Dear Sir—I beg to acknowledge receipt of a copy of a resolution, adopted by the Board of Aldermen April 5, 1910, requesting the Public Service Commission to direct the receivers of the Metropolitan Street Railway Company to operate its cars on the Eighth avenue line on shorter intervals along the entire route, and in reply to inform you as follows:

Several investigations, covering the method of operation and including counts of the passengers carried, have been made during the past winter, the last observations being on March 18, from 7 a. m. to 7 p. m. Below is a tabulation showing the service during those hours, divided into three periods.

You will notice that no exception can be taken to the loading, cars on the average carrying about 50 per cent. of their seating capacity.

These observations were made at Canal street and West Broadway. As to the headway, it will be observed that the average interval was about 2 minutes, 30 seconds.

In order to ascertain whether the above correctly represented the regular daily service, another observation was taken under cover on March 21, from 1 to 5 p. m., and on March 24, from 10 a. m. to 1 p. m. The results were practically the same as on March 18. There were some irregularities in headway, but so far as observations showed they were due in each instance to interferences from vehicles or from other causes over which the railroad company had no control.

So far as there is actual cause for complaint, it appears to be that passengers are required to take the car ahead at Thirteenth street and Eighth avenue. In making up the schedules, the Commission has generally approved and extended the practice of turning back cars in order to increase the number in operation where they are most needed. This practice unquestionably causes complaint from those who happen to be on a car which is turned back, but close observation at a great many points, where it has been put into operation, confirms the belief that it is working to the best interests of the larger number.

A very close watch has been kept continuously upon the starter at Thirteenth street and Eighth avenue, to insure efficient service and the exercise of good judgment by him in the performance of his duties.

Our evidence covering the subject does not indicate that the service is inadequate, and therefore an order upon the receivers, requiring them to operate all cars on the Eighth avenue line upon the same headway as is now maintained north of Thirteenth street, would not be warranted.

To the Honorable Board of Aldermen of the City of New York:

Sirs—I am in receipt of copy of resolution adopted by you on March 29, 1910, requesting me to appeal from the decision of the referee in favor of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, with reference to its right to maintain tracks on Eleventh avenue, Borough of Manhattan. At the same time it is suggested that I prepare and submit to the Legislature such acts or amendments as will empower the City to remove the said tracks.

I beg to advise you that I have taken an appeal from the judgment entered in this action upon the decision of the referee and will vigorously prosecute said appeal to the end that a final, and if possible a favorable, decision may be obtained from the courts.

With reference to the simultaneous efforts to secure such legislation as is desired, I suggest for your further consideration the view that perhaps the aid of the Legislature should not be invoked pending the final determination of the appeal, because the only sort of an act which could be constitutionally passed, unless the judgment appealed from is reversed, would call for the condemnation of the tracks in question and the franchise of the railroad company to maintain them in the streets, involving an expenditure by the City of possibly millions of dollars. Of course such an expenditure, if ultimately necessary, should not be allowed to stand in the way of the removal of the tracks, operations over which jeopardize the lives of citizens; but if, as we hope, the situation can be relieved through the courts, this would be far preferable, for the reason stated. And to that end you may be sure that no effort will be spared.

The Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—Reporting further on a communication from the Board of Education requesting an authorization of corporate stock to the amount of \$7,461,010 for school building purposes in the several Boroughs, and the immediate issue of \$3,500,000 thereof under the provisions of section 169 of the Charter, which was referred to me at a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held January 7, 1910, it would appear that Brooklyn still has greatest need of appropriations for elementary schools, notwithstanding the fact that corporate stock to the amount of \$716,000 for an addition to Public School 19 (District 31) and for new Public School 165 (District 39) and Public School 167 (District 39), in this Borough as per the aforementioned request, was authorized by your Board of January 11 last.

In addition to the three items already provided for, corporate stock to the amount of \$1,917,000 is requested for elementary schools in Brooklyn as follows:

I am informed by the City Superintendent of Schools that the following items, in the order named, in the above list, viz., Public School 168 (District 32), an addition to Public School 73 (District 36) and Public School 171 (District 40), are in his judgment the most necessitous in the entire City.

The Department of Education owns a site 200 feet by 125 feet at Throop avenue, Bartlett and Whipple streets, which was acquired during the year 1908 at a total cost of \$150,112.51. It is proposed to erect thereon a 48-room building to be known as

Public School 168, at an estimated cost (for construction only) of \$300,000, in order to relieve congested schools in the Thirty-second, Thirty-fifth, Thirty-third and Thirty-first Districts, as follows:

Next to the Thirty-ninth School District for which corporate stock for two additional buildings, Public School 165 and Public School 167, hereinbefore mentioned, was authorized on January 11, District 40 is the most congested in the City, having approximately 5,500 pupils on part time. It is proposed to erect a 48-room building to be known as Public School 171 at an estimated cost of \$316,000 on a site 176 feet 8 inches by 186 feet by 175 feet by 210 feet, acquired in 1909 at a cost of \$33,000, located at Ridgewood, Lincoln and Nichols avenues, which location is one of the most growing parts of the district. It is intended to give relief to Public School 65 and Public School 108, which schools have respectively 630 and 668 pupils on part time.

