Whereas, no provision has been made for the sale of Documentary Internal Revenue Stamps in the Borough of The Bronx; and,

Whereas, a constant demand by the public is being made upon the Register of Bronx County for a supply of these stamps to cover the war tax imposed upon certain instruments presented for record in his office, it is therefore

Resolved, That the Register may, by requisition, draw upon the Comptroller for a sum of money, not to exceed \$50, wherewith to purchase Documentary Internal Revenue Stamps, which said sum, however, shall be refunded to the Comptroller on or before the thirty-first day of December, nineteen hundred and eighteen.

Resolution Granting Permission to Storekeepers, Hucksters and Peddlers to Use Streets for Sale of Wares on Account of Jewish Holidays.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to storekeepers, hucksters and peddlers to stand on the sidewalk and in the carriageway near the curb, on the streets and thoroughfares of the City of New York, excepting on such streets and thoroughfares on which all encroachments have been removed by direction of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, for the sale of their wares on account of the Jewish holidays, with the consent of the property owners and the Commissioner of Licenses, provided a free passageway be kept on the sidewalk for all pedestrians and on the carriageway for all vehicles; such permission to continue only from February 25, 1918, to March 27, 1918, inclusive, and the ordinance or ordinances conflicting with the foregoing provisions are hereby suspended for the period of time above mentioned; the exercise of any privilege granted hereunder to be subject to supervision by the Police Department; furthermore, it is to be understood that this resolution shall not be in effect in any street where in the judgment of the Police Commissioner the privileges therein granted are apt to interfere with the religious repose of the residents or worshippers in the immediate neighborhood thereof.

Subdivision 3 of section 2 of article 1 of chapter 11 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to the discharge of small-arms, as amended, be and the same is hereby further amended by adding at the end thereof the following words: the grounds of Boy Scout Troop No. 9, located in the sand pit near the corner of Farragut Road and East 41st Street.

An Ordinance to Provide the Necessary Means for the Support of the Government of The City of New York and the Counties of New York, Bronx, Kings, Queens and Richmond, and for Other Purposes, and to Levy Taxes on the Estates, Real and Personal, Subject to Taxation in The City of New York, Pursuant to Law, in and for the Year 1918.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

SECTION 1. There shall be and there is hereby imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation of and within The City of New York the sum of one hundred and ninety-three million three hundred and ninety thousand two hundred and eight dollars and forty-three cents (\$193,390,208.43), being one hundred and forty-three million five hundred and sixty-nine thousand and eight dollars and seventy cents (\$143,569,008.70) to pay the expenses appropriated in the budget of the year 1918 for conducting the public business of The City of New York in each department and branch thereof; seventy-five million five hundred and ninety thousand four hundred and sixty dollars and two cents (\$75,590,460.02) to pay interest on the City debt and to provide for the redemption and amortization of the principal of the City debt; three million one hundred thousand dollars (\$3,100,000) for deficiencies in taxes, pursuant to chapter 209 of the Laws of 1906; eight million four hundred and sixty-three thousand seven hundred and fifty-six dollars and thirty-eight cents (\$8,463,756.38) for direct State taxes, these several totals amounting in the aggregate to two hundred and thirty million seven hundred and twenty-three thousand two hundred and twenty-five dollars and ten cents (\$230,723,225.10), and, in accordance with section 189 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 615, Laws of 1916, the sum of nine hundred thousand dollars (\$900,000) for redemption in 1918 of "tax notes" issued between November 8, 1917, and December 31, 1917, the proceeds of which were applied in 1917 to pay indebtedness incurred on account of non-revenue producing improvements; from which grand total of two hundred and thirty-one million six hundred and twenty-three thousand two hundred and twenty-five dollars and ten cents (\$231,623,225.10) there is to be deducted the sum of thirty-eight million two hundred and thirty-three thousand and sixteen dollars and sixty-seven cents (\$38,233,016.67) supplied by the General Fund for the Reduction of Taxation, as stated by the Comptroller of The City of New York in a communication to this Board, dated February 21, 1918, transmitting his certificate of the amount of the appropriations made for the year 1918, thus making a sum total of one hundred and ninety-three million three hundred and ninety thousand two hundred and eight dollars and forty-three cents (\$193,390,208.43) which is hereby imposed and levied upon the said estates, real and personal, subject to taxation within The City of New York.

Section 189 of the Charter provides, in part, that—

"Whenever the Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall authorize an expenditure for public improvements the cost whereof either wholly or in part is payable by the City under the provisions of this act, and shall direct that such cost of said improvements shall be included in the tax levy or levies of the year or years next following the adoption of the budget or budgets in which such cost, or such partial disbursement thereof as may be required, shall be included, the Comptroller is authorized to issue, in anticipation of the collection of the taxes of the year from which said Board shall direct the payments to be made, as hereinbefore authorized, to pay the cost of such public improvements, obligations of the City of New York to be known as 'tax notes,' or by such other name or names as he may designate, provided, however, that the maturities of said obligations or any renewal thereof shall in no event be later than the year in anticipation of the tax levy thereof said obligations were issued."

SECTION 2. There shall be and there is hereby imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of New York, the sum of three million eight hundred and forty-three thousand three hundred dollars and thirty-three cents (\$3,843,300.33) to pay the expenses and charges of said county for the year 1918, included in the Budget, and the further sum of one hundred and thirty-six thousand four hundred and thirty-two dollars and thirty cents (\$136,432.30), paid during the year 1917 from the proceeds of special revenue bonds, for county charges or liabilities of said county, as provided by subdivisions 3 and 7 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, amounting together to the sum of three million nine hundred and seventy-nine thousand seven hundred and thirty-two dollars and sixty-three cents (\$3,979,732.63).

