COMMUNICATIONS FROM CITY, COUNTY AND BOROUGH OFFICERS.

The President laid before the Board the following communication from the Sheriff of Richmond County:

Sheriff's Office, Richmond County, Richmond, N. Y., January 7, 1910.

Hon. JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, President of the Board of Aldermen, City Hall, Borough of Manhattan, N. Y.:

Dear Sir—Finding it absolutely necessary for me to appoint three additional guards in the Richmond County Jail to care for the increased number of prisoners in the said jail, I would ask your Honorable Board to issue Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of three thousand and six dollars (\$3,006). This amount will be sufficient compensation for three guards at the prevailing rate of wage, which is \$3 per day. This amount will furnish salaries from February 1, 1910, to the end of the current year.

I enclose herewith a copy of the report of the Commission of Prisons, for the year 1909, and would respectfully call your attention to paragraph four of said report, which refers to the inadequate number of guards now employed in the Richmond County Jail.

This matter is of the greatest importance to me, and I would thank you and your Honorable Board for your earnest consideration of my request.

RICHMOND COUNTY JAIL.

Inspected September 27, 1909.

Located at Richmond, Staten Island, Joseph J. Barth, Sheriff; John J. Bennett, Jailer.

The number of prisoners on the day of inspection was: Men, 37; classified as follows—court prisoners, 23; serving sentence, 14. There were 3 women; 2 serving sentence and one held for the Grand Jury—making in all 40

sentence and one held for the Grand Jury—making in all, 40.

The highest number at any one time during the past year was 55; the lowest, 30; the average, about 50.

This is a well constructed, modern jail, and is receiving excellent care at the hands of the keepers. It was clean; beds were furnished with sheets and pillows with slips, and presented a neat appearance.

Recommendations.

1. The interior of the jail needs repainting; this could be done by the inmates if the City would furnish the material.

2. The jail should be connected with the city water supply. The city water pipes are now laid to within three-quarters of a mile of Richmond. The present supply is entirely insufficient. At times for two or three days together there is no water to flush the closets, an intolerable condition. The present water is pumped from a spring near by into tanks in the jail attic. These tanks are made of wood and are not watertight. After standing partly empty for a few days they dry out and leak when filled up. This leakage threatens very serious damage to the jail below. The City water supply would of course remedy this; but if that is not furnished it should be otherwise remedied.

3. The yard surrounding the jail, including the garden, should be properly and thoroughly fenced, not only for the protection of the City's property, but to keep the public from having access to the windows of the jail.

4. The City only provides three Guards, which the Sheriff works in shifts of twelve hours each; each Guard is twelve hours on and twenty-four off, so that there is never but one Guard on duty at a time. This is insufficient for the care of so many prisoners, especially when the public has access to the exterior of the jail on all sides.

Pursuant to Section 115 of the Greater New York Charter.

City of New York, Office of the Mayor,) January 11, 1910.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Gentlemen-In pursuance of section 115 of the Greater New York Charter, I transmit herewith a statement of the debt of The City of New York, and the City's borrowing capacity at the close of business December 31, 1909, which figures have been furnished to me by the Finance Department.

I am informed that it has been the custom to send you the debt and borrowing capacity as of September 30 of each year, but I considered it my duty to furnish you the figures as of December 31, 1909.

It was this fact that caused the delay in sending you the statement required by section 115 of the Charter.

At my suggestion, the heads of the different Departments and more important Bureaus of the City were each sent a letter on the 23d day of November, 1909, requesting the following information:

"First-A short statement of the most important work carried on by your Department during the year 1909.

"Second—Such recommendations as you desire to present which will increase the efficiency of your Department.

"Third-Any suggestions you may wish to make tending toward a more economical administration."

All the Departments and Bureaus requested to furnish this information have responded, and you will find their communications following the financial statement from the Comptroller's office.

You will also find statements from the different Borough Presidents in regard to the more important work accomplished by them during the year 1909.

DEPARTMENT OF BRIDGES.

Manhattan Bridge.

The work under the contract for the construction of the steel towers, cables and superstructure of this bridge was completed on October 25, 1909, nearly two months in advance of the time allowed under the contract. This is a record for not only a great municipal work, but for any undertaking of its size which, taking into account the time of construction, has been completed ahead of time.

During the year the loading capacity of the bridge, the plans of its construction, and the materials used therein, were passed upon by Ralph Modjeski, probably the best bridge engineer in the world, and were approved by him.

The bridge has four railroad tracks on the lower deck, and provision has been made for four railroad tracks on the upper deck. This provides a carrying capacity for railroads that may use the bridge of 175,000 passengers per hour each way.

Queenshoro Bridge.

This bridge was opened to pedestrian and vehicular traffic and practically completed on March 30, 1909. The Bridge Department, acting under the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, began the operation of a local surface car service back and forth over the bridge on September 19, 1909. This was done to accommodate the public pending the judicial determination of legal questions affecting the franchise of the South Shore Traction Company, that had been granted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. The operation of this surface road was successfully and economically carried on by the City until November 21, 1909, when operation was assumed by the South Shore Traction Company, whose franchise had been upheld by the courts. The New York and Queens County Railway Company began the operation of a surface car service on the bridge on October 4, 1909, this company transferring passengers from the bridge line to their other lines in the Borough of Queens.

The bridge has four railway tracks on the lower deck and provision can be made for four tracks on the upper deck. All of these facilities cannot be used until some definite scheme is submitted by the franchise-granting powers to the Bridge Department, so that specific arrangements can be made for the accommodation of the different kinds of railroads or transportation mediums that can make use of the transportation facilities on the bridge.

Madison Avenue Bridge Over the Harlem River at East One Hundred and Thirtyeighth Street.

This bridge replaces an old one, which was inadequate to accommodate the large vehicular and surface railway traffic at this point. The piers and abutments of the new bridge were completed during the year, and the draw span has been erected and work on the approaches is well advanced.

Hunters Point Avenue Bridge Over the Dutch Kills, in the Borough of Queens.

This bridge replaces an old one formerly in use at this location. A contract for the construction of the new bridge was let on July 13, 1909, and the dredging has been completed, work is in progress on the piers and abutments, and the steel is being fabricated at the shops.

Municipal Building.

This structure will be a twenty-five story office building, surmounted by a fourteenstory tower, and is located at Tryon row, Park row, Duane street and Centre street. There has been appropriated by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the construction of the building, to date, a total of \$10,200,000. A contract for the construction of the foundations of the building was entered into June 2, 1909, at a contract price of \$1,443,147. The site has been excavated and the caissons are now being sunk.

The available office space in the building will be about 651,000 square feet. This will accommodate all the various City Departments which are now using leased quarters. This building will result in a great saving to the City, the different City Departments now being in rented quarters.

Plans have been prepared for the Henry Hudson Memorial Bridge over the Harlem River, and the Eastchester Bridge over the Hutchinson River, in the Borough of The Bronx.

Plans have also been prepared for elevators and stairways in the anchor piers of the Queensboro Bridge.

In connection with your request for recommendations tending toward a more economical administration, I wish to advise you that the engineering force of this Department will be substantially reduced within a comparatively short time. The saving that will follow will not be directly reflected in the Budget. The salaries of the engineering force are charged against construction accounts, made up by the proceeds of bond issues.

Farly in 1906, and since then, it has been necessary to employ and organize a large engineering force to take care of the work of the Department. Since then the Queensboro Bridge has been completed, and the Manhattan Bridge practically completed. Through elevated railroad service has been put into operation on the Brooklyn Bridge, and elevated railroad service has been inaugurated and a subway station built on the Williamsburgh Bridge. The Flushing Bridge and the Borden Avenue Bridge, in Queens, have been completed and are in use. The Pelham Bay Bridge and the University Heights Bridge, in The Bronx, have also been completed, and the public is using them. The work still remaining in hand can now be done by a smaller force.

As a further recommendation, tending toward a more economical administration, I would suggest, in connection with the letting of public contracts, that section 518 of the Revised Ordinances be so amended that the retained moneys shall be deducted from the value of work done, until a certain limit or sum, fixed by the head of the Department, has been reached. Thereafter, the City shall pay the total amount of each subsequent estimate until the completion of the contract.

In large contracts for public work, under the present provisions of section 518 of the Revised Ordinances, retained moneys toward the completion of the work are far in excess of the sum necessary to guarantee the City against loss. The interest on the money thus unnecessarily retained is charged against the contract price in the bids as presented, and the cost of the work to the City is thereby increased.

DEPARTMENT OF WATER SUPPLY, GAS AND ELECTRICITY.

Lighting.

The Greater City has been relighted entirely, by rounding out the plans which have been in progress for four years. This statement applies without reservation as to boroughs or forms of lighting. Mantle gas lamps replaced open flame lamps, with an average increase in power of about 200 per cent. More powerful arc lamps replaced less powerful with a gain of 100 per cent. Tungsten lamps replaced carbon lamps with an increase of 200 per cent. Fifth avenue, since September 15, 1909, is, for its length, regarded by the highest experts as the best lighted street in the world, from Washington Square to Fifty-ninth street. The diffusion of light was increased there 150 per cent. Before the end of the month the highest power white flame lamps will be in permanent service on the main squares of Manhattan, a new type of lighting for large open areas. On the high average of all the boroughs New York is by technical data the best lighted city in the world.

Water Supply, Manhattan.

Twenty-nine miles of new mains were laid and 750 new hydrants set. Maps completed of every detail of the distribution service. Sewage disposal plant at Mount Kisco begun to prevent water shed pollution.

Water Supply, Brooklyn.

On the Ridgewood water shed the 72-inch pipe line, twenty-three miles long, has been completed, except for one railroad crossing, making the most distinctive feature

of the system since the conduit was laid in 1888. Three driven well stations are being built. Within Brooklyn Borough two new stations, Canarsie and Gravesend, have been completed and put in operation. Twenty-six miles of distribution mains were laid and 611 hydrants set.

Water Supply, Queens.

A new pumping station and filter plant were begun at Bayside to utilize the waters of Oakland Lake and the driven well system. A new 30-inch main to bring water into Long Island City was provided for.

Water Supply, Richmond.

The two private water companies, Staten Island and Crystal, were taken over and a complete municipal system installed.

High Pressure Fire Service.

Extensions of the system have been made in Manhattan, Brooklyn and Coney Island. That the system is now working at its greatest efficiency was shown in January, when three large fires and two small ones broke out at about the same time inside the high pressure zone, calling out the whole Department below Thirty-seventh street, forty engines and 600 men. None of the engines was used. Insurance interests agree that this was the greatest hazard in New York's history. Without the high pressure it is problematical whether the Department could have held these fires. Application is pending for the purchase of two additional pumps, making six in each Manhattan station.

BOARD OF WATER SUPPLY.

We beg to submit the following statement of the work carried on by this Board during the year 1909:

Practically all the property necessary for the building of the reservoir at Ashokan and the aqueduct to the Hill View Reservoir has been secured.

Active operations have been begun in the building of the aqueduct along the whole of the line, and the work of building the dam at Ashokan has advanced beyond the point anticipated at this time when the contract was let. As a matter of interest, it may be stated that the world record, as regards speed, in the placing of masonry in a dam has been made at Ashokan, where during the month of October 35,000 cubic yards of masonry was put in place; the nearest approach to this was at Assouan, where a record of 30,000 cubic yards was made.

Besides the necessary acquisition of property, the Board has proceeded with the letting of contracts for the work necessary and at the present time over \$50,000,000 of contracts have been let and work is proceeding thereon.

The next step in the active prosecution of this work will be to provide for the local distribution in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx, Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond, and, following along this line, this Board, on November 15, 1909, submitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment a plan for such local distribution.

In the building of the reservoir at Ashokan, it has been found necessary to remove from the old cemeteries a number of bodies, and this work is being proceeded with.

Standing timber and houses necessary to be destroyed have been deestroyed, and where necessary to be removed have been sold by the Board wherever practicable.

The police force organized under the act is performing excellent service, and at the present time it may be said that in the maintaining of peace and order they are making about twenty arrests a day, most of which are for carrying concealed weapons. At the present time the force consists of about 200 men. We think their operations have been along lines which have proven satisfactory to the people who are residents along the line of the construction work.

In regard to the request as to suggestion for more economical administration. The criticism so far as the newspapers are concerned against the action of the Board seems to have been confined to the acquisition of land through the method directed by law. While we hesitate to make any recommendation for a change of law in a matter so important to the City, we beg to suggest that, in the light of the criticisms that have been leveled at the City, it might be possible to have legislation enacted which would either create a permanent board for the acquisition of property, or place the whole matter in the hands of this Board to stand responsible for the acquisition of property as may be necessary from time to time. In any event, either of these methods would certainly prove more economical than that now pursued, particularly in relation to the cost which the actual carrying out of the proceedings now entails.