Next in point of urgency, after the three buildings in Brooklyn just mentioned is a new building to contain 48 class rooms and to be known as Public School 61, which is proposed to erect, at an estimated cost of \$316,000, on the site 220 feet 10 inches by 108 feet 8 inches acquired in 1908, at a cost of \$156,521.13, on East Twelfth street, between Avenues B and C, Borough of Manhattan. This school is designed to take the place of the present Public School 126, No. 536 East Twelfth street, which was erected in 1862, and is now dilapidated and unfit for use, besides being inadequate for the needs of the neighborhood, as will appear from the fact that 1,142 pupils are now registered therein on part time.

In addition to the above items which aggregate \$1,101,000, provision should be made at once for at least three new buildings to relieve the growing congestion in the Borough of The Bronx.

While, as hereinbefore specified, the need of new school buildings is most urgent in certain sections of the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn, as a whole the congestion in the elementary schools is greater in the Borough of The Bronx than in any other Borough. The official figures for October, 1909, show 14.83 per cent. of the total number of pupils on register in that Borough to be on part time as against 11.20 per cent. in the Borough of Brooklyn, which Borough has the next largest percentage. Owing to the large number of new sittings (21,816) provided for the Borough of Brooklyn during the year ending October, 1909, conditions have been reversed, as will appear from the fact that in October, 1908, Brooklyn had 18.46 per cent. of the register on part time as against 9.59 per cent. in The Bronx.

The percentage of pupils on part time in the Borough of The Bronx has been increasing rapidly for several years past, as will appear from the following figures:

Since 1905 the per cent. of part time pupils has increased from 1.66 to 14.83 and this against a corresponding decrease from 14.96 per cent. to 7.39 for the entire City. These figures indicate that the school situation in that Borough should have immediate consideration, especially in view of the fact that about two years are required to get a building ready for occupancy, after an appropriation therefor has been made.

The request for \$7,461,010, hereinbefore mentioned, includes the sum of \$1,488,000 for additional elementary school accommodations in The Bronx, as follows:

The Borough of The Bronx is divided into four school districts, located in general as follows: District No. 23, extending from the Harlem River to Long Island Sound south of One Hundred and Forty-ninth street; District No. 24, from the Harlem River to the Sound between One Hundred and Forty-ninth and One Hundred and Sixty-seventh streets; District No. 25, from the Harlem and North rivers to the concourse between One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street and Yonkers, and extending eastward to the Bronx River between One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street and One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street; District No. 26, which includes all the rest of The Bronx north of One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street.

The only congestion in District No. 23 at the present time (February 23, 1910) is in Public School 31 which has one class on part time and in Public School 43 which has fourteen classes containing an aggregate register of 638 pupils. No appropriation is asked for this district.

District No. 24 had (February 1, 1910) 74 classes, with an aggregate register of 3,463 pupils on part time, which number represents 21 per cent. of the total registration of pupils therein. The sum of \$157,000 is requested for a 24-room addition to Public School 39, Longwood avenue, Kelly and Beck streets. This site, which is 200 feet by 150 feet, cost \$40,500 and affords ample room for the proposed addition to the building



now located thereon. Conditions in Public School 39 are disclosed by the following statement: Public School No. 39, The Bronx, as of February 15, 1910.

The sum of \$283,000 is requested for District No. 25 for a 48-room building to be located on a site 150 feet by 191 feet, Prospect avenue and One Hundred and Seventy-sixth street, which was purchased in 1904 and 1905 at a total cost of \$37,000. Not anticipating the Mayor's veto of December 29, the Board of Education awarded a contract for this building in the sum of \$235,841 on December 20, 1909, corporate stock therefor having been duly authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and approved by the Board of Aldermen. The new school, to be known as Public School 44, is designed to relieve Public Schools 32, 6 and 4, which together now have approximately 1,300 pupils on part time. In order to cover any unforeseen contingencies \$240,000 is recommended to be appropriated for this item.

The greatest need, however, in the Borough is the large and rapidly developing territory included in District No. 26, which district has thirteen schools, with 13,159 pupils on register, 4,900 of whom were on part time at the beginning of the new term which began the first of February. As will appear from a foregoing statement, request is made for three new buildings to contain forty-eight rooms each in this district, to be known as Public School 46, Public School 47 and Public School 45, and for a sixteen-room addition to Public School 34, making a total of 160 rooms designed to accommodate approximately 8,000 children.

Of the proposed buildings Public School 46, to be located at Bainbridge and Briggs avenues and One Hundred and Ninety-sixth street, on a site 200 feet by 145 feet 6 inches, purchased in 1907 at a cost of \$39,014.83, would seem to be the most urgent. This building is designed to relieve Public School 5 and Public School 8, which together now have approximately 300 pupils on part time.

The item of \$12,000 for portable buildings hereinbefore mentioned is also for District No. 26 and is distributed as follows:

On December 22, 1909, the Board of Education awarded a contract in the sum of \$3,147, for furnishing and erecting three portable school houses on the premises of Public School 8, Borough of The Bronx, but because of the long delay in the execution thereof the Ducker Company declined to enter into said contract, with the result that the Board of Education, at a meeting held February 7, 1910, rescinded its resolution awarding this contract and rejected all bids therefor. A contract for three portable buildings for Public School 15, in the sum of \$3,654, has also been let. Both of these items, together with the one for two portable buildings for Public School 14, should be provided for at this time. It would appear, however, from the contracts already let that the estimated cost (\$12,000), as submitted, is too high and that \$10,500 would be sufficient for this purpose.

