DEPARTMENT OF PARKS.

Report of the Department of Parks, Borough of the Bronx, for the Quarter Ending September 30, 1910.

Footbridge over the Falls of Bronx River was contracted for last March, and at the present writing is 90 per cent. completed.

Plans and specifications have been prepared for erecting a buttress at the dam across the Bronx River. Contract was awarded September 15, and work is progressing satisfactorily.

A contract was awarded for the Greenhouses in Bronx Park on September 15, the Contractor to begin work at once.

Work on the Shelter House in the Botanical Gardens was begun August 1, and has progressed satisfactorily and is about two-thirds completed.

On September 22 a contract was awarded for furnishing and setting the granite coping south of the Administration Building in the Zoological Garden. The work is well under way and will be completed, it is expected, early in November.

Under a contract awarded last July, the furnishing for the new Administration Building in the Zoological Garden is now well under way and should be completed by November 1, 1910.

The Sicilian Asphalt Paving Company was awarded contract for surfacing the roadway at Eastern Boulevard from a point 400 feet north of Split Rock road to the southern boundary of Pelham Bay Park. This work has progressed satisfactorily and gives promise of being completed by the middle of November.

The same concern was given a contract in August for reconstructing the Bronx and Pelham Parkway from its junction with the Eastern Boulevard to the crossing of the Parkway over the tracks of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad. This work is likewise progressing satisfactorily; the improvement was imperative, owing to the immense automobile traffic on this parkway.

The brick drain in Van Cortlandt Park designed to carry off water of Tibbetts Brook is about two-thirds completed.

The work on the Colonial Gardens at Van Cortlandt Park has progressed to such an extent that the Garden is practically completed by this time; upwards of 125,000 plants have been planted in these Gardens. The cribwork and filling at the Harlem River and McCombs Dam Park was begun August 22, and should, according to the progress already made, be completed about December 1. A new lake has been constructed in Van Cortlandt Park, particularly for curlers during the winter.

DeVoe Park has been railed with pipe railing, and the cleaning up and grading continued.

At Echo Park, Crotona Park and Pelham Bay Park, new horse fountains were installed.

Meanwhile, under different foremen, regular maintenance work progressed favorably. The Base Ball Fields, Tennis Courts and Golf Links continued to receive necessary care and attention, the need of which was accentuated by the unusually dry summer. Carpenters, Painters, etc., were kept busy in their several departments on various jobs required by the department. Besides laying several thousand feet of sodding in the various parks, the gardeners, climbers and pruners cultivated and cared for some four thousand plants, pruned 2,478 trees, sprayed 3,581 trees and cut down and removed seventy-one trees.

Receipts for quarter ending September 30 for locker privileges, rents, building projections, etc., were \$2,839.85, and the expenses as per reports attached.

Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Changes in the Electrical Rules and Regulations.

Beginning February 1, 1911, the rules and regulations relating to subways, contained on pages 7 to 15 inclusive; the rules and regulations relating to overhead wires, etc., contained on pages 19 to 26 inclusive; the rules and regulations relating to Class B, Outside Work, contained on pages 43 to 47 inclusive, of the printed rules of the Department, edition of 1908, will be withdrawn and the following Administrative Regulations and Rules 12 to 13-A (Class B, Outside Work) will be substituted therefor.

ADMINISTRATIVE REGULATIONS.

Note—The term "Commissioner," as used herein, designates the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, unless otherwise specified.

The term "Company," as used herein, designates any person or corporation authorized by franchise or by general law to maintain ducts, poles, conductors or other electrical appliances upon, over or under the streets, avenues, highways or other public places in The City of New York.

Permits—Prior to the undertaking of any electrical construction or the erection or the placing overhead or under ground of electrical conductors on any of the streets, avenues, highways or other public places of The City of New York a permit therefor must be obtained from the Commissioner. Blank forms of application are provided. Permits involving disturbance of the surface of the street or public place must receive the approval of the Borough President or Park Commissioner having jurisdiction.

Any officer or employee of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, or the President of the Borough, or of the Department of Parks, or any member of the Police Department shall be entitled to examine permits under which any work connected with ducts, poles,

conductors or other electrical appliances is being performed.

The Commissioner reserves the right to revoke or suspend any permit granted by him, or to withhold consideration of applications for permits, whenever, in his opinion, such action is necessary in order to secure compliance with orders issued by him; but such revocation or suspension shall not apply to any construction actually performed in good faith by the company to whom a permit therefor shall have been granted.

