To the Honorable Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York City:

Gentlemen-In view of the excessive prices members of the Police Force have to pay for their uniforms and supplies, as told in the accompanying clipping taken from "Democracy" of May 7, we would respectfully suggest the establishment of a tailoring shop at which all City employees requiring uniforms may have them made at cost price; or if this be too paternal or socialistic, it might be advisable to let a yearly contract for making such uniforms to the lowest responsible bidder.

Investigation leads us to the belief that a price of from \$38 to \$45 for winter coat and trousers for a Policeman is excessive. The cloth used in police uniforms is not as durable and as good a cloth as that used by the United States sailors, and naval uniforms cost fully 25 per cent. less than those of our police.

Trusting that your honorable body will take this matter up in justice to 8,000 decent, hardworking men, we remain

Patrolmen Forced to Pay Exorbitant Prices for Uniforms and Supplies.

The rank and file of the Police Department is much wrought up over the excessive prices charged by the Department for uniforms, caps, belts, pistols and all other supplies and more especially over the fact that they must buy their supplies from certain contractors, whereas members of the Fire Department can buy their supplies anywhere they please and at prices far below that charged to the police. While there is no hint or suspicion of graft on the part of anybody, the prices charged to the police are so unreasonable that the whole matter will probably be laid before Mayor Gaynor before long for a complete investigation. His attention will be called to the fact that where a Policeman has to pay for everything, no matter how trivial, the Fireman receives everything, except his uniform and cap, free of all cost. The police will ask the Mayor why this should be so and why one Department should be favored at the expense of

A comparison of the prices shows that a Fireman can buy a flannel uniform anywhere he pleases at a cost of about \$13.80 and a cloth suit for about \$4 more. A Patrolman must buy cloth for summer coat and trousers at \$2.20 a yard; cloth for winter trousers at \$3.20 a yard; cloth for winter overcoats at \$3.60 a yard; for dress trousers at \$3.05 a yard and cloth for dress coats at \$4.30 per yard. These cloths must be bought from one firm of contractors, with whom the Police Department has an arrangement for

this purpose, but any tailor can make the uniform. As a result, a summer uniform costs the Patrolman \$18, a winter uniform from \$40 to \$50 and a dress coat and trousers from \$32 to \$38.

But the expenses of outfitting a Patrolman do not end here. He must buy buttons at three cents each; precinct numbers at the rate of two for seven cents; straps for clubs, five cents each and stripes signifying years of service, for eight cents each. A Fireman has none of these expenses, for the coats, coat and cap badges, insignia of rank, hat numbers with leather straps and belts, are furnished free of charge. The issue corporate stock of The City of New York, in the manner provided by section 169 belts worn by a Policeman cost \$1.50 each and this is undoubtedly excessive, for the United States Army has a much better belt for which they pay \$0.82 each.

Another source of complaint on the part of the police is in the sleeping arrangements. The police have to furnish their own mattresses, bedding and linen, whereas in the case of the Fireman all this is furnished free of charge by the Department.

The police pay from \$3 for Inspectors' caps down to \$2 for Patrolmen's caps. The gold braiding and insignia on the Inspector's cap brings the price up to \$7 whereas the Battalion Chief, who has a cap very similar, pays only \$2.75 and the Fireman only \$1.15.

About two years ago the Police Force was armed with Colt's 38-calibre revolvers, which are considered among the best of small firearms. Then Commissioner Bingham issued an order, replacing this style of weapon with Smith & Wesson's. for which each man had to pay \$13. The United States Army is armed with a 38-calibre Colt, which is the standard arm used by the United States troops. The Federal Government pays only \$11.60 apiece. as against the \$13 by the Police Department.

These exorbitant prices for police supplies constitute one of the chief reasons why it is impossible to get more applications for Patrolmen's examinations. The first year Patrolman, who receives \$800, must spend between \$200 and \$250 before he can become a full-fledged member of the force, so that if he be a married man, his income for the first twelve months will be only from \$10 to \$12 a week.