In the request for \$7,461.010 hereinbefore mentioned, \$338,095 is requested for contingencies, as follows:

Contingencies.  
For the wages of Draftsmen, Inspectors, etc., and for surveys, borings and the purchase of drafting materials, based on five per cent. of the proposed expenditures, \$338,095.

Of the above mentioned sum approximately \$300,000 is for wages and the remainder for other contingencies, as specified. The payroll for salaries and wages of the inspecting and drafting corps of the Bureau of Buildings approximates \$14,000 per month, and the balance now available for this purpose approximates \$39,000, so that there is no immediate need of an appropriation for salaries and wages. On the other hand, no funds are available at the present time for surveys, borings and drafting materials, and, besides, there are outstanding liabilities for supplies aggregating \$2,277.25. It would appear advisable, therefore, to appropriate \$25,000 for the contingency account at this time.

In conclusion, the nine items hereinbefore described, viz.: Public School 168, an addition to Public School 73, and Public School 171, for the Borough of Brooklyn; Public School 61 for the Borough of Manhattan, an addition to Public School 39, Public School 44, Public School 46 and eight portable buildings for the Borough of The Bronx, and \$25,000 for contingencies, all Boroughs, can be provided for under the provisions of section 169 of the Charter without exceeding the limitation of \$3,500,000 which may be appropriated in any one year by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment without the concurrence of the Board of Aldermen. I would therefore recommend that corporate stock to an amount not exceeding \$1,845,500 be so authorized, in accordance with a resolution attached hereto.

The President laid before the Board the following communication from the Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

The Board of Aldermen, No. 11 City Hall, New York City:  
Gentlemen—The Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals respectfully request that special revenue bonds be issued in the amount of thirteen thousand dollars (\$13,000), for the following purposes:

The total amount represented annually in the above request would be \$26,040. Inasmuch as it will not be possible to fill all of these positions at one time, it is thought that an appropriation of \$13,000, to cover practically a period of six months, will be sufficient.

It has long been known that Bellevue Hospital did not have Nurses enough with which to properly cover the hospital wards. There has never been a time, at least for a number of years, when there were Nurses enough on the wards, and to aggravate this condition since January 1, 1907, there has been an increase of 236 beds for patients in Bellevue Hospital.

The Board of Trustees has realized this deficiency, but have recently had the fact presented to them more forcibly by the combined protests of the Board of Managers of the Bellevue Training School, and of the Medical Board, composed of the Visiting Physicians and Surgeons to the Hospital.

The following report is quoted from the Minutes of the Medical Board:  
"The Medical Board respectfully calls the attention of the Board of Trustees to the very inadequate number of Nurses in the hospital for the general ward service, which is a constant source of hindrance in securing the best treatment of the patients. The Nurses work hard and faithfully, but three Nurses cannot possibly care for thirty-six very ill patients with acute diseases, which is not infrequently the situation in the wards.

"It is impossible to carry out many orders for such common and necessary therapeutic measures as cupping, irrigation, etc., owing to lack of time of the Nurses.

"The balconies with which the hospital is especially provided for outdoor treatment cannot adequately be used because a corps of Nurses properly dressed for outdoor work cannot be provided.

"The small rooms for the noisy delirious, off the wards in the new medical pavilion, cannot safely be used for lack of Nurses to watch and care for these cases.

"Serious accidents and scandals are occurring in the wards for the sole reason that the overworked Nurses cannot be omnipresent. Such, for example, are to be cited falling out of bed and breaking a collar bone, running naked through the ward in delirium, etc., etc. The time of the greatest need of additional Nurses in the pneumonia and typhoid season is, unfortunately, the time of the greatest illness among the Nurses themselves, so that the census of the school does not truly represent its working capacity at this time, and this year, in addition to ordinary ailments, a number have been victims of scarlet fever, which implies at least six weeks' quarantine.

"The ratio of Nurses per patient in Bellevue Hospital cannot fairly be compared with that of other hospitals of the City, because the patients of Bellevue have so often suffered from poverty, neglect and alcoholism that they frequently present a group of ailments instead of a single disease, and therefore require more time for their nursing. Moreover, many are so exceptionally dirty that a large share of the Nurses' time must be expended in making them vermin-free.

"For the above reasons the Medical Board regard the nursing situation as constituting a grave emergency and urge that an effort at once be made to secure sixty additional Nurses, twenty new paid Ward Maids, and ten Orderlies, to enable the proper care of the ward patients. The estimated cost is as follows:

"20 Nurses, at \$600 a year each, and 40 Nurses, at \$96 a year each .....	\$15,840 00
"20 Ward Maids, at \$240 a year each.....	4,800 00
"10 Orderlies, at \$300 a year each.....	3,000 00

"In order to meet this emergency, which evidently is not understood by the City authorities, it is suggested that a joint effort be made by the Trustees, the Managers of the Training School and the Medical Board to obtain the necessary emergency appropriation and explain the need of it and the grave scandals liable to ensue without it to the City authorities.

