

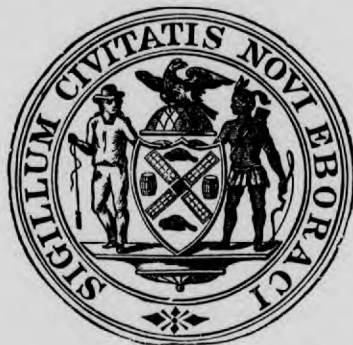

The Board of Health met this day.

Report from Sanitary Committee.

The Sanitary Committee report that whereas they find on investigation that the occupants of No. 10 Baxter street, had been ordered to vacate the building by the Department of Buildings, in order that necessary repairs may be made, that no further action is necessary on the part of this Department, and that no further action be taken in respect to the premises No. 96 Baxter street, as repairs are necessary for defects in construction and not for sanitary reason.

Resolutions.

Resolved, That a copy of the report of Sanitary Inspector Ewing on case of scarlatina in School Building, Tenth avenue corner One Hundred and Fourth street, be forwarded to the Board of Education.

Resolved, That a copy of the report of Sanitary Inspector Post upon the condition of Public School No. 17, No. 335 West Forty-seventh street, be forwarded to the Board of Education for the necessary action.

Resolved, That a copy of the report of Assistant Sanitary Inspector Morris, upon the condition of premises 412 East Thirteenth street, shall be forwarded to the Department of Buildings, for the necessary action.

Resolved, That copies of the reports of Sanitary Inspectors upon the condition of certain street pavements, etc., be forwarded to the Department of Public Works, for the necessary action, as follows:

Street pavement, in front of 47 West Third street.

Unpaved street, Sixty-eighth street, between Tenth avenue and Boulevard.

Resolved, That leave of absence be and is hereby granted to Dr. James J. Delaney.

Whereas, The investigation conducted by the Sanitary Engineer, at the request of the chairman of the Sanitary Committee, has shown that either the school sinks, or a vault built on that plan, have proved far superior to the deep privy vaults in tenement house yards, and in order that any necessary ordinance on this subject may only be passed after the fullest investigation; therefore

Resolved, That the Sanitary Superintendent report to this Board within two weeks the result of his experience on the subject of the advisability of the construction of school sinks or privy vaults of this pattern in place of the present vaults, for all new houses, and also give the reasons for the failure or success of those now in use.

Resolved, That the Register of Records be and is hereby authorized and directed to make the following corrections in the Register of Deaths:

Minnie Dirlan, died February 23, 1878, instead of Mina Dirban.

Joseph Anton Schnetzer, died February 23, 1879, age 36 years 4 months 26 days, birthplace Switzerland, father and mother's birthplace, Switzerland, instead of Joseph Schnetzer, age 33 years, birthplace Germany, father and mother's birthplace Germany.

Otto Gimelich, died December 25, 1874, instead of Otto Gruelich, the same being clerical errors.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending March 8, 1879:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,642, as follows, viz.: 5 public buildings, 850 tenement-houses, 135 private dwellings, 60 other dwellings, 8 manufactories and workshops, 11 stores and warehouses, 39 stables, 1 oil works, 1 lime kiln, 34 slaughter-houses, 3 public sewers, 2 fat-rendering establishments, 18 manure dumps, 3 lodging-houses, 1 garbage dump, 1 fertilizing works, 22 sunken and vacant lots, 2 stock yards, 3 uninhabitable dwellings, 44 yards, courts, and areas, 58 cellars and basements, 95 waste-pipes and drains, 137 privies and water-closets, 22 street-gutters and sidewalks, 15 dangerous stairways, 1 smoky chimney, 1 cesspool, 1 piggery, 7 other nuisances, together with 62 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 483.

During the past week 107 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 53 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

49 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 122 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 111 houses, 111 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

One case of typhoid fever was removed to hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 480 births, 40 still-births, 134 marriages, and 555 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this bureau during the week ending Saturday, March 8, 1879. This shows a decrease of 40 births, 11 still-births, 69 marriages, and 45 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1878, there was an increase of 19 births, and a decrease of 7 still-births, 71 marriages, and 16 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from diphtheria decreased 6; malarial fever, 1; puerperal diseases, 4; diarrhoeal diseases, 1; rheumatism and gout, 4; phthisis pulmonalis, 11; pneumonia, 10; heart diseases, 1; meningitis and encephalitis, 5; apoplexy, 3; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 4; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 4; enteritis, gastritis, and peritonitis, 4; Bright's disease and nephritis, 5; cyanosis and atelectasis, 10; surgical operations, 1; suicide, 4; drowning, 1; while the deaths from scarlatina increased 16; croup, 3; whooping cough, 1; inanition, 1; cancer, 1; bronchitis, 6; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 1; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 6; premature and preterm births, 8.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 128 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year; 188 under two years; 256 under five years, and 38 seventy years and over, which shows that the deaths of children under five years of age were 10 more than the number reported during last week, and represent 46.13 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 68 were in institutions, 296 in tenement-houses, 182 in houses containing 3 families or less, 4 in hotels and boarding-houses, 5 in rivers, streets, boats, etc., 5 were on the basement floor, 134 on the first, 163 on the second, 105 on the third, 53 on the fourth, 20 on the fifth, 20 on the sixth. 552 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 3 non-resident; 54 were stated to be single, 170 married, 69 widowed, and the condition of 315 was not stated, these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows: City deaths, 555; still-births, 40; bodies in transitu, 18. Of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births 31 were upon certificates received from the coroners. 480 births, 134 marriages, 31 still-births, 555 deaths, 18 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated. 48 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 7 transcripts of the birth record, 4 of marriage, and 34 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending March 8, 1879, was 36.5 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer 30.276, the mean humidity 69, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind 1,004, and the total amount of rainfall was .28 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the N. Y. Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 527 deaths and still-births, or 88.4 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 8; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 235; City (Pauper burial-ground, undenominational), 46; Greenwood (undenominational), 55; Lutheran (undenominational), 92; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 25; Evergreen (undenominational), 33; Woodlawn (undenominational), 10; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 4; Union (Methodist Protestant), 3; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 3; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 5; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 4; Washington (undenominational), 4.

