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BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

EXTRACT FROM

MINUTES, BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT, CITY OF NEW YORK, MARCH 22, 1907.

Nassau Electric Railroad Company.

In the matter of the application of the Nassau Electric Railroad Company for a franchise to construct, maintain and operate a double track street surface railroad on Livingston street and on Flatbush and Lafayette avenues, in the Borough of Brooklyn, upon which a report, together with a proposed form of contract, was submitted from the Bureau of Franchises at the meeting of June 22, 1906, and the matter subsequently referred to a Select Committee consisting of the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, which Committee on January 18, 1907, submitted certain terms and conditions upon which it recommended the franchise should be granted, and the matter was referred to the Corporation Counsel, from whom an opinion was received at the meeting of March 15, 1907, suggesting certain modifications and recommendations in the proposed form of contract; and the matter was adjourned until this day.

The President of the Borough of Brooklyn moved that consideration of the matter be adjourned two weeks.

Which motion was agreed to.

George J. Hoster.

In the matter of the application of George J. Hoster for permission to construct, maintain and operate a single track turnout from the existing tracks of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad in Eleventh avenue, to the premises of the petitioner, situated on the northeast corner of Eleventh avenue and West Thirty-fourth street, Borough of Manhattan, which construction was authorized by resolution adopted by the Board October 26, 1906, and approved by the Mayor February 13, 1907.

Pursuant to the terms of the consent the petitioner filed a certificate of acceptance, which was forwarded to the Corporation Counsel for approval.

The Secretary presented the following:

Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—I have a communication from you, dated February 27, 1907, inclosing for my approval as to form the certificate of acceptance of George J. Hoster, filed with the Board of Estimate and Apportionment February 27, 1907, pursuant to a resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment October 26, 1906, and approved by the Mayor February 13, 1907.

Such resolution purported to authorize the construction and maintenance of a single track turnout from the existing tracks of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad in Eleventh avenue to the premises of George J. Hoster, situated on the northeasterly corner of Eleventh avenue and West Thirty-fourth street, in the Borough of Manhattan.

Since the date of the adoption of such resolution by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and its approval by the Mayor, an opinion has been handed down by the Appellate Division in the case of Edward P. Hatfield and others vs. Isidore Straus and others.

This was an appeal involving the question of the right of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to consent to the construction and operation by the firm of R. H. Macy & Co. of tracks connecting their premises with the tracks of the Street Surface Railway Company in Thirty-fourth street.

In the opinion of Clarke, J., it was stated:

"Upon reason and authority therefor I reach the conclusion that there is no power lodged in the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or any local authority, to grant the permit here under consideration."

In view of the foregoing, I am of the opinion that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment had no authority to make the said grant to George J. Hoster, and I therefore return to you herewith the said certificate of acceptance without my approval as to form.

The Secretary was directed to notify the petitioner of the opinion rendered by the Corporation Counsel.

The following matters not on the calendar were considered by unanimous consent:

New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, for Itself and as Lessee of the New York and Harlem Railroad Company.

In the matter of the application of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, for itself and as lessee of the New York and Harlem Railroad Company, for a franchise or right to construct, maintain and use ducts or subways through certain streets and avenues in the Borough of The Bronx, for the purpose of electrifying its lines in conformity with chapter 425 of the Laws of 1903, upon which a report was submitted on September 28, 1906, from the Bureau of Franchises, together with a proposed form of contract, and which was subsequently referred to a Select Committee consisting of the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the President of the Borough of The Bronx, which, on February 15, 1907, presented a report suggesting certain modifications in the contract previously submitted by the Bureau of Franchises, which terms and conditions were tentatively approved by the Board at its meeting of March 1, 1907, and the matter referred to the Corporation Counsel to draw a contract in accordance with the modified terms and conditions.

At the meeting of March 15 an opinion was received from the Acting Corporation Counsel suggesting certain changes in the proposed contract, and the matter was referred to a Select Committee consisting of the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the President of the Borough of The Bronx.

The Comptroller, as Chairman of the Select Committee, presented the following:

SIR—At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held March 15, 1907, a copy of opinion, dated March 14, 1907, from the Acting Corporation Counsel, suggesting certain amendments to the form of contract as modified by the Select Committee for the grant of a franchise to the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company for itself and as lessee of the New York and Harlem Railroad Company, to construct ducts or subways under and along certain streets in the Borough of The Bronx, was referred to a Select Committee consisting of the Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen and President of the Borough of The Bronx.

Your Committee considered the suggestions of the Acting Corporation Counsel good, and would advise that they be incorporated in the form of agreement.

The following was offered:

Resolved, That the report, dated March 19, 1907, from the Select Committee, this day presented to this Board, be approved and the Division of Franchises be instructed to incorporate in the proposed form of contract granting a franchise to the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, for itself and as lessee of the New York and Harlem Railroad Company, to construct, maintain and operate certain ducts or subways under and along certain streets and avenues in the Borough of The Bronx, the amendments suggested by the Acting Corporation Counsel in the opinion dated March 14, 1907, submitted to the Board March 15, 1907.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—16.

Union Railway Company of New York City.

In the matter of the application of the Union Railway Company of New York City for permission to construct, maintain and operate a double track railroad connecting with the existing tracks of the company on Madison avenue, between One Hundred and Thirty-sixth and One Hundred and Thirty-seventh streets, Borough of Manhattan, thence over, upon and along the viaduct, temporary bridge and over, upon and across the temporary bridge and viaduct leading thereto, to the terminus of said viaduct at Mott avenue, in the Borough of The Bronx, and northerly upon and along Mott avenue to its intersection with One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, to connect with the existing double track railroad of said company upon One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, and such permission to continue until the completion of the new Madison Avenue Bridge and the viaducts leading thereto, which was presented to the Board at its meeting of December 21, 1906, and referred to the Bureau of Franchises, which Bureau, on March 15, 1907, presented a report, together with a resolution for adoption, and the matter was referred to a Select Committee consisting of the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx.

The Comptroller, as Chairman of the Select Committee, presented the following:

Hon. GEORGE B. MCCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman, Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—At meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held March 15, 1907, a report was received from the Bureau of Franchises, suggesting certain terms and conditions to govern the consent of the City, permitting the Union Railway Company to construct, maintain and operate a double track railroad connecting with the existing tracks of the company on Madison avenue, between One Hundred and Thirty-sixth and One Hundred and Thirty-seventh streets, Borough of Manhattan, over the temporary bridge and viaduct leading thereto, to the terminus of said viaduct at Mott avenue, in the Borough of The Bronx, and upon and along Mott avenue, to its intersection with One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, to connect with the existing double track railroad of said company upon One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street. A form of resolution was also presented for adoption.

The matter was referred to a Select Committee, consisting of the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the President of the Borough of Manhattan and the President of the Borough of The Bronx.

Your Committee after considering all the suggestions before it, would recommend:

First—That the annual compensation for the privilege be fixed at \$5,000.