SECTION 3. There shall be and there is hereby imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of Bronx, the sum of eight hundred and fourteen thousand five hundred and ninety-six dollars and five cents (\$814,596.05), to pay the expenses and charges of said county for the year 1918, included in the Budget, and the further sum of thirty-five thousand one hundred and forty-nine dollars and seventy-two cents (\$35,149.72), paid during the year 1917, from the proceeds of special revenue bonds, for county charges or liabilities of said county, as provided by subdivisions 3 and 7 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, amounting together to the sum of eight hundred and forty-nine thousand seven hundred and forty-five dollars and seventy-seven cents (\$849,745.77).

SECTION 4. There shall be and there is hereby imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of Kings, the sum of two million and seventy-seven thousand one hundred and thirty-nine dollars and seventy-seven cents (\$2,077,139.77), to pay the expenses and charges of said county for the year 1918, included in the Budget, and the further sum of eighty thousand and thirteen dollars and eighty-three cents (\$80,013.83), paid during the year 1917, from the proceeds of special revenue bonds, for county charges or liabilities of said county, as provided by subdivisions 3 and 7 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, amounting together to the sum of two million one hundred and fifty-seven thousand one hundred and fifty-three dollars and sixty cents (\$2,157,153.60).

SECTION 5. There shall be and there is hereby imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of Queens, the sum of four hundred and ninety-eight thousand six hundred and ninety-eight dollars and thirteen cents (\$498,698.13), to pay the expenses and charges of said county for the year 1918, included in the Budget, and the further sum of twelve thousand six hundred and twelve dollars and twenty-seven cents (\$12,612.27), paid

during the year 1917 from the proceeds of special revenue bonds, for county charges or liabilities of said county, as provided by subdivisions 3 and 7 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, amounting together to the sum of five hundred and eleven thousand three hundred and ten dollars and forty cents (\$511,310.40).

SECTION 6. There shall be and there is hereby imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of Richmond, the sum of one hundred and sixty-six thousand seven hundred and ninety-nine dollars and eighty-two cents (\$166,799.82), to pay the expenses and charges of said county for the year 1918, included in the Budget, and the further sum of twelve thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight dollars and seventeen cents (\$12,898.17), paid during the year 1917, from the proceeds of special revenue bonds, for county charges or liabilities of said county, as provided by subdivisions 3 and 7 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, amounting together to the sum of one hundred and seventy-nine thousand six hundred and ninety-seven dollars and ninety-nine cents (\$179,697.99).

SECTION 7. There shall be and there is hereby imposed and levied upon the real estate, subject to taxation, of and within the City of New York, the sum of two million and sixty-one thousand three hundred and sixty-four dollars and six cents (\$2,061,364.06), to pay the assessment or special tax imposed upon the City of New York, as provided by chapter 679, Laws of 1911 (section 247 of the Greater New York Charter), as follows:

"Acquiring title wherever the same has not been heretofore acquired for the same purpose in fee for the lands, tenements and hereditaments required for the opening and extending of Queens Boulevard, from Van Dam Street to Hillside Avenue, in the First, Second and Fourth Wards, Borough of Queens, City of New York." Confirmed by an order of the Supreme Court and entered in the office of the Clerk of the County of Queens November 19, 1917, at a total cost of \$4,122,728.11; fifty (50) per cent. of the entire cost and expense of this proceeding shall be levied on the City of New York, in accordance with a resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted February 21, 1918

An Ordinance to Repeal an Ordinance Amending Section 181 of Article 15 of Chapter 23 of the Code of Ordinances, Relating to "Streets."

Be it *Ordered* by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows: Section 1. An ordinance to amend subdivisions 1, 2 and 3 of section 181 of article 15 of chapter 23 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to "streets," adopted July 3, 1917, and received from the Mayor July 17, 1917, is hereby repealed in its entirety.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

No. 135.

An Ordinance to Amend Section 181 of Article 15 of Chapter 23 of the Code of Ordinances, Relating to "Streets," and Particularly to "Abutting Owner's Duties and Responsibilities" with Respect to "Sidewalks."

Be it *Ordered* by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows: Section 1. Section 181 of Article 15 of Chapter 23 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to "Streets," and particularly to "Abutting Owners' Duties and Responsibilities" with respect to "sidewalks," by inserting therein three subdivisions, respectively 1, 2 and 3, being a restoration of said section as the same existed prior to July 17, 1917:

§181. Abutting property owners' duties and obligations.

1. Generally. The owner, lessee or occupant of any house or other building or vacant lot fronting on any street shall, at his charge and expense, well and sufficiently pave, according to this ordinance, and keep and maintain in good repair, the sidewalks, curb and gutter of the street in front of such house, building or lot.

2. Notice to regulate and pave sidewalks. When any street shall have been paved and a majority of owners of lots on the same block shall have regulated and paved their sidewalks, the president of the borough in which the same is located shall give notice to the owner, lessee or occupant of any lot in front of which the sidewalks shall not be paved, to regulate and pave the same within a certain time, to be designated in the notice. Upon complaint being made to the borough president having jurisdiction thereof that any sidewalk, curb or gutter is not paved or repaired according to this article, he may cause a notice to be served upon the owner, lessee or occupant of any house, building or vacant lot of ground fronting thereon to repair or relay, as the case may require, such sidewalk, curb or gutter, within 10 days after the service of such notice.