The violation of any of these rules and regulations shall operate *ipso facto* as a revocation of the permit held by the company guilty of such violation.

All permits for overhead lines are temporary in their nature, and shall cease and determine when underground accommodations shall have been provided in the street or avenue for which the permits have been granted, or when otherwise ordered by the Commissioner.

No permit for the erection of a pole shall be deemed to convey to the company the exclusive right to the use of said poles; but, on the contrary, the company in accepting the permit obligates itself to provide pole accommodations for other companies who may be authorized from time to time by the Commissioner to place electrical conductors on such poles. No company, however, shall be required to furnish such pole accommodations until the tenant company shall have executed a written contract with the owner company agreeing to comply with such reasonable conditions and regulations concerning such pole accommodations as the owner company may impose, and shall have paid one year's rental in advance or given satisfactory guarantee of such payment. In the event of a disagreement between the parties, the conditions, regulations and terms shall be fixed by the Commissioner.

Repairs—Whenever, in the opinion of the Commissioner or of any owner company, repairs or alterations to any duct, pole, conductor or other electrical appli-

ance are necessary, such repairs or alterations must be made by the party owning said duct, pole, conductor or other electrical appliance immediately upon notice.

For routine repairs or alterations permits must be obtained. Companies are authorized and directed to make necessary repairs without permit in cases of emergency, and to file as promptly thereafter as practicable a report thereof in the shape of an application for permit, said application bearing a memorandum of the emergency. This emergency authorization does not cover the undertaking of any additional construction, but is intended solely to insure at all times safety and continuity of service.

Access—Any duly authorized agent of the Commissioner shall have access at all reasonable times to the property of the company, for purposes of inspection, test, verification of tests or consultation of test records.

Means of Identification—Every employee of a company engaged in placing, maintaining, repairing or removing ducts, poles, conductors or other electrical appliances on or under the highways shall carry upon his person at all times when so engaged an identification card, badge, or work ticket, giving his name or number, and the name of his employer.

Tests—Such tests and determinations as may from time to time be prescribed by the Commissioner shall be made by the company owning or controlling the lines or appliances to be tested. Duly authenticated records of such tests must be filed as directed by the Commissioner, and, if such tests relate to the lines of a tenant company a certified copy of the records shall be filed promptly with the owner company.

Reports—Every company shall file such reports or maps of completed construction or of work in progress as may from time to time be required by the Commissioner.

Rules for Occupancy—Owner companies are authorized to place in effect from time to time such reasonable rules governing the occupancy of ducts or poles as may be approved by the Commissioner.

Certificates—No person or corporation shall hereafter begin construction of its plant or lines or furnish electric service in The City of New York until the Commissioner shall have caused investigation to be made of the proposed plant and lines of said company and shall have certified the general construction of the system to be substantial and the method of operation safe.

Prior to the placing in service of any electric wiring or appliances for light, heat or power in any building in The City of New York a certificate of approval thereof must be obtained from the Commissioner. Blank forms of application are provided.

Discontinuance—The Commissioner reserves the right to cause the use of electricity to be discontinued on any electrical conductor located in, on, over or under any street, avenue, highway or other public place, or in any building in The City of New York whenever, in his opinion, such discontinuance is necessary in order to safeguard life or property.

CLASS B.

OUTSIDE WORK.

(Light, Power and Heat. For Signalling Systems, See Class E.)
ALL SYSTEMS AND VOLTAGES.

12—WIRES:

a. Line wires must have an approved weatherproof or rubber insulating covering.

b. Services must consist of approved rubber covered multiple conductor cables and must enter the building in the manner prescribed by the second paragraph of No. 12-g. If necessary to carry the service line across the face of the building before entering, the approved service cable may be extended in flexible metal conduit, or a waterproof conduit system must be employed.

c. Must be at least seven feet above the highest point of flat roofs, and at least one foot above the ridge or pitched roofs over which they pass or to which they are attached and roof structures must be substantially constructed. Roof lines will be permitted only under special authorization in writing, given in advance.

d. (Stricken out.)

e. Must, where exposed to the weather, be provided with petticoat insulators of glass or porcelain; porcelain knobs or cleats and rubber hooks will not be approved. (For exception, see No. 31 B.) Wires on the exterior walls of buildings must be kept at least one foot apart and must be supported at least every fifteen feet, the distance between supports to be shortened if wires are liable to be disturbed.