BOARD OF WATER SUPPLY.

FIRE DEPARTMENT.

The number of civilian employees is 541, assigned to the various bureaus and branches of the Department in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx, Richmond, Brooklyn and Queens.

The uniformed force in the various boroughs numbers in all 4,305; there are 132 land companies and eight floating engines or fireboats in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond, and 109 land companies and two floating engines or fireboats in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, a total of 251 companies. The fireboat fleet, consisting, as above stated, of ten companies, has a combined pumping capacity of about 78,000 gallons per minute, equal to that of 130 land engines, or almost equivalent to that of the entire land force of the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx, Brooklyn and Queens, and insures thorough protection to the vast waterfront interests of the City and to the shipping in the harbor as well.

The number of fires occurring during the nine months which ended September 30, 1909, was 9,139, with a total loss of \$5,459,613, as against 10,082 fires with an aggre-

gate loss of \$7,514,000 for the corresponding period of 1908, a decrease of \$2,054,387, or nearly 28 per cent., due to the high standard of discipline and efficiency prevailing in the uniformed force, and to the successful working of the high pressure system of fire protection installed in 1908, and operated jointly by this Department and the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity in important business centres of the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn, and the extension of which through the agency of the last mentioned Department would greatly add to the effectiveness of the means of extinguishing large fires, and is earnestly recommended.

Twelve new apparatus houses will have been finished by the end of the present year, three in Manhattan, two in The Bronx, two in Richmond, three in Brooklyn and two in Queens, and extensive alterations and repairs completed by that time in the case of a considerable number of fire houses in the various boroughs, with the result of placing them in excellent condition as regards sanitary fitness and general adaptability to the needs of the service.

During the current year a number of engine companies have been equipped with high pressure hose wagons and an automobile hose wagon, built to carry 2,100 feet of 3-inch hose and capable of traveling to fires with speed at the rate of twenty miles per hour, have been acquired, and the Department is now about to advertise for three automobile pumping engines, which, it is believed, will prove a very efficient adjunct to the present fire extinguishing apparatus in the outlying territory of the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens; the procurement of which type of apparatus has been here-tofore deferred owing to the fact that it has only recently attained its full measure of development.

It can safely be said that the Department is now well equipped in the matter of apparatus, hose, horses, buildings and equipment generally; that from a fire extinguishing point of view it has no equal in any of the cities of the old or new world, and that advance in effectiveness would now seem to lie in the direction of prevention.

To this end it is important that there should be co-operation between the Tenement House, Police, Health, Street Cleaning and Fire Departments, with a view to a fair and decent enforcement of the present laws and ordinances relating to the storage and handling of refuse matter and of various materials and substances tending to increase the number and extent of fires, notably in tenement houses, as the result would undoubtedly be a large diminution in the amount of annual fire loss and the saving of many lives. This co-operation is therefore strongly recommended.

There is need of a new fire alarm system in the Borough of Manhattan to take the place of the present system, which has been in use for many years. The matter was thoroughly investigated by the New York Board of Fire Underwriters and the National Board of Fire Underwriters in conjunction with this Department in 1905 and in the following year a bond issue appropriation of \$25,000 was authorized by the municipal authorities for the purpose of defraying the expense of the preliminary plans and specifications of the project, which were duly made and submitted by experienced engineers employed for the purpose and approved by the Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, which body, in May of the present year, authorized a bond issue of \$100,000 to provide means for the preparation of detailed plans and specifications for the work, which it is estimated will cost \$2,680,000 if certain additional subways required in connection therewith are to be built by the City, or \$2,000,000 if these additional subways are to be constructed by the Empire City Subway Company, Ltd. There will also be necessary a new building for a central office of the new system to be located in an isolated section of the Borough of Manhattan, where it would be immune from destruction from fire exposure or other cause, and a similar structure is required for the central office of the present fire alarm telegraph system in the Borough of The Bronx.

During the current year a large measure of attention has been given to the matter of reducing the cost of general supplies for the use of this Department, with the result that a saving of \$75,000 has been effected, as compared with the amount expended for this purpose during the year 1908, and in the Budget for 1910 the allowance for supplies is \$81,000 less than the appropriation for the current year.

In the matter of horseshoeing the expenditure has been \$35,000 less than that during the preceding year, and the expense for gas and electric lighting it is estimated has been 35 per cent. less than for the year 1908, although exact figures cannot be given as the matter is one coming under the jurisdiction of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, which branch of the City government has to do with the matter of providing illumination for the apparatus houses of the Department.

In the matter of forage a much better quality has been obtained during the present year than formerly, and there is now more competition with resulting benefit to the service.

These results have been due to my action in placing in charge of these matters a Chief of Battalion of the Uniformed Force, whose thorough inspections and close supervision have ensured the delivery of forage of proper weight and quality and in reducing to a minimum the cost of horseshoeing and the lighting of company quarters.

The Budget for 1910 shows an increase of less than 2 per cent. in amount over that of 1909, notwithstanding the growth in volume and extent of the many activities of the service.

As a measure of economy I have caused a reduction to be made in the number of Battalion Chiefs by increasing the number of companies in some of the battalion districts, and further steps should be taken in this direction as I believe it can be done without impairing the efficiency of the service.

The paid system of fire protection has since 1905 been extended into Rockaway Beach, Far Rockaway, Arverne, Jamaica, Richmond Hill, Flushing, College Point and a portion of the Town of Newtown, Borough of Queens, and into a large portion of the Borough of Richmond. There are now 41 volunteer companies in the Borough of Queens and 13 in Richmond, the number of such companies in existence at the time of the going into effect of the Greater New York Charter having been 76 and 57, respectively. There are now 23 companies of the paid system in the Borough of

Queens and 14 in the Borough of Richmond, and this system should, as soon as practicable, be extended over the remaining volunteer territory pursuant to the requirements of section 722 of the amended Greater New York Charter.

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

1. A short statement of the most important work carried on by this Department during the year 1909.

The most important work accomplished during 1909 is the completion of the sheds on nine (9) steamship piers between West Twelfth and Twenty-third streets, North River, which is the largest project this Department has undertaken, and excels any other work of like character.

Next in importance is the progress of the South Brooklyn water-front improvement, between Twenty-eighth and Thirty-sixth streets, which will, when completed, provide six (6) large piers for steamship purposes, varying from 1,200 to 1,400 feet in length. The dredging has been completed, and one pier between Thirty-first and Thirty-second streets, 1,400 feet long, is nearing completion. A shed thereon is in course of construction, and will be finished by July 1, 1910. During this month bids will be received for a similar pier at the foot of Thirty-third street. In the rear of these piers a sea wall is being built, 435 feet having been completed.

The Thirty-ninth Street Ferry Building, Manhattan, has been completed and the Staten Island Ferry Building, Manhattan, is nearing completion. These make two of the most imposing and useful structures in the lower portion of the City.

With and in addition to these improvements, there have been completed:

294,091 square feet of new piers,

108,900 square feet of repairs to existing piers,

1,260 linear feet of sea wall,

8,107 linear feet of new wharfage room,

-portions of which have been executed in all five Boroughs.

At St. George, Staten Island, an inclined masonry approach for vehicular traffic is being constructed to connect with the new highway under the jurisdiction of the President of the Borough of Richmond, which will provide an easier grade than the present steep hill leading from the ferry. Also, a steel viaduct for trolley cars is being constructed at the approach.

During the year improvements have been made to the ferries tending towards greater economy, the specifications for coal and the ticket system having been revised and greater saving made in repairs to ferryboats.

An increase of 4 per cent. in passenger and 7 per cent. in vehicular traffic is shown on the Staten Island ferry; a decrease of 2 per cent. in passenger and an increase of 17 per cent. in vehicular traffic is shown on the Thirty-ninth street ferry.

The Stapleton ferry was established May 27, 1909, to take care of the heavy trucking from Stapleton and vicinity.

An agreement has been entered into with the Brooklyn and Manhattan Ferry Company for the resumption of the service of two ferries from Broadway, Brooklyn, to Roosevelt and Twenty-third streets, East River, Manhattan.

An agreement has been entered into by which the ferry work at Cortland street, North River, will be finished by the Pennsylvania Railroad Company before May 1, 1911, which will give a widened exterior street and a revenue of about \$20,000 per year.

Condemnation proceedings for the acquisition of Piers (old) 8, 9, 10, 11 and private property between West Forty-fourth and Fiftieth streets, North River, are now under consideration by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund. When this property is acquired and improvements made, it will make a marginal street 250 feet wide between Rector and West Fifty-ninth streets, excepting where intercepted by the Gansevoort Market, and between West Thirtieth and Forty-second streets, where the tracks of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company and the Consolidated Gas Company are situated.

Plans have been adopted for the building of three (3) new piers at the foot of Gansevoort street, North River.

Orders have been issued for the extension of the piers at West One Hundred and Twenty-ninth, One Hundred and Thirty-second, One Hundred and Thirty-third and One Hundred and Thirty-fourth streets, North River, to the pierhead line.

A bulkhead has been completed from West One Hundred and Fifty-fifth and One Hundred and Fifty-eighth streets, North River, and one new pier has been constructed thereat

On the westerly side of the Harlem River a new plan has been adopted between Two Hundred and First and Two Hundred and Fifteenth streets.

Between Sixty-fourth and Eighty-first streets, East River, a bulkhead wall is in course of construction; nearly one-half of its length having been completed.

Between Gouverneur and Jackson streets, East River, new plans have been adopted, and the Sinking Fund Commissioners will shortly vest title in the City, whereupon three (3) new piers can be built.

A new pier has been built at the foot of Jamaica avenue, Astoria.

Plans and specifications have been completed for a new ferry house at Thirty-ninth street, Brooklyn.

2. Such recommendations as I desire to present which will increase the efficiency of this Department:

The efficiency of this Department could be increased and the criticism of all mercantile bodies abated if the canal basin in the lower part of the East River was removed to some other locality. Under the present Charter, Piers 5 and 6, East River, and the adjacent slip are set aside for canal boats. This district is greatly needed for open wharfage, and a less important section of the water-front should be set aside for the canal boats.

Plans and specifications for two new ferryboats, each having three (3) truck gangways, have been completed, and the expenditure therefor has been approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. This will greatly assist in taking care of the increased traffic at Thirty-ninth Street Ferry.

3. Any suggestions I may wish to make tending toward a more economical administration:

I have no suggestions to offer of this character, but new methods of systematizing accounts and work and modifications in construction work are taken up from time to time and put into effect.

Bureau for Collection of Arrears of Personal Taxes.

Collections amounted to \$142,059.88; 6,264 actions were brought and 5,070 closed

Bureau of Penalties

Thirty-three thousand six hundred complaints were received; 7,000 actions were brought for violations of corporation ordinances; collections amounted to \$31,000.

Tenement House Branch Office.

Twenty-one thousand seven hundred and twenty-five violations were received in tenement house matters, and 7,100 actions are pending in Building Department matters; 7,825 lis pendens were filed; about 2,000 proceedings were brought to vacate premises; \$9,814.88 in penalties was collected; 880 criminal proceedings were instituted and 231 proceedings in rem; 322 judgments were entered and about 100 precepts issued in unsafe building proceedings.

Bureau of Street Openings.

Seventy-nine proceedings were terminated by confirmation of reports by which the City acquired title to twenty-six and three-quarter miles of new streets; the awards in those proceedings were \$10,035,125.92, and the assessments \$5,023,528.39. There were 7,423 hearings before Commissioners; 713 motions were argued and twenty-four appeals argued.

Water Supply Proceedings.

In proceedings brought under chapter 724, Laws of 1905, 43 of which are pending, 45 reports were made by the Commissioners of Appraisal in which the awards for property taken were \$2,172,083.61. In other proceedings relating to the water supply 6 reports were made in which the awards were \$158,845.50.

Other Condemnation Proceedings

In the proceeding to acquire title to lands for the Manhattan Terminal of the Brooklyn Bridge, the Commissioners have made awards of \$4,559,759. The awards are approximately \$2,700,000 less than the lowest valuations testified to on behalf of the owners of the property taken. In thirteen other proceedings in which the reports have been confirmed the awards aggregate \$4,922,388.39. Reports have been submitted for confirmation in five other proceedings in which the awards amount to \$5,113,083.56.

Tort Division.

Over 500 cases were on the calendar in the First Department, about 250 of which were disposed of. The amount claimed in these actions was about \$2,000,000; the amount recovered was about 5 per cent. of that sum. Including actions which were discontinued or dismissed, the net recovery was about 3 per cent. of the amount claimed.

Division of Franchises.

