

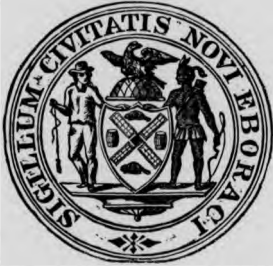

Resolved, That Michael A. Bortscheller be and he is hereby appointed a Commissioner of Deeds in and for the City and County of New York, in the place and stead of Hugh Sutherland, the name of Michael Burghard, appointed March 2, 1886, in place of said "Sutherland," being an error, no person of that name being an applicant for the office.

Resolved, That the consent of this Board be and the same is hereby granted and the permission of the Common Council is hereby given, to the Southern Boulevard Railroad Company to construct, maintain, operate and use a street surface railroad, with the necessary connections, sidings, switches, turn-outs and turn-tables, through, upon and along the surface of the following streets and highways in the City of New York, to wit:

From the beginning of the said Southern Boulevard at the upper end of the iron bridge crossing the Harlem river on the line of Third avenue; thence through, upon and along the said Southern

Boulevard and across the intersecting streets, avenues and highways, as said Southern Boulevard winds and turns, until it reaches Boston avenue, formerly called the Boston post-road, the length of said proposed railroad being about three and one-half miles.

Resolved, That the foregoing consent, authority and permission is given and granted to said company, upon the following conditions, viz.:

First—That the said railroad, and the said sidings, connections, switches, turn-outs and turn-tables shall be constructed upon the best plan for the construction of surface railroads, sidings, switches, turn-outs, turn-tables and connections in use in said city at the time of their construction.

Second—That said corporation shall comply with each and every of the provisions of chapter 252 of the Laws of 1884, pertinent thereto.

Third—The foregoing consent is given and granted upon the express condition that the provisions of chapter 252 of the Laws of 1884 shall be complied with

### Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending March 6, 1886:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 5,304.

The number of complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors was 283.

During the past week 189 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

There were issued to the consignees of vessels, to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 35 permits.

There were issued to consignees to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 7 permits.

There was issued, under the Sanitary Code, 5 miscellaneous permits.

There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy-sinks, 21 permits.

At premises where contagious diseases were reported 105 visits were made, and 42 disinfections and 19 fumigations were performed.

The number of cases of contagious diseases removed to Riverside Hospital was 8.

The number of vaccinations performed was 1,206, of which 31 were primary, and 1,175 revaccinations.

There were seized and condemned 7,045 pounds of meat.

The number of specimens of milk examined was 33, and the number of quarts of adulterated milk destroyed was 83, and the number of arrests made was 4.

The certificates of 712 births, 59 still-births, 227 marriages and 747 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, March 6, 1886. This shows an increase of 107 births, 9 still-births, 27 marriages, and 50 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week; but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1885, there was an increase of 77 births, and a decrease of 9 still-births, 76 marriages and 29 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from small-pox decreased 4; malarial fevers, 1; puerperal diseases, 2; rheumatism and gout, 2; pneumonia, 14; heart diseases, 4; convulsions, 7; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 3; suicide, 4; drowning, 4; while the deaths from scarlatina increased 1; diphtheria, 4; croup, 11; whooping-cough, 10; typhus fever, 3; typhoid fever, 3; cerebro-spinal fever, 2; diarrhoeal diseases, 2; inanition, 1; cancer, 8; phthisis pulmonalis, 8; bronchitis, 5; aneurism, 1; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 6; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 8; meningitis and encephalitis, 8; apoplexy, 6; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 5; gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, 3; Bright's disease and nephritis, 11; cyanosis and aelectasis, 8; and surgical operations, 1. The number of deaths from measles, erysipelas, alcoholism and premature and preterm births was the same in the two successive weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 132 were in institutions, 422 in tenement-houses, 175 in houses containing three families or less, 9 in hotels and boarding-houses, 9 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 11 were on the basement floor, 147 on the first, 193 on the second, 138 on the third, 86 on the fourth, 29 on the fifth, 2 on the sixth; 732 were stated to be residents of New York City and 15 non-residents; 108 were stated to be single, 180 married, 104 widowed, and the condition of 355 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 747; still-births, 59; bodies in transitu, 14; of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births, 37 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 712 births, 227 marriages, 57 still-births, 747 deaths; 14 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 116 searches of the registers of births, marriages and deaths were made, and 3 transcripts of the birth record, 5 of marriage and 78 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending March 6, 1886, was 24.2 degrees Fahrenheit, the mean reading of the barometer was 29.770; the mean humidity was 56, saturation being 100; the number of miles traveled by the wind was 2,770, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0 inches depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

## HARLEM RIVER BRIDGE COMMISSION.

PROPOSALS FOR ESTIMATES FOR FURNISHING THE GAS OR OTHER ILLUMINATING MATERIAL FOR, AND LIGHTING, EXTINGUISHING, CLEANING, REPAIRING AND MAINTAINING THE PUBLIC LAMPS (AND BURNERS) ON THE STREETS, AVENUES, PIERS, PARKS AND PLACES IN THE CITY OF NEW YORK, FOR THE PERIOD OF ONE YEAR, COMMENCING MAY 1, 1886, AND ENDING APRIL 30, 1887, BOTH DAYS INCLUSIVE.

ESTIMATES FOR THE ABOVE WILL BE RECEIVED AT THE OFFICE OF THE COMMISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS, NO. 31 CHAMBERS STREET, IN THE CITY OF NEW YORK, UNTIL 12 O'CLOCK M. OF THURSDAY, APRIL 1, 1886, at which place and time they will be publicly opened by said Commissioner and read.