"It is moreover important that this request should be in no wise construed as casting any criticism upon the present methods of work of the school, but merely as demonstrating that the service is increasing far beyond the means provided to cope with it. It is not always appreciated that the means of modern scientific diagnosis and treatment require much more time on the part of the Nurse than was the case a decade ago. It takes much more time and care to prepare patients for blood cultures, inoculations, antiseptic dressings, and for operations. This is the work of skilled Nurses, but the routine work of passing food trays, bed pans, making beds, etc., may properly be done by Ward Maids, thereby saving much time for the Nurses and greatly promoting the efficiency of the service."

Accompanying this letter is a copy of a letter received from the Board of Managers of the Bellevue Training Schools.

Upon careful investigation it is found that the proportion of Nurses to patients in Bellevue Hospital is, during the daytime, 1 to 8; at night, 1 to 21, with a total proportion of 1 to 6, which is far too small. The proportion should be 1 to 3, or 1 to 4, at least, to insure proper care of the patients.

It is generally conceded by hospital authorities that in a general hospital with an acute service Nurses in proportion of one Nurse to every three patients is none too many. It would be hard to find a hospital with a more acute or more difficult service than that of Bellevue.

Attention is called to several New York hospitals. In St. Luke's the proportion is 1 to 4. In Mount Sinai it is better than 1 to 4. In the New York Hospital it is 1 to 3. In the Presbyterian Hospital it is 1 to 2½, or even better. If the sixty Nurses requested were obtained our proportion would then be about 1 to 4-10.

The request for Orderlies and Ward Maids is in lieu of more Nurses, as they may be used to supplement the work of Nurses. The situation is acute just now, for the reason that the census is still very high. We are feeling the effects of the shortened course of training, and the nursing force has never been what was needed.

In making up the Budget for 1910 it was not deemed of any use to ask for the great increase really needed, for the reason that the appropriation asked for Nurses has been cut down each year, and was even reduced about \$2,000 this year, while the amount asked for was far below our actual needs. In our request we ask for pupils and graduates, for the reason that pupils alone cannot be obtained in sufficient number, and even the division given may necessarily be subject to later revision.

The extra Ward Maids for Harlem and Fordham are needed as assistants to the Nurses. By performing some of the manual work now done by Nurses they will make it possible for the Nurses to give more of their time to strictly nursing duties.

It is urged that this request receive your prompt approval.

They respectfully urge that a special effort be made jointly by the Trustees, the Medical Board and Training School Managers to secure an emergency appropriation for the following increase:

That, since sending this communication the District Attorney has changed his mind about the rate at which he will pay these Assistants and has had the grades established to appoint three at \$4,000, three at \$3,000, and two at \$1,500, not changing the amount in the aggregate, but not as stated in his letter. Inasmuch as these grades have been favorably reported it is necessary to make provision to pay the salaries. The Committee has deducted three months from the amount necessary to pay these salaries for the current year, and recommends that the accompanying resolution be adopted.

District Attorney's Office, County of New York,

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen, City of New York:

Gentlemen—I hereby respectfully request that your Honorable Board issue special revenue bonds to the amount of twenty-four thousand dollars (\$24,000), to provide for the payment of the salaries of eight (8) Deputy Assistant District Attorneys at three thousand dollars (\$3,000) per annum each, in the office of the District Attorney of the County of New York.

The necessity for this increase in the professional staff of this office is due to the fact that I desire to create a new bureau in the office to meet the conditions which have arisen in this City and County in respect to the congestion in the courts, the delay in bringing defendants to trial, and the lack of proper protection of poor and illiterate defendants or complainants in the Police Courts; and also to check the criminal and reckless use of automobiles in this County.

I do not pretend that it is possible to eradicate these evils, but I do believe that they can be remedied to a very great extent by placing a Deputy Assistant District Attorney in each of the Police Courts in this County. In order that your Honorable Board may better understand the necessity for such a provision, I have endeavored to enumerate below some of the factors which go to create congestion and the consequent delay in the administration of justice in this County.

During the year 1908, the number of prisoners arraigned in all the City Magistrates' Courts in this County was 175,371, and of these arraignments the Magistrates had summary jurisdiction over 114,869. As recited above, the great mass of people

having recourse to these courts are extremely poor and entirely helpless, and many of them have no knowledge of our language, and could not afford to engage counsel to protect their rights. Owing to the immense volume of business conducted in these Police Courts daily, it is impossible for the Magistrates to devote sufficient time to wading through the evidence in these cases. This condition can be better appreciated when I call your attention to the fact that during the year 1908 there were arraigned in the Night Court alone over 68,000 prisoners.

I believe that a Deputy Assistant District Attorney assigned to each of these courts could considerably aid the Magistrates by investigating each case before it was presented to the court. Furthermore, it would be his duty to protect the defendant from oppression when it appears that the complainant is actuated by some ulterior motive; and also see that the complainant has an opportunity to assert his rights before the Magistrate. This would insure a thorough examination in many cases where such examinations would be found necessary. As a result of these examinations many cases would be disposed of in the Police Courts, instead of being held for trial in the Court of Special Sessions, or to await the action of the Grand Jury, and if indicted await final action in the Criminal Branch of the Supreme Court or the Court of General Sessions, the calendars of which courts are always crowded with many cases which should have been disposed of in the Police Courts.

