

The Board met this day.

Resolved, That the Sanitary Superintendent be and is hereby directed to cause an inspection to be made by the Sanitary Inspectors for the Twenty-second, Twenty-third, and Twenty-fourth Wards, and report to this Board on the use of well water for drinking in these districts, the number of wells used, their liability to contamination from drains, privies, cesspools, etc.; that there be included in their report the effect of said wells on the health of those using them, and the deaths probably attributable to them.

utable to them. That the Chemist of the Board be directed to co-operate with the Sanitary Inspector in this work.

An application from John Hardy, in respect to orders requiring school sinks at certain premises, was received and referred to the Sanitary Superintendent.

Dr. Chas. H. Wade appeared before the Board in answer to notice of a violation of the Sanitary Code, in not reporting two cases of diphtheria that occurred at No. 129 Macdougal street, and, after making a statement which was satisfactory to the Board, he was excused.

Action of the Board on Tenement House Plans.

The following plans for light and ventilation of tenement houses were approved by the Board upon the conditions specified in the several permits granted.

Plan No. 773. Five four-story tenement houses, 20 feet by 65 feet, on lots 20 feet by 81 feet, on the southwest corner of Ninetieth street, near Lexington avenue, to be occupied by four families each.

Plan No. 774. One five-story tenement house, 25 feet by 54 feet, with extension 20 feet 6 inches by 36 feet, on the east side of Third avenue, 25 feet south of One Hundred and Nineteenth street, to be occupied by eight families each; condition, that the shaft on the stair-case side be extended downwards so as to light and ventilate the two bedrooms on the second story; extension to be shortened to 36 feet.

Plan No. 776. Four four-story tenement houses, 25 feet by 60 feet each, on lots 25 feet by 100 feet, on the south side of Forty-fourth street, 150 feet east of Second avenue, to be occupied by eight families each; conditions, ventilating shaft provided for water-closet, slot between houses to be 4 feet wide in the clear, and slots of end houses two feet wide in the clear.

Plan No. 7 7. Five four-story tenement houses, 25 feet by 56 feet each on lots 25 feet by 100 feet, on the south side of east Eighty-second street, 206 feet 6 inches east of First avenue, to be occupied by eight families each; condition, air shaft to be sixteen square feet.

Plan No. 778, three four-story tenement houses, 21 feet 3 inches by 55 feet each, on lots 21 feet 3 inches by 100 feet on the west side of Second avenue, 50 feet south of One Hundred and Thirteenth street, to be occupied by three families each.

Plan No. 779, two four-story tenement houses, one 30 feet by 65 feet, on lot 30 feet by 75 feet, and one 25 feet by 75 feet, on lot 25 feet by 100 feet, on the north side of Seventy-ninth street, commencing 75 feet east of Second avenue, to be occupied by eight families each; conditions, windows in the side of house on lot 30x75 feet to remain unobstructed.

Plan No. 780, one five-story tenement house, 25 feet by 55 feet, on lot 25 feet by 100 feet 6 inches on West Fifty-fourth street. No. 427 to be occupied by eight families.

Plan No. 783, one five-story tenement house, 39 feet 7½ inches by 65 feet, on lot 39 feet 7½ inches by 100 feet, on the north side of Seventy-ninth street, 200 feet east of Third avenue, to be occupied by ten families; conditions, that main shafts be made 20 square feet in the clear, that a 20 square foot shaft be provided for servants' bed-rooms, and a separate shaft for bath-rooms.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending December 18, 1880:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,901, as follows, viz.: I public building, 861 tenement-houses, 130 private dwellings, 77 other dwellings, II manufactories and workshops, II stores and warehouses, 28 stables, 36 slaughter-houses, I lime-kiln, 2 manure-dumps, I garbage-dump, I lodging-house, I public sewer, I2 sunken and vacant lots, 83 yards, courts, and areas, III cellars and basements, 228 waste-pipes and drains, 223 privies and water-closets, I3 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 9 dangerous stairways, 2 cesspools, 7 smoky chimneys, I3 other nuisances, together with 38 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 690.