The United States Supreme Court decided in favor of the City the test case upholding the constitutionality of the bill fixing the price of gas to the City at

75 cents and to the individual consumer at 80 cents per thousand feet. The City saved \$750,000 on bills due and will save about \$200,000 annually on its gas billa

The actions brought by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company to restrain the City from removing the tracks on Eleventh avenue, is now being tried before a referee and an early decision is expected.

Affirmative Actions.

In actions brought by the City, including suits against street railway companies for "car license fees" and for "paving between tracks," the office has collected upward of \$400,000. Claims have been filed and proved against street railroads in the hands of receivers and other actions are now being appealed.

Queens County Litigation.

All actions for damages caused by the operation of the City's water works on Long Island have been successfully defended. Although actions are pending in which over \$1,300,000 damages is claimed, many of the claims are being withdrawn.

Tax Cases.

During the years 1908 and 1909, 1,307 tax certiorari proceedings were disposed of The assessments under review in these proceedings amounted to \$519,641,582; the amount of such assessments claimed to be excessive was \$188,264,167.23. Of this amount in actual litigation only \$33,338,444.81 of assessments was vacated and the balance of \$155,221,572.42 of litigated assessments was sustained.

Special Franchise Assessments.

This is a matter which has been surrounded by many difficulties. The act defining special franch ses and imposing a tax thereon, creating, as it did, a quasi new species of property for taxation purposes, has given rise to many questions which could only be finally settled by judicial determination. The corporations in almost every instance brought certiorari proceedings to review the assessments for each successive year, thus imposing upon this office the conduct of a very large number of cases, each involving serious questions of law and fact. These cases were sent to Referees for trial, and there are now pending 254 separate proceedings before an aggregate of twenty-four Referees.

On assuming office in July, 1907, I realized that it was essential that some special cases involving general questions applicable to most, if not all, the cases should be pushed to final conclusion in order that general rules should be established which would simplify the disposition of all these proceedings. In pursuance of that policy, the case of the Jamaica Water Supply Company has just been concluded in the Court of Appeals, in which case that Court has laid down general principles which I think will simplify much the disposal of the pending cases.

In view of this fact, and after conference with the Attorney General, the Appellate Division was asked to and did fix a Special Term for trying these certiorari cases, and motions are about to be made to change the venue and vacate the orders of references in order that they may be brought on for hearing at this Special Term with a view of disposing of them as rapidly as possible.

Change of Grade Claims.

One hundred and two such claims have been tried before the "Change of Grade Damage Commission," and sixty before the Board of Assessors.

Debt Limit Case.

The decision of the Court of Appeals in this important action settled the question as to the method of computing the City's debt limit. I regret that the space allow me in this report will not permit of the mentioning of a number of other important decisions by the Appellate Courts.

Legislation.

There were introduced in the Legislature during the session of 1909, 110 amendments to the City Charter, and 258 other bills affecting The City of New York, exclusive of reprints and duplications and numerous amendments to the various codes and general statutes.

Only 87 bills affecting the City were passed by the Legislature and submitted to the Mayor. He approved 61 of these and vetoed 26.

One of the most important bills proposed by the Corporation Counsel and enacted with the approval of the Mayor, is chapter 74 of the Laws of 1909. It remedies defects in the assessments of bank shares for the years 1901 to 1907, inclusive, and validates assessments aggregating over \$15,000,000.

The City was in grave danger of losing this amount by reason of the decision in the case of the Bridgeport Savings Bank (191 N. Y., 88). This bill passed the Legislature two weeks after its introduction.

At the request of the Mayor, a joint resolution proposing an amendment to the Constitution with reference to condemnation proceedings, was drawn up and introduced. It passed the Assembly, but was not reported out of the Judiciary Committee in the Senate. This bill is referred to elsewhere in this report.

Recommendations.

The present system of condemning land for public uses should be revised. In my preliminary report for 1908, transmitted on December 21, 1908, I discussed this matter at length, and it is, therefore, not necessary to repeat what was said in that communication. I will merely add that further experience has convinced me of the absolute necessity for the revision of the procedure in such matters. A copy of the recommendation made at that time is attached hereto marked "Schedule A."

the same to be introduced in the Legislature, but it was never acted on by that body I hereto amex a copy of such proposed amendment marked "Schedule B."

I also desire to make another recommendation, which, if adopted, would increase the efficiency of the Department and bring about a more economical administration. The five separate offices and bureaus of the Department in the Borough of Manhattan should be concentrated into one office. Separate offices, however, should be maintained in the Borough of Brooklyn. The Charter provides for a branch office in that Borough, and experience has shown the absolute necessity and advisability of continuing that policy.

SCHEDULE A.

Recommendations.

The Corporation Counsel makes the following suggestions as to condemnation proceedings:

The existing method of condemning land is, and has been, for a long time considered by all those who are at all conversant with the subject as indescribably faulty, inefficient and objectionable. The difficulty in suggesting a remedy is largely constitutional. The Constitution of the State of New York provides, article I., section 7:

"When private property shall be taken for any public use, the compensation to be made therefor, when such compensation is not made by the State, shall be ascertained by a jury, or by not less than three commissioners appointed by a court of record, as shall be prescribed by law."

The diffculties in trying such cases before the ordinary jury of twelve have been looked upon as so manifest that the universal practice has been to resort to the other method of procedure, by Commissioners appointed by the courts. This method has proved most inefficient in practice, the two principal grounds of objection to this proceeding being, first, as to the amount of the awards; and, second, as to the great delay and tremendous expenses involved, most unjust both to the property owners and the public.

Under the prevailing system the Commissioners, being quasi judicial officers, have control of their own proceedings, can sit as often or as seldom as they see fit and grant adjournments whenever they deem proper. The length of time required for any proceeding rests, therefore, with them, and is not within the control of the Corporation Counsel, who only acts as counsel for one of the parties in interest. The Commissioners are often not only not familiar with real estate values, but also unversed in the rules of evidence as to measure of values and unaccustomed to sifting evidence and that close analysis of testimony necessary to a judicial procedure.

The only really effective remedy must be provided by constitutional amendment. which would relegate this branch of litigation to the regular courts of the State exercising equitable jurisdiction, where the matters would be decided by a Judge sitting without a jury. Such court could pass upon values very much as it does in applications for injunctions by abutting property owners to restrain the operations of the elevated railroads. Those actions are practically a condemnation proceeding of the easement of light, air and access, and this method of determining the amount of awards has proved very satisfactory. If condemnation proceedings were prosecuted before the courts in this way, sitting as Courts of Equity, the question of the value of the properties would be passed upon in regular judicial proceedings by Judges accustomed to deal with disputed questions and familiar with the rules of evidence and cross-examination of witnesses.

The above method is the only real solution of the problem, but it is open to the very plain objection that several years will be required to secure a constitutional amendment.

Another suggested remedy has been something in the nature of Condemnation Courts, or Commissioners appointed by the Appellate Division or in some other manner, at fixed salaries, to try and determine condemnation cases. There are serious constitutional questions as to some features of this plan, but probably a statute along these lines could be drafted which would not be open to constitutional objections, and such a course would have the advantage of giving prompt relief. although it would, while probably proving more satisfactory than the present system, be open to many of the same objections.

SCHEDULE B.

Concurrent Resolution of the Senate and Assembly.

Proposing an amendment to article six of the constitution by adding a new section to be known as section twenty-four, and section seven of article one in relation to a court of condemnation proceedings and other matters relating thereto.

Section 1. Resolved (if the assembly concur), That article six of the constitution be amended by adding a new section thereto to be numbered section twenty-four to read as follows:

Sec. 24. The legislature may establish a court of record, in any county not contained with other counties within a city, or in any city, containing within its boundaries more than one county, which court may be vested with original jurisdiction in proceedings for taking private property for public use, assessing property for benefits and awarding damages, and in proceedings for the review of assessments of property for taxation. Judges of such court shall sit without a jury. The judges shall be appointed in such manner and hold office for such term as the legislature may prescribe.

Sec. 2. Resolved (if the assembly concur), That section seven of article one of the constitution be amended to read as follows:

Sec. 7. When private property shall be taken for any public use, the compensa-After making that report and in order to effectuate the proposed change in tion to be made therefor, when such compensation is not made by the state, shall be of section twenty-four of article six of this constitution or by a jury, or by not less than three commissioners appointed by a court of record, as shall be prescribed by law. Private roads may be opened in the manner to be prescribed by law; but in every case the necessity of the road and the amount of all damage to be sustained by the opening thereof shall be first determined by a jury of freeholders, and such amount, together with the expenses of the proceeding, shall be paid by the person to be benefited. General laws may be passed permitting the owners or occupants of agricultural lands to construct and maintain for the drainage thereof, necessary drains, ditches and dikes upon the lands of others, under proper restrictions and with just compensation, but no special laws shall be enacted for such purposes.

Sec. 3. Resolved (if the assembly concurs), That the foregoing amendment be referred to the legislature to be chosen at the next general election of senators, and in conformity with section 1, article 14 of the constitution, be published for three months previous to the time of election.

POLICE DEPARTMENT.

The work of the Police Department increases each year, keeping pace with the rapid growth of the City. Many important events have taken place during the past eleven months, too numerous to mention in this report. Among the more important was the assassination of Lieutenant Joseph Petrosino in Italy which aroused the feelings of the people the world over. His body was brought to New York and his burial was attended by all the honors that could be given to a member of the force killed in the performance of his duty.

The removal of the former Police Commissioner by the Mayor and the resultant resignation of two of his Deputies necessitated a complete reorganization and a reassignment of the work performed by the Deputy Commissioners. After a few days of excitement the Department resumed its balance and proceeded to do police work as it came along.

The Hudson-Fulton celebration presented to the members of the force the opportunity to show the people of the City, as well as the citizens of the United States and the visitors from foreign countries, that New York has one of the best police forces in the world. The men availed themselves of this opportunity, and the work done by them from September 25 to October 2, inclusive, will never be forgotten, and has added much to the history and prestige of the Department. Many letters on file in the Department will attest to this appreciation.

The work of the force during the campaign and on Election Day further demonstrated its effectiveness.

The work of the Detective Bureau, which has grown to large proportions, is being brought up to a higher standard each year.

The Traffic Squad continues to demonstrate its necessity, and is playing a more important part each year with the growth of the population and the rapid increase in the use of automobiles and motor vehicles in the city.

Attention is called to the authorities of this city that it is their duty to demand of the legislature that adequate laws be enacted for the protection of life and property on our streets which have become so dangerous during the past year.

The work of the Bureau of Repairs and Supplies has been very great this year. To the energy of that Bureau we are indebted to the fact that we are now in the new Police Headquarters building. No. 300 Mulberry street, with its many interesting events as Headquarters, has passed into history. The work of the Department long ago outgrew the accommodations afforded by this building. The work will be better done in the new building as there is more room, and the sanitary conditions are perfect, while in the old building they were very bad.

The Electrical Bureau, one of the most important branches of police work, can give better service in the new building, where one of the finest switchboards in the United States has been installed by the Telephone Company. A new submarine cable was laid this year across the Narrows to the Borough of Richmond, giving direct connection with Police Headquarters.

The Department still suffers from an insufficient number of men to do patrol work. Five hundred additional men were asked for in the budget for 1910, and none allowed. The Police Commissioner will, of necessity, have to appeal to the incoming administration on January 1 for more men.

Five new station houses are in course of construction, two of which are near work has been purely educational with the idea of reducing the infant mortality.

Completion. Many more are needed. Some of the present station houses are hardly As a result the months of June, July, August and September, 1909, show the reduc-

fit for the men to live in, and it will be the duty of the Police Commissioner to secure appropriation for more new station houses next year.

The work of the Legal Bureau has kept up with the general increase in efficiency shown by the various departments, and has grown to be a very important branch of police work.

The work of the Harbor Patrol is in good shape, and the important duty performed by this branch of the service during the Hudson-Fulton celebration merited much praise.

The new Permanent Census Board, of which the Police Commissioner is a member, began its work in October. This Board will be required, through the Police Department, to take a census of all children in Greater New York between the ages of four and eighteen years. This will entail a large amount of work on the present force.

The work of inspection of steam boilers and the examination of applicants as to their qualifications as engineers and firemen increases each year.

The Police Commissioner believes that the drivers of automobiles and motor vehicles should be required to pass an examination and certificates given only to those who qualify, on the same theory that the law compels stationary engineers to be examined to take out a license. Whether this should be done by the Police Department or by some other authorized board is a matter for discussion.

DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH.

The death rate for the past eleven months of the year has been the lowest on record—16.12, as compared with 16.52 for last year, which was the previous lowest record.

Bureau of Records.

During the year an alphabetical card index of 500,000 certificates of births (with names of parents thereon) from 1866 to 1888, has been made and completed. This is of great value, as the number of searches made by the Bureau of Records last year was over 120,000.