Second—That the permit issued by the Department of Public Parks on November 23, 1892, to the Union Railway Company of New York City, for permission to maintain its tracks upon and across the Madison Avenue Bridge for the purpose of running tracks across said bridge, be revoked upon the removal of the present swing span connecting Madison avenue in the Borough of Manhattan with East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, in the Borough of The Bronx.

The following was offered:

Whereas, The City of New York is about to replace the present Madison avenue bridge over the Harlem river, connecting Madison avenue in the Borough of Manhattan with One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street in the Borough of The Bronx by a new and larger bridge structure; and

Whereas, In order that traffic may be maintained between the two boroughs during the erection of said new bridge the City has caused to be built a temporary bridge and approaches thereto, from a point on Madison avenue, between One Hundred and Thirty-sixth and One Hundred and Thirty-seventh streets, Borough of Manhattan, to a point on Mott avenue, between Park avenue and One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, Borough of The Bronx; and

Whereas, The Union Railway Company, having a franchise for a street surface railroad on One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, from Third avenue to the Harlem river, and on Madison avenue, from One Hundred and Thirtieth street to the Harlem river, and an administrative permit for the use of the existing Madison avenue bridge, has made application to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the consent of said Board to construct, maintain and operate temporary railroad tracks on Madison avenue, Borough of Manhattan, and over the said temporary bridge and the approaches thereto, and on Mott avenue, in the Borough of The Bronx, pending the completion of the new bridge; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the consent of the corporation of The City of New York be and the same is hereby given to the Union Railway Company, a corporation organized under the laws of the State of New York, to construct, maintain and operate a double track street surface railroad by the overhead system of electricity, in, along and across the following streets, avenues and the temporary Madison avenue bridge and the approaches thereto, viz., connecting with the existing tracks of the grantee in Madison avenue, Borough of Manhattan, at a point on said Madison avenue, between One Hundred and Thirty-sixth and One Hundred and Thirty-seventh streets, where the viaduct leading to the said temporary bridge intersects Madison avenue; thence over, along and upon the said viaduct, and over, upon and across said temporary bridge and the viaduct leading thereto, in the Borough of The Bronx, to the terminus of said viaduct at Mott avenue; thence northerly along and upon Mott avenue to One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, there to connect with the existing double track railroad of the grantee upon said One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, said track being for temporary use only during the construction of the new Madison Avenue bridge, the location of said railroad track being shown on a map or plan entitled:

"Map showing location of proposed railway track to be constructed upon the temporary bridge across the Harlem river and upon the approaches thereto, together with curves and connections with existing railway tracks in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, to accompany application of the Union Railway Company of New York City to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York,"

—dated December 19, 1906, and signed by Edward A. Maher, president, a copy of which is annexed hereto and made a part hereof, upon the following terms and conditions:

1. Said consent shall continue only during the pleasure of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority, and shall be revocable upon thirty (30) days' notice in writing to said grantee, its successors and assigns, but in no case shall said consent extend beyond a term of three (3) years from the date of the approval of this consent by the Mayor, and thereupon all rights of the said Union Railway Company, its successors or assigns, in and upon the said Madison avenue, Mott avenue, One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street and the temporary bridge and the approaches or viaducts leading thereto shall cease and determine. Provided, however, that if, before the expiration of the full term of three (3) years for which this consent is granted, the new Madison avenue bridge shall have been completed and opened for public travel, and the grantee shall have constructed and put in operation its railroad thereon, such construction and operation shall act as a revocation of this consent, and all rights of said grantee thereunder shall cease and determine without notice from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority.

2. The Union Railway Company, its successors or assigns, shall pay into the Treasury of The City of New York the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) per annum.

Such sum shall be paid into the Treasury of The City of New York on November 1 of each year; provided, however, that the first payment shall be only such portion of \$5,000 as the time between the date when the temporary bridge is first opened to public travel and November 1 following shall bear to the whole year. The compensation herein reserved shall commence from the date of the opening of the temporary bridge to public travel. Such compensation shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but shall be in addition to any and all taxes of what-

soever kind or description now or hereafter to be paid by any ordinance of The City of New York, or by any law of the State of New York.

3. Upon the revocation or termination by limitation of this consent the said grantee, its successors or assigns, shall, at its own cost, cause the railroad track and all appurtenances pertaining thereto to be removed, and all those portions of Madison avenue, Mott avenue, One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street and the temporary bridge and the approaches or viaducts leading thereto affected by this permission to be restored to their proper and original condition, if required so to do by The City of New York, or its duly authorized representatives. If the railroad track to be constructed by the said grantee under this consent shall not be required to be removed, it is agreed that the said track and appurtenances shall become the property of The City of New York. The said track and appurtenances shall be removed and the said streets restored to their original condition within thirty (30) days from the date when the new Madison avenue bridge is opened to public travel.

4. The consent hereby given is for the exclusive use of said grantee, and shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall title, interest or property therein pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the acts of the said grantee, its successors or assigns, or by operation of law, without the consent in writing of The City of New York, acting by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority.

5. The said grantee shall pay the entire cost of:

- (a) The construction and the maintenance of the railroad track and its appurtenances.
- (b) The protection of all surface and subsurface structures which shall in any way be disturbed by the construction of the railroad track and its appurtenances.
- (c) All changes in sewer or other subsurface structures made necessary by the construction of the railroad track and its appurtenances, including the laying or relaying of pipes, conduits, sewers or other structures.
- (d) The replacing or restoring the pavement in said streets which may be disturbed during the construction of said railroad track and its appurtenances, including the removing and replacing of all curb and flagging.
- (e) Each and every item of the increased cost of any future substructures caused by the presence of said railroad and its appurtenances under this consent.
- (f) The inspection of all work during the construction or removal of the railroad tracks, as herein provided, which may be required by the Presidents of the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx and the Commissioners of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, Bridges and Parks.
- (g) All engineering or surveying that may be performed by the Presidents of the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, and the Commissioners of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, Bridges and Parks, because of the construction or removal of the railroad track and its appurtenances, as herein provided.

6. Before the construction shall be begun the grantee shall obtain permits to do the work from the Presidents of the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, and from the Commissioners of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, Bridges and Parks. Said grantee shall perform all the duties which may be imposed upon the grantee by these officials as conditions of such permits, provided such conditions are not inconsistent with the provisions of this consent. The grantee shall submit to these officials working plans, which shall include and show in detail the method of construction of said railroad track and the mode of protection or changes in all subsurface structures required by the construction of this track.

7. The said railroad may be operated by the overhead system of electricity or by any other motive power which may be approved by the authorities of The City of New York, excepting horse or steam power.

8. Said grantee, its successors or assigns, shall upon ten (10) days' notice in writing from the Department of Bridges supply sufficient electric power to operate the draw span of the temporary bridge at all times during the twenty-four (24) hours of the day.

9. The grantee, its successors or assigns, shall at all times keep the streets along the track and for a distance of 2 feet on either side thereof and the entire roadway of the temporary bridge and the approaches thereto free and clear from ice and snow.