Gentlemen-At a meeting of your Board held on May 6, 1910, there was presented for your consideration the report of your Committee on Corporate Stock Budget recommending the construction of a municipal bathing house at Coney Island, which report your Board approved.

Your Committee respectfully suggests that at this time the most important element in the progress of the project is the immediate appropriation of funds with which to proceed with the construction and equipment of the building. If the matter is held over and considered with the Corporate Stock Budget, as a whole, a delay of at least two weeks will result, which might mean that the baths would not be ready for the public this season. Your Committee therefore asks that immediate action be taken upon the resolution transmitted herewith.

To the Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen-In the matter of a resolution of the Board of Aldermen, adopted April 5, 1910, relative to fixing the salary of the Deputy Chief of the Fire Department in charge of the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens at \$7,500 per annum, which was presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment at a meeting held April 15. 1910, and referred to a Select Committee, consisting of the Comptroller and the President of the Board of Aldermen, for consideration, we would report as follows:

The purpose of the resolution is the advancement in salary of Thomas Lally, Deputy Chief in charge of the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, from \$5,000 to \$7.500 per annum.

Deputy Chief Lally has been a member of the Fire Department for nearly forty years, having entered the service August 15, 1870. The dates of his promotion to dif

ferent positions in the service are: Assistant Foreman, April 21, 1873; Foreman, November 1, 1881; Chief of Battalion, May 1, 1884; Deputy Chief, September 18, 1900.

Upon his appointment as Deputy Chief Mr. Lally was placed in charge of one of the Brooklyn fire districts, his previous service of thirty years having been in Manhattan in districts south of Houston street. On January 14, 1904, he was placed in charge of the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens. On December 27, 1905, his title was changed to Deputy Chief of Department in charge, Brooklyn and Queens, and his salary increased from \$4,200 to \$5,000 per annum.

Previous to consolidation the salary paid to the Chief of the Brooklyn Fire De partment was \$6,000 per annum. The territory embraced by the fire service of the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens covers about 200 square miles, an area greater than the other Boroughs of the City combined, and the demands upon the Department have greatly increased since Deputy Chief Lally was placed in charge, as may be seen from the following statistics:

Population in 1904, 1,510,049; in 1910, 1,844,907. New buildings erected, 57,894. Fire companies in service in 1904, 82; in 1910, 113. Members of uniformed force January, 1904, 1,293; May, 1910, 1,692. Number of fire alarms in 1904, 3,599, with an average loss of \$871. Number of fire alarms in 1909, 4,606, with an average loss of \$478.1

During the six years of Mr. Lally's supervision the paid fire system has been extended to Far Rockaway, Rockaway Beach, Jamaica, Richmond Hill, Flushing and College Point, and the high pressure system has been installed in Brooklyn and Concy Island. The general conduct of the Department has been excellent.

In view of the great increase in the number of buildings and in population in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens in the past few years, involving additional responsibilities in the protection of life and property placed upon the man in charge, we are of the opinion that the salary of the position of Deputy Chief in charge of those Boroughs should be increased, and therefore recommend approval of and concurrence in the resolution of the Board of Aldermen.

Dear Sir-I beg to notify you that at a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on May 13, 1910, a resolution of the Board of Aldermen recommending to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the appointment of a committee to hold hearings and investigate the conditions with regard to the beach front at Coney Island, with a view to acquiring the necessary property on the beach front for the construction and maintenance of a boardwalk, to begin at Nortons Point and to end at Brighton Beach, was referred to a committee consisting of the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the President of the Borough of Brooklyn.

The resolution referred to was adopted by the Board of Aldermen on May 3, 1910.

The President laid before the Board the following communication from the Commissioner of Docks:

Department of Docks and Ferries, City of New York, Pier "A," North River, New York, May 11, 1910.

Hon. JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, President of Board of Aldermen: Sir-The Budget appropriation for this Department for the current year allows under the heading Bureau of Superintendence, Special Contract Obligations, Item 164, Music, \$34,344.