It is recommended that a number of copies be printed and bound to facilitate the present work of searching and the preservation of the records.

Tuberculosis.

The use of the hospitals for contagious diseases for tuberculosis, when contagious diseases are not especially prevalent, has been made possible. Riverside Hospital, which had been previously used for the care of contagious diseases, has been set aside for the care of advanced cases. The statistics the Department has obtained during the year demonstrate the necessity for increased inspection, which has been reflected in the increased allowance in the Budget for next year. Advance has also been made in the care of cases by the opening of pavilions for women at Otisville, and by doubling the capacity of the institution at that place.

Country Milk Inspection.

Score cards are kept of the dairy and creamery inspections, and the average score has been much improved during the past year.

Several sections have been added to the Sanitary Code and many new rules made looking to the improvement of the milk supply, particularly as regards the care of infectious diseases, especially typhoid fever, occurring on the milk shed. Every creamery and dairy is visited once every six months.

It is recommended that the number of inspectors be increased so that the creameries and dairies may be inspected every sixty days.

Division of Child Hygiene.

January 1, 1910, will mark the completion of the first year of the Division of Child Hygiene, this division having grouped all of the activities of the Department that related to the health of children.

During this past year the registration of midwives has been inaugurated.

These women report approximately 50 per cent. of the births occurring in New York City. They are now under constant supervision and inspection.

Between April 15 and September 1, 18,165 children whose births were reported by midwives were visited. In this entire number but 22 cases of ophthalmia neonatorum were found. The results of this comprehensive supervision show that prophylactic measures may entirely wipe out those cases of blindness due to neglect in infancy.

Previous to the organization of this division, the number of children who obtained treatment for physical defects diagnosed by the inspectors in the school has not exceeded 6 per cent. During the past year, 84 per cent. of these children have received medical care. This work is uniform in all boroughs.

It is recommended that the staff of inspectors and nurses be so increased that the medical inspection may be carried on in all of the free schools of the City as well as in the public schools.

The work of the nurses in visiting and instructing mothers in the care of babies and in the prevention of the diseases of infancy began April 1 instead of July 1, as in former years. Over 57,000 mothers were visited and instructed. The object of the work has been purely educational with the idea of reducing the infant mortality. As a result the months of June July August and September 1909 show the reducing

tion in the death rate of babies under two years of age of over 20 per cent. as empared with the previous summer, an actual saving of 797 lives.

It is recommended that this work be continued throughout the entire year and the force of nurses increased to make this possible.

DEPARTMENT OF STREET CLEANING.

First-When I entered upon my duties as Commissioner of Street Cleaning January 1, 1909, contracts for snow removal had already been let out on the basis of payment for measurement of snow actually removed. This plan offered large opportunities for fraud, and I soon discovered extensive sales of snow tickets. Ten indictments were the result. On account of incompetency on the part of some of the contractors, hired trucks were put to work in several of the districts and a more satisfactory system of snow removal was established. Fraud also was discovered at Canal street dump. I gathered the evidence and placed it in the hands of the District Attorney. A Dump Inspector was indicted.

I caused a bill to be drafted giving the Commissioner of Street Cleaning control of the sprinkling, washing and sanding of the streets and making it possible for him to enter into contracts for such work. This bill became a law. A fund of \$100,000 was appropriated by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to ascertain by tests the merits of the latest devices for cleaning streets by water. These tests were made. I have requested an appropriation of \$500,000 for the purpose of doing this work by contract. This request has been referred to the Comptroller. These tests were made in all three boroughs. By this method I am sure that the Department of Street Cleaning aided in establishing the lowest death rate on record.

A contract for scow trimming for Manhattan and The Bronx was entered into. whereby the City receives \$1,717 weekly. The benefit to the City is very great and relieves the administration of the shifting and unsatisfactory condition of week to week agreements.

Private contractors who have previously controlled street sprinkling by a tax upon individual property owners, without responsibility to the City or any of its representatives as to the method of sprinkling, have been relieved of this work by the Department.

The use of snow ploughs has been successfully introduced, resulting in great saving to the City, and the immediate opening of the streets for traffic after a storm.

A new system of accounting has been successfully introduced, thereby giving a clear view of the expenses and distribution of the same.

In order to promote a higher standard of efficiency and to create a spirit of loyalty toward the Department among its employees, I made it possible for this Department to present itself before the taxpayers in a parade held June 3.

This was the first year that it was possible for every employee of the Department of Street Cleaning to enjoy a vacation with pay.

Great economy has been exercised, resulting in a probable saving of \$500,000. There has been a general cutting down of the Department force where services were no longer required. The repairs to scows by contract work have proved a great saving to the City, the City having no dry dock of its own. An equalization of salaries has been effected in the mechanical bureau.

The new stable in Brooklyn was opened November 12, 1909, thereby affording great relief to the Department work in the Borough of Brooklyn.

Second—As to recommendations for increasing the efficiency of the Department, I would say that by the establishment of a pension fund the incentive to faithful service will be increased and it would be possible to retire the older men and to hire younger and more efficient men. I would also recommend:

Legislation making possible a five year snow contract.

The adoption of the area system for snow removal, with proper restrictions.

Equalization of salaries in accordance with the duties and length of service of employees.

Adoption of three-horse covered trucks for ash and garbage removal.

The establishment of a special police force for use in the Department of Street Cleaning, consisting of at least fifty men.

Third—As to suggestions tending toward a more economical administration l would say that a different system of paying the sweepers and drivers should be established. An immense amount of time is lost under the present system. Another measure of economy would be the pasturing of horses which have become temporarily unserviceable.

BOARD OF EDUCATION.

The amount allowed in the Budget for 1909 for the Department of Education was \$27,270,736.80, which was \$5,560,747.85 less than the amount asked by the Board of Education. The principal reduction was in the General School Fund, in which the Board of Education included \$3,273,163.52 for increases in the salaries of teachers. The reduced appropriation prevented the Board from enlarging its work in various important directions, such as evening schools, recreation centres, kindergartens, etc.

Owing to the City's financial condition, as developed by circumstances occurring about the middle of the year 1908, the Board was compelled to call a halt in the matter of erecting school buildings, and not a single contract for a new building has been awarded since July last year.

On October 29 last an issue of Corporate Stock to the amount of \$6,699,010 for new school buildings and additions was approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. Although the Board of Aldermen has not yet approved this issue, the

providing additional school accommodations will be prosecuted vigorously. Prior to October 29 issues of Corporate Stock to the amount of \$1.275.250 were authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the equipment of buildings which had been begun before the financial situation developed as already stated.

There have been seven sites acquired during the year—three by purchase and four by condemnation-and, in addition, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment has authorized the acquisition of six sites by purchase and five by condemnation proceedings.

The number of schools under the jurisdiction of the Board of Education is 527. three training schools, nineteen high schools, five hundred and one elementary schools, three truant schools and one nautical school. The number of pupils registered on October 31 was 665,797, an increase of 22,573 as compared with the same date in the previous year.

It is very gratifying to note the constantly diminishing number of pupils on part time, notwithstanding the inability of the Board of Education to proceed with the erection of new schoolhouses. The report for October, 1909, shows 46,549 part-time pupils, which is 19,250 less than the number on part time in October of last year, and 34,984 less than in October, 1907.

THE DEPARTMENT OF TAXES AND ASSESSMENTS.

In September the Department published a volume of maps covering the entire city, which shows the assessed value of land per front foot one hundred feet deep for inside lots of normal character. The ability to publish such a map is the fruit of many years of good administration. The publication of the maps serves several purposes:

First—It aids individual assessors, by enabling them to compare readily the value on each street in their own district with every other street, and with the values fixed by assessors in neighboring districts.

Second—It renders a like comparison easy by any person interested and furnishes opportunity for intelligent criticism which may be helpful to the Tax Department.

Third—It renders favoritism difficult, and aids greatly in establishing equality of assessment throughout the city.

Fourth—This publicity of the methods employed tends to bring about that confidence in the good faith and ability of the Department which is essential to the best results.

This work is much appreciated by real estate brokers, appraisers and taxpayers here and by other cities and States. Many requests have been received from other cities for the land value maps, and for information as to New York methods. An expert from the Department has been given leave of absence and is now employed by Ohio cities to aid them in making a new assessment, the first under a new law.

The reputation for knowledge and fairness which the Tax Department has acquired is evidenced by the reduction in the number of appeals to the courts to review the action of the Tax Commissioners. Two years ago there were more writs of certiorari for the review of real estate assessments granted each year than the Corporation Counsel could try in four years. The whole force of the office could not have tried in five years the cases on hand, leaving wholly out of consideration the new cases of each year. The condition was growing worse, instead of better, and seriously interfering with the orderly and equitable assessment of real estate by the Department. Moreover, persons who had real grievances were sometimes practically denied access to the courts, on account of the impossibility of trying cases within a reasonable time.

Through the earnest efforts of the Corporation Counsel and the Tax Commissioners, the old cases have been in large part concluded by trial or by settlement. The new cases for 1909 to review personal assessments are only three in number, as compared with over one hundred often instituted in former years, and only thirty-two proceedings have been brought to review real estate assessments, not already under review, as compared with several hundred in former years.

The law for the taxation of personal property is unsuited to city conditions, but good administration has accomplished much. Persons assessed are now generally confident that the Commissioners are judges, not prosecutors, and that their legal rights will be at least as well safeguarded by the Commissioners as by the best private

While there is still room for improvement in making the personal assessment rolls, the proportion of the collection of personal taxes assessed shows great progress. About three-fourths of the personal taxes are assessed in Manhattan. The per-Board of Education has taken steps to let contracts for new buildings, and the work centage of the total levy of personal taxes in Manhattan against persons and corporations, collected up to July 1 of the year following the levy, was as follows for the last four years:

TENEMENT HOUSE DEPARTMENT.

Up to the beginning of the year 1909 the Tenement House Department was seriously hampered in carrying on two important lines of its work, owing to the lack of sufficient appropriation, one year after another, from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. These two lines were (1) the structural improvement of tenements erected prior to the passage of the Tenement House act, and (2) the periodic sanitary inspection of all tenement houses with apartment rentals of \$25 and under, as required by the City Charter.

Owing to the same hindrance (a lack of sufficient appropriation) the Department had never had sufficient force at its command to make a comprehensive survey of tenement conditions, every employee being needed to carry on the most urgent current work. In consequence, up to the present time it was not known with accuracy even how many tenements there were in the City, and of these how many were subject to structural inspection, or how many to periodic sanitary inspection. There was also no exact knowledge of the amount of structural improvement necessary to be made, as, for example, the number of interior rooms entirely without windows, or the number of school sinks remaining.

The Budget of 1909, however, provided an increase of appropriation over the year before, especially for carrying on the two lines of work above indicated, so that with the beginning of the year this work was undertaken with vigor.

An additional force of ninety-five Inspectors had to be selected and trained, after which a complete census of the City's tenements was made, for the first time in the history of the Department, giving the facts with regard to the number, distribution, rental and structural and sanitary defects of the City's tenements, which were necessary, both as a basis for future work on the part of the Department, and as a general source of valuable information regarding tenement conditions for the use of the public. The general results of this census have been published in the second quarterly report of the Department for the year 1909. A more detailed report will be made in the annual report for the same year.

Immediately after the completion of the census, the directly practical work of issuing orders for the structural improvement of the tenements was begun. The tenements were first classified according to the seriousness of the defects they showed, as indicated by the census, and were then takeen up for attention in the order of their condition, beginning with the lowest grade and taking up the higher grades one after the other in order. It is to be understood, then, that the number of houses against which orders were issued as a result of the block census is of those which show the most serious structural defects, singly or in combination, such as interior rooms entirely without windows, or school sinks, or both together. Since the first of the year to November 30, 5,401 of such tenements have been inspected and the appropriate orders issued.

The sanitary work also has been carried on in accordance with the Budget provisions, as two complete sanitary inspections of the 81,160 tenements in the City with apartment rentals of \$25 or less will have been made by the end of the year.

Meantime the volume of current work of the Department has had to be kept up as usual. During the year, up to December 1, 31,703 citizens' complaints were received and acted upon, and 91,228 violations of different classes were filed. Of these, 10,578 related to buildings in course of construction, 8,841 to buildings undergoing alteration and 71,809 to legally occupied tenements (not undergoing alteration) for sanitary or structural defects. In this latter class are to be included the structural violations filed in consequence of the block census. During the same period 1,307 plans were filed for the construction of 2,437 new tenements, to contain 36,066 families, and 3,581 plans for the alteration of 4,452 already existing tenements.