Where not exposed to the weather, low potential wires may be supported on glass or porcelain knobs which will separate the wires at least one inch from the surface wired over, supports to be placed at least every four and one-half feet.

f. Must be so spliced or joined as to be both mechanically and electrically secure without solder. The joints must then be

soldered, to insure preservation, and covered with an insulation equal to that on the conductors.

All joints must be soldered, unless made with some form of approved splicing device.

g. Must, where they enter buildings, have drip loops outside, and the holes through which the conductors pass must be bushed with non-combustible, non-absorptive, insulating tubes slanting upward toward the inside.

For low potential systems the service wires must be brought into buildings through a single iron conduit. The conduit to be equipped with an approved service-head. The inner end must extend to the service cutout, and, if a cabinet is required by the Code, must properly enter the cabinet.

h. Electric light and power wires must not be placed on the same cross-arm with telegraph, telephone or similar wires, and when placed on the same pole with such wires the distance between the two inside pins of each cross-arm must not be less than twenty-six inches.

Electric light and power wires must not be placed on the same pole with telegraph, telephone or similar wires unless the former are placed above the latter and separated therefrom by a vertical distance of at least four feet; and unless the voltage does not exceed the following normal operating values:

Constant potential metallic circuits 5,000 volts; alternating current series circuits, 5,000 volts; direct current series circuits, 7,500 volts; direct current railway circuits, 700 volts.

On pole lines of modern and substantial construction where the current employed is not greater than 7½ amperes per circuit, a maximum voltage of 10,000 may be permitted on alternating or direct current series circuits under special permission in writing, given in advance, and after plans of the line construction have been submitted and approved by the Commissioner.

In the event of electric light or power wires passing down a pole carrying signal wires, the former must be enclosed in a grounded metallic covering and be suitably protected against mechanical injury, from the lowest electric light cross-arm to the ground or to a point three feet from the centre of the pole, measured horizontally. Approved insulating material must be placed over the grounded metallic shields wherever directed by the Commissioner.

Mast arms and other conducting fixtures or rigging located below the lowest electric light and power cross-arm must be grounded. Transformer cases must be grounded unless the secondary circuits are grounded.

Transformers must not extend below and cable boxes must not extend above their respective cross-arms, unless the distance between the two groups of cross-arms be suitably increased.

Mast arms, etc., transformers with ungrounded secondaries, and shields for conductors running down the pole must be grounded at the pole to which they are attached.

i. The metallic sheaths to cables must be permanently and effectively connected to "earth."

Trolley Wires:

j. Must not be smaller than No. 0 B. & S. gauge copper or No. 4 B. & S. gauge silicon bronze, and must readily stand the strain put upon them when in use.

k. Must have a double insulation from the ground. In wooden pole construction the pole will be considered as one insulation.

l. Must be capable of being disconnected at the power plant, or of being divided into sections, so that in case of fire on the railway route, the current may be shut off from the particular section and not interfere with the work of the firemen. This rule also applies to feeders.

m. Must be safely protected against accidental contact where crossed by other conductors.

Where guard wires are used they must be insulated from the ground and electrically disconnected in sections of not more than 300 feet in length.

12-A. POLE LINES:

a. Not more than one pole line shall be placed on a side of a street. This rule shall not be interpreted to forbid the use of an independent system of poles for the support of trolley wires.

b. Poles must be set about twelve inches back from the curb line and at least ten feet from any street lamp, hydrant, tree or other pole. Departure from this rule may be authorized only under special permission in writing, given in advance.

c. All poles must be painted as directed by the Commissioner, and must be branded or stamped with some device indicating their ownership at a point not less than five feet nor more than seven feet from the ground; and each cross-arm and, where necessary, each pin must indicate its ownership through the use of some distinguishing mark, paint, fastening or type of insulator. Approved high tension

insulators must be employed for the support of extra high potential wires.

d. Wires must be strung with a minimum clearance of eighteen feet above the surface of the street.

e. All wires which would normally pass within four inches of any pole, building or other object must be provided with approved extra insulation or must be attached to the object by means of an approved insulator.

f. Guy wires must be kept at least eight feet above the surface of the street and, if attached at either end to a pole carrying electric light and power wires, must have a strain insulator inserted at that end. Except with the consent of the Park Commissioner having jurisdiction, no guy wire may be attached to any tree located upon a highway or other public place.

12-B—SUBWAYS:

a. A watchman must be continuously on duty at open manholes and, where traffic conditions permit, a guard frame must be placed at the opening.

b. Upon opening a manhole special precautions must be taken to prevent the ignition of gas that may have accumulated therein.

