The Board of Health of the Health Department of the City of New York respectfully submits the following report for the three months ending June 30, 1874, with the vital statistics of the city for the same period:

The following is a summary of the operations of the Sanitary Bureau, which is charged with the duty of inspecting and reporting in proper form all nuisances or causes of danger to the public health, with the execution of the orders of the Board, and with the care of contagious diseases.

The number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was thirty-one thousand six hundred and fifty-seven, as follows, viz.:

The number of complaints received from citizens during the three months ending June 30, 1874, was twelve hundred and thirty-two (1,232), all of which were referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

The Sanitary Superintendent during the same period granted, under instructions and authority of the Board, eleven hundred and twelve (1,112) permits to vessels to discharge cargoes upon proper vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port; two thousand five hundred and sixty-five (2,565) permits to scavengers to empty privies, their work being inspected by officers of this Board detailed for that purpose; thirty-two (32) permits to re-move and transport manure; nine (9) permits to transport bones and fat; and seventy-one (71) permits were granted to land rags (in bulk) under bonds.

The number of places visited where cases of contagious diseases were reported and found was eight hundred and ninety-three (893); the num-ber of persons sick with contagious disease, who eight hundred and ninety-three (893); the hundred ber of persons sick with contagious disease, who could not be properly isolated or cared for at their own houses and were therefore removed to hospital, was two hundred and two (202); the number of families visited for the purpose of vaccinations. ber of families visited for the purpose of vaccina-tion was two thousand seven hundred and nine (2,709); and the number of vaccinations per-formed was fifteen hundred and sixty-five (1,565).

The number of premises disinfected and fumigated where contagious diseases had prevailed was nine hundred and eighty-five (985). The number of bodies removed to the Morgue was eight (8).

The following tabulated statement gives the amount of work performed by the Disinfecting Corps for the purpose of preventing the spreading of contagious diseases. The methods of disinfection employed were the same as described in former reports. The disinfecting depot at One Hundred and Seventieth street, near Third avenue, was abandoned on May 30, 1874, when the resignation of the disinfector for the annexed district took effect.

The disinfection of street gutters was commenced June 1, and was limited until June 15 to the disinfection of streets and gutters in the Fourth and Sixth Wards. The general disinfection was commenced June 15. The depots during this month were situated at northeast corner Elm and Broome streets; No. 436 West Thirty-fifth street; and Scavengers' alley in East Twelfth street; On June 30 the depot at Elm and Broome streets was vacated, and a depot was established at No. 146 Hester street. The two (300 gallons) trucks were stationed respectively at West Thirty-fifth street stand, and East Twelfth street; while the two barrel carts of (100 gallons) capacity each, and the cart kept for the distribution of disinfectants for privies, yards and cellars were stationed at Elm street. at Elm street.

The disinfecting solution used for the disinfection of privies, yards, and cellars, is as follows:

I quart of dead oil.

2 quarts of dead oil, 2 quarts of zinc iron liquor, diluted with water to three gallons, represents an ordinary charge for a privy. If the privy vault had been recently cleaned, or if the vaults do not

come up to average size, the quantity of disinfecting liquor used is correspondingly less.
2d. Yards and Cellars— 1/2 quart of dead oil.

I quart of dead on,
I quart of zinc iron liquor,
diluted with water to three gallons. This disinfection was commenced June 18, and kept up
regularly until the 30th instant.

The total mortality in the city, in the second quarter of the present year, was 35 less than in the corresponding quarter of the year 1873, and was marked with 217 more deaths than were registered in the first quarter this year, but counting all deaths as they occurred in the two succes sive periods of 13 weeks each, only 21 less than an equal number of deaths occurred in each of these periods. There were 13,075 deaths in the 26 weeks that ended on the 30th day of June. This mortality is equal to 26.15 per 1,000, as an annual death rate, estimating the city population at 1,000,000, or of 25.10 per 1,000, in a population of 1,000,000. tion of 1,040,000.

The foregoing statement indicates the fact that not only the second, but the first quarter of the year has proved more favorable to human life in New York than any corresponding period since 1868. It is to be noticed, however, that measles,

1868. It is to be noticed, however, that measles, whooping-cough and diphtheria, were charged with more deaths than in the average of corresponding months in the previous four years.

The zymotic class of diseases being justly regarded as most correctly representing the sanitary state of the population, the evidence which it affords is contributed by the conclusion that an interval degree of the population of the conclusion that an interval degree of the conclusion that an interval degre unusual degree of general healthfulness has pre-vailed in the past three months, and in the half year ending at the beginning of the present month.