Another hindrance to the work of the Department was removed during the current year by the passage of an amendment to the Tenement House Act relieving the Department from the mandatory enforcement of certain detailed provisions of the law. In consequence, it has been possible for the Department to adjust its requirements more closely to the practical necessities of the different cases presented to its attention, and therefore secure a more substantial improvement in tenement conditions, together with a prompter compliance with the law.

With regard to the coming year, the Commissioner feels that the lines for increasing efficiency and economy in his Department have already been entered upon, and that next year's work is already planned for as a continuation of the work indicated this year.

BELLEVUE AND ALLIED HOSPITALS.

First—A short statement of the most important work carried on by the Department during the year 1909: Of the events of special importance that have taken the efficiency of the department,

place during the year, the first to be mentioned is the opening on April 28 of the new Bellevue Training School for Women Nurses. This building accommodates three hundred nurses in addition to the necessary servants, and has all the features to be found in a modern, completely equipped home for nurses. It is splendidly situated on the East River, just south of Pavilions A and B of the new hospital. There is sufficient ground to enable the building to be extended should additional accommodation for nurses be needed at any time. The effect of the new quarters is already noticeable in the better grade of pupil nurses obtained.

A contract for the boiler house and coaling station of the new Bellevue Hospital, amounting to \$394,000, was made on March 5, 1909. The site is part of a dock now being filled in by the Department of Docks and Ferries and the work has been delayed on account of unexpected difficulties which arose in connection with cutting the piles, which are entirely under water. The foundations, however, are now completed and most of the structural steel erected, and the building will be completed in the autumn of 1910.

On November 1, 1909, a contract amounting to \$445,750 was made for the laundry building and refrigerating plant of the new Bellevue Hospital. The excavations for the buildings are nearly completed.

An appropriation of \$500,000 toward the construction of Pavilions I. K, L and M of the new Bellevue Hospital was granted in June, 1909, and the detailed plans together with specifications, and a request for an additional appropriation of \$2,228,104 with which to complete the work are now before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. These pavilions will contain 544 beds for surgical cases and accommodate 77 members of the house staff. They also contain the entire operating plant of the new hospital, comprising sixteen operating rooms, with the necessary etherizing and recovery rooms and sterilizing apparatus, as well as the kitchen and dining rooms for the house staff and employees. There is also a very complete hydrotherapeutic department.

Plans have been practically completed for the laying out, improving and planting of the grounds of the new Bellevue Hospital, and an appropriation of \$25,000 has been asked with which to execute the work.

On June 7 the contractor for the construction of the pathological department and the men's dormitory of the new Bellevue Hospital made an assignment and work was stopped, but it is satisfactory to note that the sub-contractors, with the approval of the Court, have formed themselves into a company to complete the contract. Work was resumed on November 22.

Two wards in the old Bellevue Hospital have been converted into rooms for the house staff, so that not more than two physicians will have to be accommodated in one room instead of three and four, and sometimes five, as has been necessary in the past. For over two years it has also been necessary to board some of the physicians outside the hospital, and the construction of these rooms will enable this to be discontinued. The better quarters afforded will also aid materially in securing a better class of internes for the hospital.

An appropriation of \$10,000 in Special Revenue Bonds, which was obtained early in the year, has enabled the Department to make many improvements in the old Staten Island ferryboats "Southfield" and "Westfield," which are used as day camps for tuberculosis patients. The principal improvements were the painting of the interior of the boats, the construction of partitions, school rooms and kitchens, and the installation of lighting fixtures. An open-air school for children was established on each boat, the necessary teachers being provided by the Board of Education. In the spring the International Children's School Farm League laid out a garden on the grounds of Bellevue Hospital for the children aboard the "Southfield." This has not only furnished much pleasure and light recreation for the children, but has also improved the appearance of the grounds of the hospital.

The social service and convalescent relief work has been extended and two additional nurses have been appointed, whose duties are to visit the homes of the babies which have been under treatment in the hospital and in the dispensary, so as to instruct the mothers in the feeding and care of the babies.

Competent fire corps have been established at each hospital, and watchmen's clocks with a number of key stations have been installed in each institution.

Second—Recommendations which will increase the efficiency of the Department. Under this heading should be stated first the establishment of the necessary grades for the appointment of two assistant medical superintendents. Since 1902, when this Department was formed, the allied hospitals, Gouverneur, Harlem, and Fordham, have been trebled in size by the construction of new buildings, and the capacity of Bellevue Hospital increased by about one-fourth. In spite of the large increase in patients and the necessary employees, no increase whatever has been made in the executive staff. This has resulted in the defeat of many desirable plans of improvement in the details of administration. A much larger executive force than in this Department is to be found in all of the private hospitals of New York, as well as in the hospitals of the other leading cities of America.

Other appointments which are very desirable from a standpoint of better efficiency are:

- 1. An investigation to ascertain the financial standing of the patients and prevent imposition on the City;
- 2. Properly qualified anaesthetists in all the hospitals to instruct the house staff in the giving of anaesthetics;
- 3. Sufficient nurses to establish convalescent relief bureaus in each of the allied hospitals similar to that existing in Bellevue Hospital.

The Budget for 1910 includes provision for the appointment of a resident physician and a clerk in the alcoholic wards of Bellevue Hospital, and for the appointment of paid physicians and nurses in the tuberculosis clinics in the dispensaries of Bellevue, Gouverneur and Harlem Hospitals. These appointments will greatly increase the efficiency of the department,

A fire alarm system is to be established in Bellevue and Harlem Hospitals, and a new temporary reception office is to be built at Bellevue Hospital, and the space to be vacated upon its construction will be converted into bath rooms for patients. The funds for both these objects have already been appropriated.

It is necessary to construct a passageway connecting Pavilions A and B of the new Bellevue Hospital, and the admitting office of the old hospital. Plans are completed for this purpose, and a request for Revenue Bonds with which to execute the work has been in abeyance in the Board of Aldermen for many months and should be acted upon without further delay.

During the year 1910 the dormitory for men employees now in course of construction will be completed. The new building will accommodate all the men Helpers in Bellevue Hospital, and, as in the case of the Nurses and of the house staff, the better quarters will tend to secure a higher grade of employees as Hospital Helpers. About fifty Helpers are now allowed extra wages to pay their board outside, because of the lack of room for them in the hospital, and the opening of the new building will prevent this extra expense and allow all of these employees to be accommodated in the institution, thus securing better discipline and greater efficiency.

Other contemplated improvements which will increase the efficiency of the Department are:

- 1. The construction of a new training school building for men Nurses at Bellevue Hospital, the acquisition of a site for which has been authorized by the City.
- 2. The construction of a new and adequate dispensary at Gouverneur Hospital to replace the present dispensary, which is overcrowded and has been criticized by the State Board of Charities.
- 3. The construction of a training school for women Nurses at Harlem Hospital. Upon the opening of the new hospital, the nursing, which in the old building was furnished by the training school of the City Hospital of the Department of Public Charities, was assumed by this Department owing to the inability of the Department of Public Charities to supply the Nurses required. As a result of this change the Nurses employed at Harlem must be lodged in the hospital itself and in two houses leased by the City near the hospital. This arrangement is neither satisfactory nor economical.
- 4. The erection of a convalescent hospital in the country within easy reach of the City, preferably at the seashore, to which patients requiring rest and nourishment more than medication may be transferred and retained until able to resume their duties

Third—Suggestions Tending Toward a More Economical Administration—Under this heading must again be noted the need of additional Assistant Superintendents, as it is believed that with proper supervision, such as is only possible with an adequate executive force, savings could be effected in the purchase and use of supplies, the repair of buildings and in other matters which can only be properly looked after by continuous oversight.

Specifications which have been prepared for the contracts for the coming year reduce the unnecessarily high standard of milk, while at the same time secure a milk of first rate quality for the patients and employees, and provide for the payment of coal on the basis of its heating value instead of weight. Changes have been made in the specifications for other supplies which will probably effect a similar saving.

Another feature that may be included under this heading is the study of regular and detailed reports of the expenditures of the Department, such as are now being provided by the new system of accounting.

DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTION.

The most important work carried on by the Department during the past year.

Harts Island.

At this place there are two classes of prisoners:

Misdemeanants (Reformatory boys and young men).

Workhouse prisoners (overflow from the Workhouse on Blackwells Lsland).

The buildings now occupied by these inmates were originally erected to house the insane, who were, previous to 1896, cared for by the old Department of Charities and Correction. The buildings are mostly frame, constructed on the large dormitory and hospital style, and are entirely unsuited to their present use.

A new reformatory is an absolute necessity, if New York City is to have a reformatory worthy the name, and as the northerly part of Harts Island is an ideal place for such an institution, I have had under consideration for the past six months a plan for a series of buildings which would be entirely suitable for such a reformatory.

This reformatory will cost about \$750,000, and its construction should not be delayed. I have submitted the plans to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and the correspondence accompanying these plans goes very fully into the necessity for such an institution.

Workhouse.

The Workhouse on Blackwells Island, whose population runs from 1,200 to 1,500, is in fairly good condition, excepting the heating plant. This plant is in use for over thirty years, and it was only by the greatest care that it was carried along up to this time.

It was found necessary to renew the plant this year, and a contract has been made for such renewal, at a cost of.....

37,000 00

There is much need for a storehouse to take the place of the present system of a number of old wooden buildings, which might be burned down any time. This storehouse would cost about \$25,000, but when it is considered that from \$70,000 to \$100,000 worth of goods are stored in the old buildings, the expense would be justifiable.

It is the intention eventually to remove the Workhouse to some other location, probably Harts Island, but as this is not likely to occur for some years to come, I strongly recommend the construction of a storehouse which should be in keeping with the proposed layout of Blackwells Island by the Charity Department.

Provision is made for the building of a new Penitentiary at Rikers Island, the plans for which have been made, and practically, at this writing, everything is in readiness to give out the contracts.

No provision, however, is made for the transfer of the Workhouse. I would therefore recommend that plans be prepared at an early date, so that they can be well thought out, with a view to an economical and efficient arrangement of the buildings; so that when Blackwells Island comes to be turned over to the Charities Department, the Workhouse prisoners could be removed at about the same time that the Penitentiary prisoners are transferred to Rikers Island.

Penitentiary, Blackwells Island.

The completion and putting into commission of these boats will bring that part of the Correction Department service up to the highest state of efficiency.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC CHARITIES.

Among the more important new buildings completed and put in service are: The new staff house, the Superintendent's residence, the new kitchen service building at the City Hospital, the new operating pavilion and the reception pavilions, one for men and one for women, and the new neurological hospital pavilion at the City Home; the new Nurses' Home, Metropolitan Hospital; the electric transformer substation, Blackwells Island; the new Municipal Lodging House, Manhattan, and the new Coney Island Hospital, Ocean parkway, one-quarter of a mile from the beach of Coney Island. This Coney Island Hospital has a bed capacity for 100 patients, and will be opened on or before January 1, 1916.

These buildings are substantially constructed, and all fully equipped with modern apparatus and fixtures suitable for the various requirements and largely increase the efficiency of the Department in caring for the sick and dependent poor of the City.

New buildings, in the course of construction, looking to better care of the patients and employees: One, the east and west tuberculosis pavilions, the staff house, the Morgue and Pathological Laboratory and the heating plant and laundry, Metropolitan Hospital District, Blackwells Island; the new Nurses' Home, Randalls Island; the new Morgue and pathological laboratory, the new Nurses' Home and annex on west side

1

of Kings County Hospital, main building; the male helpers' dormitory and six of the eight pavilions of the Sea View Sanatorium, New York City Farm Colony District, Richmond.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment has authorized an additional expenditure of \$1,350,000 for the construction of an administration building, power house, laundry, Nurses' Home, surgical pavilion, kitchen building, stables, and for the heating, plumbing and lighting of the entire group of buildings of this Sea View Sanatorium, plans for which have already been prepared and approved by the Art Commission.

Work will be started on these buildings early in the coming year. When completed this sanatorium will provide for the care of about one thousand patients on the most advanced and scientific principles.

The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund assigned to the Department of Public Charities, on September 22, the fifty-acre plot of ground at New Brighton, Borough of Richmond, on the shore of Raritan Bay, as a site on which to establish a hospital for children, particularly those having joint diseases.

Possession of this site has been taken and the necessary action started to carry this idea into practical operation.

Bradford Street Hospital, East New York.

The construction of this complete hospital will be undertaken in a short time, with the necessary accessory buildings, complete in every detail, and will provide for the care of about two hundred patients. This hospital will be in a large and growing section of Brooklyn, at present inadequately provided with hospital and ambulance service.

Surveys and Layouts.

The work of securing surveys and layouts of the exceedingly valuable properties of this Department has been completed, with the single exception of the layout of Randalls Island, which at present is under consideration; with its adoption, definite and comprehensive plans will have been prepared for all the properties under the jurisdiction of the Department of Public Charities, insuring the development of such properties along logical and orderly lines, with definite purpose as well as true economy of means and effort.