3. Construction by city; reimbursement by assessment. In case the owner, lessee or occupant shall fail to lay, repair or relay, as the case may require, such sidewalk, curb or gutter, within the time required by the notice and otherwise to comply therewith, the borough president having jurisdiction is hereby authorized and required to lay or relay the flagging and set or reset the curb and gutter, or any of such work, and to do such incidental work as may be necessary properly to construct or repair such sidewalk, and to certify the expense thereof to the board of assessors. The board shall make a just and equitable assessment of such expense among the owners or occupants of all houses or lots deemed to be benefited thereby, in proportion, as near as may be, to the advantages which they may be deemed to have acquired.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Whereas, the application for variation from the provisions of Section 8-a has the endorsement of Charles Piez, Vice-President and General Manager of the Emergency Fleet Corporation, therefore,

Be it Resolved, That the application of the Delaney Forge & Iron Co., Inc., of Buffalo, New York, for variation from the provisions of Section 8-a of the Labor Law in so far as the same applies to one hundred (100) males in the employ of said Company and engaged on work for the United States Government, be granted.

This variation to be effective immediately and to continue until July 1, 1918.

Whereas, the Division of Factory Inspection has submitted to this Commission the following requests for variation of law, the same being in the form of appeals from orders issued by said Division of Factory Inspection against the premises noted herein; and

Whereas, the said Division of Factory Inspection has had a reinspection made of the premises in each case, and upon the reports submitted gives the conditions existing and recommends as follows:

1. Premises affected, Buffalo, 351 Abbott rd., Building No. 1; appellant, National Aniline & Chemical Co., Inc. 10—Additional exit. 11—Street exit door to open outwardly. 12—Doors to hall and stairs, all floors, to open outwardly. 13—Prohibit occupancy. Four-story building erected before Oct. 1, 1913; sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm; occupancy, 115; 38 factory; 77 not factory; above 1st floor, 83; above 2d floor, 44; exits, one interior stairway properly enclosed, doors to which open out and are self-closing; fire escape on side of building, with nonfireproof openings 7 feet high and 3 feet 8 inches wide; imperfect horizontal exit on each floor, exits remote; no egress from roof; building used for office, laboratory and experimental purposes; 4th floor used as living rooms by restaurant keeper; restaurant also located on 4th floor; fire escape stairs are 18½ inches wide, 4-inch tread, 9½-inch rise, pitched 66 degrees; horizontal exit in westerly end of building near stairway, imperfect in that fire doors have not been provided on each side of openings, some of doors provided are not self-closing; 2d, 3d and 4th floors have steps leading to horizontal exit. Horizontal exit not remote from stairway.

Recommendation: Accept fire escape if reconstructed to conform to Rule 4-B; order No. 11 to be complied with; there being insufficient space to swing doors outwardly, accept a self-closing sliding door at each entrance to stairway, said door to be equipped with a fusible link, to be self-closing, and to be kept open at all times when anyone is at work in the building.

2. Premises affected, Buffalo, 351 Abbott rd., Building 2; appellant, National Aniline & Chemical Co., Inc. 5—Fire drills. 6—Not more than 1 inch space between bars enclosing elevators. 7—Additional exit. 8—Skylight three-quarters area shaft. 9—Prohibit occupancy. 10—Class "B" fire alarm system. 11—Make building fireproof.

Five-story building erected since Oct. 1, 1913; nonfireproof; divided lofts; no sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm; occupancy, 30, 20 of whom are factory; exits, one interior stairway properly enclosed with fireproof partitions; doors open out and are self-closing; imperfect hori-

zonal exits on 1st, 2d, 3d and 4th floors; exits not remote; no egress from roof. Buildings of brick, concrete and iron construction designed for use as office, laboratory and experimental work; 1st, 2d and 3d floors under construction; iron work 1st floor has not been encased in fireproof material; doors within 30 feet connected building not fireproofed; horizontal exits have wired glass panels more than 720 square inches. Space of straight bars on elevator cage are 1 1/2 inches; bar spacing about 5 feet above floor of car; space between bars and floor of solid construction.

Recommendation: Accept as means of exit exterior or interior fireproof enclosed stairway to be located at westerly end of building at extreme north; if interior stairway be provided no skylight need be installed if there are exterior openings to outer air within shaft. Waive No. 8 as there are exterior fireproof windows in shaft. Extension of time on fire alarm signal system and fire drill until Dec. 1, 1918, at which time the system is to be installed or a sprinkler installed which will obviate the necessity for such installation. No 6 to be waived. Encase structural iron work on 1st floor with fireproof materials; accept glass in doorway on one side of horizontal exit if all openings to horizontal exit on the other side of wall be provided with self-closing sliding fire doors equipped with fusible link.

3. Premises affected, Buffalo, 351 Abbott rd., Buildings 3, 4, 5 and 6; appellant, National Aniline & Chemical Co., Inc. 6—Three additional wash basins. 7—Two water closets in building. Four-story building used for color mixing and copperage; occupancy, 30 males; no water closet and one sink provided. In Building 101, on opposite side of street but connected by covered viaduct, are sufficient and suitable wash sinks and water closets.

Recommendation: Waiver of order and acceptance of facilities in Building 101.

4. Premises affected, Buffalo, 351 Abbott rd., Building 7; appellant, National Aniline & Chemical Co., Inc. 3—Water closet for employees in building. Two-story building used for packing; 13 employees, all males. In Building 101, across the street, are sufficient and suitable closets; same work done in Building 101, part of same department.

Recommendation: Acceptance of facilities in Building 101 and waiver of order.