12-C—SERVICES:

a. Each premises shall be supplied by a separate service entering on the side nearest to the point of supply on the main. Under no circumstances shall a service be carried through a party wall from an adjoining premises.

b. Where a row of separate premises is to receive its supply from an overhead main one service cable shall be run from the pole to the row, and from the first attachment to the building sub-services or a service main shall extend in conduit along the face of the row. One service cable shall not supply more than five premises except under special permission in writing, given in advance.

The same plan of sub-services may be employed in connection with underground service, under the same restrictions.

12-D—SIGNS:

a. Wires carried on the outside of sign structures must be run in approved metal conduit or approved armored cable. This does not apply to signs erected on roofs or on open ground where rubber covered wire is employed and is not subject to mechanical injury, and where it is kept at least one inch from the surface wired over.

b. Wires within structure of sign must be double braided rubber covered and where the difference of potential between wires is over 120 volts they must be separated by at least 1/2 inch.

c. Must be constructed entirely of metal.

d. Sheet metal must not be less than No. 26 B. & S. gauge.

e. Must be braced by angle iron of such thickness and so placed as to secure sufficient strength and rigidity.

f. All metal must be galvanized or enameled or treated with at least three coats of anti-corrosive paint or compound.

g. If the terminals of receptacles are not of the enclosed type, receptacles must be so constructed that the terminals will be at least one inch from the surface wired over. Wires must be soldered to terminals, and exposed parts must be treated to prevent corrosion.

h. All signs must be made weather-proof, and each compartment must have suitable provision for drainage.

i. Where wires pass out of letters or into cutout box they must be protected by approved tubes or bushings.

j. Where wire not inferior in size and insulation to approved No. 14 B. & S. gauge rubber covered wire is used connecting direct to standard sockets or receptacles, 1320 watts may be dependent upon final cutout.

k. Must have maker's name or trade mark permanently attached to the exterior.

l. Must be constructed as to render each compartment accessible for inspection, or in lieu thereof must be inspected and labelled at the factory.

13—TRANSFORMERS:

(See also Nos. 11, 13-A and 36.)

Where transformers are to be connected to high-voltage circuits, it is necessary in many cases, for best protection to life and property, that the secondary system be permanently grounded, and provision should be made for it when the transformers are built.

a. (See No. 36.)

b. Must not be attached to the outside walls of buildings, unless separated therefrom by substantial supports.

Must not be attached to frame buildings when any other location is practicable.

The attachment of transformers to buildings will be permitted only under special authorization in writing, given in advance.

13-A—GROUNDING LOW-POTENTIAL CIRCUITS:

The grounding of low potential circuits under the following regulations is only allowed when such circuits are so arranged that under normal conditions of service

there will be no passage of current over the ground wire.

Direct-Current 3-Wire Systems:

a. Neutral wire must be grounded and the following rules must be complied with:

1. Must be grounded at the Central Station on a metal plate buried in coke beneath permanent moisture level, or to a number of pipes driven deeply enough into the ground to insure their being in permanent moisture, and also through all available underground water and gas pipe systems.

2. In underground systems the neutral wire must also be grounded at each distributing box through the box.

3. In overhead systems the neutral wire must be grounded every 500 feet, as provided in sections c to g.

Alternating-Current Secondary Systems:

b. Transformer secondaries of distributing systems must be grounded, and the following rules must be complied with:

1. The grounding must be made at the neutral point or wire, whenever a neutral point or wire is accessible.

2. When no neutral point or wire is accessible one side of the secondary circuit must be grounded, provided the maximum difference of potential between the grounded point and any other point in the circuit does not exceed 250 volts.

3. The ground connection must be at the transformers or on the individual service as provided in sections c to g, and when transformers feed systems with a neutral wire, the neutral wire must also be grounded at least every 250 feet for overhead systems, and every 500 feet for underground systems.

Ground Connections:

c. When the ground connection is inside of any building, or the ground wire is inside of, or attached to any building (except central or sub-stations) the ground wire must be of copper and have an approved rubber insulating covering, National Electrical Code Standard, for from 0 to 600 volts.

d. The ground wire in direct-current three-wire systems must not at central stations be smaller than the neutral wire and not smaller than No. 4 B. & S. gauge elsewhere. The ground wire in alternating-current systems must never be less than No. 4 B. & S. gauge.

On three-phase systems the ground wire must have a carrying capacity equal to that of any one of the three mains.

e. The ground wire must, except for central stations and transformer sub-stations, be kept outside of buildings as far as practicable, but may be directly attached to the building or pole by cleats or straps or on porcelain knobs. Staples must never be used. The wire must be carried in as nearly a straight line as practicable, avoiding kinks, coils and sharp bends, and must be protected when exposed to mechanical injury.