10. The grantee, its successors and assigns, shall keep in permanent repair the portion of the surface of the streets along its track and 2 feet on either side thereof, and the entire roadway of the temporary bridge and the approaches thereto, under the supervision of the proper local authorities, and whenever required by them to do so and in such manner as they may prescribe. And the City shall have the right to change the material or character of the pavement of the streets, and of the roadway of the temporary bridge and the approaches thereto, and in that event the grantee, its successors or assigns, shall be bound to replace such pavement, in the manner directed by the proper authorities, at its own expense, and the provision as to repairs herein contained shall apply to such renewed or altered pavement.

11. This consent is subject to whatever right, title or interest the owners of abutting property or others may have in or to Madison avenue, Mott avenue and One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street.

12. Said grantee, its successors or assigns, shall be liable for all damages to persons or property, including the street and subsurface structures therein, by reason of the construction, operation or maintenance of said railroad track, and it is a condition of this consent that The City of New York assumes no liability to either person or property on account of this consent.

13. This consent is given upon the further and express condition that the provisions of the Railroad Law, applicable thereto, and all laws or ordinances now in force or which may be adopted, relating to surface railroads operating in The City of New York, shall be strictly complied with.

14. Said grantee, its successors or assigns, shall commence the construction of said railroad under this consent and complete the same within ten (10) days after the closing of the present Madison Avenue Bridge to public travel; otherwise this consent shall be forfeited forthwith and without any proceedings, by law or otherwise, for that purpose; provided, however, that such time may be extended by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for a period not exceeding ten (10) days.

15. This consent is upon the express condition that the said grantee, within thirty (30) days after its approval by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of The City of New York the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000), either in money or securities, to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance of the terms and

conditions of this consent, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charge and the repairs of the street pavement. In case of default in the performance by said grantee of any of such terms and conditions, The City of New York shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for making the necessary change or repairs, after ten (10) days' notice in writing, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings, or in case of default in the payment of the annual charges, shall collect the same, with interest, from such fund after ten (10) days' notice, in writing, to the said grantee.

In case of any drafts so made upon the security fund, the said grantee shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice in writing, pay to the Comptroller of The City of New York a sum of money sufficient to restore the said fund to the original amount of five thousand dollars (\$5,000), and in default of the payment thereof the consent hereby given may be canceled and annulled, at the option of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, acting on behalf of said City. No action or proceedings or rights under the provisions of this section shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to The City of New York.

16. Said grantee shall give notice to the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx and to the Commissioners of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, Bridges and Parks, in writing, of its intention to begin construction of the work hereby authorized at least forty-eight (48) hours before such construction commences. The grantee shall also give to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment notice, in writing, of the date on which the work is commenced, and also the date on which the same is completed.

17. This consent shall not become operative until said grantee shall duly execute an instrument, in writing, wherein said grantee shall promise, covenant and agree on its part to conform to, abide by and perform all the terms, conditions and requirements in this consent fixed and contained, and file the same in the office of the Comptroller of The City of New York within thirty (30) days after the approval of this consent by the Mayor.

And the said grantee shall promise, covenant and agree in said instrument to hold The City of New York harmless from all damages to persons and property which may result from the construction, use, maintenance or operation of the railroad track hereby authorized.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond—15.

Present and not voting—The President of the Borough of The Bronx—1.

The following was offered:

Whereas, The City of New York is about to replace the present Madison Avenue Bridge over the Harlem river, connecting Madison avenue, in the Borough of Manhattan, with One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, in the Borough of The Bronx, by a new and larger structure; and

Whereas, It is found by the records of the Department of Public Parks that, on November 23, 1892, a permit was issued by said Department, reading as follows:

"The Union Railway Company of New York City, having heretofore applied for permission to maintain its tracks upon and across the Madison Avenue Bridge, for the purpose of running across the said bridge, which cars have been heretofore operated by animal traction, and the said company being determined to operate its cars across the said bridge and upon the rest of its route by electric traction;

"Now, for the purpose of enabling said company to effect such change, and for the purpose of securing the proper operation of the bridge as a drawbridge when so operated, and for the purpose of securing, to the public the greater facilities to be afforded by the use of electric power as a motive power and for other purposes;

"Resolved, That the Union Railway Company of New York is permitted to maintain its tracks upon and across the Madison Avenue Bridge, and is permitted to run cars operated by electric power thereon and to erect upon the bridge poles fit to carry the wires necessary for the propulsion of the said electric cars upon the bridge, and to construct whatever additional fixtures and wires which may be required for such purposes, and has hereby granted to said company full power and authority to run cars to be operated by electric power on the tracks upon and across the Madison Avenue Bridge, provided, however, that the said company shall so construct its tracks, poles, wires, fixtures and appurtenances, and shall so run, manage and operate its cars as not to impair the use of the bridge as a drawbridge and public highway, and provided further the said company shall submit a detailed specification for the work to be done to this Department for approval; and further, that this permission shall be subject to any change in the elevation or grade of the bridge and approaches; and

"Resolved, That the said Union Railway Company, in consideration of the license herein granted and during the life of this permit, shall supply electric power sufficient to operate the motor to turn the draw of the bridge, the power to be supplied during the whole twenty-four hours, it being understood that the Department of Parks shall supply the plant; notice that such supply of power shall be required of the Union Railway Company of New York City shall be given within thirty days prior to the date when such power shall be required; further

"Resolved, That should it be found at any time inoperative or inadvisable by said Union Railway Company of New York City to operate its cars by electric traction, it may abandon the use of such power and revert to the use of animal power;" therefore be it

Resolved, That the permit issued by the Department of Public Parks to the Union Railway Company of New York City for permission to maintain its tracks upon and across the Madison Avenue Bridge for the purpose of running across said bridge, be revoked upon the removal of the present swing span connecting Madison avenue, in the Borough of Manhattan, with East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, in the Borough of The Bronx.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond—15.

Present and not voting—The President of the Borough of The Bronx—1.

Present—George B. McClellan, Mayor; Herman A. Metz, Comptroller; Patrick Keenan, Chamberlain; Patrick F. McGowan, President, Board of Aldermen, and John R. Davies, Chairman, Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the meeting held February 20, 1907, were approved as printed.

Mr. L. Lafin Kellogg again appeared before the Board and requested that action be taken in regard to the proposed lease of the pier and bulkhead at the foot of West Forty-fourth street, to the United States Transportation Company. He renewed his request, he stated, because the Italian line had made an arrangement with the Dock Commissioner for the lease of a pier in South Brooklyn.

The Dock Commissioner, who was present, stated that while the Italian line had been negotiating for the lease of a pier in South Brooklyn, nothing definite had as yet been arranged and the matter was still open.

Mr. Kellogg then stated that he had evidently been misinformed as to the facts. No action was taken.

