Adjourned Hearings on Legislative Bills.

The public hearings on the following bills were adjourned, by order of the Mayor, to Saturday, May 6, 1916, at 10 a. m., in the Board of Estimate and Apportionment Chamber, City Hall, Borough of Manhattan.

Senate No. 1670, Int. No. 1228, entitled an act to authorize the board of estimate and apportionment of the City of New York to allot certain lands to the International Garden Club for the establishment thereon of a horticultural garden.

Senate No. 1923, Int. No. 1473, entitled an act to amend the Greater New York charter, in relation to aldermanic districts, the division of the city into the same and the boundaries thereof, and to districts for home rule and local improvements.

Senate No. 1883, Int. No. 1448, entitled an act authorizing the police commissioner of the city of New York to rehear the charges upon which John H. Downs, formerly a patrolman in the police department of the said city, was dismissed from said department, and to reinstate him in the position formerly held by him.

Senate No. 1918, Int. No. 1468, entitled an act to amend the Greater New York charter, in relation to the powers of the board of estimate and apportionment to reconsider its action in the apportionment of the cost of certain public improvements.

Assembly No. 2068, Int. No. 1393, entitled an act to amend the Greater New York charter, in relation to water charges and water meters.

Assembly No. 1818, Int. No. 512, entitled an act to amend the Greater New York charter by inserting therein provisions for recording and indexing instru-

ments affecting land in the counties of New York and Bronx, and to repeal existing laws on said subject.

Assembly No. 1777, Int. No. 956, entitled an act to amend the Greater New York Charter, in relation to the New York city penitentiary, workhouse and reformatory for misdemeanants.

Assembly No. 1701, Int. No. 1434, entitled an act to amend chapter seven hundred and twenty-four of the laws of nineteen hundred and five, entitled “An act to provide for an additional supply of pure and wholesome water for the city of New York; and for the acquisition of lands or interest therein, and for the construction of the necessary reservoirs, dams, aqueducts, filters and other appurtenances for that purpose; and for the appointment of a commission with the powers and duties necessary and proper to attain these objects,” in relation to the appraisal of consequential damages.

Assembly No. 933, Int. No. 852, entitled an act to amend the Greater New York Charter, in relation to rehearing of charges against, and the reinstatement of, uniform members of the police department serving the period of probation preliminary to permanent appointment.

Assembly No. 1771, Int. No. 1095, entitled an act to amend the Greater New York Charter, in relation to an interpreter of the Italian language for the municipal court in the borough of Brooklyn.

Assembly No. 1985, Int. No. 845, entitled an act to amend the Greater New York charter, in relation to fire marshals and bureau of fire investigation, and repealing section seven hundred and seventy-eight-b thereof.

Assembly No. 1970, Int. No. 1114, entitled an act to amend the Greater New York charter, in relation to the rehearing of charges against and the reinstatement of persons dismissed.

Assembly No. 1469, Int. No. 1273, entitled an act to amend the Greater New York charter, in relation to the bureaus in the department of finance.

Assembly No. 400, Int. No. 394, entitled an act to amend the New York city municipal court code, in relation to disposition of a party or person who expects to be a party to an action.

Assembly No. 851, Int. No. 770, entitled an act to amend the Greater New York charter in relation to the office of the commissioners of accounts.

Assembly No. 1614, Int. No. 1363, entitled an act to amend the Greater New York charter, in relation to the period of service of members of the police force of the board of water supply transferred or appointed to the police department of the city of New York.

Assembly No. 1185, Int. No. 1058, entitled an act to empower the city of New York to widen Kills path, a highway situate in the boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, in said city, by acquiring through purchase or condemnation the lands of the various cemetery corporations or of others, abutting along said highway, from Jamaica avenue in the borough of Brooklyn to Myrtle avenue in the borough of Queens.

Assembly No. 2072, Int. No. 1256, entitled an act to amend the Greater New York charter, in relation to the powers and duties of the board of assessors, the board of revision of assessments, and the board of estimate and apportionment.

Assembly No. 1427, Int. No. 1231, entitled an act to amend chapter two hundred and seventy-nine of the laws of nineteen hundred and fifteen, entitled “An act in relation to the municipal court of the City of New York, and repealing certain statutes affecting such court, its justices and officers,” in relation to the payment to judgment creditors or their attorneys of moneys deposited in court to satisfy judgments.

Assembly No. 1965, Int. No. 1366, entitled an act to amend the Greater New York charter, in relation to the reinstatement of policemen.

Assembly No. 1431, Int. No. 1235, entitled an act to amend the Greater New York charter, in relation to the penalty for failure to report marriages and births to the department of health.