The Department maintains nine recreation structures located at the foot of Albany street, North River; at the foot of Barrow street, North River; at the foot of West One Hundred and Twentyninth street, North River; at the foot of Market street, East River; at the foot of East Third street, East River; at the foot of East Twenty-fourth street, East River; at the foot of East Twenty-fourth street, East River; at the foot of East One Hundred and Twelfth street, Harlem River, and at the foot of Metropolitan avenue, East River, Borough of Brooklyn.

Heretofore bands have been maintained on all of the structures each night throughout the entire recreation pier season. On the larger piers, namely, at the foot of Barrow street, West Fiftieth street, East Twenty-fourth street, nineteen men and leader are necessary, fourteen men and leader being sufficient for the remaining piers, these being the same assignments as have been in force in former years.

In the Budget appropriations for this year a reduction was made in the amount allowed for music on the piers and with the amount available, as noted above, \$34,344, arrangements cannot be made for daily programs, and two or three days of each week on each of the piers would not be provided for.

Recognizing the good that these recreation piers do for the public during the summer season, I am anxious to provide music each night on all of the piers, and to do this it will be necessary to have one additional band of nineteen men and leader and two additional bands of fourteen men and leader to each band. The cost of these three additional bands would amount to \$16,695, at the rate of \$3 per night for each player, and \$6 per night for each leader.

I respectfully request that pursuant to provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Charter a resolution be adopted by you requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the Comptroller to issue special revenue bonds in the sum of \$16,695 for the purposes stated, namely, to meet the cost of employing the three additional bands.

To the Board of Education:

The Committee on Finance respectfully reports that it is in receipt of a communication from the Secretary, stating that the Committee on Buildings has had under consideration the matter of the necessity and advisability of erecting a fence and forming a playground and athletic field on the site on Cherry, Clinton and Water streets, Borough of Manhattan, which was acquired for school purposes on June 19, 1907.

The plot has a frontage of 181 feet 4 inches on Cherry street, and on Water street, and of 116 feet on Clinton street, and the Committee on Buildings is of the opinion that the same should be utilized at the earliest possible date as a place of recreation for the children of this congested locality. Whereas, The appropriation for "Compensation of Janitors" for 1910 was but \$1,393,141.41, which, based upon the rates of compensation paid for many years, and making due allowance for anticipated enlargement of the summer and evening activities, including a small reservation for contingencies, was approximately \$80,000 less than the amount required for 1910 for cleaning, heating, ventilating and efficient care

of the school plant generally; and Whereas, In order to offset the anticipated deficit the Committee on Care of Buildings reluctantly presented a report which was adopted by the Board of Education February 7, 1910 (see "Journal," pages 328-329), which report indicated the condition of the fund for "Compensation of Janitors," and recommended that certain graded percentage deductions be made in such manner as appeared to be the least onerous; and

Whereas, In accordance with the action of the Board of Education in approving such report, the Auditor is now causing the prescribed deductions to be made from the monthly payrolls of Janitors, and the Janitors in accordance with the terms of such report, are accepting such reduced installments "as on account of compensa-

tion"; and

Whereas, The Committee on Care of Buildings believes that the rates paid prior to January 1, 1910, were not excessive, in fact, in many instances might be considered otherwise, in that such rates were established many years ago and have remained unchanged while the cost of living has constantly increased; and

Whereas, So far as is known to this Committee the public school Janitors are the only class of public servants to suffer a reduction in compensation; and

Whereas, The public school Janitors are thus placed in the predicament of either suffering such deduction from the amount left over for their own use after paying their help, or else reducing the number or calibre of subordinate help, or both, and since the first expedient works a hardship upon a worthy class of public servants, and the second, and more probable expedient, will result in unclean school buildings, with

attendant evils; therefore he it Resolved, That the Committee on Finance be requested to take the necessary steps to secure sufficient funds to restore the amounts already deducted from the

compensation of Janitors, and to maintain, for the balance of the year, the same rates as paid prior to January 1, 1910.

JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, Esq., President, Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir-There are required by the Department for the proper supervision of its works seven (7) automobiles. These machines will be used principally by the Engineers. The Department is responsible for the correct administration of a territory of about 850 square miles, and the only means of transportation over a large section of this area is by horses and wagons.

To illustrate the necessity for these cars I might mention the fact that on Long Island the Engineer who will be in charge of the pumping stations is required to visit about thirty (30) pumping stations, located from Ridgewood to Massapequa, a distance of about 23 miles. This Engineer has to depend on train service and considerable delay is often caused in making connections.

One of the machines will also be used by the Superintendent of Ponds and Con-

duits, his duty requiring visits to all of the streams and ponds.

On the Croton Watershed there is a considerable stretch of the City's property which must be inspected daily by the Engineer and his Assistants. The means of transportation across country is limited and it is often necessary for the Engineer to go down on the Harlem Railroad and come up on the Hudson River Railroad in order to visit the works under his charge.

One of the cars will be used by the Deputy Commissioner and myself and will replace an old car which is now of little service.

Six (6) of the automobiles which are credited to the Department I propose to sell at public auction.

I believe the Board recognizes that it is impracticable, if not impossible, to prepare specifications and contracts for the purchase of automobiles. Each part of these machines is covered by patents or special designs, I believe, and in the selection of any design one concern would naturally be favored and the Department could not consistently ask for competitive bids. I am satisfied that it would be a clear evasion of section 419 of the Charter, which provides that there should be free competition for the furnishing of supplies where the expense will exceed \$1,000.

To avoid these complications I would respectfully ask the Board's consideration to grant the necessary authority to purchase these machines without advertising for competitive bids or proposals,

Hon. JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, President, Board of Aldermen, City Hall, City:

Dear Sir-At the closing meeting of the Board of Aldermen last year a resolution was passed authorizing the Commissioner of this Department to purchase on open orders 225 high pressure hydrants from the A. P. Smith Manufacturing Company. The resolution, however, failed to receive the approval of the former Mayor.

It is a matter of much importance to the Department that the hydrants for the system be of a standard pattern, and as the hydrants manufactured by the A. P. Smith Manufacturing Company are the only ones which stood the test prescribed in the original contract for the furnishing of hydrants, I beg to renew the application for authority to expend the sum of \$24,412.50 for the purchase of these hydrants without

the formality of advertising for competitive bids. On several occasions the Department has obtained authority from the Board of Aldermen to purchase on open orders the hydrants of this pattern. Contracts have already been awarded for the furnishing, delivering and laying of water mains in the new districts to which the high pressure service will be extended. No other part of the high pressure system deserved or has received more attention from the Engineering Bureau than the proper selection of a hydrant well adapted for the extraordinarily severe service for which it is intended and on the unfailing record of which the efficiency of the whole system depends. Under the trying conditions of operation the requirements in this case are necessarily much more exacting than in that of the common and much simpler hydrant in use on our distribution system, and can only be made by high, technical skill in the design and excellence of its material and workmanship.

On the Department's invitation for bids for a suitable hydrant for this service in November, 1904, five (5) of the leading manufacturers submitted hydrants for test, and the only hydrant to comply with all the requirements was the one submitted by the A. P. Smith Manufacturing Company. The contract was not awarded until June 27, 1905. This delay was due principally to the claim made by several of the unsuccessful bidders, who requested sufficient time to readjust their hydrants and to have same retested. All the bids were rejected, and on the second bidding several hydrants were submitted, but the A. P. Smith Manufacturing Company's hydrant was the only one which successfully passed the test. An injunction was issued restraining the Commissioner from awarding the contract to the A. P. Smith Manufacturing Company and two years clapsed before the final decision of the Court.

Taking these facts into consideration, as well as the obvious advantage of uniformuv in hydrants, and the agreement by the Company to furnish these hydrants at the same rate which governed their bid which was submitted in competitive bidding, I would respectfully ask authority from the Board of Aldermen to purchase these hydrants on open order.