SIR—Hon. J. A. Bense, Commissioner, Department of Docks and Ferries, under date of January 30, 1907, transmits for the information of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund a copy of communication of same date forwarded to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, submitting estimates of moneys required for the use and purposes of the Department of Docks and Ferries for the year 1907, amounting to \$29,070,500, and requesting that the necessary action be taken in order that Corporate Stock be issued for the above amount. Second—The establishing of a marginal street, wharf or place with its inshore or easterly line coinciding with the westerly line of the right of way of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad and with the westerly line of said proposed marginal street, wharf or place coincident with the said proposed bulkhead line, both the easterly and westerly lines of said proposed marginal street, wharf or place extending from the aforesaid line drawn parallel with and distant 31 feet 4 inches southerly from the northerly line of West Seventy-seventh street northerly to the aforesaid line drawn parallel with and distant 31 feet 4 inches northerly from the southerly line of West Eighty-first street.

Third—The establishing of a pier 60 feet wide with its southerly side 40 feet northerly from and parallel with the aforesaid line drawn parallel with and distant 31 feet 4 inches southerly from the northerly line of West Seventy-seventh street; also a pier 60 feet wide drawn parallel with and distant 175 feet northerly from the first described proposed pier; also a pier 80 feet wide drawn parallel with and distant 175 feet northerly from the second herein described proposed pier; also a pier 60 feet wide drawn parallel with and distant 175 feet northerly from the third herein described proposed pier; also a pier 60 feet wide and drawn parallel with and 40 feet southerly from the hereinabove said line drawn parallel with and distant 31 feet 4 inches northerly from the southerly line of West Eighty-first street.

All said piers, five in number, extending from the hereinabove described proposed bulkhead line westerly to the pierhead line as established and modified by the Secretary of War in 1897.

Technical Description of Proposed New Plan for Improving the Water Front Between West Seventy-seventh and West Eighty-first Streets, North River.

The proposed new plan for improving the water front, between West Seventy-seventh and West Eighty-first streets, North river, comprises:

First—The establishing of a bulkhead line extending from a point in a line drawn parallel with and distant 31 feet 4 inches southerly from the northerly line of West Seventy-seventh street, distant 160 feet westerly from the westerly line of Twelfth avenue, to a point in a line drawn parallel with and distant 31 feet 4 inches northerly from the southerly line of West Eighty-first street, distant 165 feet westerly from the westerly line of Twelfth avenue.

Second—The establishing of a marginal street, wharf or place, with its inshore or easterly line coinciding with the westerly line of the right-of-way of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad and with the westerly line of said proposed marginal street, wharf or place coincident with the said proposed bulkhead line, both the easterly and westerly lines of said proposed marginal street, wharf or place extending from the aforesaid line drawn parallel with and distant 31 feet 4 inches southerly from the northerly line of West Seventy-seventh street, northerly to the aforesaid line drawn parallel with and distant 31 feet 4 inches northerly from the southerly line of West Eighty-first street.

Third—The establishing of a pier, 60 feet wide, with its southerly side 40 feet northerly from and parallel with the aforesaid line drawn parallel with and distant 31 feet 4 inches southerly from the northerly line of West Seventy-seventh street; also a pier 60 feet wide drawn parallel with and distant 175 feet northerly from the first described proposed pier; also a pier 80 feet wide drawn parallel with and distant 175 feet northerly from the second herein described proposed pier; also a pier 60 feet wide drawn parallel with and distant 175 feet northerly from the third herein described proposed pier; also a pier 60 feet wide and drawn parallel with and 40 feet southerly from the hereinabove said line drawn parallel with and distant 31 feet 4 inches northerly from the southerly line of West Eighty-first street.

All said piers, five in number, extending from the hereinabove described proposed bulkhead line westerly to the pierhead line as established and modified by the Secretary of War in 1897.

In connection therewith, the Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

SIR—Hon. J. A. Bense, Commissioner, Department of Dock and Ferries, in communication dated February 1, 1907, submits for the approval by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund a plan adopted by him February 1, 1907, for improving the water front of The City of New York, between West Seventy-seventh street and West Eighty-first street, North river, Borough of Manhattan.

This improvement consists of the establishment of a bulkhead line, marginal street and five piers between the prolongation of approximately the centre lines of West Seventy-seventh and West Eighty-first streets.

The Commissioners approved a similar plan for the improvement of this property on June 20, 1904, but subsequently Judge Davis of the Supreme Court rendered a decision that the plan had been unlawfully determined upon and adopted.

Sections 87 and 88 of the Charter were amended by chapter 741 of the Laws of 1904, so as to make the adoption of a plan for this improvement legal, and by a resolution of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, March 22, 1905, the Commissioner of Docks was requested "to prepare and adopt a new plan for the improvement of the water front and harbor of The City of New York on the North river, from West Seventy-seventh to West Eighty-first street, to take the place of the plan adopted by the Board of Docks May 17, 1901, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund June 20, 1901, which has been declared by the courts to be illegal, and submit the same to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at the earliest possible moment."

The plan now submitted is that requested by the above resolution. The improvement is a useful one, and I think that the plan may properly receive the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR—Honorable Theodore A. Bingham, Commissioner of the Police Department, in a communication dated February 21, 1907, transmits an order of the Police Department, which, in substance, requests the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to authorize the Comptroller to execute a lease from Hugo Heymann and Solomon Oppenheimer of the premises on Flatbush avenue, between Avenue J and Thirty-fifth street, in the Borough of Brooklyn, for the use of a precinct to be established by dividing the territory now known as the Sixty-eighth Precinct, the term to be for one year at an annual rental of \$1,000, with the privilege of renewal for another year upon the same terms. He states that the size of the

ground upon which the building stands is about 60 by 90 feet; that the Police Department has to make all alterations and repairs, the City to pay the water charges and to furnish the light, heat and janitor service, and that the necessity for leasing this property is for the purpose of establishing a station house as aforesaid, and that the premises recommended are the most reasonable that can be secured in the neighborhood for the purposes desired, and that the payment of the rent is from the appropriation made to the Police Department for the year 1907, entitled Police Station House Rents, and is sufficient to cover the obligation when incurred.

I have had an examination made of this site and find that it is the old Vandever homestead, on the west side of Flatbush avenue, 80 feet north of Avenue J. It is a two-story, cellar and attic, frame building, 40 by 25 feet, with a two-story and attic addition, 20 by 20 feet. The building is old and in very bad repair. The roof leaks and the plaster of the ceilings in the parlors is broken and fallen down. The wallpaper in several of the rooms, especially upstairs, is badly torn. The house is heated by a furnace in the cellar and there is gas and gas fixtures only in the five front rooms of the house. The water is obtained from a well and pump in the cellar, toilet in the yard, and there is no stable on the property.

This building was occupied about three years by the Colonial Athletic Club, at a rental of \$25 a month, and about a year ago the club moved out and the place was rented to the Redemption Mission, which is still in possession at the same rental.

The house has four rooms on the first floor and there are six on the second, with two small rooms partitioned off and plastered in the rear of the attic, making a total of twelve rooms in the building.

