shall furnish on the concrete of the elevated structure samples of natural cement finish and mortar faced finish subjected to such

surface treatments as may be required. From these samples the character of the finish will be determined.

Tools.

Section No. 239. In order to remove the cement film and to obtain the desired surface treatment the wire brush, sand blast, pneumatic hammer or tools ordinarily used for dressing stone surfaces shall be used when required.

Recesses for Tiles.

Section No. 240. Where inlaid colored tiles are shown on the contract drawings, or are ordered, recesses shall be provided in the concrete for the reception of the tiles. These recesses shall be scored or channeled, by attaching strips of wood to the forms, or in some other satisfactory manner, in order to secure a proper bond for the tiles.

Reinforced Concrete for Elevated Structure; How Paid For.

Section No. 241. The concrete masonry for the reinforced concrete elevated Railroad shall be measured in place in the work to the prescribed net lines as shown on the contract drawings, or as ordered by the Engineer, and shall be paid for at the price stipulated in Schedule Item 6-A; which price is to include the cost of all scaffolding, centers, forms and removing the same, of all raised or depressed surfaces in the concrete required for ornamental effect, of providing recesses in the concrete for inlaid colored tile, and of all work, labor and material incidental thereto, payment for which is *not* herein elsewhere *specifically* provided for under other Schedule Items.

Natural Cement Finish and Mortar Faced Finish and Payment For.

Section No. 242. The natural cement finish and mortar faced finish will be measured on the basis of the actual area covered in place and payment therefor will be made at the prices stipulated in Schedule Items 6-B for natural cement finish and 6-C for mortar faced finish, which prices will include the cost of the samples of finish as herein required, of all scaffolding, tools, forms and the removal of the same, etc., and of all other incidental work, labor and material.

18.

WATERPROOFING.

Waterproofing Where Required.

Section No. 243. The reinforced concrete arches of the reinforced concrete elevated Railroad shall be waterproofed on top, as shown on the contract drawings, or as ordered.

Surfaces to Be Made Smooth.

Section No. 244. All surfaces to which waterproofing is to be applied shall be made as smooth as possible and shall be thoroughly dry before waterproofing is applied; on these surfaces there shall be spread either hot melted pitch or asphaltum in a thick layer of uniform thickness; on this layer of pitch or asphaltum shall be laid a treated woven fabric of such material as may be approved by the Engineer; this process shall be repeated until two (2) plies or four (4) plies, as required, have been placed and a final coat of pitch or asphaltum shall then be applied. Each layer of pitch or asphaltum must completely and entirely cover the surface on which it is spread without cracks or blow holes.

Definition of Term "Ply."

Section No. 245. The term "ply" as used in these specifications shall mean a layer of treated woven fabric, both sides of which shall be coated with pitch or asphaltum at the time of laying.

Section No. 246. Any leaks that are found at any time prior to the completion of the work and final acceptance thereof by the Commission shall be cut out and the leaks stopped, at the sole expense of the Contractor.

Quality of Pitch.

Section No. 247. Pitch shall consist of either coal-tar or natural asphalt as the Engineer shall elect; it must be delivered on the work in packages that are plainly marked with the manufacturer's brand, and indicating the grade and quality of the material.

Coal-Tar Pitch.

Section No. 248. The coal-tar pitch shall be straight-run pitch containing not less than twenty-five (25%) per centum and not more than thirty-two (32%) per centum of free carbon, which will soften at approximately 70° F., and melt at 100° F., being a grade in which distillate oils distilled therefrom shall have a specific gravity of 1.05.

Quality of Asphalt.

Section No. 249. The asphalt used shall consist of fluxed natural asphalt, or asphalt prepared by the careful distillation of asphaltic petroleum, subject to the approval of the Engineer, but however prepared, it shall comply with the following requirements:

The asphalt shall contain in its refined state not less than 95 per centum of bitumen soluble in cold carbon disulphide, and at least 98½ per centum of the bitumen soluble in cold carbon disulphide, shall be soluble in cold carbon tetrachloride. The remaining ingredients shall be such as not to exert an injurious effect on the work.

The asphalt shall not flash below 350 degrees Fahr. when tested in the New York State Closed Oil Tester. When twenty (20) grams of the material are heated for five (5) hours at a temperature of 325 degrees Fahr. in a tin box 2½ inches in diameter it shall not lose over 5% by weight, nor shall the penetration at 77 degrees Fahr. after such heating be less than one-half (½) of the original penetration.

The melting point of the material shall be between 100 degrees and 175 degrees Fahr. as determined by the Kraemer and Sarnow method.

The consistency shall be determined by the penetration which must be between 75 and 100 at 77 degrees Fahr.

A briquette of the solid bitumen of cross section of one (1) square centimeter shall have a ductility of not less than twenty (20) centimeters at 77 degrees Fahr., the material being elongated at the rate of five centimeters per minute. (Dow moulds)

All tests herein provided must be conducted according to methods approved by the Engineer.

The penetrations indicated herein refer to the depth of penetration in hundredth centimeters of a No. 2 cambric needle weighted to one hundred (100) grams at 77 degrees Fahr. acting for five (5) seconds.

Woven Fabric for Waterproofing.

Section No. 250. The fabric to be used shall be a woven fabric which shall have been treated with pitch or asphaltum before being brought on the work. The fabric and the material used in its treatment shall be approved by the Engineer.

Fabric for Waterproofing to be Carefully Laid.

Section No. 251. The fabric must be rolled out into the pitch or asphaltum while the latter is still hot, and pressed against it so as to insure its being completely stuck over its entire surface, great care being taken that all joints are well broken by overlapping, and that the ends of the rolls are carried up on the sides as shown on the contract drawings, or as ordered.

Section No. 252. When the finishing layer of concrete is laid over or next to the waterproofing material, care must be taken not to break, tear or injure in any way the outer surface of the pitch or asphaltum.

Skilled Labor to be Employed.

Section No. 253. None but competent men, especially skilled in work of this kind, shall be employed to lay the waterproofing.

Measurements and Payments.

Section No. 254. Measurements for waterproofing will be made on the basis of actual area covered by the number of plies ordered, no account being taken of laps, and the waterproofing will be paid for as herein stipulated in Schedule Item 15, which price is to include all work, labor and material in connection therewith.

19.

CONDUITS.

Quality Iron Pipe Conduit.

Section No. 255. All iron conduits used for any purpose in connection with the work herein shall be of the best grade (Galvaduct or equal) standard weight wrought iron or steel piping, protected inside and out by a coat of zinc or enamel. It shall be delivered to the work in bundles of full length pipes, each length marked with the trademark of the manufacturer. It shall bend cold 90 degrees about a radius equal to ten (10) diameters without signs of flaw or fracture in either pipe or enamel.

Section No. 256. All conduits shall be carefully cleaned before and after erection, and all ends shall be reamed free from burrs, and inside surfaces shall be free from all imperfections liable to injure the cable.

Joints Water-tight.

Section No. 257. All joints shall be made with standard couplings, well treated with red lead, and screwed up to make a water-tight job.

Built in Concrete, Etc.

Section No. 258. Conduits built into concrete or other parts of the structure shall be properly protected and supported, so that the same shall not be injured by the building operations.

Not Built in Concrete.

Section No. 259. Conduits not built into the structure shall be supported by approved pipe straps located not more than eight (8) feet apart, or in any other manner designated by the Engineer, and they shall be kept boxed or otherwise suitably protected from injury.

Bends and Offsets.

Section No. 260. Bends and offsets may be made in the field if proper tools are used, but in no case shall deformed, split or crushed conduit be erected. All bends and offsets not hand formed shall be made by the use of standard large radius elbows. Not more than two (2) right angle bends shall be made between any two (2) outlet boxes without special approval of the Engineer.

Measurement and Payment.

Section No. 261. Measurements for the above iron pipe conduits and fittings shall be per lineal foot of single conduit placed in the work—in accordance with the requirements—and payment for the same, including all incidental work, labor and material, shall be as herein stipulated in Schedule Item 32.

Outlet and Pull Boxes and Payment for Same.

Section No. 262. All outlet and pull boxes shall be made of cast iron, with openings threaded for the conduit ends, and conduits shall be screwed into these openings and made up with red lead to effect a water-tight joint. The ends of all conduits inside of boxes shall be fitted with bushings. Covers shall be of cast-iron and water-tight, and no other boxes or covers shall be used except under special permission of the Engineer. The price for each cast-iron outlet and pull box furnished and placed in the work, including all incidental work, labor and material, shall be as herein stipulated in Schedule Items 33 and 33A.

DRAINS.

Drains.

Section No. 263. The surfaces over the arches of the reinforced concrete elevated Railroad, as far as possible, shall be arranged so that any water finding access thereto will be lead away automatically to drains leading to the gutter or to the City sewers as required.

The station and toilet room drainage shall also be arranged to discharge into the sewers.

Section No. 264. Where drain pipes connect with the City sewers the junction shall be protected by suitable traps located in accessible manholes below the surface of the street. Connections with the Railroad shall be as necessity demands and all as directed by the Engineer.

Section No. 265. The drain pipes and fittings shall be of cast iron, "extra heavy," and all bends or offsets shall be made with large radius elbows, wyes or tee-wye fittings. The whole or any part of the drain pipes may be built into the masonry structure and suitable hand-holes and clean-outs shall be provided.

Section No. 266. All drains shall be measured in place and the actual net length as laid for each class of drain will be paid for as herein provided in Schedule Item 17-A. The prices herein stipulated for each class of pipe will include the cost of providing and laying the pipe, of all specials of any nature whatsoever, such as bends, tees, wyes, hand-holes, clean-outs, traps, etc., of all material for jointing same, of the connections to the City sewers with the necessary manholes, and of all work, labor and material incidental to furnishing and laying such drains and appurtenances, payment for which is not herein elsewhere specifically provided for under other Schedule Items.

SPECIAL MATTERS.

Station and Other Finish Work.

Section No. 267. The work to be done under this contract upon or in connection with the reinforced concrete elevated Railroad includes the furnishing and constructing complete in place of the finish of all exposed concrete surfaces of the reinforced concrete elevated Railroad between stations, at stations and in the stairwells leading from the street to the station platforms, at the prices stipulated in Items 6-B and 6-C; of all inlaid colored tile work, Item 6-D; of all raised or depressed surfaces in the concrete required for ornamental effect, included in Item 6-A; of all stairways at stations, Items 128 and 129; of all steel work for the station canopies, Item 19; of station platform granolithic surface finish, Item 6-E; of steel tees in the top of the copings to form anchors for railings, Item 20; of cast iron shoes provided with bolts at piers for attaching pier lamps for railings between stations and at stations, Item 25-A; of 16-ounce copper flashing where the roof of the canopy adjoins the concrete work, Item 130; of all anchors for window frames and signs at the entrances built into the concrete, Item 20; of all three (3) inch wrought-iron pipe leaders from the street surface to the roof, Item 131; of all concrete copings around stairwells, including a granolithic finish, Item 6-F; and of all work, labor and material incidental to any of the foregoing work payment for which is not elsewhere specifically provided for under other Schedule Items.

Station finish work not specifically mentioned in this section, though shown on the plans, is not included in the work to be done under this contract.

Inlaid Colored Tile.

Section No. 268. Inlaid colored tile shall be wet-pressed, hand-made, weather-proof, glazed or other approved tile of sizes, shapes and color as required. Samples shall be submitted for approval. Payment for furnishing, delivering and setting such inlaid colored tile, as measured in place at the work, will be made at the price stipulated in Schedule Item 6-D, which price shall include the cost of all work, labor and material incidental thereto.

Stairways.

Section No. 269. Stairways shall have cast iron risers, cast iron non-slipping treads, steel non-slipping platforms, and shall be supported on steel stringers which are to be framed to the steel of the structure, or anchored to the concrete masonry. Payment for stairways constructed complete, as measured in place at the work, will be made at the prices stipulated in Schedule Item 128 for stairway treads (including stringers) per linear foot of tread, and in Schedule Item 129 for stairway platforms (including stringers) per square foot of platform; which prices shall include the cost of all material delivered and erected in the work, of all necessary cleaning and painting as required and of all other incidental work, labor and material.

Granolithic Platform Finish.

Section No. 270. When the platforms are being constructed, provision shall be made for laying the granolithic surface finish simultaneously therewith. This shall be done by filling the rough concrete up to within about one (1) inch of the finished surface, and while this concrete is still wet, applying a mixture of one part of Portland cement and two parts of approved sand, which is to be divided up into large squares, as directed, and troweled down to a hard, smooth surface finish. The platforms are also to be graded so as to drain to the track trough. Payment for the concrete below the surface finish will be included in the price stipulated in Schedule Item 6-A. The granolithic surface finish will be measured on the basis of the actual area covered in place and payment therefor will be made at the price stipulated in Schedule Item 6-E, which price will include all work, labor and material incidental thereto.

No Ledge Rock.

Section No. 271. Ledge rock in place will not be encountered on this Contract Section, but boulders requiring blasting may be encountered, for which reason specifications for rock are included in this contract.

Section No. 272. Any buildings within the lines of Queens Boulevard, Skillman avenue or Roosevelt avenue will be acquired by the City and removed by other contractors.

IV.

SECURITY TO BE FURNISHED BY CONTRACTOR.

Contractor's Bond.

Article XXVII. Simultaneously with the execution of this contract the Contractor shall give security for the performance of his obligation by filing with the Comptroller a bond in the form annexed hereto, entitled, "Form of Bond," executed by the Contractor and by two or more sureties to be corporations or persons approved by the Commission in the sum of fifty thousand (\$50,000) dollars. In case any of the sureties upon the bond shall become insolvent or unable in the opinion of the Commission to pay promptly the amount of such bond to the extent to which such surety might be liable, then the Contractor within ten days after notice by the Commission to the Contractor shall, by supplemental bond or otherwise, substitute another and sufficient surety to be approved by the Commission in place of the surety so insolvent or unable. If the Contractor shall fail, within such ten days or such further

time as the Commission may grant, to substitute another and sufficient surety, then the Contractor shall, for all the purposes of this contract, be deemed to be in default in the performance of his obligations hereunder and upon the said bond, and the Commission may terminate the contract or may bring any proper suit or proceeding against the Contractor and the sureties, or either of them, or may require to be deducted from any moneys then in, or thereafter coming into, the hands of the City and due to the Contractor the amount for which the surety insolvent or unable as aforesaid shall have justified on the bond; and the moneys so deducted shall be held by the Comptroller as collateral security for the performance of the condition of the bond.

Deposit of Cash or Securities.

*Article XXVIII. The Contractor may at his option deposit with the Comptroller in lieu of said bond or of any part thereof, an equal amount in cash or in value of securities. If securities are deposited they shall be securities of which a schedule shall be hereto annexed, entitled Schedule of Securities, and there shall be deposited with them the written approval of the Commission, which it shall give when satisfied as to the character thereof. In case any of the securities so deposited shall, in the opinion of the Commission, at any time cease to be of the character of securities in which the saving banks of the State of New York are then authorized by law to invest moneys, or shall, in the opinion of the Commission, at any time become of less value than the value stated for it or them in the said schedule, then within ten days after notice to the Contractor of the objection of the Commission, the Contractor shall either substitute therefor securities which shall be approved by the Commission as of the character aforesaid and as being of at least the value of the former securities to which the Commission shall have objected as such value was originally stated in the said schedule, or shall deposit with the Comptroller in cash the amount of such value of such former securities as so originally stated. In case the Contractor shall not within such ten days substitute such new securities, he shall, if the Commission so elect, be deemed to be in default in the performance of his obligations under this contract; and in addition to any and all other remedies against the Contractor or its sureties, the Commission may require the Comptroller to deduct from any moneys then due or which thereafter may become due to the Contractor under this contract, the amount of the original valuation of such securities objected to, and to hold such amount in lieu of such securities, as if part of the original deposit or as if deposited with the Comptroller as aforesaid, and such amount shall in such case be deemed to be paid to the Contractor upon the contract. The securities so objected to shall upon such substitution of securities or deposit of cash in lieu thereof be returned to the Contractor.

The City shall from time to time collect all interest, dividends or other profits or income on any securities deposited by the Contractor, and shall, when and as collected, pay the same to the Contractor. If the securities are in the form of coupon bonds the coupons as they respectively become due shall be delivered to the Contractor. If the deposit be made in cash, interest shall be paid to the Contractor at the average rate of interest received by the City on its bank balances during such period. Provided, however, that the Contractor shall not be entitled to interest, dividends or other profits or income on any securities the proceeds of which shall be used or applied as hereinafter provided.

Security For.

Article XXIX. The said deposit, whether in cash or securities, in the form and as the same shall at any time be, shall be security for the faithful performance by the Contractor of all the covenants, conditions and requirements specified and provided for in this contract. In case of any default on the part of the Contractor in such performance, and in the further case that the City shall for or by reason of such failure, whether by reason of employment of another contractor or contractors or otherwise, incur or become liable for expense through such default as hereinafter provided, then the Comptroller shall forthwith pay or apply to the use of the City the amount of such expense out of the said deposit in cash or securities or out of the portion of the deposit remaining at the time.

Sale of Securities.

Article XXX. The Comptroller shall, upon the requirement of the Commission, in order to make such payment or application to the use of the City, sell at public auction in The City of New York any of the securities which may then constitute part of such deposit upon notice to be published in three daily newspapers, the first publication to be as much as ten days before the sale and such publication to be made three times within such ten days. Any such sale shall be adjourned from time to time if requested by the Commission. The Comptroller shall, upon the requirement of the Commission, deduct from the proceeds of any such sale, all expenses thereof and of such advertisement, and pay and apply to the use of the City so much of the residue of such proceeds as may be necessary for the purpose aforesaid. And the Contractor within ten days after notice from the Commission so to do shall (unless the time be extended by the Commission) by further deposit, according to the requirement of the Commission, of money or securities of the character aforesaid approved by the Commission restore the said deposit with the Comptroller to the full amount originally required. In addition to, or in lieu of, the sale above provided for, the Commission may, in the name of and in behalf of the City, bring any appropriate suit or proceeding in any proper court to enforce the lien and claim of the City in and upon the said deposit, whether such deposit be in money or securities.

Retention of Security.

Article XXXI. If at any time when the Contractor shall otherwise be entitled to a return of the said deposit, there shall be pending any claim for damages or loss caused to others by the negligence, fault, or default of the Contractor, for which it shall be claimed that the City shall be liable, then and in that case the said deposit, or such part thereof as the Commission shall prescribe, shall, upon the requirement of the Commission, be reserved by the Comptroller for a reasonable time as security to the City against such claims. And the amount of any such damages or costs paid by the City to others or for which the City shall be liable to others, shall be deducted from the said deposit before the same shall be returned to the Contractor as hereinafter provided.

On Completion of Works.

Article XXXII. When the Contractor shall have fully completed the Works according to the terms of this contract and the Commission shall so certify, the Comptroller shall pay and deliver to the Contractor the said deposit, or so much thereof as shall not have been reserved or used or applied for any of the purposes above mentioned.

Retained Percentages.

Article XXXIII. In addition and as further security there shall be deducted fifteen per centum (15%) of the amounts certified from time to time to be due to the Contractor until the amount so deducted and retained shall equal the sum of One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000). Thereafter there shall be so deducted and retained for such purpose ten per centum (10%) of amounts certified from time to time to be due to the Contractor. The Contractor may from time to time withdraw portions of the amounts so to be retained upon depositing with the Comptroller corporate stock of The City of New York of a market value equal to the amount so withdrawn, in which event the provisions of this chapter in respect of securities shall also apply to such corporate stock.

V.

PAYMENTS TO CONTRACTOR.

Partial Payments.

Article XXXV. In order to assist the Contractor to prosecute the work advantageously, the Engineer shall, from time to time, as the work progresses, but not oftener than once a month, make in writing an estimate, such as in his opinion shall be just and fair, of the amount and value of the work done and materials incorporated in the work by the Contractor according to the terms of this contract (but it is understood that in making such estimates the Engineer shall not necessarily be governed by the unit prices contained in the Contractor's proposal), provided, however, that estimates may at any time be withheld or reduced, if, in the opinion of the Engineer, the work is not proceeding in accordance with the contract. The first such estimate shall be of the amount and value of the work done and materials incorporated in the work since the Contractor commenced the performance of this contract on his part. Every subsequent estimate except the final estimate shall be of the amount and value of the work done and materials incorporated in the work since the last preceding estimate was made, provided, however, that no such estimate shall be required to be made when, in the judgment of the Engineer, the total value of the

*Articles XXVIII to XXXII inclusive will form part of the contract only in case the Contractor elects to deposit cash or securities in lieu of a bond, or to deposit corporate stock of The City of New York in lieu of retained percentages.

work done and materials incorporated in the work since the last preceding estimate amounts to less than ten thousand (\$10,000.00) dollars. The Engineer shall further include accepted structural iron and steel delivered on the site of the work, or on property owned or leased by the City, but not incorporated in the work, at the rate of forty (\$40) dollars per ton of two thousand pounds. But the quantity of such structural iron and steel included in any partial estimate shall not exceed the quantity of such material, as determined by the Engineer, required for the ensuing six months, and any material included in a partial estimate which may subsequently become unsatisfactory shall be deducted from succeeding partial estimates. No materials not incorporated in the work, excepting such structural iron and steel, shall be included in partial estimates.

Not by Strict Measurement.

Article XXXVI. Such estimates shall not be required to be made by strict measurement, but they may be made by measurement or by estimation, or partly by one method and partly by the other, and it shall be sufficient if they are approximate only.

Vouchers.

Article XXXVII. Upon each such estimate being made and certified in writing to the Commission, the Commission shall forthwith prepare and certify a voucher for eighty-five or ninety per cent. of the amount stated in such estimate or certificate to be the value of the work done and materials furnished as provided in Article XXXIII, and the City shall within thirty (30) days after the date of the certification of such voucher by the Commission pay the same; provided, however, that the City may at all times reserve and retain from said partial payments, or any of them, in addition to the ten or fifteen per cent. above mentioned to be retained and reserved, any sum or all sums which by the terms hereof, or of any law of the State of New York passed prior to the date hereof, it is or may be authorized to reserve or retain.

Final Estimate.

Article XXXVIII. Whenever, in the opinion of the Engineer, the Contractor shall have completely performed this contract on his part, the Engineer shall so certify, in writing, to the Commission, and in his certificate shall state, from actual measurements, the whole amount of work done by the Contractor, and also the value of such work under and according to the terms of this contract. On the expiration of ninety (90) days after the acceptance by the Commission of the work herein agreed to be done by the Contractor, and the filing of a certificate of the completion and acceptance of the work in the office of the Comptroller, signed by the Engineer and the Commission, the City shall pay to the Contractor the amount remaining after deducting from the amount or value stated in the last-mentioned certificate all such sums as shall theretofore have been paid to the Contractor under any of the provisions of this contract, and also any sum or all such sums of money as by the terms hereof the City is or may be authorized to reserve or retain; provided, that nothing herein contained shall be construed to affect the right, hereby reserved, of the Commission to reject the whole or any portion of the aforesaid work, should the said certificate be found, or known to be, inconsistent with the terms of this contract, or otherwise improperly given. All prior certificates upon which partial payments may have been made, being merely estimates, shall be subject to correction in the final certificate, which final certificate may be made without notice thereof to the Contractor, or of the measurements upon which it is based.

Interest in Case of Delayed Payments.

Article XXXIX. If the payment of the amount due the Contractor on any voucher shall be delayed beyond the time stipulated in Article XXXVII, in the case of partial payment, or Article XXXVIII, in the case of final payment, the City shall pay the Contractor interest on such amount at the rate of four and one-half (4½) per cent. per annum for the period of such delay; it being understood that such payments of interest, if any, are to be in lieu of any claim of the Contractor for alleged damages for breach of contract or otherwise in case of delayed payments. The term for which interest shall be paid shall be reckoned, in the case of a partial payment, from the thirtieth day after the certification of such voucher by the Commission, and in the case of a final payment from the ninetieth day after the acceptance of the work by the Commission, to the date of payment of the voucher. The date of payment of a voucher shall be considered the day on which the voucher is ready for payment as evidenced by the records of the Department of Finance. If interest shall become due on any partial payment the amount thereof, as determined by the Commission, shall be added to a succeeding payment. If interest shall become due on a final payment it shall be paid on a supplementary voucher prepared by the Commission and forwarded to the Comptroller for payment in the usual manner.

No Estoppel.

Article XL. The City shall not, nor shall any Department or officer thereof, be precluded or estopped by any return or certificate made or given by the Commission, any Engineer, or other officer, agent or appointee thereof under any provision of this contract, from at any time either before or after the final completion and acceptance of the work and payment therefor pursuant to any such return or certificate, showing the true and correct amount, quality and character of the work done and materials furnished by the Contractor or any other person under this agreement, or from showing at any time that any such return or certificate is untrue and incorrect or improperly made in any particular, or that the work and materials, or any part thereof, do not in fact conform to the specifications; and the City shall not be precluded or estopped, notwithstanding any such return or certificate and payment in accordance therewith, from demanding and recovering from the Contractor such damages as it may sustain by reason of his failure to comply with this contract or the specifications.

No Waiver.

Article XLI. Neither the acceptance of the Commission or its Engineer, or any of its employees, nor any order, measurement or certificate by the Engineer, nor any order by the Commission for payment of money, nor any payment for, nor acceptance of the whole or any part of the work by the Engineer or the Commission, nor any extension of time, nor any possession taken by the Commission, or its employees, shall operate as a waiver of any portion of this contract or of any power herein reserved to the Commission, or any right to damages herein provided; nor shall any waiver of any breach of this contract be held to be a waiver of any other or subsequent breach.

Final Payment to Terminate Liability of City.

Article XLII. The acceptance by the Contractor of the last payment aforesaid shall be and shall operate as a release to the City from all claim and liability to the Contractor for anything done or furnished for, or relating to, the work, or for any act or neglect of the Commission, the City or of any person relating to or affecting the work, except only the claim against the City for the remainder, if any there be, of the amounts kept or retained as provided in this contract.

Contractor's Claims for Damage.

Article XLIII. If the Contractor shall claim compensation for any damage sustained by reason of the acts of the Commission, or its agents, he shall, within ten days after the sustaining of such damage, make a written statement of the nature of the damage sustained to the Engineer. On or before the fifteenth day of the month succeeding that in which any such damage shall have been sustained, the Contractor shall file with the Engineer an itemized statement of the details and amount of such damage, and unless such statement shall be made as thus required, his claim for compensation may be forfeited and invalidated, and he shall not be entitled to payment on account of any such damage.

Lien Law.

Article XLIV. If at any time before or within thirty (30) days after the whole work agreed herein to be performed and all the labor and material herein agreed to be delivered have been performed or delivered or completed and accepted by the City any person or persons claiming to have performed any labor or furnished any material toward the performance or completion of this contract shall file with the Commission and with the Comptroller of the City any such notice as is described in the Lien Law, the City shall retain until the discharge thereof from moneys under its control so much of such moneys as shall be sufficient to satisfy and discharge the amount in such notice claimed to be due, together with the costs of any action or actions brought to enforce such lien created by the filing of such notice.

VI.

CONTRACTOR'S LIABILITY FOR INJURIES TO PERSONS OR PROPERTY.

Contractor Approves Plans as Involving no Damage.

Article XLV. The Contractor expressly admits and covenants to and with the City that the plans and specifications and other provisions of this contract, if the work be done without fault or negligence on the part of the Contractor, do not involve any danger to the foundations, walls or other parts of adjacent or overhead buildings or structures or surfaces; and the Contractor will at his own expense make good any damage that shall, in the course of construction, be done to any such foundations,

walls or other parts of adjacent or overhead buildings or structures or surfaces. The liability of the Contractor under this covenant is absolute and is not dependent upon any question of negligence on his part or on the part of his agents, servants or employees, and the neglect of the Engineer to direct the Contractor to take any particular precautions or to refrain from doing any particular thing shall not excuse the Contractor in case of any such damage.

Traffic to be Maintained.

Article XLVI. The Contractor shall during the performance of the work safely maintain the traffic on streets, avenues, highways or other public places as provided in the specifications, and shall take all necessary precautions to place proper guards for the prevention of accidents, and put up and keep at night suitable and sufficient lights.

Indemnification for Accidents, Etc.

Article XLVII. The Contractor shall be solely responsible for all physical injuries to persons or property occurring on account of and during the performance of the work hereunder, and shall indemnify and save harmless the City from liability upon any and all claims for damages on account of such injuries to persons or property, and from all costs and expenses in suits which may be brought against the City for such injuries to person or property; it being distinctly understood, stipulated and agreed that the Contractor shall be solely responsible and liable for and shall fully protect and indemnify the City against all claims for damages to persons or property occasioned by or resulting from blasting or other methods or processes in the work of construction, whether such damages be attributable to negligence of the Contractor or his employees or otherwise.

Money Due the Contractor May Be Retained to Meet Claims.

Article XLVIII. In case any claim shall be made by any person or corporation against the Contractor or the City for loss or damage to person or property as aforesaid, the amount of such claim or so much thereof as the Commission shall deem reasonable, shall, upon the requirement and in the discretion of the Commission, be retained by the Comptroller out of any moneys thereafter growing due to the Contractor hereunder (in addition to the other sums hereinbefore authorized to be so retained), as security for the payment of such claim or claims. If and when the liability of the City or the Contractor on such claim or claims shall have been established by a judgment of a Court of competent jurisdiction, or shall have been admitted by the Contractor to be valid, the said claim or claims shall be paid from the amount so retained and the balance, if any, paid to the Contractor. Should there be any unsatisfied claims for injuries to persons or property at the time when the final estimate for the work is made and returned, the Engineer shall have the right to retain out of said final estimate a sum in his judgment sufficient to protect the City in regard to all unsatisfied claims as aforesaid and in case the amount thus retained should be insufficient to pay the amount adjudicated to be due upon such claim the City may sue for and recover from the Contractor the amount or balance as a debt from the Contractor to the City. The Engineer may further, if in his judgment such a course is necessary, at the time of making the final estimate, and as a condition to making the same, require the Contractor to continue his bond or other security or any part thereof, for a time not exceeding the time when such claims would be barred under the existing Statute of Limitations, as security against any claims then unsatisfied or not presented.

Examinations of Abutting Property.