Landscape layouts, with grading and planting plans of the City Hospital and the Metropolitan Hospital districts, Blackwells Island, have been made, and the work started on this project. This is part of a great scheme to make Blackwells Island ultimately into a hospital park for the sick poor and their friends.

General Needs.

The principal general needs of the Department are a better class of employees in the lower grades and a more rapid extension of the facilities for the care of patients and inmates of the institutions.

This can only be secured through an increase in the Budget allowance for the wages of such employees. The necessary extension of the facilities of the Department requires a large increase of the amount of Corporate Stock annually issued for improvements.

There is also need of an internal organization to give attention to the large and growing construction work of the Department, in order that the head of the Department may give more of his time and thought to the administration of the Department.

This Department is now conducted on a most economical basis. More money should be allowed in order that better help may be secured, as the employees of the Department of Charities are the lowest paid of any in the City service.

BOROUGHS OF MANHATTAN AND RICHMOND

Central Park.

Laying water mains and appurtenances.

Installation of new Croton water connection to comfort station at One Hundred and Sixth street, near Fifth avenue.

New water supply system connected with bird house and rebuilding of pelican cage, the Menagerie.

Completion of comfort station in the ramble.

Construction of an entrance for pedestrians at One Hundred and Sixth street and Central Park West.

Stone foundation laid for concreting bottom of Conservatory Lake. Erection of three-rail pipe fences along the sides of East drive, north of Fifty-

ninth street. New stationary benches placed on the Mall around music stand.

Repairs to fences and walks prior to Hudson-Fulton celebration; temporary fences erected for protection of public at dangerous points.

Construction of comfort station and shelter opposite Grant's Tomb.

Battery Park.

Erection of 100-foot steel flagpole with reinforced concrete foundation.

Corlear's Hook Park.

Erection of fence along water-front.

Colonial Park.

Removal of dead trees and planting of finished portion north of One Hundred and Forty-ninth street.

St. Nicholas Park.

Planting of park.

Erection of tool house for Department force.

Hamilton Fish Park.

Alterations to water supply system to furnish increased supply.

John Jay Park.

Construction of temporary playground in northerly portion.

Tompkins Square Park.

Erection of three-rail pipe fence around grass plots throughout the park.

Chelsea Park.

Work of constructing park commenced and comfort station and shelter erected for women and children.

De Witt Clinton Park.

Contract awarded for alterations and repairs to pergola building.

Westerleigh Park, Borough of Richmond.

New cement sidewalk and curb laid around the park,

Playgrounds.

Erection of pavilion for attendants in Hamilton Fish and Hudson Parks.

Construction of sheds over swings and sand boxes in John Jay and East River

Installation of additional swings, slides, etc., in Hudson Park and concreting of floors under swings

Running tracks in St. Gabriel's DeWitt Clinton, Thomas Jefferson and Seward Parks resurfaced.

Installation of fifty lockers in pavilions in Hamilton Fish and Thomas Jefferson Parks, and fifty additional in Seward and DeWitt Clinton Parks in connection with athletics.

Miscellaneous.

Concrete rubbish pits were built in Battery, City Hall, Hudson, Tompkins Square, Stuyvesant, Union Square and Mount Morris Parks.

The tree plots on West End avenue were regraded and sodded; about 300 new trees planted, around which tree guards were placed, from Seventieth to One Hundred and Sixth street.

Dead trees were removed from all the small parks below Fifty-ninth street, and new trees planted to replace those in City Hall and Madison Square Parks. Street trees were pruned, trimmed and cleaned of insects, etc.

Broadway Plots.

Improvement of centre plots on Broadway from Sixtieth to One Hundred and Tenth street, as follows:

New curb laid and iron curb guards placed on corners.

All plots excavated and refilled with good fertile loam.

Railings around each plot in course of erection.

Planting and sodding in progress.

Installation of water supply in each plot.

The efficiency of the Department, I believe, has been greatly improved in the past year in the matter of accounting methods, recording and checking the time returns of the working force, and in keeping record and tabulating the annual maintenance cost of each park, square and place within the jurisdiction of the Department, all of which was designed within the Department.

In addition to the important accounting methods, the clerical and working force has also been readjusted in the interest of greater efficiency.

Rigid economy has been practiced, as shown by the maintenance expenditures for parks, parkways, playgrounds, etc., which, in 1909, I estimate, will be about \$25,000 less than in 1908, and on the basis of the Budget appropriation for 1910 there should be a decrease in that year of about \$25,000 over 1909.

DEPARTMENT OF PARKS.

BOROUGHS OF BROOKLYN AND QUEENS.

Prospect Park was replanted with evergreen and deciduous shrubbery, about 10,700 plants being set out. The greater portion of the roadways were resurfaced with Hudson River gravel, and the bridle paths likewise treated. New brick and concrete gutters were constructed. The tennis shelter is nearing completion and will be ready for occupancy in the spring. One hundred and thirty thousand square feet of sods were laid throughout the park. Twenty-seven hundred feet of 12-inch cast iron water mains were laid.

The shelter house in New Lots Park was completed and opened to the public. The shelter house in Fulton Park is nearing completion.

Work of grading, fencing and laying out of playground at White, Seigel and McKibbin streets is under way.

The grading, paving, draining, etc., of Bay Ridge parkway, between Fort Hamilton and Fourth avenues, is in process.

The roadways on Ocean parkway, Bay parkway, Eastern parkway, Eastern parkway extension, Forest Park, Highland Park and Shore road were resurfaced.

A new park containing about six acres, known as Highland Park, in Jamaica, was taken possession of and improved so that it can be used by the public.

The stone retaining wall around Sunset Park was completed, and a new pipe and wire fence was erected around the lake.

Amersfort and Winthrop Parks were remodelled and planted with shrubbery.

The walks around Prospect Park Plaza and those in Fort Greene Park were resurfaced with asphalt.

A new road was constructed into and around the athletic house on the Parade Ground.

Trees were set out in Highland Park, Highland boulevard, Eastern parkway, Ocean parkway and in various small parks.

Contracts for the paving of Parkside avenue, between Flatbush avenue and the Park Circle, the Ocean parkway traffic road between Eighteenth avenue and Kings highway, and repairs to the three-arch bridge are ready, and bids will be opened during December for repairs to the bulkhead at Coney Island and the resurfacing of the Speedway on Ocean parkway.

A contract has been awarded for the construction of a bridge over the Shore road at First avenue, and work thereon will be started before the end of the year.

The trees on city streets were taken care of in a systematic and thorough manner. Ninety-one thousand four hundred trees were sprayed, pruned or otherwise attended to.

Recommendations.

Permission should be granted to enter into a contract for the construction of a retaining wall on the water-front of the Shore road. The foundation for same is partly in place and may become dangerous to navigation.

Money should also be granted for the improvement of Dyker Beach Park, this land having been in the possession of the City for fifteen years. The same is true of Canarsie Park on the shore of Jamaica Bay.

Rainey Park, in the Borough of Queens, on the East River front, has been in the possession of the Department for a number of years, but while money for its improvement has been granted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the same is not available.

Kissena Park, in Flushing, could be greatly improved at a comparatively small outlay.

The land known as the addition to the Willink Entrance has been in the possession of the City for seven years, but no money has been appropriated for its ultimate improvement.

Shelter and comfort houses are urgently needed in McLaughlin, City, Highland, Winthrop and Greenpoint Parks. Money was allowed for same, but was later withheld

Return road should be built in Forest Park, also boundary road on southerly and easterly side of the park.

Highland Park should be completed, including the erection of a suitable shelter and comfort house, money for which was granted but subsequently withheld.

Fort Hamilton avenue requires a permanent pavement from Ocean parkway to New York Bay.

The paving of the traffic road on Ocean parkway with asphalt should be continued to Coney Island.

The walks in Prospect Park not already laid in tiles are in dilapidated condition and should be provided with tile pavement.

The water supply and drainage systems in Prospect Park have outlived their usefulness, and new mains and sewers are urgently needed.

The Budget allowance for the year 1910 will necessitate economy.

DEPARTMENT OF PARKS.

BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

During the year 1909, the following work was done by this Department:

Bronx Park (Including Botanical and Zoological Parks),

Wall and fence on easterly extension of Bronx Park (begun in 1908) completed. About 126,000 plants of various kinds propagated in greenhouses, and transplanted during the year, in the beds throughout small parks and squares.

Administration building, Zoological Park (begun in 1908), now under way; will be completed about January 10, 1910.

Boundary and partition fences around elephant yards (begun in 1908) completed. Comfort station and storehouse, Zoological Park (begun in 1909), now under way. Shelter building, Botanical Garden; specifications and plans prepared; work not

Pelham Bay Park,

Hexagonal asphalt block pavement from Bartow Station to City Island (begun in 1908) completed.

Van Cortlandt Park.

Laying water pipe for irrigating purposes (begun in 1908) completed. Colonial Garden improvement (begun in 1905) now under way. Resurfaced north end of Rockwood drive and parts of Vault Hill road.

Macomb's Dam Park.

Filling in Cromwell's Creek, completed by New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, under its agreement with the City.

Filling in low lands adjacent to Robbins avenue, now under way.

Granite steps (begun in 1909) now under way.

Pipe railing (1,500 feet) erected along walks.

Crotona Park.

Laying water pipe for irrigating purposes (begun in 1908) completed. Gutters (2,500 feet) laid.

Macadam walk, 15 by 50 feet, laid on side of Municipal Building. Laying tile drains (begun in 1909) about half completed.

Claremont Park.

Fence along Clay avenue side erected and painted; 25 trees planted. Fireproof vaults in Office Building (begun in 1909) now under way. Laying water pipe for irrigating purposes (begun in 1908) completed.

St. Mary's Park.

Wrought iron fence (begun in 1909) completed.

Filled in, graded and planted northwesterly section of park.

Laying water pipe for irrigating purposes (begun in 1908) completed.

Two flights of granite steps (begun in 1909) now under way.

Asphalting walks (begun in 1909) now under way.

Walks (except asphalt surface) completed by park labor.

St. James' Park.

Foundation wall on Creston avenue (begun in 1907) completed, and fence erected. Wall erected on northerly side of park.

Parkways.

Spuyten Duyvil Parkway.

Bridle path (begun in 1908) completed.

Roadway oiled for entire length.

Railing completed on wall near western terminus.

Path laid 200 feet through glen, and steps constructed to connect same with parkway.

Portions of gutters relaid.

Considerable filling in done.

Laid out proposed addition to parkway.

Mosholu Parkway.

Improvement of glen (begun in 1908) completed; 2,000 feet of walk laid; 4,100 evergreen and deciduous shrubs planted.

Sprinkling roadway with 20,000 gallons asphaltic road oil.

New walks (2,000 feet) laid.

Granite steps from Webster avenue to bridge (begun in 1909) now under way. Stone drain (250 feet) built.

Bronx and Pelham Parkway.

Sprinkling roadway with 10,000 gallons road oil.

Asphalt pavement built over bridge of New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company.

New roadway built on southern driveway, two miles long. Gutters (2,000 feet) constructed.

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Road reconstructed from Williamsbridge to Westchester road.

Grading road along southern boundary (begun in 1908) completed as far as available funds would permit.

Laying asphalt block pavement on southerly side (begun in 1909) now under way.

General Work.

Pipe railing (10,000 feet) erected and painted.

Trees pruned (18,000).

Trees sprayed with emulsion (8,000).

Trees planted under contract (400).

Tree guards placed around street trees (1,600).

The efficiency of this Department could be increased, in my opinion, by preparing a general plan for the improvement and development of the entire system, under the direction of the Landscape Architect, by a bureau to be established, which shall make a complete survey of the parks and parkways in The Bronx system and prepare a comprehensive plan for their development, which should not be deviated from in any essential feature without the approval of some such body as the Municipal Art Commission. This would enable each succeeding administration to carry out a consistent and systematic development of The Bronx parks—at present but little developed—under a plan which will be the result of careful study of experts, and which, when completed, would result in a harmonious whole.

I am also of the opinion that the amount of money granted annually for the maintenance of this Department is inadequate, and that the same should be increased. The result of such additional appropriations will ultimately prove economical to the City, and woodlands and natural features which cannot now receive proper attention, would be preserved.

The bookkeeping system adopted in the Department during the past year provides necessary means of checking any extravagance.

MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Your Commission found itself confronted with a problem of dealing with the ever increasing number of candidates for examination. In order that the eligible lists might present to the appointing officers the names of persons best qualified for the various positions, practical tests have been given wherever possible and the results have been most satisfactory.

