Recommendation: Accept two fireproof enclosed stairways located at points as remote as possible from each other, said stairways to be constructed of incombustible material, to extend from 2d floor to ground, enclosure to extend from 1st to 2d floors, all doors leading from workroom to stairs to be fireproof self-closing, opening outwardly so as not to obstruct the passageway, with direct egress to outer air at ground floor from enclosure. Stairway at southwest end may be built from present fireproof partitions of office to enclose stairs to vault, permitting office within enclosure of stairway. Accept these two stairways as exits (in lieu of four required by floor space) on condition that occupancy does not exceed 50 on 2d floor.

(2) Premises affected, McConnellsville (Main Building); appellant, Frank E. Harden Co., 8-Additional exit. Three-story nonfireproof frame building erected before Oct. 1, 1913; open lofts; no sprinkler; combustibles carried; no fire alarm; occupancy, 25; above 1st floor, 16; above 2d floor, one or two occasionally; 3d floor used for storage; exits, two interior stairways, one from 1st to 3d floors and one from 1st to 2d floors; doors to stairs open outwardly but are not self-closing; exits remote; no safe egress from roof; imperfect horizontal exit on 2d floor.

Recommendation: While no one permanently employed on 3d floor, accept as 2d means of exit therefrom a ladder to be installed at westerly end of attic leading to 2d floor.

(3) Premises affected, Mt. Vernon, 7-9 Valentine st.; appellant, Wm. A. Forrester, 1-Vertical sliding doors on elevator to be self-closing. 2-Make and keep on file monthly inspection reports of elevator. 3-Guard elevator counterweights at top and bottom. 4-Provide sign on elevator indicating safe load. 5-Provide sign prohibiting persons riding on elevator. 6-Arrange fire escape doors to close and latch properly. Provide electrical contacts on elevator. Hand-power elevator of carriage hoist type, used infrequently for raising material from 1st to 2d floors; doors at 3d floor are sectional vertical sliding doors, and are not in good repair; the only other entrance to shaft which is being used is at ground floor from outside of building; this opening protected by horizontal sliding door which is kept locked when not in use; installation of electrical contacts impracticable on hand-power elevator; counterweights are entirely unguarded at bottom of run, and being hand-power elevator guarding at top unnecessary; fire escape provides adequate exit for employees, and fireproof doors to balcony are acceptable except that the springs provided to keep doors closed should be replaced by stiffer springs as present ones do not operate effectively.

Recommendation: When gate at top of elevator has been repaired to operate freely and counterweights guarded at both sides of runway in basement, orders Nos. 1, 2, 3 and 5 will be waived. Nos. 4 and 8 to be complied with.

(4) Premises affected, Albany, 95 Washington ave.; appellant, Westcott Burlingame, 1-Provide at least two legal means of exit. 





The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street and the openings of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the date of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials or labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers. Party walls and fences, when existing against property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furring, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the Contractor.

"No buildings, parts of buildings, fixtures or machinery sold for removal under these terms and conditions shall in any case be relocated or re-erected within the lines of any proposed street or other public improvement, and if any such buildings, parts of buildings, fixtures or machinery, etc., shall be relocated or re-erected within the lines of any proposed street or other public improvement, title thereto shall thereupon become vested in The City of New York and a resale at public or private sale may be made in the same manner as if no prior sale thereof had been made."

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids, and be it further

Resolved, That while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.