This protection can be secured by use of an approved moulding, and as a rule the ground wire on the outside of a building should be in moulding at all places where it is within seven feet from the ground.

f. (See 13-A-a-1.) The ground connection for central stations, transformer sub-stations, and banks of transformers must be made through metal plates buried in coke below permanent moisture level, or to a number of pipes driven deeply enough into the ground to insure their being in permanent moisture, and connection should also be made to all available underground piping systems, including the lead sheath of underground cables.

g. For individual transformers and building services the ground connection may be made as in section f, or may be made to water piping systems running into buildings. If the piping system is metered, the ground connection must be made between the meter and the street mains unless an approved jumper is employed to carry the grounding current around the meter.

Where it is necessary to run the ground wire through any part of a building it shall be protected by approved porcelain bushings through walls or partitions and shall be run in approved moulding, except that in basements it may be supported on porcelain.

In connecting a ground wire to a piping system the wire should be sweated into a lug attached to an approved clamp, and the clamp firmly bolted to the water pipe after all rust and scale have been removed; or be soldered into a brass plug and the plug forcibly screwed into a pipe-fitting, or where the pipes are cast-iron, into a hole tapped into the pipe itself. For large stations, where connecting to underground pipes with bell and spigot joints, it is well to connect to several lengths, as the pipe joints may be of rather high resistance.

Where ground plates are used a No. 16 Stubbs gauge copper plate, about three by six feet in size, with about two feet of crushed coke or charcoal, about pea size, both under and over it, would make a ground of sufficient capacity for a

moderate-sized station, and would probably answer for the ordinary sub-station or bank of transformers. For a large central station a plate with considerably more area might be necessary, depending upon the other underground connections available. The ground wire should be riveted to the plate in a number of places, and soldered for its whole length. Perhaps even better than a copper plate is a cast-iron plate with projecting forks, the idea of the fork being to distribute the

connection to the ground over a fairly broad area, and to give a large surface contact. The ground wire can probably best be connected to such a cast-iron plate by soldering it into brass plugs screwed into holes tapped in the plate. In all cases the joint between the plate and the ground wire should be thoroughly protected against corrosion by painting it with waterproof paint or some equivalent.



Franchise Matters.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT at the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held this day the following proceedings were had:

Whereas, The New York Cahill Telharmonic Company has, under date of May 10, 1907, made application to this Board for the grant of the right, privilege or franchise to lay, construct, maintain and operate wires and other electrical conductors in the streets of the City of New York, for the purpose of distributing music electrically, and

Whereas, Sections 72, 73 and 74 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by Chapters 629 and 630 of the Laws of 1905, provide for the manner and procedure of making such grants, and

Whereas, In pursuance of such laws this Board adopted a resolution on May 24, 1907, fixing the date for a public hearing thereon, as June 7, 1907, at which citizens were entitled to appear, and be heard, and publication was had for at least two (2) days in the New York Tribune and New York Herald, newspapers designated by the Mayor, and in the City Record for ten (10) days immediately prior to the date of hearing, and the public hearing was duly held on such day, and

Whereas, This Board has made inquiry as to the money value of the franchise or right applied for and proposed to be granted to the New York Cahill Telharmonic Company and the adequacy of the amount of compensation to be paid therefor; now, therefore, it is

Resolved, That the following form of resolution for the grant of the franchise or right applied for by the New York Cahill Telharmonic Company, containing the form of proposed contract for the grant of such franchise or right be hereby introduced and entered in the minutes of this Board as follows, to wit:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby grants to the New York Cahill Telharmonic Company the franchise or right fully set out and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, embodying all the terms and conditions, including the provisions as to rates and charges, upon and subject to the terms and conditions in said proposed form of contract contained, and that the Mayor of the City of New York be and he is hereby authorized to execute and deliver such contract, in the name and on behalf of the City of New York, as follows, to wit:

Proposed Form of Contract.
This contract, made this . . . day of . . . 19 . . . by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the "City"), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the "Board"), and the New York Cahill Telharmonic Company (hereinafter called the "Company"), party of the second part, witnesseth:

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained the parties hereto do covenant and agree as follows:

Section 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right and privilege to lay, construct, maintain and operate suitable wires or other electrical conductors in conduits under the streets and avenues within the territory comprised in the Borough of Manhattan and that part of the Borough of The Bronx west of the Bronx River, for the purpose of operating a telharmonic system within the said territory; that is, a system for the generation and distribution of music electrically, and for no other purpose whatsoever.