The newly created promotion bureau, to supervision all promotion examinations, has scored a decided advance in the administration of the Civil Service Law. While care was taken in the conduct of examinations for entrance to the service, it was considered even more important to provide a thorough and practical system of examination for the more lucrative and responsible positions. The results have been most satisfactory in the practical tests for Engineer of Steamer, Fire Department, heretofore considered impracticable, yet 571 firemen were examined in the actual operation of fire engines, the examination being held at the foot of Grand street, East River, and covering a period of thirty-one days. These practical tests have now been extended to the Labor Service and all applicants for positions as artisans and mechanics are given actual trade school tests.

Our recently adopted system of efficiency records has greatly improved the effectiveness of promotion examinations and, we believe, will prove of still greater benefit to the service.

An important step taken was the transfer, by reclassification, of Foremen and Assistant Foremen of laborers and mechanics in all departments to the competitive class. It is believed that better results can be obtained by promotion from the ranks than by the appointment of untried men from eligible lists, who would doubtless be unfamiliar with the duties required.

The Commission strongly urges that its force be augmented by the appointment of at least two examiners or inspectors for the supervision of the keeping of efficiency records in the various departments and for the better observance of the Civil Service Law.

We believe that some general scheme covering the salary changes in all departments is an absolute necessity in order to systematize the City's service, and in order that the positions and grades may conform to the civil service classification.

COMMISSIONERS OF ACCOUNTS.

Apart from the regular examinations made by this office, which are mandatory under sections 119 and 195 of the Charter, the work of this Department, during the year 1909, has consisted largely of special examinations, some of which have already been completed and the final reports filed, and others of which are now in course of prosecution. The following comprise the special examinations which were completed during the year:

Department of Parks, Borough of The Bronx—Accounts and methods

Department of Street Cleaning-Methods of snow removal.

Bureau of Highways, Manhattan—Methods and materials used in painting the

One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street viaduct.

These two are connected by a paved channel three-fifths of a mile long.

In connection with the above there is being constructed a system

Department of Street Cleaning—Inspection and removal of snow in District No. 3.

Night Court-Accounts and methods.

Individual Salary Increases—During the years 1904, 1905, 1906, 1907 and 1908. Aqueduct Commission—History and administration.

Municipal Courts, Borough of Manhattan—General administration.

Department of Street Cleaning-Delahanty Steam Dumpers.

Department of Street Cleaning-Snow removal contracts.

Borough of The Bronx—A proposed issue of Special Revenue Bonds for highway maintenance.

Purchase of coal by the various Departments and offices of the City government. Bellevue and Allied Hospitals—Purchase of supplies.

Department of Charities-Inspection of various steam plants.

Borough of Brooklyn-Accounts and methods of office of President.

Tenement House Department, Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx-Financial transactions, 1906 and 1907.

Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, Borough of The Bronx—Audit of receipts of the Bureau of Water Register, 1906, 1907 and 1908.

Receiver of Taxes, Borough of Brooklyn—Audit of receipts for six years ended September 30, 1907.

The following investigations are under way:

Department of Docks and Ferries.

Office of the President of the Borough of Queens.

Department of Bridges.

Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

It is estimated that the four examinations above mentioned will, unless the present plans are changed by the new incoming Commissioners, constitute the major part of the work of the staff for the year 1910.

The following examinations will, in all probability, be completed before the close of the present administration:

Department of Street Cleaning.

A comprehensive study of the functions of the Department along constructive ines.

Police Department.

An examination relating chiefly to questions of clerical accuracy in the drawing up of accounts.

Register's Office, Brooklyn.

An examination of the accounts and methods of this Department covering the administration of ex-Register Boulton for the years 1906 and 1907, and the administration of Register Prendergast for the year 1908.

Bureau of Weights and Measures.

An examination on a somewhat comprehensive scale of the operations of the Bureau.

Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

A thorough investigation of the activities of this Department.

Brooklyn Disciplinary Training School.

This is a special examination ordered by the Mayor at the instance of the Board of Managers of the school.

Board of Assessors.

A special matter referred to this Department by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment at the instance of the Comptroller.

In discussing the possible increase of efficiency in this Department, we desire to emphasize the necessity for additional Accountants. The examinations which are mandatory under the Charter, such as the periodical examinations of the Chamberlain's and Comptroller's accounts, demand the constant attention of a large force of men. Furthermore, it has been deemed necessary to check the accounts of fees and fines in the courts of inferior jurisdiction, both civil and criminal. The result is that but a small proportion of the working force of the office is engaged upon the special examinations which are of primary importance. If this Commission is conceived as something more than an auditing board, and if it is to assume all the broad functions conferred upon it by the Charter, it should be supplied with the necessary complement of Accountants properly to carry on its work.

AQUEDUCT COMMISSIONERS.

The most important work carried on by the Aqueduct Commissioners during the year 1909 has been the construction of the Croton Falls Reservoir (K), of the Croton system. This construction embraces a large masonry dam across the west and middle branches of the Croton River, north of Croton Falls, and an earthen dam across the east branch of the Croton River, south of Brewster, forming two storage reservoirs, one of fifteen billion and the other of one billion gallons capacity. These two are connected by a paved channel three-fifths of a mile long.

In connection with the above there is being constructed a system of highways fourteen and a half miles long to replace old highways to be flooded. Twenty miles of boundary walls enclose an area of 1,627 acres now being cleared and made ready for the storage of water.

The work has been energetically pushed forward during the year, the main dam being now built to, and including, the roadway across it, while the overfall dam (700 feet long), and spillway, together with waste channel and other appurtenances are being constructed and well under way. The earth dam, together with

its 1,000 feet overfall dam and spillway, has been built to within about fifteen feet of its top, while its channel and other appurtenances are well along to completion. The connecting channel between the two reservoirs is completed, except the three tunnels, which are to carry the water under the Harlem Railroad tracks. These tunnels are now being bored. Some water has been stored back of the dams during the past year.

Emergency cross gates are designed and being put in at Jerome Park Reservoir, Gatehouse No. 1 and at One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street gatehouse, which give better control of the working of the supply to the reservoirs and pumps; also gates and screens at the new Croton Dam; superstructures for seven gatehouses at Jerome Park Reservoir; a blow-off from the Gould's swamp siphon of the new aqueduct to empty same where required. The total cost of the above will be about \$650,000. All of the latter emergency work is being done at the request of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Together with the above, surveys have been made, not only for this work, but also for the proposed Patterson Reservoir, which latter surveys are well under way.

The cost of administration of the above work is less than 12 per cent. of the amount of work done.

During the past year, while installing gates at Jerome Park and One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, it has become very apparent that more storage capacity snould be had within the limits of the City, as it is not safe to shut off the Aqueduct, for any purpose, for more than one day. The relief for the City, in case of emergency, is the finishing of the easterly basin of the Jerome Park Reservoir, which has been held in abeyance at the request of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, for the purpose of considering the advisability of constructing a filtration plant at this point. This reservoir can be quickly constructed.

THE ARMORY BOARD.

The most important works carried on by this Department during the year 1909 were the award of a contract for a new armory for the Twenty-second Regiment Engineers, at a cost of \$535,000; the authorization of an additional story on the Seventh Regiment Armory, at a cost of \$198,000; an addition to the Twelfth Regiment Armory, at a cost of \$21,000; an addition to the Second Company Signal Corps Armory, at a cost of \$15,000, and an addition to Squadron C Armory, at a cost of \$15,000. All these additions were made necessary by the growing strength of the various organizations.

Expenditures of \$48,000 for supplies and \$53,000 for repairs have been authorized for the twenty-six organizations of the National Guard, New York, within this jurisdiction.

A total appropriation of \$885,000 has been expended on building contracts, repairs, etc., at a cost for administration, supervision and inspection of \$11,750, with no increases over the expenses of 1908.

There are under the jurisdiction of the Armory Board twenty-six organizations, naval and military, housed in twenty-two buildings, aggregating in value. with the equipment, \$14,000,000.

I can suggest nothing that would tend to make the administration of the Department more efficient or more economical.

COMMISSIONER OF LICENSES.

The Commissioner of Licenses, who is charged with the enforcement of the law governing employment agencies, reports that during the year 1909 there were 2,020 complaints against such agencies received and investigated by his office. Of these investigations, 560 cases involved separate hearings or trials before the Commissioner.

As a result of the complaints made, the sum of \$3,270 was ordered refunded to the various seekers for employment and \$954.18 to applicants for help.

There were, during the year, fifteen licenses of employment agencies revoked for the various causes, two of which involved the sending of girls to disorderly houses. The total number of inspections made by the Inspectors' staff was approximately 5,000. The agencies under regulation include not only those who supply domestic servants, but the labor, stenographic, theatrical, technical, clerical and shipping agencies and nurses' registries. The total number of licenses issued was 798.

Since the enactment of the Employment Agency Law, five years ago, the abuses which were formerly complained of are almost wholly eliminated. The once prevalent system of robbing the unemployed by charging extortionate fees no longer exists. Those agencies on the lower east side of Manhattan, through which girls were frequently sent to disorderly or undesirable places, have been driven out of business.

Referring to the second and third questions in your communication, I cannot, at present, see a way to increase the efficiency of this office by reductions in either force of employees or salaries. In fact, the Board of Estimate was recently asked for a small increase in my appropriation, for the purpose of enlarging the scope and results of our work, but the request was denied, after due consideration and the conclusion that the increase was not an urgent necessity.

MAYOR'S BUREAU OF WEIGHTS AND MEASURES.

The efforts of the Bureau were directed towards stopping the practice of selling short weight packages, principally the necessaries of life, but such efforts were discon-

tinued for the reason that the Courts ruled that the work was not within the jurisdiction of the Bureau.

One thousand five hundred and forty (1,540) violations against dealers of coal, meat, groceries and other commodities were reported to the Corporation Counsel for prosecution which involved penalties of approximately thirty-three thousand dollars (\$33,000), about ten thousand of which have been collected.

To stop short weight and measure practices it is most necessary that the ordinance be revised, and in that respect I would suggest consideration of the following recommendations:

That the sale of various commodities, principally the necessaries of life, be brought under the Bureau's control.

That authority over the make and pattern of any weighing or measuring instrument used in buying or selling be given the Bureau.

That all liquids be sold by wet measure or by weight.

That all dry commodities be sold by dry measure or by weight,

That all instruments intended to be used for weighing or measuring be tested by the Bureau before using.

That a testing and weighing station be established in each borough.

That full supervision over official coal scales be lodged with the Bureau.

That all coal and ice be sold by weight or special agreement.

That a set standard for barrels, boxes, crates, or baskets as used in the purchase or sale of farm products be established.

That every license, or renewal thereof, issued to peddlers or hucksters shall have printed on the back extracts from the short weight law in various languages.

That possession of an incorrect scale or measure by a peddler or huckster be considered as prima facie evidence of intention to defraud.

That all public weighers be licensed, and be placed under the jurisdiction of the Bureau.

That a liquid standard conforming to the standard of the Internal Revenue Department be adopted, such to be standard for barrels and casks to be used for spirits or beers.

That penalties be increased from the \$10 and \$25 now in effect to \$25, \$50 and \$100. In conclusion, I would suggest that the penalty for short weight be increased as proposed; if this be done the Bureau will become a revenue producer, judging from the amount of collections the last year, which was over \$10,000.

MAYOR'S OFFICE—BUREAU OF LICENSES.

The total number of licenses issued was 49,418. The total amount of money received by the Bureau for the issuance of said licenses was \$281,459.75.

A new system of issuing licenses and filing daily reports with the Comptroller was introduced by me, thus increasing the efficiency and accuracy of the Bureau. With this end in view I would also recommend that each license bear upon it some evidence of the identification of the licensee, and furthermore, that lay inspectors be substituted for the police squad now attached to the Bureau, thus restoring two Sergeants and twenty-eight Patrolmen to active duty on the Police Force.

Patrolmen are paid at the rate of \$1,400 per annum and I feel certain that we could secure competent Inspectors for \$1,200 a year or less.

PRESIDENT OF THE BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN.

A few of the most important works carried to completion during the present year have been the erection and opening of two interior baths—one situated at Cherry and Oliver streets and the other at No. 83 Carmine street. These will provide adequate bathing facilities in two very thickly populated neighborhoods. Another is now almost completed at Rutgers and Jefferson streets, and will be ready for operation in the very near future.

Another important improvement carried to a successful issue has been the widening of Fifth avenue, from Twenty-fifth to Forty-eighth street, thereby relieving the congestion formerly existing in that thoroughfare, and which improvement should be continued to Central Park at Fifty-ninth street.

I also consider the repaying of Central Park West, from Fifty-ninth street to One Hundred and Tenth street, and First avenue, from Nineteenth street to Fifty-ninth street, of great public benefit.