5. Premises affected, Buffalo, 351 Abbott rd., Building 11; appellant, National Aniline & Chemical Co., Inc. 8—Enclose elevator shaft fireproof to 3 feet above roof, with skylight. 9—Exit stairs incombustible. 10—Treads of stairs not less than 10 inches. 11—Enclose north and south exit stairs fireproof. 12—Roof of stairway enclosure fireproof, with skylight. 13—Prohibit occupancy. Three-story nonfireproof building, with 1st floor lofts divided; sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm; occupancy, 19; above 1st floor, 13; above 2d floor, 8; exits, three interior stairways, doors to which open out and are self-closing. "H" manufactured. Westerly stair enclosed fireproof, with no egress direct to outer air; stairs at northerly and southerly side of building partly enclosed with fireproof material; roofs of all stairway enclosures nonfireproof; there is a small extension at north and south ends, and stairways occupy part of this space; two elevators, each wood-enclosed.

Recommendation: Elevators to be enclosed with fireproof material, but no skylight if windows be provided to outer air; accept stairs of incombustible material and treads less than 10 inches wide. Accept fireproof or fire-resisting partitions for continuation of enclosure of north and south stairs; roofs of stairways enclosures to be made of fireproof material or of standard specifications; skylight to be provided in northerly enclosure and waived in so far as applies to southerly enclosure, as there are exterior fireproof windows in shaft; waived also in westerly stairway enclosure, as there are exterior fireproof windows in shaft.

6. Premises affected, Buffalo, 351 Abbott rd., Building 12; appellant, National Aniline & Chemical Co., Inc. 2—Enclose exit stairs with fireproof partitions to 3 feet above roof and provide skylight. 3—Exit stairs 44 inches wide and incombustible. 4—Make treads not less than 10 inches wide. 5—Prohibit occupancy. Three-story nonfireproof building erected since Oct. 1, 1913, with divided lofts; sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm; occupancy, 32; above 1st floor, 20; above 2d floor, 3; exits, four unenclosed interior stairways; exits remote; no egress from roof. Siphon colors are made; about midway in building is concrete partition 1 1/2 inches thick; southerly section consists of two working platforms, one above the other, with stairways leading to same and runways leading over to northerly section. At times there are apt to be suffocating fumes in building. The two exit stairs in northerly section are 44 inches wide with nine-inch tread; two in southerly section are 30 inches wide with 9-inch tread; stairs built of wood.

Recommendation: Accept two stairs in northerly section portion if same be enclosed with fireproof partitions as per Section 79-a, except that partitions may terminate at underside of roof, and if there be exterior fireproof windows in shaft no skylight need be provided. Two stairs now in southerly section may remain as at present installed, with passageways enclosed with fire-resisting material to be provided from 2d and 3d floors and extend from fireproof enclosed stairways to working platforms at southerly section. Waiver of orders Nos. 3 and 4.

7. Premises affected, Buffalo, 351 Abbott rd., Buildings 14, 15, 15a and 16; appellant, National Aniline & Chemical Co., Inc. 3—Keep all vats, where the top thereof is below the level of the elbow of the operator, properly covered. 12—Two water closets. 11—Four wash sinks. 15—Self-closing gates or doors 5 feet 6 inches high on all floors of barrel elevator shaftway on sides used for loading. 16—Operating cable locking devices on barrel elevator car. Two-story building; 37 employees. Covers not provided for all vats. Plant has proper wash and bath house and nearby facilities for water closet for employees in this building. On same floors no gates provided at elevator. Operator designated for this car.

Recommendation: Accept facilities in nearby building, and waive orders 10 and 11; 16 to be complied with by assigning operator to run this car at all times; 3 and 15 to be complied with. 8. Premises affected, Buffalo, 351 Abbott rd.; Building No. 17; appellant National Aniline & Chemical Co., Inc. 2—Provide water closet. 3—Provide sink. Nine employees in building; nearby buildings have sufficient water closet facilities and wash and bath house have ample washing facilities.

Recommendation: Waiver of orders and acceptance of facilities provided.

9. Premises affected, Buffalo, 351 Abbott rd., Buildings 21, 21a, 22, 22a; appellant, National Aniline & Chemical Co., Inc. 3—Suitable water closet. 4—Wash sinks (2). Twelve employees. Sufficient facilities provided in Buildings 55 and 57 across driveway.

Recommendation: Waiver of orders and acceptance of facilities in Buildings 55 and 57.

10. Premises affected, Buffalo, 351 Abbott rd., Building 24; appellant, National Aniline & Chemical Co., Inc. 4—Prohibit occupancy. 5—Enclose elevator shaft fireproof. 6—Enclose exit stairs fireproof. 7—Make exit stairs 44 inches wide. 8—Stair treads 10 inches wide, not over 7 1/4 inches rise. 9—Stairs incombustible. 10—Six additional wash basins. 11—Two additional

water closets. Three-story brick building erected since Oct. 1, 1913; floor area 23,880 square feet; colors manufactured; open lofts; sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm; floor area of building is composed of platforms connected by stairs; there are numerous vats with platforms of varied heights; occupancy, 95; 75 above 1st floor, 45 above 2d floor; eleven unenclosed stairways; elevator enclosed with wooden partitions; hoistway shaft not fireproofed; three sinks and five water closets provided in building; stairways of wood construction and are from 29 to 40 inches in width, nearly all treads are 9 1/4 inches wide.

