An Ordinance to Provide the Necessary Means for the Support of the Government of The City of New York and the Counties of New York, Bronx, Kings, Queens and Richmond, and for Other Purposes, and to Levy Taxes on the Estates, Real and Personal, Subject to Taxation in The City of New York, Pursuant to Law, in and for the Year 1918.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

SECTION 1. There shall be and there is hereby imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation of and within The City of New York the sum of one hundred and ninety-three million three hundred and ninety thousand two hundred and eight dollars and forty-three cents (\$193,390,208.43), being one hundred and forty-three million five hundred and sixty-nine thousand and eight dollars and seventy cents (\$143,569,008.70) to pay the expenses appropriated in the budget of the year 1918 for conducting the public business of The City of New York in each department and branch thereof; seventy-five million five hundred and ninety thousand four hundred and sixty dollars and two cents (\$75,590,460.02) to pay interest on the City debt and to provide for the redemption and amortization of the principal of the City debt; three million one hundred thousand dollars (\$3,100,000) for deficiencies in taxes, pursuant to chapter 209 of the Laws of 1906; eight million four hundred and sixty-three thousand seven hundred and fifty-six dollars and thirty-eight cents (\$8,463,756.38) for direct State taxes, these several totals amounting in the aggregate to two hundred and thirty million seven hundred and twenty-three thousand two hundred and twenty-five dollars and ten cents (\$230,723,225.10), and, in accordance with section 189 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 615, Laws of 1916, the sum of nine hundred thousand dollars (\$900,000) for redemption in 1918 of "tax notes" issued between November 8, 1917, and December 31, 1917, the proceeds of which were applied in 1917 to pay indebtedness incurred on account of non-revenue producing improvements; from which grand total of two hundred and thirty-one million six hundred and twenty-three thousand two hundred and twenty-five dollars and ten cents (\$231,623,225.10) there is to be deducted the sum of thirty-eight million two hundred and thirty-three thousand and sixteen dollars and sixty-seven cents (\$38,233,016.67) supplied by the General Fund for the Reduction of Taxation, as stated by the Comptroller of The City of New York in a communication to this Board, dated February 21, 1918, transmitting his certificate of the amount of the appropriations made for the year 1918, thus making a sum total of one hundred and ninety-three million three hundred and ninety thousand two hundred and eight dollars and forty-three cents (\$193,390,208.43) which is hereby imposed and levied upon the said estates, real and personal, subject to taxation within The City of New York.

Section 189 of the Charter provides, in part, that—

"Whenever the Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall authorize an expenditure for public improvements the cost whereof either wholly or in part is payable by the City under the provisions of this act, and shall direct that such cost of said improvements shall be included in the tax levy or levies of the year or years next following the adoption of the budget or budgets in which such cost, or such partial disbursement thereof as may be required, shall be included, the Comptroller is authorized to issue, in anticipation of the collection of the taxes of the year from which said Board shall direct the payments to be made, as hereinbefore authorized, to pay the cost of such public improvements, obligations of the City of New York to be known as 'tax notes,' or by such other name or names as he may designate, provided, however, that the maturities of said obligations or any renewal thereof shall in no event be later than the year in anticipation of the tax levy thereof said obligations were issued."

SECTION 2. There shall be and there is hereby imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of New York, the sum of three million eight hundred and forty-three thousand three hundred dollars and thirty-three cents (\$3,843,300.33) to pay the expenses and charges of said county for the year 1918, included in the Budget, and the further sum of one hundred and thirty-six thousand four hundred and thirty-two dollars and thirty cents (\$136,432.30), paid during the year 1917 from the proceeds of special revenue bonds, for county charges or liabilities of said county, as provided by subdivisions 3 and 7 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, amounting together to the sum of three million nine hundred and seventy-nine thousand seven hundred and thirty-two dollars and sixty-three cents (\$3,979,732.63).

SECTION 3. There shall be and there is hereby imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of Bronx, the sum of eight hundred and fourteen thousand five hundred and ninety-six dollars and five cents (\$814,596.05), to pay the expenses and charges of said county for the year 1918, included in the Budget, and the further sum of thirty-five thousand one hundred and forty-nine dollars and seventy-two cents (\$35,149.72), paid during the year 1917, from the proceeds of special revenue bonds for county charges or liabilities of said county, as provided by subdivisions 3 and 7 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, amounting together to the sum of eight hundred and forty-nine thousand seven hundred and forty-five dollars and seventy-seven cents (\$849,745.77).