Article XLIX. In order to safeguard the owners or tenants of abutting property and at the same time prevent unjust or fraudulent claims against the Contractor or the City in respect thereto, the Engineer shall, whenever in his judgment it shall be necessary or proper, cause a detailed examination of any adjacent or abutting property to be made before construction is begun. The owner, or tenant of each parcel or his or their duly authorized representative, shall be invited by a notice in writing delivered to a person apparently in charge of the premises, to be present, and the Contractor, or his duly authorized representative, shall attend and with the Engineer shall make such detailed examination. A complete record of the existing conditions of each parcel shall be made in triplicate, signed by the Engineer and the Contractor, and one copy shall be delivered to the owner, one to the Contractor and one shall be retained by the Commission. At such times as the Engineer may direct, and upon the completion of the work, or upon notice to the Engineer by the owner or tenant that physical injury has occurred, further examination shall be made and the findings recorded and filed as above.

Damage to Works During Construction.

Article L. All risk of loss or damage to the Works, or to any part thereof, or to any of the materials, tools, implements or other things used in doing the work, prior to final completion, is assumed and shall be borne by the Contractor, and any such loss or damage shall be made good by the Contractor at his own cost, and the construction shall be carried forward by him in accordance with this contract, without additional cost to the City by reason of such loss or damage.

VII.

CITY TO SECURE CONTRACTOR AGAINST INTERFERENCE BY INJUNCTIONS, ETC.

City's Assurances to Contractor of Right to Construct.

Article LI. The City hereby stipulates and covenants to and with the Contractor that the City will secure and assure to the Contractor so long as the Contractor shall perform the stipulations of this contract, the right to construct the Railroad as prescribed in this contract free of all right, claim or other interference, whether by injunction, suit for damages or otherwise, on the part of any owners, abutting owner, or other person; but not including any interference, legal or otherwise, by patentees or persons claiming to be patentees of tools, methods or appliances.

Claims for Infringement of Patents.

Article LII. The Contractor shall hold himself responsible for any claims made against the City for any infringement of patents by the use of patented articles in the performance and completion of the work, or of any process connected with the work agreed to be performed under this contract, or of any materials used upon the said work; and shall save harmless and indemnify the City for all costs, expenses and damages which the City shall be obliged to pay by reason of any infringement of patents used in the performance and completion of the work.

Acquisition of Real Estate.

Article LIII. The City will acquire all such real estate and rights of way or other rights, terms, franchises, easements and privileges therein which, in the opinion of the Commission, it shall be necessary to acquire or extinguish for the purpose of constructing the Works free of interference or right of interference; provided, however, that this covenant shall not apply to or include any damages for physical injuries to property referred to in Chapter VI hereof, whether or not compensation for such damages be awarded in a condemnation proceeding. If compensation for any such damages shall be included in an award in condemnation proceedings the Contractor shall, upon demand, promptly reimburse the City for any payments made by it for such purposes.

VIII.

TIME FOR COMPLETION, DAMAGES FOR DELAY, ETC.

Commencement and Completion of Work.

Article LIV. Time is of the essence of this contract. The Contractor shall begin actual work within sixty (60) days after the delivery of this contract. The entire work covered by this contract shall be completed in all respects within eighteen (18) months from the date of the delivery of this contract.

Price to be Reduced for Delay.

Article LV. In the event of delay in completion of the Works beyond the period herein prescribed, or beyond the period to which such time may be extended by resolution of the Commission for good cause shown, the City shall—whether the working force be increased as provided in the specifications or not—be paid damages for such delay. Inasmuch as the amount of such damages will be extremely difficult to ascertain, especially in view of the fact that the Railroad herein contracted for is only a part of a complete system, the remainder of which is to be constructed under other contracts, it is hereby expressly agreed that damages shall be liquidated and paid by reducing the price to be paid the Contractor as follows: From the amounts which shall become payable to the Contractor after the expiration of the periods above limited (but not including the retained percentages from amounts theretofore certified to be due) there shall be deducted and retained by the City the following percentages: From the amount due for the first month after the expiration of such periods one (1) per centum thereof; from the amount due for the second month after the expiration of such periods two (2) per centum thereof; from the amount due for the third month after the expiration of such periods three (3) per centum thereof; from the amount due for the fourth month after the expiration of such periods four (4) per centum thereof; similarly from any amounts which may subsequently become due there shall be deducted a percentage, the rate of which shall equal the number of

months which may have elapsed between the expiration of the periods above limited and the time when such payments shall become due. These amounts shall be deducted and retained by the City and are hereby agreed upon and determined as the measure of liquidated damages (and not as a penalty) to the City. But in case the Contractor shall be delayed by reason of any labor strike not caused or instituted or provoked by the Contractor, or by any sub-contractor, agent or representative of the Contractor (which fact the Contractor shall prove to the satisfaction of the Commission), or in case the Contractor shall be delayed by any injunction or by any interference of public authority, and in case the Contractor cannot, notwithstanding such injunction or interference, with reasonable diligence make up for the delay so occasioned by speedier work when the Contractor shall not be so interfered with, then the said date for completion shall be extended by resolution of the Commission to a date later than the expiration of the said period by the amount of the time of such delay.

Commission May Intervene in Case of Injunction.

Article LVI. But no injunction, strike or interference of public authority shall be ground for such extension except if and from the time when the Contractor shall give the Commission notice of the injunction or other cause of delay, with copies of the injunction or other orders and of the papers upon which the same shall have been granted. The Commission and the City or either shall be accorded the right to intervene or become a party to any suit or proceeding in which any such injunction shall be obtained, and to move to dissolve the same or otherwise, as the Commission or City may deem proper. If necessary the Corporation Counsel or the Counsel to the Commission or both shall be authorized by the Contractor to appear, for that purpose, as counsel or attorneys for him.

In Case of Variation of Quantities.

Article LVII. The time stipulated within which to complete the Works is based upon the quantities of the various items entering into the work as stated in the form of proposal, which are given solely for the purpose of classifying bids. In case these quantities are exceeded or diminished then an extension or diminution of the term of this contract shall be made. It is, however, understood and agreed that in case an increase in any one item is balanced or offset by diminution of other items, no change in the term shall be made, and in any event the Engineer shall determine the amount of extension or diminution of time in respect of the relative increase or reduction in the quantities involved in the final completion.

Suspension of Work and Additional Time for Performance.

Article LVIII. The Commission reserves the right of temporarily suspending the execution of the whole or any part of the work herein contracted to be done, if it shall deem it for the interest of the City so to do, without compensation to the Contractor for such suspension, other than extending the time for completing the work as much as it may have been delayed by such suspension.

Time for Completion to Be Extended in Case of Delay in Acquiring Real Estate.

Article LIX. In case the Contractor shall at any time give notice to the Commission that any real estate is necessary under this contract for any of the purposes specified above, which notice shall give a brief description of such real estate, the Commission shall (if it finds that such necessity exists) begin and conduct with diligence proceedings to acquire the real estate described; and, in case the Commission shall fail to put the Contractor into possession of such real estate within three (3) months from the date of the delivery of such notice, the Commission shall allow the Contractor so much additional time wherein to perform and complete this contract on his part as the Engineer shall certify in writing to be just, but no allowance by way of damages shall be made for such delay.

Extensions Not Cumulative.

Article LX. It is expressly understood, however, that the periods of extension referred to herein shall not be cumulative, but only the single period of delay giving the greatest extension shall be taken into consideration.

Permission to Complete Contract Not a Waiver.

Article LXI. The permitting of the Contractor to go on and finish the work, or any part of it, after the time fixed for its completion, or after the date to which the time for completion may have been extended, or the making of partial payments to the Contractor after any such periods, shall in no wise operate as a waiver on the part of the City of any of its rights under this contract.

IX.

REMEDIES IN CASE OF CONTRACTOR'S DEFAULT.

In Case of Default.

Article LXII. If the work to be done under this contract shall be abandoned by the Contractor, or if this contract shall be assigned, or the work sublet by him, otherwise than as herein specified, or if at any time the Engineer shall be of the opinion, and shall so certify in writing to the Commission that the performance of this contract is unnecessarily or unreasonably delayed, or that the Contractor is wilfully violating any of the provisions or covenants of this contract, or the specifications, or is executing the same in bad faith or not in accordance with the terms thereof, or if the work be not fully completed within the time named in this contract for its completion, or within the time to which the completion of the contract may be extended by the Commission, the Commission may

May Take Charge of Work.

(1) Notify the Contractor, by a written notice, to discontinue all work, or any part thereof, under this contract, and thereupon the Contractor shall discontinue the work, or such part thereof, and the Commission shall thereupon have the right to contract for the completion of the Works in the manner prescribed by law, or to place such and so many persons as it may deem advisable, by contract or otherwise, to work, and complete the work herein described, or such part thereof, to take possession of and use any or all of the materials, plant, tools, equipment, supplies and property of every kind provided by the Contractor for the purpose of his work, and to procure other materials for the completion of the same, and to charge the expense of said labor and materials to the Contractor. The expense so charged shall be deducted and paid by the City out of such moneys as may be due or may at any time thereafter grow due to the Contractor under and by virtue of this contract, or any part thereof. And in case such expenses shall exceed the amount which would have been payable under the contract if the same had been completed by the Contractor, he shall pay the amount of such excess to the City; and in case such expense shall be less than the amount which would have been payable under this contract if the same had been completed by the Contractor, he shall forfeit all claim to the difference; and when any particular part of the work is being carried on by the Commission, by contract or otherwise, under the provisions of this article of the contract, the Contractor shall continue the remainder of the work in conformity with the terms of this contract, and in such manner as in nowise to hinder or interfere with the persons or workmen employed, as above provided, by the Commission, by contract or otherwise, to do any part of the work, or to complete the same under the provisions of this article of the contract. And

Or Proceed Upon Bond.

(2) The City may also proceed as to the Commission shall seem proper upon the Bond or other security in its possession. And

Or May Bring Suit.

(3) The City may also bring any suit or proceeding for specific performance or for injunction or to recover damages or to obtain any relief or for any purpose proper under this contract.

X.

MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS.

Changes in the Contract.

Article LXIII. No correction or change in this contract shall be made except by written instrument duly authorized by the Commission and consented to by the Contractor and by the sureties upon his bond; but this provision shall not limit or affect the right to prescribe variations whether of construction or location of route as in this contract elsewhere provided.

Members of Commission Not Liable.

Article LXIV. No claim shall be made by the Contractor against any member of the Commission personally by reason of this contract or of any of its articles or provisions.

Contractor Not to Assign, Sublet, Etc.

Article LXV. The Contractor shall not assign, transfer, convey, sublet or otherwise dispose of this contract or his right, title or interest in or to the same or any part thereof without the previous consent in writing of the Commission, and he shall not assign by power of attorney or otherwise any of the moneys to become due and payable under this contract unless by and with the like consent. If the Contractor shall without such previous written consent assign, transfer, convey, sublet or otherwise dispose of this contract or of his right, title or interest therein or any of the moneys to become due under this contract, to any other person, company or

corporation, this contract may at the option of the Commission be revoked and annulled and the City shall thereupon be relieved and discharged from any and all liability and obligations growing out of the same to the Contractor and to his assignee or transferee; and no right under this contract or to any money to become due hereunder shall be asserted against the City in law or in equity by reason of any so-called assignment of this contract or any part thereof or of any moneys to grow due hereunder unless authorized as aforesaid by the written consent of the Commission; provided that nothing herein contained shall be construed to hinder, prevent or affect an assignment by the Contractor for the benefit of his creditors made pursuant to the statutes of the State of New York.

Provisions in Case Commission Ceases.

Article LXVI. In case the Commission shall cease to exist the Legislature may provide what public officer or officers shall exercise the powers and duties of the Commission under and by virtue of this contract; and in default of such provision, such powers and duties shall be deemed to be vested in the Mayor of the City. In case any officer or officers other than the Commission shall hereafter have the powers of the Commission or any of them, then the provisions of this contract shall be applicable to such officer or officers to the extent to which the powers of the Commission shall appertain to such officer or officers, and any official act or determination of such officer or officers or of this Commission shall be sufficient hereunder, anything herein to the contrary notwithstanding, if the same be done or had by lawful vote or resolution or in such manner as the Legislature may from time to time prescribe.

Labor Law.

Article LXVII. The Contractor agrees to comply with the provisions of the Labor Law, including Section three thereof as re-enacted by Chapter 36 of the Laws of 1909. The Contractor further agrees and stipulates that no laborer, workman or mechanic in the employ of the Contractor, sub-contractor or other person doing or contracting to do the whole or a part of the work contemplated by this contract, shall be permitted or required to work more than eight hours in any one calendar day, except in cases of extraordinary emergency caused by fire, flood or danger to life or property; and further that the wages to be paid for a legal day's work as hereinbefore defined to all classes of such laborers, workmen or mechanics upon the work contemplated by this contract or upon any material to be used upon or in connection therewith shall not be less than the prevailing rate for a day's work in the same trade or occupation in the Borough of the City where the work hereby contemplated, about or in connection with which such labor is performed, is in its final or completed form to be situated, erected or used; and that each such laborer, workman or mechanic employed by the Contractor or by any sub-contractor or other person on, about or upon the work contemplated by this contract shall receive such wages herein provided for. This contract shall be void and of no effect, unless the Contractor shall comply with the provisions of this section. In obedience to the requirements of Section Fourteen of the Labor Law it is further provided that if the provisions of the said Section Fourteen are not complied with, this contract shall be void.

All Necessary Legal Provisions Deemed Inserted Herein.

Article LXVIII. It is the intent and understanding of the parties to this agreement that each and every provision of law required to be inserted in this contract should be and is inserted herein. Furthermore, it is hereby stipulated that every such provision is to be deemed to be inserted herein; and if, through mistake or otherwise, any such provision is not inserted or is not inserted in correct form, then the contract shall forthwith, upon the application of either party, be amended by such insertion so as to comply strictly with the law, and without prejudice to the rights of either party hereunder.

Provision Unlawful in Case of Provision.

Article LXIX. If this contract contains any unlawful provision not an essential part of the general structure of the contract and which shall not appear to have been a controlling or very material inducement to the making thereof the same shall be deemed of no effect, and shall, upon the application of either party, be struck from the contract without affecting the binding force of the contract as it shall remain after omitting such provision.

In witness whereof, this contract has been executed for The City of New York by the Public Service Commission for the First District under and by resolution duly adopted by the Commission and the seal of the Commission has been hereto affixed and attested by its Secretary and these presents have been signed by its Chairman; and the Contractor has caused its corporate seal to be hereto affixed and these presents to be executed by its proper officers the day and year first above written.

The communication transmitted with the contract requested the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to consent to the award of the contract, to prescribe a limit to the amount of bonds available to meet its requirements, and to direct the Comptroller to issue bonds to the extent of the estimated contract amount noted.

The proposed section is about 20,000 feet long of 3-track elevated construction, with eight local stations and two express stations. The contract award has been made to the lowest of eleven bidders.

For the construction of Section No. 3, Routes 36 and 37, known as the Astoria, Woodside and Corona Route, beginning at a point on Queens boulevard, in the Borough of Queens, about two hundred and seventy feet (270) northwest of the westerly line of Van Dam street and extending thence along and over Queens boulevard, Greenpoint avenue, Skillman avenue and Roosevelt avenue to a point over Roosevelt avenue about seventy (70) feet east of the easterly line of Sycamore (Albertus) avenue; with local stations at Rawson street, Lowry street, Bliss street, Lincoln avenue, Broadway, 25th street, Elmhurst avenue and Sycamore avenue, and with express stations at Woodside avenue and Junction avenue, at a cost not to exceed two million and sixty-three thousand five hundred and eighty-eight dollars (\$2,063,588); and be it further

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment prescribes that the limit of the amount of proceeds of corporate stock available for the said purposes shall be two million and sixty-three thousand five hundred and eighty-eight dollars (\$2,063,588); and be it further

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized and directed to issue corporate stock of The City of New York to an amount not exceeding two million and sixty-three thousand five hundred and eighty-eight dollars (\$2,063,588), at such rate of interest as the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund shall prescribe, the proceeds to the amount of the par value thereof to be issued for the purposes mentioned in the communication of the Public Service Commission for the First District to this Board, dated February 10, 1913.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Public Service Commission—Approval of Consent to Award of Contract, Etc., for Construction of Section 2, Routes 36 and 37 of the Subway (Cal. No. 19).

And the Public Service Commission for the First District does hereby, pursuant to section 45 of the Greater New York Charter, make request for the authorization of such corporate stock for the full amount sufficient to pay the entire estimated expense of executing such contract, to wit: The sum of eight hundred and sixty thousand seven hundred and forty-three dollars and fifty cents (\$860,743.50).

INVITATION TO CONTRACTORS.

PART OF ROUTES NO. 36 AND 37.

The City of New York, acting by the Public Service Commission for the First District (hereinafter called "the Commission") invites proposals to construct Section No. 2 of the Astoria, Woodside and Corona Rapid Transit Railroad.

The points within the City between which the said part is to run and the route or routes to be followed are briefly as follows:

Section No. 2. Beginning at a point on Second (formerly Debevoise) Avenue in the Borough of Queens about three hundred (300) feet south of the centre line of Beebe Avenue and extending thence along and over Second Avenue to a point about three hundred and thirty (330) feet south of the centre line of Ditmars Avenue; with local stations at Beebe Avenue, Washington Avenue, Broadway, Grand Avenue, and Ditmars Avenue, and with an express station at Hoyt Avenue.

The general plan of construction calls for an elevated railroad. The details of the construction of the railroad and appurtenances are more particularly indicated on the contract drawings.

Bidders will not be required to provide or lay tracks or ties, nor to do station finish work.

The work of construction under the contract will include the construction of all necessary sewers and connections, along the route of the Railroad; also the necessary support, maintenance, readjustment and reconstruction of vaults adjacent to buildings, pipes, tubes, conduits, subways or other subsurface structures; the support and care, including underpinning where necessary, of all buildings, monuments, surface railroads and other structures, etc., affected by or interfered with during the construction of the work; also the restoration of the sidewalks and roadways.

Bidders must examine the form of contract and the specifications, maps and plans; must visit the location of the work and inform themselves of the present conditions along the line thereof and make their own estimates of the facilities and difficulties attending the execution of the proposed work.

A fuller description of the work to be done is set forth, and other requirements, provisions, details and specifications are stated, in the printed form of contract and in the Contract Drawings therein referred to. Printed copies of the form of contract, bond and contractor's proposal may be had on application at the office of the Commission, No. 154 Nassau Street, Borough of Manhattan, City of New York. The Contract Drawings may be inspected at the same office, and copies thereof may be purchased by prospective bidders on payment of five dollars (\$5.00). The printed form of contract and the Contract Drawings are to be deemed a part of this invitation.

Partial payments to the Contractor will be made monthly as the work proceeds, as provided in the form of contract.

The Contractor will be required to complete the work as soon as practicable and within a period of eighteen (18) months from the date of the delivery of this contract.

Sealed bids or proposals will be received at the office of the Commission at No. 154 Nassau Street, Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, until the 28th day of January, 1913, at twelve (12) o'clock noon, at which time, or at a later date to be fixed by the Commission, the proposal will be publicly opened.

Proposals must be in the form prescribed by the Commission, copies of which may be obtained at the office of the Commission.

A statement based upon estimate of the Engineer, of the quantities of the various classes of the work and of the nature and extent as near as practicable of the work required is to be found in the schedule forming a part of the form of Contractor's Proposal. The quantities given in such schedule are approximate only, being given as a basis for the uniform comparison of bids, and no claim is to be made against the City on account of any excess or deficiency, absolute or relative, in the same, except as provided in the specifications and form of contract.

All proposals must, when submitted, be enclosed in a sealed envelope endorsed "Proposal for Constructing Part of Rapid Transit Railroad—Routes No. 36 & 37, Section No. 2" and must be delivered to the Commission or its Secretary; and in the presence of the person submitting the proposal, it will be deposited in a sealed box in which all proposals will be deposited. No proposal will be received or deposited unless accompanied by a separate certified check drawn upon a national or state bank or trust company having its principal office in the City of New York, satisfactory to the Commission and payable to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York for the sum of fifteen thousand (\$15,000) dollars. Such check must not be enclosed in the envelope containing the proposal.

The Unit Prices must not be improperly balanced, and any bid which the Commission considers detrimental to the City's interests may be rejected.

No proposal, after it shall have been deposited with the Commission, will be allowed to be withdrawn for any reason whatever.

The award of the contract will be made by the Commission as soon as practicable after the opening of the proposals.

Bidders whose proposals are otherwise satisfactory, in case the sureties or securities named by them are not approved by the Commission, may substitute in their proposals the names of other sureties or securities approved by the Commission, but such substitution must be made within five (5) days after notice of disapproval, unless such period is extended by the Commission.

A bidder whose proposal shall be accepted shall, in person or by duly authorized representative, attend at the said office of the Commission within ten (10) days after the delivery of a notice by the Commission that his proposal is accepted and that the contract is consented to by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and such bidder shall then deliver a contract in the form referred to, duly executed and with its execution duly proved.

At the time of the delivery of the contract, the Contractor will be required to furnish security to the City by giving a bond for fifty thousand (\$50,000) dollars. At the option of the successful bidder cash or approved securities may be deposited instead of giving a bond. If securities are deposited in place of a bond under this contract, they must be of the character of securities in which Savings Banks may invest their funds and must be approved by the Commission.

The Contractor's bond must be in the form annexed to the form of contract.

In addition and as further security fifteen (15) per centum of the amounts certified from time to time to be due to the Contractor will be deducted until the amounts so deducted and retained shall equal the sum of one hundred thousand (\$100,000) dollars. Thereafter there shall be so deducted and retained for such purpose ten (10%) per centum of the amounts certified from time to time to be due to the Contractor. The Contractor may from time to time withdraw portions of the amounts so retained upon depositing in lieu thereof corporate stock of The City of New York equal in market value to the amount so withdrawn.

In case of failure or neglect to execute and deliver the contract or to execute and deliver the required bond or to make the required deposit, such bidder will, at the option of the Commission, be deemed either to have made the contract or to have abandoned the contract. In the latter case, the Commission will give notice thereof to such defaulting bidder, and the Commission may thereupon proceed to make another contract with such, if any, of the original bidders, as, in the opinion of the Commission, it will be to the best interests of the City to contract with, or may by new advertisement invite further proposals. The defaulting bidder shall thereupon be liable to the City for all loss and damage by it sustained, including the excess, if any, of the amount it shall pay any other Contractor over the amount of the bid of such defaulting bidder.

If the Commission shall give notice to any bidder that his or its proposal is accepted and that the contract is consented to by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and if the bidder shall fail within ten (10) days thereafter or within such further period, if any, as may be prescribed by the Commission, to execute and deliver the contract and to execute and deliver the bond with sureties, or to make the required deposit, then the Invitation to Contractors and proposal accepted as aforesaid shall be a contract binding the bidder to pay to the City the damage by it sustained

by reason of such failure, and in such case the bidder shall, by the terms of the proposal, absolutely assign to the City the ownership of the check accompanying his or its proposal as a payment on account of such damages.

All such deposits made by bidders whose proposals shall not be accepted by the Commission will be returned to the person or persons making the same within five (5) days after the contract shall be executed and delivered. The deposit of the successful bidder will be returned when the contract is executed and its provisions in respect of the bond or deposit are complied with.

RAPID TRANSIT RAILROAD.

CONTRACT.

Routes No. 36 and 37—Section No. 2.

Agreement made this day of 1913, between The City of New York, hereinafter called the City, acting by The Public Service Commission for the First District, hereinafter called the Commission, party of the first part, and Cooper & Evans Company, a corporation organized and existing under the laws of the State of New York, hereinafter called the Contractor, party of the second part.

Whereas, the Commission in behalf of the City by due advertisement, pursuant to law, has invited contractors to submit to the Commission proposals for making this contract; and

Whereas, the Contractor has thereupon duly submitted to the Commission a proposal, which has been accepted; and

Whereas, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York has consented to this contract;

Now, therefore, in consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements hereinafter contained, and under the authority of chapter 4 of the laws of 1891, entitled, "An Act to provide for Rapid Transit Railways in Cities of over One Million Inhabitants," and of the various acts amending the same, the parties do hereby, the City for itself and its successors and the Contractor for itself, its successors and assigns

Agree each with the other as follows:

I.

GENERAL PROVISIONS AND DEFINITIONS.

Outline of Contract.

Article I. The Contractor agrees to construct the part hereinafter described of a Rapid Transit Railroad, with its appurtenances. The City agrees to pay the Contractor the sums of money hereinafter mentioned at the times and in the manner and upon the terms and conditions hereinafter set forth.

Brief Description of Works.

Article II. The Railroad to be constructed under this contract forms a part of a certain route adopted by the Commission on October 10, 1911, and which is known as the Fifty-ninth Street, Woodside and Astoria Route, or Route No. 36, and part of a certain route adopted by the Commission on October 10, 1911, and which is known as the Roosevelt Avenue Route or Route No. 37. Route No. 36 and Route No. 37 combined form the Astoria, Woodside and Corona Rapid Transit Railroad, or Routes 36 and 37. The part of Routes 36 and 37 to be constructed under this contract consists of:

Section No. 2.

Second Avenue from Beebe Avenue to Ditmars Avenue.

Beginning at a point on Second (formerly Debevoise) Avenue in the Borough of Queens about three hundred (300) feet south of the centre line of Beebe Avenue and extending thence along and over Second Avenue to a point about three hundred and thirty (330) feet south of the centre line of Ditmars Avenue; with local stations at Beebe Avenue, Washington Avenue, Broadway, Grand Avenue, and Ditmars Avenue, and with an express station at Hoyt Avenue.

The precise location of the tracks, and the dimensions and other characteristics of the Railroad are more fully stated in the specifications forming a part of this contract, and in the detailed drawings and plans hereinafter mentioned.

Statutes Incorporated Herein.

Article III. This contract is made pursuant to the Rapid Transit Act, which is to be deemed a part hereof as if it were incorporated herein.

Marginal Notes, etc.

Article IV. Titles, headings, running headlines and marginal notes are printed hereon merely for convenience and shall not be deemed to be any part of this contract for any purpose whatever.

Definitions of Words.

Article V. The following words and expressions used in this contract shall, except where by the context it is clear that another meaning is intended, be construed as follows:

"City."

(1) The word "City" to mean The City of New York, and any other corporation or division of government to which the ownership, rights, powers and privileges of The City of New York under the Rapid Transit Act, shall hereafter come, belong or appertain.

"Commission."

(2) The word "Commission" to mean the Public Service Commission for the First District, and any other board, body, commission, official or officials, to which or to whom the powers now belonging to the said Commission in respect of the location, construction, equipment, maintenance and operation of Rapid Transit Railroads under the provisions of the Rapid Transit Act shall, by virtue of any act or acts, hereinafter pass or be held to appertain.

"Contractor."

(3) The word "Contractor" to mean the party of the second part to this contract, and its successors and assigns and any and every person or corporation who or which shall at any time be liable in the place or for the party of the second part to perform any obligations under this contract assumed by the said party of the second part. For convenience the Contractor is hereinafter referred to as if the Contractor were an individual. The word "he" shall, as the sense may require, include "it," "she" and "they"; the word "him" shall include "her," "it" and "them"; and the word "his" shall include "its," "her" and "their."

"Comptroller."

(4) The word "Comptroller" to mean the Comptroller of The City of New York, and the officer or board to whom or to which his powers now existing under the Rapid Transit Act shall come to appertain.

"Engineer."

(5) The word "Engineer" to mean the Chief Engineer of the Commission or his duly authorized representative and any successor or successors duly appointed or any deputy or substitute for him who shall be appointed by the Commission or by its authority.

"Rapid Transit Act."

(6) The words "Rapid Transit Act" to mean chapter 4 of the laws of 1891 as amended by chapters 102 and 556 of the laws of 1892, chapters 528 and 752 of the laws of 1894, chapter 519 of the laws of 1895, chapter 729 of the laws of 1896, chapter 616 of the laws of 1900, chapter 587 of the laws of 1901, chapters 533, 542, 544 and 584 of the laws of 1902, chapters 562 and 564 of the laws of 1904, chapters 599 and 631 of the laws of 1905, chapters 472, 606 and 607 of the laws of 1906, chapter 429 of the laws of 1907, chapter 498 of the laws of 1909, chapters 205, 504, 505 and 506 of the laws of 1910, chapter 888 of the laws of 1911 and chapter 226 of the laws of 1912, or as heretofore otherwise amended.

"Railroad."

(7) The word "Railroad" to mean the part which the Contractor agrees by this contract to build, together with all appurtenances thereto which are to be constructed or provided by the Contractor.

"The Works."

(8) The words "the Works" to mean all of the matters and things herein agreed to be furnished or done by or on the part of the Contractor.

"New York."

(9) The words "New York" to mean the City of New York according to its boundaries at the date of this contract.

"Daily Newspaper."

(10) The words "daily newspaper" to mean any paper regularly published in New York on every day or every day except Sundays and holidays.

"Notice"—"Direction."

(11) The word "notice" to mean a written notice. The word "direction" to mean a written direction.

Wherever in the specifications or upon the drawings the words "directed," "required," "permitted," "ordered," "designated," "prescribed" or words of like import are used, it shall be understood that the direction, requirement, permission, order, designation or prescription of the Engineer is intended, and similarly the words "approved," "acceptable," "satisfactory" or words of like import shall mean approved by or acceptable or satisfactory to the Engineer.

Legal Address of Contractor—Address May be Changed.

Article VI. The address given in the bid or proposal, upon which this contract is founded, is hereby designated as the place where all notices, directions and other communications to the Contractor shall be certified, mailed or delivered. The delivering at the above-named place or depositing in a post-paid wrapper directed to the above place, in any post-office box regularly maintained by the Post-office Department, of any notice, letter or other communication to the Contractor, shall be deemed sufficient service thereof upon the Contractor. Such address may be changed at any time by an instrument in writing executed and acknowledged by the Contractor and delivered to the Commission. Nothing herein contained shall be deemed to preclude or render inoperative the service of any notice, direction or other communication upon the Contractor personally.

Contractor Responsible for Acts of Sub-contractor's Employees.

Article VII. If the Contractor shall cause any part of this contract to be performed by a sub-contractor, the provisions of this contract shall apply to such sub-contractor and his officers, agents and employees in all respects, as if he and they were employees of the Contractor; and the Contractor shall not be in any manner thereby discharged from his obligations and liabilities hereunder, but shall be liable hereunder for all acts and negligence of the sub-contractor, his officers, agents and employees as if they were employees of the Contractor. The employees of the sub-contractor shall be subject to the same provisions hereof as employees of the Contractor; and the work or materials furnished by the sub-contractor shall be subject to the provisions hereof, as if furnished directly by the Contractor.