Sec. 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:

First—The said right and privilege to lay, erect, construct and maintain the wires or other electrical conductors in conduits for the purpose aforesaid shall be held and enjoyed by the Company for the term of twenty-five (25) years from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for a further period of twenty-five (25) years upon a fair revaluation of said right and privilege.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board, or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than three (3) years and not later than one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than the sum required to be paid during the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract. If the Company and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding twenty-five (25) years shall be reasonable, and either the City (by the Board) or the Company shall be bound, upon request of the other, to enter into a written agreement with each other fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable, but in no case shall the annual rate so fixed be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate and at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested freeholders, selected in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company. These two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six (6) months prior to the expiration of this original contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three (3) months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuation so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual sum shall in any event be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year of

the original term of this contract. If in any case the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the Company shall pay the annual rate theretofore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. The compensation and expenses of said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company, each paying one-half thereof.

Second—The Company shall pay to the City for the privilege hereby granted the following sums of money:

(a) The sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) in cash within three (3) months after the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor and before anything is done in exercise of the privilege hereby granted, and the further sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) within twelve (12) months after the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

(b) During the first term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500) and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500).

During the second term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than five thousand dollars (\$5,000) and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000).

During the third term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than seven thousand five hundred dollars (\$7,500) and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of seven thousand five hundred dollars (\$7,500).

During the fourth term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) and which shall be equal to four (4) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000).

During the remaining term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000) and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000).

The gross receipts mentioned above shall be the gross receipts of the Company from all sources within the Borough of Manhattan and the portion of the Borough of The Bronx west of the Bronx River.

The annual charges shall commence from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

All annual charges as above shall be paid into the treasury of the City on November 1 of each year, and shall be for the amount due to September 30 next preceding. Provided, that the first annual payment shall be only for that proportion of the first annual charge as the time between the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor and September 30 following shall bear to the whole of one year.

Whenever the percentage required to be paid shall exceed the minimum amount as above, then such sum over and above such minimum shall be paid on or before November 1 in each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding.

Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Company shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be made in addition to any and all taxes of whatsoever kind or description now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City or resolution of the Board or any law of the State of New York.

Third—The annual charges or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract (whether original or renewal), notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other company providing for payments for similar rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges hereby granted (whether original or renewal), or any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this contract and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof, or otherwise, exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

This provision, however, shall not apply to the making of a mortgage, but shall apply to a sale under foreclosure.

Fourth—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall the title thereto, or right, interest or property therein pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, nor shall the Company in any manner consolidate or pool its stock, business or interests or enter into any agreement for a division of business, interest or territory, or to prevent competition or a reduction in rates, or acquire, own or make use of or in any manner exercise control over any of the rights, privileges, franchises or stock, or use, own, control or operate any of the property, works, plants or appliances of any such person or corporation without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in any wise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents. This provision, however, shall not apply to the making of a mortgage, but shall apply to a sale under foreclosure.

Fifth—Upon the termination of this original contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the wires, electrical conductors and other property of the Company within the streets and avenues of the City constructed pursuant to this contract for the generation and distribution of music electrically, shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or individual. If, however, the termination of this contract, as above, the Board shall so order by resolution, the Company shall on thirty (30) days' notice from the Board remove any and all of its wires, electrical conductors and other property, or any portion thereof constructed pursuant to this contract, and the said streets and avenues shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the Company.

Sixth—Said telharmonic system shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters, as provided by the Charter of the City.

No construction upon said telharmonic system shall be commenced until written permits have been obtained from the proper City officials.

In any permits so issued such officials may also impose such conditions, as a condition of granting of the same, as are necessary for the purpose of protecting any structures, in the streets and avenues, over which such officials have jurisdiction, and the Company shall comply with such conditions.

Seventh—All wires or other electrical conductors of the Company laid pursuant to this contract shall be placed in ducts, conduits or subways (referred to in this paragraph as subways). Such subways shall be leased from the company or companies having control thereof under the provisions of law, or from the City should it succeed to the rights of such company or companies. If the City shall construct or acquire subways for electrical conductors in the Borough of Manhattan or the portion of the Borough of The Bronx west of the Bronx River the Company hereby agrees to lay its wires and electrical conductors in such subways, and the City agrees to lease to the Company such space as may be required for its telharmonic system herein authorized.