Recommendation: Elevator shaft to be enclosed fireproof; stairway on easterly side of building to be enclosed fireproof, and stairway in southwest corner to be extended from 1st to 2d floors, and also enclosed with fireproof partitions; provide fireproof stairway about midway on south side of building and another fireproof stairway about midway at north side of building. These four stairways will be accepted in lieu of five exits required by floor area, and permit present stairways to remain as working stairways. The two stairways now in the building to be enclosed as per Section 79-a, and two new stairways to be constructed in all respects in accordance with Section 79-a of the Labor Law and Industrial Code Rules. Waive orders 7, 8 and 9 in so far as they relate to existing stairs. Waive order 10; 11 to be complied with by extending existing installation.

11. Premises affected, Buffalo, 351 Abbott rd., Building 25; appellant, National Aniline & Chemical Co., Inc. 3—Water closet to be provided. 4—Provide wash sink. Two-story building with 10 males employed; no water closet nor sink in building. Have bath house with proper washing facilities and water closet accommodations in new Building 55 across the way.

Recommendation: Waiver of orders and acceptance of facilities now provided.

12. Premises affected, Buffalo, 351 Abbott rd., Building 26; appellant, National Aniline & Chemical Co., Inc. 3—Provide wash sink. 4—Provide water closet. Two-story building with three employees. Have suitable accommodations in building across the way.

Recommendation: Waiver of orders and acceptance of facilities in building across the way for three persons employed.

13. Premises affected, Buffalo, 351 Abbott rd., Building 31; appellant, National Aniline & Chemical Co., Inc. 1—Provide two water closets. 2—Provide two wash sinks. Seventeen males employed. No water closets nor sinks in building. Building 27 adjoining has sufficient accommodations for these employees.

Recommendation: Waiver of orders and acceptance of facilities in Building 27.

14. Premises affected, Buffalo, 351 Abbott rd., Building 31-32; appellant, National Aniline & Chemical Co., Inc. 6—Provide two water closets. 7—Provide two wash sinks. 22 males employed; no water closets nor sinks in building. Sufficient water closets and washing facilities provided in Building No. 27 nearby, also in bath house.

Recommendation: Waiver of orders and acceptance of facilities in Building 27.

15. Premises affected, Buffalo, 351 Abbott rd., Building 38-39; appellant, National Aniline & Chemical Co., Inc. 4—Provide water closet in building. 10 male employees, divided into shifts. Water closet facilities in yard across the driveway.

Recommendation: Waiver of order and acceptance of closet already provided.

16. Premises affected, Buffalo, 351 Abbott rd., Buildings 40 and 41; appellant, National Aniline & Chemical Co., Inc. 2—Provide water closet. 3—Provide wash sink. Two one-story buildings with an occupancy of 16. Buildings adjoin house wherein are located proper and sufficient washing and toilet facilities.

Recommendation: Waiver of orders and acceptance of accommodations provided.

17. Premises affected, Buffalo, 351 Abbott rd., Building 42; appellant, National Aniline & Chemical Co., Inc. 5—Prohibit occupancy. 6—Additional exit. 7—Skylight in stairway enclosure. 8—Continue stairs to roof. Three-story nonfireproof building, erected since Oct. 1, 1913; divided lofts; no sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm. Occupancy, 7; above 1st floor, 6; above 2d floor, 4; exits, one interior stairway properly enclosed with fireproof partitions, doors to which open outwardly and are self-closing; imperfect horizontal exit on 1st floor; no safe egress from roof. Concrete building erected more for use as a bath house than for manufacturing; on 1st floor are water filters; 2d floor bath house with sinks, also water closets, shower baths and lockers; about one-half area of 3d floor devoted to bath purposes, balance used as stock room and small plant laundry. Existing stairway straight run on exterior wall.

Recommendation: Acceptance of Rule 4-a fire escape at northerly side near northeast corner. Plain glass window in exterior wall, and waiver of order No. 7. Waiver of No. 8, no egress from roof.

18. Premises affected, Buffalo, 351 Abbott rd., Building 46; appellant, National Aniline & Chemical Co., Inc. 4—Skylight three-fourths area of stairway enclosure. 5—Additional exit. 6—Prohibit occupancy. Three-story nonfireproof building, erected since Oct. 1, 1913; divided lofts; no sprinkler; combustibles carried; no fire alarm; occupancy, 27; above 1st floor, 24; above 2d floor, 3; exits, one interior stairway enclosed with fireproof partitions, doors to which open out and are self-closing; 1st floor of building used as garage; lime slacking also done on 1st floor; 2d floor, electrical repairs are made; 3d floor, plumbing repairs; electrical and plumbing stock rooms kept in building; employees vary, as this building is used for headquarters and the men are at work at times throughout the plant. Building bounded by river on one side.

Recommendation: Waiver of No. 4, as there are fireproof windows in exterior wall of stairway enclosure. Accept as compliance with No. 5 a fire escape conforming to Rule 4, 79-b-4; same to be located at front of building on northeast corner as remote as possible from stairway.

19. Premises affected, Buffalo, 351 Abbott rd., Buildings 47, 48, 49, 50, 51 and 52; appellant, National Aniline & Chemical Co., Inc. 5—Two suitable water closets. 6—Two suitable sinks. Group of one-story buildings with 20 employees; buildings located near bath house, and new buildings erected with proper facilities.

Recommendation: Waiver of order and acceptance of facilities now provided.

20. Premises affected, Buffalo, 351 Abbott rd., Building 53; appellant, National Aniline & Chemical Co., Inc. 3—Additional exit. 4—Prohibit occupancy. 5—Skylight in stairway enclosure. 6—Enclose stairs. Three-story factory building erected since Oct. 1, 1913; open lofts; sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm. Occupancy, 6; above 1st floor, 1; above 2d floor, 1; used for manufacture of nigrosine, and connected with Building 54; exits, one fireproof stairway; horizontal exit on 2d floor, which is imperfect; 3d floor is balcony with about one-third floor to accommodate working conditions; horizontal exit on 2d floor has fire door on one side only; exits remote; safe egress from roof.

