POLICE DEPARTMENT.

Report for the Year Ending December 31, 1909.

Police Department, City of New York, }
January 13, 1910.

His Honor the Mayor, City Hall, New York City:

Sir—I have the honor to transmit to you the report of the Police Department for the year 1909, during the last half of which I was Commissioner, having been appointed on July 1, in place of Theodore A. Bingham, removed.

The work of the Police Department increases each year, keeping pace with the rapid growth of the city. Two new bridges across the East River (the Queensboro and the Manhattan) were opened in 1909, and new precincts were created to police them.

The conduct of the police in the primaries and general election of 1909 demonstrated one phase of the standard of efficiency to which the force has attained. The absence of disorder was favorably commented on, and there was an almost unprecedented lack of the familiar charges of colonizing, illegal voting, rioting at the polls, and so forth. Mr. Leary, State Superintendent of Elections, in his report to the Governor, commented very favorably on the co-operation of the force with his Department during the campaign.

The force, and the Department generally, is also entitled to credit for the manner in which the big crowds were handled during the Hudson-Fulton celebration.

When I took office I found that the new Police Headquarters, the cornerstone of which had been laid in 1905, was still far from ready for use and that work on it was proceeding at a rate so nearly imperceptible as to promise a lapse of years before its end. Vigorous exertions by the Second Deputy Commissioner speedily put the building in habitable condition, and early in December the Department moved into its new quarters.

The Electrical Bureau, one of the most important branches of police work, gives better service in the new building, where one of the finest switchboards in the United States has been installed by the Telephone Company. A new submarine cable was laid

across the Narrows to the Borough of Richmond, giving direct connection with Police Headquarters.

No additional men have been allowed the Department for the year 1910. Five hundred were asked for in the Budget, but not allowed. We should have at least three hundred more men for 1910.

Five new station houses are in course of erection, two of which are near completion; many more are needed. Some of the present ones are hardly fit for the men to live in, and it will be necessary to secure appropriation for more new station houses this year.

The new Permanent Census Board, of which the Police Commissioner is a member, began its work in October. This Board is required, through the Police Department, to take a census of all children in Greater New York between the ages of four and eighteen years. This will entail a large amount of work on the present force.

SCHEDULE D.

Report of the Harbor Police for the Year 1909.

The fleet of the Harbor Precinct now consists of the steamer "Patrol" and seven launches, which regularly patrol the waters of the City, giving assistance to vessels in distress, rescuing persons from drowning and recovering bodies of persons who have been drowned. The steamer "Patrol," during 1909, answered thirty emergency calls. In addition to the general work of the precinct, the members of its force have also during the year performed special duty on shore in various parts of Greater New York.

Property on vessels at anchor and on docks has been carefully guarded, with the result that successful thefts from them have become very rare.

Jamaica Bay and adjoining waters have been thoroughly patrolled by the launch at Harbor C, which has its station at Canarsie. The launch stationed in the Kill von Kull has done very effective work by protecting the shipping interests around Staten Island and preventing stealing of coal from tows in transit through its waters.

A new 5-pair cable was laid to replace an old 1-pair cable on Fifth avenue, from Fifty-eighth to Sixty-fourth street. Work done by Kerite Cable Company. (Contract.)

The Sixth, Ninth, Twelfth and Fortieth Precincts were thoroughly rewired. Work done by Police Department.

A new 10-pair cable, with the necessary subsidiary conduit, was installed connecting the new Second Precinct station house. Work done by Standard Underground Cable Company. (Contract.)

A new 5-pair cable, with the necessary subsidiary conduit, was installed connecting the new One Hundred and Seventy-second Precinct station house. Work done by Commercial Construction Company and Safety Insulated Wire and Cable Company. (Contract.)

Aerial line (12,000 feet of wire) was constructed from the One Hundred and Sixty-second Precinct station house, on Meeker avenue, to offal dock at Newtown Creek. Work done by the Police Department.

Police wires were removed from 2,706 poles belonging to the various telegraph and telephone companies, and from 44 old police poles, which were removed. Work done by the Police Department.