Commission May Disapprove Sub-contractors.

Article VIII. The Contractor, before making any sub-contract of the work, shall state in writing to the Commission the name of the proposed sub-contractor, the portion of the work which such sub-contractor is to do or the materials which such sub-contractor is to furnish, the place of business of such sub-contractor and such other information as the Commission may require. The Commission shall have the right to require the Contractor not to award any sub-contract to a person, firm or corporation disapproved of by the Commission.

II.

WORK TO BE DONE, PRICES, ETC.

Work to Be Done.

Article IX. The Contractor shall do all the work and furnish all the materials, plant, tools and appliances necessary or proper for performing and completing the work of constructing the Railroad in the manner and within the time hereinafter specified. He shall complete the Railroad and do all work and furnish all labor and materials in and about the construction of the Railroad to the satisfaction of the Commission and in accordance with this contract and the specifications and drawings herein mentioned at the prices herein agreed upon and fixed therefor; provided, however, that said contract drawings may from time to time be altered or modified as hereinafter provided.

Construction Includes Incidental Work.

Article X. In order to construct the Railroad it will be necessary to take up and relay the sidewalk pavement or other surface material, to protect, support and maintain during construction all buildings and other structures, including their foundations, and all subsurface railroads, water mains, gas pipes, electric subways, poles and wires, vaults, including vaults of abutting property, and other surface, subsurface and overhead structures, together with their necessary connections, as the same may be met with along the route; to build sewers along the route; to make or remake the necessary manholes, catch basins and other sewer connections therewith; to move, alter, readjust or rebuild water mains, gas pipes, electric subways, vaults, including vaults of abutting property, and other subsurface structures, together with their necessary connections; and to do all such additional and incidental work as may be necessary for the completion of the Railroad and the reconstruction and restoration of the street pavements or other surfaces adjacent to the route of the Railroad and which may have been directly or indirectly disturbed or injured by the Contractor in the progress of the work of construction, to as useful and good a condition as existed before construction shall have been begun. All such work of every description, including all work, labor and material in connection therewith, is part of the work which is included in this contract and which the Contractor agrees to perform for the prices herein agreed upon.

Prices.

Article XI. The City will pay and the Contractor shall receive in full compensation for furnishing the necessary plant and all the materials and labor, and for performing and completing all the work which is necessary or proper to be furnished or performed in order to complete the Railroad (including all incidental work) and also for all loss or damage arising out of the nature of the work aforesaid, or from the action of the elements, or from any unforeseen obstruction or difficulty encountered in the prosecution of the work, and for all risks of any description connected with the work, and for all expenses incurred by or in consequence of the suspension or discontinuance of the work as herein specified, the following prices, to wit:

SCHEDULE OF UNIT PRICES.

Item I-B. For Column Excavation, as specified in Section No. 74, the sum of one 39-100 dollars (\$1.39) per cubic yard.

Item 1-C. For Railroad Duct Excavation, as specified in Section No. 74, the sum of one 19-100 dollars (\$1.19) per cubic yard.

Item 6. For concrete masonry, in place, the sum of seven 25-100 dollars (\$7.25) per cubic yard.

Item 9. For brick masonry, in place, the sum of fifteen dollars (\$15.00) per cubic yard.

Item 12. For timber piles, in place and prepared, the sum of fifty cents (\$0.50) per lineal foot.

Item 13. For timber foundations, placed and fastened, the sum of sixty dollars (\$60) per thousand feet, board measure.

Item 17. For vitrified pipe, in place, as follows:

(e) For four (4) inch vitrified pipe, the sum of one 00-100 dollar (\$1.00) per lineal foot.

Item 18-A. For Railroad ducts in place as required by Section No. 221 of the Specifications, the sum of fourteen cents (\$0.14) per duct foot.

Item 19. For riveted steel, painted and erected, the sum of sixty dollars (\$60.00) per ton of two thousand pounds.

Item 20. For steel beams and shapes with connections, painted, sixty 70-100 dollars (\$60.70) per ton of two thousand pounds.

Item 21. For steel rods and bars built in concrete, and erected, the sum of sixty 00-100 dollars (\$60.00) per ton of two thousand pounds.

Item 25-A. For miscellaneous iron castings such as column fenders, manhole heads and covers, grating, pipes, etc., in place, the sum of fifty 00-100 dollars (\$50.00) per ton of two thousand pounds.

Item 25-B. For new cast-iron hub and spigot pipe, special castings, in place, the sum of fifty 00-100 dollars (\$50.00) per ton of two thousand pounds.

Item 30. For street surface restored:

(h) For all surfaces of whatever character as required in Section No. 225, the sum of two 65-100 dollars (\$2.65) per square yard.

Item 75. For street surface railroads, including the support, reconstruction, rebuilding, etc., where necessary, as follows:

(c) For electric (overhead trolley) railroads, the sum of sixty-nine cents (\$0.69) per lineal foot of single track.

Work not Susceptible of Classification.

Article XII. In case any work or materials shall be required to be done or fur-

nished in or about the Works—whether specified herein or indicated on the plans or not—which are not susceptible of classification under the Schedule of Unit Prices, the Contractor shall and will, if ordered by the Engineer, do and perform such work and furnish such materials at and for the actual and necessary net cost in money to the Contractor for labor and for material, where new material is used, and in addition thereto ten (10%) per centum of such net cost for the use of tools and plant, superintendence and all other expenses incidental to the performance of such work and the furnishing of such material, and the Contractor shall have no further claim in excess of the above; but this method of payment shall not apply to the performance of any work or the furnishing of any material which in part or in whole is susceptible of classification under such schedule, which work or material shall be paid for in part or in whole, as the case may be, at the unit price given in such schedule, except as herein otherwise *expressly* provided.

In case any work or material shall be required to be done or furnished under the provisions of this Article, for cost plus ten (10%) per centum, the Contractor shall at the end of each day during the progress thereof furnish to the Engineer daily time slips showing the name and number of each workman employed thereon, the number of hours employed thereon, the character of work he is doing and the wages paid or to be paid to him and also a daily memorandum of the material delivered on the work showing the amount and character of such material, from whom purchased and the amount paid or to be paid therefor. If required, the Contractor shall produce any books, vouchers, records or memoranda showing the work and materials actually paid for and the actual prices therefor.

Quantities Approximate Only.

Article XIII. It is expressly understood and agreed that the quantities of the various classes of work to be done and materials to be furnished under this contract, specified in the Contractor's Proposal, are approximate and only for the purpose of comparing, on a uniform basis, the bids offered for the Works under this contract; and neither the City, nor the Commission, nor any member of the Commission, is to be held responsible that any of the said estimated quantities shall, by reason of inaccuracies, or changes in the Works, be found even approximately correct in the construction of the Works, and the Contractor shall make no claim for anticipated profit, or for loss of profit, because of a difference between the quantities of the various classes of work actually done or materials actually delivered, and the estimated quantities stated in the Contractor's Proposal.

Right of Commission to Amplify Plans.

Article XIV. The Commission shall have the right, during the progress of the work, to amplify the plans, to add explanatory specifications and to furnish additional specifications and drawings.

Plans May be Modified.

Article XV. The Commission further reserves the right to change the location and to alter, in any way it may deem necessary for the public interests, the drawings aforesaid, in part or altogether, at any time during the progress of the work, without constituting grounds for any claim by the Contractor for payment or allowance for damages or extra service other than is provided for items of the different classes of construction shown in the schedule, or where not susceptible of classification, then as otherwise provided herein.

Contractor Bound to Complete in Best Manner.

Article XVI. The Contractor shall complete the entire work in accordance with the specifications and contract drawings and according to the other provisions of this contract and within the time specified in this contract, in the most workmanlike manner and with the highest regard to the safety of life and property and according to the lines, levels and directions given by the Engineer, for the prices herein agreed upon.

Best Materials, Machinery, Tools, etc., to be Used.

Article XVII. The Contractor shall furnish of the best description all materials, machinery, implements, tools and labor necessary to construct and put in complete working order all work covered by the specifications, contract drawings and provisions of this contract, including all additional specifications, drawings and details issued or required, as herein provided for the prices hereinbefore agreed upon.

Contractor Has Examined Location, Plans, etc.

Article XVIII. The Contractor hereby represents that prior to the execution of this contract he has examined in detail on the ground the location mentioned herein and indicated on the plans, and that he has fully examined the plans and has read each and every clause and section of this contract and the specifications and has had full opportunity to consider the same and make necessary investigations relating thereto; and he agrees that he will not make any claim for, or have any right to, damages or an extension of time for completion of the Works, or any other concession, because of any misinterpretation or misunderstanding of this contract or the specifications or of the plans, or because of any lack of information.

No Acceptance to Obviate the Necessity for Sound Work, etc.

Article XIX. No acceptance of any part of the Works or of materials therefor shall relieve the Contractor of his obligation to furnish sound material and perform sound work, whether with respect to such part or to any part of the Works.

Inspection.

Article XX. The Commission contemplates, and the Contractor hereby approves, the most thorough and minute inspection by the Commission and its Engineer, and by their representatives or subordinates, of all work and materials and of the manufacture or preparation of such materials from the beginning of Construction to the final completion of the Works. It is the intention of the Commission that its Engineer shall draw the attention of the Contractor to all errors or variations from the requirements of this contract or other defects in workmanship or materials. But it is expressly agreed that no omission on the part of the Commission or its Engineer or any officer, member or subordinate of the Commission to point out such errors, variations or defects shall give the Contractor any right or claim against the City or shall in any way relieve the Contractor from his obligations according to the terms of this contract.

Contractor to Afford Facilities for Inspection.

Article XXI. The Contractor shall at all times give to the Commission and its members, to the Engineer and his assistants and subordinates, and any person designated by the Commission or its Chairman, all facilities, whether necessary or convenient, for inspecting the materials to be furnished and the work to be done under this contract. The members of the Commission, the Engineer and all employees of the Commission bearing his authorization or the authorization of the Commission or its Chairman, shall be admitted at any time summarily and without delay to any part of the Works or to inspection of materials at any place or stage of their manufacture, preparation, shipment or delivery.

Engineer Be Furnished Facilities.

Article XXII. The Engineer shall be furnished with every reasonable facility for ascertaining whether the work is in accordance with the requirements and intention of this contract, even to the extent of uncovering or taking down portions of finished work. Should the work thus exposed or examined prove satisfactory, the uncovering or taking down and the replacing of the covering or the making good of the parts removed shall be paid for at the contract prices for the class of work done; but should the work exposed or examined prove unsatisfactory, such uncovering, taking down, replacing and making good shall be at the expense of the Contractor.

Inspection Not to Relieve Contractor of Obligations.

Article XXIII. The inspection of the work shall not relieve the Contractor of any of his obligations to fulfill his contract as herein prescribed, and defective work shall be made good and unsuitable materials will be rejected, notwithstanding that such work and materials have been previously overlooked by the Engineer and accepted or estimated for payment. If the work or any part thereof, shall be found defective before the final acceptance of the whole work, the Contractor shall forthwith make good such defect, in a manner satisfactory to the Engineer, and if any material brought upon the ground for use in the work, or selected for the same, shall be condemned by the Engineer as unsuitable or not in conformity with the specifications, the Contractor shall forthwith remove such materials.

Engineer's Determination to Be Final and Conclusive upon Contractor.

Article XXIV. To prevent disputes and litigations, the Engineer shall in all cases determine the amount, quality, acceptability and fitness of the several kinds of work and materials which are to be paid for under this contract; shall determine all questions in relation to the Works and the construction thereof; and shall in all cases determine every question which may arise relative to the fulfillment of this contract on the part of the Contractor. His determination and estimate shall be final and conclusive upon the Contractor, and in case any question shall arise between the parties hereto, touching this contract, such determination and estimate shall be a condition precedent to the right of the Contractor to receive any money under this contract.

Engineer to Explain.

Article XXV. The Engineer shall make all necessary explanations as to the meaning and intention of the specifications, shall give all orders and directions contemplated therein or thereby and in every case in which a difficult or unforeseen condition shall arise in the performance of the work required by this contract.

Other Contractors.

During the progress of the work it will be necessary for other contractors and persons to do work in or about the construction or equipment of the Railroad. The Contractor shall afford to such other contractors or persons such facilities as the Engineer may require.

Differences Between Contractor and Other Contractors.

Any difference or conflicts which may arise between the Contractor and other contractors of the Commission in regard to their work shall be adjusted and determined by the Engineer.

Substitute for Chief Engineer.

Article XXVI. Any engineer substituted by the Commission in place of the Chief Engineer during his absence, illness or inability or when the Commission shall so determine, shall, during his official connection, have all the power and authority of the Chief Engineer, and in all respects be recognized as such Chief Engineer.

III.

SPECIFICATIONS.

Specifications and Drawings Subject to Requirement of Railroad of Highest Class—Where Text of Contract Doubtful, Best Materials and Workmanship Required.

Section No. 1. The specifications and contract drawings hereinafter mentioned and taken in connection with the other provisions of this contract, are intended by the Commission to be full and comprehensive, and to show all the work required to be done. But in a work of this magnitude it is impossible either in advance to show all details, or precisely to forecast all exigencies. The specifications and contract drawings are to be taken, therefore, as indicating the amount of work, its nature and the method of construction so far as the same are now distinctly apprehended. The Railroad is intended to be constructed for actual use and operation as an interurban railroad of the highest class, adapted to the necessities of the people of New York, in the best manner, according to the best rules and usages of railroad construction, and in the event of any doubt as to the meaning of any portion or portions of the specifications or contract drawings, or of the text of the contract, the same shall be interpreted as calling for the best construction, both as to materials and workmanship, capable of being supplied or applied under the then existing local conditions. All the clauses of the specifications, and all the parts of the contract drawings, are, therefore, to be understood, construed and interpreted as intending to produce the results hereinbefore stated.

To Construct in Accordance With Specifications.

Section No. 2. The Contractor shall construct and complete the Railroad strictly in accordance with the requirements of these specifications; if, in the specifications or contract, any detail or other matter or thing requisite be not mentioned, nevertheless the same is deemed to be included and the Contractor hereby undertakes to do the same as part of the work hereunder, at the unit prices for each class of work where applicable or as provided in Article XII. of the contract.

Maps and Drawings.

Section No. 3. The contract plans referred to in the contract and specifications bear date December 14, 1912, are each countersigned by the Engineer, are stamped with the seal of the Commission, bear the general title:

ROUTES No. 36 AND 37, SECTION No. 2.

Contract Drawing No.

and are designated or numbered as follows:

Nos. A-1 to A-5 inclusive, C-1 to C-10 inclusive.

Typical Sections and Dimensions.

Section No. 4. The sections and dimensions shown on the contract drawings are typical sections and dimensions which should be applicable to the greater part of the work. Where, however, changes are deemed necessary they may be ordered under Article XV. of the contract and the Engineer shall issue such plans and specifications as may be necessary.

Supplementary Drawings.

Section No. 5. In addition to the contract drawings already mentioned, the Commission has had prepared a set of maps and plans, bearing the same seal and general title as the contract drawings, but designated as supplementary drawings. These supplementary drawings exhibit certain information which the Commission has received from its Engineer of the general nature of the soil underlying portions of the route, the nature and position of surface railways, water mains, gas and other pipes, sewers, electric subways, manholes, hydrants, catch basins and other surface and subsurface structures.

Supplementary Drawings May Be Examined.

Section No. 6. These supplementary drawings can be seen at the office of the Engineer, also samples of material taken in connection with test borings. They are exhibited to the Contractor without any guarantee on the part of the Commission as to their completeness or correctness. The Contractor may have copies (blue-prints) of these drawings for such aid, if any, as may be derived from them, on the payment of the cost of blue-printing.

In Case of Difficulties Not Indicated on Supplementary Drawings.

Section No. 7. If, in the prosecution of the work, difficulties of any nature be encountered which are not indicated or suggested by the supplementary drawings, or by the samples of the test borings, or if additional surface or subsurface structures or obstructions be discovered or found of different size or in different positions or of different nature from those shown on the supplementary drawings, or if in any way such supplementary drawings be found erroneous, the Contractor shall take every necessary or proper precaution to overcome the unforeseen difficulty, and is to support, maintain, protect, remove, adjust or readjust, as the case may be, the additional or different surface or subsurface structures according to the direction of the Engineer, and as provided in this contract and these specifications.

Specifications Not Exclusive.

Section No. 8. It is expressly understood that the specifications do not include all requirements, but are requirements in addition to those heretofore or elsewhere given or provided in this contract. The specifications and other provisions of this contract, and the contract drawings, are intended to be explanatory of each other. Should, however, any discrepancy appear or any misunderstanding arise as to the import of anything contained in either, the explanation of the Engineer shall be final and conclusive.

Subdivisions of Specifications.

Section No. 9. These specifications are grouped in subdivisions as follows:

2. General Clauses.
3. General Manner of Prosecution and Maintenance of Traffic.
4. Street Railroad Tracks, Mains and Other Surface, Subsurface and Overhead Structures.
5. Excavation.
6. Backfilling.

9. Mortar.
10. Masonry.
11. Concrete.
12. Brick Masonry.
13. Steel and Iron.
14. Painting.
15. Ducts.
16. Surfaces Restored.

1.

Brief Description of the Work.

General Nature.

Section No. 10. The Rapid Transit Railroad which is hereinbefore described is to be an elevated railroad. The general details of construction and the location of the various tracks, junctions, grades, etc., are indicated more particularly on the contract drawings.

The Contractor will not be required to provide or lay tracks or ties under this contract.

Stations are to be constructed at such places as are indicated on the plans, but station finish work is not included in the work to be done under this contract. Station

construction must, however, be kept so advanced that station finish contractors can complete their work coincidently with the completion of the Railroad.

Surface and Subsurface Structures.

Section No. 11. In addition to the construction of the Railroad, it will be necessary to do various incidental work which is generally referred to in Article X hereof.

2.

General Clauses.

Section No. 12. All materials and workmanship must be of the best class in every respect, and the Engineer is to be the sole judge of their quality and efficiency.

Rapidity and Safety.

Section No. 13. All the work shall be prosecuted in the manner, according to local conditions, best calculated to promote rapidity in construction, to secure safety to life and property and to reduce to the minimum any interference with abutting property and the public travel. Paving, or other surface work affecting, or affected by, street traffic shall be prosecuted during such hours as will reduce such interference to a minimum. Night work shall be conducted, in accordance with the directions of the Engineer, so that annoyance to occupants of abutting property shall be reduced to a minimum, and the Engineer may, if in his judgment conditions so require, direct that night work be omitted.

Contract Section Part of System.

Section No. 14. The contract section embraced in this contract is one of a number of contract sections forming part of an extensive rapid transit railroad system, which the interests of the City imperatively require should be completed and put in operation without delay. If the Contractor shall fail so to prosecute his work that, in the judgment of the Engineer, it shall not be reasonably probable that the work will be completed within the time limit, the Contractor, if directed by the Commission, shall increase the number of shifts and the number of men in each shift as may be necessary to insure the completion of the work within the time required by this contract, or within the shortest possible time thereafter.

Emergencies.

Section No. 15. In case of emergencies involving danger to life or property, continuous work with an increased force may be ordered by the Engineer for such time as may be necessary.

Permits.

Section No. 16. No work shall be begun until the Commission shall issue to the Contractor a permit authorizing him to proceed. No permits for excavation will be issued until the Contractor has given satisfactory assurance to the Engineer that the material needed for construction has been acquired and is available. Such permits are to be in such form and to cover such portions of the work as the Commission shall prescribe.

When to Be Filed With Borough President.

Section No. 17. Before any opening is made in the surface of a street, a copy of the permit issued by the Commission shall have been filed with the Borough President not less than five days, unless the Engineer shall expressly direct work to begin within a less period.

Notice Regarding Commencement of Work.

Section No. 18. Before commencing work on any part of the route, the Contractor shall give notice in writing to the Engineer at least one (1) week in advance of his intention to commence such operations; and before commencing manufacture, or resuming manufacture, if the same has been suspended, of any article called for by these specifications, notice shall be given to the Engineer in writing at least one (1) week in advance, with the name and address of the maker and the amount and description of the material to be manufactured.

Methods of Construction.

Section No. 19. Plans showing the proposed methods of construction shall be submitted to the Engineer and receive his approval before permits will be granted and before such plans are put in operation.

Ordinances and Regulations.

Section No. 20. In all operations connected with the Works, all ordinances of the City, and of the Board of Health, so far as they may be valid and operative with respect thereto, and all laws of this State which are now applicable to and control or limit in any way the actions of those engaged in the work or affecting the materials belonging to them, shall be respected and strictly complied with, and the Contractor shall further strictly comply with all applicable Federal, State and Municipal regulations regarding the transportation in and around the City and Harbor of materials used in, or in connection with, the work.

Requirements of Borough President, etc., to Be Observed.

Section No. 21. Whenever the construction of the Works under the provisions of this contract shall interfere with, disturb or endanger any sewer, water pipe, gas pipe, or other duly authorized subsurface structure, the work of construction at such points shall be conducted in accordance with the reasonable requirements of the Borough President or the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity or other officer or local authority having the care of and the jurisdiction or control over such subsurface structures so interfered with, disturbed or endangered.

Building and Water Permits; Shut-Offs for Water Pipes, etc.

Section No. 22. The Contractor shall, at his own cost, provide for the water supply necessary for his work and he shall bear the cost of any inspection charge in connection therewith. He shall bear the expense absolutely necessary in the bagging of gas pipes where it is necessary to cut off the supply of same, and of the shutting off and restoration of the flow in water mains where such work applies to the maintenance and support thereof as provided in Section No. 51 of the specifications.

Storage on Streets.

Section No. 23. Along the streets occupied by the Railroad and on cross-streets adjacent thereto, only a reasonable amount of such structural and other material as may be absolutely necessary to avoid delay in construction may be stored; such material must not be allowed to accumulate, but must be replenished from day to day. The amount to be so allowed shall be determined by the Engineer.

Material Stored.

Section No. 24. Excavated sand, gravel or stone that in the judgment of the Engineer is suitable for use in mortar, concrete, or masonry, also structural and other material to be used in the work, may be stored in such locations and for such periods as are approved by the Engineer.

Approval of Engineer Revocable.

Section No. 25. In any case material may only be so stored with the approval of the Engineer, revocable at any time; and if so ordered, such material shall be removed immediately on receipt of the order, or within a period of time to be therein stated.

Access to Fire Hydrants.

Section No. 26. Wherever the work is being carried on, free access must be given to every fire hydrant and fire alarm box, and when required, hydrants shall be extended by suitable tube or piping to an accessible point as approved by the Engineer, and to the satisfaction of the Chief of the Fire Department. Materials must not be piled at any time or place within ten (10) feet of any fire hydrant or fire alarm box; and where materials are unavoidably piled or placed in the vicinity of a fire hydrant or fire alarm box, and to such height as to obscure a sight of the same, the position of such hydrant or fire alarm box shall be indicated by suitable signals, both day and night.

The Contractor shall guard, maintain and protect the existing wires, cables, ducts, manholes, posts and poles of the Fire Department. He shall not cause the interruption of the existing Fire Department Fire Alarm Telegraph service. No Fire Department wire, cable, duct, manhole, post or pole shall be disturbed except in the presence of a representative of the Bureau of Fire Alarm Telegraph. In case of the disturbance of any of the former, the same shall be restored to its existing condition by the contractor at his own expense.

Work to Be Cleared.

Section No. 27. At his own expense and as directed from time to time by the Engineer, the Contractor is to clear the work, streets and all public places occupied by him of all refuse and rubbish that may accumulate from any source whatever and leave them in a neat condition; but this is in no way to be construed as placing upon the Contractor the usual duties of the Street Cleaning Department.

Assistance to Be Rendered to Owners of Buildings.

Section No. 28. Where access to any adjacent property is temporarily cut off, owing to the occupancy of the street by the Contractor, he must, at his own cost, render every assistance to the owner or occupant in handling such materials of any description, including all material to be removed by the Department of Street Clean-

ing, that has to be taken to or removed from such property; such material shall be taken to or from the nearest accessible point that in the opinion of the Engineer is convenient for handling.

Waste Material.

Section No. 29. Waste material of any character will under no conditions be permitted to remain on the streets, but must immediately on its becoming unfit for use in the work be carted away and disposed of by the Contractor as hereinbefore provided.

Conveniences for Men.

Section No. 30. Necessary conveniences, properly secluded from public observation, shall be constructed and maintained by the Contractor at his own expense wherever needed for the use of the Contractor's employees, to the satisfaction of the Engineer and the sanitary authorities.

Fences.

Section No. 31. Wherever necessary the Contractor shall erect and maintain at his own expense fences for the protection of adjoining property and of the adjoining public places.

Advertisements Forbidden.

Section No. 32. The using of fences and buildings during construction for advertising purposes, other than the name and address of the Contractor, is forbidden; all temporary buildings and fences erected by the Contractor shall be neat in appearance and shall be painted as directed by the Engineer.

Barricades.

Section No. 33. Barricades and bridges shall be erected by the Contractor at his own cost, for the protection of the work or use of the public; they shall be substantial in character and neat in appearance.

Detailed Drawings.

Section No. 34. The Engineer will prepare and furnish to the Contractor, from time to time as required, drawings and plans amplifying such details of the contract drawings as may be necessary, and drawings and plans necessary to show the adjustment and reconstruction of all surface and subsurface structures wherever the reconstruction of the same is necessitated by the construction of the railroad. These plans must be strictly followed, unless local conditions should develop during construction, suggesting changes, when, with the approval of the Engineer, such changes may be permitted.

Working and Shop Drawings.

Section No. 35. The Contractor shall make all working or shop drawings which may be required in addition to the contract drawings, or in addition to such other drawings as the Commission may issue in amplification of such contract drawings, as explained above. All working or shop drawings shall be submitted in duplicate to the Engineer for his approval, which approval shall be indicated by his countersigning one set of such working or shop drawings and returning the same to the Contractor. Should the working or shop drawings be not approved by the Engineer, then the Engineer shall return one set of such working or shop drawings, with the necessary corrections and changes indicated thereon; and the Contractor must make such corrections and changes, and again submit plans in duplicate for the approval of the Engineer; and no work called for by said working or shop drawings shall be done until the approval of the Engineer be obtained, which must be given or refused within ten (10) working days after delivery to him at his office of such plans in duplicate.

Lines and Grades.

Section No. 36. During the progress of the work the Commission will give, through the Engineer, to the Contractor, suitable points, marks or benches, indicating the line and grade of the Railroad and of the sewers; such points or bench marks to be established at such intervals as the Engineer deems necessary for the Contractor to be able to perform his work. The principal lines and grades are to be given by the Engineer, who may change them from time to time as may be authorized and directed by the Commission. The stakes and marks given by the Engineer shall be carefully preserved by the Contractor, who shall give to the Engineer all necessary assistance and facilities for establishing benches and plugs and for making measurements.

Notice, How Given.

Section No. 37. When the Contractor is absent from any part of the work where it may be necessary to give instructions, orders will be given by the Engineer to, and shall be received and promptly obeyed by the superintendent or overseer of the Contractor, who may have charge of the particular work in relation to which the orders are given, and a confirmation in writing of such orders will be given to the Contractor by the Engineer if so requested.

Imperfect Work.

Section No. 38. Any imperfect construction which may be discovered before the final acceptance of the work, shall be corrected immediately on the requirement of the Engineer and at the Contractor's expense, notwithstanding that it may have been overlooked by the proper inspector.

Damaged Work to Be Replaced.

Section No. 39. All work of whatever kind which during its progress and before its final acceptance shall become damaged from any cause shall be broken up or removed and be replaced by good and sound work at the Contractor's expense.

Condemned Materials to be Removed.

Section No. 40. If any material brought on the ground for use in the work or selected for the same shall be condemned by the Engineer as unsuitable or not in conformity with the specifications, the Contractor shall forthwith remove such materials as may be directed by the Engineer.

Competent Men.

Section No. 41. The Contractor shall employ only competent, skillful and faithful men to do the work. Whenever the Engineer shall notify the Contractor in writing that in his opinion any man on the work is incompetent, unfaithful or disorderly, such man shall be discharged from the work and shall not again be employed on it.

3.

General Manner of Prosecution and Maintenance of Traffic.

Access to Buildings, Etc.

Section No. 42. No building shall, without the consent of the occupant, and after notice to the Engineer, be deprived of means of access thereto, and, where necessary, suitable means shall be provided, at the Contractor's expense, to permit owners and occupants to reach their premises. Where necessary, proper and easy means for passengers to reach or leave street cars shall be maintained.

Contiguous Contract Sections.

Section No. 43. On the division line of contiguous contract sections, the Engineer will decide any matters in the details of construction within a limit of twenty feet on either side of the line where the work of contractors may be in conflict, and direct which of the contractors shall complete the details of construction within such limits.

Conduct of Work.

Section No. 44. Generally the Contractor will be permitted to conduct his work in the most expeditious manner possible, having due regard for the safety of persons and property and facilities for traffic and under such instructions as the Engineer may give from time to time.

Facilities for Travel.

Section No. 45. All necessary facilities are to be furnished by the Contractor for the benefit of street travel, both on longitudinal and cross streets.

Close Observation of Above Requirements.

Section No. 46. The Commission will insist upon the close observance of the above requirement, and no departure therefrom will be allowed, excepting upon the written permission of the Commission.

4.

Street Railroad Tracks, Mains and Other Surface, Subsurface and Overhead Structures.

Notice to be Given.

Section No. 47. Notice is to be given by the Contractor to all individuals, companies and the proper City officials, owning or having charge of surface, subsurface or overhead structures along any part of the work, of his intention to commence operations along such part of the route, at least one (1) week in advance, and the Contractor shall file with the Engineer at the same time a copy of said notice; and he shall co-operate with the proper parties, officers or officials in charge of such structures and shall furnish them with all reasonable facilities to inspect the methods of caring for their property.

Plans Furnished.

Section No. 48. In the rearrangement of surface, subsurface or overhead structures requiring removal and relaying or reconstruction due to interference with the railroad structure a tentative plan will be made by the Engineer, which will be sub-

mitted to the parties interested; if any reasonable changes are then requested by any of the said parties within ten (10) days after the submission of the tentative plans, such changes will then be made, if in the judgment of the Engineer they will best conserve the interest of all parties concerned; a further plan will then be made which, on the approval of the Engineer, will be final.