During the past week 180 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 48 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the

58 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 237 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 213 houses, 213 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc. Fourteen cases of contagious disease were removed to the hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 530 births, 46 still-births, 163 marriages, and 636 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, December 18, 1880; this shows an increase of 42 births, 6 still-births, 64 marriages, and 5 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1879, there was an increase of 2 still-births, 156 deaths, and a decrease of 4 births and 11 marriages. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from croup decreased 3; diarrhœa, 8; cerebro-spinal fever, 2; typhus and typhoid tever I each; phthisis pulmonalis, 16; bronchitis, 4; pneumonia, 15; marasmus, tabes mesenterica, and scrofula, 5; meningitis and encephalitis, 5; convulsions, 2; apoplexy, 4; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, I; enteritis, gastro enteritis, peritonitis, and gastritis, 8; cyanosis and atelectasis, 2; premature and preternatural births, 2; while the deaths from small-pox increased 3; scarlatina, 6; diphtheria, 12; whooping cough, I; erysipelas, 4; and heart diseases, 11; while the deaths from measles, malarial fevers, puerperal diseases, suicides and drownings show no change from the previous week. from the previous week.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 127 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year; 178 under two years; 244 under five years, and 49 seventy years and over, which shows that the deaths of children under five years of age was 22 less than the number reported during last week, and represent 37.48 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 132 were in institutions, 381 in tenement houses, 126 in houses containing three families or less, 4 in hotels and boarding-houses, 4; in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 8 were on the basement floor, 118 on the first, 195 on the second, 110 on the third, 64 on the fourth, 15 on the fifth, 1 on the sixth; 644 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 7 non-residents; 92 were stated to be single, 152 married, 79 widowed, and the condition of 328 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 651; still-births, 46; bodies in transitu, 24; of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births 77 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 530 births, 163 marriages, 46 still-births 65 deaths, 24 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 44 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 3 transcripts of the birth record, 14 of marriage, and 27 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending December 18, 1880, was 32.6 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.676, the mean humidity was 85, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,522, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.17 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 596 deaths and still-births, or 85.50 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 20; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 267; City pauper burial-ground (undenominational), 63; Greenwood (undenominational), 49; Lutheran (undenominational), 82; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 25; Evergreen (undenominational), 31; Woodlawn (undenominational), 49; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 6; Union (Methodist Protestant), 2; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 1; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 5; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 9; Washington (undenominational), 8.

The distribution of deaths (actual mortality) for the week ending December II, 1880, was in the following Wards, viz.: First, 4; Second, 2; Third, 4; Fourth, II; Fitth, IO; Sixth, I4; Seventh, 30; Eighth, 28; Ninth, 22; Tenth, 30; Eleventh, 37; Twelfth, 45; Thirteenth, 22; Fourteenth, 12; Fifteenth, 15; Sixteenth, 26; Seventeenth, 36; Eighteenth, 35; Nineteenth, 99; Twentieth, 52; Twenty-first, 40; Twenty-second, 38; Twenty-third, 16; Twenty-fourth, 8.

The actual mortality for the week ending December 11, 1880, was 636; this is 162 more than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1879, and 156.4 more than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 27.40 per 1,000 persons living, the population, according to the U. S. Census of 1880, being 1,206,577.

The annual death-rate per 1,000 persons living, of the estimated or enumerated population, according to the most recent weekly returns of Philadelphia, Pa., was 19.21; Brooklyn, N. SIR—There were 651 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, December 18, 1880, which is an increase of 20, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 152 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1879. The actual mortality for the week ending December 11, 1880, was 636, which is 156.4 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 28.23 per 1,000 persons living, the population, according to the last U. S. Census, being 1,206,577.

Sir—By chapter 521, Laws of 1880, section 2, the salary of the Commissioner of Public Works thereafter to be appointed was established at the rate of \$8,000 per annum. At the date of the Departmental Estimate for this Department, a new appointment for Commissioner of Public Works had not been made, and the estimate for "Salaries—Department of Public Works," for 1881, contained provision for a salary of \$10,000 for the Commissioner. I therefore desire to amend the Departmental Estimate for that appropriation by reducing it from the sum of \$83,800 to the sum of \$81,800.

SIR-The Departmental Estimate for "Lamps and Gas" for 1881, was based on the prices paid for lighting public lamps for the year ending April 30, 1881, and the prices paid for gas for public buildings for the year 1880.