Recommendation: Perfect horizontal exit on 2d floor by providing proper fire door on the other side, width of 30 inches to be allowed to remain; provide horizontal exit in party wall on 3d floor near easterly end, which will lead to Building 54; 1st floor has opening at each end leading to driveways. Waive order No. 5, as stairway enclosure has exterior fireproof windows to outer air; when additional exit has

been provided as called for, waive order to enclose stairway fireproof from 2d to 3d floor.

21. Premises affected, Buffalo, 351 Abbott rd., Building 54; appellant, National Aniline & Chemical Co., Inc. 4—Skylight in stairway enclosure. 5—Additional exit. 6—Prohibit occupancy. Three-story nonfireproof building erected since Oct. 1, 1913; open lofts; sprinkler; no fire alarm; no combustibles; occupancy, 22; above 1st floor, 18; above 2d floor, 6; exits, one interior stairway enclosed with fireproof partitions, doors to which open out and are self-closing; imperfect horizontal exit on 2d floor; exits remote; no egress from roof; building connected with No. 53 and used for manufacture of benzidine.

Recommendation: Accept a horizontal exit on 3d floor as additional exit, same to conform with Section 79-f-9, and to be provided at easterly end of building and leading to Building 53; horizontal exit on 2d floor to be provided with fire doors on both sides; 1st floor has doors to driveways at either end. Waive order for skylight, as there are fireproof windows in exterior wall of stairway enclosure.

22. Premises affected, Buffalo, 351 Abbott rd., Building 55; appellant, National Aniline & Chemical Co., Inc. Three-story nonfireproof building erected since Oct. 1, 1913; open lofts; sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm; occupancy, 23; above 1st floor, 11; above 2d floor, 5; exits, two interior stairways, one of which is properly enclosed with fireproof partitions; doors to same open out and are self-closing; imperfect horizontal exit on 3d floor; exits remote; no egress from roof; Building 55 one of three connected buildings in a group where intermediate products are made; horizontal exit on 3d floor is 36 inches wide, with fire door on one side only, said door not provided with self-closing device; unenclosed stairway erected to accommodate working conditions; 1st floor has doors to driveway at each end.

Recommendation: Order No. 2 to provide adequate cover or railing around all vats, pans and kettles where the tops thereof are below the level of the elbow of the operator, is to be complied with. No. 8 will be waived when exit provided as called for herein; No. 9, accept the 36-inch horizontal exit on 3d floor when same has been provided with fire door on both sides, and accept horizontal exit on 2d floor to be located in fire wall directly underneath the horizontal exit on 3d floor, same to conform to Section 79-f-9 and Industrial Code Rules; waive order No. 10 for skylight three-fourths area of stairway enclosure, as there are exterior fireproof windows in said enclosure; when the horizontal exits have been provided as called for in compliance with order No. 9, the unenclosed stairway will be permitted to remain unenclosed, same to be used as a working stairway, and order No. 11 will be waived.

23. Premises affected, Buffalo, 351 Abbott rd., Building 56; appellant, National Aniline & Chemical Co., Inc. 3—Covers over or railings around all vats, pans and kettles where the top thereof comes below the level of the operator's elbow. 5—Covers for extractors. 10—Prohibit occupancy. 12—Skylight in stairway enclosure.

13—Additional exit. 14—Enclose stairs fireproof. Three-story nonfireproof factory building erected since Oct. 1, 1913; open lofts; sprinkler; no fire alarm; no combustibles; occupancy, 32; above 1st floor, 14; above 2d floor, 7; exits, one interior fireproof enclosed stairway, doors to which open out and are self-closing; one unenclosed stairway; two imperfect horizontal exits on 3d floor; exits remote; safe egress from roof. This is the center of a group composing buildings 55, 56 and 57, which are used for making intermediate products; on 3d floor are two imperfect horizontal exits, one leading to Building 55, 36 inches wide, and one to Building 57, 72 inches wide, which exits have fire doors on one side only; unenclosed stairway from 1st to 2d floor used to accommodate working conditions. The extractors take water out of liquid product, and sediment resulting is pasty; extractors filled by hose and pipe connections; location protects top of extractors; stairway enclosure has exterior fireproof window.

Recommendation: No. 3 to be complied with. No. 5 to be waived. No. 12 to be waived, as there are exterior fireproof windows in enclosure. No. 13, will accept present openings in fire wall on 3d floor, southerly opening being 72 inches wide, if same be provided with proper self-closing fire doors equipped with fusible links on each side of said wall, and as additional exit from 2d floor a horizontal exit conforming to Section 79-f-9 and Industrial Code rules in fire wall between Buildings 56 and 57 at a point as nearly as possible underneath exits in fire wall on 3d floor. When the horizontal exits called for have been provided, order to enclose stairway from 1st to 2d floor fireproof will be waived, and said stairway permitted to remain as a working stairway only but not classified as an exit.

24. Premises affected, Buffalo, 351 Abbott rd., Building 57; appellant, National Aniline & Chemical Co., Inc. 7—Skylight in stairway enclosure. 8—Additional exit. 9—Prohibit occupancy. 11—Enclose stairs fireproof. Three-story nonfireproof factory building erected since Oct. 1, 1913; open lofts; sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm system; occupancy, 12; above 1st floor, 7; above 2d floor, none permanently; exits, one interior stairway properly enclosed fireproof, doors to which open out and are self-closing; one auxiliary stairway; imperfect horizontal exit on 3d floor only; exits remote; no egress from roof; exterior windows.