The rental asked by the owners of the property is excessive, and I would respectfully recommend that the Commissioner of the Police Department be requested to furnish the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund with information as to how much money he intends to spend for improvements and the nature and class of improvements before this lease is authorized.

You will note that the lease is for one year, with the privilege of renewal for one more year, and the Police Department can spend \$10,000 on the house and stable, and at the expiration of the lease the owner will have a new house which has cost him nothing, and upon which, if the City paid \$1,000 a year, he would receive an excess rental over the market rental value.

SIR—Caroline Hornung, in a verified petition addressed to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, requests a release of a portion of Bennett's lane, which was formerly a road from New Utrecht to the bay, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

The petitioner states that she is the owner of property situated on the southerly side of Bay Eleventh street, distant 131 feet 5 inches westerly from the southwesterly corner of Bay Eleventh street to Cropsey avenue, having a frontage of 40 feet on Bay Eleventh street, with a depth on the easterly side of 90 feet 6 inches; that said property is shown on the survey attached to the petition, and lies in Section 19, in Block 6460, on the land map of the County of Kings. In the matter of the application of Harris Cohen and Asher Shaps for a release of a portion of Bennett's lane, in the Borough of Brooklyn, which was presented to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on July 18, 1906 (see Minutes, Sinking Fund, 1906, page 870), the Corporation Counsel stated in an opinion under date of July 5, 1906, that in his opinion, the interest of the City in the said lane was merely nominal and a cloud upon the title of the private adjoining owner, and, further, he was of the opinion that where action was taken by the said authorities to discontinue and close the street, the City had thereafter no interest by which it could prevent the abutter upon the street so closed from erecting a building upon land formerly within that street; and, further, he was of the opinion that the provisions of sections 428, 442 and 443 of the amended Greater New York Charter superseded, so far as they go, the provisions of section 1006 of the Laws of 1905, relating to the closing of streets.

I would therefore respectfully recommend that the matter be referred to the Corporation Counsel for his opinion as to whether the interest of the City in the following described property, in the Borough of Brooklyn, is material, or nominal and a mere cloud upon the title of a private owner:

Beginning at a point on the southerly side of Bay Eleventh street, distant 131 feet 5 inches westerly from the southwesterly corner of Bay Eleventh street and Cropsey avenue; running thence westerly along the southerly side of Bay Eleventh street 40 feet; thence southerly and parallel with Cropsey avenue to the centre line of Bennett's lane; thence easterly along the northerly side of the centre line of Bennett's lane 40 feet 5 inches more or less; thence northerly and again parallel with Cropsey avenue to the point or place of beginning.

If the Corporation Counsel is of the opinion that the interest of the City is nominal and a mere cloud upon the title of a private owner, and he shall so certify, pursuant to the provisions of section 205 of the Greater New York Charter, I am of the opinion that a release should be authorized to the petitioner, Caroline Hornung, for a nominal consideration, upon condition that the petitioner shall produce evidence that the taxes, assessments, water rates and sales against the property heretofore described shall have been paid before the delivery of the release. I would also recommend that the charge to be made for a release of the property in question should be the nominal sum of \$1, together with the sum of \$100 for the cost of the examination and preparation of the release.

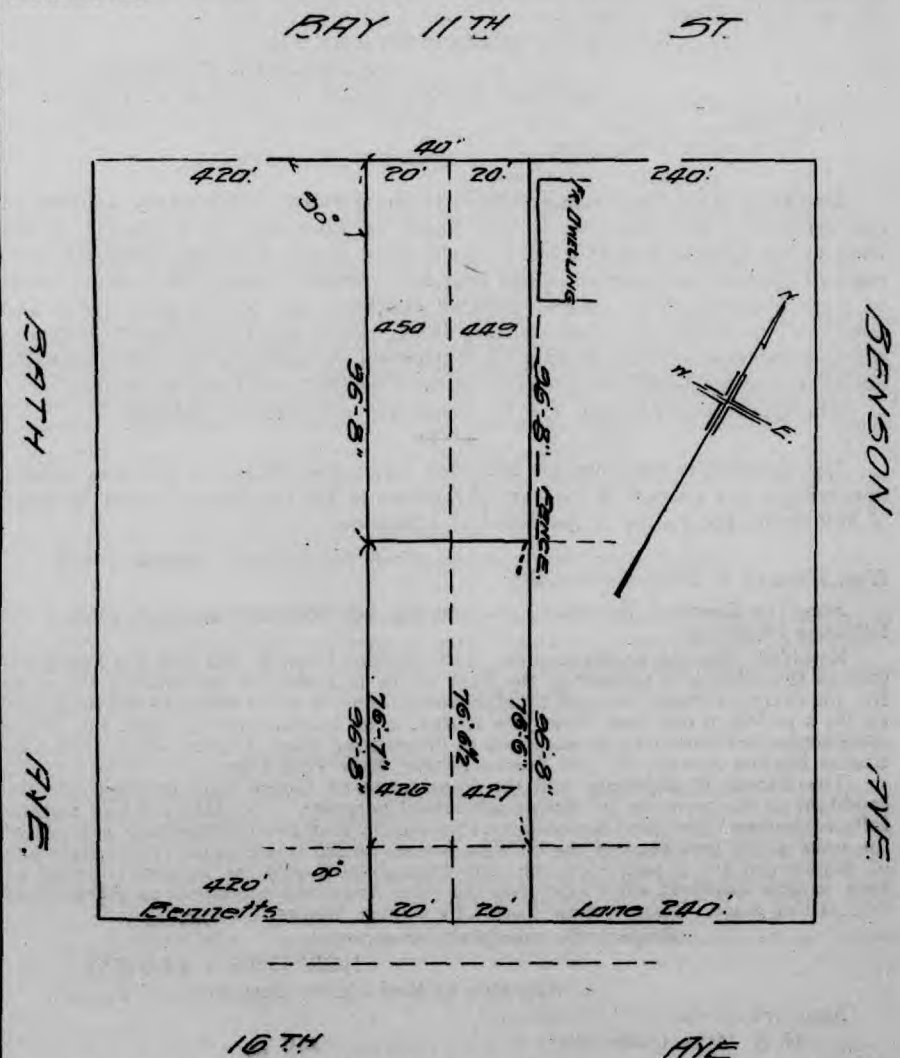

Upon information and belief that on the 27th day of February, 1905, pursuant to titles 2 and 3 of chapter 10 of the Greater New York Charter, the Local Board of the Bay Ridge District, Borough of Brooklyn, adopted a resolution upon a petition recommending a change in the map of New York City by closing and discontinuing Bennett's lane between Eighty-fourth street and Gravesend bay. That on the 6th day of April, 1906, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York adopted said resolution, and after a hearing had thereon on the 4th day of May, 1906, and pursuant to section 442 of the Greater New York Charter as amended, said Bennett's lane was closed and discontinued.