Reconstruction or Relaying, Etc.

Section No. 49. Whenever it becomes necessary to cut, move, change, or reconstruct any surface, subsurface or overhead structures, or connections therewith (as more particularly enumerated in Article X), such work shall be done in accordance with the standard specifications and reasonable requirements of the several owners or of the Borough President or Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity or other officer or local authority having the care of and the jurisdiction or control over such structures, except as elsewhere herein specifically provided.

Reasonable Dispatch.

Section No. 50. All work of reconstruction or alteration shall be done with reasonable dispatch, and facilities are to be provided so that said work will interfere as little as possible with the practical working and use of such structures.

Maintenance, Support, etc.

Section No. 51. The Contractor shall at all times, by suitable bridging or other supports, maintain and support in an entirely safe condition for the usual service and to the reasonable satisfaction of the owners, all surface, subsurface and overhead structures and appurtenances encountered or affected during the prosecution of his work. All surface, subsurface and overhead structures and appurtenances, and all surfaces of whatever character along the line of the work shall be protected from injury, but should any injury occur the Contractor shall fully restore such surface, subsurface or overhead structures and appurtenances or surfaces to as good a condition as existed before the injury was done. All the above, including also all changes of surface, subsurface or overhead structures and appurtenances made by the Contractor for his own convenience in executing his work shall be done at the Contractor's own expense.

Necessary Permanent Pipe Changes.

Section No. 52. Payment for all changes of surface, subsurface or overhead structures and appurtenances, including all work, labor or material incidental thereto, made necessary because of physical interference with the Railroad structure and requiring their removal, relaying or reconstruction in other than their original positions, is included: In the cases of surface and overhead structures, in the price stipulated in the Schedule for riveted steel. Item 19; in case of subsurface structures, in the prices stipulated in the Schedule for Column Excavation and Railroad Duct Excavation, Items 1-B and 1-C; except as otherwise herein specifically provided.

In the design of the Railroad structure it is intended to avoid physical interference with surface, subsurface and overhead structures as far as it may be reasonably practicable to do so.

Maintenance of Surface Railroads.

Section No. 53. The Contractor shall maintain and support both temporarily and permanently, in a manner that will cause the minimum interference with traffic, and in a safe condition all street surface railroads, including ducts, cables and all other appurtenances of such railroads; he shall rebuild either in their original or in new locations all parts of such surface railroads, including ducts, cables and all other appurtenances of such railroads, whose reconstruction or rebuilding may be necessitated by the construction of the work; and he shall construct trolley-wire troughs or other insulating protection under the Railroad structure. Payment therefor will be at the rate specified in Schedule Item 75, which price will include the cost of all work, labor and material incidental thereto. The work of rebuilding tracks mentioned herein is not intended to include the movement of tracks laterally, but only such work as is incidental to the construction of the Railroad.

Trolley troughs and insulating protection shall be similar to such constructions under the elevated extensions of the existing Manhattan-Bronx Rapid Transit Railroad constructed under the contract of February 21, 1900, between the City and John B. McDonald in The Bronx on the Broadway and West Farms divisions.

Facilities to Be Given to Make Extensions.

Section No. 54. In the event of the owners or the City desiring to make any addition, alteration or extension to their structures, or do any work to or in connection with surface, subsurface or overhead structures owned by them, or it, or to lay any new structure in or across a street occupied by the Works at the time the work under this contract is in progress, the Contractor, by written permission, shall give said owners or the City all reasonable opportunity to perform such work; provided such work or alteration for the benefit solely of the owners of subsurface structures does not cause the Contractor any serious loss or delay, as shall be determined by the Commission. The written permission from the Contractor, with three prints of plans or sketches, or a description indicating the proposed work in detail, shall be submitted to and approved by the Engineer before any work shall be proceeded with under such written permission.

5.

EXCAVATION.

Width of Excavation.

Section No. 55. Special care must be taken to avoid damage wherever excavations are being made. The width of such excavations shall not exceed the width actually necessary, in the opinion of the Engineer, for the proper prosecution of the work. All excavations shall be of such dimensions, as shall be necessary, in the opinion of the Engineer, for the proper and expeditious progress of the work, and to permit the laying and readjusting of all sewers, mains, subways and other subsurface structures encountered.

Depth of Excavations.

Section No. 56. All excavations shall be excavated to such depth, both in soft ground and in rock, as may be necessary to permit the laying of such concrete bed or special foundation as shown on the plans or may be deemed necessary by the Engineer. But generally in the case of column foundations on ledge rock in place the surface of the rock shall be carefully cleaned of loose and rotten rock and roughly brought to a horizontal surface; except that where such rock is less than five (5) feet below the surface it shall be excavated to a depth of at least five (5) feet below the surface.

Sides to Be Secured.

Section No. 57. The sides of the excavations shall be secured against slips by suitable sheet piling or sheeting, held in place by braces, shores or walling timbers, special precautions being taken where there is additional pressure, due to the presence of buildings or other structures. Where a movement of the ground might cause the settlement of an adjacent building, the sheeting must be started, if near the building, before the elevation of the bottom of the foundation of the building is reached; if away from the building, at such depth of the excavation as the Engineer may permit; and the excavation must not be made in advance of or below the bottom of the sheeting.

Filling Back of Sheetings.

Section No. 58. Sheetings shall be driven wherever possible, but when it is placed against the sides of the excavation, the spaces or voids back of the sheeting must be immediately and carefully filled with suitable material to prevent as far as possible the natural ground back of the sheeting from moving.

Sheeting.

Section No. 59. No payment shall be made to the Contractor for sheeting left in the ground or in the work, unless the Engineer shall in writing require it to be left in, in which case payment shall be made to the Contractor for the sheeting so left in as measured by the Engineer, and at one-half the current market price for new material of the same grade, character and dimensions, and without any allowance or payment for placing the same or the expense thereof.

Timber for Temporary Purposes.

Section No. 60. All timber used for sheeting, shoring, bracing, decking or other temporary purposes, shall be sound and free from any defects that may impair its strength. It shall be provided, placed and removed at the Contractor's own cost and expense. All sheeting and timber used temporarily shall be put in place by skilled mechanics, keyed tight by wedges where necessary, and so arranged as to be withdrawn readily without endangering the adjoining soil.

Vaults of Abutting Property.

Section No. 61. The cost of the removal, where necessary, of all walls or other parts of vaults of abutting property that are within the ordered net lines of any excavation is included in such excavation as provided in Section No. 70, but the restoration of all such walls or other parts of vaults originally within the ordered net lines of such excavation will be paid for at the unit prices specified in the Schedule applicable to the several classes of work and material involved in such restoration.

The above is not to be construed, however, as applicable to any work beyond the ordered net lines of such excavation, which shall be done at the Contractor's own cost and expense.

Vaults Disturbed.

Section No. 62. Wherever vaults of abutting property are broken through or otherwise disturbed, the Contractor shall at his own cost and expense erect a six-inch hollow tile wall laid in Portland cement mortar, as a temporary partition, on or about the building line, or as directed, that will afford proper protection to the owner or occupant of the adjoining premises.

Blasting.

Section No. 63. Wherever rock or other material requiring blasting is encountered in any excavation, all necessary precautions must be exercised by the Contractor, as required by the ordinances of the City relative to blasting. Explosives shall be used only of such character and strength as may be permitted by the Commission, and the right is reserved for the Engineer to direct that in special cases ordinary blasting powder only, in small charges, shall be used. Blasting shall not be done between the hours of 11 P. M. and 7 A. M. without the express permission of the Engineer, and under such restrictions as he may impose.

Storage of Explosives.

Section No. 64. No larger quantity of explosives shall be kept on the line of the work than will be actually required for the twelve (12) hours of work next ensuing, and it shall be kept under lock, the key to which is to be only in the hands of the foreman or other equally trustworthy person. The amount of explosives kept in any one place shall not exceed the limit permitted by any ordinance of the City, or as may be determined by the Commission. Caps and exploders shall not be kept in the same place with dynamite and other explosives. During freezing weather, special precautions shall be taken as to the care and manipulation of dynamite.

Near Pipes and Mains.

Section No. 65. Whenever any pipe or main is encountered in or alongside of the excavation, right is reserved to direct that all rock within five (5) feet of the same shall be removed by means other than blasting.

Pumping.

Section No. 66. Whenever water is encountered in excavations, the same shall be removed by bailing or pumping, great care being taken when pumping that the surrounding particles of soil be not disturbed or removed. If necessary to prevent such disturbance, the pumping must be done by a series of driven wells whose points are protected by fine wire cloths, the rate of flow at each well being made so slow as not to remove the particles of soil; or the pumping must be done by other means approved by the Engineer. The delivery from all pumps shall be conducted into adjacent sewers, and the delivery pipes shall be so arranged as to be readily inspected at all times to ascertain if the water is free from particles of soil.

Carts to be Tight.

Section No. 67. All carts, buckets or other vehicles used by the Contractor for the removal of material, shall be tight and so arranged and so loaded as not to spill over. Whenever a cart, bucket or other vehicle so used is leaky or unsuitable, it shall be immediately withdrawn from the work on notification by the Engineer, or his duly qualified assistant, in charge of that portion of the work.

Removed Expeditiously.

Section No. 68. Excavated material shall be removed expeditiously and disposed of, in any place selected by the Contractor, subject to the ordinances and regulations of the City authorities governing the disposal of such material, and the regulations of the United States Government as to the disposal or dumping of material in and about or near the Harbor of New York.

When Excavated Material May be Taken by City.

Section No. 69. If at any time during the course of construction the City shall desire for city purposes any part of the material excavated, and the cost of such disposal shall not exceed the cost to the Contractor of the method in which he is then disposing of it, the Commission may order such material dumped or turned over to the City at a point designated without cost to the City.

Section No. 70. All excavations include the excavation of all materials of whatever nature encountered in the excavations, including earth above and below mean high water, ledge rock in place, boulders and other materials requiring blasting. Excavation shall be classified and paid for as either:

Column Excavation, Definition of.

Column Excavation, which includes all excavation for Railroad column foundations and for all subsurface structures required to be removed, relaid or reconstructed in other than their original locations or otherwise changed because of their physical interference with Railroad column foundations, or

Railroad Duct Excavation, Definition of.

Railroad Duct Excavation, which includes all excavation for Railroad ducts and Railroad duct manholes and their appurtenances and for all subsurface structures required to be removed, relaid or reconstructed in other than their original locations or otherwise changed because of their physical interference with Railroad ducts or Railroad duct manholes.

Ordered Net Lines of Excavation and Measurement.

Section No. 71. The ordered net lines of excavation and the measurements for payment therefor will be determined as follows:

(1) *Column foundations and duct manholes:* In excavation for Railroad column foundations and Railroad duct manholes the ordered net lines of excavation and the measurements therefor, except such portion as may be in rock, shall include the total excavation from the street surface to the bottom of the column foundation or the bottom of the duct manhole, within vertical planes one and one-half (1½) feet outside of the net outside lines of the bottom of such column foundation or duct manhole, as ordered or indicated on the plans.

In such portion of the excavation for Railroad column foundations and Railroad duct manholes as may be in rock the ordered net lines of excavation and the measurements therefor shall include the total excavation from the surface of the rock to the bottom of the column foundation or the bottom of the duct manhole, within vertical planes six (6) inches outside of the net outside lines of the bottom of such column foundation or duct manhole, as ordered or indicated on the plans.

(2) *Railroad ducts:* In excavation for Railroad ducts the ordered net lines of excavation and the measurements therefor shall include the total excavation from the street surface to the bottom of the duct structure within vertical planes passing through the net outside lines of such duct structure, as ordered or indicated on the plans.

(3) *Subsurface structures:* In excavation for subsurface structures required to be removed, relaid or reconstructed in other than their original locations or otherwise changed because of their physical interference with railroad column foundations or Railroad ducts or Railroad duct manholes the ordered net lines of excavation and the measurements therefor will be as follows:

(a) *Electric ducts and pipe conduits:* In excavation for electric ducts and pipe conduits, other than Railroad ducts, the ordered net lines of excavation and the measurements therefor shall include the total excavation from the street surface to the bottom of such ducts or pipe conduits within vertical planes passing through the net outside lines of such ducts or pipe conduits; provided, however, that if such ducts or pipe conduits shall consist of a single conduit or a group of conduits not enclosed in concrete, then the ordered net lines of excavation and the measurements therefor shall include the total excavation from the street surface to the extreme bottom of such single conduit or group of conduits within vertical planes one (1) foot outside the net outside lines of such single conduit or group of conduits.

(b) *Pipes:* In excavation for pipes the ordered net lines of excavation and the measurements therefor, except such portion as may be in rock, shall include the total excavation from the street surface to a depth of six (6) inches below the interior diameter of the pipe within a trench two (2) feet wider than the interior diameter of the pipe; provided, however, that where in the opinion of the Engineer the trench for laying pipes 30 inches or more in diameter is required to be close sheeted and the trench is so sheeted, the ordered net lines of excavation and the measurements therefor, except such portion as may be in rock, shall include the total excavation from the street surface to a depth of six (6) inches below the interior diameter of the pipe within a trench three (3) feet wider than the interior diameter of the pipe.

In such portion of the excavation for pipes as may be in rock the ordered net lines of excavation and the measurements therefor shall include the total excavation from the surface of the rock to a depth of eight (8) inches below the interior diameter of a 20-inch or smaller pipe and twelve (12) inches below the interior diameter of a pipe of larger diameter within a trench two (2) feet wider

than the interior diameter of the pipe. No allowance will be made for the removal of rock under the bells to give the required clearance.

(c) *Valve chambers and other structures.* In excavation for valve chambers and for valves, valve boxes and hydrants, the ordered net lines of excavation and the measurements therefor shall include the total excavation from the street surface to the lowest part of such valve chamber or other structure within vertical planes one (1) foot outside of the net outside lines of the bottom of such valve chamber or other structure.

(d) *Other subsurface structures.* For all other subsurface structures the ordered net lines of excavation will be as directed by the Engineer.

At the intersection of two trenches or at the intersection of a pipe or other trench with an excavation made by the Contractor under orders from the Engineer for any purpose whatsoever, the cubical contents of the intersection will be allowed only once. Under no circumstances will a double allowance be made for any excavation.

No deduction from the amount of excavation to be allowed as aforesaid will be made on account of vault space or spaces occupied by pipes or other subsurface structures.

No Allowance Outside of Ordered Net Lines.

Section No. 72. There will be no measurement or allowance made nor money paid for excavation outside (in plain or depth) the ordered net lines of excavation as indicated in Section No. 71; and no allowance shall be made for any excess excavation caused by slips or slides. It is understood and agreed that the Contractor has estimated and allowed for all such matters in Schedule Items 1-B and 1-C.

Payment for Excavation.

Section No. 73. Column Excavation shall be paid for at the price stipulated in Schedule Item 1-B; Railroad Duct Excavation at the price stipulated in Schedule Item 1-C.

Prices for Excavation to Include.

Section No. 74. The prices herein stipulated for Column Excavation and Railroad Duct Excavation, Schedule Items 1-B and 1-C respectively, are to include the cost of excavating, of the disposal of the materials excavated, of backfilling, of all sheeting and bracing, of maintaining and supporting of openings during and after excavation, of all pumping or bailing, and of the maintenance, support, removal, reconstruction, with all incidental work, labor and material, etc., of all subsurface structures and surfaces of whatever nature and their appurtenances, payment for which is not herein elsewhere specifically provided for.

BACKFILLING.

Quality of Material; How Placed.

Section No. 75. Wherever necessary, excavations shall be backfilled with sand, gravel or other good clean earth, free from perishable material and from stones exceeding six (6) inches in diameter, and not containing in any place a proportion of stone of or below that size exceeding one (1) part of stone to five (5) parts of earth. The filling shall be compacted by flooding with water or, in cases where flooding with water is not practicable it shall be compacted by ramming in layers, not exceeding six (6) inches in depth.

Subsurface Structures—Frozen Material Not Permitted.

Section No. 76. Whenever pipes, sewers, or other subsurface structures are met with, the filling must be carefully packed, rammed and tamped under and about such subsurface structures, using special tools for the purpose. No filling of trenches with frozen earth will in any case be permitted, nor will any filling be permitted over frozen material.

Sheeting Removed.

Section No. 77. As fast as the work of filling permits, sheeting and other timber supporting the sides of the excavation shall be carefully withdrawn, or if directed by the Engineer, shall be left in place, and the spaces left by the removal of such material carefully backfilled.

How Paid For.

Section No. 78. The cost of backfilling is to be included in the prices paid for Column Excavation and Railroad Duct Excavation, Schedule Items 1-B and 1-C respectively.

7

PILING AND TIMBERING.

Character of Piles.

Section No. 79. If in the judgment of the Engineer the ground is of such a character as to require piling, the Contractor shall drive such piles as the Engineer directs. The piles shall be of good, sound pine or spruce, or other acceptable timber, straight and free from shakes; they shall be not less than twelve (12) inches in diameter at the butt end, or less than six (6) inches in diameter at the point, and shall be driven to the satisfaction of the Engineer and by means of a steam hammer driver if so required by him. If necessary the points of the piles shall be protected by proper shoes, and the butts by rings or caps. Piles shall not be spliced unless permitted by the Engineer, and then in such manner as he directs. Piles shall be carefully cut off to the grade given by the Engineer.

Piles Driven in Required Location.

Section No. 80. Piles shall be driven in the position and manner and to the depth ordered; if driven in a wrong position or injured in any way by driving they must be withdrawn and replaced by others. After being driven they shall be cut off to a true plane for proper adjustment with capping timber or masonry.

Payment for Timber Piles.

Section No. 81. The price herein stipulated to be paid, per lineal foot of timber piles, Schedule Item 12, is to cover the cost of furnishing, driving and preparing the piles ready for the capping timbers or masonry, including all work, labor and material in connection therewith, and the portion cut off and removed will not be included in the length measured for payment. No test piles, guide piles, or piles other than those that are a part of the finished foundation and are included within the net width of the finished foundation will be paid for.

Concrete Piles.

Section No. 82. If in the judgment of the Engineer special conditions so require, piles of re-inforced concrete of an approved form of construction shall be used.

Payment for Piles Other Than Timber Piles.

Section No. 83. Payment for piles other than timber piles will be as provided in Article XII of the contract.

Grillage.

Section No. 84. Timber grillage foundations shall be built if so directed by the Engineer.

Foundation Timber.

Section No. 85. All foundation timber shall be of pine or spruce, or other timber permitted by the Engineer, sound and free from shakes. It shall be of such dimensions, and laid in such manner, as the special plans to be issued shall require, and held in place by spikes or good seasoned oak or locust treenails.

Foundation Timber, Measurement and Payment.

Section No. 86. No wastage is to be allowed for, and the estimate of the quantities of foundation timber used will be based on the amount ordered by the Engineer and placed according to his directions. Payment for foundation timber, including all work, labor and material in connection therewith, will be as provided in Schedule Item 13.

8.

CEMENT.

Portland Cement.

Section No. 87. All cement used in the work shall be true Portland cement, by which is meant the finely pulverized product, resulting from the calcination to incipient fusion of a properly proportioned intimate mixture of argillaceous and calcareous earths or rocks to which no addition greater than three (3) per cent. has been made subsequent to calcination.

Brand to be Approved.

Section No. 88. Before any cement is furnished, the brand shall receive the approval of the Engineer. Cement, to be acceptable, shall be of a well-known brand which has been in successful use for large engineering works in America for at least five (5) years, and which has an established reputation for uniform character. Preference will be given to cements which, by their records, show a tendency to maintain high strength of mortar with increased age.

Inspection.

Section No. 89. Cement shall be subject to inspection at the place of manufacture or on the work, and to such tests as may be ordered by the Engineer. The Engineer or his representatives shall have access at all times and places to inspect the methods of manufacture, storage and protection, and shall have liberty to inspect the daily laboratory records of tests and analyses at the cement works.

Tests.

Section No. 90. In general, tests will conform to the methods recommended by the Committee on Uniform Tests of Cement of the American Society of Civil Engineers. Unless otherwise directed, samples will be taken at the place of manufacture by a representative of the Engineer, and sent to the Commission's laboratory, where the tests will be made. If required, tests will be made on the individual samples, without intermixing.

Specific Gravity and Color.

Section No. 91. The cement shall have a specific gravity of not less than 3.10 nor more than 3.25 after being thoroughly dried at a temperature of 212 degrees Fahr. The color shall be uniform, bluish gray, free from yellow or brown particles.

Chemical Analysis.

Section No. 92. Chemical analyses of cement made from time to time shall show a reasonably uniform composition. Cement shall not contain more than 1.75 per cent. of sulphuric anhydride (SO_3) nor more than 4 per cent. of magnesia (MgO).

Fineness.

Section No. 93. The fineness of the cement shall be such that it shall leave by weight a residue of not more than eight (8) per cent. on a No. 100, and not more than twenty-five (25) per cent. on a No. 200 sieve; the wires of the sieves being respectively 0.0045 and 0.0024 inch in diameter.

Time of Setting.

Section No. 94. It shall not develop initial set in less than thirty (30) minutes unless a more quickly-setting cement is specifically required, and shall develop hard set in not less than one (1) hour nor more than ten (10) hours.

Soundness.

Section No. 95. Pats of neat cement, after remaining one (1) day in moist air, shall be kept in air or water of normal temperature for at least twenty-eight (28) days, or shall be exposed to an atmosphere of steam, above boiling water, in a loosely closed vessel for at least five (5) hours; and the separate parts under any of these conditions, shall remain hard without any indications of checking, cracking, distortion, disintegration or blotching.

Tensile Strength.

Section No. 96. Neat cement briquettes shall have at the end of one (1) day in moist air a breaking strength, per square inch of sectional area, of not less than one hundred and fifty (150) pounds; at the end of seven (7) days—one (1) day in air, six (6) days in water—or not less than five hundred (500) pounds; at the end of twenty-eight (28) days—one (1) day in air, twenty-seven (27) days in water—or not less than six hundred (600) pounds. The strength at twenty-eight (28) days shall not be less than that at seven (7) days.

Mortar Briquettes.

Mortar briquettes, composed of one (1) part of cement and three (3) parts of standard Ottawa sand, by weight, shall have at the end of seven (7) days—one (1) day in air, six (6) days in water—a breaking strength, per square inch of sectional area, of not less than two hundred (200) pounds; and at the end of twenty-eight (28) days—one (1) day in air, twenty-seven (27) days in water—or not less than three hundred (300) pounds. The strength at twenty-eight (28) days shall show an increase of not less than fifty (50) pounds over the strength at seven (7) days.

Long-time Tests.

Section No. 97. Tests will be made from time to time extending over longer periods than twenty-eight (28) days. If such tests show a tendency to unsoundness or unusual reduction in strength with increased age, the Engineer shall have the right to prohibit the further use of that brand and to require that another brand be substituted.

Storage During Tests.

Section No. 98. All cement shall be held in storage to allow ample time for tests to be made before the cement is required for use in the work.

How Contained.

Section No. 99. Cement shall be packed and delivered in canvas sacks or other strong, well-made packages, plainly marked with the manufacturer's brand, and sealed in an approved manner. The weights of such packages shall be uniform.

Methods of Storing.

Section No. 100. The Contractor shall at all times keep in store on the work, or at some point convenient thereto, a sufficient supply of cement, so as to guard against possible shortage. It shall be stored in a weather-tight building, with a tight floor a proper distance above the ground, and with sufficient floor space to admit of storing each lot of cement separately, so as to facilitate identification of each individual lot in case of necessity for further tests or rejection. Cement that has become partially set or otherwise damaged shall not be used.

9.

MORTAR.

Cement and Sand—Mixing.

Section No. 101. All mortar shall be prepared from accepted cement and clean, sharp sand, approved by the Engineer. These ingredients shall be thoroughly mixed dry in the proportions as specified below; water shall then be added, so as to produce a stiff paste. Water used in mortar, grout or concrete must be clean, fresh water, no salt water being permitted. The mortar shall be freshly mixed for the work on hand, in proper boxes made for that purpose, and no mortar shall be used that has stood beyond such limit of time as may be determined by the Engineer.

How Measured.

Section No. 102. For purposes of mixture, three hundred and seventy-five (375) pounds of Portland cement shall be estimated at three and one-half (3½) cubic feet of volume. The proportional parts of sand and stone or gravel shall be by volume as cast into the measuring box. The proportions for brick masonry shall be one (1) part cement to two (2) parts sand; for pointing, one (1) part cement and one (1) part sand; for concrete masonry, as specified under the head of concrete; and for other classes of work, as directed by the Engineer.

10.

MASONRY.

Laid in Portland Cement.

Section No. 103. All masonry, except as otherwise specified, shall be laid in Portland cement mortar, and shall be built of the forms and dimensions shown on the plans, or as directed by the Engineer from time to time; and the system of joining or bonding ordered by the Engineer shall be strictly followed.

Water Not to Interfere With.

Section No. 104. Care must be taken that no water shall interfere with the proper laying of masonry in any of its parts.

Freezing Weather.

Section No. 105. During freezing weather such masonry only shall be built whose construction, in the judgment of the Engineer, can not be postponed, except at the cost of delaying the work. The Contractor shall provide such appliances as are necessary for heating the water and the materials used in the masonry according to the specific instructions of the Engineer.

Protected in Freezing Weather.

Section No. 106. During freezing weather all masonry shall be protected by a suitable covering of salt hay, canvas, tarpaulin or by such material or in such ways as may be necessary to insure it against freezing.

Hot Weather.

Section No. 107. During hot weather all masonry, especially concrete, shall be kept wet by sprinkling and properly covered until it has become thoroughly set and hardened.

Pointing.

Section No. 108. Unless otherwise permitted, every joint that is to be pointed shall be raked out, within two days after being laid, to a depth of at least two inches.

Mortar for Pointing.

Section No. 109. Pointing of the face joints of masonry shall be thoroughly made with cement mortar mixed in the proportion of one (1) part of cement to one (1) part of sand, except where otherwise specially provided.

When Pointing Permitted.

Section No. 110. No pointing shall be done in freezing weather, and masonry laid between December 1 and April 1 shall not be pointed until permitted by the Engineer.

Defective Masonry.

Section No. 111. Any masonry which is found to be defective from any cause whatsoever, before the final completion and acceptance of the work, must be removed and properly rebuilt, or if damaged during such time must be properly repaired.

11.

CONCRETE.
How Composed.

Section No. 112. The concrete shall be composed of gravel or broken stone, or a mixture of both, free from all dust and dirt, and mixed together with the proportion of mortar specified below.

Sand.

Section No. 113. Sand for concrete shall be of the kind herein specified for mortar.

Stone.

Section No. 114. Stone for concrete shall be sound, clean gravel, or sound hard, broken limestone, or trap rock, or a mixture of such gravel and broken stone may be used.

Sizes of Stone.

Section No. 115. Broken stone or gravel for concrete shall be graded from fine to coarse, and that which is all of one size, or practically so, shall not be used. It shall be screened or washed so as to remove all dust, and it shall contain no pieces that will pass through a hole three-eighths ($\frac{3}{8}$) inch in diameter, and no pieces that will not pass through a hole one and one-half ($1\frac{1}{2}$) inches in diameter. Broken stone or gravel for concrete, graded as above, but between three-eighths ($\frac{3}{8}$) and three-fourths ($\frac{3}{4}$) inch in diameter, may be required and used in special parts of the work.

Rubble Concrete.

Section No. 116. In concrete where the thickness is thirty (30) inches or more, if permitted by the Engineer, the Contractor may imbed in the same, pieces of clean, sound stone whose greatest diameter does not exceed twelve (12) inches and whose least diameter or thickness is not less than three-quarters ($\frac{3}{4}$) of the greatest diameter. These stones shall be set by hand in the concrete as the layers are being rammed, and so placed that each stone is completely and perfectly imbedded. No two (2) stones shall be within six (6) inches of each other and no stones within four (4) inches of an exposed face, nor shall any such stone be placed nearer than six (6) inches to any metal built in the concrete for reinforcing the same.

Proportions.

Section No. 117. The proportions of cement, sand and stone (or gravel) used in making concrete shall be one (1) part of cement, two (2) parts of sand and four (4) parts of stone.

Mixing By Machine.

Section No. 118. Whenever practicable, concrete shall be machine mixed. A rotary machine of a pattern approved by the Engineer, and mixing only one batch at a time, shall be used.

Mixing By Hand.

Section No. 119. When concrete is mixed by hand the stone or gravel shall be spread on a platform in a bed about six (6) inches thick, and shall be thoroughly wet. Sand shall be spread on a platform and the requisite portion of cement spread on the sand. After thoroughly mixing the latter, the dry mixture thus formed shall be spread evenly over the bed of stone wet as above, and the whole turned over until thoroughly mixed, but not less than two (2) turnings on the mixing board shall be allowed in any case, water being added as necessary. Care shall be taken to keep the bed of concrete wet and avoid piling.

How Laid.

Section No. 120. Concrete shall be placed immediately after mixing in layers of such thickness as may be directed by the Engineer, and shall be thoroughly compacted throughout the mass by ramming or spading, special tamping bars or tools being used as approved by the Engineer. The amount of water used in making the concrete shall be as approved by the Engineer. If a small amount of water has been used in mixing, ramming shall be continued until the water flushes to the surface; as a rule, however, concrete shall be placed wet.

Time for Hardening.

Section No. 121. Concrete shall be allowed to set for twelve (12) hours, or more, if so directed, before any work shall be laid upon it; and no walking over or working upon it shall be allowed while it is setting. Concrete shall not be flooded with water before being thoroughly set.

Rock Surface be Cleaned.

Section No. 122. Before laying concrete on rock surfaces the latter shall be carefully cleaned of loose and rotten rock and roughly brought to a horizontal surface, and when laid on earth the earth shall be rammed as directed before placing the concrete.

Surface Rough for Bonding.

Section No. 123. Wherever a section of concrete is necessarily left unfinished, leaving a surface which will be hard set before additional concrete can be laid, care shall be taken to flush the cement to such surface, and such dovetails or grooves shall be formed as may be necessary to insure a good bond with the new work; and if deemed necessary by the Engineer, the joints shall be reinforced with steel bars or dowels, to be furnished by the Contractor.

Joints Cleaned.