Twenty-one thousand six hundred feet of wire was removed from the elevated railroad structures. Work done by the Police Department.

During a very severe sleet and snow storm, in January, the aerial lines in Brooklyn and Queens were very seriously damaged; 95 miles of aerial lines had to be rebuilt. Work done by the Police Department.

Telephone booth was established at Fourteenth avenue and Fiftieth street, connecting with the One Hundred and Seventy-second Precinct. This booth is supplied with both police and public telephones. Work done by the Police Department.

Brooklyn Bridge cable was overhauled and put in good repair. Work done by the Police Department.

A new submarine cable terminal was constructed at Fort Hamilton, and an aerial line built thence to Eighty-sixth street and Third avenue. Work done by the Police Department.

On September 19, 1909, 3-pair submarine armored telephone cable was laid in New York Bay, between Fort Hamilton and Fort Wadsworth (6,634 feet), thereby restoring direct telephone connection with Police Headquarters, St. George, Richmond, instead of public telephone service, which had been used since February 9, 1908. Work done by the Kerite Cable Company (contract).

Six miles of aerial lines were constructed from Tompkins avenue and Arrietta street, along New York avenue, to cable terminal at Fort Wadsworth shore, Richmond. Work done by the Police Department.

Police telephone booth was located at Stapleton ferry house, connecting with the Eightieth Precinct station. Work done by the Police Department.

The recorded messages show an enormous increase over the previous year.

It should be noted that the above messages are those recorded. There are as many more passing over the lines of a conversational nature requiring no record.

Hudson-Fulton Celebration.

The preparation for telephone communication was commenced in August. In addition to Police telephone service, twenty-five telephone stations were established along the shore of New York Bay and the North River as far as Spuyten Duyvil, and fourteen stations in Manhattan and three in Brooklyn for the land parades. These stations were connected directly with Police Headquarters, and each was in charge of an operator from the Telegraph Bureau. The booths were equipped with lamp and flag signals. The Police Commissioner, his Deputies and the Chief Inspector were constantly informed of the details of the parade, and by means of this telephone communication they controlled the vast police force on duty on this occasion. Work done by the New York Telephone Company and Police Department employees (naval parade), Brooklyn and Manhattan. Work on land lines, Brooklyn, done by Police Department.

The messages directing the movements of the Police forces, calling for aid, ambulances, etc., were promptly transmitted, and the telephone arrangements highly commended.

New Police Headquarters.

The transfer of the Telegraph Bureau and electrical equipment to the new Police Headquarters was one of the notable achievements of the year. The interior electrical work, which was begun in August, was completed within the last five months. In the Telegraph Bureau there has been installed a 12-position switchboard, having the latest approved appliances for rapid telephone service, and so arranged that it can be extended to meet any future demands. It is a combination magneto and common battery switchboard, each position equipped with supervising lamps. Work done by the Western Electric Company under contract with the New York Telephone Company.

The power plant in the terminal room is used for charging storage battery and for ringing purposes. The storage battery is for line lamps, pilot lamps, "busy" signal lamps and supervising lamps, and for transmission. It is so arranged, in case of the power giving out, that by throwing certain switches an emergency supply could be obtained from the Spring Street Telephone Exchange. It would therefore be impossible to have any interruption of the service caused by loss of power.

There is also installed in the terminal room a complete electrical equipment for detecting any "trouble" or defect on the line. There is a Wire Chief on duty in this room who keeps an accurate record of the condition of the lines, in order that necessary repairs may be immediately made. In the centre of the Operating Department is a monitor switchboard, where a Lieutenant in charge is on duty day and night, who can tell at a glance, by means of lamp signals, whether the calls are promptly answered. He can take up any line, or intercept any message, thereby giving complete supervision. There is no modern improvement that is not embodied in this telephone equipment. All this work done by the Western Electric Company, under contract with New York Telephone Company.

The interior wiring, including the telephone and electric bell system, has been installed throughout the entire building, providing the necessary wiring to meet future requirements. Work done by the Police Department; house cables from terminal room to junction boxes by New York Telephone Company.