Recommendation: Accept as compliance with No. 8 the 73-inch horizontal exit on 3d floor if same be provided with proper self-closing fire door on each side, equipped with fusible link, and horizontal exit on 2d floor if same be provided in fire wall leading to Building 56, said exit to conform to Section 79-f-9 and Industrial Code rules. Unenclosed stairway from 3d floor to pent to be accepted as at present constructed and unenclosed. There being exterior fireproof windows in stairway enclosure order No. 7 is waived. Orders Nos. 9 and 11 to be waived when No. 8 has been complied with as called for.

25. Premises affected, Buffalo, 351 Abbott rd., Building 60; appellant, National Aniline & Chemical Co., Inc. 1—Provide water closet. 2—Provide wash sink. Small one-story blacksmith shop with four men employed therein. No water closet nor sink in building.

Recommendation: Accept installation of suitable and convenient central toilet and washing facilities to be erected to accommodate this and nearby buildings.

26. Premises affected, Buffalo, 351 Abbott rd., Buildings 61, 62, 63; appellant, National Aniline & Chemical Co., Inc. 6—Four water closets. One-story building used for repair work and stock; about 58 employees; many of these men are in and out all over the plant; no water closets in building, nor convenient.

Recommendation: Accept suitable toilet installation to be provided in this building or nearby, which will be accessible for this building as well as nearby small buildings.

27. Premises affected, Buffalo, 351 Abbott rd., Building No. 66; appellant, National Aniline & Chemical Co., Inc. 1—Additional exit. 2—Enclose exit stairs fireproof. 3—Continue exit stairs to roof. 4—Exit stairs 44 inches wide, 10 inches tread, and incombustible. 5—Enclose hoistway shaft fireproof. 6—Prohibit occupancy. 7—Provide water closet. 8—Provide wash sink. Two-story wood building erected since Oct. 1, 1913; nitraniline manufactured; open lofts; sprinkler; no combustibles; fire alarm system; occupancy, 12; 5 above 1st floor; exit, one interior unenclosed stairway 36 inches wide with 8 1/4

inches tread; no washing nor water closet facilities in building, nor adjacent.

Recommendation: Accept as additional exit a horizontal exit conforming to Section 79-f-9 leading to Building 21 from 2d floor, same to be in northeast corner of building. There is an exit on 1st floor to Building 21, which will make additional exit from each floor. Three-story nonfireproof building erected since Oct. 1, 1913; open lofts; sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm; occupancy, 21; above 1st floor, 10; above 2d floor, 6; exits, two interior stairways properly enclosed with fireproof partitions, doors to which open out and are self-closing; exits remote; safe egress from roof; two imperfect horizontal exits on each floor, "H" acid manufactured in building; fireproof enclosed stairs have exterior windows in enclosure leading to outer air; these windows are fireproof; this building is connected with a building having ample washing and toilet facilities; horizontal exits lead to buildings 107 and 108 through party wall; these horizontal exits have but one fire door.

Stairways have exterior fireproofed windows in enclosure; water closets located on 3d floor, majority of employees on 2d and 3d floors; horizontal exits connect with buildings 105 and 106, and on 3d floor are two additional horizontal exits in form of bridges leading to Buildings 109 and 102.

Phenyl acid manufactured. Color acid manufactured. Floors in building are not continuous, but are platforms made to accommodate gravity flow in tanks used. Building used to manufacture color acids and similar in construction to Buildings 114 and 115. Two unenclosed stairways accommodate working conditions; two fireproof stairways form perfect exit lines; occupancy small.

Recommendation: Waive of order No. 8 if horizontal exits on 3d floor are perfected by providing self-closing sliding fire doors on each side; inasmuch as there are exterior fireproof windows in stairway enclosure, waive order for skylight; as connected Building 17 has ample washing and toilet facilities, waive orders Nos. 11 and 12. Stairs are 43 inches wide, and the unenclosed stairs only are of incombustible material; waive order and accept stairways as constructed.

One-story and basement nonfireproof brick building erected since Oct. 1, 1913; no sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm; divided lofts. Occupancy, 10; above 1st floor, none. Exits: Five unenclosed interior stairways; exits remote; no egress from roof; 4 imperfect horizontal exits on each floor. Building used as boiler house and engine room. The height between basement and first floor is 10 feet 11 inches; lower story but little over half its height above curb; openings in fire wall protected on one side by wooden doors; ash hoist extends from basement floor to top of building, about 56 feet; lower story varies but little, being a cellar; stairs mostly 36 inches wide; built of incombustible material. Resolved by the State Industrial Commission, That the variations noted be granted to the appellant in each case with the understanding that said variations be effective only so long as conditions remain as of this date.