Section No. 124. In all cases of joints of old with new work the old surfaces shall be thoroughly cleaned and wet, and a coating of mortar or cement shall be applied, if required, before placing the concrete.

Forms.

Section No. 125. Suitable forms shall be provided by the Contractor to support the concrete while being placed. These forms shall be immediately replaced by new ones as soon as they commence to lose their proper shape. The forms shall be made of wood or metal.

Section No. 126. The forms if made of wood, shall be made of boards with tight joints, tongued and grooved, if required by the Engineer.

Forms, How Set; Defective Work Replaced.

Section No. 127. The forms shall be set true to line, firmly secured, and be so tight as not to allow water in the mortar to escape. On the removal of the forms if there are voids such as to indicate an excessive loss of mortar, portions of the concrete shall be cut out to the fullness of such defects and the space refilled with a rich concrete or mortar in such proportions and in such manner as the Engineer may direct.

Section No. 128. Where reinforcement steel is used, efficient means shall be provided to maintain it in the exact position it is to occupy in the completed work, and to prevent it from becoming dislodged, or moved in any manner, when concrete is placed.

Concrete, How Measured and Paid For.

Section No. 129. Concrete masonry shall be measured in place in the work to the prescribed net lines ordered by the Engineer and shall be paid for at the prices in Schedule Item 6; which price is to include the cost of all scaffolding, centers, forms, etc., and removing the same, and all work, labor and material incidental thereto.

Backing or Filling Concrete, Not Paid For.

Section No. 130. No concrete backing or filling outside of the ordered net lines of the structure will be paid for.

12

BRICK MASONRY.

Quality.

Section No. 131. Bricks for masonry shall be of the best quality common bricks, burned hard entirely through, regular and uniform in shape and size and of compact texture.

How Laid.

Section No. 132. All brick masonry shall be laid in mortar of the quality above described, except that in exposed locations coloring matter may be added, if required by the Engineer. The bricks shall be laid to line with joints in the face work not exceeding one-quarter ($\frac{1}{4}$) of an inch in the beds, and three-eighths ($\frac{3}{8}$) of an inch on ends; the bricks to be thoroughly wet before laying and to be completely embedded in mortar under the bottom and on the sides and ends at one operation, care being taken to have every joint full of mortar.

All exterior surfaces shall be smooth and regular.

Cleaned.

Section No. 133. The inside faces of all arches and other exposed parts shall have all the mortar scraped off and washed clean immediately after the centers have been struck, and shall be pointed and left in neat condition.

No "Bats" or Culls.

Section No. 134. All bricks of whatever nature shall be carefully culled and if necessary gauged before laying, at the expense of the Contractor. No "bats" shall be used except in large masses of brickwork, where a moderate proportion, to be determined by the Engineer, may be used, but nothing smaller than half bricks.

Racked or Toothed.

Section No. 135. All unfinished work shall be racked back or toothed, as directed by the Engineer, and before new work is joined to it the faces of the brick in the old work must be scraped entirely clean, scrubbed with a stiff brush and be well moistened.

Measurements and Payments.

Section No. 136. Brick masonry shall be measured to the lines indicated and shown on the plans and as ordered by the Engineer and shall be paid for as herein stipulated in Schedule Item 9, for common brick masonry. This price is to include the cost of all scaffolding, forms, centers, etc., and the removal of the same, of all plastering and pointing, and of all other work, labor and material incidental thereto.

13.

Steel and Iron.

Open Hearth Process.

Section No. 137. Steel shall be made by the open hearth process.

Chemical and Physical Properties.

Section No. 138. The chemical and physical properties of finished material shall conform to the following limits:

Yield Point.

Section No. 139. The yield point shall be that strain, beyond which the elongation ceases to be proportional to the weight imposed, and may be indicated by drop of beam. The speed of testing shall be governed by the Inspector.

Ductility Elongation.

Section No. 140. In determining the ductility, the elongation shall be measured after breaking on an original length as specified, in which length shall occur the curve of reduction each side of the point of fracture.

Chemical Determination.

Section No. 141. Chemical determinations of the percentages of carbon, phosphorus, sulphur and manganese shall be made by the manufacturer from a test ingot, so taken, during the casting of each melt of steel as to fairly represent the melt. Two copies of such analyses shall be furnished to the Engineer or his Inspector.

Test Pieces.

Section No. 142. Sample pieces for tensile and bending tests of plates, shapes and bars shall be cut from such portions of the finished product of each melt as the inspector may designate, and shall be stamped by him; they shall have both faces rolled and both edges milled to the usual form of a standard test specimen,—one and one-half ($1\frac{1}{2}$) inches wide on a gauged length of nine (9) inches,—or with both edges parallel. The area of the minimum section shall not be less than one-half ($\frac{1}{2}$) square inch.

Rivet Rods.

Section No. 143. Rivet rods shall be tested as rolled.

Where Taken From.

Section No. 144. For rollers and pins the specimens shall be cut from the finished bar so that the center of the specimen shall be one inch from the outside of the bar.

Steel Castings.

Section No. 145. For steel castings the test piece shall be turned to a uniform minimum section of one-half ($\frac{1}{2}$) inch diameter, for a length of at least two and one-half ($2\frac{1}{2}$) inches. Specimens for bending shall be one (1) inch by one-half ($\frac{1}{2}$) inch in section.

Treatment of Test Specimens.

Section No. 146. For steel castings the number of tests will depend on the character and importance of the castings. Specimens shall be cut cold from coupons molded and cast on some portion of one or more castings from each melt. The coupons shall be annealed with the castings before being cut off.

Rolled steel shall be tested in the condition in which it comes from the rolls.

Number of Tests.

Section No. 147. At least one tensile and one bending test shall be made from each melt of steel as rolled. In case steel differing three-eighths ($\frac{3}{8}$) inch or more in thickness is rolled from one melt, a test shall be made from the thickest and from the thinnest material rolled.

Duplicate Tests.

Section No. 148. If the above tests do not fulfil the requirements of these specifications, duplicate tests may be made at the discretion of the inspector, he selecting and stamping the duplicate test pieces. If these retests meet all the requirements, the melt shall be accepted.

Angles.

Section No. 149. Angles three-quarters ($\frac{3}{4}$) of an inch and less in thickness shall open flat, and angles one-half ($\frac{1}{2}$) of an inch and less in thickness shall bend shut, cold, under blows of a hammer, without signs of fracture. This test shall be only made when required by the inspector.

Rivet Steel.

Section No. 150. Rivet steel, when nicked and bent around a bar of the same diameter as the rivet rod, shall give a gradual break and a fine, silky, uniform fracture.

Discard.

Section No. 151. Sufficient discard shall be made to insure sound material free from piping or excessive segregation. The material shall be finished straight and smooth, and shall be free from all seams, flaws, cracks, defective edges or other defects. Any imperfection which may develop during the progress of the work will be sufficient cause for rejection.

Material Marked.

Section No. 152. Each finished piece of steel shall be marked with the melt number, excepting that the bars for reinforcing concrete shall be bundled and the melt number stamped on a metal tag attached to each bundle.

Variation in Weight.

Section No. 153. A variation in weight of any piece of steel of two and one-half per centum ($2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent.) from that specified shall be sufficient cause for rejection, except in case of sheared plates exceeding one hundred (100) inches in width, where the variation may be five (5) per centum.

Rejections.

Section No. 154. Material which, subsequent to the above tests at the mills and its acceptance there, develops weak spots, brittleness, cracks or other imperfections, or is found to have injurious defects, will be rejected at the shop and shall be replaced by the manufacturer at his own cost.

Mill Orders.

Section No. 155. The Engineer shall be furnished copies in triplicate of all mill orders, and no material shall be rolled nor work done before the Engineer has been notified so that he may arrange for the inspection.

Test Pieces.

Section No. 156. The Contractor shall furnish, without extra charge, such standard test pieces, as may be necessary to determine the uniform quality of the material and also the use of a reliable testing machine, with the necessary labor for testing.

Wrought Iron.

Section No. 157. All wrought iron shall be double rolled, tough, fibrous and uniform in character. It shall be thoroughly welded in rolling and be free from surface defects.

Method of Testing.

Section No. 158. The methods specified for testing rolled steel shall apply generally to wrought iron. Standard test specimens shall show an ultimate strength of at least fifty thousand (50,000) pounds per square inch, and an elongation of at least eighteen (18) per centum in eight (8) inches, with fracture wholly fibrous. Specimens shall bend cold with the fibre, through one hundred and thirty-five (135) degrees, without sign of fracture, with inner radius not to exceed the thickness of

the piece tested. When nicked and bent the fracture shall show at least ninety (90) per centum fibrous.

Cast Iron.

Chemical Requirements. Section No. 159. Cast iron shall be tough gray iron made by the Cupola process and shall contain not more than 0.6 per centum of phosphorus and not more than 0.12 per centum of sulphur. No mill cinder iron, white or burnt iron or scrap of any kind will be permitted in the composition.

Test Bar.

Section No. 160. The quality of the iron entering into castings shall be determined by means of the "Arbitration Bar." This is a bar $1\frac{1}{4}$ inches in diameter and 15 inches long, cast under the same circumstances as those which attended the casting of the full-sized piece. This bar shall sustain at the center, when resting upon two dull knife edges twelve (12) inches apart, a load of three thousand (3000) pounds with a deflection of at least one-tenth ($1/10$) of an inch before rupture.

Number of Test Bars.

Two (2) sets of two (2) bars shall be cast from each heat; one set from the first and the other set from the last iron entering into the castings. Each set of two bars is to be made in a single mold.

True to Pattern.

Section No. 161. Castings must be sound, true to pattern, free from cracks, flaws, excessive shrinkage, and have smooth clean surfaces. They must be neatly chiseled and wirebrushed before leaving the foundry. Castings which do not accurately conform to dimensions on the plans will be rejected. Each casting shall have its distinguishing letter or number cast on at the place indicated on the plans.

WORKMANSHIP.

Quality.

Section No. 162. All workmanship shall be first class. All parts exposed to view shall be neatly finished. All nuts exposed to view on the final structure shall be hexagonal. Shearing and chipping shall be neatly and accurately done and all portions of the work, exposed to view, neatly finished. Lattice bars shall have neatly rounded ends concentric with the rivet holes.

Material Straightened in Shop.

Section No. 163. All material shall be straightened in the shop before being worked in any way.

Size of Rivets.

Section No. 164. The size of rivets called for on plans shall be understood to mean the actual size of the cold rivet before heating.

Rivet Holes Accurately Spaced.

Section No. 165. All holes shall be accurately spaced and punched. The diameter of the punch shall not be more than one-sixteenth ($1/16$) inch greater than the diameter of the rivet. The diameter of the die shall be as small as may be required to punch a clean hole.

Punching.

Section No. 166. Punching shall be accurately done. Drifting to enlarge unfair holes will not be allowed. If the holes must be enlarged to admit the rivet they shall be reamed. Poor matching of holes will be cause for rejection.

Sub-punching and Reaming.

Section No. 167. Where sub-punching and reaming are required, the punch used shall have a diameter not less than three-sixteenths ($3/16$) inch smaller than the rivet. Holes shall then be reamed to a diameter not more than one-sixteenth ($1/16$) inch larger than the nominal diameter of the rivet. All reaming shall be done with twist drills after the material is assembled and firmly bolted together. The use of lubricants in reaming is not allowed.

Drilling.

Section No. 168. All materials over seven-eighths ($7/8$) of an inch thick shall be drilled from the solid. Material over five-eighths ($5/8$) of an inch and not exceeding seven-eighths ($7/8$) of an inch in thickness shall be sub-punched and reamed.

Burrs Removed.

Section No. 169. All burrs shall be removed, and the members shall have all parts firmly drawn together with bolts before reaming or riveting is commenced.

Sheared Edges.

Section No. 170. Sheared edges of plates, exceeding five-eighths ($5/8$) of an inch in thickness in main members, shall be planed at least one-eighth ($1/8$) of an inch where called for on plans.

Assembling.

Section No. 171. Riveted members shall have all parts well pinned up and firmly drawn together with bolts, before riveting is commenced.

Riveting.

Section No. 172. Rivets when driven shall completely fill the holes, and shall be machine driven wherever possible. They shall have full concentric heads or they shall be countersunk when so required. Rivet heads shall not be flattened to less than half the diameter of the rivet on the line of the shank unless countersunk. Loose, burned or otherwise defective rivets shall be cut out and replaced. In cutting out defective rivets, great care shall be taken not to injure the adjacent material. If necessary they shall be drilled out.

Rivet Spacing.

Distances from center of rivet to edge of sheared plate shall not be less than $1\frac{1}{4}$ " for $\frac{3}{4}$ " rivets and $1\frac{3}{8}$ " for $\frac{5}{8}$ " rivets; distances from center of rivets to a rolled edge shall not be less than $1\frac{1}{8}$ " for $\frac{3}{4}$ " rivets and $1\frac{1}{4}$ " for $\frac{5}{8}$ " rivets. The minimum pitch for $\frac{3}{4}$ " rivets shall be $2\frac{1}{2}$ " and for $\frac{5}{8}$ " rivets $2\frac{1}{8}$ ". When material is sub-punched and reamed the pitch for $\frac{3}{4}$ " rivets may be made $2\frac{3}{4}$ " and for $\frac{5}{8}$ " rivets $2\frac{5}{8}$ ".

Use of Bolts.

Section No. 173. Generally the use of bolts instead of rivets will not be permitted, but when used in special cases the holes shall be reamed parallel, and the bolts turned to a driving fit, with the threads entirely outside of the holes.

Templates.

Section No. 174. All holes for field rivets where called for on plans shall be sub-punched and accurately drilled to an iron template, fitted with bushings, or reamed and match marked while the connecting parts are temporarily assembled in the shop. In case of splices of upper chords or other compression members, the abutting ends shall be brought to a forcible bearing.

Stiffeners—Splice Plates and Fillers.

Section No. 175. Stiffeners of plate girders shall be faced on the ends and brought to a true contact bearing with the flange angles. Web splice plates and fillers under stiffeners shall be cut to fit within one-eighth ($1/8$) of an inch of flange angles.

Finished Members.

Section No. 176. Finished members shall be true and free from kinks, twists or open joints. Ends of floor beams and stringers shall be finished square and true.

Web Plate Projections.

Section No. 177. Web plates must not project beyond the flange angles or be more than one-quarter ($1/4$) of an inch back of face of same.

Abutting Surfaces Faced.

Section No. 178. All abutting surfaces shall be neatly planed or faced perpendicular to the direction of the strain, so as to insure even bearings, except where otherwise noted on the plans.

Pins and Rollers.

Section No. 179. Pins and rollers shall be turned accurately to a gauge and shall be of full size throughout. All pin-holes shall be bored truly and at right angles to the axes of the members to be connected, and shall fit the pins with a play not exceeding one-thirty-second ($1/32$) of an inch for pins over 5" in diameter, and not exceeding one-fiftieth ($1/50$) of an inch for pins 5" and less in diameter. Anchor bolts and adjustable members over one (1) inch in diameter shall be of structural steel with cold-rolled threads; the threaded portion of such bolts, tested to destruction, shall develop a greater strength than the unthreaded portion.

Rods Upset.

Section No. 180. Rods and bars which are to receive a thread shall be properly upset. Where threads are cut on steel, they shall be properly filed.

Bed Plates Planed.

Section No. 181. Bed plates shall be planed. The bottom of the shoes shall be planed exactly parallel to the center line unless otherwise shown. The cutting of the planing tool shall be in the direction of expansion.

Annealing.

Section No. 182. Steel, except in minor details, which has been partially heated, shall be properly annealed. All steel castings shall be annealed.

Steel Castings True to Pattern.

Section No. 183. Steel castings shall be true to pattern and free from injurious imperfections.

Rods and Bars Deformed Sections.

Section No. 184. Rods and bars to be used for reinforcing concrete shall be deformed as approved by the Engineer; plain bars will not be used.

Bent Rods.

Section No. 185. Bent rods shall be bent uniformly to template in a machine or press approved by the Engineer. They may be bent either at the shop or on the work. In special cases bending hot and annealing may be required.

Details Boxed.

Section No. 186. Nuts, bolts, rivets and other similar material shall be boxed. Weight Marked.

Section No. 187. The weight shall be plainly marked upon every piece and box, upon it.

Inspection.

Section No. 188. Free access and information shall be given by the Contractor for a thorough inspection of material and workmanship, with proper office facilities.

Contractor Responsible.

Section No. 189. The Inspector shall make detailed reports of his inspection to the Engineer and may notify the Contractor of any defects in the material or workmanship, but all acceptances made by him shall be considered temporary, and his inspection shall in no way relieve the Contractor of full responsibility for the character and accuracy of the work until its completion and final acceptance by the Engineer.

Errors in Plans.

Section No. 190. The Contractor shall be responsible for all errors which can be discovered by checking or examining the plans.

Inspector's Office.

Section No. 191. The Contractor shall furnish for the use of the Inspector a suitably equipped office at the mills and at the shops.

Loading and Shipping.

Section No. 192. All parts shall be carefully loaded and protected from injuries during transportation by such means as will be satisfactory to the Inspector. After delivery of materials at the work the Contractor will be required to store the same on skids at least twelve (12) inches above the ground and to keep the same in good condition. Any piece showing injurious effects of rough handling at any stage until the final acceptance of the work may be rejected.

Payments for Steel.

Section No. 193. The prices to be paid for steel are as herein provided in *Schedule Items 19, 20 and 21*. These prices include the cost of material delivered and erected in the work, of all necessary cleaning and painting (where painting is required) and of all other incidental work, labor and material. The quantity of metals to be paid for shall be the number of pounds actually placed in accordance with the drawings or orders. The price for *Item 19* also is to include the cost of the maintenance, support, removal and reconstruction, with all incidental work, labor and material, etc., of all surface and overhead structures of whatever nature and their appurtenances, payment for which is not herein elsewhere specifically provided for.

Payments for Castings.

Section No. 194. For miscellaneous iron castings, such as column fenders, manhole heads and covers, gratings, straight pipes, etc., payment shall be made as provided in *Schedule Item 25-A*; for new cast-iron hub and spigot pipe, special castings, payment shall be made as provided in *Schedule Item 25-B*. These prices shall include the cost of the material delivered and erected in the work.

Under these Items payment will be made for such new castings as may have to be provided on account of changes, etc., made necessary because of physical interference with the Railroad, as more fully described in Section No. 52. This does not relieve the Contractor, however, of his obligation to preserve all castings that are in a good condition and can be reclaimed and used, in order to avoid the necessity whenever possible of providing new castings.

14.

Painting.

Painting.

Section No. 195. All metal work, excepting as otherwise herein provided, shall be painted with three (3) coats of paint, including the shop coat, of kind and quality approved by the Engineer. Lead or carbon paint will generally be required for the last two coats.

Shop Coat.

Section No. 196. All iron shall be scraped free from scale, and receive one coat of red lead paint as herein specified, before leaving the shop. All surfaces which come in contact or are enclosed shall be painted before being assembled. All turned or faced surfaces shall receive a coat of white lead and tallow before leaving the shop. If the Engineer so directs on members or parts of members buried in concrete the shop coat will be omitted.

Quality of Red Lead.

Section No. 197. The red lead shall be strictly pure, and shall contain at least eighty (80%) per centum of "true lead" (Pb, O_4). The color shall be a clean pure tint. The red lead shall be of the fineness that when washed with water through a No. 19 silk bolting cloth, not more than one (1%) per centum shall be left on the screen.

Quality of Linseed Oil.

Section No. 198. The linseed oil must be absolutely pure, fully aged and ripened, well settled oil. It shall be perfectly clear on receipt, and after heating to 212 degrees Fahr. on a current of hydrogen, shall not show a deposit of foots nor a loss of over 0.4 per centum for raw oil, nor over 0.2 per centum for boiled oil. The specific gravity at 60 degrees Fahr. for raw oil shall be between 0.932 and 0.937, and for boiled oil between 0.936 and 0.940.

Original Packages.

Section No. 199. All material shall be delivered, inspected and sampled in original packages.

Proportions in Mixture.

Section No. 204. Red lead paint shall be mixed in the proportion of 500 lbs. of red lead to five and one-half ($5\frac{1}{2}$) gallons of boiled linseed, and eleven (11) gallons of raw linseed oil.

Damaged Shop Coat to be Renewed.

Section No. 201. Where the shop coat has become damaged before or after erection, through any cause whatever, it shall be renewed with the same kind of paint as originally used, such renewal to be considered only as a part of the original shop coat.

Structural Steel and Rods.

Section No. 202. Structural steel and rods to be imbedded in concrete shall be protected from the weather before being put in place, and shall be cleaned and scales removed before being incased in the concrete. Rods shall not be painted.

Second Coat Carbon Paint.

Section No. 203. The second coat of paint shall be a carbon paint approved by the Engineer. It shall be applied after erection, but not until the metal has been cleaned from dirt or other objectionable matter that may be found thereon.

Metal to be Cleaned After Erection.

Section No. 204. After erection the metal shall be thoroughly cleaned of all dirt, rust or scales by stiff wire brushes or sand blasts, as directed, and afterward dusted and thoroughly and evenly painted as described above. No paint shall be applied until the cleaning has been passed upon by an Inspector.

Third Coat, When Applied.

Section No. 205. The third or finishing coat, which shall be a carbon paint of a color and quality approved by the Engineer, shall be applied to all exposed surfaces of the metal after its erection. It shall be applied at such time after such completion and before the final acceptance of the work as in the judgment of the Engineer may be advisable. The several field coats shall be sufficiently tinted to be distinctive.

Surfaces in Contact.

Section No. 206. Surfaces of exposed members inaccessible after erecting, shall be cleaned and painted before erecting.

Recesses, Etc.

Section No. 207. All recesses that might contain water, or through which water could enter, must be filled with thick paint or a waterproof cement of ground skins before receiving final painting.

Section No. 208. All surfaces so close together as to prevent the insertion of a brush, must be painted thoroughly by using a piece of cloth, if necessary.

Rainy or Freezing Weather.

Section No. 209. No painting in rainy or freezing weather or on wet surfaces will be permitted.

Payments.

Section No. 210. Payment for painting is included in the prices for steel and iron.

15

Ducts.

Vitrified Ducts—Quality and Size.

Section No. 211. The ducts to contain cables for transmitting electricity for the Railroad shall be manufactured of the best clay, thoroughly mixed, burnt and vitrified, sound in all respects, straight and free from soft spots, stones, cracks or blisters liable to impair their strength or durability; in lengths generally of from eighteen (18) to thirty-six (36) inches, shorter lengths shall only be used as directed; generally in four-way form with circular holes, the diameter to be such as to pass a mandrel three and one-half (3½) inches in diameter; one, two or three-way ducts shall be used in special cases as determined by the Engineer. The interior surface of the holes to be smooth and clear of warts, pits or blisters, which may tend to injure the electric cable in pulling the same through the duct. The ends to be cut smooth and at right angles to the axis of the duct and beveled on inside for three-quarters (¾) of an inch.

Thickness of Ducts.

Section No. 212. The outside walls and webs of four-way ducts to be three-quarters (¾) of an inch thick; the outside dimensions of ducts to be not less than nine and one-quarter (9¼) nor more than ten (10) inches, and constructed square on outer lines; the dimensions of single, two-way or three-way ducts shall be consistent with the above.

Ends Combed.

Section No. 213. The ends of ducts to be combed with two (2) sets of three (3) combings each, each combing to have a width of one-quarter (¼) of an inch and a depth of one-sixteenth (1/16) of an inch.

Glaze.

Section No. 214. The inside and outside of ducts to be thoroughly glazed in the most approved manner with good salt glaze.

Inspection.

Section No. 215. All ducts to be subject to inspection, both at the place of manufacture and on the work. All rejected ducts to be promptly removed by the Contractor at his expense.

How Laid.

Section No. 216. The ducts shall be laid in beds of cement mortar about one-quarter (¼) of an inch in thickness, with broken joints and with full bearing. Two (2) strips of thick unbleached muslin six (6) inches wide, and coated with neat cement mortar, shall be used to wrap each joint, the ends of the wrap to lap six (6) inches. The muslin shall be not less than 56 x 60 count, weight not less than four (4) ounces to the yard and width thirty-six (36) inches. In laying the ducts care must be taken to close abutting joints so that practically the ends of ducts shall be in contact on all sides. Where ducts are laid on curves, the wraps must be doubled if required, to protect the openings between the ends of the ducts on the outer line of the duct and to exclude all mortar from duct openings.

Mandrels.

Section No. 217. The ducts shall be laid with a linked mandrel of the length and diameter to be prescribed, the same accurately fitting the duct openings, the mandrel to be left in each duct until the next succeeding duct is laid.

Dowel Pins.

Section No. 218. The ducts shall be laid with dowel pins, at least two pins on the opposite sides horizontally.

Laid to Line.

Section No. 219. The ducts shall be so laid that the center of the holes shall be true to line and grade.

To Be Rodded.

Section No. 220. After the ducts are laid, and sufficient time is given to allow the mortar in beds to set, they shall be rodded; all mortar or other foreign matter must be cleaned from the duct openings, leaving a clear and smooth opening. If obstructions are found in rodding the ducts which cannot be removed by cleaners, so as to give a clear and smooth opening sufficient to pass a three and one-quarter (3¼) inch mandrel, the ducts shall be removed and relaid; all ducts, during the construction and after being rodded, shall be plugged with suitable plugs, to be furnished by the Contractor. If wooden plugs are used they shall be immersed in water for at least eight (8) hours before being put in place.

Measurement and Payment for Vitrified Railroad Ducts.

Section No. 221. Railroad ducts shall be paid for per duct foot in place at the price herein stipulated for Railroad ducts, *Schedule Item 18-A*, which price shall include the cost of furnishing, laying and rodding the ducts, of the concrete envelop and of all other material, including all work, labor and material incidental to the duct line construction as shown on the plans, except excavation and the restoration of the street surface, which will be paid for under *Schedule Items 1-C and 30(h)*; and except duct manholes. The ducts to be provided under *Schedule Item 18-A*, shall include only those intended solely for the purpose of the operation of the Railroad.

Duct Manholes.

Section No. 222. Generally the Railroad duct lines will be constructed near the curb side of the column foundations. But to escape existing subsurface structures they may be placed in other locations as ordered. Duct manholes shall be built as indicated on the plans or as directed by the Engineer. These manholes shall be generally at intervals of about four hundred (400) feet. They may vary in form as may be necessary to accommodate the work to local conditions. At manholes the ducts will be laid to conform to the special conditions. Duct manholes will be paid for in accordance with the various classes of work or material applicable thereto in the *Schedule* and at the prices stipulated therein for such classes of work or material.

Manhole Drain Pipes.

The four (4) inch drain pipes for the duct manholes shall be vitrified pipe of the best quality, thoroughly and perfectly burnt, without imperfections, well and smoothly glazed inside and outside and perfect in shape. It shall be paid for at the price stipulated in *Schedule Item 17(e)*, which price shall include all work, labor and material incidental to furnishing and laying the pipe in place, and including the proper connections with the sewers; except excavation and the restoration of the street surface.

16.

Surfaces Restored.

Pavement to Be Restored.

Section No. 223. As soon as the structure in any excavation or trench made within a street shall be completed and the trench back-filled, a temporary pavement shall be laid and maintained in a condition satisfactory to the Engineer; and after the earth shall have become, in the opinion of the Engineer, sufficiently settled, the Contractor shall proceed to restore the surface to a condition similar to, and equally as good as, that existing previous to the commencement of construction.

Other Sidewalks May Be Laid.

Section No. 224. Nothing contained in these specifications shall be understood or construed as prohibiting the Contractor from making any arrangement with any property owner to lay another style of sidewalk, or other surface covering within curb lines, in place of the sidewalk or other surface covering taken up; in which case the Contractor shall file with the Commission a copy of his contract with such property owner, duly acknowledged in writing by both parties.

In case any property owner desires to lay a sidewalk, or other surface covering within curb lines, affected by this contract, different from the one removed, and shall notify the Commission in writing that he has failed to make satisfactory arrangements for such work with the Contractor, then the Commission, in its discretion, may direct the Contractor to finish and dress off the filling over his work to such grade as the Engineer may select, and further direct him to remove from the area to be restored all material of whatever nature not required to be relaid, and to permit another contractor to lay such sidewalk or other surface covering; in which case the liability of the Contractor under this contract shall cease, as far as that part of his work is concerned, whenever the Engineer shall report to the Commission that the instructions of the Commission have been complied with, exactly the same as if the Contractor had fully completed the restoration as hereinbefore provided.

Payment for Street Surface Restored.

Section No. 225. Payment for all street surface restored of whatever character,

and work, labor and material incidental thereto, such as restoring manhole heads and covers, trees, etc. (except as included in Item 25-A), will be made as provided in *Schedule Item 30(h)*.

IV.

SECURITY TO BE FURNISHED BY CONTRACTOR.

Contractor's Bond.

Article XXVII. Simultaneously with the execution of this contract the Contractor shall give security for the performance of his obligation by filing with the Comptroller a bond in the form annexed hereto, entitled, "Form of Bond," executed by the Contractor and by two or more sureties to be corporations or persons approved by the Commission in the sum of Fifty thousand (\$50,000) dollars. In case any of the sureties upon the bond shall become insolvent or unable in the opinion of the Commission to pay promptly the amount of such bond to the extent to which such surety might be liable, then the Contractor within ten days after notice by the Commission to the Contractor shall, by supplemental bond or otherwise, substitute another and sufficient surety to be approved by the Commission in place of the surety so insolvent or unable. If the Contractor shall fail, within such ten days or such further time as the Commission may grant, to substitute another and sufficient surety, then the Contractor shall, for all the purposes of this contract, be deemed to be in default in the performance of his obligations hereunder and upon the said bond, and the Commission may terminate the contract or may bring any proper suit or proceeding against the Contractor and the sureties, or either of them, or may require to be deducted from any moneys then in, or thereafter coming into, the hands of the City and due to the Contractor the amount for which the surety insolvent or unable as aforesaid shall have justified on the bond; and the moneys so deducted shall be held by the Comptroller as collateral security for the performance of the condition of the bond.

Deposit of Cash or Securities.