Every detail of the work connected with the transfer of the service was so well planned that on November 28, at 12.29 a. m., at the touch of an electric button by the Police Commissioner, the entire telephone service was immediately transferred to the new building without a second's delay, and no interruption to the service.

Addition to Police Cable Plant.

The underground cables owned and operated by the Police Department are in good condition, but in Manhattan particularly it is necessary to relieve the congestion, as there are many party lines which interfere with good Police service. I would respectfully recommend that an appropriation be obtained as soon as possible to provide for direct lines to each precinct station, Inspection District office, Court Squad, hospital and substation not already equipped. This would enable us to dispense with leased lines, which we are now using to meet this condition.

I would recommend the extension of the underground cable system in order to abandon the overhead lines in Brooklyn and Queens which have been in use many years.

This is now possible, as subways have been constructed, and it will also enable this Department to co-operate with the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity in the removal of overhead construction.

SCHEDULE N.

Report of Operations of the Bureau of Repairs and Supplies in 1909.

During the year 12,823 requisitions were received and acted upon from the various precinct stations, and 743 orders were issued for contract supplies and 3,559 for repairs and supplies. The large number of open orders was caused by the fact that contracts for supplies for the year 1909 were not acted upon by the then Police Commissioner until May of that year. By advertising and awarding all contracts during January, as will be done in 1910, the number of open market orders necessary will be comparatively few.

Police Department Buildings Under Construction; also Buildings to be Begun During the Year 1910.

New station houses are in course of construction for the following precincts: First, Second, Thirteenth and One Hundred and Seventy-second.

Plans and specifications have been approved for the erecting of a new station house for the Eighth Precinct at Beach and Varick streets.

Premises have been procured for the Ninety-ninth Precinct, Tottenville, Borough of Richmond, which will require alterations and additions to meet requirements for police purposes.

SCHEDULE X.

Report on Work of School for Recruits, 1909.

The purpose of the School for Recruits is to fit Probationary Patrolmen for the performance of their duties as policemen. The school is under the immediate supervision of the Second Deputy Commissioner. A Lieutenant is in charge, assisted by four Lieutenants as instructors.

The course of instruction covers six weeks, during four of which the men are on probation. Should they prove satisfactory at the end of this term they are appointed Patrolmen, and during the next two weeks, while finishing their course of instruction, they fit themselves out with uniform and equipments, so that at the end of the course they are ready to begin regular patrol duty.

Instruction is given in the laws of the State, the ordinances of the City, rules, regulations, usages and customs of the Department, treatment of accidents, first aid to the injured, treatment of homicide cases, use of finger-prints, drill, use and care of the pistol, swimming, school of the soldier, etc. Regular home work is required, the studying to be done at night, and the results to be produced the next morning in the shape of reports. In regular classes the men are taken, under charge of instructors, to the several courts, and are made familiar with their locations, their jurisdictions and their procedures. They observe the manner of making complaints and arraigning prisoners, and learn the functions and methods of the several offices (as Grand Jury, District Attorney, Coroner) with which their work may be expected to bring them in contact.

During the last two weeks of the six which they spend in the school the new policemen are assigned to precincts, where, in company with an experienced Patrolman, they do patrol duty on a busy post from 8 to 12 p. m. each night, thus gaining knowledge of the practical side of patrol duty. While so patrolling they are visited and advised by their instructors.

During 1909 there were 624 men employed on probation, of whom 42 were rejected and 6 resigned. From precincts 51 Patrolmen were sent to the school and 19 men who had been rejected during 1908 and appointed during 1909, making a total of 694 who received instruction during the year at the School for Recruits.

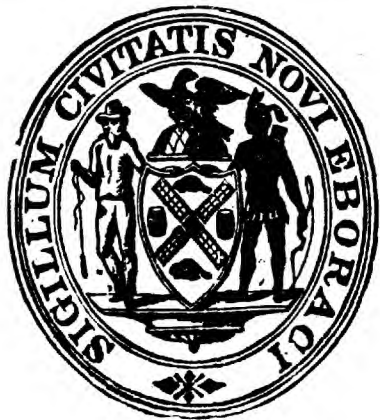

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.
