BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN.

At a meeting of the Board of Local Improvements of the Washington Heights District, held June 30, 1903, the following members were present: Alderman Florence and President Cantor.

The minutes of the previous meeting were approved.

The President presented the matter of repairing sidewalks on the west side of Broadway, between One Hundred and Thirtieth and One Hundred and Thirty-first streets.

On motion, suitable resolution was introduced and adopted providing for this improvement. Estimated cost, \$360. Assessed value of property affected, \$25,000.

The President presented the matter of flagging sidewalks on the north side of West One Hundred and Forty-fourth street, beginning 200 feet west of Amsterdam avenue

One Fundred and Forty-fourth street, beginning 200 feet west of Amsterdam avenue and running west 100 feet.

Suitable resolution was adopted authorizing this improvement, the estimated cost of which is \$80 and the assessed value of property affected being \$30,000.

The President submitted the matter of changing the grades of Riverside Drive extension, between West One Hundred and Thirty-fifth and West One Hundred and Fifty-eighth streets, and the grades of the abutting streets to suit the grades of Riverside Drive extension.

At a meeting of the Board of Local Improvements of the Washington Heights District, held July 7, 1903, the following members were present: Aldermen Florence, Meyers. Klett and President Cantor.

The minutes of the previous meeting were approved.

The President submitted to the Board the matter of placing a sewer in Broadway, east and west sides, between Dyckman street and the summit north of Hawthorne street.

Suitable resolution was adopted authorizing this improvement, the estimated cost of which is \$27,000 and the assessed value of property affected \$707,000.

The President submitted petition for the paving of West One Hundred and Seventy-eighth street, from Amsterdam avenue to Broadway.

There being no report from the Commissioner of Public Works, the matter was laid over.

The President presented the question of paving Bradhurst avenue, between West One Hundred and Fiftieth and West One Hundred and Fifty-fifth streets, with sheet asphalt, and the curbing and resetting of the curb of same.

Suitable resolution was introduced and adopted providing for this improvement. Estimated cost, \$18,878; assessed value of property affected, \$602,500.

The President presented the matter of paving West One Hundred and Fiftieth street, between Eighth avenue and Bradhurst avenue, with sheet asphalt, and the curbing and resetting of the curb of same.

Proper resolution was adopted approving of this work. Estimated cost, \$2,792; assessed value of property affected, \$133,000.

Note—The Engineer of Highways reports that no water mains have been laid in this street between the points mentioned, and the clerk was instructed to communicate to the Commissioner of Water Supply the fact that the Board was about to initiate to the Commissioner and request that water mains be laid in this street between the points named, and that the forwarding of this resolution be withheld until such work is completed.

Superintendent's Report.

Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:
Section 1. The Board of Aldermen of The City of New York hereby grants to the Ocean Electric Railway Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the franchise, right and privilege to construct and operate a double-track surface railway, with all connections, turnouts, switches, crossovers and suitable stands necessary for the accommodation and operation of said railway, by the overhead system of electricity, or any other motive power which may be lawfully employed upon the same, in, upon and along the following named streets and highways and bridges, all situated in the Borough of Queens, City and State of New York, set forth in the following description of route:
Beginning at the termination of the existing railroad tracks on Washington avenue, so-called, in Rockaway Park upon Rockaway Beach, in the Fifth Ward of the Borough of Queens; running from thence in an easterly and southerly direction along Eastern avenue to the Boulevard; thence easterly along the Boulevard to Park avenue; and thence northerly along Park avenue; and thence northerly along Park avenue; and thence northerly along Park avenue to the existing right of way and railroad track of the New York and Rockaway Beach Railroad Company in what is now known as Hammels in said Fifth Ward of the Borough of Queens and City of New York.

Section 2. The grant of this franchise is subject to the following conditions:

struction and operation of said railway shall be obtained by the grantee, or in the event that such consent cannot be obtained, the grantee shall obtain the favorable determination, confirmed by the Court, of three Commissioners, appointed by the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, in the manner provided by the Railroad Law, before said railway is built or operated.

Second—The said right, privilege and franchise to construct and operate said railway shall be held and enjoyed by said railway company, its lessee or successors, for the term of twenty-five years from the date when this ordinance is signed by the Mayor, with the privilege of renewal of said grant for a further period of twenty-five years upon a fair revaluation of said right, privilege and franchise, but such renewal shall not provide for any further renewal. Such revaluation shall be of the right, privilege and franchise to maintain and operate said railway by itself, and shall not include any valuation derived from the ownership, operation or control of any other railroad by the grantee, its successors or assigns. It shall be made in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board of Estimate and Aportionment or its successors in authirity; one disinterested freeholder; and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluations aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six months prior to the expiration of the grant, and their report shall be filed with the Comptroller or his successor in authority within three months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience, and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine the books of the railway company. The valuations so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but shall not in any event be less than the minimum amount fixed as the sum to be paid annually for the last five years of the original franchise.

Third—Upon the termination of the said franchise, right or privilege, whether original or renewal, if the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, or its successors in authority shall so desire, there shall be a fair valuation of the plant and property of the grantee necessary for traction purposes upon the said streets and highways and bridges, including equipment, tracks and appurtenances, which plant and property shall be and become the property of The City of New York at the option of the said Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority, on the termination of this grant and the payment to the grantee of such valuation. The valuation shall be based upon a fair appraisal of the property, excluding any value derived from the franchise, and such value shall be determined by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority.

Fourth—The Ocean Electric Railway Company, its successors or assigns, shall pay for this franchise to The City of New York the following sums of money: During the first term of five years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than \$500, and which shall in no case be less than \$500, and which shall be equal to three per cent. of its gross annual receipts from the route constructed under this ordinance, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of \$500. Sixth—The railway and other structures constructed by the grantee, its successors or assigns under this ordinance, shall in all respects comply with the provisions of chapter 686 of the Laws of 1894, as amended.

Seventh—The grantee, its successors or assigns, shall cause to be laid, under the supervision of the municipal authorities having jurisdiction in such matters, upon and along the public highway known as the Boulevard, as hereinbefore described, a good and sufficient macadamized payement to the curb line on the north and south sides of the said Boulevard.

The grantee shall pay the entire cost thereof, together with the cost of the present macadamized payem

Tenth—The said railway shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of The City of New York, who have jurisdiction in such matters under the Charter of the City.

Eleventh—Said railway shall be constructed and operated in the latest improved manner of street railway construction and operation, and the railway and property of said company shall be maintained in good condition throughout the term of this grant.