*Article XXVIII. The Contractor may at his option deposit with the Comptroller in lieu of said bond or of any part thereof, an equal amount in cash or in value of securities. If securities be deposited they shall be securities of which a schedule shall be hereto annexed, entitled *Schedule of Securities*, and there shall be deposited with them the written approval of the Commission which it shall give when satisfied as to the character thereof. In case any of the securities so deposited shall, in the opinion of the Commission, at any time cease to be of the character of securities in which the savings banks of the State of New York are then authorized by law to invest moneys, or shall, in the opinion of the Commission, at any time become of less value than the value stated for it or them in the said schedule,—then within ten days after notice to the Contractor of the objection of the Commission, the Contractor shall either substitute therefor securities which shall be approved by the Commission as of the character aforesaid and as being of at least the value of the former securities to which the Commission shall have objected as such value was originally stated in the said schedule, or shall deposit with the Comptroller in cash the amount of such value of such former securities as so originally stated. In case the Contractor shall not within such ten days substitute such new securities, he shall, if the Commission so elect, be deemed to be in default in the performance of his obligations under this contract; and in addition to any and all other remedies against the Contractor or his sureties, the Commission may require the Comptroller to deduct from any moneys then due or which thereafter may become due to the Contractor under this contract, the amount of the original valuation of such securities objected to, and to hold such amount in lieu of such securities, as if part of the original deposit or as if deposited with the Comptroller as aforesaid, and such amount shall in such case be deemed to be paid to the Contractor upon the contract. The securities so objected to shall upon such substitution of securities or deposit of cash in lieu thereof be returned to the Contractor.

The City shall from time to time collect all interest, dividends or other profits or income on any securities deposited by the Contractor, and shall, when and as collected, pay the same to the Contractor. If the securities are in the form of coupon bonds the coupons as they respectively become due shall be delivered to the Contractor. If the deposit is made in cash, interest shall be paid to the Contractor at the average rate of interest received by the City on its bank balances during such period. Provided, however, that the Contractor shall not be entitled to interest, dividends or other profits or income on any securities the proceeds of which shall be used or applied as hereinafter provided.

Security For.

Article XXIX. The said deposit whether in cash or securities, in the form and as the same shall at any time be, shall be security for the faithful performance by the Contractor of all the covenants, conditions and requirements specified and provided for in this contract. In case of any default on the part of the Contractor in such performance, and in the further case that the City shall for or by reason of such failure, whether by reason of employment of another contractor or contractors or otherwise, incur or become liable for expense through such default as hereinafter provided, then the Comptroller shall forthwith pay or apply to the use of the City the amount of such expense out of the said deposit in cash or securities or out of the portion of the deposit remaining at the time.

Sale of Securities.

Article XXX. The Comptroller shall, upon the requirement of the Commission, in order to make such payment or application to the use of the City, sell at public auction in The City of New York any of the securities which may then constitute part of such deposit upon notice to be published in three daily newspapers, the first publication to be as much as ten days before the sale and such publication to be made three times within such ten days. Any such sale shall be adjourned from time to time if requested by the Commission. The Comptroller shall, upon the requirement of the Commission, deduct from the proceeds of any such sale, all expenses thereof and of such advertisement, and pay and apply to the use of the City so much of the residue of such proceeds as may be necessary for the purpose aforesaid. And the Contractor within ten days after notice from the Commission so to do shall (unless the time be extended by the Commission) by further deposit, according to the requirement of the Commission, of money or securities of the character aforesaid approved by the Commission restore the said deposit with the Comptroller to the full amount originally required. In addition to, or in lieu of, the sale above provided for, the Commission may, in the name of and in behalf of the City, bring any appropriate suit or proceeding in any proper court to enforce the lien and claim of the City in and upon the said deposit, whether such deposit be in money or securities.

Retention of Security.

Article XXXI. If at any time when the Contractor shall otherwise be entitled to a return of the said deposit, there shall be pending any claim for damages or loss caused to others by the negligence, fault, or default of the Contractor, for which it shall be claimed that the City shall be liable, then and in that case the said deposit, or such part thereof as the Commission shall prescribe, shall, upon the requirement of the Commission, be reserved by the Comptroller for a reasonable time as security to the City against such claims. And the amount of any such damages or costs paid by the City to others or for which the City shall be liable to others, shall be deducted from the said deposit before the same shall be returned to the Contractor as hereinafter provided.

On Completion of Works.

Article XXXII. When the Contractor shall have fully completed the Works according to the terms of this contract and the Commission shall so certify, the Comptroller shall pay and deliver to the Contractor the said deposit, or so much thereof as shall not have been reserved or used or applied for any of the purposes above mentioned.

Retained Percentages.

Article XXXIII. In addition and as further security there shall be deducted fifteen percentum (15%) of the amounts certified from time to time to be due to the Contractor until the amount so deducted and retained shall equal the sum of one hundred and seventy-five thousand (\$175,000) dollars. Thereafter there shall be so deducted and retained for such purpose ten percentum (10%) of amounts certified from time to time to be due to the Contractor. The Contractor may from time to time withdraw portions of the amounts so to be retained upon depositing with the Comptroller corporate stock of The City of New York of a market value equal to the amount so withdrawn, in which event the provisions of this chapter in respect of securities shall also apply to such corporate stock.

*Articles XXVIII to XXXII inclusive will form part of the contract only in case the Contractor elects to deposit cash or securities in lieu of a bond or to deposit corporate stock of The City of New York in lieu of retained percentages.

V
PAYMENTS TO CONTRACTOR.

Partial Payments.

Article XXXV. In order to assist the Contractor to prosecute the work advantageously, the Engineer shall, from time to time, as the work progresses, but not oftener than once a month, make in writing an estimate, such as in his opinion shall be just and fair, of the amount and value of the work done and materials incorporated in the work by the Contractor according to the terms of this contract (but it is understood that in making such estimates the Engineer shall not necessarily be governed by the unit prices contained in the Contractor's proposal), provided, however, that estimates may at any time be withheld or reduced, if, in the opinion of the Engineer, the work is not proceeding in accordance with the contract. The first such estimate shall be of the amount and value of the work done and materials incorporated in the work since the Contractor commenced the performance of this contract on his part. Every subsequent estimate except the final estimate shall be of the amount and value of the work done and materials incorporated in the work since the last preceding estimate was made, provided, however, that no such estimate shall be required to be made when, in the judgment of the Engineer, the total value of the work done and materials incorporated in the work since the last preceding estimate amounts to less than ten thousand (\$10,000.00) dollars. The Engineer shall further include accepted structural iron and steel delivered on the site of the work, or on property owned or leased by the City, but not incorporated in the work, at the rate of forty (\$40) dollars per ton of two thousand pounds. But the quantity of such structural iron and steel included in any partial estimate shall not exceed the quantity of such material, as determined by the Engineer, required for the ensuing six months, and any material included in a partial estimate which may subsequently become unsatisfactory shall be deducted from succeeding partial estimates. No materials not incorporated in the work, excepting such structural iron and steel, shall be included in partial estimates.

Not by Strict Measurement.

Article XXXVI. Such estimates shall not be required to be made by strict measurement, but they may be made by measurement or by estimation; or partly by one method and partly by the other, and it shall be sufficient if they are approximate only.

Vouchers.

Article XXXVII. Upon each such estimate being made and certified in writing to the Commission, the Commission shall forthwith prepare and certify a voucher for eighty-five or ninety per cent. of the amount stated in such estimate or certificate to be the value of the work done and materials furnished as provided in Article XXXIII, and the City shall within thirty (30) days after the date of the certification of such voucher by the Commission pay the same; provided, however, that the City may at all times reserve and retain from said partial payments or any of them, in addition to the ten or fifteen per cent. above mentioned to be retained and reserved, any sum or all sums which by the terms hereof, or of any law of the State of New York passed prior to the date hereof, it is or may be authorized to reserve or retain.

Final Estimate.

Article XXXVIII. Whenever, in the opinion of the Engineer, the Contractor shall have completely performed this contract on his part, the Engineer shall so certify, in writing, to the Commission, and in his certificate shall state, from actual measurements, the whole amount of work done by the Contractor, and also the value of such work under and according to the terms of this contract. On the expiration of ninety (90) days after the acceptance by the Commission of the work herein agreed to be done by the Contractor, and the filing of a certificate of the completion and acceptance of the work in the office of the Comptroller, signed by the Engineer and the Commission, the City shall pay to the Contractor the amount remaining after deducting from the amount or value stated in the last-mentioned certificate, all such sums as shall theretofore have been paid to the Contractor under any of the provisions of this contract, and also any sum or all such sums of money as by the terms hereof the City is or may be authorized to reserve or retain; provided, that nothing herein contained shall be construed to affect the right, hereby reserved, of the Commission to reject the whole or any portion of the aforesaid work, should the said certificate be found, or known to be, inconsistent with the terms of this contract, or otherwise improperly given. All prior certificates upon which partial payments may have been made, being merely estimates, shall be subject to correction in the final certificate, which final certificate may be made without notice thereof to the Contractor, or of the measurements upon which it is based.

Interest in Case of Delayed Payments.

Article XXXIX. If the payment of the amount due the Contractor on any voucher shall be delayed beyond the time stipulated in Article XXXVII in the case of partial payment, or Article XXXVIII in the case of final payment, the City shall pay the Contractor interest on such amount at the rate of four and one-half (4½) per cent. per annum for the period of such delay; it being understood that such payments of interest, if any, are to be in lieu of any claim of the Contractor for alleged damages for breach of contract or otherwise in case of delayed payments. The terms for which interest shall be paid shall be reckoned, in the case of a partial payment from the thirtieth day after the certification of such voucher by the Commission, and in the case of a final payment from the ninetieth day after the acceptance of the work by the Commission, to the date of payment of the voucher. The date of payment of a voucher shall be considered the day on which the voucher is ready for payment as evidenced by the records of the Department of Finance. If interest shall become due on any partial payment the amount thereof, as determined by the Commission, shall be added to a succeeding payment. If interest shall become due on a final payment it shall be paid on a supplementary voucher prepared by the Commission and forwarded to the Comptroller for payment in the usual manner.

No Estoppel.

Article XL. The City shall not, nor shall any Department or officer thereof, be precluded or estopped by any return or certificate made or given by the Commission, any Engineer, or other officer, agent or appointee thereof under any provision of this contract, from at any time either before or after the final completion and acceptance of the work and payment therefor pursuant to any such return or certificate, showing the true and correct amount, quality and character of the work done and materials furnished by the Contractor or any other person under this agreement, or from showing at any time that any such return or certificate is untrue and incorrect or improperly made in any particular, or that the work and materials, or any part thereof, do not in fact conform to the specifications; and the City shall not be precluded or estopped, notwithstanding any such return or certificate and payment in accordance therewith, from demanding and recovering from the Contractor such damages as it may sustain by reason of his failure to comply with this contract or the specifications.

No Waiver.

Article XLI. Neither the acceptance of the Commission or its Engineer, or any of its employees, nor any order, measurement or certificate by the Engineer, nor any order by the Commission for payment of money, nor any payment for, nor acceptance of the whole or any part of the work by the Engineer or the Commission, nor any extension of time, nor any possession taken by the Commission, or its employees, shall operate as a waiver of any portion of this contract or of any power herein reserved to the Commission, or any right to damages herein provided; nor shall any waiver of any breach of this contract be held to be a waiver of any other or subsequent breach.

Final Payment to Terminate Liability of City.

Article XLII. The acceptance by the Contractor of the last payment aforesaid shall be and shall operate as a release to the City, from all claim and liability to the Contractor for anything done or furnished for, or relating to, the work, or for any act or neglect of the Commission, the City or of any person relating to or affecting the work, except only the claim against the City for the remainder, if any there be, of the amounts kept or retained as provided in this contract.

Contractor's Claims for Damage; Statements of Damage To Be Filed With Engineer.

Article XLIII. If the Contractor shall claim compensation for any damage sustained by reason of the acts of the Commission, or its agents, he shall, within ten days after the sustaining of such damage, make a written statement of the nature of the damage sustained to the Engineer. On or before the fifteenth day of the month succeeding that in which any such damage shall have been sustained, the Contractor shall file with the Engineer an itemized statement of the details and amount of such damage, and, unless such statement shall be made as thus required, his claim for compensation may be forfeited and invalidated, and he shall not be entitled to payment on account of any such damage.

Lien Law.

Article XLIV. If at any time before or within thirty (30) days after the whole work agreed herein to be performed and all the labor and material herein agreed to

be delivered have been performed or delivered or completed and accepted by the City any person or persons claiming to have performed any labor or furnished any material toward the performance or completion of this contract shall file with the Commission and with the Comptroller of the City any such notice as is described in the Lien Law, the City shall retain until the discharge thereof from moneys under its control so much of such moneys as shall be sufficient to satisfy and discharge the amount in such notice claimed to be due, together with the costs of any action or actions brought to enforce such lien created by the filing of such notice.

VI
CONTRACTOR'S LIABILITY FOR INJURIES TO PERSONS OR PROPERTY.

Contractor Approves Plans as Involving no Damage.

Article XLV. The Contractor expressly admits and covenants to and with the City that the plans and specifications and other provisions of this contract, if the work be done without fault or negligence on the part of the Contractor, do not involve any danger to the foundations, walls or other parts of adjacent or overhead buildings or structures or surfaces; and the Contractor will at his own expense make good any damage that shall, in the course of construction, be done to any such foundations, walls or other parts of adjacent or overhead buildings or structures or surfaces. The liability of the Contractor under this covenant is absolute and is not dependent upon any question of negligence on his part, or on the part of his agents, servants or employees, and the neglect of the Engineer to direct the Contractor to take any particular precautions or to refrain from doing any particular thing, shall not excuse the Contractor in case of any such damage.

Traffic to be Maintained.

Article XLVI. The Contractor shall during the performance of the work safely maintain the traffic on streets, avenues, highways, or other public places as provided in the specifications, and shall take all necessary precautions to place proper guards for the prevention of accidents, and put up and keep at night suitable and sufficient lights.

Indemnification for Accidents, Etc.

Article XLVII. The Contractor shall be solely responsible for all physical injuries to persons or property occurring on account of and during the performance of the work hereunder, and shall indemnify and save harmless the City from liability upon any and all claims for damages on account of such injuries to persons or property, and from all costs and expenses in suits which may be brought against the City for such injuries to person or property; it being distinctly understood, stipulated and agreed that the Contractor shall be solely responsible and liable for and shall fully protect and indemnify the City against all claims for damages to persons or property occasioned by or resulting from blasting or other methods or processes in the work of construction, whether such damages be attributable to negligence of the Contractor or his employees or otherwise.

Money Due the Contractor May be Retained to Meet Claims.

Article XLVIII. In case any claim shall be made by any person or corporation against the Contractor or the City for loss or damage to person or property as aforesaid, the amount of such claim or so much thereof as the Commission shall deem reasonable, shall, upon the requirement and in the discretion of the Commission, be retained by the Comptroller out of any moneys thereafter growing due to the Contractor hereunder (in addition to the other sums hereinbefore authorized to be so retained), as security for the payment of such claim or claims. If and when the liability of the City or the Contractor on such claim or claims shall have been established by a judgment of a Court of competent jurisdiction, or shall have been admitted by the Contractor to be valid, the said claim or claims shall be paid from the amount so retained and the balance, if any, paid to the Contractor. Should there be any unsatisfied claims for injuries to persons or property at the time when the final estimate for the work is made and returned, the Engineer shall have the right to retain out of said final estimate a sum in his judgment sufficient to protect the City in regard to all unsatisfied claims as aforesaid and in case the amount thus retained should be insufficient to pay the amount adjudicated to be due upon such claim the City may sue for and recover from the Contractor the amount or balance as a debt from the Contractor to the City. The Engineer may further, if in his judgment such a course is necessary, at the time of making the final estimate, and as a condition to making the same require the Contractor to continue his bond or other security or any part thereof, for a time not exceeding the time when such claims would be barred under the existing Statute of Limitations, as security against any claims then unsatisfied or not presented.

Examinations of Abutting Property.

Article XLIX. In order to safeguard the owners or tenants of abutting property and at the same time prevent unjust or fraudulent claims against the Contractor or the City in respect thereto, the Engineer shall, whenever in his judgment it shall be necessary or proper, cause a detailed examination of any adjacent or abutting property to be made before construction is begun. The owner or tenant of each parcel or his or their duly authorized representative, shall be invited by a notice in writing delivered to a person apparently in charge of the premises, to be present, and the Contractor, or his duly authorized representative, shall attend and with the Engineer shall make such detailed examination. A complete record of the existing conditions of each parcel shall be made in triplicate, signed by the Engineer and the Contractor, and one copy shall be delivered to the owner, one to the Contractor and one shall be retained by the Commission. At such times as the Engineer may direct, and upon the completion of the work, or upon notice to the Engineer by the owner or tenant that physical injury has occurred, further examination shall be made and the findings recorded and filed as above.

Damage to Works During Construction.

Article L. All risk of loss or damage to the Works, or to any part thereof, or to any of the materials, tools, implements or other things used in doing the work, prior to final completion, is assumed and shall be borne by the Contractor, and any such loss or damage shall be made good by the Contractor at his own cost, and the construction shall be carried forward by him in accordance with this contract, without additional cost to the City by reason of such loss or damage.

VII.

CITY TO SECURE CONTRACTOR AGAINST INTERFERENCE BY INJUNCTIONS, ETC.

City's Assurances to Contractor of Right to Construct.

Article LI. The City hereby stipulates and covenants to and with the Contractor that the City will secure and assure to the Contractor, so long as the Contractor shall perform the stipulations of this contract, the right to construct the Railroad as prescribed in this contract free of all right, claim or other interference, whether by injunction, suit for damages or otherwise, on the part of any owners, abutting owner, or other person; but not including any interference, legal or otherwise, by patentees or persons claiming to be patentees of tools, methods or appliances.

Claims for Infringement of Patents.

Article LII. The Contractor shall hold himself responsible for any claims made against the City for any infringement of patents by the use of patented articles in the performance and completion of the work, or of any process connected with the work agreed to be performed under this contract, or of any materials used upon the said work; and shall save harmless and indemnify the City for all costs, expenses and damages which the City shall be obliged to pay by reason of any infringement of patents used in the performance and completion of the work.

Acquisition of Real Estate.

Article LIII. The City will acquire all such real estate and rights of way or other rights, terms, franchises, easements and privileges therein which, in the opinion of the Commission, it shall be necessary to acquire or extinguish for the purpose of constructing the Works free of interference or right of interference; provided, however, that this covenant shall not apply to or include any damages for physical injuries to property referred to in Chapter VI hereof, whether or not compensation for such damages be awarded in a condemnation proceeding. If compensation for any such damages shall be included in an award in condemnation proceedings the Contractor shall, upon demand, promptly reimburse the City for any payments made by it for such purposes.

VIII.

TIME FOR COMPLETION, DAMAGES FOR DELAY, ETC.

Commencement and Completion of Work.

Article LIV. Time is of the essence of this contract. The Contractor shall begin actual work within sixty (60) days after the delivery of this contract. The entire work covered by this contract shall be completed in all respects within eighteen (18) months from the date of delivery of this contract.

Price to be Reduced for Delay.

Article LV. In the event of delay in completion of the Works beyond the period herein prescribed, or beyond the period to which such time may be extended by

resolution of the Commission for good cause shown, the City shall—whether the working force be increased as provided in the specifications or not—be paid damages for such delay. Inasmuch as the amount of such damages will be extremely difficult to ascertain, especially in view of the fact that the Railroad herein contracted for is only a part of a complete system, the remainder of which is to be constructed under other contracts, it is hereby expressly agreed that damages shall be liquidated and paid by reducing the price to be paid the Contractor as follows: From the amounts which shall become payable to the Contractor after the expiration of the periods above limited (but not including the retained percentages from amounts theretofore certified to be due) there shall be deducted and retained by the City the following percentages: From the amount due for the first month after the expiration of such periods one (1) per centum thereof; from the amount due for the second month after the expiration of such periods two (2) per centum thereof; from the amount due for the third month after the expiration of such periods three (3) per centum thereof; from the amount due for the fourth month after the expiration of such periods four (4) per centum thereof; similarly from any amounts which may subsequently become due there shall be deducted a percentage, the rate of which shall equal the number of months which may have elapsed between the expiration of the periods above limited and the time when such payments shall become due. These amounts shall be deducted and retained by the City and are hereby agreed upon and determined as the measure of liquidated damages (and not as a penalty) to the City. But in case the Contractor shall be delayed by reason of any labor strike not caused or instituted or provoked by the Contractor, or by any subcontractor, agent or representative of the Contractor (which fact the Contractor shall prove to the satisfaction of the Commission), or in case the Contractor shall be delayed by any injunction or by any interference of public authority, and in case the Contractor cannot, notwithstanding such injunction or interference, with reasonable diligence make up for the delay so occasioned by speedier work when the Contractor shall not be so interfered with, then the said date for completion shall be extended by resolution of the Commission to a date later than the expiration of the said period by the amount of the time of such delay.

Commission May Intervene in Case of Injunction.

Article LVI. But no injunction, strike or interference of public authority shall be ground for such extension except if and from the time when the Contractor shall give the Commission notice of the injunction or other cause of delay, with copies of the injunction or other orders and of the papers upon which the same shall have been granted. The Commission and the City or either shall be accorded the right to intervene or become a party to any suit or proceeding in which any such injunction shall be obtained, and to move to dissolve the same or otherwise, as the Commission or City may deem proper. If necessary the Corporation Counsel or the Counsel to the Commission or both shall be authorized by the Contractor to appear, for that purpose, as counsel or attorneys for him.

In Case of Variation of Quantities.

Article LVII. The time stipulated within which to complete the Works is based upon the quantities of the various items entering into the work as stated in the form of proposal, which are given solely for the purpose of classifying bids. In case these quantities are exceeded or diminished then an extension or diminution of the term of this contract shall be made. It is, however, understood and agreed that in case an increase in any one item is balanced or offset by diminution of other items, no change in the term shall be made, and in any event the Engineer shall determine the amount of extension or diminution of time in respect of the relative increase or reduction in the quantities involved in the final completion.

Suspension of Work and Additional Time for Performance.

Article LVIII. The Commission reserves the right of temporarily suspending the execution of the whole or any part of the work herein contracted to be done, if it shall deem it for the interest of the City so to do, without compensation to the Contractor for such suspension, other than extending the time for completing the work as much as it may have been delayed by such suspension.

Extensions Not Cumulative.

Article LX. It is expressly understood, however, that the periods of extension referred to herein shall not be cumulative, but only the single period of delay giving the greatest extension shall be taken into consideration.

Permission to Complete Contract Not a Waiver.

Article LXI. The permitting of the Contractor to go on and finish the work, or any part of it, after the time fixed for its completion, or after the date to which the time for completion may have been extended, or the making of partial payments to the Contractor after any such periods, shall in no wise operate as a waiver on the part of the City of any of its rights under this contract.

IX

REMEDIES IN CASE OF CONTRACTOR'S DEFAULT.

In Case of Default.

ARTICLE LXII. If the work to be done under this contract shall be abandoned by the Contractor, or if this contract shall be assigned, or the work sublet by him, otherwise than as herein specified, or if at any time the Engineer shall be of the opinion, and shall so certify in writing to the Commission that the performance of this contract is unnecessarily or unreasonably delayed, or that the Contractor is wilfully violating any of the provisions or covenants of this contract, or of the specifications, or is executing the same in bad faith or not in accordance with the terms thereof, or if the work be not fully completed within the time named in this contract for its completion, or within the time to which the completion of the contract may be extended by the Commission, the Commission may

May Take Charge of Work.

(1) Notify the Contractor, by a written notice, to discontinue all work, or any part thereof, under this contract, and thereupon the Contractor shall discontinue the work, or such part thereof, and the Commission shall thereupon have the right to contract for the completion of the Works in the manner prescribed by law, or to place such and so many persons as it may deem advisable, by contract or otherwise, to work, and complete the work herein described, or such part thereof, to take possession of and use any or all of the materials, plant, tools, equipment, supplies and property of every kind provided by the Contractor for the purpose of his work, and to procure other materials for the completion of the same, and to charge the expense of said labor and materials to the Contractor. The expense so charged shall be deducted and paid by the City out of such moneys as may be due or may at any time thereafter grow due to the Contractor under and by virtue of this contract, or any part thereof. And in case such expense shall exceed the amount which would have been payable under the contract if the same had been completed by the Contractor, he shall pay the amount of such excess to the City; and in case such expense shall be less than the amount which would have been payable under this contract if the same had been completed by the Contractor, he shall forfeit all claim to the difference; and when any particular part of the work is being carried on by the Commission, by contract or otherwise, under the provisions of this article of the contract, the Contractor shall continue the remainder of the work in conformity with the terms of this contract, and in such manner as in nowise to hinder or interfere with the persons or workmen employed, as above provided, by the Commission, by contract or otherwise, to do any part of the work or to complete the same under the provisions of this article of the contract. And

Or Proceed Upon Bond.

(2) The City may also proceed as to the Commission shall seem proper upon the bond or other security in its possession. And

Or May Bring Suit.

(3) The City may also bring any suit or proceeding for specific performance or for injunction or to recover damages or to obtain any relief or for any purpose proper under this contract.

X

MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS.

Changes in the Contract.

ARTICLE LXIII. No correction or change in this contract shall be made except by written instrument duly authorized by the Commission and consented to by the Contractor and by the sureties upon his bond; but this provision shall not limit or affect the right to prescribe variations whether of construction or location of route as in this contract elsewhere provided.

Members of Commission Not Liable.

ARTICLE LXIV. No claim shall be made by the Contractor against any member of the Commission personally by reason of this contract or of any of its articles or provisions.

Contractor Not to Assign, Sublet, etc.

ARTICLE LXV. The Contractor shall not assign, transfer, convey, sublet or other-

wise dispose of this contract or his right, title or interest in or to the same or any part thereof without the previous consent in writing of the Commission, and he shall not assign by power of attorney or otherwise any of the moneys to become due and payable under this contract unless by and with the like consent. If the Contractor shall without such previous written consent assign, transfer, convey, sublet or otherwise dispose of this contract or of his right, title or interest therein or any of the moneys to become due under this contract, to any other person, company or corporation, this contract may at the option of the Commission be revoked and annulled and the City shall thereupon be relieved and discharged from any and all liability and obligations growing out of the same to the Contractor and to his assignee or transferee; and no right under this contract or to any money to become due hereunder shall be asserted against the City in law or in equity by reason of any so-called assignment of this contract or any part thereof or of any moneys to grow due hereunder unless authorized as aforesaid by the written consent of the Commission; provided that nothing herein contained shall be construed to hinder, prevent or affect an assignment by the Contractor for the benefit of his creditors made pursuant to the statutes of the State of New York.

Provisions in Case Commission Ceases.

ARTICLE LXVI. In case the Commission shall cease to exist the Legislature may provide what public officer or officers shall exercise the powers and duties of the Commission under and by virtue of this contract; and in default of such provision, such powers and duties shall be deemed to be vested in the Mayor of the City. In case any officer or officers other than the Commission shall hereafter have the powers of the Commission or any of them, then the provisions of this contract shall be applicable to such officer or officers to the extent to which the powers of the Commission shall appertain to such officer or officers, and any official act or determination of such officer or officers or of this Commission shall be sufficient hereunder, anything herein to the contrary notwithstanding, if the same be done or had by lawful vote or resolution or in such manner as the Legislature may from time to time prescribe.

Labor Law.

ARTICLE LXVII. The Contractor agrees to comply with the provisions of the Labor Law, including section 3 thereof as re-enacted by chapter 36 of the Laws of 1909. The Contractor further agrees and stipulates that no laborer, workman or mechanic in the employ of the Contractor, sub-contractor or other person doing or contracting to do the whole or a part of the work contemplated by this contract, shall be permitted or required to work more than eight hours in any one calendar day, except in cases of extraordinary emergency caused by fire, flood or danger to life or property; and further that the wages to be paid for a legal day's work as hereinbefore defined to all classes of such laborers, workmen or mechanics upon the work contemplated by this contract or upon any material to be used upon or in connection therewith, shall not be less than the prevailing rate for a day's work in the same trade or occupation in the Borough of the City, where the work hereby contemplated, about or in connection with which such labor is performed, is in its final or completed form to be situated, erected or used; and that each such laborer, workman or mechanic employed by the Contractor or by any sub-contractor or other person on, about or upon the work contemplated by this contract, shall receive such wages herein provided for. This contract shall be void and of no effect, unless the Contractor shall comply with the provisions of this section. In obedience to the requirements of section 14 of the Labor Law it is further provided that if the provisions of the said section 14 are not complied with, this contract shall be void.

All Necessary Legal Provisions Deemed Inserted Herein.

ARTICLE LXVIII. It is the intent and understanding of the parties to this agreement that each and every provision of law required to be inserted in this contract should be and is inserted herein. Furthermore, it is hereby stipulated that every such provision is to be deemed to be inserted herein; and if, through mistake or otherwise, any such provision is not inserted or is not inserted in correct form, then the contract shall forthwith, upon the application of either party, be amended by such insertion so as to comply strictly with the law, and without prejudice to the rights of either party hereunder.

Provision Unlawful in Case of Provision.

ARTICLE LXIX. If this contract contains any unlawful provision not an essential part of the general structure of the contract and which shall not appear to have been a controlling or very material inducement to the making thereof the same shall be deemed of no effect, and shall upon the application of either party, be struck from the contract without affecting the binding force of the contract as it shall remain after omitting such provision.

In Witness Whereof, this contract has been executed for THE CITY OF NEW by the PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION for the First District under and by resolution duly adopted by the Commission and the seal of the Commission has been hereto affixed and attested by its Secretary and these presents have been signed by its Chairman; and the CONTRACTOR has [caused corporate seal to be hereto affixed and these presents to be executed by proper officers] the day and year first above written.

Public Service Commission—Assumption by The City of Primary Responsibility for Damages in Connection with Construction of Subway (Cal. No. 21).

Establishment in City Departments of Grade of Position of Steam Roller Engineer, Etc. (Cal. No. 23).

(On February 13, 20 and 27, 1913, this matter was laid over for one week.)

International Union of Steam Engineers, Hall of Local Union No. 184, November 16, 1912.

Mr. WILLIAM A. PRENDERGAST, Comptroller, City of New York:

Dear Sir—I desire to again call your attention that there is at the present time a violation of the prevailing rate of wage law in the four boroughs. Especially in the Borough of Kings, under President Mr. Steers.

Owing to the fact that all Roller Engineers in The City of New York are, and have been receiving \$28.50 per week of forty-eight (48) hours, and owing to the fact that beyond a question of a doubt we can prove that the above is the prevailing rate of wage.