The distribution of deaths (actual mortality) for the week ending March 1, 1879, was in the following wards, viz.: First, 7; Second, ..; Third, 5; Fourth, 19; Fifth, 10; Sixth, 10; Seventh, 28; Eighth, 15; Ninth, 22; Tenth, 30; Eleventh, 32; Twelfth, 49; Thirteenth, 12; Fourteenth, 11; Fifteenth, 8; Sixteenth, 15; Seventeenth, 37; Eighteenth, 29; Nineteenth, 92; Twentieth, 43; Twenty-first, 43; Twenty-second, 57; Twenty-third, 8; Twenty-fourth, 4.

The actual mortality for the week ending March 1, 1879, was 586; this is 50 more than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1878, and 30 more than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 27.88 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,092,813.

The annual death-rate per 1,000 persons living, of the estimated or enumerated population, according to the most recent weekly returns, of Philadelphia was 19.07; Brooklyn, 19.25; Baltimore, 20.38; Boston, 22.14; Cincinnati, 19.92; New Orleans, 19.06; Richmond, 19.08; Charleston, 28.68; Dayton, 11.24; Lowell, 21.52; Worcester, 8.94; Cambridge, 18.25; Lawrence, 19.11; Lynn, 15.34; Springfield, 21.52. BUREAU OF VITAL STATISTICS.

REPORTED MORTALITY* for the week ending March 8, 1879, together with the ACTUAL MORTALITY for the week ending
March 1, 1879.

W. DE F. DAY, M. D., *Sanitary Superintendent and Register:*

SIR—There were 555 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, March 8, 1879, which is a decrease of 45, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 16 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1878. The actual mortality for the week ending March 1, 1879, was 586, which is 30.0 above the average for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 27.88 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,092,813.

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 4 of chapter XIII. of the ordinances of 1866, entitled "Of the firing of fire-arms, cannons, and fireworks."

Section 1. Section 4 of the above-entitled ordinance is hereby amended and shall read as follows:

"Section 4. No cannon, or piece of artillery, shall be discharged or fired off in any street, avenue, lane, or public park or place within the corporate limits of the City of New York, without a written permission from his Honor the Mayor, under a penalty of twenty-five dollars for every offense. In no case shall the calibre of the cannon exceed four pounds. The provisions of this section, except that relating to the calibre of the cannon, shall not apply to the 4th day of July, in each and every year."

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office on the 4th day of March, 1879, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, the following additional sections to the Sanitary Code, for the security of life and health, be and the same are hereby adopted and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code.

Section 202. Any cattle, meat, birds, fowl, fish, fruits, or vegetables, found by any inspector or officer of this Department in a condition which is, in his opinion, unwholesome or unfit for use as human food, shall, upon the order of the Sanitary Superintendent, be removed from any market, street, or public place, and the owner or person in charge thereof, when so directed by the said inspector or by such order of the Sanitary Superintendent, shall remove, or cause the same to be removed, to the place designated by the Sanitary Superintendent, or to the official dock, and shall not sell, or offer to sell, or dispose of the same, for human food. And when, in the opinion of the Sanitary Superintendent, any such meat, fish, fruits, or vegetables shall be unfit for human food, or any such animal, cattle, sheep, swine, or fowls, by reason of disease, or exposure to contagious disease, shall be unfit for human food, and improper or unfit to remain near other animals or to be kept alive, the Board of Health may direct the same to be destroyed, as dangerous to life and health, and may order any such animals, sheep, swine, or fowls, to be removed by any inspector, police officer, officer, or agent of this Department, and to be killed and taken to the official dock.

Section 203. That hereafter no person shall gather, collect, accumulate, store, expose, carry, or transport in any manner through the streets and public places of this city, or in or to any tenement-house, cellar, or house in said city, any bones, refuse, or offensive material, without a special permit in writing from the Board of Health, in accordance with the conditions and subject to the limitations thereof, and in such manner as not to cause offensive odors or any nuisance whatsoever.