SECTION 4. There shall be and there is hereby imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of Kings, the sum of two million and seventy-seven thousand one hundred and thirty-nine dollars and seventy-seven cents (\$2,077,139.77), to pay the expenses and charges of said county for the year 1918, included in the Budget, and the further sum of eighty thousand and thirteen dollars and eighty-three cents (\$80,013.83), paid during the year 1917, from the proceeds of special revenue bonds, for county charges or liabilities of said county, as provided by subdivisions 3 and 7 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, amounting together to the sum of two million one hundred and fifty-seven thousand one hundred and fifty-three dollars and sixty cents (\$2,157,153.60).

SECTION 5. There shall be and there is hereby imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of Queens, the sum of four hundred and ninety-eight thousand six hundred and ninety-eight dollars and thirteen cents (\$498,698.13), to pay the expenses and charges of said county for the year 1918, included in the Budget, and the further sum of twelve thousand six hundred and twelve dollars and twenty-seven cents (\$12,612.27), paid

during the year 1917 from the proceeds of special revenue bonds, for county charges or liabilities of said county, as provided by subdivisions 3 and 7 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, amounting together to the sum of five hundred and eleven thousand three hundred and ten dollars and forty cents (\$511,310.40).

SECTION 6. There shall be and there is hereby imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of Richmond, the sum of one hundred and sixty-six thousand seven hundred and ninety-nine dollars and eighty-two cents (\$166,799.82), to pay the expenses and charges of said county for the year 1918, included in the Budget, and the further sum of twelve thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight dollars and seventeen cents (\$12,898.17), paid during the year 1917, from the proceeds of special revenue bonds, for county charges or liabilities of said county, as provided by subdivisions 3 and 7 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, amounting together to the sum of one hundred and seventy-nine thousand six hundred and ninety-seven dollars and ninety-nine cents (\$179,697.99).

SECTION 7. There shall be and there is hereby imposed and levied upon the real estate, subject to taxation, of and within the City of New York, the sum of two million and sixty-one thousand three hundred and sixty-four dollars and six cents (\$2,061,364.06), to pay the assessment or special tax imposed upon the City of New York, as provided by chapter 679, Laws of 1911 (section 247 of the Greater New York Charter), as follows:

"Acquiring title wherever the same has not been heretofore acquired for the same purpose in fee for the lands, tenements and hereditaments required for the opening and extending of Queens Boulevard, from Van Dam Street to Hillside Avenue, in the First, Second and Fourth Wards, Borough of Queens, City of New York." "Acquiring title, wherever the same has not been heretofore acquired for the same purpose in fee, to the lands, tenements and hereditaments required for the opening and extending of Unionport Road, from Bronx Park East to Birchall Avenue; Birchall Avenue, from Unionport Road to White Plains Road, and Sagamore Street, from Unionport Road to Hunt Avenue, in the 24th Ward, Borough of The Bronx, City of New York." The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, at a meeting held on March 1, 1918, authorized and directed, under the provisions of chapter 15, Laws of 1918, amending section 247 of the Greater New York Charter, that the total amount of the cost and expense of acquiring Queens Boulevard, viz., \$1,236,818.43, to be borne by the Borough of Queens, shall be levied with the taxes upon the real property in said Borough in five equal amounts; one-fifth thereof, or \$247,363.69, shall be levied and collected with the taxes upon the real property in said Borough becoming due and payable in the year 1918, and the remaining four-fifths shall be levied and collected, in equal parts with interest thereon, with the taxes upon the real property in said Borough becoming due and payable in the years 1919, 1920, 1921 and 1922.

SECTION 12. The rates of tax upon each dollar of assessed valuation upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within The City of New York, and the several counties and boroughs included within said City are, for the purpose of carrying out and making effective the foregoing sections of this ordinance, hereby fixed for the year 1918, as follows:

An Ordinance to Repeal an Ordinance Amending Section 181 of Article 15 of Chapter 23 of the Code of Ordinances, Relating to "Streets."

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:
Section 1. An ordinance to amend subdivisions 1, 2 and 3 of section 181 of article 15 of chapter 23 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to "streets," adopted July 3, 1917, and received from the Mayor July 17, 1917, is hereby repealed in its entirety.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

No. 135.

An Ordinance to Amend Section 181 of Article 15 of Chapter 23 of the Code of Ordinances, Relating to "Streets," and Particularly to "Abutting Owner's Duties and Responsibilities" with Respect to "Sidewalks."