Seventy-five (75) per cent. of our men are operating rollers in The City of New York and have been for the past two years receiving said rate.

Therefore, we most respectfully request you as Comptroller of The City of New York to give this matter your earliest attention, especially owing to the fact that The City of New York is only paying the sum of \$4.50 per eight (8) hours on the same work.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—In a communication dated November 16, 1912, the business representative of Local Union No. 184, International Union of Steam Engineers, stated that the prevailing rate of wages for Steam Roller Engineers of \$4.75 per diem was not paid in city departments. In connection therewith we report as follows:

The following statements were made by employers of Steam Roller Engineers, to an examiner of the Department of Finance:

Barber Asphalt Company, Church Street, Manhattan.

"The company has 37 steam rollers. Thirty Engineers are employed at present, and are paid \$28.50 a week, straight time, for eight hours a day. We pay single time for overtime on other than City work, and double pay for Sundays and holidays. The asphalt Steam Roller Engineer requires more experience than the Engineer who operates a roller on ordinary road work."

Uvalde Asphalt Company, Broadway, Manhattan.

"The company has 25 steam rollers. Fourteen Steam Roller Engineers are now employed at \$4.75 a day."

Sicilian Asphalt Company, Park Row, Manhattan.

"We have now 15 Steam Roller Engineers, at \$28.50 a week, or \$4.75 a day."

Cranford Asphalt Company, Montague Street, Brooklyn.

"We have six Steam Roller Engineers on the payroll, at \$28.50 a week."

Borough Asphalt Company, Metropolitan Avenue, Brooklyn.

"We employ two Steam Roller Engineers on asphalt work and one Engineer on roller or road work. We pay them \$28.50 a week, or \$4.75 a day."

Brooklyn Alcatraz Company, Hamilton Avenue, Brooklyn.

"Our Steam Roller Engineers are paid \$28.50 a week. We have four rollers, three on asphalt work and one on road or macadam."

Hill Paving Company, Main Street, Flushing, L. I.

"We have five steam rollers, and are operating three at present. The Engineers are paid \$30 a week. The excess rate is allowed on account of the extra expense of the men for carfares, etc."

Standard Bithalactic Company, Church Street, Manhattan.

"We have three Roller Engineers at \$28.50 a week."

Dayton Hedges Company, 41st Street and Broadway, Manhattan.

"We employ four Roller Engineers, two on asphalt and two on macadam roads, at \$28.50 a week."

R. C. Bouker Company, Far Rockaway, L. I.

"We have one Roller Engineer, and he receives \$4.75 a day, straight time; no lay off or broken time."

Warren Brothers, Church Street, Manhattan.

"We employ two Roller Engineers, at \$28.50 a week."

Cleveland Triniti Company, Flushing, L. I.

"We have at present two Roller Engineers at \$28.50 a week."

Pease Brothers, Main Street, Flushing, L. I.

"We employ four Roller Engineers, two at \$4.75 a day and two at \$4.50 plus carfares, averaging \$28.50 a week."

Asphalt Construction Company, 137th Street and Madison Avenue, Manhattan.

"We have four Roller Engineers, and pay \$28.50 a week."

The rates paid by contractors in Greater New York are as follows:

The number of Engineers employed during the summer season is considerably increased. There are 39 Steam Roller Engineers employed by the City, 10 in the Department of Parks, and 29 in the Bureaus of Highways, of the Offices of the Borough Presidents. The rate paid is \$4.50 per diem. There are eight asphalt Roller Engineers in City employ, all in Brooklyn. The City owns its asphalt plant in that borough. The contractors employ 86 out of 104 Engineers on asphalt work. While the employers agree that more skill is required to operate a roller on asphalt than on macadam, the majority of the contractors employing men on road work pay them \$4.75 a day.

The agreement entered into between Local Union No. 184 and the contractors provides for the same rate for competent Engineers for rollers on asphalt and macadam. It also provides that eight hours shall constitute a day's work, and forty-eight hours a week's work, for which the contractor shall pay \$28.50. Some of the contractors pay full time, in order to retain the services of competent men.

Board of Estimate and Apportionment, 277 Broadway, New York City:

Dear Sirs—We have been allowed in the budget for 1913 in the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices, the following:

Two Foremen at a per diem rate equivalent to \$1,200 per year each;

One Storekeeper at a per diem rate equivalent to \$900 per year.

We have been trying for some time to rearrange the work of this Bureau, so as to meet the changed conditions of keeping stores, and, at the same time, handling our departmental work. If the title of one of the Foremen could be changed to Storekeeper, which would require the majority of his time and still occasionally act as Foreman on detail, this would save the City the sum of \$900 appropriated for the position of Storekeeper.

By changing the title of the other Foreman to Inspector of Repairs, for which work he has passed the Civil Service examination, his title would be more in accordance with his duties than at present. I might add that the other Foreman has also passed an examination and is eligible for the position of Storekeeper.

I therefore respectfully ask that your Board establish the following position in the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices, of this office:

One Storekeeper at \$1,200 per annum;

One Inspector of Repairs at \$1,200 per annum.

Sir—The highest grade established for Law Clerk in the Bureau of Franchises is \$1,950. Recently I applied to the Civil Service Commission for an examination for promotion for Joseph A. Devery, a Law Clerk in this Bureau since 1906, and who is receiving a salary of \$1,950. The request was denied, on the ground that no grades higher than \$1,950 were established in the Board, and until such higher grades were established, no examinations for promotion could be held.

I would therefore request that the grade of Law Clerk be established at \$2,100 and \$2,250, each for one incumbent, in order to provide for promotions in the Bureau.

The Chief Engineer states that he recently applied to the Municipal Civil Service Commission for a promotion examination for Mr. Devery. The request was denied on the grounds that no grades of position higher than \$1,950 were established in the Board, and that until higher grades were established a promotion examination could not be held. Request, therefore, is made for the establishment of the next two higher grades of the position of Law Clerk.

The Chief Engineer states that he desires to increase Mr. Devery's salary to the

extent of \$300. As the establishment of the grade of position at \$2,250 per annum will permit of an increase in his salary of \$300, and will also be sufficient to obtain the desired promotion examination, it will not be necessary to establish the additional grade of \$2,100.

The money necessary to make the above increase in salary is to be transferred from the office of the President of the Borough of Manhattan to the Bureau of Franchises.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On January 29, 1913, the President of the Borough of Manhattan, requested establishment in his office of certain grades of positions. On February 20, 1913, the request was orally amended to include the following grades:

In connection therewith we report as follows:

The grade of Clerk, at \$3,500, is proposed to increase the salary of Stephen Kelly, Clerk, from \$2,850. Mr. Kelley is in charge of the Division of Appointments and Local Board. He has supervision as to appointments, resignations, increases and decreases in salaries, etc., of the entire force of the Borough President's office, numbering about 2,500 employees. He is Clerk to the Local Boards and is an expert on Civil Service and Public Improvement matters. His duties are varied and exacting, requiring a special knowledge of many varied subjects. His service has extended over a period of 14 years, he having entered the employment of the City, as Clerk, at \$1,350, on June 15, 1899. His record in the Department is excellent. We are of the opinion the grade should be established.

The grade of Clerk at \$2,550 is for the purpose of increasing the salaries of James H. McDermott, Clerk, at \$2,400, in charge of the Payroll Division and of James Carracher, Clerk, at \$2,400, in charge of the Contract Division. Mr. McDermott entered the City's employ, as Clerk at \$1,200, on November 2, 1899, and Mr. Carracher on September 17, 1886, as Clerk, at \$1,500. The President states that they are both very efficient and that he proposes the increases to reward them for long and faithful service. We are of the opinion that the grade should be established.

The grade of Clerk at \$2,250 is proposed to increase the salary of Edward Brady, Clerk, at \$2,100, Assistant to the Clerk in charge of the Division of Sidewalks, Street Signs and Encumbrances. Mr. Brady entered the service of the City on April 16, 1895, as Clerk, at \$1,000. The President states that he has shown unusual ability in the campaign for the removal of sidewalk encroachments. For this reason and because of his general efficiency the increase is proposed. We are of the opinion the grade should be established.

The grade of Assistant Engineer at \$2,250 is proposed to increase the salary of Charles H. Levy, Assistant Engineer, at \$2,100, in charge of the Division of Highways in the Bureau of Design and Survey. Mr. Levy started his employment with the City on April 16, 1906. The President states that he is very competent and has handled the difficult work of his division satisfactorily. We are of the opinion the grade should be established.

The grade of Librarian, at \$1,350, is for the purpose of increasing the salary of Gertrude L. Farrington, Librarian to the Bureau of Design and Survey, at \$1,200. Formerly about eighteen thousand copies of valuable records, maps and volumes of data, dating back more than 100 years and belonging to the Bureau of Design and Survey, were kept in an unsystematic condition. Miss Farrington has had charge of the restoring, compiling, indexing, and filing of these records, etc. She entered on the work on May 10, 1912, and is a qualified librarian, having been employed as such in the Queens Borough Public Library prior to her present employment. The President states that the work is of great value and that because of Miss Farrington's efficiency he requests the increase. We are of the opinion the grade should be established.

The grade of Axeman, at \$1,050, is for the purpose of increasing the salaries of eight axemen, at \$900 each, employed in the Bureau of Design and Survey. The grade of Axeman is just above that of Laborer. The duties are not onerous nor exacting. It is open to the eight men it is proposed to increase to take a promotion examination for the higher grade of Rodman. The maximum rate generally paid in city departments to Axeman is \$900, the rate paid these incumbents.

We are of the opinion there should be no increase above this rate, and recommend that this item in the request be not approved.

The grade of Inspector, at \$1,350, is to permit of increases in salary for William Clark and Henry W. Kennedy, Inspectors of Encumbrances, at \$1,200 each, in the Division of Sidewalks, Street Signs and Encumbrances. Mr. Clark entered the City's employ as Inspector, at \$900, on August 17, 1896, and Mr. Kennedy as Inspector, at \$900, on August 30, 1893. The President states that they are efficient and that their record in the department is good. We are of the opinion that the grade should be established.

The grade of Inspector of Public Works, at \$2,100, is for the purpose of increasing the salary of William Goldsmith, Inspector, at \$1,800; in charge of the Permit Division. Mr. Goldsmith's service with the City began as Inspector, at \$1,500, on July 5, 1911. He is an engineer, and has recently taken an examination for Assistant Engineer Grade E. The President states he is very capable and performs his duties efficiently and conscientiously. We are of the opinion the grade should be established.

The grade of Transitman, at \$1,650, is proposed to increase the salaries of Joseph Frank and Morris Jaffe, Transitmen, at \$1,500 each, in the Bureau of Highways. Mr. Jaffe's service with the City began on March 8, 1910, as Transitman, at his present salary, and Mr. Frank's on April 12, 1910, as Transitman, at \$1,350. Both are stated to be very efficient. We are of the opinion the grade should be established.

The grade of Stationary Engineer at \$6 per day is proposed for an increase of \$1 per day for John J. Daly, Engineer in charge of the Hall of Records. The prevailing rate of wage for Stationary Engineer is \$4.50 per day. Although at present the grade exists for two incumbents at \$6 per day in the office of the President of the Borough of Manhattan, we deem it advisable that, because the request is so much in excess of the prevailing rate, this part of the request be referred to the Committee on Standardization of Salaries and Grades.

Funds for the increases can be provided by schedule modifications within the present appropriations, and in conformity with the resolution governing salary increases adopted by your board on January 30, 1913. We recommend the adoption of the attached resolution recommending the establishment of the grades requested, except that of Axeman at \$1,050.

Dear Sir—Referring to the call of Mr. John W. Devoy, Treasurer of the Brooklyn Public Library, I would request the favorable consideration by the Corporate Stock Budget Committee of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for an issue of corporate stock to the amount of \$2,600, to provide means for the acquisition of a parcel of ground, 20 feet in width by 100 feet in depth, adjoining the present plot which has been acquired by The City of New York as a site for a Carnegie Library, at the southeast corner of Schenectady avenue and Eastern parkway, Borough of Brooklyn.

This will leave a space of approximately ten feet at the rear of the building for light and air. The price is reasonable.

The request is for a part allowance of the \$200,133 in special revenue bonds, requested by the Board of Aldermen on July 11, 1911, for fire protection work in the Department.

Gentlemen—I would ask for the earliest possible action upon the issue of corporate stock to the amount of \$4,650 for engineering work in connection with grade crossing elimination in this borough.

One extensive piece of work is drawing to a close, but will require four or five months' attention.

Another even more important construction is to be begun at once. That you may have full information upon the subject, the following report has been prepared by our Engineering Bureau:

"The amount of money available for salaries of an engineer and assistants, in connection with the elimination of grade crossings in this borough, on January 1, 1913, is \$1,620.75. We need for the year 1913 \$6,250, as follows:

There is, therefore, a probable deficiency of \$4,629.25, and I would ask that additional corporate stock be issued, so that this work may be carried on during the coming year.

In explanation of the above request, will say that the present contract work of elimination at Huguenot crossing will probably be completed in about four months; an inspector must be in constant attendance, representing this Department, as we have to certify to one-fourth of the cost.

The Crooks crossing elimination is to commence and we will need an inspector there at once; that work will be carried on throughout the year. As much of the work is being done by the Staten Island Railway Co., through its own force, it is necessary for us to check up their time account, and all materials delivered and charged, and in many cases we have to separate these items from their own work which is going on in that vicinity. For the month of October, as an example: These items included 9,000 hours of labor at 13 different prices.

The Engineer in charge of this work, representing this Department, is unable, without assistance, to compute and check all of the many items of expenditure entering into this work; and there is also some necessary checking of field work to be done by him, for which he needs the occasional services of a field party. This has all been considered carefully and kept down to a minimum expenditure in the schedule outlined above.

Gentlemen—On January 10, 1913, the President of the Borough of Richmond requested early action on a request for an authorization of \$4,650 corporate stock for salaries for the engineering staff working on the elimination of grade crossings in the Borough of Richmond. In connection therewith, we report as follows:

The estimated cost of the salaries for 1913 of employees engaged on this work is \$6,250. On January 1, 1913, the available balance was \$1,620.75. The request is for \$4,650. Work at the Huguenot crossing is almost completed, but the presence of an inspector is necessary, as the President has to certify to one-fourth of the cost. A similar work has been projected at Crooks crossing, and actual construction will commence in the immediate future.

The nature of the work performed by the City employees is principally that of inspection after the plans have been duly adopted pursuant to the provisions of the Railroad Law. The greater part of the expense of construction is borne by the railroad companies.

Appropriations amounting to \$10,000 have been made for this purpose and \$9,500 transferred to the account.

Against the balance of \$1,620.75 on January 1, 1913, is set up the estimated cost for the year 1913, based upon the following schedule:

The City of New York, Office of the President of the Borough of Richmond, Borough Hall, New Brighton, New York City, January 17, 1913.

Board of Estimate and Apportionment, No. 277 Broadway, New York:

Gentlemen—I would ask for the issuance of \$10,500 corporate stock to provide for further work in connection with the Richmond Borough Hall for the following reason.

Some two years ago, upon favorable report from the Corporate Stock Budget Committee, we were authorized to spend a certain balance of corporate stock originally appropriated for the "Completion of approach work and grounds in connection with the Borough Hall, Borough of Richmond, City of New York, with all work incidental thereto," for purpose of completing the coping, sidewalks, grading and turfing of the Borough Hall grounds and the building of a large coal storage bin beneath the floor and sidewalk at the west of the structure, so as to permit us to purchase coal in larger quantities and get resulting benefit in price.

Owing to the changes in labor and supply conditions, the cost of completing the grounds and walls was much larger than anticipated, even though good competition was secured in the bidding. That work has now been finished and there remains but a balance of \$1,640 in the fund, and we have prepared plans and have made estimates for the coal bin, and in our best judgment the work will cost in the neighborhood of \$12,000.

There will be a still further advantage in having these large coal bins from the

fact that the new additional County Courthouse is to be built upon a site adjoining the Borough Hall and will be heated and power will be furnished from the boiler plant in the Borough Hall, as extended somewhat for the purpose. It will necessarily take some time, even after the stock is authorized, to provide the necessary contract plans, to secure bids and carry on the work which should be all finished in time to take advantage of the lowest coal prices available in the early autumn.

Plans and estimates have been made for the construction of coal bins with storage capacity sufficient to provide fuel for a central plant to heat the Borough Hall and the new County Court House. The cost of construction is estimated at \$12,000. It is for this purpose that corporate stock is requested.

One of the advantages urged by the Borough President in favor of large storage bins is that coal could be purchased in boat-load quantities at a saving of 50 cents to 75 cents per ton. It has been suggested that the same advantage may be secured by contracting for cargo lots, deliveries to be made on order, thereby avoiding the expense of storage. The Borough President has agreed to try this method, but if it proves unsuccessful, the request for corporate stock to construct storage bins will be renewed.

Gentlemen—On February 4, 1913, the Board of Aldermen adopted a resolution requesting \$1,825 in special revenue bonds, to be used by the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity "for the purpose of paying the salary of Foreman John F. Grady from January 1 to December 31, 1913."

This action was pursuant to a request by the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, under date of January 17, 1913, reading as follows:

"Mr. John F. Grady, Foreman in charge of the company assigned to the repair and maintenance of the water distribution system in the lower section of the Borough of Manhattan, and who has been connected with the City service for forty-two years, presented to me last year his application for retirement. The matter was later referred to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and by it transmitted to the Comptroller for report. No action has been taken upon said application. I understand that about that time the Comptroller was served with an injunction by a taxpayer restraining him from paying any moneys to City employees retired under authority of chapter 669 of the Laws of 1911. In preparing the Department's estimate for funds required for the current year no provision was made for the continued employment of Foreman Grady. It was my belief that he would be retired some time last year, and consequently there would be no necessity for appropriating any money for his salary. Unfortunately, the suit brought by the taxpayer has not yet been decided. As you will see, this has brought about a rather embarrassing situation, so far as Mr. Grady is concerned, and if the taxpayer's suit should terminate adversely to the City Mr. Grady will, no doubt, remain with the Department.

"I would therefore respectfully request that the Board of Aldermen provide special revenue bonds in the sum of \$1,825, the proceeds whereof to be applied to the payment of Mr. Grady's wages for the year 1913."

In a communication addressed to me, under date of February 25, 1913, the Commissioner states the following:

"My attention has been called to the fact that in the resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen on February 4, 1913, referring to the issue of special revenue bonds to provide for the payment of wages of one of the Department Foremen, the name is given as John F. Grady. It appears that Mr. Grady has no middle name, but there is no other employee bearing the name of John Grady holding the position of Foreman."

On January 4, 1912, the Mayor recommended the retirement, pursuant to the provisions of sections 165, 166 and 167 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, of Mr. Grady, but, as stated by the Commission, no action on this recommendation has yet been taken by your Board, and Mr. Grady is still performing service for the Department.

Mr. Grady's rate of compensation as Foreman has been \$5 per day since April 1, 1877, and he is employed every day of the year. The \$1,825 requested will provide for 365 days at \$5 per day.

Pending action by your Board in the matter of Mr. Grady's retirement from active service, and in order that he may receive pay while actually employed, I recommend the adoption of the attached resolutions concurring in the request of the Board of Aldermen, with the correction of the clerical error previously noted; and providing for the necessary schedule modification.

Greene was eligible for an appointment as a District Superintendent at \$2,100 per annum but that he is a very valuable man in his present position as Assistant Superintendent of Final Disposition and wished to retain him in said position. Therefore, he feels that the man should be paid at the rate he would have received had he accepted the position of District Superintendent.

But in view of the resolution adopted by this Board on January 30, 1913, I cannot recommend the approval of the revenue bond request.

Request was made for one automobile, at \$1,200, for the use of pumping stations in the Borough of Queens. This request was tentatively approved by the Budget Committee and included in the Tentative Budget. This item, however, was eliminated in the final draft of the 1913 Budget, as approved by your Board, leaving the necessary transportation unprovided for. Approval of this item in the request of the Board of Aldermen, therefore, appears to be proper.

Regarding the other two items in the request, the 1913 Budget Schedules for Accounts, Contract and Open Order Service, Transportation, Hire of Horses and Vehicles with Drivers, Water Supply, No. 834 TC, Distribution, and Hire of Horses and Vehicles Without Drivers, Water Supply, No. 840 TC, Distribution, provide in part as follows:

834TC Driver with team and vehicle at \$6 per day (1,012 days).

840TC Horse and vehicle at \$60 per month (48 months).

It is, therefore, unnecessary to provide for any additional vehicular transportation for use on the distribution systems of the Department at present.

Standard Testing Laboratory—Monthly Report (Cal. No. 59).

The Secretary presented the following, which was ordered printed in the Minutes and filed:

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor, Chairman Board of Estimate and Apportionment, 277 Broadway, New York City:

Sir—I beg to submit herewith report showing in tabulated form the work performed by the Standard Testing Laboratory of your Board during the month of February, 1913, together with a departmental summary.

There were submitted for analysis during the month of February 235 samples of supplies and materials of construction. The majority of these samples were obtained by the regular Samplers attached to the Standard Testing Laboratory, and it was found that only 33.16 per cent. complied with the specification requirements, while 66.84 per cent. failed to comply and were either rejected or an appropriate deduction made for the deficiency.

The routine work done during the month of February is more comprehensively given in the attached schedule.

The work of research could not be followed up as expeditiously as desired owing to five vacancies for the positions of Engineering Chemists, which could not be filled on account of the Civil Service Eligible List for these positions not having been promulgated.

The research work conducted during the month of February may be summarized as follows:

Board of City Record—Research on paper and typewriter ribbons, with special determination of color tints in papers.

Commissioners of Accounts—Examination of a series of bituminous paving materials obtained from the plant of the United States Asphalt Refining Company at East Brooklyn, Maryland. These materials are derivatives of Mexican asphaltic oil.

Board of Education—By request of the Consulting Engineers to the Committee on School Investigation a research was made as to the adaptability and composition of coal briquettes for fuel in school buildings.

Fire Department—Research was made as to the composition of white enamel paints, with special reference to preparing adequate specifications for this material.

Commission on Standardization—Research is being made to classify suitable tallow and greases for various classes of soap. These greases are being classified not only as to their chemical composition but also as to their color tints. The same work is being conducted in reference to the various grades of rosins used in the manufacture of laundry soap.

Investigation and study as to new and practical methods for testing woolens, cottons and denims.

Research in reference to the quality of laboratory glassware.

Research as to the physical and chemical qualities of rubber goods of all descriptions for hospital purposes.

Study of adequate specifications for paints, varnishes and oils.

President, Borough of Richmond—Research as to the physical and chemical properties of granite paving blocks for the purpose of preparing adequate specifications for same.

Finance Department—Investigation as to the ingredients and commercial values of insecticides.

Investigation as to the proper composition of carbonated mineral waters.

*Axeman, 1 at \$900 (A. S. I., \$300).

This change is to provide for Edward V. Shiels, an Axeman at \$900 appointed October 1, 1912, and not provided for in the 1913 budget. The position of Draftsman at \$900 is vacant.

In Personal Service, Salaries Regular Employees, Water Supply—Filtration, No. 676C, Corporate Stock Force, the schedule line, "Assistant Engineer, 1 at \$1,500," is changed to read:

*Leveler, 1 at \$1,200 (A. S. I., \$200).

—and the schedule total is reduced by \$300.

Of the \$500 available for salary increases in the vacant position reduced, \$200 is started in the new line, Leveler, 1 at \$1,200, and \$300 is used to increase two positions, \$150 each, in No. 680 C.W., as subsequently noted.

This change is to provide for Charles A. Brushaber, a Leveler, at \$1,200, appointed August 15, 1912, who was not included in the Commissioner's 1913 estimate, and, therefore, not provided for in the 1913 budget.

In Personal Service, Salaries Regular Employees, Water Supply—Distribution, No. 679C, Corporate Stock Force, the line reading, "Transitman, 1 at \$1,200," is changed to read:

*Rodman, 1 at \$1,200 (A. S. I., \$400).

This change is to provide for Marcus Washburn, a Rodman, at \$1,200, whose title cannot be changed to Transitman on account of Civil Service restrictions.

The line now reading, "Leveler, 1 at \$1,500," is changed to read:

Leveler, 2 at \$1,500.

This change is to provide for Harold T. Kinch, a Leveler, at \$1,500, appointed July 27, 1904, who was absent on leave on account of illness at the time the budget estimate was being considered, and whose position was erroneously reported as vacant. He was, therefore, not provided for in the 1913 budget.

The line now reading, "Rodman, 2 at \$900," is changed to read:

Rodman, 1 at \$900.

*Axeman, 1 at \$900 (A. S. I., \$300).

This change is to provide for John Gould, Jr., an Axeman, at \$900, appointed August 15, 1912, who cannot be promoted to the vacant position of Rodman on account of Civil Service restrictions.

The line now reading, "Inspector, 8 at \$1,800," is changed to read:

Inspector, 9 at \$1,800.

This change is to provide for Ernest Wetterer, an Inspector at \$1,800, appointed July 30, 1907. Mr. Wetterer was carried on the payroll of Administration, Corporate Stock Force, during 1912, and his position appears in the Commissioner's departmental estimate for 1913 as "Transferred to Distribution—Corporate Stock," but through a clerical error was not added to the requested positions for distribution, and, therefore, was not provided for in the 1913 budget. The net result of the proposed changes in No. 679C is an addition of \$3,300 to the present schedule total.

In Salaries, Regular Employees, Water Supply—Distribution, No. 680W, Corporate Stock and Water Revenue Force, the lines now reading, "Transitman, 1 at \$1,350," and "Leveler, 1 at \$1,200," are changed to read:

*Leveler, 1 at \$1,500 (A. S. I., \$600).

*Leveler, 1 at \$1,350 (A. S. I., \$550).

The proposed changes are to provide for Edwin A. Hemmings, a Leveler, at \$1,500, increased from \$1,350 to \$1,500 on August 1, 1912, and John T. Dowd, a Leveler, at \$1,350, who was increased from \$1,200 to \$1,350 on August 15, 1912. The \$300 required for the two increases is obtained by the decrease of the position of Assistant Engineer at \$1,500 to Leveler at \$1,200 in No. 676C, as previously noted.

The following matters not on the Calendar for this day were considered by unanimous consent:

Department of Docks and Ferries—Amendments to Chapters 776 and 778 of the Laws of 1911 (No. 64).

The President of the Board of Aldermen presented the following:

March 6, 1913.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—The Committee on Terminal Improvements, in considering the plans for the construction, equipment and operation of a terminal freight railway upon the water-front of the Borough of Brooklyn, between 65th street and the Brooklyn Bridge, and in particular with a view to the joint operation of the proposed railway by the transcontinental trunk lines, has found that the existing statutes fail to give the City the power necessary to carry its plans into effect.

The statute under which terminal railways, such as that proposed for South Brooklyn and for the west side of the Borough of Manhattan, could be constructed, is chapter 776 of the Laws of 1911. This statute has been made the subject of a very careful study and analysis by your committee, and, in its opinion, the statute as it lies at present is at the same time obscure, self-contradictory and defective. It gives to the City, through the Board of Estimate and the Commissioner of Docks, the power arbitrarily to fix rates in and upon any terminal facilities created thereunder, and at the same time in effect prescribes that such rate shall be not more than enough to net for the City interest and sinking fund upon its capital investment in the enterprise. This would make it impossible for the City to secure a private operator of such terminal facilities, and, therefore, would compel the City to forego the immense advantage of securing the joint operation of the South Brooklyn terminal railway by the transcontinental trunk lines. It would practically drive the City, in the case of that railway and the one ultimately projected for construction on the west side of Manhattan Island, to the expedient of municipal operation. In the opinion of your committee, it is most unwise to limit the City's choice of operating plans.

Another limiting provision of the present law which would make private operation impracticable to the point of impossibility is the requirement that all contracts for private operation reserve to the City the power of recapture at any time upon one year's notice. Your committee is of the opinion that the City should be given a somewhat broader discretion in this matter.

Still another provision of the present law highly undesirable in the eyes of your committee is that which prescribes that all streets included within a terminal established under the act shall be taken out of the jurisdiction of the Borough President of the particular borough affected and placed within that of the Commissioner of Docks, and thereafter classed as marginal wharves. Your Committee is of the opinion that the Board of Estimate should have the discretionary power to declare which streets shall and which shall not become marginal wharves.

Still other provisions of the existing law are, in the opinion of this committee, restrictive and obstructive and require change in order that the various port improvements contemplated by the Dock Commissioner and by this Board may be carried into effect. It therefore submits herewith a proposed bill amending chapter 776 of the Laws of 1911 as indicated, and recommends that this Board approve this bill, and cause the same to be transmitted to the Legislature for introduction, and that the enactment thereof into law be urged as an administration measure.

The committee likewise has found that chapter 778 of the Laws of 1911, being in itself an amendment of the transportation corporations law providing for the incorporation of freight terminal companies, is unduly restrictive and would prohibit the very arrangement for the joint operation of the South Brooklyn terminal railway by the transcontinental trunk lines which your committee regards as one of the most valuable proposed features of that projected terminal.

The present law forbids railroads to hold stock or to acquire any proprietary interest in a freight terminal company organized under the act. As it would be necessary for the transcontinental trunk lines to organize an independent joint operating company under this act in order to undertake the operation of the City's proposed terminal railway in South Brooklyn, it is manifest that the present law would render it impossible for the City to realize the most attractive features of the South Brooklyn plan.

The committee submits herewith a bill amending chapter 778 of the Laws of 1911, which removes the prohibition against stock or bond ownership or participation by railroads in terminal operating companies. It recommends that this bill be transmitted to the Legislature with a recommendation for enactment into law as an administration measure. Respectfully submitted,

An Act to amend chapter seven hundred and seventy-six of the laws of nineteen hundred and eleven, entitled "An Act to improve the water-front facilities of the city of New York, in relation to the receipt, delivery and shipment of freight," generally.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Subdivisions (d), (e), (f), (g), (i), (j) and (l) of Section 2 of chapter seven hundred and seventy-six of the laws of nineteen hundred and eleven, entitled "An Act to improve the water-front facilities of the city of New York, in relation to the receipt, delivery and shipment of freight," are hereby amended to read as follows:

(d) "Marginal Wharf" means the area extending inshore from the bulkhead line shown on any plan for the improvement of the water-front adopted pursuant to law and constructed in accordance with such plan:

(1) Designated as "marginal street, wharf or place" or.