Senate No. 1491, Assembly No. 2112, Int. No. 591, entitled an act to amend chapter three hundred and thirty-six of the laws of nineteen hundred and three, entitled “An act to provide for the erection of the court house in the County of New York and authorizing the acquisition of a site therefor,” in relation to expenditures by the court house board.

Senate No. 601, Int. No. 571, entitled an act to authorize the board of assessors of the City of New York to estimate and allow the damages sustained by owners of real property fronting upon East One Hundred and Sixty-seventh Street and upon Park Avenue, in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, by reason of the change of the street grade due to the construction of a bridge to carry East One Hundred and Sixty-seventh Street over the tracks of the New York and Harlem railroad in the year Nineteen Hundred and Ten.

Senate No. 1911, Int. No. 1465, entitled an act to authorize and empower The City of New York to acquire a site beyond its territorial limits for use as a farm colony for women sentenced to institutions under the jurisdiction of the department of correction of The City of New York.

Senate No. 1718, Int. No. 1376, entitled an act to amend the Greater New York Charter, in relation to the filing of maps showing the lay-out of streets upon private property.

Senate No. 1842, Int. No. 883, entitled an act to amend the inferior criminal courts act of The City of New York, in relation to removal of charges of misdemeanor from the court of special sessions.

Senate No. 1579, Int. No. 1144, entitled an act to amend the Greater New York Charter, in relation to the department of bridges of The City of New York, and the devolution of certain powers and duties of other departments and offices.

PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION, April 17, 1916.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York:

The Public Service Commission for the First District herewith transmits for the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the following certificates to Hudson and Manhattan Railroad Company:

Form of certificate modifying the certificate of May 4, 1909, for extension to the Grand Central Station.

Form of certificate modifying the certificate of February 2, 1905, to New York and Jersey Railroad Company for Thirty-third Street Extension.

Form of certificate modifying the certificate of November 24, 1903, for Corland and Fulton street tunnels.

The situation in respect of these modifications is as follows:

Extension to Grand Central Station—Under date of May 4, 1909, the Commission granted a certificate to Hudson and Manhattan Railroad Company authorizing it to extend its line from its then authorized terminus at 6th avenue and 33d street under 6th avenue, Bryant Park and 42d street to a terminal station between Vanderbilt and Lexington avenues. The Railroad Company secured the necessary consents and approvals, but did not begin the construction of the line within the period prescribed by the certificate. The Railroad Company some time ago applied for an extension of two years, but the matter of a long extension was held in abeyance pending the development of the plans for certain of the municipal railroads to be operated under contracts Nos. 3 and 4 so that the precise effect of their construction upon the Hudson and Manhattan Line and vice versa could more definitely be ascertained. In lieu of the long extension applied for by the Company short extensions of time have been granted by the Commission and the time of the Railroad Company to begin construction now expires on May 1, 1916.

The construction of the Hudson and Manhattan Line affects and is affected by the construction of the City's Broadway Line at the intersection of Broadway, 6th avenue and 33d street and the construction of the City's Steinway Tunnel Line in 42d st. In order to safeguard the Broadway Line against the future construction of a subway under it at the 33d street intersection, a special floor design was developed whereby the floor of the City subway would also act as the roof of the future subway. This would require the extension of the third track in the Thirty-third Street station a short distance further north than would otherwise be necessary and some changes in levels.

The plans for the Steinway Tunnel Line have not been developed to a point where a precise location can now be given for the Hudson and Manhattan Line in 42d street. The certificate of May 4, 1909, provides "The tunnels of the Railroad, but not including the stations thereof, where the same shall be in 42d street shall be located south of the center line of said street unless the Commission shall expressly authorize the location of the tunnels elsewhere in the said street." The certificate also locates the terminal station in 42d street between Vanderbilt and Lexington avenues. Both these locations are apt to conflict with the location of the Steinway Tunnel Line and one of provinces of the proposed certificate is to place control of the entire situation in the Commission so that it may precisely locate the portion of the Hudson and Manhattan Line in 42d street so as to accommodate it to the location of the Steinway Tunnel.