5. Upon information and belief that The City of New York has no interest whatever in and to that part of said Bennett's lane so closed and will undoubtedly impose taxes upon said portion of Bennett's lane now closed against the property of your petitioner; that at no time since the closing of said road has the City been in possession, entitled to the possession or had any interest in the said premises, but that your petitioners ever since the said closing has been in the undisturbed possession of said portion of Bennett's lane.

6. That your petitioner is desirous of annexing to his parcel that portion of Bennett's lane so closed as aforesaid as abuts on his property, but that the interest, if any, of The City of New York in and to said portion of Bennett's lane constitutes a cloud upon the title of your petitioner to the said premises.

Wherefore your petitioner prays that The City of New York may execute and deliver a quit claim deed of its interest to him in and to said portion of Bennett's lane.

In connection therewith the Comptroller presented the following report, with opinion of the Corporation Counsel, and offered the following resolution:

February 20, 1907.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR—Frederick E. Weitzel, in a verified petition addressed to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, requests a release of a portion of Bennett's lane, which was formerly a road from New Utrecht to the bay, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

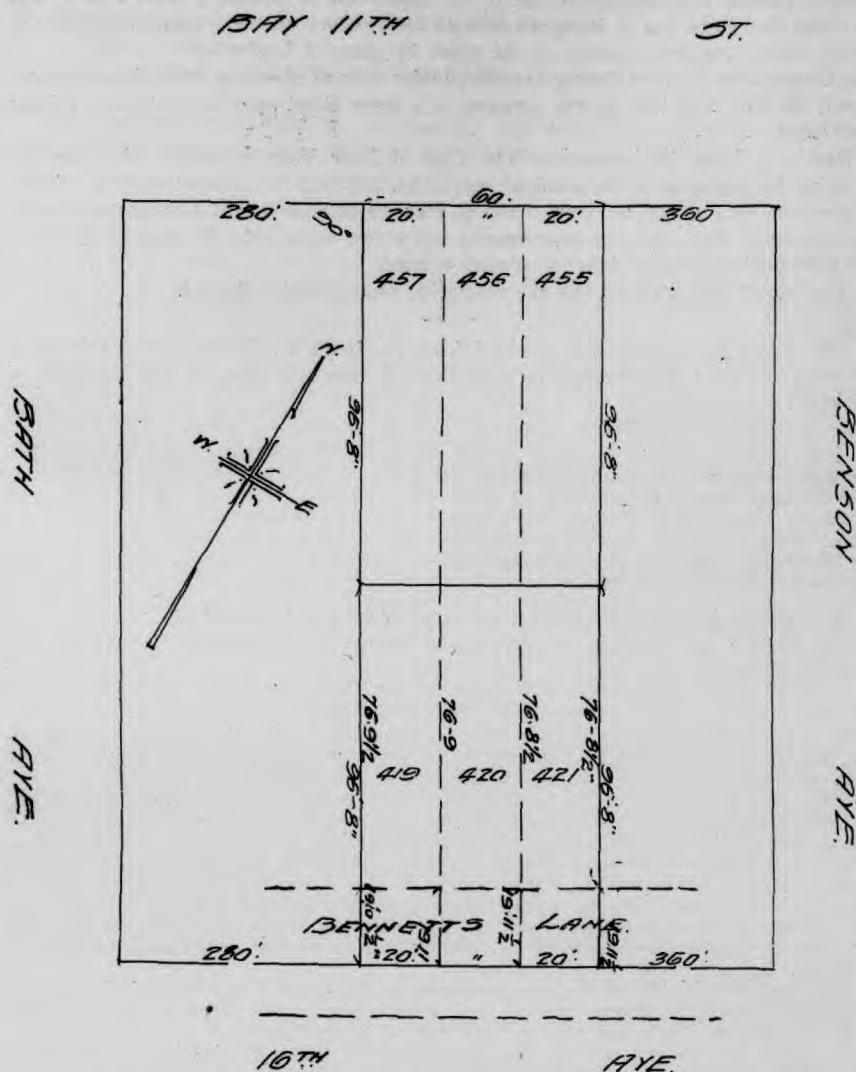
The petitioner states that he is the owner of property situated on the southerly side of Bay Eleventh street 280 feet easterly from the corner formed by the intersection of the easterly side of Bath avenue with the southerly side of Bay Eleventh street, the said property having a frontage of 60 feet on Bay Eleventh street and running to the northerly side of Bennett's lane.

The petitioner states that the said lane extends from Eighty-fourth street to Gravesend Bay, and is undoubtedly an old country road, having an irregular alignment and a width of about 33 feet. Its lines were ignored when a definite street system was provided for the locality, and it has already been discontinued through a portion of its length.

It appears that on February 27, 1905, pursuant to titles 2 and 3 of chapter 10 of the Greater New York Charter, the Local Board of the Bay Ridge District of the Borough of Brooklyn adopted a resolution upon a petition recommending a change in the map or plan of The City of New York by closing and discontinuing Bennett's lane, between Eighty-fourth street and Gravesend Bay, and on April 6, 1906, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted said resolution, and, after a hearing had thereon, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, on May 4, 1906, pursuant to the provisions

of section 442 of the amended Greater New York Charter, closed and discontinued Bennett's lane, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

It appears that the petitioner desires a release of more than a half portion of Bennett's lane adjoining his property, in order to obtain a frontage upon Sixteenth avenue, but I am of the opinion that the release should be limited to the centre line of Bennett's lane.



The Corporation Counsel, in an opinion under date of July 5, 1906, in the matter of the application of Harris Cohen and Asher Shaps for a release of a portion of Bennett's lane, in the Borough of Brooklyn, which was presented to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on July 18, 1906 (see Minutes, Sinking Fund, 1906, page 870), stated that the interest of the City in Bennett's lane was merely nominal and a cloud upon the title of a private owner, and that where action has been taken by the City authorities in discontinuing and closing a street, the City had thereafter no interest by which it could prevent an abutting owner upon the street so closed from erecting a building on land formerly within the street.

I would respectfully recommend that the matter be referred to the Corporation Counsel for his opinion as to whether the interest of the City in the following described property in the Borough of Brooklyn is material, or nominal and a mere cloud upon the title of a private owner:

Beginning at a point on the southeasterly side of Bay Eleventh street, distant 280 feet northerly from the corner formed by the intersection of the northeasterly side of Bath avenue with the southeasterly side of Bay Eleventh street; thence running southeasterly and parallel with Bath avenue to the centre line of Bennett's lane; thence running northeasterly along the centre line of Bennett's lane 60 feet; thence running northwesterly and again parallel with Bath avenue to the southeasterly side of Bay Eleventh street, and thence southwesterly along the southeasterly side of Bay Eleventh street 60 feet, to the point or place of beginning.

If the Corporation Counsel is of the opinion that the interest of the City is nominal and a mere cloud upon the title of a private owner, and he shall so certify, pursuant to the provisions of section 205 of the amended Greater New York Charter, I am of the opinion that a release should be authorized to the petitioner, Frederick E. Weitzel, for a nominal consideration, upon the condition that the petitioner shall produce evidence that the taxes, assessments, water rates and sales against the property have been paid before the delivery of such release. I would further recommend that the charge to be made for the release of the property in question be the nominal sum of \$1, together with the sum of \$100 as the cost for the examination and preparation of the release.