The records of this office show that the number of complaints received during the year 1908 from City Magistrates, where the defendants were held to await the action of the Grand Jury, amounted to 7,095. Of this number 1,589, or over 22 per cent., were dismissed by the Grand Jury; 715 were acquitted after trial by jury, and 1,419 were discharged by the courts; or, in other words, 52½ per cent. of the total cases held by the City Magistrates were either thrown out by the Grand Jury or by the courts.

The following extract from our records shows that during 1908, 12,099 cases were disposed of in the Court of Special Sessions, of which number 1,145 were acquitted and 751 dismissed, or about 15½ per cent. of said cases were thrown out by the Court of Special Sessions. These reports disclose that of the 19,195 persons arrested, 5,619 were either acquitted or discharged. Of these 5,619 but few of them could procure bail, and the great majority, being poor and without friends, were committed to jail probably for weeks or months, awaiting the disposition of their cases, many of which may have been of a most trivial character, and in consequence thereof losing their employment, inflicting great hardship upon the many families dependent upon them, in addition to ruining the reputations of such persons, for even though acquitted the stigma of imprisonment always remains.

I believe that with a Deputy Assistant District Attorney in each Magistrate's Court a great number of cases now occupying the time of this office, the courts, jurors, witnesses, etc., at great expense to the County and the public, will be disposed of in the Police Courts, thereby relieving the congestion in the higher courts and insuring a prompt and speedy trial for defendants, especially those charged with heinous crimes, for nothing deters the commission of crime so effectually as prompt and adequate punishment.

In reference to the matter of checking the criminal and reckless use of automobiles in this County, it is my purpose to endeavor to accomplish this by referring to the proposed Bureau the explicit duty of enforcing and developing the criminal law in matters affecting the safety of the public in the streets. It will pay particular attention to street traffic dangers, especially those caused by automobiles and street cars.

The peril arising from the reckless use of automobiles is of comparatively recent development in the life of this County, and as yet no agency has been devised or used which has proved adequate to check this growing evil. My idea is that the rigorous enforcement of the criminal law by the District Attorney will be a powerful deterrent to the commission of numerous acts of criminal carelessness by the users of automobiles. The automobile peril, as it exists to-day, is due to two causes: In the first place, the present laws are grossly inadequate, and secondly, they are inefficiently enforced. I believe that the proposed Bureau can be a strong factor in remedying both of these defects.

It has been stated that within a period of one year, about ninety-six persons have been killed by automobiles in New York City. A recent compilation sets forth that four deaths were caused by automobiles in this city in the month of November, and that out of seventy-eight street accidents of a serious nature in the same month, more than half were due to automobiles. It may almost be said to be common knowledge that speed violation is to-day a routine, matter-of-fact occurrence, a thing taken for granted.

The nature and extent of this evil is quite apparent to your honorable Board, but could such conditions exist if even the present laws were enforced? Now the efficient enforcement of a criminal law involves the apprehension of as many violators as possible, the obtaining and presenting to the courts of strong and satisfactory evidence and the imposition of heavy penalties.

I believe that a system of gathering and perfecting the evidence at the earliest moment possible can be devised and worked out to advantage through the agency of the new Bureau, vigilant and alert, and continuously and persistently at work on this problem.

The automobile peril now demands, I believe, special treatment, and the District Attorney, through the proposed Bureau, can make it thoroughly understood throughout the community that as its criminal law officer he is determined that the laws affecting the safety of the public in the city's thoroughfares shall be enforced to the limit.

I believe that this Bureau can be made a medium through which the public sentiment of this community, outraged and indignant at almost daily casualties due to speed violation, can express itself in no uncertain manner on this matter of the right of the public to come and go safely in its highways. The moral effect of the mere existence of such a Bureau would in my opinion be of great and lasting benefit to the community.

Therefore, in order to protect the interests of the people, it would be essential that the Deputy Assistant District Attorneys assigned to the proposed Bureau be men of experience, honesty, and possessing considerable professional skill, and in order to retain such counsel for the people it is but wise economy that their salaries be commensurate with the responsible character of their duties.

I believe that the work of this Bureau, along the lines above stated, would be sufficiently effective to justify its existence, and I therefore respectfully request that the appropriation be granted.

The members of said Commission shall serve without pay and shall make a report to the Mayor and the Board of Aldermen on or before May 1, 1911.

Sec. 2. That for carrying out the work of the said Commission the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is hereby requested, in pursuance to subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, to issue special revenue bonds to an amount not exceeding fifteen thousand dollars, the proceeds of which are to be applied to the defraying of the expenses of said Commission. The said Commission is authorized and empowered to employ such experts and assistants as it may deem necessary in the prosecution of said work.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Sir—The New York Chapter of the American Institute of Architects is in receipt of a communication from your Committee asking that it co-operate with you in urging upon his Honor William J. Gaynor, Mayor of The City of New York, the appointment of an official committee to study the matter of congestion of population in this city, and also to prepare a definite plan for city development with a view of obviating the conditions which now prevail. This Chapter having given careful consideration to what you propose, wishes to reply to your suggestion as follows:

The New York Chapter of the American Institute of Architects maintains the position it definitely stated at one of your conferences last year. It believes that no adequate result will ever be attained by the appointment of a Commission outside of the City government itself; the history of every such commission in the past is the production of many schemes, beautiful to look at and admirable in themselves were they possible of execution, but the actual result of the work of these previous commissions has been almost nil.