Following the development of the special floor design for the Broadway Line at the 33d street intersection, application was made to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for an appropriation to meet the increased expense due to the adoption of such a design which was estimated at Seventy-five Thousand Dollars (\$75,000). This matter was before the Board of Estimate and

Apportionment for some time and after several conferences between the representatives of the Commission and the Comptroller and the President of the Board of Aldermen an understanding was reached that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment would appropriate the amount requisitioned for the special floor design, but the Hudson and Manhattan Railroad Company should agree to reimburse the City for this expenditure if it extended its line and should generally agree to such relocation of its line as might be necessary to accommodate it to the construction of the City railroads, and that if these conditions were complied that an extension of two years to begin construction might be granted.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment appropriated the sum of Seventy-five Thousand Dollars (\$75,000) for the special floor design at the 33d street intersection and the proposed certificate carries out the rest of the understanding. The amount to be repaid by the Hudson and Manhattan Company to the City when the Company begins the construction of its line is Seventy-five Thousand Dollars (\$75,000) with interest at six per centum (6%) per annum from the first day of June, 1916. By this modifying certificate the certificate of May 4, 1909, is further revised so as to include provisions for the responsibility of the Hudson and Manhattan Company for any damages that may be caused by it to the City rapid transit railroads. The extension of time proposed to be granted by this modifying certificate is up to and including the first day of March, 1918.

Thirty-third Street Extension.—The certificate of February 2, 1905, to New York and Jersey Railroad Company (of which the Hudson and Manhattan Railroad Company is the successor) authorized the construction of a railroad from the intersection of Greenwich West 10th and Christopher streets in the Borough of Manhattan under Christopher street to 6th avenue, thence with one branch under 6th avenue to a terminal station at or near the intersection of 6th avenue and 33d street, and with another branch crossing diagonally under 6th avenue to 9th street, and thence easterly under 9th street to a terminal station at or near the intersection of 4th avenue and 9th street. The 6th avenue branch provided for in such certificate has been constructed and put in operation, but the construction of the 9th street Branch has never been begun. Under the certificate as heretofore modified the time of the Company to construct the 9th street Branch begins to run from the time the Commission establishes certain levels. These levels have not been established.

Under the certificate of February 2, 1905, the City has the right to recapture either the 6th avenue Branch or the 9th street Branch or both after the expiration of twenty-five years from the date of beginning operation of any part upon paying an amount, based upon cost, to be ascertained as provided in the certificate. As a basis for this ascertainment the certificate provides that within a certain period after the completion of the 6th avenue Branch and the 9th street Branch the Company should file a statement of cost which, if agreed upon, should be the amount to be paid by the City upon recapture, and if not agreed upon the cost should be determined by arbitration. It seems advisable that this statement of cost of the 6th avenue Branch which is constructed and in operation should be furnished while the facts in regard to its construction are comparatively fresh in the minds of those connected with the work, and when evidence, documentary and otherwise, in regard thereto can be secured, and that this examination should not be deferred on account of the 9th street Branch, the construction of which is problematical. The second of the proposed certificates modifies the certificate of February 2, 1905, so as to provide that the statements of cost of the 6th avenue Branch shall be submitted by the Hudson and Manhattan Company within ninety days after the Commission shall notify it in writing to present such statement.

Cortlandt and Fulton Street Tunnels.—Under date of November 24, 1903, the former Rapid Transit Board authorized the Hudson and Manhattan Company to construct the portion of the Cortlandt and Fulton street tunnels within the State of New York. In connection with the authorization of the terminal station the Company was authorized to construct a passageway for foot passengers under Dey street from the terminal station to a connection with the present rapid transit railroad in Broadway. This passageway was never constructed and the purpose which it was intended to serve will be met by the construction of the new City subway in Church street. Although the time of the Hudson and Manhattan Company to construct this passageway has expired and the Commission by following the procedure set forth in the certificate, i. e., giving three months' notice, might declare the authorization in respect thereto vacated, it would seem to be preferable to eliminate the provision for this passageway by agreement. This is the province of the third of the modifying agreements transmitted herewith which provides for eliminating from the certificate of November 24, 1903, the provision for the construction of the Dey Street passageway.

At the termination or forfeiture of this grant, the City, at the election of the Board, shall have the right to purchase all or any part of the property and plant of the Company used for the purpose of the operation of the stage or omnibus system hereby authorized, at a sum equal to a fair valuation of such property and plant, exclusive of any value which such property and plant may have by reason of this contract. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such buildings by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstances of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area, shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street and the openings of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all openings in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days

from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances or portions as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting bricks, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the Contractor.

"No buildings, parts of buildings, fixtures or machinery sold for removal under these terms and conditions shall in any case be re-located or re-erected within the lines of any proposed street or other public improvement, and if any such buildings, parts of buildings, fixtures or machinery, etc., shall be re-located or re-erected within the lines of any proposed street or other public improvement, title thereto shall thereupon become vested in The City of New York and a resale at public or private sale may be made in the same manner as if no prior sale thereof had been made."

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids; and be it further

Resolved, That while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, Bureau or officers, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate, that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation of the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