The total number of contagious diseases reported to the Department during the three months ending June, 27, 1874, was eight hundred and fifty-four (854), as follows: Typhoid fever, forty-two (42); scarlet fever, two hundred and thirty-nine (239); cerebro-spinal meningitis, forty-six (46); measles, one hundred and twenty-two (122); diphtheria, three hundred and fourteen (314); and small-pox, ninety-one (91).

The following abstract presents a comparison of the mortality of the chief pulmonary diseases during the second quarter of the year in the past five years; also of the total number of deaths in the first year and in the first five years of life, and of the total mortality in public institutions.

The mortality from acute diseases of the lungs has exceeded that from the same causes in the corresponding period of the previous five years. Bronchitis and pneumonia were charged with 986 deaths in the second quarter of the present year, and in the previous five years, in the corresponding thirteen weeks, the average was 800. Phthisis pulmonalis is charged with 54 deaths above the average of the previous five years. But these increased numbers are about in the ratio of increase of population.

Infants under a year old suffered a diminished death rate, and between one and five years of age the rate was still further diminished, chiefly by the greatly diminished amount of small-pox. This obvious gain in tavor of children under five years of age is shown by 639 less deaths under that age than in the average for the previous five years. The deaths in hospitals and other public institutions the last quarter should be mentioned in the same line of evidence, as the total number of deaths in them during the quarter was less by 340 than in the average of the corresponding weeks for the previous five years.

During the three months ending June 30, 1874, six thousand four hundred and fifty-two (6,452) permits were granted for burials. During the same period two hundred and sixty-five (265) applications for transit permits were received, and permits granted; five hundred and ninety-one (591) permits were granted for the burial of still-born children; seven hundred and seventy-one (771) Coroner's certificates were received and recorded; three hundred and twenty-six (326) searches of the records of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and three hundred (300) transcripts, forty-six (46) of marriages, and forty-three (43) of births from said records, were issued.

The total number of births registered in the last quarter amounts to 5,964. This is a decrease of 301, as compared with the number registered in the previous quarter, and 1,036 more than were of 301, as compared with the number registered in the previous quarter, and 1,036 more than were registered in the corresponding quarter of the previous year. The ratio of publicly registered births to the estimated population of the city the last six months is equivalent to 23.51 per 1,000 annually. The birth rate the last quarter was e ual to 22.93 per 1,000. This increased faithfulness of physicians and parents in reporting births for registration, has been greatly promoted by the service of two canvassers, who in the past four months have thoroughly canvassed and obtained returns of births from persons who had neglected their duty in this matter.

The Register of Vital Statistics states that about 75 per cent. of all births are non-regularly reported and registered, and that at the present rates of birth and mortality there was a natural increase in the population during the past six months amounting to about 4,000 in excess of the deaths.

Orders of the Board.

The orders of this Board for the abatement of nuisances are issued upon the facts and evidence nuisances are issued upon the facts and evidence contained in the written reports of Sanitary Inspectors, the result of personal inspection of the premises complained of. During the three months ending June 30, 1874, the number of orders issued by the Board was six thousand, one hundred and ninety-four. Of this number, 2,813 were issued under the first sub-division of section 14, chapter 74, Laws of 1866, by the terms of which the party sued is allowed three days in which to demand a hearing by the Board of the testimony which may be presented to show that the order should be modified or revoked. In cases where no hearing has been asked for, and the order should be modified or revoked. In cases where no hearing has been asked for, and the orders have not been complied with, final orders in the original or an amended form to the number of six hundred and forty-two have been issued, and the Board has directed the attorney to commence actions for penalties for non-compliance with such orders. All other written orders, in number three thousand three hundred and eighty-one, have been issued under the second sub-division of section 14, chapter 74, Laws of 1866, and are of a peremptory character, requiring that the nuisance be abated within five days, and if not complied with, directing the Sanitary Superintendent to enforce the same without further notice, unless the Board shall elect to commence a suit for penalty in lieu of the execution of the order by its officers or agents.

The absolute necessity, therefore, is apparent, that the Board should now appoint a principal "Superintendent," who will be authorized to take charge of the vessel as soon as she is designated by the Secretary, attend to her fitting up, and see that she is completely prepared for the reception of pupils and in such manner as to insure the success of this highly important experiment, designed for the improve-

by education, character, and experience in the naval service, to take charge of and insure success to this enterprise.