SIR—I have received your communication of February 20, 1907, transmitting for my consideration an application made to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund by Frederick E. Weitzel, for a release of a portion of the old Bennett's lane, in the Borough of Brooklyn, together with a report made to you on the subject by the Bureau of Real Estate, and I am requested to advise you whether the interest of The City of New York in this piece of property is material or simply nominal and a mere cloud upon the title of a private owner, and if the latter, I am asked to so certify that the matter may be presented to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, pursuant to section 205 of the amended Greater New York Charter.

This application is precisely similar to that of Harris Cohen and Asher Shaps, concerning which an opinion was delivered to the Comptroller on July 5, 1906. It was there held that the interest of The City of New York in this old highway was merely nominal. In accordance with that opinion, I hereby certify that the interest of The City of New York in the property hereinafter described, which formerly formed part of Bennett's lane, in the Borough of Brooklyn, is a mere cloud upon the title of a private owner, to wit:

Beginning at a point on the southeasterly side of Bay Eleventh street, distant 280 feet northerly from the corner formed by the intersection of the northeasterly side of Bath avenue with the southeasterly side of Bay Eleventh street; thence running southeasterly and parallel with Bath avenue to the centre line of Bennett's lane; thence running northeasterly along the centre line of Bennett's lane 60 feet; thence running northwesterly and again parallel with Bath avenue to the southeasterly side of Bay Eleventh street, and thence southwesterly along the southeasterly side of Bay Eleventh street 60 feet to the point or place of beginning.

I have prepared a proper deed conveying the interest of the City, which I transmit herewith, duly approved as to form, together with two copies thereof.

of the above mentioned tenants 40 per cent. until such time as the market is put in proper condition for their occupancy.

The report was accepted and resolution unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution, relative to the assignment of rooms in the Brooklyn Borough Hall and Municipal Building, in the Borough of Brooklyn, to the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, Board of Coroners and to the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity:

March 11, 1907.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR—The Coroners of the Borough of Brooklyn occupy rooms 11 and 11a on the main or first floor above the basement in the Borough Hall of the Borough of Brooklyn, and the President of the Borough of Brooklyn has for some time past been very anxious to obtain these rooms, in view of the crowded condition of his present quarters and the fact that, while the Coroners can obtain outside quarters, he is tied down by the charter requirements to the Borough Hall and cannot have his office elsewhere.

In one of the Borough President's communications, addressed to this office, he states that his own suite of private offices is used temporarily for the accommodation of the Consulting Engineer and his confidential Inspector, and states that it is plain that neither the Consulting Engineer nor he can do their work under the present cramped conditions.

The attention of the Coroners was called to the status of the matter and they were requested to inform the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund whether they desired to move from the present rooms. They at first declined, but in a communication addressed to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, under date of February 18, 1907, they stated that if they can obtain the floor space now occupied by the Deputy Collector of Assessments and Arrears in the Municipal Building, with the exception of the vault beneath, that they would be willing to move. The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund have authorized a lease of the third floor of the Mechanics' Bank Building, situated at the corner of Court and Clinton streets, in the Borough of Brooklyn, at their meeting held April 18, 1906, for the use of the Deputy Collector of Assessments and Arrears of the Borough of Brooklyn, which lease will expire on May 1, 1909, and I am advised that the removal of all the records of the said office will be completed by the end of this week.

Hon. Bird S. Coler, President of the Borough of Brooklyn, in a communication under date of March 1, 1907, addressed to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, again requests the assignment to him of rooms 11 and 11a in the Borough Hall and states that the Board of Coroners are willing to move to rooms 1 and 3 in the Municipal Building, providing they can also obtain one-third of 384 square feet of the vault room in the same, formerly used by the Deputy Register of Arrears, and also that the Bureau of Water Rates of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity have 200 square feet of the space in rooms 1 and 3 in the Municipal Building and two-thirds of the vault room therein, and also a room in the basement of the Municipal Building, formerly used as a bookbindery room by the Bureau of Assessments and Arrears, size 25 by 18 feet, and submits a resolution which has been prepared by him, which he states is satisfactory to everybody concerned.

I would therefore respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund assign for the use of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn rooms 11 and 11a on the main or first floor above the basement of the Borough Hall in the Borough of Brooklyn, containing 1,400 superficial feet, which are now used by the Board of Coroners of the Borough of Brooklyn, and further, that there be assigned to the Board of Coroners of the Borough of Brooklyn 2,529 square feet of floor space in rooms 1 and 3 of the Municipal Building and one-third of 384 square feet of vault room in the same, formerly used by the Deputy Register of Arrears, and also assign for the use of the Bureau of Water Rates of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity 200 square feet of the space in rooms 1 and 3 in the Municipal Building, and two-thirds of the vault room therein, and also a room in the basement of the Municipal Building, formerly used as a bookbindery room by the Bureau of Assessments and Arrears, size 18 by 25 feet.

Sir—Herewith is submitted a general report of the Department of Bridges for the year ending December 31, 1906.

The rush-hour service on the Brooklyn Bridge has been appreciably improved during the year. The capacity of the local, or bridge trains, has been increased 25 per cent., or 9,000 passengers per hour. The service during non-rush hours has also been considerably increased. Trolley car service has been increased during rush hours to 300 cars per hour, as against 280 cars per hour in 1905.

On the Williamsburg Bridge, the Brooklyn railway companies are now operating over this structure 2,365 trolley cars per day, as against 1,994, the maximum before the improvements were made in 1906.

The work on the Manhattan Bridge is advancing satisfactorily. Sufficient manufactured steel will be ready in the spring to allow the contractors to steadily progress with the work of constructing this bridge.

The work on the Blackwell's Island Bridge is going ahead more rapidly than at any time since the work was started.

The condition of the different appropriations and funds of this Department are shown as they existed on December 31, 1906, in the financial statement forming a part of the report. The changes in employees and salaries during 1906 were as follows:

BRIDGES OVER THE EAST RIVER.

No. 1—Brooklyn Bridge.

A marked improvement in the rush hour service was effected in June by increasing the length of the trains made up of bridge cars from four to five cars, thus increasing the capacity of the bridge for passenger traffic by 9,000 passengers per hour. Better use of the platform space available has served to improve the conditions at the station during the hours of the day when through elevated trains are operated.

Changes and betterments in operation have brought about a precision in train dispatching which heretofore was lacking, and has made it possible to increase the number of trolley cars operated over the bridge. The volume of travel over the bridge has exceeded that of previous years. In July and August the increase in travel was almost 25 per cent. greater than in the corresponding period of 1905.

