The 703 deaths represent a death-rate of 18.99, against 18.11 for the previous week and 18.44 for the corresponding week of 1895.

Contagious and infectious diseases show a slight decrease, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever and small-pox being respectively 238, 227, 102, 14 and 0, against 246, 289, 75, 13 and 0 for the previous week, a total of 581 against 623. The increase of diphtheria was mainly in the Eleventh and Twenty-first Wards, and the decrease in the Eighth and Nineteenth Wards. The increase of measles was most marked in the Eighteenth Ward, and the decrease in the Tenth and Twenty-second Wards, and the decrease in the Twelfth and Twenty-first Wards. Eleven of the 14 cases of typhoid fever were above Fortieth street, and 2 were below Fourteenth street. No case of small-pox was reported.