Since the estimate was made, proposals have been received from the several gas-light companies for furnishing gas for the public buildings for the year 1881, and in accordance with the provisions of the Charter the lowest bids were accepted and contracts made thereon. Under these contracts the cost of lighting the public buildings and offices will be \$5,000 more than the amount allowed in the Departmental Estimate.

1 am also informed that the several Gas-light Companies appeared before your Board and stated that on the expiration of the present contracts for lighting the public lamps they would be compelled to increase the r prices, as follows:

that on the expiration of the present contracts of lighting the pasts tamped to increase their prices, as follows:

The New York, Manhattan, New York Mutual, and Metropolitan Gas-light Companies, from \$15 per lamp, paid for the year ending April 30, 1881, to \$18 per lamp.

The Harlem Gas-light Company, from \$17 per lamp, paid for the year ending April 30, 1881,

to \$20 per lamp.

The Northern Gas-light Company, from \$35 per lamp, paid for the year 1880, to \$37.58.

As the contract with the Northern Gas-light Company expires on the 31st inst., a contract at the above rate (\$37.58 per annum), has been made by the Gas Commission with this company for the four months ending April 30, 1881.

Under these circumstances, the cost of lighting the public lamps of the city for 1881 will be \$45,453 more than the amount allowed in the Departmental Estimate.

I therefore respectfully ask to amend the Departmental Estimate for "Lamps and Gas" by increasing it from \$500,400 to \$550,853 (including \$5,400 for salaries payable from the same), and request that the latter amount be set apart in the Final Estimate for 1881.

Sir—When the Departmental Estimate for this Department was made up, it was considered that an expenditure of \$1,500 would be sufficient for the necessary repairs and alterations to prepare the rooms in the City Hall, lately occupied by this Department, for the use of the Marine Court. Upon re-examination of the subject since the rooms are vacated, it is found that the expense will be about \$5,000, requiring a corresponding increase in the estimate for the appropriation for "Public Buildings, Construction and Repairs." It is thought, however, that with strict economy, and confining the repairs and alterations to the immediate necessities, an increase of \$3,000 will be sufficient.

The Departmental Estimate for that appropriation also includes an allowance of \$18,000 for the necessary work, alterations and fittings to prepare the upper part of the Essex Market building for an armory for the Fifth Regiment of the National Guard. Inasmuch as this is a special item of expenditure, not in the nature of general repairs and maintenance of public buildings, I would recommend that the above amount be set apart as a special appropriation for this purpose.

I therefore respectfully request that in the Final Estimate for 1881 the sum of \$48,000 be set apart for "Public Buildings, Construction and Repairs" (including \$1,900 for salaries payable from the same), and the sum of \$18,000 for "Fifth Regiment Armory, Essex Market."

ARREARS OF TAXES.

NOTICE TO TAXPAYERS

THE COMPTROLLER OF THE CITY OF NEW York hereby gives notice to owners of Real Estate in said city, that, as provided by chapter 123 of the Laws of 1880, they may now pay any arrears of taxes and Croton water rents levied prior to the year 1877, with interest thereon at the rate of seven per cent, per annum. CHAPTER 123.

An Act in relation to arrears of taxes in the City of New York, and to provide for the reissuing of revenue bonds in anticipation of such taxes.

Passed April 15, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time after the passage of this act, and before the first day of October, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person may pay to the Comptroller of the City of New York the amount of any tax upon real property belonging to such person, heretofore laid or imposed and now remaining unpaid, together with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the time that such tax was imposed to the time of such payment, provided, also, that the time when such payment may be made on the amount of any such tax laid or imposed in the years eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, and eighteen hundred and seventy-ine shall extend to the first day of April, eighteen hundred and eighty-one. The comptroller shall make and deliver to the person making any such payment a receipt therefor, and shall forthwith cancel the record of any such tax on the books of the finance department; and upon such payment being made such tax shall cease to be a lien upon the property and shall be deemed fully paid, satisfied and discharged, and there shall be no right to any further interest or penalty by reason of such tax not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute passed requiring the payment heretofore of any penalty or interest over seven per centum per annum upon any unpaid tax.

Sec. 2. Any revenue bond heretofore issued in anticipation of the taxes in the first section specified which may fall due and become payable before said taxes are collected, may be reissued by the comptroller of said city, in whole or in part, tor such period as he may determine, not exceeding one year.