The New York Chapter of the American Institute of Architects considers it most important that a city plan for New York be prepared at a very early date, and further, that such a plan and the preliminary study leading up to its preparation should be made entirely by experts, civil engineers, architects and landscape engineers working in or attached to the City Departments eventually having in charge

the execution of any such plan or scheme. The services of such a Commission would not only consist of preparing such a plan as is proposed by your Committee, but also would have in charge and under its consideration current schemes of city engineering as a whole, which of necessity would be contingent upon a city plan and its development.

The Chapter would welcome the opportunity to be of any possible service to the City in offering whatever material or information it has at its command for what the City officers may need in order to inaugurate such a scheme.

It is believed that the best results for the City can be obtained in the preparation and execution of this work only by a body like the Board of Public Improvements, provided for in the amended Charter of The City of Greater New York, as submitted to the New York Legislature during its session of 1909. The Chapter feels strongly that the attitude herein announced is for the best interest of the City and it is the intention of the Chapter to present this point of view to his Honor the Mayor, and to the Borough Presidents at the earliest possible date.

#### No. 266.

The Committee on Laws and Legislation, to which was referred on February 8, 1910 (Minutes, page 491), the annexed ordinance in favor of requiring street railroad companies to allay dust and particles of deleterious matter, respectfully

#### REPORTS:

That it believes the proposed ordinance to be greatly in the interest of the general health and comfort of the public, and that it entails no hardship on the railroad companies. It, therefore, recommends that the said ordinance be adopted.

AN ORDINANCE requiring street surface railroad companies to sprinkle streets or thoroughfares with oil or water, to allay dust and other matter which fill the air through the momentum and friction of cars operated thereon.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. The several railroad companies operating cars on the surface of any of the streets or thoroughfares of The City of New York are hereby directed and required to sprinkle, with oil or water, the surface of the streets or thoroughfares upon which such cars are operated at least three times in every twenty-four hours, or oftener when necessary, between the tracks and for a distance two feet beyond the rails upon either side thereof, whenever the atmospheric conditions are such as to cause the air to be filled with particles of dust and other matter largely conducted by the momentum and friction of the cars so operated.

Sec. 2. Each and every railroad company which shall neglect or refuse to comply with the provisions of section one of this ordinance shall thereby incur a penalty of one hundred dollars (\$100) for each such neglect or refusal, to be recoverable against the company so offending in an action to be brought by the Corporation Counsel in the name of The City of New York.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Hon. JOHN PURROY MITCHELL, President, Board of Aldermen, City:

Dear Sir—Upon assuming the duties of my office on January 1, 1910, I found that there remained to be copied 45,000 marriage records of my predecessors' administration.

Two copies of each record are required. One, in book form, is retained in this office. The other is sent to the State Department of Health.

In duplicate, therefore, there are 90,000 copies to be rewritten. Since January 1, 1910, there has been an increase in this arrearage of approximately 2,500 records per month. This condition is brought about by the fact that, while the work of the County Clerk's office has increased approximately 33 1/3 per cent., the number of employees has remained the same since 1894.

In verification of this statement I enclose a brief schedule showing the increased work of the office.

In order to bring the work of the office up to date I respectfully ask you to present to the Board of Aldermen a resolution providing for an issue of special revenue bonds to the amount of \$10,000. If granted, I propose to set to work immediately a sufficient number of temporary Clerks to copy these marriage records, paying them for their services at the rate of 10 cents per folio, or 100 words.

I believe you thoroughly appreciate the importance of getting this work up to date, and I therefore urgently ask your favorable consideration and the introduction of such a resolution at to-morrow's meeting of the Board of Aldermen.

Dr. W. H. Smith, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

From March 13 to 19, inclusive, the following operations were performed, at all of which the Attending Surgeons or their Assistants were present: Bellevue Hospital, 57; Gouverneur Hospital, 19; Harlem Hospital, 27; and Fordham Hospital, 16.

In accordance with the rules, a fire drill was held at Bellevue and Gouverneur Hospitals on March 15, and at Harlem and Fordham Hospitals on March 16.

Special Nurses have been authorized as follows: 5 special Nurses to care for sick members of the house staff, rendering altogether 9 days' service; 4 Nurses for isolation cases, rendering up to the present time, 16 days' service; and 1 special Nurse to care for a sick pupil in the Nurses' residence, rendering 3 days' service. This makes a total of 28 days' service rendered by special Nurses. Approval is asked for.

A Nurse at Harlem Hospital is ill with diphtheria and is at present in the isolation ward. Is it desired to retain her in isolation at Harlem with special Nurses costing \$6 a day, or to send her to the Minto Hospital, where she will be cared for at the rate of \$20 per week?

In the matter of kosher meat for the boat "Westfield," it is recommended that the same arrangement now existing be continued, with the stipulation that the amount purchased for the year shall not exceed \$1,000.

A request has been received from the Training School, asking that individual lockers, numbering about 300, be installed in the new Nurses' residence. It is recommended that this be referred to the Building Committee.

It has long been a custom in Bellevue to supply ambulance Drivers with rubber coats, rubber boots, and rubber hat covers. It is recommended that hereafter the ambulance Drivers shall obtain these articles at their own expense.