Eighth—The Company shall file with the Board, on the first day of November in each year, a map or plan upon which shall be plainly indicated the number of wires which are used by the Company on the thirtieth day of September next preceding, and the streets and avenues in which the same are located and also those which were put in use during the preceding year.

Ninth—The Company shall commence the construction of its lines or the distributing of music hereunder within nine (9) months from the date of the signing of this contract by the Mayor and within five (5) years thereafter shall either have in operation not less than 2,500 music outlets or else shall have not less than \$500,000 invested in plant in The City of New York, otherwise the Board may, after three (3) months' notice and if the default is not remedied in such three (3) months, declare all rights under this contract forfeited.

Tenth—The Board may, by resolution, direct the Company to install, free of charge, music outlets and necessary appurtenances thereto in any all of the free wards of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, situated in the portion of the City for which a franchise is hereby granted. Upon the application of the Board of Education to the Board, the Board may, by resolution, direct the Company to install, at one-half its usual rates for such installation, music outlets and necessary appurtenances thereto, in the assembly halls in public schools within the territory of The City of New York for which a franchise is hereby granted. Upon notice by the Board to the Company that such resolutions have been adopted, the Company shall install such apparatus, provided that the Company shall not be required to extend its wires for the purpose of connecting with such schools a distance greater than one thousand (1,000) feet, and provided further, that no more than ten (10) schools need be equipped by the Company in any one year, but any school situated within a block bounded by portions of streets or avenues in which the Company has its wires shall be equipped when so ordered by the Board in addition to the ten (10) schools which may be required to be equipped in any one year, and provided further that the Company shall not be required to install more than ten (10) music outlets in any one hospital or school. Upon notice of the Board to the Company that a resolution directing such installation has been adopted by the Board, the Company shall install such apparatus and shall furnish music in Bellevue and Allied Hospitals free of charge, and in public schools at one-half the regular rates charged by the Company for similar service.

Eleventh—It is agreed that the Board shall have absolute power to regulate all charges or rates for services rendered by the Company to subscribers, pursuant to this contract, provided such rates shall be reasonable and fair.

Twelfth—The Company shall not require nor receive from its subscribers any deposit or advance payment in excess of the cost to it of apparatus leased or furnished to the subscriber on his premises and of what is reasonably necessary to insure payment of current bills, and on such amounts so paid the Company shall pay interest at the statutory rate whenever such money is held for more than one month. Unpaid bills shall never be charged against property unless due from the owner thereof, and no person not himself in arrears shall be denied service because any previous occupant of the same premises is in arrears to the Company for service.

Thirteenth—The wires of the Company shall be employed for no other purpose than those explicitly set forth herein, and the Company binds itself not to lay, use, lease or operate wires for illegal purposes.

Fourteenth—The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the system authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or defaults of the Company.

Fifteenth—It is a condition of this contract that the Company shall bear the entire expense of all work undertaken by reason of this grant. Sixteenth—If the Company shall fail to give efficient public service and maintain its structures and equipment as herein provided in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give written notice to the Company specifying any default on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time, and upon failure of the Company to remedy said default within a reasonable time the Company shall for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains pay to the City a sum of fifty dollars (\$50), as fixed or liquidated damages, or the Board, in case such structures or equipment which may affect the surface of the streets and avenues, shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid, shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinafter provided.

Seventeenth—If, for a period of three (3) consecutive months, the telharmonic system of the Company shall not be operated, or if the same shall not be operated for a period of six (6) months out of any consecutive twelve (12) months, the Board may, after three (3) months' notice and failure by the Company to give to the Board satisfactory security for the future against further breach, declare the right and franchise under this contract terminated without further proceedings in law or in equity, provided that in case of the destruction by fire or otherwise of any of the Company's central stations or of the machinery thereat, the Company shall be allowed a year in which to restore, rebuild or replace the same, unless the Board shall extend such time for a further period for cause shown.

Eighteenth—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account and shall, on or before November 1 in each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of the business done by the Company pursuant to this contract for the year ending September 30 next preceding. Such report shall contain a statement

of the gross receipts received from the operation of the telharmonic system hereby authorized from all subscribers served by the Company, together with such other information and in such form and detail as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report and may examine its officers under oath.

