The following resolution of the Board of Aldermen was returned to his Honor the Mayor for amendment, for the reason that the word "ordered" therein is directed by law to be done by the Department of Public Works, namely:

Resolved, That Eighty-first street, from Eighth to Ninth avenue, be graded, curbed, and be paved with Belgian or trap-block pavement, and that at the several intersecting streets and avenues crosswalks be laid where not now laid, and relaid where those now laid are, in the opinion of the Commissioner of Public Works, not in good repair, or are not upon a grade adapted to the grade of the proposed new pavement, under the direction of the Commissioners of Public Parks; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Messrs. Charles H. Haswell, William E. Worthen, and John Bogart, the Commission of Engineers appointed to examine the work of constructing Riverside avenue, presented their report, whereupon the following preambles and resolution were adopted:

Whereas, It appears by a report made by a Board of Engineers, appointed to investigate the conduct of the work of Riverside Drive, that in consequence of the lax supervision of the Superintending Engineer, the work has not, in the opinion of said Board of Engineers, been performed by the contractors in every respect fully in the spirit and letter of the contract; and Whereas, The Superintending Engineer has been specially charged by this Department with the supervision and proper conduct of this work, and to represent the Department in the same; therefore Resolved, That the Secretary be directed to transmit a copy of these preambles and resolution to the said Superintending Engineer, and notify him to appear before this Board at its next meeting, and present in writing his reasons, and any statement he may wish to make, why he should not be removed from his present position of Superintending Engineer.
