### SANITARY BUREAU.

The following is a summary of the operations of the Sanitary Bureau, which is charged with the duty of inspecting and reporting in proper form all nuisances or causes of danger to the public health, with the execution of the orders of the Board, and with the care of contagious diseases.

The number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 20,964; the number of causes of complaint was 9,409, as follows:

The number of complaints received from citizens during the three months ending June 30, 1881, was 2,986, all of which were referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

The Sanitary Superintendent during the same period granted, under instruction and authority of the Board, 1,289 permits to discharge cargoes, upon proper vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port; 2,839 permits to scavengers to empty privies, their work being inspected by officers of this Board detailed for the purpose; 71 permits to land rags (in bulk) under bonds; 18 permits to transport manure, and 14 miscellaneous permits under the Sanitary Code.

During the three months ending June 30, 1881, nine thousand four hundred and seventy-five (9,475) permits were granted for burials. During the same period two hundred and ninety-seven (297) applications for transit permits were received and permits granted; six hundred and forty-one (641) permits were granted for the burial of still-born children; nine hundred and twenty-six (926) Coroners' certificates were received and recorded; nine hundred and thirty (930) searches of the records of births, marriages and deaths were made; and four hundred and eighty-seven (487) transcripts of the records of deaths, ninety (90) of marriages, and seventy-four (74) of births from said records were issued. There were five thousand two hundred and thirty-six (5,236) persons registered as married during the quarter, and five thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine (5,879) children were born during the same period.

## OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY—NOTICES OF THE BOARD.

The notices of the Board for the abatement of nuisances are issued upon the facts and evidence contained in the written reports of the Sanitary Inspectors, the result of personal inspection of premises complained of. During the three months ending June 30, 1881, the number of notices issued by the Board was 7,473. These notices call the attention of owners, lessees, and agents to a violation of the Sanitary Code in each case, and require the necessary alteration, repair, cleaning, and improvement of the premises named within five days from the receipt of the notice. If, upon reinspection, it is found that the requirements of the notice have not been complied with, a suit for penalty is commenced against the delinquents, under section 82, chapter 335, Laws of 1873.

The prices of fuel and of all classes of supplies have largely advanced during the year. In accordance with your recommendation an advance has been made in the wages of cleaners or laborers paid from this appropriation. A very large expenditure had to be incurred for materials, services and labor required in draping the city and county buildings and offices on the occasion of the death of the late President of the United States.

I submitted this question to the Counsel to the Corporation, and I herewith enclose a copy of his opinion, in which he says "that the erection of poles on streets or sidewalks does not render companies liable to this charge, and that the ordinance is applicable only where the wires are placed under ground."

In accordance with this opinion I respectfully request that the above amounts be returned by your Department to the Brush Electric Illuminating Company.

SIR—I have received your letter of June 18, in relation to the interpretation of the ordinance of the Common Council in respect to the Electric Light Companies.

The ordinance provides, "Whenever at any time any permit shall be granted to open the streets, pavements, or sidewalks, for the purpose of laying the tubes, wires, conductors, and insulators of the company, a sum equal to one cent per lineal foot of the streets occupied under such permit shall be paid to the city."

You then ask:

1. "Will the erection of poles on the streets or sidewalks to support wires, render companies liable to this charge, or is it applicable only where the wires are placed under ground?"

2. "Whether the words 'per lineal foot of streets occupied, are to be interpreted as meaning the length of the streets in which one or any number of wires may be laid, or the length of each wire, or the length of each set of wires, where one or more sets of wires may be laid together, as, for instance, one on each side of a street: and whether, in the two latter cases, the charge would also apply to wires laid from the main line to houses opposite the same.'"

The ordinance in question evidently contemplates that the charge specified shall be made only when the streets, pavements, or sidewalks are opened for the purpose of laying the tubes, wires, conductors, and insulators of the company.

First—I am therefore of opinion that the erection of poles on streets or sidewalks does not render the companies liable to this charge, and that the ordinance is applicable only where the wires are placed under ground.

Second—I am also of the opinion that the charge of one cent per lineal foot is to be made under the ordinance for each lineal foot of trench that may be opened in the street, and the aggregate amount thereof is to be determined by the length of the trench opened, whether the same be occupied by one or more wires, and that the charge would not apply to wires laid from the main lines to houses opposite the same.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office on the 11th day of October, 1881, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, the following amendment of the Sanitary Code for the security of life and health be and the same is hereby adopted, and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:

Resolved, That Section 201 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 201. That for all lodging-houses in which beds are let for lodgers containing four or more beds in any apartment therein for the use of lodgers, a permit in writing from this Department shall be required, and no person in the City of New York, shall have, lease, let or keep any such lodging-house or the lodgings therein, or assist in the keeping, hire, or assist in hiring, or conduct the business of any such lodging-house, or the lodgings therein, except pursuant to the terms and condition of a permit in writing previously obtained therefor from this Department, an application for which shall be made in accordance with the rules and regulations of the Board of Health by the person or persons who propose to use the same. The beds in all lodging-houses and in every room in which beds are let for lodgers shall be separated by a passageway of not less than two feet, horizontally, and all the beds shall be so arranged that under each of them the air shall freely circulate, and there be adequate ventilation. Six hundred cubic feet of air space shall be provided and allowed for each bed or lodger, and no more beds shall be permitted than those provided in this way, unless free and adequate means of ventilation exist, approved by the Board of Health, and a special permit in writing be granted therefor, specifying the number of beds or the cubic air space which shall under special circumstances be allowed.
