#### PUBLIC NOTICE.

"Resolved, That the public offices of this city (except those specially by iaw required to be kept open) be closed for the transaction of business on Saturday, the 26th day of December, 1885, and Saturday, the 2d day of January, 1886, being the days succeeding Christmas and New-Year's Day, respectively, so that such public offices will be so closed from Thursday in each week until the following Monday."

#### APPROVED PAPERS

Ordinances and Resolutions passed by the Common Council during the week ending Dec. 19, 1885.

Resolved, That permission be and is hereby given to the Cercle Francais de l'Harmonie to erect a bridge across Irving place, connecting the Academy of Music with Irving Hall, on the night of the 18th day of January, 1886, provided such bridge shall not interfere with the free use of the street by the public, and that the said bridge be removed and the street restored to its usual condition on the 19th day of January, 1886.

Now, therefore, be it
Resolved, That the Legislature of the State of New York be requested to incorporate on the
most liberal and well-considered basis, a free public library, which shall forever stand as a monument of the homage paid by the people to self-culture, and which shall fittingly supplement our
system of public education, constituting, with our public schools and colleges, the museums of art
and of science, a university worthy of the City of New York.

Resolved, That his Honor the Mayor and the Counsel to the Corporation be invited to
co-operate with a special committee of this Board to prepare and submit to the Legislature a
suitable memorial praying for legislation in this regard, and to draft a proper act of incorporation.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, December 8, 1885. Approved by the Mayor, December 14, 1885.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Charles Cooney to retain the stand on the sidewalk, inside the stoop-line, in front of No. 188 Sixth avenue, provided such stand shall not be an obstruction to the free use of the street by the public; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.
