The following was received from Messrs. Coleman, Breuchaud & Coleman, con-tractors for the New Croton Dam:

CROTON-ON-HUDSON, N. Y., September 29, 1902.

To the Honorable the Aqueduct Commissioners:

To the Honorable the Aqueduct Commissioners:

Gentlemen—We have received your letter of September 26, 1902.

You maintain that you have no statement from us that a reduction of the hours of work would cause us any injury. We beg to state that if we had to pay our men the same wages for a reduced number of hours, it follows that our financial loss would be large and easily estimated, causing us an obvious injury.

As regards facts for a basis of modification of our contract, we beg to hand you herewith a table of prices which we submit for your consideration.

We notice that you refer to an absence of sufficient reasons given by us why such a modification would be for the best interests of The City of New York. We respectfully submit the following reasons for your consideration:

The contract for the construction of the New Croton Dam was executed in 1892, before the eight-hour working day had been adopted by the Legislature as the policy of the State in all public works.

Since then the eight-hour day has been given the force of law in relation to public work by action of the Legislature, and has, as matter of fact, become universal for City work.

In the vicinity of the New Croton Dam an important contract is in force under the eight-hour law, and others have to be made in the Croton Reservoir upon the

Same basis.

Under these circumstances, there have already been, since the passing of the law of April 14, 1902, many delays in the construction of the dam, owing to our inability of securing a sufficient number of men for working on a ten-hour basis, and while these conditions remain unchanged more delays are certain to occur; and, as you are aware, the work is now stopped owing to the impossibility of keeping our men at work under the old conditions.

From what precedes it can be seen that the adoption of the eight-hour day would importantly haven the completion of the dam, which is of vital consequence to the

From what precedes it can be seen that the adoption of the eight-hour day would importantly hasten the completion of the dam, which is of vital consequence to the water supply system of New York.

Considering that the demands of the workmen are due to a Legislative act, approved by the Mayor of New York, which imposes upon us new conditions which were not contemplated in our contract, we do not consider that we can be held responsible for the delays which have already occurred. Although we know that the act of April 14, 1902, is not mandatory, we feel justified in representing that, in our cpinion, our case calls for the exercise of discretion in accordance with its terms.

Gentlemen—Relating to the forms of contract, specifications, proposal and bond, for building fourteen highway bridge superstructures across the Croton lake and river and its tributaries, which were transmitted to you by the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, with a communication dated August 6, 1902, which was reterred to me, I beg to report that three of the bridge superstructures are to be erected on the highways that are being constructed by Coleman, Breuchaud & Coleman on the New Croton Dam Division. Gentlemen—Relating to a communication received from Messrs. Robertson & Barrett, dated September 8, 1902, transmitting bill of Clark & Avery, for \$28.50, and of Arthur S. Avery, for \$58, for removing bodies from the Katonah Cemetery, which communication was referred to me, I would report that I instructed Mr. Edward Wegmann, Division Engineer, to investigate the matter and he writes me as follows:

Wegmann, Division Engineer, to investigate the matter and he writes me as follows:

"In answer to your favor of the 24th inst., I have to report as follows about the removal of bodies referred to in your letter:

"The Mr. Avery, of the firm of Clark & Avery, is Mr. A. S. Avery, since May 9, 1901, Axeman on this division. He informs me that in December, 1899, before entering the service of The City of New York, he moved, as a member of the firm of Avery & Smith, three bodies, with stones, etc., from the Katonah Cemetery to Oakwood, Mt. Kisco, for Mrs. Amelia Deacon, of Katonah, New York, for which he was paid \$58. Before doing this work he wrote to Mr. H. T. Dykman to get his consent to the removal and received an answer of which I inclose a copy.

"In April, 1902, while employed by the City, Clark & Avery, of which firm he is a member, moved one body, with stones, etc., from Katonah to Bedford Union Cemetery, for Miss E. A. Reynolds, of Mount Vernon, N. Y., for which they received \$28.50. In this case Clark & Avery did not communicate with Mr. Dykman, as they thought his letter of October 6, 1899, of which a copy is inclosed, covered this case.

this case.

"I have, therefore, to report that the two bills mentioned in your letter are correct, and were actually paid by owners of lots in Katonah Cemetery for moving bodies, stones, etc. As far as I can learn, no promise was given to the plotholders that the City would reimburse them for the expenses incurred in moving the bodies and monuments, but they wished to have the work done without any delay and did it, therefore, on their own account.

"The bill seems reasonable, though the work might probably have been done for

somewhat less if let in a big contract. The prices charged per body and stone are in one case \$19.33 and in the other \$28.50. Smith & Godwin last fall moved bodies and stones from the Katonah Cemetery for from \$14 to \$24 per body.

"The above facts will give you all the information I have in connection with these bills."