Nineteenth—The Company shall submit to the Board a report not later than November 1 of each year, for the year ending September 30 next preceding, and at any other time upon request of the Board, which shall state:

1. The amount of stock issued, for cash, for property.
2. The amount paid in as by last report.
3. The total amount of capital stock paid in.
4. The funded debt by last report.
5. The total amount of funded debt.
6. The floating debt as by last report.
7. The total amount of floating debt.
8. The total amount of funded and floating debt.
9. The average rate per annum of interest on funded debt.
10. Statement of dividends paid during the year.
11. Total amount expended for same.
12. The names of the directors elected at the last meeting of the corporation held for such purpose.
13. Location, value and amount paid for real estate owned by the Company as by last report.
14. Location, value and amount paid for real estate now owned by the Company.
15. Number of subscribers served by the Company.
16. Total receipts of the Company for each class of business.
17. Amounts paid by the Company for damage to persons or property on account of construction and operation.
18. Total expenses of operation.

—and such other information in regard to the business of the Company as may be required by the Board.

For failure to comply with the foregoing the Company shall pay a penalty of one hundred dollars (\$100) per day until such statement is rendered, which may be collected by the Comptroller without notice.

Twentieth—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company, within three (3) months after the execution of this contract, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred thereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000), either in money or securities to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of all the terms and conditions of the contract, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the privilege hereby granted, in default of which payment of the annual charge the City shall collect same with interest from the said fund after ten (10) days' notice to the Company. In case of failure of the Company to comply with the terms of this contract relating to the filing of annual statements and the commencement and increase of construction, or its neglect or refusal to comply with any demand or direction of the Board or other municipal officials, made pursuant to the terms of this contract, or under the authority of any laws or ordinances now or hereafter in force, in such case, and in any of these events the Company shall pay to the City a penalty of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) for each violation, and in case of a violation of the provisions relating to the illegal use of wires, the Company shall pay to the City for each violation a penalty of not less than one hundred dollars (\$100) and not more than five hundred dollars (\$500), to be fixed by the Board.

The procedure for the imposition and collection of the penalties provided in the grant shall be as follows:

The Board, on complaint made, shall give notice to the Company, directing its President or other officer to appear before the Board on a certain day, not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why the Company should not be penalized in accordance with the foregoing provisions. If the Company fails to make an appearance, or, after a hearing, appears in the judgment of the Board to be in fault, said Board shall forthwith impose the prescribed penalty, or, where the amount of the penalty is not prescribed herein, such amount as appears to the Board to be just, and without legal procedure direct the Comptroller to withdraw the amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with him. In case of any drafts made upon the security fund the Company shall, upon ten (10) days' notice, pay to the City a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount of five thousand dollars (\$5,000), and in default thereof this contract shall be cancelled and annulled at the option of the Board, acting in behalf of the City. No action or proceeding or right under the provisions of this contract shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City.

Twenty-first—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, or with any orders of the Board, acting under the powers herein reserved, the franchise or consent herein granted may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel, on notice of ten (10) days to the Company, or at the option of the Board, by resolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the wires, electrical conductors and other property within the streets and avenues of the City constructed and in use by virtue of this contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or in equity. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear, action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

Twenty-second—If at any time the powers of the Board or any other of the authorities herein mentioned or intended to be mentioned, shall be transferred by law to any other board, authority, officer or officers, then and in such case such other board, authority, officer or officers shall have all the powers, rights and duties herein reserved to or prescribed for the Board or other authorities, officer or officers.

Twenty-third—The words "streets or avenues" and "streets and avenues," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean "streets, avenues, highways, parkways, driveways, concourses, boulevards, bridges, viaducts, tunnels, public places or any other property to which the City has title or over which the public has an easement," encountered in the route hereinabove described, and upon or in which authority is hereby given to the Company to construct, maintain and operate wires or other electrical conductors.

Twenty-fourth—The words "notice or direction," wherever used in this contract shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the Company, or if no such office shall have been designated, or if such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed in the city, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at The City of New York. Delivery or

mailing of such notice or direction as and when above provided shall be equivalent to direct personal notice or direction, and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery of mailing.

Twenty-fifth—Whenever the term "outlet" or "music outlet" is used in this contract it shall be deemed to mean one diaphragm or music translating device such as is used by the Company on the premises of the subscriber.

Sec. 3. Nothing in this contract shall be construed as in any way limiting the present or future jurisdiction of the Public Service Commission under the laws of the State of New York.

Sec. 4. The Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms, conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF the party of the first part, by its Mayor, thereto duly authorized by the board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City, has caused the corporate name of said City to be hereunto signed and the corporate seal of said City to be hereunto affixed, and the party of the second part, by its officers thereto duly authorized, has caused its corporate name to be hereunto signed and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed, the day and the year first above written.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or a certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bid required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.