Central Park West was paved with asphalt on an old belgian block foundation and the cost of keeping it in repair was so great that it was found to be cheaper to remove the paving blocks, lay a concrete foundation and put down a new asphalt pavement.

First avenue was also covered with an asphalt pavement laid on belgian blocks, and on account of the heavy vehicular traffic was continually full of ruts and holes in spite of our efforts to keep it in good condition. It has now been paved with granite blocks on a concrete foundation, the only pavement suitable for heavy traffic.

In addition to these, this Department has repayed many miles of streets with granite, sheet asphalt, block asphalt and wood block pavement. It has also built and repaired a considerable amount of sewers.

Since my accession to this office I have advocated the reconstruction of old sewers whose long life and insufficient size have rendered them inadequate for the service of the locality in which they exist, a work that for years to come will require the constant attention of this Department.

I have, as far as possible, encouraged the construction of public sewers in the upper section of this Borough, and have deprecated the construction of sewers by private individuals who wish to quickly dispose of the property affected, because in the

first place the Bureau of Sewers has a staff of Engineers sufficient in size and competence to properly complete the sewer system in this Borough, and for the further reason that a sewer constructed not under the supervision of the Bureau of Engineers, but by private interests will invariably be to some degree, however slight, at variance with the ultimate plans or desires of this Department.

I have strongly advocated in the past, and still advocate with increased emphasis, the appointment of an Engineer to inspect and examine steam pipes entering sewers from private buildings. These pipes in many instances exhaust live steam in such quantities as to make it absolutely unsafe for our employees to work in the sewer in the neighborhood of their entrance. It also occasions disintegration of the mortar joints and causes many cave-ins. This is a violation of the corporation ordinances and punishable by a fine, but the Department at the present time is without expert steam engineers who have sufficient technical knowledge to trace the pipes to their connection with the boilers, and therefore unable to legally prove the violation. This should he remedied at once.

One of the mose serious problems that will confront this Department in the near future will be the proper arrangement and placing of the sewer system of this Borough beneath the streets because of the congested condition caused by subsurface pipes etc., the largest portion of which is in the railroad area, which makes it very difficult to reach the sewer for purposes of cleaning and repairing. This can be easily understood, for the sewer being the lowest structure is the hardest to get at in case of accident.

The result of this congestion and inaccessibility to the sewer system will be the entire reconstruction of the sewer system of this Borough along new lines, which, as I stated in my annual report, will entail a very large expenditure, but the importance of the work cannot be overestimated.

In view of the development of the system of tunnels in this Borough, the fact above stated is particularly pertinent to the incoming administration.

The allowing of gasoline to escape into the sewers is another problem which ha been combated, I am happy to say, with considerable success, but still requires the constant attention of our Inspectors.

I have taken personal supervision over the openings made in the pavement by the various corporations, and where there has been negligence shown in making the necessary repairs, I have had the locations referred to me by the Engineer of Highways, when by means of a carefully recorded "follow up" system I have secured the restoration of the cuts submitted within a reasonable time.

In the Inspection Division of the Bureau of Highways we have at the present time the most effective method of keeping the streets paved with asphalt or wood block in good condition yet devised. It has indeed been instrumental in securing the restora tion of 75,000 defects during the year 1908, and without doubt an equally large number of repairs will be effected this year. Of course the only adequate solution of the problem of keeping the asphalt pavement in repair is the establishment of a municipal asphalt repair plant, and in this connection I feel safe in stating that the initial expenditures would be more than offset in the saving in the cost and rapidity of repairs The saving in yardage would be large, because repairs would be made as soon as re ported. The saving in the cost of repairs to streets on which contracts have expired and the avoiding of costly damage suits as a result of accidents occasioned by serious defects would be immense.

With regard to the public baths and comfort stations I have endeavored to see and feel it essential that they should be properly supervised. A system of direct control and communication should exist between these places and the Bureau head. In that way many of the conditions that were heretofore complained of could be rooted out. This is true of all outlying divisions or stations of this Department.

In order to secure the proper degree of efficiency this control and communication should exist by means of honest, efficient and reliable supervisors who would be in daily touch with all the outlying stations as signed to their respective jurisdiction, and who by daily report would acquaint the Bureau head of conditions as they exist at all times.

The inspection of work and materials, and the report on bills pertaining to same should be similarly systematized, so that a definite system as to report inspection and time consumed in same could be established.

I desire at this time to call attention to the condition of the Criminel Courts Building on Centre street. As you are aware, it has been declared unsafe by the Superintendent of Buildings, and although temporary repairs have been made, tending to make the structure habitable, at a cost of approximately \$10,000, it is only a "makeshift," and the same will be necessary again in the very near future. The proper method to pursue, in my opinion, is to arrange for a new foundation, constructed according to modern methods, and not to continue spending money for temporary repairs, as al such money spent is practically wasted.

The most practical suggestion that can be made for an increase in economy is, to my mind, as follows:

The application of sound business practice and good common sense to the affairs of each department. It is not the elimination of any particular function or person that will resound to the greatest economic efficiency, but rather the careful investigation of earth division and subdivision of each department and arranging for a conduct of same that will be productive of the greatest efficiency. When that result is obtained the "dead wood" of the City service will be manifest and the needless expenditures will be clearly seen, and then a proper economy, consistent with good and efficient government, can be had.

In conclusion, I would say in speaking of our relations with other departments, that it would be well to have the Commissioner of Street Cleaning see to it that his subordinates do not sweep the snow and ice and various other refuse into the catch | faction to both traveling public and residents. The opening of the Queensboro Bridge

basins of our sewer system, and also that where streets are flushed that they are properly swept before said flushing takes place.

The cost of repairing and cleaning sewers and the damages which result on account of the above complained of actions are a needless expense on the City, and could be easily eliminated by a little care on the part of the employees of the Street Cleaning Department.

I would also suggest that the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity be instructed that in each and every instance where they have occasion to disturb pavement in this Borough, that they immediately notify this Department of that fact, giving full particulars in relation to each opening they have made. This is very important, because by both Departments working in harmony in this respect, a saving to the City will result, in so far as a direct responsibility can be placed, and it will, therefore, not be necessary for extra moneys to be expended on account of increased yardage caused by delay in making repairs.

JOHN CLOUGHEN, Acting President, Borough of Manhattan.

PRESIDENT OF THE BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

First—That the important work of this office is the installation and maintenance of sewers, the installation and maintenance of highway pavements, the supervision over buildings under construction, the care of public buildings and offices, and the completion of the topographical map of the borough. This is the work which this office has done during the last year.

Second—The efficiency of this Department can be further increased by a noninterference with its records, by emphasizing the productive work and minimizing the statistical or supervisory work, which latter is made necessary by absurd rules imposed by outside departments.

Third—The collating by the Comptroller of the cost records of the Borough Presidents and the constructive City departments through tabulation and comparison in order that each purchasing department may be put in competition with every other City department, and that the comparison may at any time be made between prices paid for labor and materials in one borough with similar expenditures in another borough.

PRESIDENT OF THE BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

I.—Topographical Bureau,

The work of the Topographical Bureau covers original surveys preparatory to the laying out of the street system, establishing grades, monumenting of the streets, the preparation of the final maps in sections, showing the widths, grades, dimensions of blocks, etc., the making of surveys and preparation of maps for street opening proceedings.

In the territory south of The Bronx and Pelham parkway, about 80 per cent. thereof has been established by the filing of the final map in that section, and in the territory north of The Bronx and Pelham parkway, east of the Bronx River, there has been established about 40 per cent. thereof by the filing of the final maps.

One thousand monuments have been set and referenced.

As to street opening proceedings there have been prepared 100 damage and profile maps, and 1,000 final damage and benefit maps.

II.—Bureau of Highways.

The important works completed represent a value of about \$2,500,000, among which is the Grand Boulevard and Concourse, recently opened to the public.

Assessment lists have been forwarded to the Board of Assessors in 59 proceedings amounting to \$1,428,000.

The elimination of grade crossings on the various railways going through the Borough has been nearly completed, the only grade crossings remaining being the three on the New York and Putnam Railroad at Kingsbridge road, West Two Hundred and Thirtieth street and West Two Hundred and Thirty-first street, and proceedings are in progress for the elimination of these.

III.—Sewers.

Nine miles of sewers have been completed at a cost of \$967,587.

Assessment lists have been prepared to the value of \$980,000.

Eighty-four miles of sewers have been cleaned, 4,123 basins have been cleaned, 28.4 miles of drains have been cleaned and repaired.

Among the most important sewers completed are the Webster avenue storm relief tunnel sewer, Avenue E sewer and the Truxton street sewer.

IOHN F. MURRAY, President, Borough of The Bronx.

PRESIDENT OF THE BOROUGH OF QUEENS.

The most important work has been that of a general reorganization and resystematization of the respective Bureaus of this Department to bring about a greater degree of co-operative efficiency.

Pursuant to instructions from Department of Finance, a Bureau of Accounting has been established which will aid materially to a more economic and better administration of the finances allowed this Borough.

In the Bureau of Highways resurfacing gangs have been organized and have proven a huge success, particularly in the resurfacing and rebuilding of the main arteries of traffic.

The treatment of all macadam roads with tar and oil has resulted in great satis-

necessitated a tremendous amount of new and repair work in the vicinity of the bridge plaza to accommodate the additional traffic from that source.

The Bureau of Street Cleaning has given greater satisfaction in the collection and disposal of garbage and sweeping of streets than at any time since its organization.

Maintenance agreements on a large number of asphalt paved streets having ex pired and great difficulty being encountered in having repairs made by asphalt companies, would recommend the erection of a municipal asphalt plant.

Would recommend a more liberal policy by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in the matter of authorization of assessable public improvements as the conservative ideas consistently followed out during the past eighteen months has retarded the development of the Borough to a large extent. A matter of extreme importance will be the construction at as early a time as possible of six new odorless garbage destroyers in order to eliminate the present method of dumping garabage in lots which is not only highly offensive, but a menace to the health of the community.

In a limited report of this nature it is next to impossible to outline a means of greater economy in the administration of Borough affairs. I feel, however, that the greater the co-operation among respective Bureaus under the jurisdiction of a Borough President, the greater the economy. This is the policy I have followed and it will be my aim to improve methods along these lines.

LAWRENCE GRESSER, President, Borough of Queens.

PRESIDENT OF THE BOROUGH OF RICHMOND.

Active prosecution of ferry approaches, street improvements, involving extensive grading and construction of unique reinforced concrete retaining walls, most conspicuous examples of that type of construction built in the United States.

Completion of several large sewer systems, and beginning of construction of two others, thus providing sanitary and land drainage possibilities for most of the more thickly settled portions of the Borough.

Successful operation of the more or less experimental refuse destructor, which handles all classes of household waste, ashes, rubbish and garbage. This plant was the most advanced type of refuse disposal in the United States, and has been examined with interest by investigators from all over the country and even from abroad.

Considerable experimenting has been done with view to rendering macadam pavement less dusty and more durable by applications of various bituminous mixtures. The work to date has been largely experimental, but sufficient information has been secured to point to satisfactory future methods.

The great topographical survey has progressed very far towards completion, with very great usefulness already to property interests.

Less segregation of departmental appropriations. Present methods do not allow sufficient freedom of action, and entail too much clerical cost, not commensurate with possibility of savings effected. Detailed cost keeping should be required; results to be published in annual reports and be availed of in presentation of departmental estimates

Gentlemen-Since the preparation of the departmental estimates, a special phase of work has become more peremptory in the Borough of Richmond than some months ago seemed likely. This is the matter of elimination of steam railroad grade cross-

The Public Service Commission, with which we have been in consultation, feels that it is absolutely necessary, in the interest of public safety and convenience, to change from present level crossings to those "under" and "over" grade at a number of places.

We have no appropriation that could properly be used for studies and plans for this purpose, so would ask that an issue of Special Revenue Bonds be granted to cover the cost of same for the year 1910. For succeeding years the matter can be presented in departmental estimates for budget appropriation,

The steam railroad is quite in accord with us as to certain particular crossings, to which we wish to devote our first efforts.

Provision for the cost of the physical changes necessary will have to be made through either special appropriation or be authorized as an assessment proceeding. We estimate that we shall need for the specific engineering work involved for the year 1910, the services of one Assistant Engineer, at \$2,400 per annum; about half time of a Transitman, \$750; full time of a Draftsman, at \$1,350, and half time of a Rodman.

We would ask therefore a Special Revenue Bond issue of \$5,000. Yours respectfully,

Third-A violation of any of the foregoing conditions by such licensee, or his agents or employees, shall subject such licensee to the revocation of this license.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect thirty days after signature by the Mayor Which was referred to the Committee on Laws and Legislation.



NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name

and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so inter-ested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the con-tract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties mak ing the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifica-tions, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any

obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do. Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in