The following statement shows the number of people and direction of travel in surface cars, on the bridge railway, in vehicles and on the promenade, passing over the bridge in one day, as determined by actual count made December 13, 1906:

During the month of October the tracks used by the surface cars crossing the bridge were entirely renewed with a type of construction which should obviate the delays heretofore experienced when repairs were necessary.

Both roadways of the bridge were repaved with granite blocks during the latter part of the year.

Additional stairways have been erected in the Brooklyn station, which have materially lessened the congestion at that point during rush hours by providing access to the loading platforms not heretofore used and providing additional facilities for passengers arriving on elevated trains and desiring to reach the bridge trains.

In order to relieve the congestion on the stairway connecting the bridge with the subway a new stair and passageway was opened, the latter running under the four loops nearest Park row.

No. 2—Williamsburg Bridge.

Traffic on the bridge has been steadily increasing and some betterment for the handling of this traffic has been effected and others are under way.

Added trolley car stands constructed at the Manhattan end of the bridge enabled the Brooklyn railway companies beginning in early summer to increase the number of cars operated per day over this structure from 1,994 to 2,365. Flooring has been laid in all the trolley railway tracks on the structure, and in case of accident or delay passengers may safely alight from cars at any point on the bridge.

The construction of an adequate subsurface station in Manhattan for all the railway traffic over the bridge, with the exception of the New York City Railway Company's service, the present needs of which are adequately provided for, is in progress. The contract for this construction was entered into with The Snare & Triest Company July 12, 1906. The completion of the station will make possible the use of all the tracks on the bridge and will afford the traveling public a service more nearly approximating the total capacity of the bridge for traffic.

The vehicle traffic over the roadways of the bridge has steadily increased and the income derived therefrom now exceeds that on the Brooklyn Bridge.

The bridge is now entirely lighted by electricity generated in the bridge lighting station, the necessary fuel being supplied by the Department of Street Cleaning in the form of street refuse.

No. 3—Manhattan Bridge.

Work on the anchorages progressed during the year. The Brooklyn anchorage is now about 60 per cent. completed and the Manhattan anchorage about 50 per cent. completed. Both anchorages will be in readiness for the cable making operations by the time the steel towers of the bridge are completed.

The contract for the towers, cables and superstructure was entered into with the Ryan-Parker Construction Company on June 15, 1906. The first shipment of steel to the bridge site was delivered on October 15, and deliveries of steel required for the anchorages have since continued. Steel required for the bridge towers is being fabricated.

The general plans for the approaches of the bridge have been completed and approved by the Art Commission, and contracts for these will be let soon.

No. 4—Blackwell's Island Bridge.

At the beginning of the year the work of erection of the steel superstructure was delayed by a strike of bridgemen. This strike continued until April 19, since which date erection has continued, and 13,500 tons of steel have been placed in the structure.

The Blackwell's Island span is practically completed. During the strike of the erectors work still progressed at the mills and shops. Of the total 50,000 tons of steel required for the bridge, 45,000 tons have been fabricated, and of this amount 35,000, including the steel already erected, have been manufactured for shipment to the bridge site. The work of erecting the river spans has been started and is progressing rapidly, with an increased working force.

The masonry construction required is progressing as rapidly as possible. A considerable portion of this construction cannot be done until after the erection of the steel work has progressed far enough to give the required tension in the steel pier members.

The Art Commission has approved the plans for the viaduct approach in Queens, and bids have been received for the construction of this approach. A contract will be let on these bids in the immediate future.

The plans for the Manhattan approach will be submitted at an early date to the Art Commission for its approval.

The arrangement of the tracks on the bridge and their connection with existing or proposed lines are being studied conjointly with the railroad companies and the Rapid Transit Commission.

Borough Bridges.

The borough bridges in maintenance have been operated, cleaned, painted and repaired by the usual forces in the employ of the department for such purposes, with very little assistance from outside the department except for repairs to pavements.

New construction is under way over the Harlem river at Madison avenue, where a temporary bridge is nearing completion; said bridge to be used for the accommodation of traffic during the construction of a permanent structure to replace the present Madison Avenue Bridge, which is altogether inadequate for the traffic in that section.

The construction of the University Heights Bridge over the Harlem river has progressed during the year, and will be fully completed during the coming spring. The Bronx part of the construction of this bridge has been so carried on that the public now has the benefit of access to the new New York Central Railroad Station at University Heights.

The new bridge over the Harlem Ship Canal at Broadway, designed to carry the tracks of the Rapid Transit Railroad and of the New York City Railway Company, is practically completed, and has been used since June for vehicle and pedestrian traffic.

Borings are being made at the proposed site of the Henry Hudson Memorial Bridge, and these will be completed so that definite plans for this structure may be fixed upon in a short time.

The contract for the construction of the Southern Boulevard approach to the Willis Avenue Bridge, let in 1904, was completed in the spring of this year. The approach, however, had been opened to travel late in 1905.

In the Borough of The Bronx work is in progress on the construction of the Pelham Bridge. The contract for the foundations and abutments was completed during the year, and the contract has been let for the superstructure and the masonry arches.

It is proposed to construct a new bridge at the crossing of Boston Post road at the Hutchinson river, to replace the present bridge, which is light and altogether inadequate for the increased traffic. The construction of this bridge will undoubtedly be undertaken this year.

The construction of a new bridge to replace the present Unionport Bridge is also contemplated.

In the Borough of Queens the new bridge over Flushing creek was formally opened to the public on October 17, 1906.

The construction of a new bridge over Dutch Kills at Borden avenue is under way.

New construction is contemplated at Strong's Causeway Bridge and at the Little Neck Bridge.

No new bridge construction was undertaken during the year in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Richmond.

No meat or dead animal above the size of a rabbit shall be taken to any public or private market to be sold for human food until the same shall have been fully cooled after killing, nor until the entrails and feet (except of poultry and game, and except the feet of swine) shall have been removed.

(CENTRE STREET, FROM PEARL TO CANAL.)

THE CITY OF NEW YORK (HEREIN after called the City) acting by its Board of Rapid Transit Commissioners (hereinafter called the Board) contemplates building a certain Rapid Transit Railroad, known as Route No. 9, in Centre street (Manhattan) and other streets in the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn, including ultimately Delancey street, Grand street, Desbrosses street, Canal street and William street in Manhattan, and Fulton street, Lafayette avenue and Broadway in Brooklyn.

By this advertisement, the City invites proposals to construct that part of said Railroad which is situated in Centre street between Pearl street and Canal street, and in Walker street and Canal street between Centre street and Chrystie street, in accordance with the detailed plans and specifications adopted therefor.

The general plan of construction calls for a subsurface railroad. There will be four tracks in Centre street and two tracks in Walker street and Canal street, and provisions for spurs turning west into Canal street.

A station between Leonard and White streets will be constructed, and suitable cross-overs, turn-outs and sidings are also to be provided, all as shown in the detailed plans of construction. The tunnels are to have a height of not less than thirteen (13) feet in the clear, and a maximum width of fifteen (15) feet for each track, except at curves, etc., where the width may be increased. GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be enclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