Mr. Rose, manager of the laundry, has resigned, his resignation taking effect April 1. It is intended to do away with the position of "Manager of Laundry," and to reorganize for better service with the laundry under the Housekeeping Department; a woman in charge of the laundry at \$60 a month, a head Laundress in charge of ironing room, at \$40 a month, and a head man in charge of wash room, at \$40 a month. This will involve no additional expense, and will, as a matter of fact, cost slightly less than the present arrangement.

On the 15th and 16th of March, the Supervising Nurse, four out of five of the medical house staff, and one of the surgical staff of Gouverneur Hospital were subpoenaed to attend the Surrogate's Court. They were obliged to leave the hospital at 10 o'clock in the morning and to remain away from the hospital for several hours. It is needless to say that such a procedure leaves the hospital without sufficient protection, and interferes greatly with the hospital work and the care of the patients. It is recommended that some action be taken to secure some different arrangement whereby the hospital may receive due consideration in this respect.

## Special Orders

Upon the invitation of the Board, the Honorable Calvin Tomkins, Commissioner of Docks and Ferries, appeared and spoke in reference to his letter of March 4, presented at last meeting, and stated that he had received a copy of a letter which had been received by the Board from Messrs. McKim, Mead & White, under date of March 10, protesting against the plan proposed by him for the use of the piers at Twenty-eighth and Twenty-ninth streets. He explained that his request for the modification of the building plans so as to permit the use of these piers was not made in view of the needs of the present time, but because of the possible demand for wharfage facilities in that neighborhood thirty or fifty years hence. A general discussion took place and Mr. Tomkins answered several questions. The conference adjourned without definite action, but it was felt by the Trustees that the conditions did not warrant any change in the plans of the new Bellevue Hospital as proposed by the Board.

A hearing was held of the charges preferred against Richard D. Healy. Mr. Healy was represented by Mr. Blair, and Mr. Benedict of the Law Department was present on behalf of the Board of Trustees. After hearing the sworn testimony of the General Medical Superintendent and the Night Assistant Superintendent, the hearing was adjourned until the next regular meeting of the Board, on Tuesday, April 5, 1910, at 4 p. m.

Consideration was given to Assembly bill No. 1102, to create a Department of Public Hospitals, a copy of which had been sent to each member, and after discussion, on motion, duly seconded and carried, it was

Resolved, To disapprove of this bill.

## Communications.

- First—Modifying Budget schedules for 1910.
- Second—Transferring \$2,282 within the appropriations for 1910.
- Third—Recommending the establishment of various additional positions and grades.
- Fourth—Modifying Budget schedule No. 191 for 1910.
- Fifth—Transferring \$4,752 from the appropriations for 1910 to the Department of Public Charities.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication, having been acknowledged, was placed on file.

A communication was received from the Department of Correction with catalogue of the articles supplied by the prisons. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication, having been acknowledged, was referred to the General Medical Superintendent for his information.

A certain contract having been entered into between the Compo Tile Company, a domestic corporation, and the Department of Health of the City of New York, on or about November 9, 1909, whereby the said corporation to lay a composition fireproof flooring and wainscoting in the several rooms of the dining hall pavilion at the Tuberculosis Sanatorium at Otisville, Orange County, N. Y., the said work to be done for the sum of \$700, and the said contract having provided among other things that the contract should not be assigned or any right therein without the consent in writing of the Board of Health indorsed thereon or attached thereto or of any moneys to become due unless with like consent; and an application having been made to the Board of Health for leave to assign the sum of \$450 out of the first sums of money due and payable under said contract to Samuel H. Clark in business at No. 245 Front street, New York City.

Resolved, That consent be and is hereby given to the assignment of the said sum of money to the said Samuel H. Clark, without waiving the right to require consent for any other or further assignments of the said contract or of any interest therein to the said Clark or any other person and without making the said Department of Health in any way liable for any improper payment of said sum of money due or to grow due under the said contract or without in any wise affecting any of the terms or provisions of the said contract except as, in and by the terms of this authority expressly mentioned.

The General Medical Officer submitted the following statement and recommendation concerning steps to be taken to safeguard the milk supply of The City of New York:

"I desire to direct the attention of the Board to certain important developments of the last year relating to the milk supply of New York, which may have a very important bearing upon the future policy of the Board with reference to the question of a pure milk supply.

"The present scheme for the surveillance of the milk supply of New York City is far more complete and comprehensive than that of any other great city of the world. It has been of gradual development covering a period of twenty-five years and has been slowly extended and perfected, as increased knowledge and the facilities at the command of the Department have rendered it possible.

"In a general way it comprises an attempt at the supervision of the health of persons handling milk (so far as infectious diseases are concerned) on the 44,000 farms (situated in seven States) which ship milk to New York, in the 1,100 creameries in the country, in the numerous receiving and bottling stations in the City, and in the 6,000 stores where milk and cream are sold. The Department also exercises a supervision over the sanitary conditions on the farms and at all milk points, regulates the conditions of transportation, delivery, etc., and makes regular chemical and bacteriological examinations of the milk.