Any person making an estimate for the above shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed "Estimate for furnishing the illuminating material for, and lighting, extinguishing, cleaning, repairing and maintaining the public lamps," and also with the name of the person making the same, and the date of its presentation.

Bidders are required to state in their estimates their names and places of residence, the names of all persons interested with them therein; and if no other person be so interested, they shall distinctly state that fact; also that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and that it is not made in collusion or out of fraud; and that no member of the Common Council, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of the Corporation, is directly or indirectly interested therein, or in the supplies or work to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof; which estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party making the same, that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true. Where more than one person is interested, it is requisite that the verification be made and subscribed by all the parties interested.

Each estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders of the City of New York, with their respective places of business or residence, to the effect that if the contract be awarded to the person making the estimate, they will, on its being so awarded, become bound as his or their sureties for its faithful performance; and that if he or they shall omit or refuse to execute the same, they will pay to the Corporation any difference between the sum to which he or they would be entitled upon its completion, and that which the Corporation may be obliged to pay to the person to whom the contract may be awarded at any subsequent letting; the amount in each case to be calculated upon the estimated amount of the work by which the bids are tested; the consent above mentioned shall be accompanied by the oath or affirmation, in writing, of each of the persons signing the same that he is a householder or freeholder in the City of New York, and is worth the amount of the security required for the completion of the contract and stated in the proposals, over and above all his debts at every date, and over and above his liabilities, as bail, surety, or otherwise; and that he has offered himself as a surety in good faith, and with the intention to execute the bond required by law.

Bidders are required to state in their estimates the district, or several districts, avenues, piers, parks and places, or parts of streets, avenues, piers, parks and places, in which they propose to perform the requirements herein contained, and also the illuminating or candle-power of the gas they propose to furnish, when

tested at a distance of not less than one mile from the place of manufacture; and bidders proposing to furnish any illuminating material other than illuminating or coal gas, must state distinctly what kind of material they propose to furnish, and the illuminating power of the light they propose to furnish.

Bidders are also required to state the price per year for which they will furnish the gas (of not less than sixteen candle-power by photometric test at a distance of not less than one mile from the place of manufacture), or other illuminating material for each lamp, including the lighting extinguishing, cleaning, repairing, reglazing, and painting lamp-posts and lanterns, and replacing the cocks, burners, cross-arms, cross-irons, lamp-irons and lanterns thereto, for the period from May 1, 1886, to April 30, 1887, both days inclusive; stating the price, for the above named period of one year, for each lamp.

Bidders proposing to furnish electric-lights must state the kind of system of light (whether the Voltaic Arc or Incandescent) they propose to furnish, also the candle-power of the light by photometric test, according to the London standard, and also whether the electric lamps are to be used on the ordinary lamp-posts of the city, or on special lamp-posts to be fitted up by the bidder without cost to the city for such lamp-posts or their fittings. If the light is to be by the "Voltaic Arc," the bidder is to state the number of such lamps to be used for lighting the streets or districts for which the bid is made, and the diameter of the carbon electrodes to be used in such lamps.

Bidders are also required to state a price for which they will repair lamp-posts, including strengthening and relining, and for each new lamp fitted up, as follows:

For each lamp-post straightened, stating the price per post.  
For each column relined, stating the price per post.  
For each lamp-post fitted, stating the price per post.  
For each lamp-post removed, stating the price per post.  
For each lamp-post reset, stating the price per post.  
For each new lamp fitted up, stating the price per post.

The bidders are required to write out the amount of their bids in their estimates, in addition to inserting the same in figures.

The total number of lamps to be contracted for is about 24,500, but bidders may bid for any portion of the same, naming their location as to districts, streets, avenues, piers, parks and public places, or parts thereof.

The burners for illuminating gas are to be of a capacity to burn three cubic feet of gas per hour, and to be of one inch, and in case the illuminating material shall be oil or naphtha, then the burners to be used for such illuminating material shall give a light (by photometric test) equal to the light given by such gas burners in use in the public lamps in the City of New York.

Should any alteration or any attachment be required to any portion of the lamps for which estimates are made in consequence of the use of illuminating material other than gas, then such alteration shall be done and such attachment placed on the lamps without expense to the city.

The number of hours the gas or naphtha lamps are to be kept burning during the contract is 4,000, and electric lamps are to be kept lighted 2,500 hours.

The amount of security required on any contract which will amount to \$400.00 and upwards shall be \$150.00; on any contract which will amount to \$300.00 and less than \$400.00, shall be \$125.00; on any contract which will amount to \$200.00 and less than \$300.00, shall be \$100.00; on any contract which will amount to \$100.00 and less than \$200.00, shall be \$75.00; on any contract which will amount to \$50.00 and less than \$100.00, shall be \$50.00; on any contract which will amount to \$25.00 and less than \$50.00, shall be \$25.00; on any contract which will amount to \$10.00 and less than \$25.00, shall be \$10.00; on any contract which will amount to \$5.00 and less than \$10.00, shall be \$5.00; on any contract which will amount to \$2.50 and less than \$5.00, shall be \$2.50; on any contract which will amount to \$1.00 and less than \$2.50, shall be \$1.00; on any contract which will amount to less than \$1.00, shall be \$1.00.

No estimate will be received or considered unless accompanied by either a certified check upon one of the National Banks of the City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money, to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the security required for the faithful performance of the contract. If the estimate of any bidder shall include any lamps with which the pipes or conductors of such gas are not connected, such bidder shall be required to connect such pipes or conductors with such lamps, and all such connections shall be made by the party of the second part without expense to the city.

But no payment to such bidder, on account of any such lamps, will be made until the same have been connected with the mains or conductors of such bidder, nor except for the time during which all the requirements herein mentioned shall have been performed.