(2) Authorized by law to be used for the deposit, transfer, or transportation of property upon, above or under the same, or for the erection or operation of terminal ways, terminal stations, terminal stores or other terminal facilities.

(e) "Water-front property" means all wharves, marginal wharves, piers, docks, bulkheads, slips and basins, and all structures thereon and land under water beneath the same and lands under water below high-water mark, and all rights, privileges and easements appurtenant thereto, together with such land, upland, and made land adjacent to the said wharves, piers, docks and bulkheads, slips, basins and lands under water, jurisdiction of which [said land, upland and made land] may be assigned to the commissioner by the board of estimate and apportionment [.] or the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

(f) "Terminal basins" means all [basin or] basins, [harbor, or] harbors, graving or loading [dock or] docks that may be provided by the inclosure, natural or artificial, of water for the flotation, protection or handling of shipping or freight, or for transport service of any class.

(g) "Terminal ways" means a way or ways constructed or operated under the provisions of this act for the transport of freight to, from, across or along any [water-front] water-front property, [marginal wharf, slip] or canal of or in the city [or terminal stations or terminal stores adjacent or in proximity thereto] or any extension or extensions, branch or branches, approach or approaches, siding or sidings [thereof, or] bridge or bridges thereof or therefor, upon, lying upon, above or below any street, avenue, road, highway, park or parkway, bridge, viaduct, or public place or slip, canal or waterway, public or private, water-front property, lands and lands under water of or in the city, including all equipment and terminal facilities, of every kind used or operated [or owned by or] in connection with any such way so constructed or operated under this act.

(i) "Terminal stores" means a building or buildings or space [being a part of or adjacent to a terminal station] for the temporary storage of freight while in the process of delivery, shipment or transport [.] or for use for general warehouse purposes.

(j) "Terminal factories" means the space used for manufacture and for the storage incidental thereto of materials, supplies and products together with such power, light, machinery, and other facilities therefor as may be supplied in connection therewith [in premises physically connected with or adjacent to terminal ways, basins or stations].

(l) "Equipment" means elevators, conveyors and conveying apparatuses, hoists, shuttles, float bridges, transfer bridges and appliances for lighting, heating, or refrigerating, roadbed, tracks, switches, cross-overs, spurs, signals, telpers, cars, motors, engines and rolling stock of all [description] descriptions; tugs, floats and lighters; power plant, sub-stations and transformers, appliances for transmission of power by third rail, overhead wires or other means; telephone and telegraph wires and other

means of communication; together with all appurtenances and appliances appertaining thereto, connected therewith or used in the operation thereof.

Section 2. Section 3 of chapter seven hundred and seventy-six of the laws of nineteen hundred and eleven, entitled "An Act to improve the water-front facilities of the city of New York, in relation to the receipt, delivery and shipment of freight," is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 3. [The board of estimate and apportionment of the city of New York is hereby empowered to authorize the commissioner, subject to such conditions as said board may deem proper.]

(1) To adopt plans for terminal facilities and equipment thereof and therefor. [The commissioner when directed by the board or when he deems it to be for the interest of the city so to do, shall submit to the board plans for terminal facilities, which shall consist of:]

(a) A map or maps showing the area to be included in said terminal facilities, together with the location of any buildings, railroad tracks, wharves, piers, bulkheads and other structures which are to form a part thereof;

(b) A description, by metes and bounds, of all property which it is proposed to acquire by purchase or otherwise as a part of said terminal facilities. [which]

These plans when adopted [by the commissioner] and certified by the board and filed in the office of the department of docks and ferries, or any modification thereof or addition thereto thereafter so adopted [and] certified, and filed shall be the plans according to which exclusively any terminal facilities [and equipment] shall be laid out or constructed by the city, its agents or contractors, or water-front property or other property, [real or personal] acquired therefor. Whenever the plans so adopted and certified shall include the narrowing or widening of a street or the opening and construction of a new street or the abandonment of a street already in existence, the power [and the duty] to narrow, widen, open, construct, abandon or close the same, or to cause the same to be narrowed, widened, opened, constructed, abandoned or closed, shall exclusively reside with the [commissioner] board [who] which is hereby authorized to take such steps as may be necessary in that regard; and, after the same shall have been so widened or opened, the board shall determine whether [the right to maintain the widened portion of a street already opened, and such new street, shall also reside with the said commissioner; but] the street so widened, to the extent of the part so widened, or such new street opened under such plan or plans shall [not] be a public street [but shall be] or a marginal wharf [and shall be used in such manner as the commissioner shall determine].

(2) In pursuance of said plans, to acquire property for terminal facilities and equipment thereof, hereby declared to be a public use, which said property may be acquired under and in accordance with the provisions of law providing for the acquisition of property for the improvement of the water-front of the city of New York.]

[Provided, that when, at any height, or depth, an area of land is required for the purposes of such terminal facilities, the entire fee of land furnishing such area, or such lesser estate therein as said board shall deem needed for public use and direct, may be so required; and the city may use for other public purposes, or may lease or permit the use for storage, warehousing, manufacturing or otherwise of such levels and parts of levels thereof as from time to time may not be required for such terminal facilities—but at no time for more than ten years in advance and always subject to resumption by the city on not to exceed one year's notice on terms stated in such lease or permit.]

[And provided further, that the area of land to be so acquired for the purposes of this act may include such area, additional and adjacent to that required for the structure of such terminal ways or stations, as said board of estimate and apportionment may authorize and certify as required to be replotted, regraded or otherwise adapted for convenient access to and use of such ways or stations or other improvement of the water-fronts of said city in connection therewith; and that such area not required for such structure, but which may have been so acquired, after the same shall have been so replotted, regraded or otherwise adapted for such access, use or improvement, may be disposed of by the city subject to such restrictions as said board may see fit to impose thereon to promote such access or use or to effect such improvement. Moneys received by the city upon such disposition of lands so acquired shall be applied to the redemption of the corporate stock of the city of New York.]

(3) To build or cause to be built the whole or any part of terminal ways, including foundations, abutments and bridges required therefor, terminal stations and equipment thereof provided for by said plans, and generally to execute such plans.

The commissioner may by force of and with the equipment of the department execute all work authorized by or under this act and perform all duties thereby imposed upon him. Whenever any such work other than such as can be done by the force and equipment of the department or supplies or materials are needed for any particular purpose, which work is to be undertaken or supplies furnished for the city of New York, and the several parts of said work or supply shall together involve the expenditure of not more than two thousand five hundred dollars the same may be secured without contract, provided the commissioner shall certify the necessity therefor and the board of estimate and apportionment shall authorize such expenditure without contract.]

(4) To adopt rates and regulations for the use of the terminal ways, terminal stations and equipment for the transportation of property in connection therewith and to provide and enforce penalties for violation of such rules and regulations.]

(5) In the name and on behalf of the city to operate or to lease the right to operate or to permit the use of terminal facilities upon such terms and subject to such regulations as he may establish; and to carry into effect the provisions of this act the commissioner may purchase or lease or obtain in the best manner obtainable for the interests of the city, and according to law, power, light, heat and fixtures for the use thereof and other necessities and conveniences for such operation, provided that nothing herein contained shall be deemed to include the right or privilege to grant a franchise to carry on the business of generating, selling or distributing electric light, heat or power.]

[Provided that any lease or permit for operation or use shall be in such terms and subject to such conditions as shall permit its termination by the city at any time or times on notice of not to exceed one year and on terms thereby set forth; and that no lease or permit shall be made for a longer period than twenty-five years or renewed more than two years prior to the expiry of its terms; and provided also that nothing herein shall be construed to limit the right of the city by lease or otherwise to permit the occupation for use for storage, factory or any other purpose whatever, whether to be carried on in connection with or independently of such terminal facilities, or any part of its property not for the time needed and used or occupied for terminal facilities; but for terms not to exceed ten years in advance of the fixing thereof, and always subject to resumption at the option of the city on conditions definitely settled in advance.]

[Provided, however, that in case any terminal facilities shall be provided or agreed to be provided by the city as a substitute in whole or in part for any existing tracks or other transportation or terminal facilities which the owner thereof may agree to surrender in consideration of the right to use such terminal facilities so provided in substitution, or agreed to be provided in substitution, the city may for such time and on such terms and conditions as may be agreed upon lease, permit or agree in respect to such substituted use or operation.]

(6) To hire or contract for use by the city in supplement or extension of its terminal facilities such ways, stations, basins, plant or service, as, being owned or controlled by others than the city, shall be needed or proper to that end, but not for a longer period than twenty-five years, except as provided for by option to the city.]

Section 3. Section 4 of chapter seven hundred and seventy-six of the laws of nineteen hundred and eleven, entitled "An Act to improve the water-front facilities of the city of New York, in relation to the receipt, delivery and shipment of freight," is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 4. [All applications for leases of or contracts for the right to operate terminal ways, terminal stations, or terminal stores under the control of such board or commissioner, or for the transportation or storage of property thereon or therein or for the right to use such terminal ways, terminal stations or terminal stores or for the transportation of property thereon or therein shall in the first instance be made in writing to the commissioner who is hereby authorized to enter into negotiations and provisionally to agree in regard thereto. After any such provisional agreement shall have been reached between the commissioner and the proposed lessee, such provisional agreement, or if no such agreement can be arrived at, then the offer of the proposed lessee shall be transmitted to the board, which, subject to this act, shall have full power to fix the terms and conditions of a lease or other contract in the premises and to authorize its execution. The lease, when authorized, shall be executed by the commissioner and shall be sealed with the seal of the department of docks and ferries of said city.]

Upon the receipt of said plans, the board shall fix a date for a hearing, and shall direct the publication of notice thereof in the City Record, and in two newspapers published in the city of New York, to be designated by the Mayor, for not less than six consecutive days, not less than seven nor more than thirty days before the date of said hearing. Said notice shall contain a general description sufficient to identify the said plans, and shall contain a statement of the date, time and place of such meeting, and that at such time and place all persons in interest will be heard prior to the adoption of any resolution in the premises.

Section 4. Section 5 of chapter seven hundred and seventy-six of the laws of nineteen hundred and eleven entitled "An Act to improve the water-front facilities of the city of New York, in relation to the receipt, delivery and shipment of freight," is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 5. [All general or special resolutions of the Board of Estimate authorizing or certifying plans provided for in this act shall be passed after a public hearing by said board, notice of which hearing shall have been published in the City Record for at least six consecutive days not less than seven nor more than thirty days before said meeting, which publication shall contain a general description sufficient to identify the matter to be affected by the resolution, a statement of the day, time and place of such meeting and that at such meeting all parties in interest will be heard prior to the adoption of any resolution in the premises.]

After the adoption and certification of said plans, and the filing thereof in the department of docks and ferries, the board may direct the commissioner to acquire, in the name and for the benefit of the corporation of the city of New York, any and all real property included in said plans or any interest therein, which may be necessary in the opinion of the board of estimate for the creation of the terminal facilities shown upon the map or maps forming part of said plans. The proceedings for the acquirement of the title to such property shall be taken and conducted in the manner prescribed in chapter twenty-one of the Greater New York Charter.

Provided, that when, at any height, or depth, an area of land is required for the purposes of such terminal facilities, the entire fee of land furnishing such area, or such lesser estate therein, as the said board shall deem needed for public use may be so acquired; and the city may use for other public purposes, or may lease or permit the use for storage, warehousing, manufacturing or otherwise, of such lands and parts of levels thereof as from time to time may not be required for such terminal facilities.

And provided further, that the area of land to be so acquired for the purposes of this act may include such area, additional and adjacent to that required for the structure of such terminal ways or stations, as said board of estimate and apportionment may authorize and certify as required to be replotted, regraded or otherwise adopted for convenient access to and use of such way or stations or other improvement of the water-front of said city in connection therewith, and that such area not required for such structure, but which may have been so acquired, after the same shall have been so replotted, regraded or otherwise adapted for such access, use or improvement, may be disposed of by the city, subject to such restrictions as said board may see fit to impose thereon to promote such access or use, or to effect such improvement. Moneys received by the city upon such disposition of lands so acquired shall be applied to the redemption of the corporate stock of the city of New York.

Section 5. Section 6 of chapter seven hundred and seventy-six of the laws of nineteen hundred and eleven, entitled "An Act to improve the water-front facilities of the city of New York, in relation to the receipt, delivery and shipment of freight," is hereby renumbered section 8c, and as so renumbered is amended to read as follows:

Section [6] 8c. Neither in any such operation of any such way, station or store, nor in any such transport as it shall undertake, shall the city of New York be or undertake to be liable as a common carrier; but such ways, stations, stores and other terminal facilities shall be and be considered as facilities supplied by the city not for gain, but for public use and administered by it only for and on behalf of such of the public as desire the same.]

Section 6. Chapter seven hundred and seventy-six of the laws of nineteen hundred and eleven, entitled "An Act to improve the water-front facilities of the city of New York, in relation to the receipt, delivery and shipment of freight," is hereby amended by adding thereto a new section to be numbered section 6, and to read as follows:

Section 6. The board may direct the commissioner to build or cause to be built the whole or any part of terminal ways, including foundations, abutments and bridges required therefor, terminal stations and equipment thereof, provided for by said plans, and generally to execute such plans.

Section 7. Section 7 of chapter seven hundred and seventy-six of the laws of nineteen hundred and eleven, entitled "An Act to improve the water-front facilities of the city of New York, in relation to the receipt, delivery and shipment of freight," is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 7. [In fixing the rate of rent or other charge to be exacted by the city for such facilities or any of them or the use thereof, regard shall be had to the expense of operation, repair, renewal, depreciation, interest on cost and amortization within not less than fifty years of any debt incurred therefor; and such rates shall not be fixed higher than, by certificate of the commissioner, approved or as modified by the board, shall be ample for such purposes and respectively proportioned to the estimated cost of the services to be furnished. And, to such extent as the commissioner may recommend and the board approve, such rates may be temporarily put and from time to time readjusted at such lower figures as the board may consider proper to inaugurate or develop the freight terminal service hereby provided for.]

The board may direct the commissioner in the name and on behalf of the city to operate or to permit the use of terminal facilities upon such terms and subject to such regulations as the board from time to time may establish; and to carry into effect the provisions of this act, the commissioner may purchase or lease or obtain in the best manner obtainable for the interests of the city, and according to law, power, light, heat and fixtures for the use thereof, and other necessities and conveniences for such operation, provided that nothing herein contained shall be deemed to include the right or privilege to grant a franchise to carry on the business of generating, selling or distributing electric light, heat or power.

Section 8. Section 8 of chapter seven hundred and seventy-six of the laws of nineteen hundred and eleven, entitled "An Act to improve the water-front facilities of the city of New York, in relation to the receipt, delivery and shipment of freight," is hereby renumbered section 8d, and as so renumbered is amended to read as follows:

Section [8] 8d. Nothing herein contained shall be construed as in any way limiting the present or future jurisdiction of the public service commission of the state of New York, and nothing herein contained shall be construed as limiting or repealing any of the provisions of the railroad law of the state of New York. Provided, however, that it shall not be necessary before constructing a railroad as part of terminal facilities to obtain a certificate of convenience and a necessity from the public service commission.

Section 9. Chapter seven hundred and seventy-six of the laws of nineteen hundred and eleven entitled "An Act to improve the water-front facilities of the city of New York, in relation to the receipt, delivery and shipment of freight," is hereby amended by adding thereto a new section to be numbered Section 8, and to read as follows:

Section 8. In case any terminal facilities shall be provided, or agreed to be provided by the city as a substitute, in whole or in part, for any existing tracks, or other transportation or terminal facilities which the owner thereof may agree to surrender in consideration of the right to use such terminal facilities so provided in substitution, or agreed to be provided in substitution, the city may for such a time, and on such terms and conditions as may be agreed upon, lease, permit or agree in respect to such substituted use or operation.

Section 10. Chapter seven hundred and seventy-six of the laws of nineteen hundred and eleven entitled "An Act to improve the water-front facilities of the city of New York, in relation to the receipt, delivery and shipment of freight," is hereby amended by adding thereto a new section to be numbered Section 8a and to read as follows:

Section 8a. The Board may hire or contract for use by the city in supplement or extension of its terminal facilities such ways, stations, basins, plant or service, as, being owned or controlled by others than the city, shall be needed or proper to that end, but not for a longer period than twenty-five years except as provided for by option to the city.

Section 11. Chapter seven hundred and seventy-six of the laws of nineteen hundred and eleven entitled "An Act to improve the water-front facilities of the city of New York, in relation to the receipt, delivery and shipment of freight," is hereby amended by adding thereto a new section to be numbered section 8b and to read as follows:

Section 8b. If the board of estimate shall determine that municipal operation of any terminal facilities created under this act is inexpedient, it shall advertise for pro-

posals for the privilege of constructing, equipping and operating the same, or for equipping and operating after construction by the city, or for operating after construction and equipment by the city, by a notice to be printed once a week for two successive weeks in not less than two daily newspapers, to be designated by the Mayor, and may require security from bidders for the execution of their bids, if accepted. Such notice shall describe the said terminal facilities in such terms as the board of estimate shall deem proper, and shall state the time and place at which proposals will be received and opened. All proposals shall undertake to equip said facilities, unless equipment shall have been provided by the city, and to maintain and operate said terminal facilities for a period not exceeding twenty-five years, with the privilege, however, of renewing said contract for a further period not exceeding twenty-five years upon terms to be readjusted as provided in said contract. Such proposals may offer to pay to the city for the use of such terminal facilities either (1) a fixed annual sum; or (2) a share of gross receipts; or (3) a share of net receipts. The board of estimate, or a duly appointed committee thereof, shall attend at the time and place specified in said public notice and shall publicly open all proposals which shall have been received, but the board of estimate shall not be bound to accept any proposal so received, but may reject all such proposals and readvertise for proposals in the manner hereinbefore provided, or may accept any of such proposals as will, in the judgment of the said board of estimate, best promote the public interest, and award a contract accordingly. Any contract for private operation of terminal facilities shall contain a provision whereby the city, at any time after ten years, may terminate the same so far as it relates to the maintenance and operation of terminal ways, and terminal stations, and the equipment thereof, upon terms to be fixed in said contract upon giving one year's written notice of its intention so to do. Upon termination by the city, pursuant to the privilege so reserved, the city shall purchase the equipment actually used in the operation of said terminal facilities at an amount agreed upon between the owner thereof and the city; or, in the event of failure to agree, at an amount to be fixed by appraisal, each party to name one impartial appraiser, and the two so named to select the third. In the event of failure to agree upon a third appraiser, he shall be named by the presiding justice of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, First Department; provided, however, that the contract for the operation of said terminal facilities may provide for the amortization of all or a part of the operator's investment out of earnings, in which event, the portion so amortized shall become the property of the city at the termination of the contract without further payment to the operator.

Any contract for private operation may provide for the construction of warehouses, factories or other buildings on land owned by the city, which warehouses, factories or buildings shall, during construction and at all times thereafter, be the property of the city. The contract may provide for the amortization of the cost of said warehouses, factories or buildings out of receipts from their operation, or out of receipts from the operation of all the terminal facilities included in said contract during the term thereof, and may provide for the payment by the city of any unamortized portion of the actual cost plus a reasonable contractor's profit, not to exceed fifteen per cent., at the termination of the contract, or on the exercise of an option to recapture reserved in the contract. The contract may provide for the payment to the city for the privilege of operating such warehouses, factories or other buildings so constructed, either (1) a fixed annual sum; or (2) a share of the gross receipts; or (3) a share in the net profits.

The said contract may contain any other provision not inconsistent with this act which the board of estimate and apportionment may deem necessary or desirable for the protection of the interests of the city of New York.

Section 12. This act shall take effect immediately.

An Act to amend Chapter 778 of the laws of 1911, entitled "An act to amend the transportation corporations' law by adding thereto an additional article, ten-a, providing for the incorporation of freight terminal companies," in relation to the ownership or control of stock and bonds of freight terminal companies by certain corporations and joint stock associations.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Section 154 of "An Act to amend the transportation corporations law by adding thereto an additional article, ten-a, providing for the incorporation of freight terminal companies," being chapter 778 of the laws of 1911, is hereby amended to read as follows: Section 154. Three or more persons may become a corporation for the supply, maintenance and operation of freight terminal facilities—including docks, wharves, bulkheads, basins, tugs, floats, lighters and other shipping, and wharfage and lighterage for the receipt, delivery, storage or handling of freight; terminal ways for initial or final local transport of freight received for shipment or delivery in or from the locality in which the business of such corporation shall be carried on; terminal stations and stores for the receipt, storage, handling, protection and preservation of freight; terminal warehousing; freight collection, delivery and express service to and from terminal docks, terminal ways, terminal stations, terminal stores and warehouses of and for freight for transport, handling, storage, warehousing, carriage, manufacture or use thereby, thereat or in such locality; terminal factory facilities, including room, power, heat, light and machinery for the use, manufacture, handling, display, sale and shipment of such supplies, materials and products as at such locality shall or may be received or shipped as freight from or by any terminal wharf, way, station, store, warehouseman, manufacturer, or carrier doing business at such locality; and equipment for such docks, ways, stations, stores, warehouses, service and factories—by making, signing, acknowledging and filing a certificate stating the name of the corporation—which shall include the words "freight terminal company;" its objects as above set forth; the amount of its capital stock, not less than one million dollars if its principal place of business is to be in the Borough of Manhattan, five hundred thousand dollars if in the borough of Brooklyn, two hundred and fifty thousand dollars if in either of the boroughs of the Bronx, Queens or Richmond, in the city of New York, and one hundred thousand if in any other locality of the state; the number of its directors, not less than three nor more than thirteen; the names and places of residence of the directors for the first year; and a statement of the place and the limits of the locality in which such corporation shall do business.

Provided, that nothing in this article shall be so construed as to permit any freight terminal company to engage in manufacture or production except of supplies for its own use, including power, heat, light and equipment for such terminal docks, ways, stations, stores, warehouses and factories, and nothing herein contained shall be deemed to include any right or privilege to carry on the business of generating, selling or distributing electricity for light, heat and power purposes, nor shall the right, operations and use of such privileges be extended beyond the streets or marginal streets bounding or occupied by the terminal docks, ways, stations, stores, warehouses and factories operated by any freight terminal company. No railroad corporation, and no corporation or joint-stock association engaged in carrying on what is known as an express business, shall either directly or indirectly, or through the medium of a holding company or otherwise, purchase, acquire or hold any of the stocks or any bonds or other evidences of indebtedness issued by any corporation which is formed under the provisions of this article.]

Section 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

[] Old law, to be omitted; *italics*, new matter.

FRANCHISE MATTERS.

Rapid Transit Railways.

The Board proceeded with the consideration of the communication dated March 4, 1913, from the Public Service Commission for the First District submitting for approval of this Board proposed certificates, proposed contracts and proposed supplementary agreements as follows:

1. Proposed certificate to be issued to Interborough Rapid Transit Company to construct, maintain and operate certain elevated railroad extensions as follows: (a) Webster avenue line, (b) 8th avenue and 162d street connection, (c) Queensboro Bridge line, (d) West Farms subway connection, in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Queens.

2. Proposed certificate to be issued to New York Municipal Railway Corporation to lay, maintain and operate certain additional tracks on its (a) Broadway elevated line, (b) Fulton street elevated line, (c) Myrtle avenue elevated line, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

3. Proposed certificate to be issued to New York Municipal Railway Corporation to construct, maintain and operate certain elevated railroad extensions known as (a) Jamaica line, (b) Liberty avenue line, in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens.

4. Proposed form of contract to be entered into with New York Municipal Railway Corporation for the construction, maintenance, equipment and operation of additional rapid transit railroads, divided into several lines, to be known, respectively, as (a) Broadway-Fourth avenue line, (b) Culver line, (c) Fourteenth-Eastern line, and future extensions in the several boroughs of the City.

5. Proposed form of contract to be entered into with Interborough Rapid Transit Company for the construction, maintenance, equipment and operation of additional rapid transit railroads, divided into several lines, to be known, respectively, as (a) Seventh avenue-Lexington avenue line, (b) Eastern parkway line, (c) Steinway Tunnel line, (d) White Plains road line, and future extensions in the several boroughs of the City.

6. Proposed form of supplementary agreement between the City (acting by the Public Service Commission for the First District) and Interborough Rapid Transit Company and New York Municipal Railway Corporation for joint use of tracks under the preceding contracts.

7. Proposed form of supplementary agreement between the City (acting by the Public Service Commission for the First District) and Interborough Rapid Transit Company, as lessee under the preceding subway contract and as grantee under the certificate granted for additional elevated railroad extensions, for joint use of tracks for through service.

This communication was presented to the Board at the meeting of March 6, 1913, when, by resolution duly adopted, this day was fixed as the date for consideration, and the communication and accompanying instruments referred to the Corporation Counsel for his examination and to the Committee on Pending Transit Proposals for report.

The following appeared in opposition: Henry S. Wood, Fred C. Leubuscher, L. S. Bedford, J. B. Allee and Miss C. P. Fincher.

Thomas E. Clark, on behalf of Brooklyn civic associations, appeared in favor. Communications were received from the 10th Assembly District Republican Club and the 18th Assembly District Republican Club in favor.

No one else desiring to be heard, the Chair declared the consideration concluded. Action was then deferred until Monday, March 17, 1913, at 2 P. M.



Sixth.—The Company shall construct, maintain and operate its electric system subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters, as provided by the Charter of the City and in strict compliance with all laws or ordinances or departmental rules and regulations now in force,

or which may be adopted, affecting companies operating electrical conductors in the City.

No construction or repair of said electrical system shall be commenced until written permits have been obtained from the proper City officials. In any permit so issued, such officials may impose such conditions, as a condition of the granting of the same, as are necessary for the purpose of protecting any structures in the streets and avenues and the proper restoration of the surface of such streets and avenues over which such officials have jurisdiction, and the Company shall comply with such conditions.

Seventh.—The plant, conduits, wires, conductors, connections, instruments and all appurtenances thereto, shall be constructed, maintained and operated in the latest approved manner and with the most modern and improved appliances, and it is hereby agreed that the Board may require the Company to improve or add to its plant, conduits, wires, conductors, connections, instruments and appurtenances, from time to time, as such additions or improvements are necessary in the opinion of the Board. Upon failure on the part of the Company to comply with the direction of the Board within a reasonable time, the rights hereby granted shall cease and determine.

Eighth.—All cables and wires of the Company laid pursuant to this contract shall be placed in ducts, conduits or subways (referred to in this paragraph as subways). In the Borough of Manhattan and that portion of the Borough of The Bronx west of the Bronx River, such subways shall be leased from the company or companies having control thereof under the provisions of law, or from the City, should it succeed to the rights of such company or companies. In the other territory in which the Company is authorized to operate by virtue of this contract, it may construct such subways as are necessary for the accommodation of its cables and wires and no more. If the City shall construct or acquire subways for electrical conductors of the character or tension of those used by the Company or similar companies, in any or all of the Boroughs, the Company hereby agrees to lay its wires and conductors in such subways and the City agrees to lease to the Company such space as may be necessary and available for the operation of the system hereby authorized. No cables or wires shall, in the future, be strung above the surface of the streets and avenues by the Company, and those at present in existence shall be removed and placed underground when and where required by the Board or the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Ninth.—The use of any bridge under the jurisdiction of the Department of Bridges shall be at the discretion of the Bridge Commissioner and in accordance with such terms and conditions and upon such reasonable charges as he may prescribe.

Tenth.—It is a condition of this contract that the Company shall bear the entire expense of all work undertaken by reason of this grant. Any alteration to the sewerage or drainage system, or to any other subsurface or to any surface structures in the streets required on account of the construction or operation of the underground conduits herein authorized to be placed in the streets and avenues, whether the same is done by the City directly or by a contractor for the City, the Company shall, at its own expense, protect or move its conduits and their appurtenances in the manner directed by the City officials having jurisdiction over such public work.

Eleventh.—It is agreed that the right hereby granted to lay and maintain conduits shall not be in preference to or hindrance to public work of the City, and should the said conduits in any way interfere with the construction of public works in the streets and avenues, whether the same is done by the City directly or by a contractor for the City, the Company shall, at its own expense, protect or move its conduits and their appurtenances in the manner directed by the City officials having jurisdiction over the construction of such change.

Thirteenth.—The Company shall, upon request from any individual or corporation occupying or owning premises in the territory in which the Company is authorized to operate, by this contract, not in arrears to it for service already rendered, extend its wires to such premises and furnish news or other service to such individual or corporation, provided that such premises are not more than one-half mile from any other premises in which the Company has its apparatus installed at the time such request is made.

Fourteenth.—The Company shall file with the Board on the first day of November in each year a map or plan upon which shall be plainly and separately indicated the number of wires which were in use by the Company on September 30 preceding, and the streets in which the same are located, and also those which were put in use during the year preceding that date. It shall also file with the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, on or before the tenth day of each month, a map or plan of the locations in which wires have been placed by it during the preceding month.

Fifteenth.—The rates to be charged by the Company shall not be in excess of the following, and it is agreed that the same may be altered or changed by the Board as hereinafter provided.

(a) For ordinary news service, including the rental of the printing telegraph or ticker, the sum of fifteen dollars (\$15) a month, or one hundred and eighty dollars (\$180) a year.

(b) For general news service, including the rental of the printing telegraph or ticker, the sum of twenty dollars (\$20) a month, or two hundred and forty dollars (\$240) a year.

(c) For financial news service, including the rental of the printing telegraph or ticker, the sum of forty dollars (\$40) a month or four hundred and eighty dollars (\$480) a year.

(d) For any other service furnished or to be furnished by the Company the rates charged shall be reasonable and fair and subject to the approval of the Board.

The Company agrees upon request of any Board, Department or Bureau of the City government, to furnish service to any and all buildings under the control of such Board, Department or Bureau, at one-half the rates above authorized to be charged by it for whatever class or classes of service may be required.

Sixteenth.—During the term of this contract, or

any renewal thereof, the Board shall have the power, by resolution, to regulate and fix the maximum and minimum rates to be charged by the Company in the City, provided such rates shall be reasonable and fair.

Seventeenth.—The Company shall not require nor receive from its subscribers any deposit or advance payment in excess of what is reasonably necessary to insure payment of current bills, and on such amounts so paid the Company shall pay interest at the statutory rate whenever such money is held for more than one month. Twentieth.—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any individual or other corporation a similar right or privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions in the territory covered by this contract, or any part thereof.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.