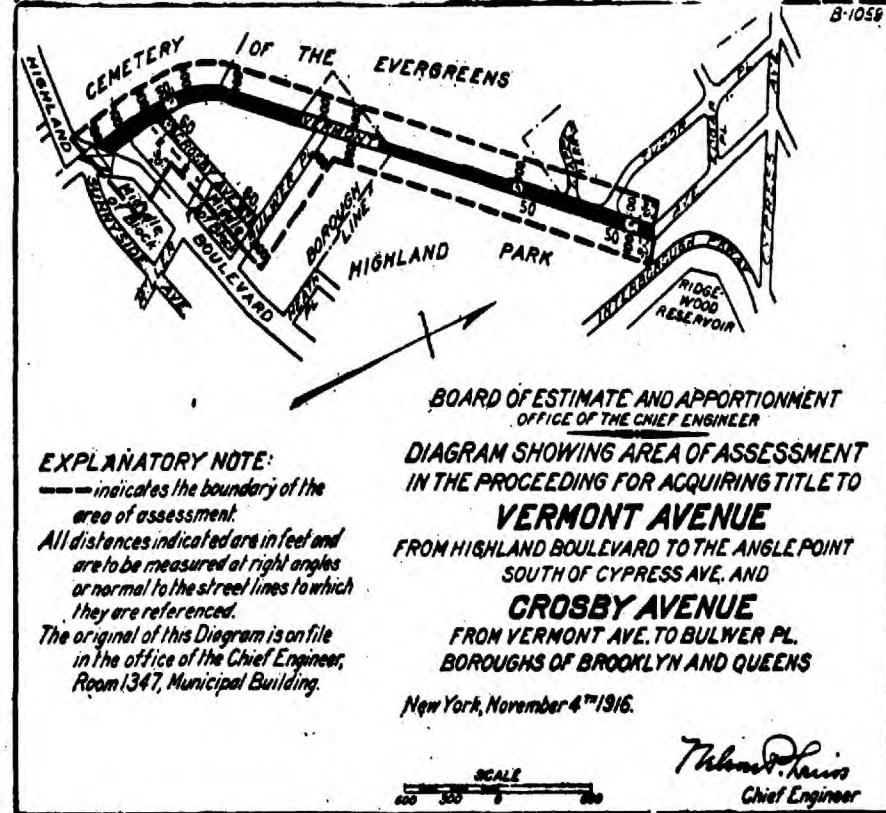

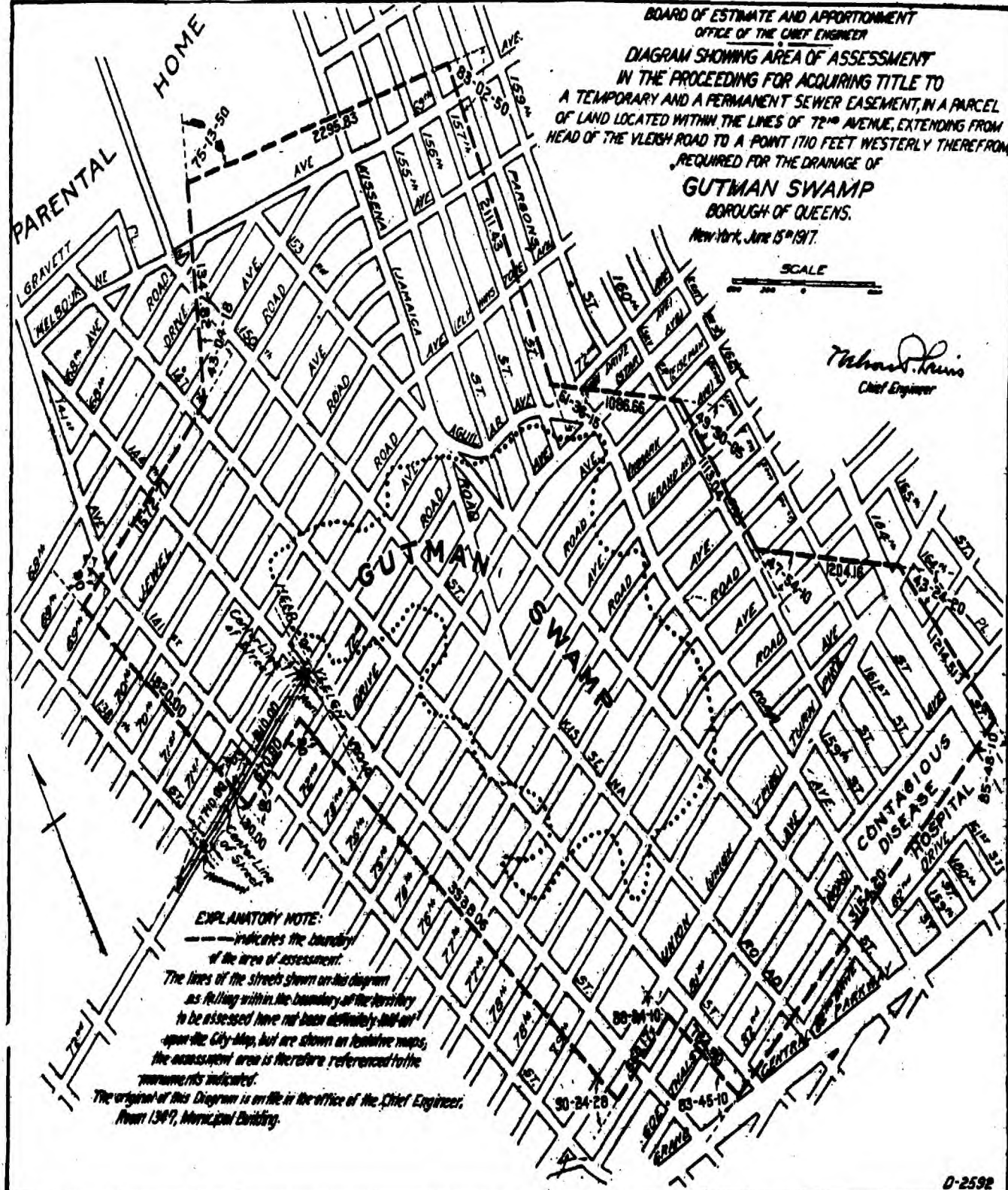