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York as follows:
Section 1. Section 181 of Article 15 of Chapter 23 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to "Streets," and particularly to "Abutting Owners' Duties and Responsibilities" with respect to "sidewalks," by inserting therein three subdivisions, respectively 1, 2 and 3, being a restoration of said section as the same existed prior to July 17, 1917:

§181. Abutting property owners' duties and obligations.

1. Generally. The owner, lessee or occupant of any house or other building or vacant lot fronting on any street shall, at his charge and expense, well and sufficiently pave, according to this ordinance, and keep and maintain in good repair, the sidewalks, curb and gutter of the street in front of such house, building or lot.

2. Notice to regulate and pave sidewalks. When any street shall have been paved and a majority of owners of lots on the same block shall have regulated and paved their sidewalks, the president of the borough in which the same is located shall give notice to the owner, lessee or occupant of any lot in front of which the sidewalks shall not be paved, to regulate and pave the same within a certain time, to be designated in the notice. Upon complaint being made to the borough president having jurisdiction thereof that any sidewalk, curb or gutter is not paved or repaired according to this article, he may cause a notice to be served upon the owner, lessee or occupant of any house, building or vacant lot of ground fronting thereon to repair or relay, as the case may require, such sidewalk, curb or gutter, within 10 days after the service of such notice.

3. Construction by city; reimbursement by assessment. In case the owner, lessee or occupant shall fail to lay, repair or relay, as the case may require, such sidewalk, curb or gutter, within the time required by the notice and otherwise to comply therewith, the borough president having jurisdiction is hereby authorized and required to lay or relay the flagging and set or reset the curb and gutter, or any of such work, and to do such incidental work as may be necessary properly to construct or repair such sidewalk, and to certify the expense thereof to the board of assessors. The board shall make a just and equitable assessment of such expense among the owners or occupants of all houses or lots deemed to be benefited thereby, in proportion, as near as may be, to the advantages which they may be deemed to have acquired.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

horizontal exits on 1st, 2d, 3d and 4th floors; exits not remote; no egress from roof. Buildings of brick, concrete and iron construction designed for use as office, laboratory and experimental work; 1st, 2d and 3d floors under construction; iron work 1st floor has not been encased in fireproof material; doors within 30 feet connected building not fireproofed; horizontal exits have wired glass panels more than 72 square inches. Spacing of straight bars on elevator cage are 1/2 inches; bar spacing about 5 feet above floor of car; space between bars and floor of solid construction.

Recommendation: Accept as means of exit exterior or interior fireproof enclosed stairway to be located at westerly end of building at extreme north; if interior stairway is provided no skylight need be installed if there are exterior openings to outer air within shaft. Waive No. 8 as there are exterior fireproof windows in shaft. Extension of time on fire alarm signal system and fire drill until Dec. 1, 1918, at which time the system is to be installed or a sprinkler installed which will obviate the necessity for such installation. No 6 to be waived. Encase structural iron work on 1st floor with fireproof materials; accept glass in doorway on one side of horizontal exit if all openings to horizontal exit on the other side of wall be provided with self-closing sliding fire doors equipped with fusible link.

3. Premises affected, Buffalo, 351 Abbott rd. Buildings 3, 4, 5 and 6; appellant, National Aniline & Chemical Co., Inc. 6—Three additional wash basins. 7—Two water closets in building. Four-story building used for color mixing and copperage; occupancy, 30 males; no water closet and one sink provided. In Building 101, on opposite side of street but connected by covered viaduct, are sufficient and suitable wash sinks and water closets.

Recommendation: Waival of order and acceptance of facilities in Building 101.

Three-story nonfireproof building, with 1st floor lofts divided; sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm; occupancy, 19; above 1st floor, 13; above 2d floor, 8; exits, three interior stairways, doors to which open out and are self-closing. "H" manufactured. Westerly stair enclosed fireproof, with no egress direct to outer air; stairs at northerly and southerly side of building partly enclosed with fireproof material; roofs of all stairway enclosures nonfireproof; there is a small extension at north and south ends, and stairways occupy part of this space; two elevators, each wood-enclosed.

Recommendation: Elevators to be enclosed with fireproof material, but no skylight if windows be provided to outer air; accept stairs of incombustible material and treads less than 10 inches wide. Accept fireproof or fire-resistant partitions for continuation of enclosure of north and south stairs; roofs of stairways enclosures to be made of fireproof material or of standard specifications; skylight to be provided in northerly enclosure and waived in so far as applies to southerly enclosure, as there are exterior fireproof windows in shaft; waived also in westerly stairway enclosure, as there are exterior fireproof windows in shaft.







TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 will be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon.
