Minutes of Special Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their office, No. 209 Stewart Building, on Wednesday, February 2, 1887, at 2 o'clock P. M.

Present—Commissioners Spencer, Dowd, the Commissioner of Public Works, and Com-missioners Baldwin, Barnes, Ridgway and Fish. The Commissioners met to open the bids received for the construction of Additional Shaft No. 1514, situated on Section 7 of the New Croton Aqueduct, in pursuance to the public notice published daily for fifteen consecutive days, commencing January 15, in the CITY RECORD and New York "Star" and New York "Graphic."

After the reading of the aforesaid notice the bid-box was opened by the Commissioners, and the following bids, upon which the required deposit had been made, were opened and read aloud by

As this statement does not embrace many new buildings where old ones have been demolished

As this statement does not embrace many new buildings where old ones have been demolished and where new ones are in progress, the figures are below the actual number. In the Second District, more especially in the Eleventh and Seventeenth Wards, the building interest has been very marked, and a corresponding increase in assessed valuations is noticed. In the Twenty-second Ward, 668 new buildings and an increase in the assessed valuations of about \$10,000,000, indicates that there has been only a small increase in the assessment of the land, while in the Twelfth Ward 1,500 new buildings and an increase in the assessed valuations of over \$24,000,000 would indicate that a very large increase has been made on the land ; and in the Nineteenth Ward an increase of nearly \$7,000,000, with only 371 new buildings, would indicate a still greater increase in the old valuations, which is probably not the case as the buildings are of a more costly character than in the other wards. Out of the 113 new buildings in the Twenty-fourth Ward only one was brick and cost about \$4,500, the others being frame and having an average assessment of \$1,000 each. In the Twenty-third Ward there are 288 new buildings, about one-half of which are brick, hav-ing an average assessment of \$3,000 each, the other half being frame with an average assessment of \$800 each.