"Dairy or farm inspection, in many respects the most important link in the chain of supervision of the milk supply, was inaugurated in June, 1906, with five country inspectors. This number has since been increased to thirty-three and, as a result of their work in the creameries and on the farms, there has been a great improvement in the methods and habits of the farmers in the care of their cows and in the collection and care of the milk, and in the consequent average cleanness of the milk supply of New York. The value of the additional safeguards, which have thus been thrown around the milk supply, has been great and by a slow process of education the general standard of milk production throughout the country is being elevated.

"The danger of infection of milk through the presence of cases of infectious disease, such as scarlet fever, diphtheria and typhoid fever, among the employees on the farms and in the creameries, has been materially lessened. There is every reason to believe that the improvements in various ways which have been made will gradually extend and a cleaner milk supply will result.

"During the last year, however, with the development of a closer supervision of the milk supply, which our present force and scheme render possible, certain hitherto unknown facts have come to light which point unmistakably to the conclusion that no system of milk inspection is possible covering so large a territory as is comprised in the New York City milk shed, which will render entirely safe the ordinary commercial milk.

"As a result of studies of typhoid fever outbreaks, which were suspected to be of milk-borne origin (studies which were rendered possible by the present system of supervision), it has been found during the last year that several distinct outbreaks of the disease were traceable directly to infected milk. The peculiar and striking feature of these outbreaks has been that they did not originate from cases of active typhoid fever or those of recent development, but were due to infection of the milk through chronic typhoid bacillus carriers, who had suffered from the disease years before and who were at the time perfectly well and could not, in any way, ordinarily be considered a source of danger.

"The fact that these typhoid bacillus carriers existed was only determined through tracing back to their origin cases of typhoid fever, eliminating all other sources of infection, and then making bacteriological examinations of the stools of the suspected persons. The surprising discovery was made that the extensive outbreaks of disease were due to the infection of milk from the intestinal discharges of such healthy persons, who had at one time had typhoid fever, and whose stools still contained enormous numbers of virulent typhoid bacilli. In one instance, it was shown that an extensive outbreak was the result, in all human probability, of the infection of milk by a typhoid bacillus carrier, who had suffered from typhoid fever forty-six years ago and who had, during these intervening years, probably been a continuous distributor of typhoid bacilli. No such important outbreak, due to this cause, has ever, to my knowledge, been previously described and it shows conclusively that no practical method of supervision can exclude such sources of infection.

"To examine the intestinal discharges of all the persons engaged in the milk traffic would be manifestly impossible. It would mean the examination of specimens from probably not less than 300,000 persons and would include a systematic examination



of every new individual who hereafter became engaged in the production or handling of milk.

"It also seems probable that a certain percentage of the cases of scarlet fever and diphtheria occurring in New York City result from milk infection; for, notwithstanding the exclusion of all those known to be suffering from these diseases, who are employed on the dairy farms and in the creameries, a mild case may escape detection or may be unrecognized.

"On the farms supplying only certified or guaranteed milk, for which a much higher price is received, it would be entirely practicable to make thorough examinations of all persons handling the milk and any chronic bacillus carrier thus discovered, could at once be excluded from contact with the milk.

"It seems, therefore, in the light of our present knowledge, imperative to supplement the present comprehensive scheme of inspection by pasteurization, at least, of all milk which is intended for consumption as a beverage. Naturally, that which is employed in cooking or baking, need not be thus treated. Of course, in lieu of pasteurization previous to the delivery of the milk to the consumer, boiling by the householder would be effective. In Europe the latter procedure is almost the routine one, not, however, for the reason here suggested, but because the methods of handling, cooling and transporting the milk are so defective, that unless the milk is boiled by the consumer soon after its receipt, it rapidly sours.

"I would, therefore, recommend that the Board adopt such action as seems to it desirable for providing, in the near future, for extensive pasteurization of the milk supply of New York."

After discussing the necessity for the adoption of stricter regulations for the sale and care of milk in The City of New York, it was, on motion of the President.

Resolved, That it is the sense of this Board that milk used for drinking purposes should be either properly pasteurized or boiled unless it is what is technically known as "certified, guaranteed or inspected milk."

A report of the failure of the contractors to furnish meat and poultry to the Tuberculosis Sanatorium at Otisville, N. Y., in accordance with specifications, was submitted and the Secretary was directed to communicate with the contractors and call their attention to the specification of their contract.

Jacob Hessel, President, and two members of the New Lots Board of Trade of the Borough of Brooklyn, appeared in the matter of the request of the New Lots Board of Trade to revoke the permit issued by the Board allowing A. Bender to conduct a cow stable at No. 712 Hendrix street, in the Borough of Brooklyn, and were heard. After considering the arguments offered by the members of said Board of Trade, the matter was referred to the President.

A copy of a permit issued to the Neponsit Realty Company by the State Commissioner of Health, was received, and ordered on file.

Meeting, April 5, 1910, 10.30 a. m.

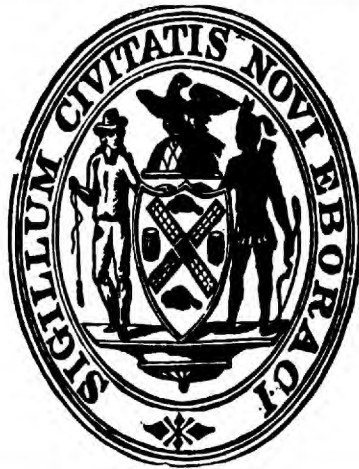

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do. Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures. Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
